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



# **Hope House benefits from** quilts made by church group

Women from Calvary Baptist Church have been making baby quilts for "Operation Snuggle," and have already finished and donated about 20 quilts to mothers at the church and also to residents of Hope House, a home for young mothers trying to get on their feet and become self sufficient.

Monica Galloway, director of the Pregnancy Support Center and house parent for Hope House, really appreciates the quilt donations and encouragement from the community.

"Each young woman who comes to Hope House has a different set of circumstances that bring them here," Galloway said. "We teach these women parenting skills, as well as how to cook and clean and basically just be the mothers who God intended them to

Latashia Wallace, 16, and her 3-monthold daughter QuanBraj, have been learning a lot of skills while living in the house.

"I love being around Monica because she's just like a mother," Wallace said. "She's so loving and caring and just a lot of fun to be around. I've learned a lot while living here, such as how to be a great mom and also how to budget money and take care of a house. I've also been going to church and like being around the other young people in the church and youth group.

Wallace said she moved out of her mom's home because her mother was having a hard enough time making a living and providing for herself, so she thought it would be better to live on her own and learn the skills needed to have a good life for her and her daughter. She will go back to high school in the fall, while her daughter goes to Bright Beginnings day care center, to finish up her education and get her diploma.

Jennifer Gray, 25, is expecting a baby in early September and also feels blessed to be livning at Hope House.



# Domestic spying lawsuit dismissed

CINCINNATI (AP) — A federal the separation of powers. appeals court ordered the dismissal today of a lawsuit challenging President Bush's domestic spying program, saying the plaintiffs had no standing to sue.

The 2-1 ruling by the 6th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals panel vacated a 2006 order by a federal judge in Detroit, who found that the post-Sept. 11 warrantless surveillance aimed at uncovering terrorist activity violated constitutional rights to privacy and free speech and

U.S. Circuit Judge Julia Smith Gibbons, one of the two Republican appointees who ruled against the plaintiffs, said they failed to show they were subject to the surveillance.

The dissenting judge, Democratic appointee Ronald Lee Gilman, believed the plaintiffs were within their rights to sue and that it was clear to him the program violated the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act of 1978.

Although the Bush administration

said in January the program is now overseen by a special federal intelligence court, opponents said that without a court order, the president could resume the spying outside judicial authority at any time. The Justice Department has said the case is moot.

The American Civil Liberties Union led the lawsuit on behalf of other groups including lawyers, journalists and scholars it says have been handicapped in doing their jobs by the government monitoring.

## Casino gunman wounds 3

LAS VEGAS (AP) — A man on a walkway over the New York-New York casino floor opened fire on the gamblers below early today, wounding three people before he was tackled by a group of off-duty police officers and military personnel, police said.

Police revised their initial report that four people were wounded in the 12:45 a.m. shooting, and they credited

"These are the real heroes. They saw him shooting and tackled him and held him," police Lt. Randy Sutton said. He said the bystanders included three off-duty outof-town police officers and two military personnel. He did not know their names.

"Amazingly, few people were hurt," Sutton said.

The gunman is believed to be in his early 50s and a Las Vegas resident who was not a hotel employee or guest, said Officer Ramon Denby. He said the man entered the casino from the walkway connecting the New York-New York to the MGM Grand and randomly fired several times at people on the casino floor below.



by a trust fund and is funded mostly by monthly donations from area churches. The community also helps by sending donations. The Pregnancy Support Center and Hope House also have two fundraisers each year, the Walk for Life and a banquet.

"We are a non-profit organization so we really depend on the community and churches for support," Galloway said.

Consumers who decide to buy credit insurance policies should be aware that the premium is added to the vehicle loan so they will have to pay interest on it. Review contracts carefully to avoid purchasing an unwanted insurance

Remember Texas law entitles credit insurance purchasers to unearned premium refunds if the purchaser cancels the policy or pays off the loan

global warming? You may soon. Recent studies suggest that rising carbon dioxide levels in the atmosphere are promoting leafier, more prolific, faster-growing - and itchier - poison ivy than ever before. And that could be killing off more trees in the forest, and causing more itches for more of us, than ever before. ...

