**Neighbor says suspect in boy's slaying depressed**

HOUSTON (AP) — A man accused of chasing his son's 11-year-old friend out of his house and shooting him to death told his neighbor hours earlier that he was depressed and wanted to kill himself. Raymond Lee Shaw, 58, was charged with murder Monday in the death the day before of Jonathan Dixon, a fifth-grader at Hill Intermediate School. Shaw, who has throat cancer and cannot speak, wrote a note Sunday to his friend Ron Zenon. The message was: "I'm really depressed today. It's Mother's Day. I miss my wife and I feel like killing myself." Zenon said Shaw's wife died of a heart attack three years ago.

About two hours later, Zenon heard a gunshot and thought his friend had killed himself, Zenon said Monday. But someone soon rushed over to tell Zenon that Shaw had just shot a young boy. As Zenon and a friend grabbed Shaw's sawed-off shotgun, Zenon heard Shaw's son ask: "Dad, Dad, Dad, why'd you kill him?" "He snapped. It's like he was insane," Zenon said. "I think he was going to shoot someone else." Police say that on Sunday, Shaw's 13-year-old son invited Jonathan and at least three other children into his home so Jonathan could dry his rain-soaked clothes.

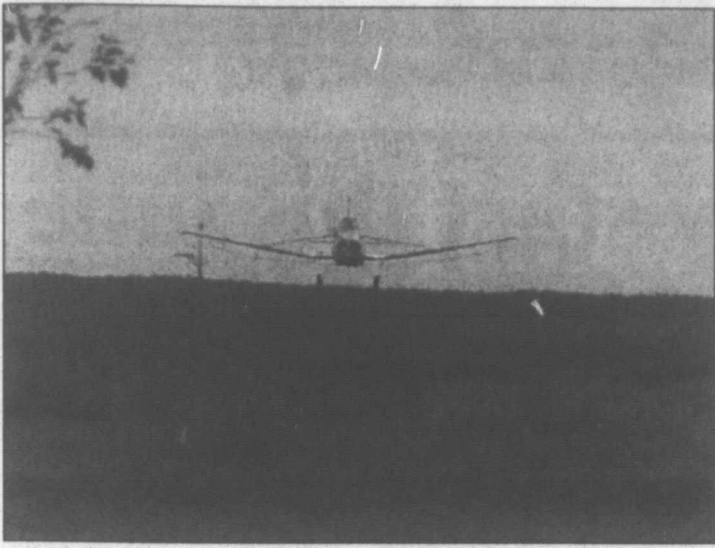

## Group seeks to block vote on ordinance

DALLAS (AP) — Latino activists and civil liberties advocates asked a federal judge today to block a voter-approved ordinance that would prohibit landlords from renting apartments to most illegal immigrants in the Dallas suburb of Farmers Branch.

The Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund and the American Civil Liberties Union, which have already sued the city over the regulation, asked for the temporary restraining order in U.S. District Court.

"It is unfortunate that the residents of Farmers Branch have chosen to implement a law which is not only bad policy, but is likely also unconstitutional," said Lisa Graybill, legal director for the ACLU of Texas. "Now the issue will have to be resolved in federal court."

The groups contend poor families could be thrown out of homes because of the ordinance. And, the groups say, families in which some people are undocumented and others are citizens or legal immigrants could be forced to either move or split up.

Farmers Branch voters became the first in the nation Saturday to prohibit landlords from renting apartments to most illegal immigrants. The ban was approved by a vote of 68 percent to 32 percent, according to unofficial results.

The ordinance, scheduled to take effect May 22, requires apartment managers to verify that renters are U.S. citizens or legal immigrants.

to do research. To rely upon a highlighted map is not responsible. It is hard not to be sympathetic, yet if a person is being given a highlighted map and relies on it, that is the key. It is the legal description that drives the sale. It is incumbent on the purchaser to rely on the legal description."

The county may choose to get a quit claim deed from Elms concerning the property he actually bought and refund the amount of his bid to him, provided the other two taxing entities involved in the sale agree, Flowers said. The other two taxing entities are Lefors Independent School District and the city of Lefors.

The taxing entities may not, however, reimburse Elms for the cost of any improvements he has made to the property, such as the utility hookups, Flowers said.

"I feel that if I go into a real estate office and I buy something and later find I got wrong information, I feel they're responsible, not me," Elms said.

All property buyers should get a survey done of the property they are considering buying before the deal is completed, Flowers said.

"In the 14 counties I've done work for, this is the first time I've seen this happen," he said.

No action was taken on the issue, which will be placed on the next meeting's agenda for action.

Constitutional amendment election results were canvassed and accepted. Peet was given authority to seek three individuals who would be willing to serve on the Gray County Industrial Development Corp.

Ambulance about one year ago on my days off. I just finished classes to become an intermediate EMT and then I'll go to school to become a paramedic."

Every once in a while, the firefighters have four days off in a row. When that occurs, Turney works for the Hereford ambulance.

Turney attended hazardous material school and is a hazmat technician. If a hazardous material spill occurs, he is certified to clean up the mess and take care of the chemicals. He is also certified in aircraft rescue, so he can work at air-

ports if the need arises.

While in Pampa, Turney said the occurrences that got his adrenaline pumping were the meat packing plant fire east of town, several structure fires and the wildfires last year. He also helped fight a church fire while working in Perryton.

# Viewpoints

## Political 'stumping' off to an early start this time

The election held Saturday reminded me that another election is coming up, one in which every U.S. citizen can participate.

Our next presidential election is Nov. 4, 2008. That means that we have about 18 more months to go before we can enjoy a campaign-free broadcast or publication.

It seems to me that the stumping started early this time, even for a Presidential race. After all, I'll bet each of us can name at least two candidates, even though it's a year and a half before we vote on them.

