**COTTONWOOD HEIGHTS, Utah (AP)** — Three generations of the same family, including a 72-year-old grandfather, are getting high school diplomas.

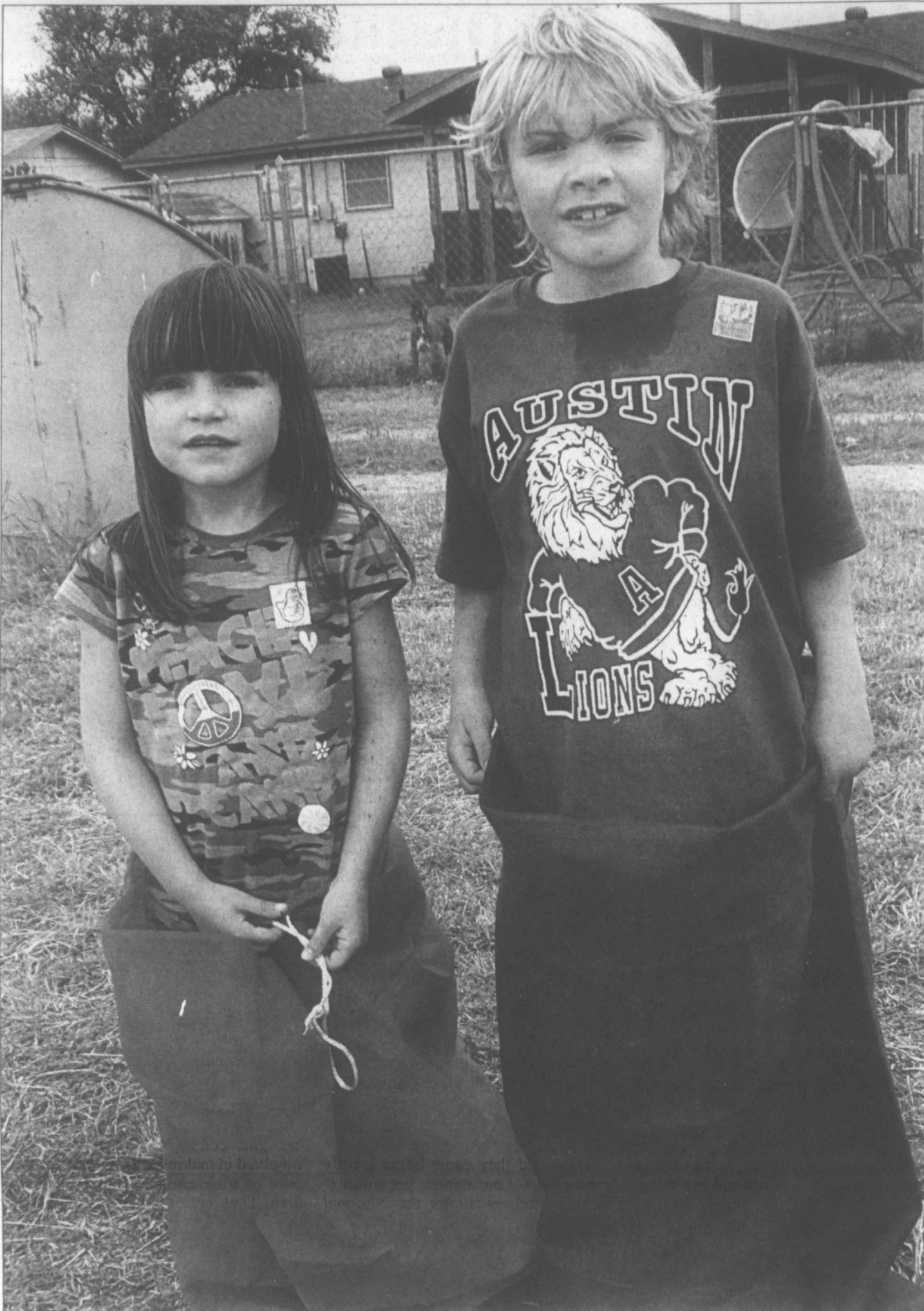

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# Bush, Putin to meet to discuss array of issues

WASHINGTON (AP) — With U.S.-Russian relations under heavy strain, President Bush and President Vladimir Putin will meet July 1 and 2 in Kennebunkport, Maine, administration officials said today.

"It's an opportunity for him and President Putin to continue what is always, for the two of them, candid and very honest conversations about things that matter," Bush spokesman Tony Snow said.

Bush's father, former President George H.W. Bush, has an ocean-front compound in Kennebunkport, and the two leaders will meet there.

The session comes at a time when many experts say relations between the two nations are at their lowest point since the Soviet era.

On Tuesday, Putin warned that the planned U.S. missile shield for

Europe would turn the region into a "powder keg."

Bush, Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice and Secretary of Defense Robert Gates have all tried to reassure the Russians that the missile system is aimed at preventing attack by a rogue state against the United States or Europe.

Washington and Moscow are also at odds over Kosovo, a province of Serbia that is under U.N. and NATO administration. Russia has called a Western-backed draft U.N. resolution that would endorse supervised independence for the Serbian province unacceptable.

Bush and Putin will discuss Iran, civil nuclear cooperation, missile defense and other issues, Snow said.

"Cooperation between the United States and Russia is important in

solving regional conflicts, stopping the spread of weapons of mass destruction and combatting terrorism and extremism," Snow explained in announcing the visit.

The two leaders also will see each other next week in Heiligendamm, Germany, during the annual summit of industrialized nations.

Asked why Bush chose to hold the meeting at his father's house in Maine, Snow said, "Why not? It's a good place to have it."

