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## Indictment returned in death of 6-week-old baby

An indictment for capital murder in connection with the death of a 6-week-old Pampa girl was among 23 handed up by a Gray County grand jury Thursday in 31st District Court in the county courthouse.

Mary Lou Bolin, 27, of 1800 N. Wells was indicted for capital murder in the death of her daughter, Kenzee Renae Bolin. Bond on the charge was set by 31st District Judge Steven Emmert at \$100,000.

The infant, who was born April 10, was pronounced dead May 21 at Pampa Regional Medical Center about an hour after she was brought in by emergency services personnel,

according to Pampa Police Department records.

Preliminary autopsy results from a Lubbock medical examiner indicate that the cause of the baby's death was blunt force trauma to the head, according to 31st District Attorney Lynn Switzer. A complete autopsy report has not yet been received in Pampa.

A member of the infant's family called 911 at 1:15 a.m. May 21 to report a baby having breathing problems at a Pampa residence, according to police records. Guardian EMS Ambulance and Pampa Fire Department responded to the call, and the child was transported by ambulance to PRMC, where emer-

gency personnel attempted to revive her for about an hour before she was deemed dead, according to PPD Assistant Chief Dennis Burton.

Cynthia Rachele Young, 36, of Pampa was indicted Thursday for first-degree murder and aggravated assault causing serious bodily injury. Bond on the first-degree murder charge was set at \$40,000, and bond on the aggravated assault charge, a second-degree felony, was set at \$20,000, for total bond of \$60,000.

The indictments for Young stem from an incident which occurred the evening of June 6 when a Pampa man died following a motorcycle accident.

Terry Lee Boaz, 41, died at Pampa

Regional Medical Center after losing control of his 1997 Harley-Davidson motorcycle in the 800 block of North Wells. Preliminary autopsy results showed Boaz died of injuries to his upper torso as a result of the accident.

Tine Sue Hoskins, 37, of Pampa was a passenger on Boaz' motorcycle at the time of the incident. She was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo as a result of the accident and was admitted in critical condition.

Young was driving a 2003 Ford pickup and was following Boaz' motorcycle when the accident

## Mobeetie Hoedown scheduled Saturday

Mobeeties' Ole Town Hoedown, involving 1870's era drills, ceremonies and re-enactments, will take place Saturday at Mobeetie, which is off of Highway 152 east of Pampa.

## School board adopts new dress code for students

A new dress code and the budget and salary schedules for 2007-2008 were among many items discussed and approved at a regular meeting held Thursday evening by the Pampa Independent School board.

After months of public and committee meetings, numerous board meetings and discussions, the new dress code for Pampa ISD was finally approved Thursday. It will be posted on the Web site www.pampaisd.net next week for anyone

wanting to print a copy.

See Sunday's Pampa News for the complete dress code.

"We took the recommendations that the board made at the last meeting to teachers and administrators for their review and input," Superintendent Barry Haenisch said. "The main thing that we heard from the elementary level is that most children in first through third grade do not choose their own clothing and they have not seen the problems at this age that are apparent in later grades. So, the recommendation was

to make this dress code applicable only to grades 4-12 and to define the standards expected for grades PK-3 in each campus handbook."

A public hearing was held in regard to the proposed 2007-2008 budget, which was voted on and approved by board members after a presentation by Carol Fields, executive director of business services.

The fund balance for general operating should be \$250,000, for food service should be minus \$364,647 and for debt service should be \$464,467, making the total fund bal-

ance \$349,820. The total tax rate should be \$1.32505, which includes general operating taxes of \$1.04005 and debt service of .285 cents.

The pay scale for 2007-2008 was also approved by board members. This scale includes an average increase of 2.029 percent over last year. A beginning teacher in Pampa will make \$33,500 annually, which is \$6,180 more than the statutory minimum. A teacher with 10 years of experience will make \$38,584, which is \$1,544 more than the mini-

## County to discuss planes, autos at Monday meeting

Trains may be missing from the agenda, but planes and automobiles will be among the topics considered by Gray County commissioners at their 9 a.m. meeting Monday in the

second-floor courtroom at Gray County Courthouse, 205 N. Russell.

A resolution in support of an upgrade at Perry LeFors Airport will be presented for approval. Commissioners had previously approved a plan to use

federal and state grant monies to extend an apron area for new hangars at the airport.

"Now we have to formalize our support with a resolution," said County Judge Richard Peet.

