

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Suicide support Practice, practice group formed

A suicide survivor support group has been formed in Pampa and has been holding meetings for the past few months.

The goal of the group is to help survivors absorb the impact of this type of death, to offer empathetic understanding and acceptance and to support each other toward healthy resolution of the grief.

When people attend this support group, they are among others who have gone through the same experience. Some attendees have gone through this a few years ago and others went through the suicide of a loved one as long as 20 years

"What is nice about having this support group is we can benefit from each other's similar experiences," saidgroup founder Ron Shank. "I lost my father and an uncle

to suicide and some of those who attend have lost spouses, children and friends. This group cannot take away the pain or grief of someone suffering from the sudden and many times unexplained loss, but we recognize that strength and healing are gained by using one's own painful growth in support of others.

"The main focus of this group is to provide an atmosphere of love and acceptance toward healing through this very complicated grieving process. Any death is difficult, but suicide produces feelings of guilt, asking why or what could I have done to avoid this and there is also a stigma or embarrassment associated with this type of death. Many times people are afraid to tell others how a person actually died and others do not know what to say to the one grieving or how to

child who is to receive a coat. The adults must also provide proof of residence, such as a recent utility bill; a Social Security card for each child receiving a coat; and the amount of income for the household.

Each child is eligible for one coat per year through the project, Henderson said.

"It's like the Evelyn Rivers project in Amarillo," she said. "Somebody Cares is an international organization based in Houston and is a non-profit compassion-

comfort them. Hopefully, this group can help with those feelings and we can all start or finish the healing process together."

Shank said most of the meetings held by the support group are informal. They may or may not have an organized subject to discuss that evening and occasionally they bring in guest speakers. This month, Counselor Danina Kennedy from Redeemed Hearts Christian Counseling Center in Pampa gave a presentation on grief and loss.

"There are many categories of grief," said

Kennedy. "People suffer physically, emotionally, spiritually, psychologically and their relationships are also affected after the death of a loved one. Physically they have trouble eating or sleeping and can feel real physical pain such as aches, chest pain or upset stomach. People put pressure on themselves to be strong and not get angry or cry in front of others and these are some things that can cause depres-

"Many people who feel close to God can even struggle with their spirituality. Many people going through the grieving process may think that other church members are thinking that if they had enough faith they would be spared all of the loneliness, anger and pain

they are experiencing. The brain is definitely affected by grief because the brain's two sides often disconnect and those grieving have trouble putting thoughts together and remembering things. And lastly, the relationships that people have are affected because every person grieves differently and in their own way and at their own pace.' Some of the information

that Shank has handed out to the group members are Web sites to visit, books to read and written suggestions for survivors. One excerpt from Bereavement Publications "Living with LOSS Magazine" (summer 2007 issue) is an article

titled "Will I feel this way by Robert Thompson, M.D., who gives

practical suggestions that may help those dealing with the death of a loved one.

"Exercise: Avoid the temptation to stay in bed or lie on the couch. Do something physical each day. Do something social each day: It's important not to isolate yourself from others. Even if it's only a phone call or brief personal encounter, try and visit with a friend or family member each day. Overlook non-helpful remarks: It's easy to be hurt by unkind things people say, but remember when someone asks you a question or makes a comments about your loss, they are almost always trying to be helpful.

"Other relationships: Although it may be hard, don't neglect other relationships, especially those with family members. Don't engage in self-destructive behavior: Do not act out your pain in negative or selfdestructive ways. Using alcohol or drugs to numb your pain has long term consequences. Allow yourself to feel the sadness: We can run, but we can't hide from our grief. Don't put a timeline on your grief: It takes as long as it takes. Your sadness is yours and no one else's."

### Search warrants issued in Anna Nicole's death By The Assocaited Press

California Department of Justice investigators began serving search warrants Friday in connection with the death of Anna Nicole Smith, a person close to the investigation told The Associated Press.

The person, who spoke on condition of anonymity because the investigation was ongoing, declined to elaborate. California Attorney General Jerry Brown was expected to make an announcement later Friday.

The former Playboy Playmate died of an accidental drug overdose in February at a Florida hotel. She was 39.