Bush also has met with Putin at the presidential retreat at Camp David in Maryland's Catoctin Mountains. And, Putin was the first head of state to visit Bush's ranch in Texas in November, 2001. "You only invite your friends into your house," Bush said at the time.

Russia views U.S. activity in its

former sphere of influence with growing suspicion. Earlier this month, in a speech, Putin denounced "disrespect for human life, claims to global exclusiveness and dictate, just as it was in the time of the Third Reich."

The Kremlin insisted that Putin had not meant to compare the Bush administration's policies with those of Nazi Germany, but the reference appeared to highlight Russia's annoyance at what it sees as U.S. domination of world affairs.

Soon after, in Moscow, Rice won agreement from Putin to tone down Russian tough talk in an effort to improve strained ties. Neither side, though, gave ground on their disagreements over missile defense and Kosovo.



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# Bush taps Zoellick for World Bank post

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush today tapped his former trade chief and No. 2 diplomat, Robert Zoellick, to run the World Bank, embarking on a healing process to mend wounds inflicted by outgoing president Paul Wolfowitz.

Zoellick, 53, would succeed Wolfowitz, who is stepping down June 30 after findings by a special bank panel that he broke bank rules when he arranged a hefty compensation package in 2005 for his girlfriend, Shaha Riza, a bank employee. Bush's selection of Zoellick must be approved by the World Bank's 24-member board.

The controversy over Wolfowitz caused a staff revolt and strained U.S. relations with Europeans and other countries and led calls for him to resign from the poverty-fighting institution.

The president said Zoellick has a long career in diplomacy that has pre-

pared him well for the job. "Bob Zoellick is deeply committed to this cause," the president said.

A seasoned veteran of politics both inside the Beltway and on the international stage, Zoellick is known for pulling facts and figures off the top of his head. He also has a reputation for being a demanding boss.

Internationally, the reaction to Bush's choice was generally positive, although some health groups and others expressed concern about his ability to carry out the institution's mission.

Zoellick announced last June that he was leaving his post as deputy secretary of state to join the Wall Street firm of Goldman Sachs and to work to develop investment markets around the world.

If ultimately approved as World Bank chief, Zoellick will need to regain trust, rebuild credibility and mend frayed relations inside the institution as well as with its member countries around the world.

The bank's new leader will try to persuade countries to contribute nearly \$30 billion over the next few years to fund a centerpiece bank program that provides interest-free loans to the world's poorest countries.

Zoellick could build upon strong relations he has developed worldwide as deputy secretary and U.S. Trade Representative. He was involved in peace talks in Sudan and as USTR he played a key role in negotiations to bring China into the World Trade Organization. He forged free trade deals between the United States and other countries, including Singapore, Chile, Australia and Morocco.

Before taking the helm in 2005, Wolfowitz was the No. 2 official at the Pentagon and played a key role in mapping out the war in Iraq. From the beginning, Europeans and others were upset that Bush would pick someone to run the bank who was so closely associated with the war.

# TB patient placed under fed quarantine

ATLANTA (AP) — A man with a form of tuberculosis so dangerous he is under the first U.S. government-ordered quarantine since 1963 told a newspaper he took one trans-Atlantic flight for his wedding and honeymoon and another because he feared for his life.

Hundreds of health authorities around the world are now scrambling to track down passengers who were seated near the man for testing, U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Director Julie Gerberding said today.

"There are two aspects to this," Gerberding said. "One is, is the patient himself highly infectious? Fortunately, in this case, he's probably not. But the other piece is this bacteria is a very deadly bacteria. We just have to err on the side of caution."

Health officials said that the man had been advised not to fly and that he knew he could expose others when he boarded the jets from Atlanta to Paris, and later from Prague to Montreal.

The man, however, told the Atlanta Journal-Constitution that doctors didn't order him not to fly and only suggested he put off his

long-planned wedding in Greece.

He knew he had a form of tuberculosis and that it was resistant to first-line drugs, but he didn't realize it could be so dangerous, he said.

"We headed off to Greece thinking everything's fine," said the man, who declined to be identified because of the stigma attached to his diagnosis.

He flew to Paris on May 12 aboard Air France Flight 385. While in Europe, health authorities reached him with the news that further tests had revealed his TB was a rare, "extensively drug-resistant" form, far more dangerous than he knew. They ordered him into isolation, saying he should turn himself over to Italian officials.

Instead, the man flew from Prague to Montreal on May 24 aboard Czech Air Flight 0104, then drove into the United States at the Champlain, N.Y., border crossing. He told the newspaper he was afraid that if he didn't get back to the U.S., he wouldn't get the treatment he needed to survive.

He is now at Atlanta's Grady Memorial Hospital in respiratory isolation.

CDC officials have recommended medical exams for cabin crew members and passengers who sat

within two rows of the man on the flights.

The other passengers are not considered at high risk of infection because tests indicated the amount of TB bacteria in the man was low, said Dr. Martin Cetron, director of the CDC's division of global migration and quarantine.

Gerberding noted that U.S. health officials have had little experience with the "extensively drug-resistant" form. It's possible it may have different transmission patterns, she said. Officials simply don't know yet.

"We're thankful the patient was not in a highly infectious state, but we know the risk of transmission isn't zero, even with the fact that he didn't have symptoms and didn't appear to be coughing," Gerberding said on ABC's "Good Morning America."

"We've got to really look at the people closest to him, get them skin tested."

Dr. Howard Njoo of the Public Health Agency of Canada said it appeared unlikely that the man spread the disease on the flight into Canada. Still the agency was working with U.S. officials to contact passengers who sat near him.