The monies are available as

matching-funds grants, with 90 percent of the project to be covered by the grants and the remaining 10 percent to be paid by the county.

The planned expansion at the

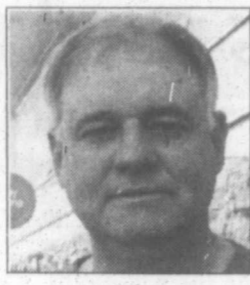

mum required.

Doug Locke, a representative of the Gray County Appraisal District Board, was present to report how he has been voting and representing the best interests of the school district in regard to actions taken by GCAD. He has suggested to GCAD that improving public communication and having a zero error policy should be implemented.

First readings were heard of TASB policy update 80, employment requirements and restrictions (local policy DBF) and curriculum development (local policy EG).

Assistant Superintendent

Evan Smith presented a curriculum management plan, detailing how the district is working on vertically aligning the curriculum so every student receives the same instruction and no one falls through the cracks.

"We want to teach precisely what is intended to be taught, provide teaching that is specific and measure specifically what is taught by using multiple assessments," Smith said. "We are working to set up benchmarks, which are specific dates, that teachers must use to see if they are teaching the correct information in the correct timeline so all of the classes and campuses will be comparable."

A discussion took place for the 2007-2008 district goals. A rough draft that was

presented included improving TAKS scores, decreasing discipline referrals, encouraging more parental involvement and increasing student and teacher attendance. Each board member will write specific goals and bring those back to the next board meeting.

County Clerk Susan Winborne gave information to board members regarding participation with other entities in funding the position of joint elections administrator.

"If you decide to participate, the school district's cost for the position would be around 20 percent, which might end up being about \$10,000 per year," Winborne said. "This person would take care of all the tasks in regard to prepar-

ing and holding the election."

Fields reported to the board that in years where an election is not held, they normally do not spend more than \$1,000. She estimates that for the bond election, the district spent \$7,622 not including attorney's fees. Many of the board members thought that contributing to this joint elections administrator might not be in the best interest of the school district. This subject was tabled until a later meeting.

Board members decided to table a bid for asbestos abatement in the PHS fine arts building until further information can be collected. They voted to designate \$1 million of the fund balance for construction so it can be used accordingly.

Pampa airport is projected to cost about \$400,000, Peet said, and the county's share of that total will be \$40,000.

Bids will be opened for a 1986 Chevrolet pickup which was put up for sale by Precinct 3. Two vehicles from the county sheriff's office will be submitted to commissioners to be declared surplus property.

Commissioners will consider hiring an elections administrator and will choose election judges and their alternates for 2007-2008 elections.

Young was taken to PRMC in connection with the accident and was treated for non-life-threatening injuries.

Three indictments for aggravated sexual assault of a child were handed up against Paulin Soto Soria of Pampa. Bond on each of the first-degree felony charges was set at \$50,000.

On or about Dec. 31, 2003, Soria allegedly committed aggravated sexual

assault of a child under age 14. The victim is a relative of Soria's, Switzer said, and three separate incidents occurred.

Dusty Cook of Pampa was indicted for aggravated sexual assault and burglary of a habitation. The two charges occurred as separate incidents, Switzer said.

Bond on the assault charge, a first-degree felony, was set at \$50,000. Bond on the burglary charge, a second-degree felony, was set

at \$15,000.

On March 17, Cook allegedly sexually assaulted a woman over age 15 at a Pampa residence. The victim was not a relative but was known to Cook, Switzer said. The incident included physical violence.

Cook allegedly burglarized a Pampa home on Nov. 20, 2006. Items taken from the home included electronic equipment.

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
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

In 1946, authorities in the British Mandate of Palestine arrested more than 2,700 Jews in an attempt to stamp out extremists.