Several people close to the model have fallen under suspicion since her death, including her psychiatrist

Dr. Khristine Eroshevich. The Medical Board of California said in April it was investigating Eroshevich, who, according to documents, authorized all 11 prescription medications found in Smith's hotel room the day she died.

Eroshevich had traveled

with Smith to Florida.

More than 600 pills, including 450 muscle relaxants, were missing from prescriptions that were no more public records request.

Odessa American on higher salaries for first responders and emergency medical personnel:

Do the men and women who respond in emergency situations deserve better pay?

In the wake of the tragedy that cost three Odessa Police Department officers their lives, the answer seems obvi-

Alas, there's a gap between what would be ideal and what reality demands.

But we may have reached a point where some accommodations must be

made budget-wise to more adequately compensate first responders, from law enforcement officers to firefighters to emergency medical personnel.

After all, they do risk their lives for the general welfare of the public. And no matter how routine a call might seem (Cpls. Arlie Jones, Scott Gardner and Abel Marquez had no doubt been called to many domestic dispute situations before the one that ended their lives), there is the potential for danger.

So that is one reason to pay these public servants on a higher level.

But there are more common sense reasons as well.

For instance, the Odessa Police Department has been operating shorthanded for some time now. Part of the reason is the fact that many officers

have been lured away by higher-paying jobs, both in other law enforcement agencies and in the private sector.

This puts an additional strain on

those who stay with the department because they are called on to work long hours to pick up the slack.

Whats more, many first responders moonlight by working other jobs or having their own businesses. This is by choice, of course. But it just reduces the spare time these people have to spend with their families. And it affects their quality of life.

So, while hiking the pay of those who work in emergency capacities might create a bigger burden on tax-payers, it may be a sacrifice that is

# Infant cold medications pulled from shelves

WASHINGTON (AP) — Drug makers on Thursday voluntarily pulled children's cold medicines off the market less than two weeks after the government warned of potential health risks to infants.

Over-the-counter medications aimed at children under the age of two are being removed from store shelves because of rare instances of parents overdosing young children, a trade group that represents the drugs' manufacturers said. The group said parents should no longer administer these medications.

The Consumer Healthcare Products Association said last month it agreed with government officials that use of the drugs should be restricted, but had previously stopped short of pulling the products from the mar-

Cold medicines being withdrawn include: Johnson & Johnson Pediacare Infant Drops and Tylenol Concentrated Infants Drops, Dimetapp Decongestant Infant Drops, Novartis' Triaminic Infant & Toddler Thin Strips and Prestige Brands Holdings' Little Colds Decongestant Plus Cough.

CVS Caremark Corp. said Thursday morning it would remove the affected products as well as CVS-brand equivalents from store shelves. The pharmacy chain said customers can return the products for a full refund.

Catherine Tom-Revzon, a pediatric pharmacist, said parents should use natural therapies, including saltwater drops and humidifiers, to treat infants' colds before using drugs.

"These medications were never designed to cure colds but only to treat cold symptoms, and in children under two there was little evidence they were effective anyway," said Tom-Revzon, who is pharmacy manager at the Children's Hospital at Montefiore in New York.

Late last month the Food and Drug Administration tentatively recommended

adding the words "do not use in children under two years," products' labeling. Current labeling directs parents to consult a doctor before administering the

drugs to infants and toddlers. The medicines come in tiny, droplet-size doses, but parents occassionally do not consult or follow directions from physicians, which can lead to accidental overdose.

FDA will formally consider revising labeling at a meeting scheduled for Oct. 18-19.

After reviewing reports of side effects over the last four decades, FDA found 54 child fatalities from over-thecounter decongestant medicines. The agency found 69 reports of children's deaths connected with antihistamines, which are used to treat runny noses.

The Consumer Healthcare Products Association said it will conduct a multiyear campaign to educate parents and physicians on safe use of cold medicines. A spokeswoman for the group said it was too early to rule out a return of the products to the

"The manufacturers made this decision after a lot of consideration and with great care for the best interests of parents and children," said **CHPA** spokeswoman Virginia Cox. "But we can't speak to what the future holds.'

The trade group stressed that the "medicines are, and have always been, safe at recommended doses.'