## Crying now acceptable in the workplace

The Wall Street Journal article nearly brought me to tears: Crying has become acceptable in the workplace.

A growing number of workers, especially those in their 20s and 30s, no longer see crying at work as a bad thing. They think it's bad to conceal their emotions.

Jean Twenge, a professor at San Diego State University, said they were raised by parents who encouraged them to express their feelings — parents who continually told them how smart and talented and perfect they are.

Now that these runts are in the workplace — now that they're in reality — they can't handle the pressure. Their meany bosses — greedy fellows who care about turning profits — are demanding and critical. No wonder every-

body is crying.

One woman — an accountant in her early 30s — broke into tears when her boss asked her to install software on her computer. When the boss asked her why she was blubbering, the woman said, "You scare me!"

It's not just women who are crying. Though they are more likely to cry than men, it has become more socially acceptable for both men and women to cry, according to Stephanie Shields, a Penn State psychology professor.

A female communications specialist in Boston gave an example. She said a male co-worker in his 20s had to fight "back tears while telling her about a chewing-out he'd gotten from a colleague." She said that a guy less in touch with his feelings might have expressed anger or

pounded the table.

How Neanderthal that would have been.

Some bosses are getting in touch with their feelings, too. A CEO of a credit-counseling service said he can't expect his employees to be

compassionate and caring with clients, then turn off their feelings like a switch. He said he knows how upsetting things can get. If they cry, he said, there is "no apology needed."

I'll tell you what is needed: Some backbone. We've gotten way too sensitive — way too eager to give into our feelings and weaknesses. We've gone soft.

Here's another softy trend. Napping is now acceptable in the workplace. Now I'm a big proponent of napping. It definitely boosts my productivity. But when I used to work in a corporate office, I napped the way an effective employee is supposed to.

I took a late lunch and sneaked out to my car. I flipped on some classical music and reclined the seat. I had some incredible naps in the parking garage and nobody knew about it but me.

But today's napping employees?

Companies are erecting tents in large napping rooms. Employees are curling up

with the company dog — a dog makes them feel happy — for a nice snooze. Nobody is embarrassed about it.

Nobody is embarrassed about anything anymore.

Look, there is a time and a place for everything. There is a time and a place for a man to nap. There is a time and a place for a man to cry — the birth of his child, the death of a loved one and when a late pass results in his team winning the Super Bowl.

There is a time and a place for a man to reveal his emotions, too. The time is usually in the evening and the place is usually a pub. Only a man's bartender should know his innermost feelings.

But that isn't the case anymore, and that is why I worry. While tough-guy terrorists are plotting to blow us

up, our fellows are misting up as they whine about their boss to co-workers.

We need to turn things back. We need to get our civilization back on track. Here's a good way to start: There shall be no more crying in the workplace, especially by men. There shall be no more napping, either (unless you sneak out to your car).

God forbid that the terrorists attack us again. But if they do, it's better that we are stoically working at our desks rather than curled up with the company dog, sobbing over something our meany boss said to us.

In 1922, the Lincoln Memorial was dedicated by President Harding, Chief Justice William Howard Taft and Robert Todd Lincoln.

In 1937, 10 people were killed when police fired on steelworkers demonstrating near the Republic Steel plant in Chicago.

In 1943, American forces secured the Aleutian island of Attu from the Japanese during World War II.

In 1958, unidentified American soldiers killed in World War II and the Korean conflict were buried at Arlington National Cemetery.

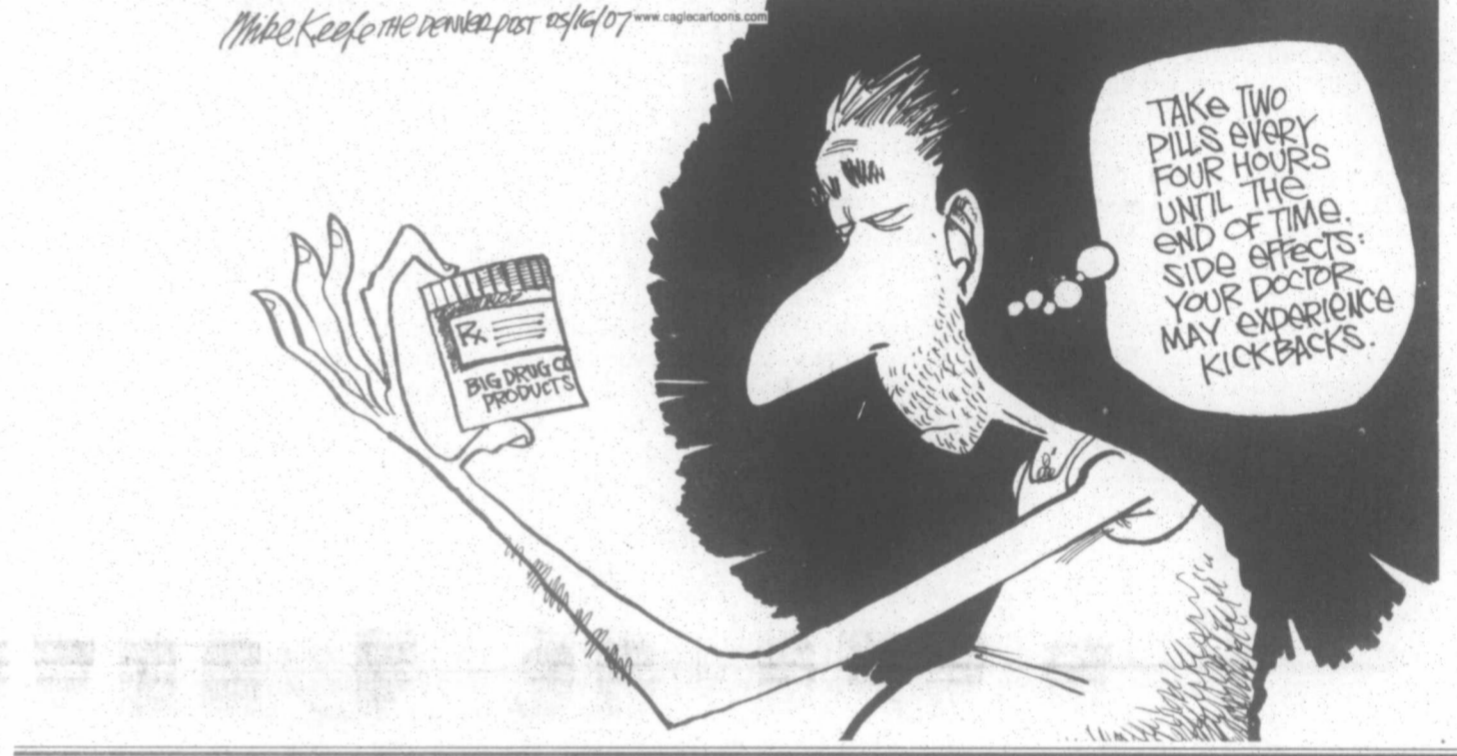
In 1971, the American space probe Mariner 9 blasted off from Cape Kennedy, Fla., on a journey to Mars.