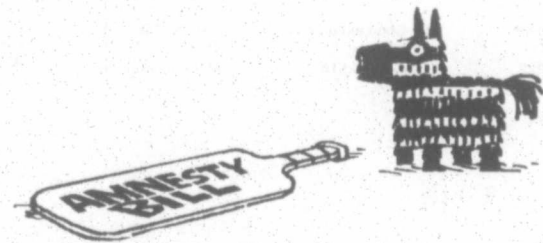
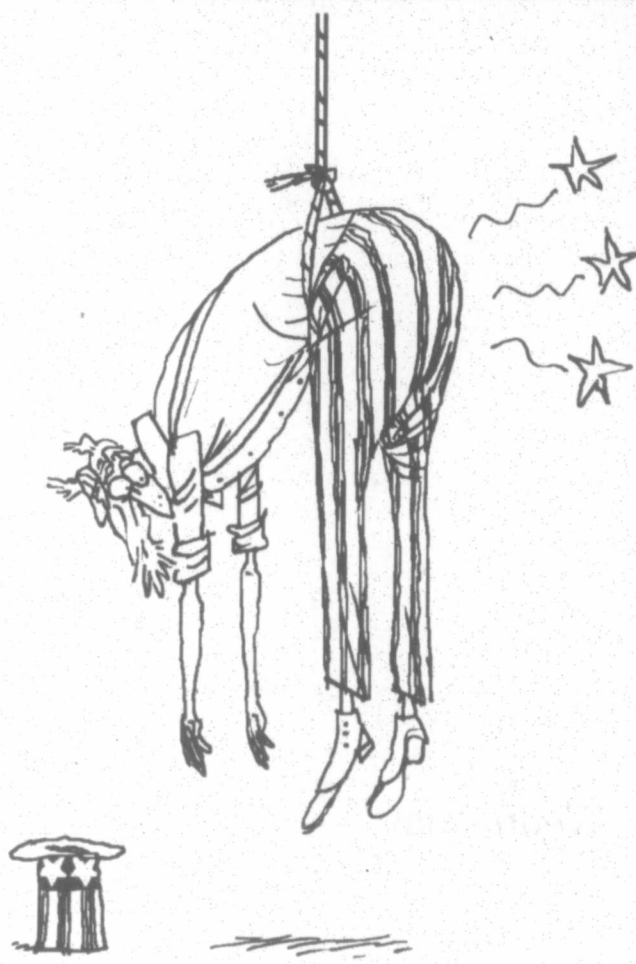
In 1954, the Atomic Energy Commission voted against reinstating Dr. J. Robert Oppenheimer's access to classified information.

## Hample book shows baseball in new light

Are you a professional fan, a beginner, a semi-expert or a deeply serious geek when it comes to baseball?

If you are any of the above, Zack Hample, himself a serious baseball geek and professional fan, has written a delightful summer book, "Watching Baseball Smarter," published by Vintage Press.

I read this wonderfully cheerful book in one sitting and was immediately overcome with a compulsion to find a baseball game on television to watch. I did, and it was far more interesting for having read the book, even though baseball was always my favorite game during school days.

Hample does not load you down with statistics or arguments about who was better than whom. His knowledge of the game in all its aspects,

on the field and off, is frankly astounding, and he covers every aspect of the game in a breezy, lighthearted manner.

One of the things I've always enjoyed about baseball is that it's not on the clock. In both basketball and football, the clock will eventually run out, and if your team is way behind in the waning minutes of the game, you know it's impossible to catch up. Not so in baseball. Your team can be way behind, with two out in the ninth inning, and stage a rally to win the game. In baseball, it's never over until the last out.

What amazes me about this book is that I can't think of a single question he does-

n't answer. He starts with the rules, then takes the positions one by one, all along attacking his subject with high good humor and no apologies. He covers salaries, contracts, steroids and controversies with a gentle, humorous style that is neither self-righteous nor argumentative.

He tells you how to score a game, how to read a box score, how to compute batting averages. And he knows his history. Did you know that in 1910, President William Howard Taft began the tradition of the seventh-inning stretch as well as the tradition of a president tossing out the first ball?

Taft didn't intend to start a tradition, but the wooden

seat got to be hard on his 300-pound frame, so in the seventh inning he stood up. Fans, expecting the president to leave the stadium, also stood up. Then Taft sat back down and so did the fans, but the tradition of standing up and moving about was instantly born.

It's these little bits of history Hample drops in that make the book such an entertaining read. He quotes Red Barber, a famous sports announcer, as saying, "Baseball is dull only for people with dull minds." That's true, I think. There is a lot going on during a baseball game besides the obvious.

There is the duel between the pitcher and the batter, a duel in which the catcher and coaches play a role. There's the problem of the

## Texas Thoughts

The Odessa American on rubberized waste:

After a simple low-tech boat blew a hole in the USS Cole, at harbor in Yemen in 2000, killing 17 sailors and blowing a 40-foot hole in the Navy destroyer, Pentagon officials vowed to prevent such an attack in the future. The idea the Naval Criminal Investigative Service came up with was to manufacture floating rubberized rings, complete with underwater sensors to detect intrusion, that could be used to shield ships worldwide.