Right now, as best I can figure, we have eight Republican candidates and six Democratic candidates, not to mention others representing assorted other parties including the Libertarians. That means that the primary elections to select one candidate for each party will be bloodbaths, with plenty of combat ahead of time to try to convince us that one candidate in each party is the best, the brightest, the most capable, and pure as the driven snow, while the rest are idiotic infidels who were raised in dens of iniquity.

Why so many candidates?

Perhaps one reason is that for the first time since 1928, there are no incumbents in the Presidential race. We usually have either a President running for re-election or a Vice President seeking to step up the ladder to the top spot.

One thing which may narrow the field to only serious contenders is the cost of campaigning. In January, Federal Election Commission

Chairman Michael Toner said that the 2008 race will be "the most expensive election in American history." He estimated that the 2008 race will be a "\$1 billion election;" and that to be a serious contender, a candidate will need to raise at least \$100 million by the end of 2007.

Can you imagine trying to raise \$100 million in campaign pledges, especially if you are not one of those who

already have name recognition?

Meanwhile, we have already had at least one debate among contenders of one political party. Our news media has obligingly reported activities and catchy comments from the candidates. Advertisements have not yet appeared, to my knowledge, but it is only a matter of time.

The problem with this election, as I see it, is that the number of candidates is a symptom. It means that there is no one candidate who really stands out, who has a strong enough and large

enough following to discourage the free-for-all that is shaping up.

The upcoming battle will likely be a bloodbath full of character assassinations, truth stretching and even truth ignoring, promises that won't be kept and skeletons that will appear out of various candidates' closets.

It will be interesting, if nothing else, to see who emerges from the fray as our next national leader. Meanwhile, let the games begin.

On May 15, 1942, wartime gasoline rationing went into effect in 17 states, limiting sales to three gallons a week for non-essential vehicles.

On this date:

In 1856, Lyman Frank Baum, the author of "The Wonderful Wizard of Oz," was born in Chittenango, N.Y.

In 1886, poet Emily Dickinson died in Amherst, Mass.

In 1911, the Supreme Court ordered the dissolution of Standard Oil Co., ruling it was a monopoly in violation of the Sherman Antitrust Act.

In 1918, U.S. airmail began service between Washington, Philadelphia and New York.

In 1930, registered nurse Ellen Church, the first airline stewardess, went on duty aboard an Oakland-to-Chicago flight operated by Boeing Air Transport (a forerunner of United Airlines).

In 1940, nylon stockings went on general sale for the first time in the United States.

In 1963, astronaut L. Gordon Cooper blasted off aboard Faith 7 on the final mission of the Project Mercury space program.

In 1970, Phillip Lafayette Gibbs and James Earl Green, two black students at Jackson State University in Mississippi, were killed when police opened fire during student protests.

In 1972, George C. Wallace was shot by Arthur Bremer and left paralyzed while campaigning in Laurel, Md., for the Democratic presidential nomination.

In 1986, searchers on Oregon's Mount Hood found two teenage survivors of a hiking expedition that became trapped in a whiteout blizzard. Nine other climbers died.

Ten years ago: Space shuttle Atlantis blasted off on a mission to deliver urgently needed repair equipment and a fresh American astronaut to Russia's orbiting Mir station. Attorney General Janet Reno requested the death penalty for Unabomber suspect Theodore Kaczynski. (However, under an arrangement in which he admitted his guilt, Kaczynski agreed to be sentenced to life in prison without possibility of parole.)

Five years ago: The White House acknowledged that in the weeks before the 9/11 attacks, President George Bush was told by U.S. intelligence that Osama bin Laden's terrorist network might hijack American airplanes, but that officials did not know that suicide hijackers were plotting to use planes as missiles.

Financier Martin Frankel pleaded guilty in New Haven, Conn., to pulling off one of the most brazen swindles Wall Street had ever seen.

One year ago: In an Oval Office address, President Bush said he would order as many as 6,000 National Guard troops to secure the U.S. border with Mexico, and he urged Congress to give millions of illegal immigrants a chance at citizenship.

## The temperamental minimum wage ...

The first fundamental law of demand postulates that the lower the price of something, the more will be demanded, and the higher the price, the less will be demanded. To my knowledge, there are no known exceptions to the law of demand. That was until last fall when 650 economists, including several Nobel Laureates, signed a letter calling for an increase in the minimum wage.

They said, "We believe that a modest increase in the minimum wage would improve the well-being of low-wage workers and would not have the adverse effects that critics have claimed."

I'm not sure if these 650 economists meant increases in the minimum wage will have no effect on the employment of low-wage workers or if they meant its magnitude won't be large. If their argument is the former, I'm embarrassed for them.

Maybe these economists, like House Speaker Nancy

Pelosi, see the law of demand as being somewhat temperamental — sometimes having an effect and sometimes not. This would be like a physicist suggesting that the velocity of light, in a vacuum, is temperamental — sometimes a constant and sometimes not. But they and Speaker Pelosi might have a point.

On Jan. 10, the House of Representatives voted to raise the minimum wage from \$5.15 to \$7.25 per hour. Their bill, for the first time, extended the federal minimum wage to the U.S. territory of the Northern Mariana Islands, but it exempted American Samoa, another U.S. Pacific Ocean territory. American Samoa would have been the only U.S. territory not subject to the federal minimum wage. If increases in the minimum wage, like my 650 fellow

economists claim, are so helpful to low-wage workers, why deprive Samoan workers from the benefits? Are Speaker Pelosi and my fellow economists anti-Samoan?

StarKist Tuna, whose parent company is Del Monte, and Chicken of the Sea employ nearly 50 percent of the Samoan workforce. Samoan cannery workers earn about \$3.50 an hour. I'll give you one guess what would happen if the minimum wage were raised to \$7.25 an hour. Here's a hint: The average cannery wage in Thailand is 67 cents an hour, and in the Philippines, it's 66 cents. If you guessed that StarKist and Chicken of the Sea might move their operations to Thailand or the Philippines, go to the head of the class. Perhaps Speaker Pelosi agrees that mandating

a higher wage would have an unemployment effect, but just in Samoa.