In 1981, Bangladesh President Ziaur Rahman was assassinated in a failed military coup.

In 1986, 21 elderly passengers were killed when a tour bus went out of control on a mountain road and plunged into the Walker River near the California-Nevada border.

Ten years ago: Child molester Jesse K. Timmendequas was convicted in Trenton, N.J., of raping and strangling a 7-year-old neighbor, Megan Kanka, whose 1994 murder inspired "Megan's Law," requiring that communities be notified when sex offenders move in. (Timmendequas was later sentenced to death; he remains on death row.)

Five years ago: A solemn, wordless ceremony marked the end of the agonizing cleanup at ground zero in New York, 8 1/2 months after Sept. 11.



## Falwell was committed to his faith, country

I was saddened by the death of the Rev. Jerry Falwell. Though I disagreed with him on several points, he was a good, honest man who made a significant contribution to American politics.

The assassination of John F. Kennedy, followed by those of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and Sen. Robert Kennedy, set the country on a downward spiral in the '60s that spilled over into the '70s. It was aggravated, of course, by the Vietnam War, race riots and Watergate.

It seemed at the time that the center had collapsed. Profanity, drug use and promiscuity, not to mention a decided decline in personal hygiene, seemed to dominate the culture. Life Magazine, very important at the time, featured on its cover a Harvard professor who was a big advocate of LSD — a hallucinogenic drug that caused the deaths of a

number of people. Hippies, the New Left, anti-American rhetoric, drug use and promiscuity were all the rage in Hollywood and in much of the press.

Americans were stuck with Jimmy Carter as president. He was a droopy-kind of guy who had been attacked by a giant rabbit in Georgia, collapsed during one of his jogging sessions and had pronounced us all stuck in a malaise. He stood by helplessly as Fidel Castro unlocked his prisons and insane asylums and dumped 100,000 Cubans on our shores. He stood by helplessly when the Ayatollah Khomeini ousted the Shah of Iran, seized our embassy and held our people hostage.

The Christian religion was

under attack, too, as secular liberals were determined to drive it out of the public view. That, incidentally, was the tactic the communists used in the Soviet Union and in Cuba when they discovered they couldn't uproot it despite their bloody brutality. Keep religion inside the church and never let it out. That is still the tactic of America's secular folks today.

It was in these dark and turbulent times that a Baptist preacher in Lynchburg, Va., stepped forward with great courage and said the world reflected in the mainstream media, in Hollywood, on television and largely in politics is not America. There is a moral majority, he said, and it's time that they be heard.

Falwell's origin may have been humble, but he was a brilliant man, especially as an organizer. His Moral Majority roused evangelical Christians with a simple message: You are American citizens, and you have a right to vote for people who reflect your morality and your culture. Get out and do so.

By coincidence, it was timed with Ronald Reagan's second run for the presidency, and I personally don't think he would have made it (the liberal Republicans vehemently opposed him) but for Falwell's movement. That would be difficult to prove, but I believe Falwell played a big role.

In recent years, he concentrated mostly on building Liberty University and his church, and both are great legacies to leave America. Falwell, despite the hatred and slander that came from

Houston Chronicle on India's political shift:

In an amazing political coup, a single, 51-year-old Dalit or "untouchable" woman from the lowest caste just led her party to victory in India's most populous state, Uttar Pradesh. She is being hailed as a serious candidate for prime minister in India's next general election. She is former schoolteacher Mayawati Kumari, known simply as Mayawati, whose Bahujan Samaj (or All People's) Party stunned political observers by winning 203 of 403 provincial assembly seats to gain an unprecedented majority in this province of over 170 million people.

Even more remarkable, she created the "rainbow coalition" that brought her party to power by forming previ-

ously unheard-of alliances with people of all castes. In a country steeped in rigid caste systems and centuries of oppression by the Hindu upper castes, this is a welcome harbinger of a seismic shift in Indian politics and a more equal footing for its millions of less advantaged citizens.