So the NCIS, along with the General

Services Administration, which awards and oversees federal contracts, began the process of procuring such items. But \$100 million and almost seven years later, only a few barriers have been delivered, those that have been are more expensive than necessary, and, as a 2004 GSA report noted, "Navy officials advised us that the barriers were prone to leaks, can deflate completely, and that defects caused barrier gates to remain open."

The GSA told a House subcommittee last week that its investigation of irregularities in the contracting process is ongoing and criminal charges are possible.

For whatever reason in this case, the sometimes time-consuming process of competitive bidding was bypassed and

the NCIS instructed the GSA to give the contract to a small technology firm Northern NEF in Colorado Springs, Colo., that had never worked on a boat-barrier project but had done some contracts for the Pentagon. The firm was small enough that under a special small-business program it could get federal contracts of less than \$3 million without undergoing competitive bidding.

Northern NEF was instructed to hire P-Con Consulting, run by a man who already worked as a security consultant to NCIS, to deal directly with the actual manufacturers. P-Con received \$3.6 million, though it's unclear what the firm actually did.

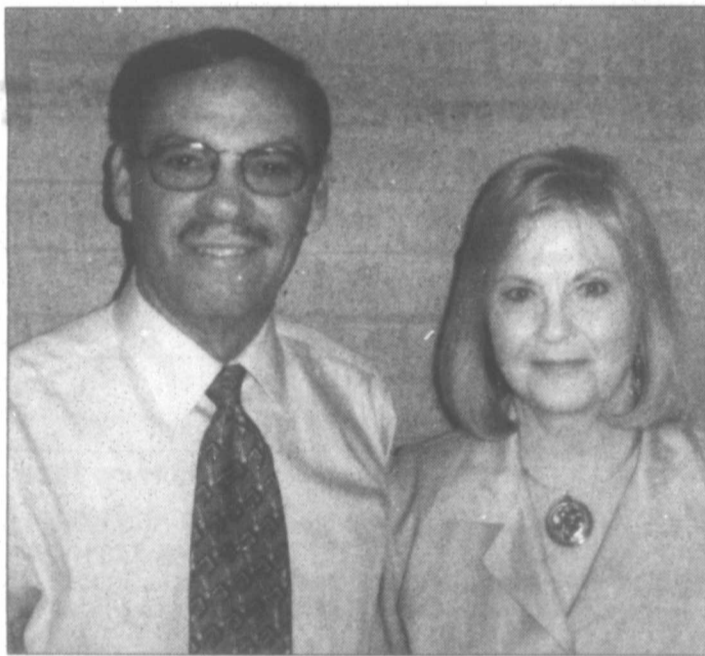

## A fake vs. the REAL thing ...

I can still remember that week back in 1997. August 31 will mark the 10th anniversary of the horrible death of the famous Princess Diana in Paris. The news has already been full of interviews, articles and specials concerning this world famous celebrity, and it is just June.

But what I remember most about that week has not been covered in any of the specials or written about in any of the articles or mentioned in any of the interviews by the reporters or by any of the guests. Just five days after that world famous wreck in Paris another death occurred in Calcutta, India. One Princess (Diana) died on a Sunday, the other Princess (Mother Teresa), died on the following Friday, the

same day her Lord was crucified.

I thought then, and I still firmly believe that God, in His providence, chose to take Mother Teresa home when He did to show the world what a REAL PRINCESS, His Princess, looks like.

In the world's eyes, Diana was young, beautiful, shapely, refined, elegant, famous and wealthy—all of the things that most humans spend their lives seeking to obtain. Mother Teresa was old, wrinkly, unrefined, plain and poor.

But in God's eyes Mother Teresa was His

faithful daughter and therefore beautiful, kind, compassionate and a servant to the neediest, just like His only begotten Son was.

Princess Diana was a woman who the Father loved and wanted to save, but who instead chose a life of immorality and materialism and fame.

This difference in what the eyes of the world see and what the eyes of God see shouldn't surprise us though. Remember I Samuel 16, when Samuel went to secretly anoint a new king? When he saw Jesse's oldest son, he thought for sure that it was

to be Eliab. He looked perfect for the role, but God said, "No!" The one God chose was David, the "runt of the family," but in the eyes of God, David was a treasure.