There's a better explanation for Speaker Pelosi's position that has nothing to do with the possible fickleness of the law of demand. StarKist, which owns one of the two Samoan packing plants, has been a big opponent of increases in the U.S. minimum wage. Del Monte, its parent company, is headquartered in Speaker Pelosi's San Francisco district. Chicken of the Sea is based in Southern California. It's not unreasonable to guess that Speaker Pelosi's position has to do with the interests of her well-heeled constituents. In any case, Samoans are off the hook for now because the proposed legislation enacting a higher minimum wage didn't pass Congress.

Many minimum wage supporters, like the Speaker, are hypocrites, but most supporters are decent people with an honest concern for

## Texas Thoughts

Houston Chronicle on maintaining an edge in science and technology:

Half a century ago, few Americans had envisioned a space race. Russia launched it by shooting Sputnik into orbit in October 1957. Fueled by Cold War anxiety, the United States shifted into high gear, and decades of towering accomplishments followed. Despite tragedies, setbacks and budget cuts, the space program continues to conquer new frontiers, long after it established U.S. dominance among nations that explore space. Today, many people say, the space program is taken for granted.

That complacency was pricked in January when China became the first nation to destroy one of its satellites with a land-based missile.

A flurry of concerned comment followed:

Was this that country's first move in the weaponization of space?

Was it a signal that China posed a new threat?

China's first manned space venture was in 2003, its second in 2005 and its third will follow next year, along with a planned lunar probe. While China is the third nation to send humans into space, relative to the United States or Russia, these are entry-level steps.

Compared to Japan, however, China is setting the pace.

If there is a 21st century space race,

it is emerging in Asia. While Japan preceded China in entering space, it now perceives itself in a catch-up role following setbacks in its program. Japan plans to launch its moon probe in August after a four-year delay.

Following closely behind is India, which launched and recovered a satellite in January, joining China, Russia, the European Union and the United States in this capacity. Next year it will launch its first satellite to go beyond Earth's orbit.

South Korea began its space program in 2000. With Russian help, it plans to put a satellite in orbit next year.

There is no question these nations seek to close the technological gap, in

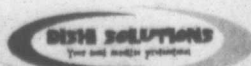

the well-being of their fellow man. True compassion for our fellow man requires that we examine not the intentions behind public policy but the effects of that policy.

There's no question that Congress can mandate the minimum wage at which a person is hired, but Congress hasn't found a way to mandate that a person have a level of productivity commensurate with the wage. Moreover, Congress hasn't chosen to mandate that an employer hire a person whose productivity is less than the minimum wage. This means higher minimum wages cause unemployment for the least-skilled workers.

space and at home. Remaining cognizant that the newer players in space are making strides might be a welcome jolt to U.S. complacency and a lack of popular interest that perhaps has contributed to an alarmingly low proficiency in math and science among the nation's high school seniors.

The National Assessment of Educational Progress recently documented that fewer than 25 percent of American seniors were proficient in math, and fewer than 18 percent were proficient in science. Congress is con-

sidering legislation that would boost resources for math and science education.

Designed to keep the country competitive in a high-tech world economy, the package of bills would offer grants to teachers' colleges in math and science, offer similar incentives at the graduate school level, establish new master's degree programs for those already teaching math and science, expand university education in mathematics, science and engineering, and provide additional early career support for scientists, mathematicians and researchers. The bills have passed by large majorities in House and Senate, which will now create a compromise bill.

The competitive edge the United

States has enjoyed was, in part, spurred by the Cold War with Russia, which added the motivation a spark of danger could provide. Today, the motivation is more about holding onto jobs in the world economy. The proposed competitiveness bills also grew out of a 2005 report from the National Academies that warned the United States could lose its edge without an effort to beef up programming in the math and science arena.

In 1957 few Americans envisioned the space race. In 2007, it was no surprise when Toyota edged out General Motors as the world's leading seller of automobiles. Supporting the development of careers in math, science and engineering might help the United States close the gap.

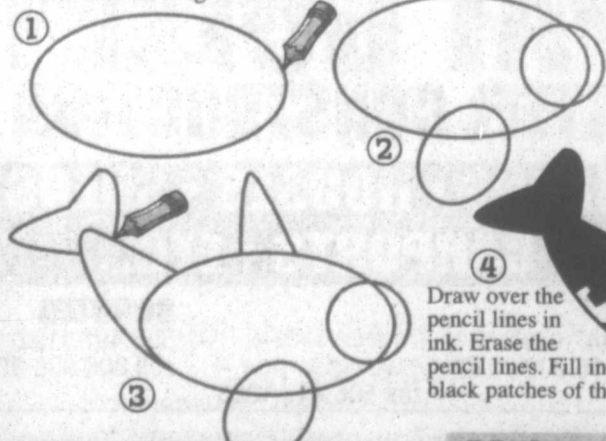
From the land, the orca's black and white pattern may not look like good camouflage. But it is, and it helps the orca sneak up on its prey.

### Is it a fish?

Orcas look a bit like fish and live in the sea, but they are mammals. They are warm-blooded, feed their young with milk and breathe air through nostrils called blowholes. Orcas must hold their breath when they are underwater.

## KILLER WHALES

Killer whales are powerful predators that eat fish, seals, sharks and even other whales. However, they are not interested in eating people. There has been only one attack on a person in the wild. Scientists believe the whale mistook a surfer for a seal. Interestingly, the whale realized the mistake and spat the person out.

The scientific name for killer whales is *Orcinus orca*. They are often called orcas.



### Signature Saddle

Orcas have a patch of gray behind the dorsal fin. This patch is called a saddle patch. Each orca has its own distinctively shaped saddle patch.

### Check Out the Chops!

Orcas have 40 to 52 sharp teeth, each of which is about three inches long. As an orca gets older, it grows layers on the outside of its teeth, forming rings. If you slice an orca tooth and count the layers, you can discover the age of the orca.