Mayawati's natural supporters are the millions of outcasts who, like her ancestors, make up India's most marginalized and impoverished population, relegated to such "unclean" jobs as scavenging and cleaning toilets. They were called "the people of God" by Mahatma Gandhi, who fought to better their lives. And while India's constitution, adopted in 1950, forbids discrimination based on caste, it is still pervasive, defining almost all areas of social interaction.

Mayawati, a seasoned, ambitious politician, has been chief minister of the state three times. She forged an unlikely partnership between

Brahmins, at the top of the Hindu caste hierarchy, and Dalits at the bottom, which resulted in her party's fielding 86 upper-caste Brahmin candidates and 91 Dalits.

"People of all castes have brought us to power," Mayawati said after her victory. "My government will provide a rule free of injustice, crime, fear and corruption and one which is oriented toward development for all, but priority will be given to the lower castes and those socially and economically left behind."

Mayawati makes no secret of the fact that she would like to be India's first Dalit prime minister. Analysts say that several factors could make that a distinct possibility: The Hindu nationalist party had its worst showing in the state in 15 years, and that party's Rahul Gandhi, heir apparent to the dynasty that has given India three prime ministers, ran a lackluster campaign. A fast-

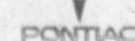
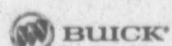
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# Dear Abby...

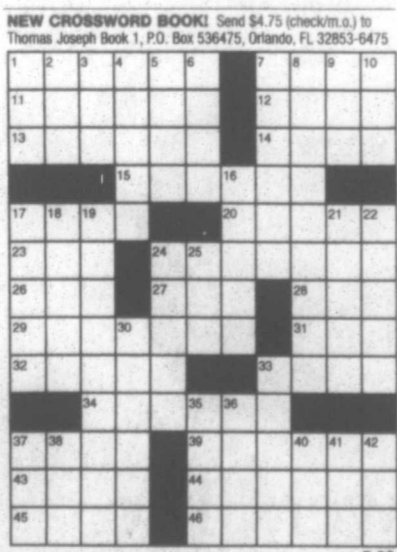

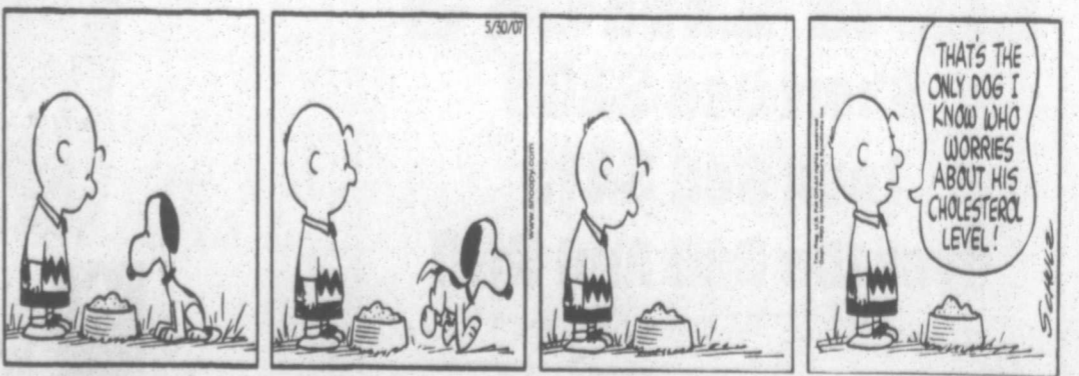

## Cavaliers tie up series with Pistons

CLEVELAND (AP) — The jumpers dropped. So did the layups and every one of his free throws, including two with four ticks left on the clock and one of the Detroit Pistons talking trash in his ear.

LeBron James ignored Rip Hamilton's taunts.

He wasn't going to let anyone or anything stop him. This was his fourth quarter. His time to shine.

"I live for the fourth quarter," James said. "I told my teammates, 'Get me to the fourth and it's close, and I'll try to win the game.' And I was able to do that."

James scored 25 points — 13 in the fourth — and rookie Daniel Gibson added a season-high 21 points as the Cleveland Cavaliers tied up the Eastern Conference finals with a 91-87 victory over the Detroit Pistons in Game 4 Tuesday night.

Just as they did a year ago, when they dropped Games 1 and 2 of the conference semis in Detroit, the Cavaliers took care of business at home and will now try to win again in Game 5 on Thursday night at The Palace in Auburn Hills, Mich.

Whether they succeed or not, the Cavs have earned themselves at least one more home game in one of their deepest runs through the postseason.

"We have a clean slate now," said Drew Gooden, who added a series-high 19 points — seven in the fourth — for Cleveland. "We can go into the Palace and start the series over."

The 21-year-old Gibson, filling in for injured Larry Hughes, made 12 of 12 free throws and carried the Cavs in the third. Eric Snow hit a crucial free throw in the final seconds as the Cavaliers moved within two victories of their first trip to the finals.

James was criticized for his fourth-quarter failures in Games 1 and 2 at Detroit, when he passed up the final shot one night and couldn't make a last-second attempt the next game.

In 12 magnificent minutes in the fourth, he went 4-of-6 from the field, 5-of-5 from the line and added four

rebounds and three assists. He also played defense down the stretch on Chauncey Billups, who went 0-for-3 with three turnovers in the fourth.

"If we just get LeBron to the fourth," Gibson said, "we know he's going to do whatever it takes to win."

The Cavaliers, who lost a seven-game series to Detroit last year, are making just their third visit to the conference finals and each time they've been tied 2-2 before losing in six games.

When he was drafted, James promised to bring the championship-starved city its first title since 1964, and he's closing in on one quicker than anyone expected.