So as the summer progresses and you see article after article and program after program and interview after interview about the 10th anniversary of the death of Princess Diana, just remember: 1) In heaven, Mother Teresa rejoices in the presence of her Father; and 2) Sept. 5 is a much bigger deal to God than is Aug. 31. And when you remember that, please use it as a reminder of just how critical it is for you to get your life right with God BEFORE you die.

The words were written in 1876 by a New England pastor in honor of the one hundredth anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. The music was written twelve years later in celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the adoption of the United States Constitution. Daniel Crain Roberts, a Civil War veteran, originally set the words to the tune of the Russian national anthem. In 1888, George Warren, a premier organist, composed the music we now know with its familiar trumpet fanfares. It was called the National Hymn. When Warren died in 1902, not a single note of music was played at his funeral because there was a feeling that no organist could play as well as he could.

## Craig Biggio becomes 27th player to reach 3,000 hits

HOUSTON (AP) — Craig Biggio kissed his wife, hugged everyone in sight and dragged former teammate Jeff Bagwell out onto the field to soak in the celebration.

It was the perfect place for the Astros second baseman to get his 3,000th career hit.

"I couldn't have scripted it any better," Biggio said. "There are a lot of things that have happened over the past 20 years but tonight is the best."

Biggio reached the milestone number on Thursday night with a single to center field in the seventh inning and then passed Roberto

Clemente for 26th on the career list with the fourth of his season-high five hits.

He was thrown out trying to stretch the 3,000th hit into a double against the Rockies. He singled to right in the ninth and singled again in the 11th in Houston's 8-5 win.

Biggio is the first player to reach 3,000 hits since Rafael Palmeiro on July 15, 2005, with Baltimore.

The 41-year-old, who entered the season needing 70 hits to reach the milestone, has played his entire 20-year career with Houston, making him the longest tenured player in franchise

history.

"I'm relieved," he said. "Seventy is a big number. I can downplay it as much as I want but 70 hits is a lot of hits, especially at my age."

The sellout crowd stood and chanted 'Bi-ggi-o' at each bat and cameras twinkled with each pitch. Fans held signs that read 'Mr. 3,000' and 'Biggio's Hit Parade.' One woman wore an orange shirt that featured block letters that read 'Biggio' and '3,000.'

His 3,000th hit came one day shy of the 19th anniversary of his first career hit, a single off Orel Hershiser on June 29, 1988.

Fireworks went off, the counter in left-center field with red illuminated numbers ticked to 3,000 and a giant banner with his picture and 3,000 that spanned from the train track to the roof of the stadium was unveiled after the hit.

Everyone on the team, including those in the bullpen, stormed the field to congratulate Biggio. His wife Patty, sons Conor and Cavan, and daughter Quinn also joined in the celebration. His sons were in the dugout acting as bat boys.

He kissed his wife and held his 7-year-old daughter in the air.

"Houston has always been very special to him," Patty Biggio said. "He's always wanted to stay here, this was where he wanted to be and to have this happen here couldn't have been more perfect."

He went to the dugout and hugged everyone while the crowd continued to go wild. Biggio then pulled Bagwell out of the dugout and returned with him to the field, where they stood arm and arm. Biggio and Bagwell played together for 15 seasons before Bagwell retired in December.

Biggio's first hit of the night came on a single to center field in the third

inning.

The second hit, also a single, came on a grounder to third base in the fifth. Garrett Atkins badly overthrew first base on the play, leaving the official scorer to pause for several tense seconds before calling it a single and ruling an error allowed Biggio to advance to second.

Biggio is the only player in major league history to have at least 600 doubles (658), 250 home runs (286), 3,000 hits and 400 stolen bases (413).

He reflected on his career and the importance of reaching the milestone before Thursday's game.

## Sonics: Durant to Seattle; Allen on his way to Boston

SEATTLE (AP) — Kevin Durant is headed to Seattle, and Ray Allen is headed to Boston.

New Sonics' general manager Sam Presti pulled off a stunning set of moves during the early stages of Thursday night's NBA draft, sending Allen and the 35th overall pick in the second round to Boston for Wally Szczerbiak, Delonte West and the No. 5 pick. Boston selected Georgetown forward Jeff Green for Seattle

with the fifth pick. Seattle will also receive a future second-round pick from the Celtics.

It was a shocking move, sending Seattle's most popular player, leading scorer and seven-time All-Star back to the Northeast where he was a college star at Connecticut.

"We are thrilled to have Kevin. But at the same time, to make the decision to move a player — and a person — like Ray Allen was tremendously difficult," Presti said.