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Ohio student gunman warned of attack

CLEVELAND (AP) — The brother of a high school student who shot and wounded four people before killing himself was led out of his home in handcuffs by police officers on Thursday, as family members looked on and called his name.

Officers placed Stephen Coon, 19, in the back of an unmarked car, then several officers went into the house. It was unclear why Coon was being taken into custody.

"Please have respect, I just lost my brother," Coon said as he was being escorted from the house.

Asa Coon, wearing a Marilyn Manson shirt, black jeans and black nail polish, opened fire with two revolvers on Wednesday, wounding two students and two teachers at SuccessTech would investigate. "We're Academy in downtown Cleveland. Coon, 14, had a history of mental problems and was known for cursing at teachers and bickering with students.

A classmate said Thursday that he and others had warned their principal about threats by Asa Coon and said the attack could have been prevented.

The student, Rasheem Smith, said on CBS' "Early Show" that despite their warnings, principal Johneita Durant told them she was too

"I told my friends in the class that he had a gun and stuff," said Smith, 15. "He was talking about doing it last week. I don't know why they didn't say nothing.

"We talked to the principal. She would try to get us all in the office, but it would always be too busy for it to happen," Smith said.

Responding on the show, schools CEO Eugene Sanders said the district going to review the entire today and tomorrow, make a determination of what has indeed occurred, and then see what the appropriate rec-

ommendations are, so we can move forward on Monday morning," he said.

A message left at Durant's office was not returned. A phone call to her home was not answered.

All classes in the city school district were canceled Thursday, and counseling was to be available for students.

Coon, who was suspended Monday for fighting with a classmate and was under suspension at the time of the shootings, had warned classmates of an attack, but none took him seriously.

"When he got suspended, he was like 'I got something for you all," said student Frances Henderson, who said she often got into arguments with Coon. "I guess this is what he had."

Coon, who was white, stood out in the predomisituation over the course of nantly black school for dressing in a goth style, wearing a black trench coat, black boots, a dog collar and chains, she said.

Henderson, who is black, said she didn't believe race played a role in the shoot-

"He's crazy. He threatened to blow up our school. He threatened to stab everybody," said Doneisha LeVert, 14. "We didn't think nothing of it."

On Thursday, a spokeswoman said Sanders will give the Mayor Frank Jackson a plan by Friday at noon to address whether additional security measures are needed at the school and how the school identifies potential problems among students.


Police Chief Michael McGrath said Thursday that the preliminary investigation found that Coon entered the school and went to a fourthfloor bathroom, where he changed clothes and took items out of a duffel bag, possibly the weapons, and put them on his body. There was an armed security guard at the school's entrance, McGrath said, though it was not known how Coon got inside.



Virginia and I together can help make up the bride of Christ, and now being in my mid-90s I am looking forward to my next wedding when Virginia and I can be in the company of the bride and Jesus will be our groom. Others have been taught likewise, and we take hold of that promise of faith.

# Panhandling with a purpose

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — It was panhandling, it was performance art — and it was a political statement about the legacy of slavery and reparations for black people.

A dozen volunteers, black and white, took to the streets of Portland on Wednesday to take part in what its creator called the National Day of Panhandling for Reparations.

They asked white passers-by to pay reparations for enslaving black people, and then they gave money to black passers-by.

"Artists take the lead on social issues," the organizer, a Portland-based performance artist named damali ayo, told The Oregonian. "This is the way I'm taking the lead on a social issue. Taking it to the streets. Also to get the job done — getting those

reparations paid out."

As volunteer Frances Miller asked passers-by for money, they reacted with confusion, amusement or annoyance. Some, like delivery man Jeremy Butyrin, gave money.

"America's history hasn't been so kind to a lot of people," said Butyrin, who gave \$10. "You can't always count on the government to take care of it. Sometimes you have to do it yourself."

"I'm Slavic. I kind of understand," he added. "My dad had to escape oppression to come over here."

Moments later, Porter Miller, 58, walked by on his way to a bus stop. He didn't understand why a stranger was offering him money.

# Rockies beat Webb, Diamondbacks 5-1 in NLCS opener; game delayed by rowdy fans

PHOENIX (AP) — In Troy Tulowitzki's view, Justin Upton was out of line not once but twice.

