Tribute to Woody Guthrie festivities this weekend

Pampa's annual Tribute to Woody Guthrie features a full slate of events for Friday Sunday "Woody's through at Neighborhood," 320 and 400 S. Cuyler.

Guthrie, a folk music singer perhaps best known for writing the song "This Land Is Your Land," lived in Pampa from 1929 to 1937.

The weekend tribute begins at noon Friday when the Woody Guthrie Center at 320 S. Cuyler opens for visitors and a "pickin' tent" on the west side of the center opens. Visitors may bring their musical instruments to take part in the playing and may attend to hear the music.

In conjunction with the tribute, Guthrie impersonator K.C. Mathey will perform at 11 a.m. Friday in the Fellowship Hall of St. Matthew's Episcopal Church for day care center and day school students. The performance is free and open to the public.

The movie "Bound for Glory" will be shown at 2 p.m. at the center, which features exhibits associated with Guthrie's time in

Pampa.

Dedication of a small building immediately west of the center will be at 5:30 p.m. The building, from which foods such as hot dogs, hamburgers and drinks are served at each year's tribute, will be named "Alice's Restaurant" after a song of the same name written and recorded by Guthrie's son Arlo.

Hot dogs will be served free of charge beginning at the time of the dedication. Cold drinks will also be available and will cost 50 cents each.

A jam session will begin at 6:30 p.m. at the center for participants and listeners.

Saturday's schedule begins at 9 a.m. when the center and pickin' tent will open. Children's activities are scheduled throughout the day.

Walking and driving tours of downtown Pampa to some of the locations where Guthrie spent his days in Pampa will be available. The tour is self-guided; guide booklets and information will be provided. Performances will begin at 1 p.m. on the

U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry has announced he would support the President's veto President would have: of a bill to drastically expand the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP). "I voted for the legislation that created the original SCHIP program, and I am an original cosponsor of HR 3584, a measure to extend that program," noted Thornberry. "The bill sent to the President more than doubled the cost of the program and would have subsidized insurance for families making over \$80,000 a year in some states. I hope that by sustaining the President's veto we can set the stage for the passage of a bill focused where it should be - on

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

Young fund-raisers exceed their expectations

A group of junior high school students could give others a few tips on successful fund-raising, judging by the profits they netted last Saturday.

The JCV Teens in Action raised \$983 from a fall dance they held from 7 to 10 p.m. Saturday in the Impact building on the campus of Pampa High School for junior high school and freshman students.

The \$983 represents the profit netted after expenses of decorating and other costs, said Ofelia Marszal, volunteer coordinator for CASA of the High Plains.

CASA is Court-Appointed Special Advocates, and is a nonprofit organization whose volunteers act as advocates for children who were removed from

abusive and/or neglectful homes. The full name of the volunteer student group is Junior CASA Volunteer Teens in Action.

An estimated 140 to 150 attended the dance, Marszal said. Bottled water was sold at \$1 per bottle, and an estimated \$200 of the profits were from the water sales, she said. The 360 bottles of water for sale were donated by Culligan Water Conditioning.

Adults donated their time to act as chaperons at the dance. Among the chaperons were Pampa police officers Dave Thomas and Tyler Jernigan.

"We didn't have any problems," Marszal said of the dance.







Tela Mange, a department spokeswoman, said the agency didn't know that a sex offender who previously lived in the house was back in jail.

Eulalio Zamaripa, 39, was convicted of indecency with a child by exposure in 2001.

He was released after four years behind bars, but was recently jailed again on a warrant related to child sup-

Mange said the agency is supposed to notify neighbors within 10 days if a high-risk sex offender moves into the area. The notice on Zamaripa was delayed because his file was lost, she said.

She said the agency will send a letter to Jurek's neighborhood explaining that there was a mistake.

amount by raising taxes on cigarettes and tobacco products. Tobacco use is declining and the projected revenue would be unable to cover the costs of the program in just five short years.

• Expanded the program before its original goals were met; according to the Centers for Disease Control, the number of uninsured children has been declining steadily for years. However, not all children eligible for the current program have yet enrolled. Before we expand the program, we should do a better job of reaching those it was originally intended to help.