### Male or female?

Look at the two pictures, then read how to tell the difference between a male and female orca. Label each one.

The male dorsal fin is upright and triangular. It can be about six feet high and is the tallest dorsal fin in the animal kingdom. The female's is shorter and curves backward.

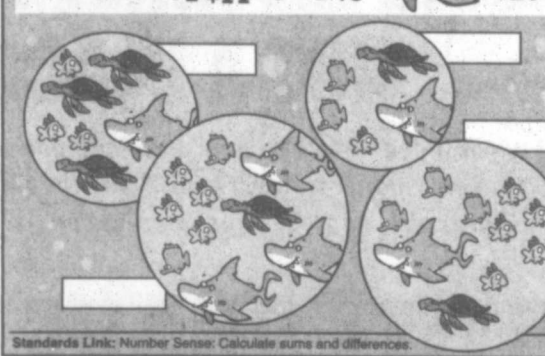

#### Whale Life

Orca babies are called calves. They are born underwater. As soon as the calf is born, the mother orca helps it swim to the surface for its first breathe of air.

The calf will drink its mother's cream-like milk for two years. The milk is about 48% fat and helps the calf develop a thin, warm layer of blubber.

The calf will start eating solid food such as herring, young salmon and squid at about tree months old.

An orca never leaves it's family. Even a fully grown adult male spends its life with the family group called a pod.

Most pods have between 5 and 30 orcas. Occasionally, two or more pods meet and briefly form a "superpod" with up to 150 orcas.

## Psychiatrist: Hilton 'distraught,' 'traumatized' over jail sentence

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Paris Hilton is "emotionally distraught and traumatized" over her 45-day jail sentence and isn't capable of testifying in a civil lawsuit against her, the socialite-reality TV star's psychiatrist said.

Dr. Charles Sophy has been seeing Hilton, 26, for the past eight months and has talked with her several times since her May 4 hearing for violating the terms of her probation in an alcohol-related reckless driving case, according to court papers. Sophy said Hilton needs time to recover from the shock of receiving jail time before testifying in a civil case brought against her by actress and diamond heiress Zeta Graff.

Messages left with

Hilton's spokesman and lawyer weren't immediately returned early today.

In court papers filed Monday, Sophy said Hilton is "distraught and traumatized as a consequence of the findings at the May 4 hearing ... and her fear of incarceration." "At this point in time," he continued, "Ms. Hilton cannot effectively respond to examination as a witness or provide any significant input into her defense."

Graff filed a \$10 million lawsuit against Hilton in 2005, claiming the reality TV star spread "vicious lies" about her. Hilton has denied that she was behind a report alleging Graff once tried to grab a necklace worth \$4 million from her throat.

Not only did I mourn the loss of my pregnancy, but I was also afraid I'd never be able to have any children. "Anonymous" should know that one in four pregnancies ends in miscarriage. If she talks with other women, she'll see she's not alone in her suffering. Sharing her story with others who have been through the same thing may help her ease the pain she's feeling. Nine months after my miscarriage I became pregnant again with my son. The happiest moment of my life was when I saw his heartbeat on an ultrasound and was later able to hold him in my arms. I am now the happy mother of three. Please extend my sympathies to "Anonymous," and tell her not to give up hope. — **ANOTHER MOM IN THE NORTH**

**DEAR MOM:** I was touched by the number of women who wrote to support "Anonymous in the North," and amazed at how many of them said that they had had miscarriages, too. One reader suggested that "Anonymous" contact area hospitals to see if there is a local support group for parents who have suffered infant loss, explaining that it helped her cope with her own grief. A national group that has helped many people is Share: Pregnancy and Infant Loss Support Inc. Founded in 1977, it has 80 chapters and offers mutual support for bereaved parents and families who have suffered a loss due to miscarriage, stillbirth or neonatal death. It provides a monitored interactive Web site that includes chat rooms and message boards. Its toll-free number is (800) 821-6819, and its Web site is [www.nationalshareoffice.com](http://www.nationalshareoffice.com). Read on:

**DEAR ABBY:** "Anonymous in the North" needs to realize that her anger and bitterness are normal. You don't get "over" a miscarriage, but you do get through it — and life does get better. What she needs to do is take care of herself, be gentle with herself. If that means avoiding or limiting her time with her brother and pregnant sister-in-law, or friends and family with babies, so be it! They need to understand that it isn't about them. It's a self-care issue. Unfortunately, family and friends can be a part of the problem.

Things not to say to someone who has miscarried:

1. "You'll get pregnant again." (Not everyone does.)
2. "You can always adopt." (That's a personal decision and should not be rushed into as second best.)
3. "It was for the best because it was defective, it was God's will, etc." (Unforgivable, even if it were true.)

I will never forget my disbelief and rage when a "friend" who knew of my miscarriage, and the emotionally and financially exhausting fertility treatments I was undergoing at the time, complained of her morning sickness and said, "Aren't you glad you're not going through this?" If you don't know what to say about a friend's miscarriage, say "I'm so sorry," and then shut up. Don't try to "fix it," any more than you'd try to "fix" a widow by fixing her up. — **DANA IN SPRINGFIELD, MO.**

**DEAR ABBY:** After my miscarriage it was hard for me to see a pregnant woman or baby. My doctor gave me a book that helped me understand and deal with my feelings. I hope "Anonymous" can get a similar reference from her doctor. — **BEEN THERE AND GOT THROUGH IT**