First, Upton stared down Jeff Francis, the winner in Colorado's 5-1 victory over Arizona in the opener of the NL championship series Thursday night, after getting plunked by a changeup in the seventh inning.

Then, he rolled his right shoulder into second baseman Kaz Matsui while trying to break up a double play, which resulted in an interference call that ignited an eight-minute delay when rowdy fans threw bottles onto the field.

Tulowitzki's anger at Upton wasn't for taking out Matsui. "I always respect guys that go into second hard," the Rockies rookie shortstop said after Colorado's 18th win in 19 games. "Whether or not it was the right call, I'm not sure. But I didn't really have a problem with that."

Tulowitzki did take exception, however, to Upton staring down Francis, who outpitched Arizona ace Brandon Webb and allowed just one earned run on seven hits in 6 2-3 innings.

"There's a man on first, no one's out. It was a change-up.

The last thing Jeff's trying to do is hit a guy," Tulowitzki

said. "I just thought he stared him down a little bit too long."

Down 5-1, Arizona put runners at runners at first and second with no outs in the seventh. Augie Ojeda bounced to third baseman Garrett Atkins, who threw to second baseman

Upton, running from first base, slid over second base and then rolled his right shoulder into Matsui's left leg, knocking the infielder to the ground. Second base umpire Larry Vanover immediately called Upton out for interference, resulting in a double play.

"I was just playing the game. I did what I was supposed to do," Upton said. "That's what you're taught to do when you slide is pop up."

Vanover wasn't buying that explanation.

"You had obvious intent on the part of the runner to break up the double play, and when it turns into intentional, that's when he's out for interference," he said.

# One of 11 unbeaten major college teams, Kansas to host Baylor

LAWRENCE, Kan. (AP)

— After waiting 11 years to climb back into the Top 25, Kansas sure doesn't want to let its No. 20 ranking slip away after just one week.

"We just arrived there," coach Mark Mangino said with a big grin. "We just broke the Top 25."

Besides, the Jayhawks (5-0, 1-0) are also eager to show off their new and improved pass defense to the same Baylor team that torched them for 394 yards through the air a year ago.

Erasing an 18-point deficit in the fourth quarter for a 36-35 victory, the Bears shocked Kansas with the third-biggest comeback in Baylor history. The setback probably kept the Jayhawks from going to a second consecutive bowl game and no doubt went a long way toward making Kansas' pass defense the worst in the nation.

So far this year, the Jayhawks, one of 11 unbeaten teams in the Football Bowl Subdivision (formerly I-A), have one of the country's best pass defenses, allowing a shade more than 160 yards a game. In a 30-24 victory at then-No. 24 Kansas State last week that finally ended their 11-year

absence from the national spotlight, the Jayhawks made two key second-half interceptions of Josh Freeman.

Might the smell of revenge be in the air when they kick off against Baylor at 11:30 a.m. CST?

"Obviously, all the guys that played in that game last year want to avenge that (loss) and have a better showing this year," said quarterback Todd Reesing. "We are not going to talk about revenge. We are just going to talk about how it is the next game."

The Bears (3-3, 0-2 Big 12) are coming off a 43-23 loss at home to Colorado. Both teams love throwing the ball, and Saturday's game will showcase two quarterbacks who have been busily erasing their school's sophomore passing records.

Reesing has thrown for 1,670 yards and twice set the Kansas record for most yards passing in a game by a sophomore. Baylor's Blake Szymanski established his school's record for touchdown passes by a sophomore in the season's third game.

With 15 touchdown passes this year, Szymanski needs five to pass Shawn Bell's single-season team record.

# SMU, Southern Miss looking to rebound from disappointing losses

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — When Southern Miss quarterback Stephen Reaves threw four interceptions and fumbled the ball twice in an upset loss to Rice on Oct. 3, John Reaves knew just how to approach his son.

The elder Reaves, a former Florida All-American and NFL quarterback, set the NCAA record for interceptions in a game with nine in 1969.

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"A couple days later he called me and said, 'Man, I thought you were going to break my record," Stephen Reaves said. "I could laugh after a couple of days.'