"It is the old Washington game of smoke and mirrors to pretend to pay for major new spending without being honest about how much it will cost and where the will money come," Thornberry said. "I will vote to sustain the President's veto in large measure because to pass a bill that funds a growing program with a declining revenue source is irresponsible and all taxpayers would have ultimately suffered the consequences." SCHIP was created in 1997 to help state govern-

ments provide health insurance for children in families that made too much money to qualify for Medicaid, but still had trouble paying for health insurance. The federal government generally pays 70 percent of the cost of the insurance, while the state pays the remaining 30 percent.

The Congressional Budget Office estimates that of the 5.8 million children who are provided public coverage, 2 million -- 35 percent -- would otherwise have had private insurance. The effect is estimated to be higher, 50 percent, for the 1.2 million newly eligible under the bill the President vetoed.



DALLAS (AP) — The Texas Youth Commission fired seven employees, including four quality assurance monitors, in response to a report of juvenile inmates living in squalid conditions at a West Texas lockup.

TYC Inspector General Bruce Toney said Wednesday that he has opened a criminal investigation into the operations of the Coke County Juvenile Center, which was vacated of its 197 male inmates on Tuesday.

"We are going to follow all leads wherever they take us and as high as they may go both in TYC and the operation of that facility," Toney said.

The state this week canceled its \$8 million annual contract with GEO Group Inc., which had operated the prison since 1994. Officials cited the "deplorable conditions" outlined in a review by TYC ombudsman Will Harrell. His report cited dirty bed sheets, fecessmeared cells, insects in the food and examples of inmates being placed in solitary confinement for five weeks.

Immigrants taking kids out of Irving schools

IRVING, Texas (AP) — The superintendent of the Irving school district said some immigrant parents have pulled their children from school over fears that they or their families will be deported.

Jack Singley said about 90 children have withdrawn from 33,000-student public school district in the last week.

The Mexican Consulate has advised people to avoid driving through the Dallas suburb in response to the Inving Police Department's participation in a program with federal immigration authorities to identify illegal immigrants who have been arrested and deport them.

Singley said he hopes the parents will re-enroll their students somewhere else. Angelo is the latest problem in a year of turmoil for the commission, which was placed in state conservatorship this spring after a sex abuse scandal and subsequent cover-up.


Commission officials haven't been able to explain why four full-time quality-assurance monitors at the Coke County facility failed to report the substandard conditions. They worked in a portable building just outside the facility's secure perimeter.

"Those who were supposed to be our quality-assurance people out at Bronte will no longer be working for the Texas Youth Commission," agency spokesman Jim Hurley said. He cited an "abysmal failure on their part to not report the deterioration of that facility."

The agency also fired an employee from the agency's Fort Worth district office who wrote a report in February awarding the prison an overall compliance score of 97.7 percent. In the review, monitors thanked GEO staff members for their positive work with juvenile inmates.

Fifty years ago, on Oct. 4, 1957, the Space Age began as the Soviet Union launched Sputnik 1, the first artificial satellite, into orbit.

In 1957, Jimmy Hoffa was elected president of the Teamsters Union.

In 1965, Pope Paul VI became the first pope to visit the Western Hemisphere as he addressed the U.N. General

Assembly.

'Trying to determine what is going on in the world by reading newspapers is like trying to tell the time by watching the second hand of

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Web Surfing. Every time you visit a Web site, you leave a footprint. These tracks contain a very important piece of information called an IP Address. An IP Address is the unique ID every computer on the Internet MUST have in order to communicate. IP is short for Internet Protocol. The address is a series of four three-digit numbers, such as 134.056.002.253.

If someone wanted to know who visited a certain Web site, they could track that IP address back to its owner, your ISP. Then, if your ISP cooperates, they could link that IP to you based on the date and time you were assigned that ID. Typically, only law enforcement officials go through such painstaking steps to find a user. But, that remote possibility is enough to cause some privacy-minded citizens to seek better protection. Enter Anonymizer.

Proxify. Think of Proxify (http://www.proxify.com) as a proxy Web-surfer. Take a look at the top-right of heir home page. Simply type any Web address into the blank to surf anonymously. Here's how it works: Let's say you didn't want the IRS to know that you visited their "Will I get Audited?" Web page. Go to Proxify's Web site and type the IRS's address (http://www.irs.gov) into the blank.

The IRS homepage will slowly appear. The sudden drop in speed is due to two factors: First, you have now introduced a middleman (Proxify) into your surfing. All Web pages will now be routed through Proxify first before



"Anonymity is essential to protect free speech. It can be used to protect human rights workers reporting abuses, political dissidents commenting on government actions, writers publishing controversial literature and other important functions where revealing a person's identity would threaten a person's life or wellbeing. Anonymous publishing has been recognized in the United States as being protected by the First Amendment."