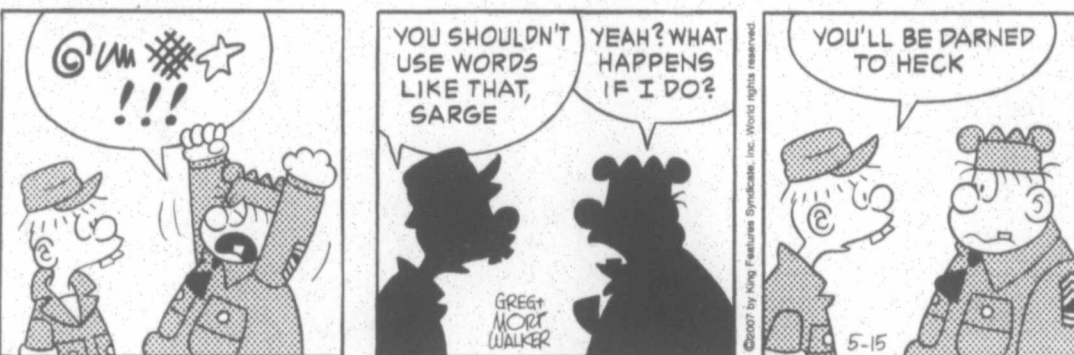

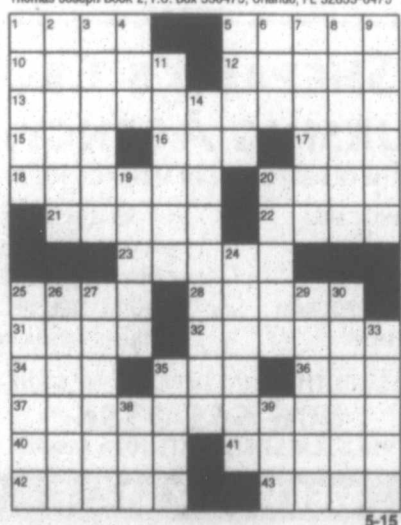

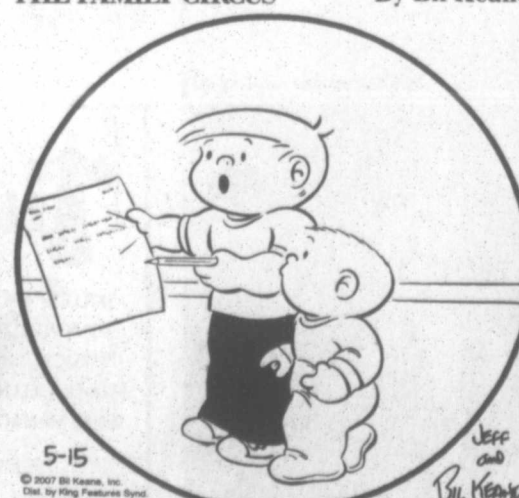

You will see the school on your left (East).

The second stop light by the school there will be a road that goes behind the school.

You will need to follow that to get to the field.

You will go past the tennis courts, baseball field, and soccer field.

There will be a stop sign and you will need to turn left and you will see the field.

Nowitzki led the Dallas Mavericks to 67 wins this season, matching the sixth most in league history.

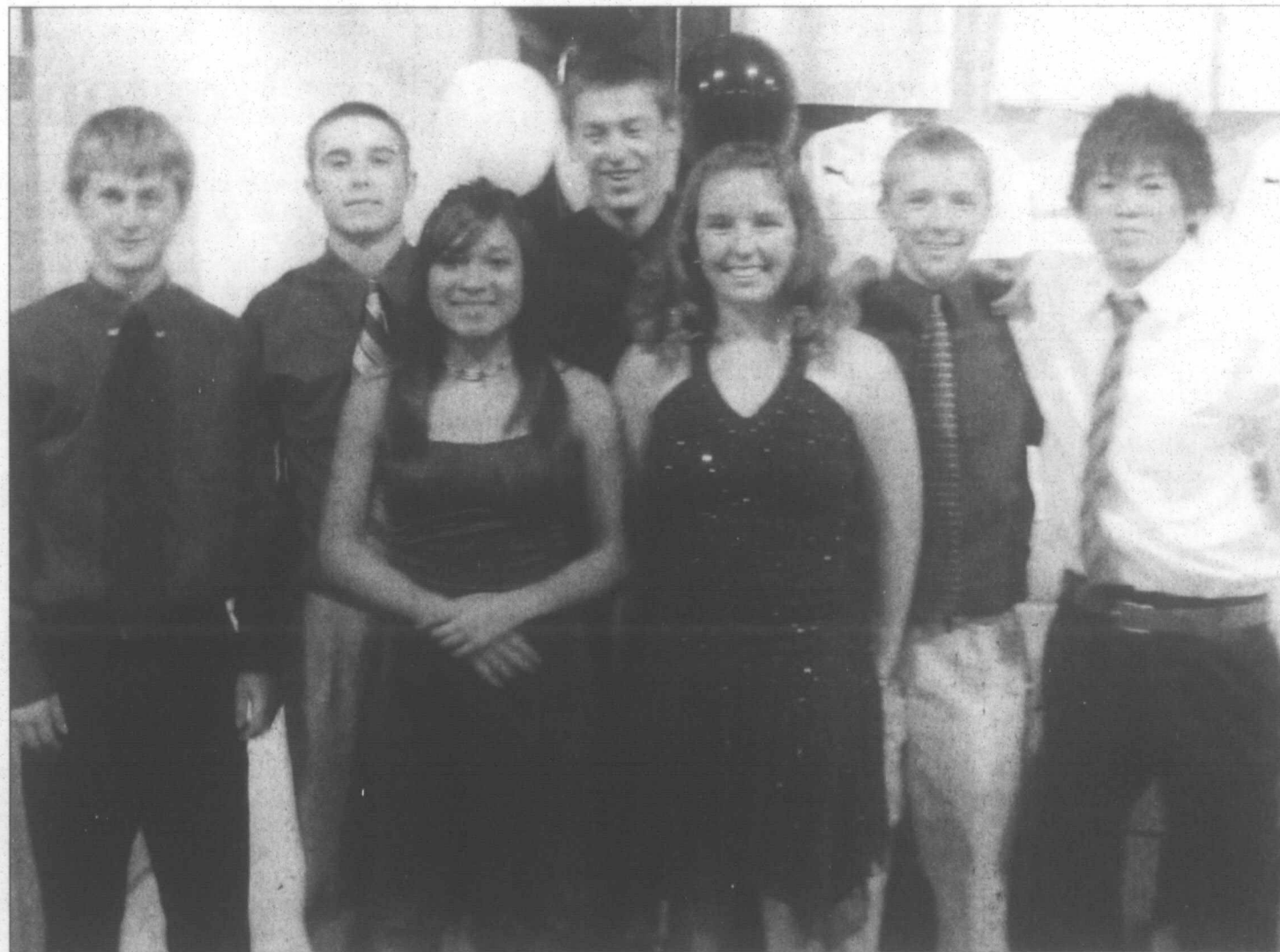
He received 1,138 points, including 83 of the 129 first-place votes. Nash of the Phoenix Suns followed with 1,013 points and 44 first-place votes, and Kobe Bryant of the Los Angeles Lakers got the remaining two first-place votes. San