Reaves and the Golden Eagles (2-3 overall, 1-1 Conference USA) will try to put that 31-29 loss to Rice behind them Saturday when SMU (1-4, 0-1) comes to Hattiesburg for the teams' first meeting.

"I've definitely got to do a better job of protecting the ball," said Reaves, who was forced to play with a pulled oblique muscle after starter Martevious Young broke his leg. "Coaches have told me that and told the offense. We still had a good shot at winning last week regardless of the turnovers I com-

# Chivas USA, FC Dallas play to draw

Brad Guzan made five saves for his MLS-leading 12th shutout of the season to help Chivas USA tie FC Dallas 0-0 on Thursday

Chivas (15-6-7) extended its unbeaten streak to 11 games (7-0-4) and moved four points ahead of Houston for the Western Conference lead with two games left for each club. Guzan has the second-highest shutout total in MLS history, trailing Tony Meola's league-record 16 with Kansas City in 2000.

With the tie, FC Dallas (13-11-5) has just one victory in its last six (1-3-2) and is now locked into the West's third seed, unable to catch Houston for second and comfortably ahead of Colorado in fourth. Backup goalkeeper Ray Burse, a 23-year-old rookie, earned his second career shutout in

FRISCO, Texas (AP) - just his fifth MLS start by turning aside one shot.

With each club having already clinched berths in the upcoming MLS Cup playoffs, neither displayed much urgency to snap the tie, although Dallas' Arturo Alvarez had perhaps the match's best scoring chance in the first minute of injury time, drilling a shot from the corner of the penalty box past Guzan and off the near-side post.

# Franchione might have violated contract by not reporting income

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Texas A&M coach Dennis Franchione appears to have violated the terms of his contract by failing to report outside income generated by his secretive, for-pay newsletter and personal Web site.

Embarrassed school officials said Thursday that income from CoachFran.com and the newsletter, which was e-mailed to boosters for \$1,200 a year, brought in about \$80,000 to Franchione between 2005 and 2007. The school said Franchione's net profit was \$37,806.32.

The NCAA requires coaches to file annual reports with their schools detailing "athletically related income and benefits from sources outside the institution." A copy of Franchione's contract, obtained by The Associated Press, includes that stipulation and specifically mentions income from Web

The AP also obtained copies of Franchione's annual outside income reports, and none include

income from Web sites.

The school said Franchione didn't think he had to report the income until he received the proceeds that exceeded expenses incurred maintaining the Web site.

Despite the clear language of the contract, school officials said they were asking their attorneys whether Franchione violated his \$2 millionper-year deal by failing to report the outside income. Athletic director Bill Byrne said he would report the results of an internal investigation to the NCAA.

Byrne also said that the entire episode will be a factor in deciding whether Franchione, under contract through 2012, will return next sea-

"I'm assuring you, it will be part of his personnel review," Byrne said. "At the end of the year, we always go over what happened in the previous year. We evaluate any actions that occurred to the football team, we look at items like recruiting, wins and losses, NCAA violations, Big 12 violations."

The NCAA doesn't comment on specific cases or even confirm ongoing investigations. NCAA spokeswoman Stacey Osburn did say income from personal Web sites would be considered "athletically related" and must be reported

David Batson, A&M's compliance officer, said he didn't expect the NCAA to penalize the program with sanctions, though he wouldn't rule it out.

"I think the actions taken by the institution will suffice," Batson said. "But ultimately, that's a decision by the NCAA.

Violation of NCAA rule 11.2.2 alone has never resulted in a major infractions case. Several schools including Wisconsin in 1999, Southwestern Louisiana in 1995 and Virginia in 1993 - were punished for their coaches failing to report athletically related income in combination with numerous other infractions, according to the NCAA.

Byrne had already ordered

Franchione to end the newsletter and on Thursday announced that Franchione must also shut down his Web site. Franchione also will receive a "letter of admonishment."

"The Aggies are embarrassed right now," Byrne said. "This has been a very unfortunate incident we do not want to experience again."

The school pointed out three areas where possible violations occurred:

-Franchione did not report income generated through his Web site or from the newsletter, called the VIP Connection. The school said Franchione thought he did not have to report the income until he received the proceeds that exceeded expenses incurred maintaining the Web site.