"Boston really pursued this. What started as a smaller conversation became fulfilled. Their pursuit was impeccable."

Seattle took another forward, Purdue's Carl Landry, with the first pick of the second round, but traded him to Houston for cash and a future second-round pick. The Sonics will also get a future second-round pick from Boston in the Allen trade.

The easy part for Presti on

Thursday was selecting Durant — the Texas star and The Associated Press college player of the year — with the No. 2 pick after Portland took Ohio State center Greg Oden first overall.

When the trade was announced on ESPN minutes before the Sonics chose Durant, almost everyone in the crowd of about 2,000 season-ticket holders and invitees at a draft party at Seattle Center booed, hissed and pointed their thumbs

down. Many were wearing gold Allen jerseys with his No. 34.

Those same fans cheered moments later as Durant's selection was announced and green and gold streamers flew.

"I want to personally compliment Ray Allen; Ray Allen the person and Ray Allen the outstanding, professional player," said team chairman Clay Bennett. "We appreciate the career of Ray Allen in this market. And we

wish him the very best." Allen was the face of the Sonics, and easily their most popular player. But for all of his offensive prowess, Allen was a defensive liability, and since arriving on June 7, Presti has preached defense.

Allen averaged a career-high 26.4 points last season, including a career-best 54 against Utah in January. But his season was shortened by injuries. He went to the bench for good in late March and played just 55 games.

## Trail Blazers go for Oden with No. 1 pick

NEW YORK (AP) — The Portland Trail Blazers got Greg Oden and felt like they won a championship.

The Seattle SuperSonics settled for Kevin Durant, thrilling fans disappointed by the trade of All-Star Ray Allen to Boston.

The Trail Blazers ended months of debate Thursday night when they chose Oden over fellow college freshman Durant with the No. 1 pick in a highly anticipated NBA draft.

Portland opted for the 7-footer who can dominate a game with his defense over the sensational scoring of Durant, who would have been the No. 1 pick in many other years after one of the most outstanding freshman seasons in NCAA history.

But franchise centers are hard to find, and most believe the Blazers got one.

"I was on the phone with the radio station back in Portland," Oden said. "They said they stomped the floor like they won the NBA championship once they

called my name."

Fans rushed the court at the Rose Garden, where a perennial playoff team has fallen on hard times after some worse behavior. But the Blazers got Rookie of the Year Brandon Roy last year and got an early start on having next season's winner when they grabbed Oden to play alongside LaMarcus Aldridge.

"They did have a bad (reputation), but I think Brandon and LaMarcus kind of turned that around," Oden said. "I hope that I can come and just push that along some more."

Even with Durant, feelings weren't quite the same in Seattle.

Moments after he was picked, Durant saw on TV that the SuperSonics had traded Allen, their leading scorer, to Boston. Fans booed the Allen trade at a draft party for the Sonics, who still face losing Rashard Lewis to free agency.

The 6-9 Durant, wearing an orange tie to match Texas colors, doesn't consider him-

self the Sonics' savior.

"Not at all, not at all," Durant said. "When you play since you were 8 or 9 years old, you know the game is not a one-man sport. I'm far from being a savior."

Portland also made a deal, clearing room in the middle for Oden by trading Zach Randolph to New York. The Blazers also sent Fred Jones and Dan Dickau to the Knicks for Steve Francis and Channing Frye.

The only other trade involving an NBA player came when Golden State sent Jason Richardson and the rights to Jermareo Davidson, the No. 36 pick, to Charlotte for Brandon Wright, taken at No. 8 by the Bobcats.

The rest of the trades, most in the second round, involved picks or cash.

Looking nervous and battling a head cold since arriving in New York, Oden shared a long handshake with commissioner David Stern before heading off for interviews. He was expected

to fly to Portland later Thursday night.

The Pacific Northwest rivals got an immediate jump-start to their rebuilding plans by moving up in last month's lottery to grab the top two picks. Though this is considered the deepest draft in years, Oden and Durant were regarded as the only can't-miss players.

Oden led Ohio State to the national championship game, despite never playing at full strength after surgery on his right wrist. Still, he averaged 15.7 points and shot nearly 62 percent while drawing comparisons to Bill Russell for his rebounding and shot blocking abilities.

Joining Durant to help the Sonics rebuild is Georgetown's Jeff Green, picked by Boston with the No. 5 pick. Durant knows Green from growing up in the Washington, D.C. area.