Antonio's Tim Duncan was fourth and Cleveland's LeBron James was fifth.

Votes were turned in before the playoffs, a good thing for Nowitzki considering how little he did to prevent the Mavs from being bounced in the first round by eighth-seeded Golden State, one of the biggest upsets in the NBA playoffs.

Twelve days later, Nowitzki hasn't gotten over the disappointment, although with this award — which Nowitzki learned he'd won late last week — is definitely a mood-lifter. The 7-foot

German is the first European honoree in the 52-year history of the award, and he's the first recipient not to have attended high school or college in the United States.

Nash, the league's MVP his first two seasons after leaving Nowitzki and the Mavericks to join the Phoenix Suns, was trying to join Larry Bird, Wilt Chamberlain and Bill Russell as the only players to win the award three years in a row.

Nash called to congratulate Nowitzki on Friday. While he himself had a great year, Nash was happy to have his pal join the fraternity of MVP winners, adding that "he's very deserving."

"I'm excited for him," Nash said. "He's obviously not the happiest camper right now but he deserves it and I think he should really enjoy this and allow this to kind of heal an unfortunate first round. Because he did have a

great year and worked hard for it."

Nowitzki's candidacy is summed up by the fact he was the best player on the best team. He led Dallas in scoring (24.6 points a game) and rebounding (8.9), and was the only player in the NBA who made more than 50 percent of his shots, 40 percent of his 3-pointers and 90 percent of his free throws.

Nowitzki, who turns 29 during the finals, is the first Mavericks player to be the MVP, which is only fitting since he's been the team's first All-Star starter (this season) and the first All-NBA first-team selection; he received that honor for the third straight year last week.

Nowitzki, however, also goes onto the dubious list of MVP winners not to win a playoff series. It last happened with Houston's Moses Malone in 1981-82. The only other times were Malone in 1978-79, Los Angeles' Kareem Abdul-Jabbar in 1975-76 (didn't make the playoffs) and Baltimore's Wes Unseld in 1968-69.

# Cavaliers take 3-1 lead over Nets

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) — Ten seconds of defense by a gimpy Eric Snow has the Cleveland Cavaliers on the verge of their first Eastern Conference final in 15 years.

Snow protected a two-point lead by forcing a turnover by Vince Carter with 1.9 seconds to play and LeBron James rebounded from a sub-par effort with 30 points, nine rebounds and seven assists in an 87-85 win over the New Jersey Nets on Monday night.

While James' performance in Game 4 is what most people will remember, it was the Cavaliers' defense that put them a win away from their third conference final, and first since 1992.

"We always need LeBron to carry us," Cavs guard Sasha Pavlovic said. "If he stops, we have to do our job. In the playoffs, everyone has to play good if you want to win the game."

Cleveland got that kind of performance on both ends of the floor to put themselves in position to wrap up the best-of-seven series at home Wednesday night.

In the other playoff game Monday, Phoenix evened its

series with San Antonio at 2-2 with a 104-98 victory.

The other conference semifinals resume Tuesday with Detroit at home with a 3-1 lead over Chicago, and Utah at home with the same lead over Golden State.

The Nets shot 36 percent from the field and their big three of Carter, Jason Kidd and Richard Jefferson connected on 11-of-48 (23 percent), including 1-of-13 in the fourth quarter. They missed layups, jumpers, bank shots and Jefferson even muffed two dunks with the Cavaliers pressing their every attempt.

"We tried to make them take tough shots, but they're three extremely talented players," Snow said. "We tried to make it tough for them, and on any given night, they are bound to hurt you."

Carter had the final chance to even the series after James hit the second of two free throws to put the Cavs ahead 87-85 with 10.3 seconds to go.

The Nets called time out and called a play for Carter. Cavs coach Mike Brown countered by subbing Snow for center Zydrunas

Ilguskas.

"We knew the ball was going to Vince," Brown said. "That's why we brought Eric in. He's our best on-the-ball defender."

Carter took the inbounds pass and tried to back down Snow at the right elbow of the foul line. The stocky 11-year veteran whose sore ankles and knee require four ice bags after games, stood his ground and waited, knowing Carter wasn't going to back to the rim.

"I was fortunate enough when he had his back to me, before he could make his move, I was able to flick the ball," Snow said.

With Larry Hughes coming over to double him, Carter tried to knock the loose ball to Kidd, but he pushed it out of bounds.

"Put the ball in my hands to make plays and that's what I want to do," Carter said. "That one I take hard, it's on me. This is an important time of year, so every play counts for us."

The Cavs then ran out the clock, moving closer to a conference final that eluded them last year, when they dropped the final two games to Detroit in the Eastern

semifinals.

"We definitely learned a lot from winning the series last year to losing the series," said James, who was limited to a playoff-low 18 points in the Game 3 loss here on Saturday. "It helped us in the postseason. This is a tough environment to win in. Now we have a chance to close it out at home. We know it's not going to be easy."

The two major adjustments the Cavaliers made in Game 4 were slowing the pace and making sure that the Nets big three didn't get open looks at the basket.

If that meant leaving Nets center Mikki Moore alone, it was a price they were willing to pay. Moore did his part for New Jersey, scoring a career-high 25 points on 11-of-14 shooting.