Most of these services forward your message through numerous servers around the world, stripping off the previous server's address. The recipient has no way of knowing that the message came from you. Of course, they also have no way to reply to you. For more information on re-mailing, check

into the recycle bin does not make it irretrievable. After all, you can always double-click on the trash and pull it back out. However, what if you "empty the recycle bin?" Could someone still retrieve the file? Yes, unless special steps are taken.

When your computer deletes a file, it doesn't truly erase it. It simply marks the area on the hard drive where the file exists as "available." The next time you save a file, it may (or may not) overwrite that deleted file.

However, even if that area on the hard drive has been overwritten eight times, the data still leaves a "magnetic signature." Law enforcement officials have devices that can decipher these "data ghosts" and rebuild the deleted files.

To truly erase all data, you need a special program. I recommend, Ultra Wipe (http://www.snapfiles.com/reviews/Ult raWipe/ultrawipe.html) It's a free program that will find the empty areas of your hard drive, write random data over them, then erase it, then repeat the process. Be careful, though. It has a "Panic Button" that will immediately erase a user-selected group of folders with a mouse-click.

Some people believe that the govern-ment and corporations are slowly eroding our right to privacy. However, with the tools I've mentioned, you'll have a fighting chance against these "Big Brothers."

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



Webb wins duel, kids' homers help Diamondbacks beat Cubs

PHOENIX (AP) — The youthful Arizona Diamondbacks used a combination of stalwart pitching, superb fielding and timely hitting to post the NL's best record.

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There was no reason to change the script in the playoffs

Brandon Webb shut down the Chicago Cubs, and the Diamondbacks got home runs from two of their kids in a 3-1 victory Wednesday night in their NL playoff opener.

"I've said all year that all of us young guys were kind of thrown in the middle of this, and we kind of don't know what's going on," said Mark Reynolds, whose sev-

enth inning homer broke a 1-1 tie. "We go out there and play and do what we know how to do, and that's play ball."

Webb baffled the Cubs with his sinker, then staggered them with changeups and curves.

"You have your ace on the mound, you always expect to win that game, especially here at home," Arizona manager Bob Melvin said. "It's a game that was probably a little more pressure on us to win than them."

Webb was locked in a tight game with Carlos Zambrano until Chicago manager Lou Piniella made a questionable move. He pulled his ace after only six innings and 85 pitches because he plans to bring the right-hander back on three days' rest in Game 4.

Reynolds promptly hit a tiebreaking homer off reliever Carlos Marmol, and the Diamondbacks held on behind their stingy bullpen.

Did planning for Game 4 cost the Cubs in Game 1? Piniella was terse when a reporter asked if he could be accused of looking ahead.

"I'm not accused of anything, sir," Piniella said. "I've got a good bullpen here, OK? And I trust my bullpen. I'm bringing back a pitcher on three days' rest on Sunday, and I took a shot with my bullpen. It didn't work today. They've done it

all year. I've got confidence in them — period, end of story."

Game 2 is Thursday night, with Ted Lilly on the mound for Chicago against Doug Davis.

The Cubs, looking for their first World Series title in 99 years, had plenty of fan support - even on the road. The team holds spring training in nearby Mesa, and the valley is a popular retirement destination for Chicagoans.

In their first playoff appearance since losing Game 7 of the 2003 NL championship series to Florida, the Cubs managed little on offense. Alfonso Soriano, Jacque Jones, Aramis Ramirez and Cliff

Floyd combined to go 0-for-16 with five strikeouts. Derrek Lee had a single but struck out three times.

Chicago twice got the leadoff batter to second with no outs early in the game but came away empty.

Webb, the reigning NL Cy Award winner, Young allowed four hits and struck out nine over seven outstanding innings. He walked three and hit a batter.

"I was able to keep them off-balance. I had pretty good stuff tonight, great offspeed," Webb said. "Had some great strikeouts, key situations."

Setup man Brandon Lyon threw a perfect eighth, and closer Jose Valverde earned

the save.

Stephen Drew homered in the fourth off Zambrano, who allowed four hits, struck out eight and walked one. Zambrano said he tried to talk Piniella into letting him go out for the seventh, but the pitcher would not criticize his manager.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - Making just the second postseason appearance in their 15-year history, the Colorado Rockies played like October regulars.