Billups scored 23 points, but only five after halftime, Hamilton 19 and Tayshaun Prince 15 for the Pistons, who needed last-second wins to go up 2-0 in the best-of-seven series and are suddenly the team looking for answers.

Their frustration boiled over in the fourth when Rasheed Wallace was whistled for a technical during Cleveland's 9-0 run.

In the final minutes, it was the more-experienced Pistons who couldn't come up with the big play. With Detroit down 88-85, Wallace blocked a shot in the lane, but Billups rushed a 3-point shot that missed.

On Cleveland's next possession, Snow got fouled by Hamilton following a scramble for a loose ball.

James was fouled, and Cleveland's superstar, whose poor free-throw shooting all season has been one of his only flaws, calmly knocked down both foul shots to make it 91-87 with 4 seconds remaining.

As James was preparing to shoot, Hamilton walked up to him at the line and tried to rattle him with a few choice words — just as James had done to Washington's Gilbert Arenas in the playoffs last season.

"I invented that," James joked. "No, Scottie Pippen invented that with Karl Malone. He (Hamilton) tried to mess with me. But I'm more focused than I ever have been in my life."

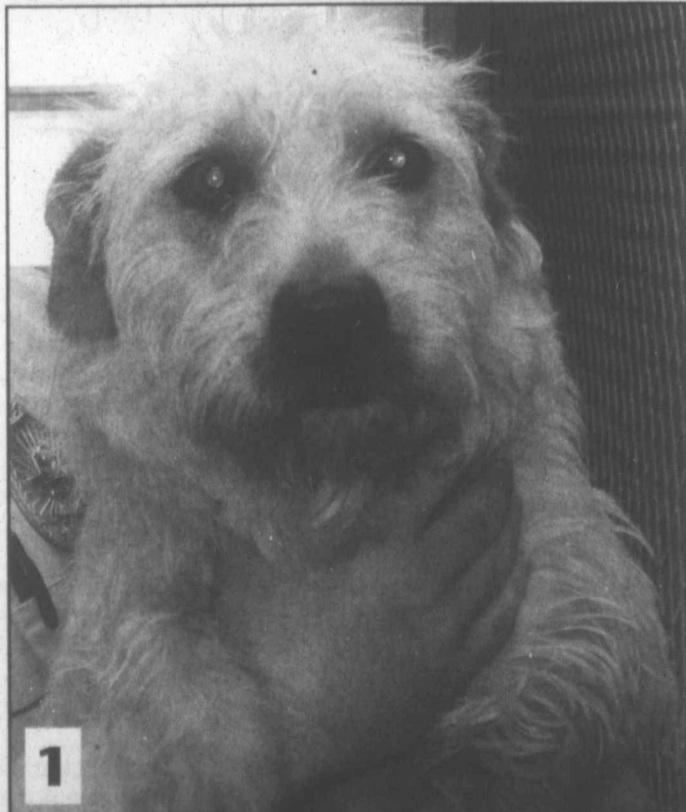

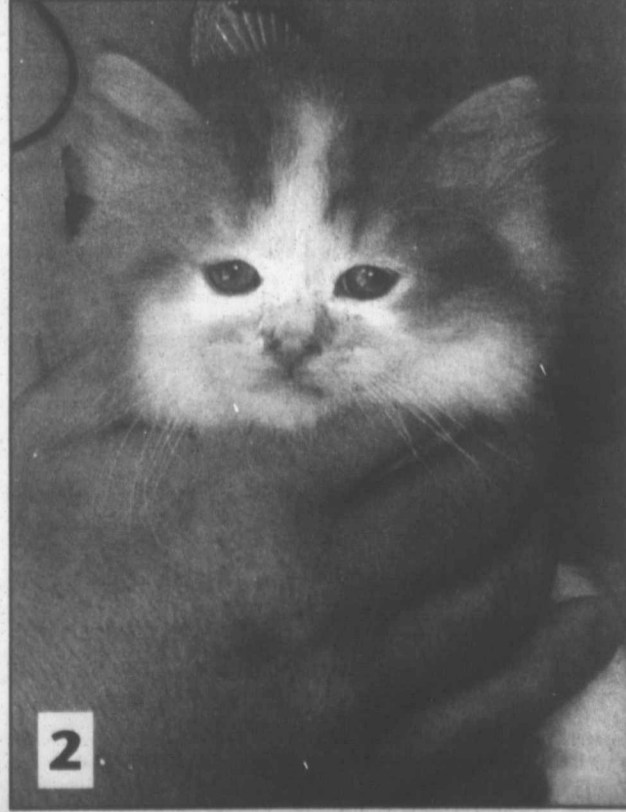

# UFC could have used a good fight to back up the hype

The message all week long was that this was the event that would help make mixed martial arts more popular than boxing. The marketing machine that is the Ultimate Fighting Championship drilled it home on the covers of the two biggest sports magazines, mainstream media coverage that would have been unheard of just a short time ago.

A few weeks earlier, there was a fight of another kind which also had a message attached. Oscar De La Hoya and Floyd Mayweather Jr. were on the front of Sports Illustrated, and the question was whether their fight would save boxing.

Turns out neither message was all it was hyped up to be.

Yes, De La Hoya and Mayweather fought in the richest fight ever, a megaevent that drew the rich and famous and generated a staggering \$150 million in revenue. They engaged in an entertaining if not terribly dramatic fight, and all but the most ardent De La Hoya fans went home happy.

But it was just one fight, and boxing remains ill with a lot of problems that will never be cured.

Chuck Liddell, meanwhile, met Quinton Jackson in the same arena Saturday night, except the two were fighting in an octagon cage instead of a ring. Nearly 15,000 mostly not-so-rich-and-famous paid their way in, and the UFC was expecting to strike it rich on a million pay-per-view buys.