Carter had 25 points, nine rebounds and nine assists, but shot 6-for-23 from the field. Kidd wasted his career playoff-high 17-rebound performance by shooting 2-for-13 and scoring five points. Jefferson had 15 points but was only 3-of-12 from the field.

"I'll live with those guys taking those shots any night," Moore said.

# Horry ejected as Suns take Game 4 in final seconds

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The series between the Phoenix Suns and San Antonio Spurs has been marked by bumps, bruises and harsh words.

A forearm by Robert Horry to Steve Nash in the closing seconds of the Suns' 104-98 win Monday night in Game 4 escalated the tension to a whole new level.

The Suns, who trailed by as many as 11 points, had taken the lead for the first time in the second half on consecutive behind-the-back feeds from Nash to Amare Stoudemire that made it 100-97 with 32 seconds to play.

As Nash started to bring the ball up the court after Manu Ginobili missed the Spurs' fourth straight shot, Horry hit him with a forearm that knocked him into the scorers' table and had players from both teams rushing to the scene.

"I was trying to skate between

him and the boards and he got me with a nice hip check," Nash said. "What can I say? It was a pretty nice check."

Horry was promptly given a flagrant foul and ejected and the Suns' Raja Bell was given a technical.

The Suns closed out the win to even their best-of-seven series with the Suns at 2-2.

Game 5 is Wednesday in Phoenix and will surely carry much of the tension that has characterized the Western Conference semifinals so far.

The incident with 18 seconds left in the game overshadowed Phoenix's late 12-1 run to close out the game.

"It was a great win, a gutsy win. They were playing extremely well that second and third quarter," Nash said. "We had a hard time stopping them. They were hitting a

lot of 3s and big shots. ... Somehow we managed to hang in there and give ourselves a chance to pick up our defense, pick up our offense."

The Spurs led 97-92 with 2:22 to play on a rebound basket by Tim Duncan, their last field goal of the game.

"(The Suns) were very aggressive," said Spurs coach Gregg Popovich. "They got to the bucket easier than they did earlier in the game. They just played very well, very aggressively down the stretch."

The Suns outscored the Spurs 32-18 in the fourth quarter.

"It says a lot about this team. We just battled all night," said Phoenix's Shawn Marion. "I think we didn't get any breaks. We just found a way to get over that hill and pull it out."

Nash and Amare Stoudemire connected on a couple of behind-

the back passes for layups that gave the Suns the lead for good, the first with 53 seconds left, the second with 32 seconds to go that made it 100-97.

After Horry's ejection, a free throw by each team made it 101-98. The Suns kept possession and Nash added another free throw with 16 seconds to go.

Marion added two free throws with 7.4 seconds left.

It's possible there could be suspensions from the league for players leaving the bench after Horry fouled Nash.

Stoudemire was caught on replays well off the bench but he said he was on his way to the scorer's table to check in when the incident happened. He said he's "just a little" worried about a possible suspension.

"I was just doing what the coach told me. He told me to check in,"

Stoudemire said. "I just got to say my prayers tonight."

The Spurs led by as many as 11 points. They missed nine of their last 10 shots, including the last six during Phoenix' closing run.

"We've been in this situation before. We did a good job to get the lead. Late in the game we didn't do a good job," Spurs guard Bruce Bowen said. "We have to do a better job of tightening up more than anything else."

Stoudemire led the Suns with 26 points, while Nash had 24 points and 15 assists.

"Today we did it. We have to do it two more times," Suns coach Mike D'Antoni said. "Tonight, we played a little bit better and a little more desperate. We got over the hump. They're a great team."

Tony Parker led the Spurs with 23 points and Tim Duncan had 21 points and 11 rebounds.

# Greg Maddux goes distance in Padres win

Greg Maddux had a vintage pitching performance, looking like a four-time Cy Young Award winner.

Maddux needed only 96 pitches to throw a five-hitter and help the San Diego Padres beat Cincinnati 7-1, handing the Reds their fourth straight loss.

He retired the first 16 batters he faced, struck out five and walked none. He picked up his 109th career complete game and first since Sept. 27, 2005, for the Chicago Cubs in a 5-3 loss at Pittsburgh.

"You can probably turn back the clock five, 10, 15 years, and you've seen games like that out of him before," Padres manager Bud Black said. "Maybe a little different style, but

still the same substance. He was efficient, threw strikes, had them off balance, pitched in, pitched out, pitched up, pitched down. It was an outstanding game."

Maddux also picked up win No. 336, putting him six behind tying Tim Lincecum for ninth on the career list.

"He was throwing 83 miles an hour and making guys look silly," said Cincinnati's Scott Hatteberg, who was 0-for-4. "He had a lot of movement on the ball. He was hitting corners all day, with the ball going whichever way."

# Matsuzaka pitches first complete game for Boston's win over Detroit

BOSTON (AP) — Just six weeks into the season, Daisuke Matsuzaka is on a roll and so are the Red Sox.

The rookie from Japan, who cost the team \$103 million, pitched his first complete game in the majors and won his fourth straight decision Monday night, 7-1 over the Detroit Tigers.

The victory gave the Red Sox an 8 1/2-game lead in the AL East, their second largest margin in team history at this point of the season — only 37 games. And they're 20-0 when they score five runs or more.

"We have to continue to play good solid baseball and it has to start with our pitching," catcher Jason Varitek said. "We can't scoreboard watch."

The pitching has been brilliant all season. Matsuzaka is 5-2 with a 4.17 ERA, but three other starters have even better ERAs — Tim Lincecum (1.79), Josh Beckett (2.66) and Curt Schilling (3.63). And the bullpen's 2.34 ERA is the lowest in the majors.

In other AL games, it was: Kansas City 2, Oakland 1; Los Angeles Angels 7, Texas 2; and Toronto 5, Baltimore 3.