"I know Jeff pretty well, on a D.C. Blue Devils team we gained a friendship from there," Durant said. "He's a

## Mavericks select Nevada's Fazekas with their top pick

DALLAS (AP) — Despite failing to trade into the first round of Thursday night's NBA draft, the Dallas Mavericks got the player they wanted in the second round.

The Mavericks added some front court depth by selecting Nevada forward Nick Fazekas with their first selection of the NBA Draft.

Dallas did not have a first-round selection, but team president and general manager Donnie Nelson said it tried to trade up into the first round with the intent of drafting Fazekas. While those attempts to make a deal fell short, the Mavericks were pleasantly surprised that Fazekas was available with the 34th pick.

"We had a couple of things we were looking at," Nelson said. "Ultimately we didn't have to do it because our guy fell to us. We got the guy we were looking for."

Fazekas was a second-team All-American this past season as he averaged 20.4 points and 11.1 rebounds per game in helping the Wolf Pack to a 29-5 record.

The 6-foot-11 power forward went as the fifth pick of the second round.

"Fazekas is someone we've had our eyes on for quite some time now," Dallas head coach Avery Johnson said. "He had a tremendous career at Nevada. We needed to get some size and some big guys that have some ability to score inside and outside."

The Mavericks traded the 60th overall pick to Orlando for the rights for North Carolina guard Reyshawn Terry — who was the 44th selection.

Dallas also selected Lithuanian guard Renaldas Seibutis with the 50th overall selection.

great player, and I can't wait to play with him."

The Atlanta Hawks used the No. 3 pick, their first of two in the lottery on Al Horford, who saluted the pro-Florida crowd with the Gator chomp. The two-time defending NCAA champions became the first school with three players selected in the top 10 of the same draft.

They made it when Corey Brewer went to Minnesota at No. 7 and Joakim Noah — donning a bow tie and getting a huge reaction from his hometown crowd — was taken by Chicago two picks later.

"This is an unbelievable experience" Horford said. "Winning two national championships. Moving up to the next level is unreal."

Two more Gators went in the second round: Chris Richard at No. 41 to Minnesota and Taurean Green by Portland at No. 52. The five players equaled the second-most for one school in a draft. UNLV had six in 1977 — though that came in four rounds.

The Hawks passed on Michael Conley Jr., even though they still need a point guard after passing on Chris Paul and Deron Williams two years ago. The Memphis Grizzlies then grabbed Conley, Oden's teammate since their junior high days and the third freshman in the top four picks.

Atlanta finally grabbed that point guard by taking Acie Law at No. 11 — the first college senior taken.

"Freshmen are very, very talented," Law said. "I think in the draft, it's all about position and what a

team needs, and you see some great, great players in this draft. I'm happy with the team that I went to and just happy to get to Atlanta and help turn that franchise around."

The Milwaukee Bucks took a chance at No. 6 on the draft's mystery player, Chinese forward Yi Jianlian. Though Yi was getting plenty of attention — half of the record 60 international media members were from China — he came with plenty of question marks. He hasn't played against top competition in the Chinese leagues, and he is rumored to be older than the 19 he is listed.

Milwaukee also ignored concerns that Yi only wanted to play in a major market with a large Asian population. He didn't even work out for the Bucks.

"It's a surprise to me as well, because when I was in China, Milwaukee didn't come to watch me play or work out," Yi said through a translator. "Myself, I'm not really familiar with the city. But I'm happy with the team, and I'm happy to play in the NBA."

Charlotte took North Carolina's Wright at No. 8, and Washington center Spencer Hawes was picked by Sacramento, the fourth and fifth freshmen in the top 10.

The Bobcats later sent Wright's draft rights to Golden State for guard Richardson and the rights to Davidson, taken by the Warriors at No. 36.

Ohio State's Daequan Cook went to Philadelphia at No. 21, giving both national championship-game teams three players in the first round. His rights later were sent to Miami for the rights to Jason Smith of Colorado State, taken by the Heat with the 20th pick.

## Rockets draft Oregon's Brooks; pick up Landry in trade

HOUSTON (AP) — The Houston Rockets drafted what they saw as the best available player in the first round on Thursday night, even though they're already stocked at the position.

The Rockets drafted Oregon point guard Aaron Brooks with the 26th pick, a surprising move two weeks after the team acquired point guard Mike James.