Jeff Francis held the league's highest-scoring team in check, and the Colorado Rockies took advantage of one shaky inning by Cole Hamels to beat the Philadelphia Phillies 4-2 in Game 1 of their NL playoff series Wednesday.

With the two highest-scoring clubs in the league playing in two of the most hitter-friendly ballparks in the majors, this series figured to have plenty of offense.

Instead, the teams combined for six runs and 10 hits in the opener. Several hitters had trouble seeing the ball because of the late-afternoon shadows at Citizens Bank Park.

'It was tough," said Todd Helton, who tripled and scored Colorado's first run in the second inning. "If you got a hit after the first inning, you deserved it.'

Beckett, Ortiz, lead Red Sox to victory over Angels

BOSTON (AP) - Josh Beckett waited four years between postseason starts. When he got back on the nothing mound, much changed.

He's still Mr. Zero when October rolls around.

The 2003 World Series MVP pitched his second consecutive postseason shutout Wednesday night, backed by a two-run homer from David Ortiz that helped the Boston Red Sox beat the Los Angeles Angels 4-0 in their AL playoff opener.

Beckett retired 19 consecutive batters after a leadoff single, allowing just four hits to run his postseason scoreless streak to 18 innings. His three postseason shutouts tie Whitey Ford and Mordecai Brown for second on the career list, one behind Christy Mathewson.

"He's a guy that wants to be great," said Red Sox third baseman Mike Lowell, who came to Boston from the Marlins in the same trade as Beckett. "He doesn't want to be pretty good. He wants to be the best guy that takes the mound. That's what you want from your ace.'

It was Beckett's first postseason appearance since blanking the New York Yankees on three days' rest to clinch the '03 Series for Florida. The last pitcher with consecutive postseason shutouts was current teammate Curt Schilling, who accomplished the feat with the Phillies in 1993 and Arizona in 2001.

"You don't change a lot of things just because now you're in the postseason," Beckett said. "You do what made you successful to get here."

Boston rookie Daisuke Matsuzaka will face Kelvim Escobar in Game 2 on Friday.

The only 20-game winner in the majors this year, Beckett struck out eight and walked none to improve to 3-2 with a 1.74 ERA in the postseason. He threw 83 of his 108 pitches for strikes and started 21 of the last 23 batters with first-pitch strikes, 15 in a row.

"He was throwing the ball better than he has at any point in the season. He was in control of himself," Red Sox manager Terry Francona said. "That was a great performance."

Beckett has two shutouts in 166 regular-season starts and three in six postseason starts. He became the first Boston pitcher to toss a postseason shutout since Luis Tiant beat Cincinnati 6-0 with a five-hitter in the opener of the 1975 World Series.

The victory was Boston's seventh straight in the postseason over the California-Anaheim-Los Angeles Angels, having come back from a 3-1 deficit to win in the 1986 playoffs and then sweeping them in the 2004 best-of-five first round.

It was Ortiz who eliminated the Angels with a 10thinning, series-ending homer

in 2004. He hurt them again this year.

Kevin Youkilis homered in the first off Los Angeles ace John Lackey, then doubled with one out in the third. Ortiz, who needed a cortisone shot in his ailing right knee on Saturday, followed with his ninth postseason homer to make it 3-0.

"This is his time of year, too," Youkilis said. "For David to come out and have a big hit is always good. Because when David's confidence is high, this team succeeds."

Lackey won 19 games in the regular season — second only to Beckett — but he couldn't keep up on Wednesday. Lackey allowed four runs, nine hits and two walks, striking out four in six innings.

"With Beckett pitching that way, it's going to be tough," Lackey said. "You've got to hold down that kind of lineup with not getting much from your side."

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

His seven-catch, 184-yard performance included two touchdowns, pushing Dallas' total to 151 points, 22 more than the '98 Vikes had after four games.

"We're right on pace," Crayton

Owens and Witten.

"I love it," Crayton said. "No one wants to sit on the sidelines. You don't want to be labeled 'just a third receiver."

Crayton has 13 catches for 262 yards and two touchdowns, ranking third to Witten and Owens in category. each However, Crayton's average of 20.2 yards per catch is the best on the team and seventh best in the NFL.





We will then turn off the seat belt sign." Without a sound, all went as requested. I noticed the sergeant saluting the casket as it was brought off the plane. His action made me realize that I am proud to be an American. So here's a public "Thank you" to our military men and women for what you do so we can live the way we do."