Matsuzaka allowed only one runner past second base, six hits and no walks. He struck out five and threw a season-high 124 pitches — a large number in the United States but not unusual in Japan, where he had 13 complete games last year.

"I didn't see any reason to take him out," Red Sox manager Terry Francona said. "He was better at the end than he was at the beginning."

Matsuzaka did give up a leadoff single to Gary Sheffield in the ninth but struck out Magglio Ordonez, who is hitting .341, then easily retired the next two batters for Boston's first complete game of the year.

"I just hope that I can continue to pitch like I did today," Matsuzaka said through a translator. "I'm not too concerned about the pitch count."

Two of Detroit's hits were by leadoff batter Curtis Granderson. In the first inning, he reached second on a single and error by right fielder J.D. Drew, but Matsuzaka retired the next three batters, two on strikeouts. In the third, Granderson hit his seventh homer of

the season.

Matsuzaka retired 16 batters on grounders.

"His fastball was in the mid 90s," Granderson said. "Once he established that, he threw his cutter, curve and changeup."

Detroit starter Nate Robertson (3-3) threw 115 pitches but only worked five innings.

"They do grind out a lot of at-bats," he said. "Pitchers throw a lot of pitches against them. I threw three good pitches for strikes tonight. They fouled off some good pitches."

The Tigers' 1-0 lead didn't last long as David Ortiz singled in the tying run in the third. Run-scoring singles by Coco Crisp in the fourth and Manny Ramirez in the fifth made it 3-1, and Boston added four runs in the eighth off Bobby Seay on Julio Lugo's bases-loaded triple and Kevin Youkilis' RBI single.

The AL Central-leading Tigers dropped their second straight game and fell to 23-14. Both teams are 11-3 in their last 14 games.

# Floyd Landis U.S. Anti-Doping Agency hearing gets under way

MALIBU, Calif. (AP) — Arlene Landis took out her camera to snap a picture of her son sitting next to his lawyers in the courtroom.

Surely, photos of the arbitration hearing that began Monday won't go in the front of Floyd Landis' scrapbook of Tour de France highlights. Still, the moment was something to remember.

After months of explaining himself to anyone who would listen, Landis finally

got to have his case heard by the arbitrators who will decide his fate.

"I'm looking forward to it," he said before the hearing, wearing a yellow necktie that matched the color of the famed jersey he captured last year in Paris. "I'm looking forward to there being an end, so I'll know whether I can keep riding or not."

What promises to be nine days of mostly dry scientific evidence began with some

good theater.

"Make no mistake about it," Landis attorney Maurice Suh said in his opening statement, "this case is an utter disaster."

The disaster, Suh said, is the way the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency has gone about prosecuting the case, which could result in a two-year suspension for Landis and make him the first cyclist in the 104-year history of the Tour de France to

be stripped of his title.

Richard Young, the lead attorney presenting USADA's case, said in his opening statement that despite the publicity, this was simply another in a long list of cases USADA handles — one in which the cold, hard scientific data would prove an athlete had used synthetic testosterone.

"There's nothing unique about what the panel has to decide," Young said. "It's

one of dozens of cases in which a high testosterone-to-epitestosterone ratio is confirmed by a different, more sensitive test."

Suh, however, said it was more than just another case. "It's a historic case, and it needs to be done right," he said.

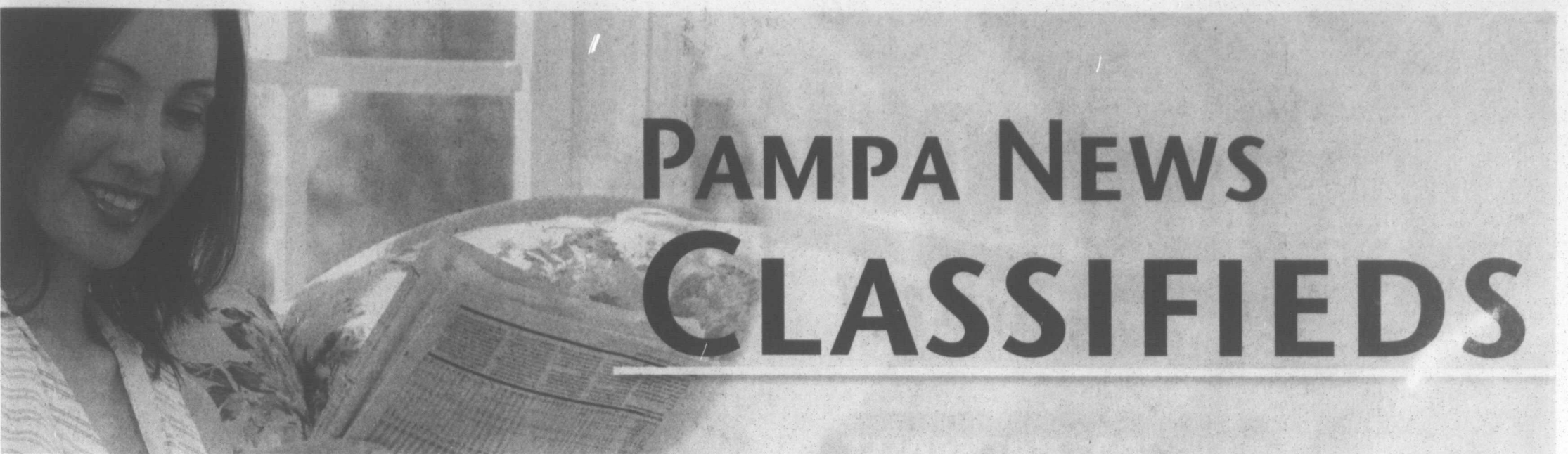
Accused of using banned synthetic testosterone during his win last year, Landis insisted on turning his arbitration hearing into a public

process, in part to expose what he says is the fraudulent way USADA and its partners in the industry do business.

About 100 people — mainly attorneys, family, media, witnesses and folks from the university — showed up. An overflow room that had been set up especially for extra spectators was dark at day's end.