General manager Daryl Morey said Brooks was sim-

ply too good to pass up. "He brings a speed and a quickness and an ability to get to the (free-throw) line," Morey said. "Guys who can shoot and then also have the quickness of him are really unguardable in the league right now."

Later, the Rockets acquired Purdue forward Carl Landry by trading a future second-round pick and cash to Seattle for the 31st pick. Houston took

Australian Brad Newley — another guard — with the 54th overall pick, acquired from Orlando for cash earlier in the day.

The 6-foot, 160-pound Brooks was the Pac-10's leading scorer last season and finished his career as the Ducks' ninth all-time scorer (1,511 points). He ranks fourth in school history in assists (471), sixth in steals (127) and shot 83 percent from the free-throw line in

his career. The Rockets acquired James two weeks ago. For now, they also still have Rafer Alston, the starting point guard the last two seasons, and reserves Luther Head and John Lucas III, who also saw time at the position last season.

Morey said Brooks brings "a different skill set than what we have." He added that the Rockets are ready to make more moves.

## Firm eyes two Texas sites for nuclear plant

HOUSTON — Exelon Nuclear has identified two possible southeast Texas locations for a nuclear project as the company prepares a federal application to build and operate a new plant.

Officials said the Illinois-based company hasn't committed to building a plant, but it expects to submit an application for the project to the federal Nuclear Regulatory Commission in November 2008.

The primary prospective site is about 10 miles south of Collegeport in Matagorda County. A secondary site is about 20 miles south of Victoria in Victoria County.

Spokesman Craig Nesbit said Exelon will work through an 18-month process with the commission before the application is submitted. After that, regulators would take three to four years to evaluate the application.

The company expects to spend \$23 million on the application process.

Matagorda County Judge Nate McDonald said the project would be welcome. The county is already home to the South Texas Project, a nuclear power plant near Bay City operated by a consortium of energy companies.

"We have nuclear electrical generation in the county

now," McDonald said. "They have been a good partner for us, and this is another one of those. They are good, clean industries, they are well-financed, they bring excellent employment opportunities and a large tax base."

The state's other existing nuclear power plant is Comanche Peak, about 80 miles southwest of Dallas.

Operators of the state's power grid said 14 percent of Texas' power came from nuclear units in 2006.

Tom O'Neill, Exelon's vice president of new plant development, said the U.S. Department of Energy projects that Texas will need 48 percent more generating capacity by 2030.

"Nuclear energy is safe and clean and has a low operating cost," O'Neill said in a prepared statement. "That's why we believe nuclear energy is a key part of Texas' future energy mix, because of its inherent environmental and energy independence benefits."

Most environmentalists are opposed to nuclear energy, pointing to risks such as breakdowns, leaks, the long-term disposal of nuclear waste and concern that terrorists could target the plants.

## Farmers, others seek to get remnants of immigration bill passed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hours after a massive immigration bill collapsed in the Senate, lawmakers and lobbyists began seeking ways to pass bits and pieces of the measure important to their constituents.

A priority for many farm groups is the "Ag jobs" component, one of several programs now needing a new legislative vehicle. It would legalize about 1 million undocumented agricultural workers in the United States, a key goal of growers whose

crops can rot in the fields if not harvested at key times by people willing to work hard at low wages.

The program is considered relatively popular, as is another piece of the stalled bill: the DREAM Act, or Development, Relief and Education for Alien Minors Act. It would create a path to legality for illegal immigrants planning to attend college or join the military and who came to the United States with their families before they turned 16.

Some lawmakers said they hope Congress will enact such programs as stand-alone bills fairly soon. Others, however, said it will be difficult to pass even non-controversial parts by themselves. Backers of items likely to be left out, they said, will resist losing the political leverage that a multifaceted package can provide.

In an interview earlier this week, Sen. Lindsey Graham, R-S.C. — a backer of the sidetracked immigration bill — said the one-at-a-time

approach may prove impossible, even for tougher border-enforcement measures that now seem popular.

"The only way we're going to get Ag jobs or DREAM Act" or pathways to legal status for the estimated 12 million illegal immigrants, Graham said,

"is to do it together. This idea of 'Just do the enforcement,' there are no votes for that."

Other Republicans, especially in the House, disagree. All immigration-related proposals should be postponed, they said, until the Mexican border is secured.

"The American people believe that until we're able to secure our borders and enforce our laws, taking additional steps is really not in the best interests of the country," House Minority Leader John Boehner, R-Ohio, said after Thursday's crucial Senate vote.

## 3 moose saunter around golf course