-The VIP Connection occasionally contained information about prospective student-athletes The NCAA prohibits a school from commenting publicly on recruits until they sign letters of intent.

—The school suggested that

Franchione violated Big 12 Conference standards of sportsmanship by criticizing officiating in some of the newsletters.

Batson said Franchione was unaware of newsletter recipients using the information for gam-

Byrne said he wasn't aware of the newsletters until a reporter asked about them. A&M hired a consulting firm to investigate about two weeks ago, after Franchione admitted he provided the information in the newsletter.

"My guess is there was an attempt to keep it from us," Byrne said. "I think the whole thing started as something well-intended, to keen a number of people who were good donors to the university forever informed about things that were going on. It just got out of control.

Franchione apologized to his team, the school and fans in a statement released after Byrne met with reporters.

# Yao scores 21 to lead Rockets over Panathinaikos

HOUSTON (AP) - Yao Ming scored 21 points and had eight rebounds to help the Houston Rockets Euroleague champion Panathinaikos of Greece 107-70 in an exhibition game Thursday night.

The Rockets played without star forward Tracy McGrady, who had a sore left knee. Club officials said he bumped it slightly in practice Wednesday and they decided at game time to hold him out. He's day to day.

Rookie Luis Scola scored 17 points while Rafer Alston added 14. Steve Francis, who returned to the team in a draft-day trade from the Knicks, played 21 minutes off the bench and scored 11

Panathinaikos, which has won four Euroleague titles the past eight years, was led by Sani Becirovic and Michael Batiste, one of two Americans on the team (along with Kennedy Winston). They each scored 14 points. Batiste, the former Arizona State player who spent the 2002-03 season with the Memphis Grizzlies, also had a team-high nine rebounds.

Kostas Tsartsaris added 10 points for Panathinaikos. Guard Dimitris Diamantidis, MVP of the Euroleague's Final Four, went 1-for-8 from the field and failed to score until there was 1:37 left in the game when he hit a 3-point-

Panathinaikos coach Obradovic got his second technical with 7:53 to play and was ejected from the game with Houston leading 90-55.

From the start, it was evident the Greek team, whose tallest player was the 6-foot-10 Tsartsaris, had no answer for the 7-6 Yao. Yao's presence in the first quarter kept the Greeks from going inside and they hit only 7 of 18 shots for 38.9 percent.

The Rockets hit 52.6 percent — 10 of 19 — of their first-quarter shots and led 33-17 after one.

Houston stretched the lead to 22 in the second quarter on its way to a 59-37 lead at the half. Yao played 19 minutes in the first half and had 14 points and Zelimir four rebounds.

PALM DESERT, Calif. (AP) — Angela Park didn't particularly want to recall the two earlier times she played a round with Michelle Wie.

"Let's not talk about that," Park said. "I played with her in the Public Links and U.S. Amateur."

Wie beat her in both those 2004 amateur tournaments, but times do change. After Thursday's first round of the Samsung World Championship, Park's 67 was good for a share of the lead with Paula Creamer, and Wie's 79 was three shots worse than any other player in the 20-player field.

The 19-year-old Park, who already has clinched this year's LPGA Rookie of the Year award, said she was nervous being paired with Wie, who still draws large galleries despite her struggles on the course this year.

Asked whether the crowd or playing with Wie made her the most nervous, Park said, "I think a little bit of both. I was shaking out there. I don't know why. I was like, 'Calm down,

calm down." The shakes didn't creep into her game; Park birdied the first three free round.

"It was because of her (Wie) that I played a little bit better than I expected because I just tried to focus on my own game," Park said. "I knew she had her own things going on.

"I wasn't looking at her swing. I wasn't really focusing on what she was doing. I just kept focused on myself."

That wasn't the case in the two earlier meetings as amateurs.

"That was totally different," Park said. "Then I so totally followed her game, watched what she was doing."

Park, who was born in Brazil and moved with her parents to the Los Angeles area when she was 8, said she was excited just to be in the tour-

"Obviously being one of the top 20, elite members of women's golf, is a very priceless experience," she said. "And especially to be the only rookie out here gives me great pride and gives me a lot of confidence."

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