Liddell is the face of the UFC, the sport's biggest name, and this was a grudge match to avenge an earlier loss to Jackson. He was favored to win not only in the Vegas sports books, but by the rabid fans who booed Jackson from the moment he entered the arena.

I had planned to see the fight in person, but was on another assignment. So I watched it on a big screen in a sports bar in Indianapolis to see what I'd been missing.

Sorry, but it sure seemed a lot of fuss about a lot of nothing.

For starters, Liddell didn't seem to take the biggest fight of his career all that seriously. A gossip columnist reported he was seen partying in the days before the fight on the Las Vegas Strip, and he came into the ring with a paunch hanging over his trunks that would make James Toney blush.

But it was the fight itself that

disappointed. I expected to see savage punches to the head, forearms to the neck, and kicks to the mid-section. I figured there would be blood, and lots of it, as befits a sport once called "human cock-fighting" by Republican presidential candidate John McCain.

Silly me. There wasn't much action at all, and when Jackson landed the first good punch of the fight Liddell crumpled to the canvas like a Las Vegas hotel being imploded.

There are rules in UFC (no eye gouging or groin punching among them) but hitting a man when he's down isn't one of them. So Jackson jumped on Liddell and started punching him until the referee jumped in and stopped the bout less than two minutes after it began.

If this had been boxing, there would have been cries of a fix. If this had been boxing, the referee would have been crucified for stopping it too soon.

If this had been boxing, cups of beer would have been flying into the ring and fans would have demanded their money back.

But this is mixed martial arts, a sport so new that even those watching aren't always sure what they're seeing. The sport is for real, but the

audience of mostly 20-something white males look like they would be just as comfortable watching Hulk Hogan as Chuck Liddell.

The crowd on this night was upset, but only because their man lost.

Now, UFC types will tell you that part of the beauty of the sport is its unpredictability, and that fights can end so many different ways. That includes quitting in the middle of a fight, something viewed as a badge of honor of sorts.

Roberto Duran would have liked the idea of "No mas" becoming socially acceptable.

There's no denying that UFC is hot. A recent card in Columbus, Ohio, brought in more money than a Rolling Stones concert, the shows sell out in Las Vegas, and the company is doing a card next month in Northern Ireland.

Some 3,000 fans showed up to watch the Liddell weigh-in, and the pay-per-view numbers are comparable or better than most major boxing matches.

Boxing has floundered because of a lack of stars, but that's not a problem at UFC, where they crank out a new one every month or so and market them with zeal. While

dozens of promoters and organizations battle each other for control in boxing, UFC is a company shop and can sell its product with a singular message.

The formula works, though UFC officials acknowledge they have work to do to expand the sport outside its core audience. The latest card was supposed to help do just that, just like the De La Hoya-Mayweather fight was supposed to save boxing.

Both efforts probably failed, not for a lack of promotion but because both sports will always be on the fringe. Boxing has been legal for more than a century and is still a niche sport, so it's hard to imagine mixed martial arts will do much better.

The UFC better watch out, though. Many more fights like Saturday's main event, and it could begin getting something boxing has had for a long time.

Something it doesn't need — a bad reputation.

## Sosa helps propel Texas over Oakland

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Sammy Sosa told himself to be patient and wait for his pitch — even if it wasn't a home-run pitch.

Oakland intentionally walked Mark Teixeira to load the bases and get to Sosa, and the slugger broke through against Lenny DiNardo.

Sosa lined a two-run single to left that got by a charging Shannon Stewart, breaking a scoreless tie in the sixth and helping the Texas Rangers end a season-worst six-game skid with a 4-0 victory over the Athletics on Tuesday night.

"This game is about adjustments," Sosa said. "He was pitching great

until that inning. Once again I had an opportunity to drive in some runs and come through for my team. Hopefully we can get on a little roll."

Marlon Byrd singled in a run during that four-run sixth for one of his three hits and Mike Wood pitched five innings in an impressive spot start against his former club. Texas avoided its first seven-game losing streak since dropping eight in a row from Aug. 8-16, 2005.

Sosa — booed each time he stepped into the batter's box — went 1-for-4 with a strikeout and remained stuck at 598 home runs, but ended an 0-for-8 stretch with the single.

## San Antonio can rely on experienced players in potential series-clincher

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — As much as the individual talents of Tim Duncan, Tony Parker and Manu Ginobili have frustrated the Utah Jazz in the Western Conference finals, the San Antonio Spurs have benefited from something else: their collective experience.

The Spurs are the oldest team in the league, featuring a roster full of players who've won championships or been part of long postseason runs. The calmness, confidence and wisdom gained along the way has been put to good use against the novice Jazz, helping San Antonio build a 3-1 series lead going into Game 5 on Wednesday night.

Consider the evidence. In Games 1 and 2, San Antonio built big leads, then prevented Utah from getting close until it was way too late. The Jazz finally clicked when they went home for Game 3 and the Spurs were wise enough to realize it wasn't their night. Rather than go all out for a rally that might've made the final score look good — as Utah did late in the first two games — San Antonio coach Gregg Popovich let backups finish what became a 26-point loss.

The best example, though, was Game 4 on Monday night.

Neither team was playing great, but both were playing hard. The Spurs led by only one point early in the fourth quarter when a foul was called on the Jazz. Then another. And another. More fouls and some technicals followed. Utah's fans lost their composure, too, going from anti-official chants to throwing things on the court.

San Antonio handled it all just fine, mainly by making free throws and not doing anything silly. As a reward, the Spurs are one win away from heading to the NBA finals for the third time in five years.

"The playoffs are a physical time,"

Popovich said Tuesday. "Things happen and you move on."

Series clinchers, also known as "close-out" games, are considered the toughest to win, but San Antonio players certainly know the drill.

The Spurs are 12-4 in close-out games since Duncan, Parker and Ginobili teamed up in 2003. Nine of the wins came on their first chance to end a series, including against Denver and Phoenix this postseason.

Yet within those numbers lies a nugget of hope for Utah. All four of San Antonio's losses have come at home.

Well, that would be good news for the Jazz if they hadn't lost 18 straight games in San Antonio. Utah's skid dates to February 1999, so long ago that Karl Malone and John Stockton had four more years together and the David Robinson-led Spurs were not only still playing in the Alamodome, it was 18 months before ground was broken on their current arena.

Another concern for Utah is that point guard Deron Williams received treatment for a sprained ankle Tuesday. He's expected to play Game 5, but also is getting over a stomach ailment that he said cost him eight pounds over the weekend.

Still, San Antonio is bracing for another challenge. Just to get this far, the Jazz had to shake off a season-ending 3-6 slump, then an 0-2 deficit in the first round. So they're not likely to give up now.

"We don't in any way think we are just going to walk in our building and take these guys out," Duncan said. "They have shown they can play with us. They have shown that they are very physical."

Utah is likely going through a rite of passage, like Miami's Dwyane Wade endured before his breakthrough last

year and, most famously, Michael Jordan's Chicago Bulls faced in getting past the Bad Boy-era Detroit Pistons.

The Jazz are somewhat fortunate to have experienced all that they have this postseason. Sure, they earned it by beating the Rockets in seven games and Golden State in five, but the Warriors helped by eliminating the top-seeded Dallas Mavericks in the first round. Whether Utah might've beaten Dallas is irrelevant; the bottom line is that the Jazz are gaining valuable experience — there's that word again — that should help in 2008 and beyond.

After all, Carlos Boozer is 25 and Williams is 22, so the pieces are in place for Utah's revival to continue.

The biggest problem for the Jazz this series is that Williams (29.5 points per game) and Boozer (24.5) aren't getting enough help. Utah's third-highest scorer is Andrei Kirilenko at a measly 8.3 points per game.

"I think we're playing a little bit weaker than we did the first two rounds. Probably the opponent is a little different," Kirilenko said. "Still, we need to stay as a team for the whole 48 minutes."

Utah's inability to spread the scoring isn't a case of Williams and Boozer hogging the ball. Kirilenko, Mehmet Okur, Derek Fisher and Matt Harpring are mostly missing open shots and losing confidence, resulting in more misses or fewer attempts.

"We have guys who are talented enough to pick it up," Boozer said. "We're going to need those guys to pick it up if we're going to have a chance. In Game 5, we're going to have to get all the loose balls, all the rebounds. Every advantage we can have, we're going to have to get."

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## Red clay still causing problems for Roddick at French Open

PARIS (AP) — The French Open's red clay gave Andy Roddick trouble again. The 2003 U.S. Open champion exited in the first round at Roland Garros for the fourth time in six years, falling to Igor Andreev of Russia 3-6, 6-4, 6-3, 6-4 Tuesday.

"I feel like the surface definitely makes a difference," said the third-ranked Roddick, who has reached the Wimbledon final twice. "I just got to figure something out."

Seven other American men, including James Blake, also lost Tuesday. The eighth-seeded Blake fell to Ivo Karlovic 4-6, 6-4, 7-5, 7-5.

Rafael Nadal and Roger Federer, the finalists last year, advanced to the second round by winning in straight sets. Australian Open finalist Fernando Gonzalez, however, lost to Radek Stepanek 6-2, 6-2, 6-4.

Today, Maria Sharapova and Amelie Mauresmo were to make their first appearances at the rain-affected tournament. Sisters Serena and Venus Williams were scheduled to play in the second round, along with top-ranked Justine Henin.

On the men's side, Federer was to be back in action against Thierry Ascione of France. No. 4 Nikolay Davydenco, No. 6 Novak Djokovic and 2003 champion Juan Carlos Ferrero were also scheduled to play.

Roddick hasn't won consecutive matches at Roland Garros since 2001. Last year, he quit with an ankle injury after losing the first two sets against Alberto Martin of Spain.

"It was difficult, but I made him go out and beat me today," said Roddick, who was broken at love in the third game of the final set when he double-faulted for the first time. "I felt like I hit the ball OK today. At times, really well."

Nadal, the two-time defending champion who improved to 15-0 for his career at the French Open, beat Juan Martin del Potro 7-5, 6-3, 6-2, and Federer defeated another American, Michael Russell, 6-4, 6-2, 6-4 in a first-round match that started Monday.

"Difficult always in the first round ... especially here," said Nadal, who trailed 5-3 in the first set but then won eight straight games. "He play very tough, very aggressive."

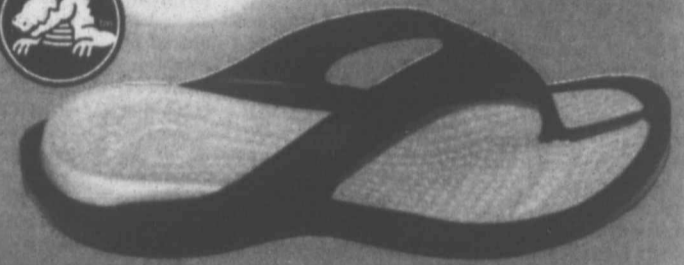