Last year, a six-year experiment at Duke University that involved piping CO2 levels predicted for the middle of this century into a forest test bed yielded 149 percent faster-growing poison ivy. The leafy toxin grew four times faster than trees exposed to the higher carbon dioxide level - so fast that scientists think the woody vine could alter the composition of forests around the globe by choking off trees. Worst of all, this poison ivy of the future was suffused with far more potent urushiol, the oily substance that makes four out of five of us itch.

Two weeks ago the House of Representatives approved a bill that would establish a new task force of federal prosecutors and investigators to look into unsolved murders from the civil rights era. In addition, the bill includes \$2 million a year in grants for local law enforcement agencies to do the same work.

From time to time, law enforcement officials do crack old murder cases involving racists and their organizations. There is little doubt, however, that more resources devoted to the work would help the justice system catch up to even more of those responsible for such killings.

At least 100 cases will be reviewed under the new program, according to the government. That may mean justice for scores of people who were slaughtered simply because of the color of their skin - or because they enlisted in the fight against racism.

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

# Nadal wins again, reaches semifinals at Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Rafael Nadal was back to his best Friday, playing at Wimbledon for the fifth consecutive day and reaching the semifinals by beating Tomas Berdych 7-6 (1), 6-4, 6-2.

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Nadal, last year's runnerup, was broken once early in the first set, but never faced any serious challenges after that. He broke the Czech in the opening games of the second and third sets.

Nadal had his first match point on Berdych's serve at 5-1 in the third set, but the Czech erased it with an ace. Nadal wasted another in the next game, but won when Berdych sent a forehand into the net.

"I had to concentrate with the movement because the ball was very difficult to touch," Nadal said. "Today was very tough with the wind, but anyway I played very good."



John Maine set a career high with nine strikeouts in 7 2-3 innings and Ramon Castro hit a two-run double filling in for suspended Paul Lo Duca, as the Mets beat the Houston Astros 6-2 on Thursday night.

The Mets started the week by getting outscored 34-12 in a three-game sweep by the Rockies in Denver. They were a different team in the opener of this series, with Maine dominating and the Mets pounding Houston starter Jason Jennings with extra-base hits in each of the first three innings.

Jose Reyes tripled on Jennings' second pitch of the game and scored on Ricky Ledee's infield single that bounced off first base. Ledee later scored on Carlos Delgado's two-out single to make it 2-0.

"We really needed it," said Delgado, who went 4-for-4. "We needed a guy to stop the bleeding. He came out today and really set the tone. He was aggressive throwing strikes.'

"I'm here to pick him up," Castro said, "and I'm going to try to do my best.'

# **Supersonics hire** Carlesimo as coach

SEATTLE (AP) -During his first couple of years away from the bench, P.J. Carlesimo questioned if he'd get the opportunity to be a head coach again.

With the inquiries he received the last few years, Carlesimo knew it would just be a case of finding what he believed was the right situation. Seattle When the SuperSonics made their offer earlier this week with the chance to coach Kevin Durant looming — Carlesimo didn't hesitate.

"It changed so dramatically in years three, four and five that it seemed to me that it was probably going to happen again," Carlesimo said. "I wasn't obsessed with it that I had to be a head coach again. I was perfectly happy in San Antonio ... it was enjoyable, but I thought it might happen at some point."

Carlesimo was hired Thursday as SuperSonics' new coach, after spending the last five seasons as an assistant with San Antonio. It's his first head coaching job since the 1999 season, when he was fired by Golden State after the Warriors started 6-21.

Carlesimo replaces Bob Hill, who was fired on April 24 after Seattle went 31-51 in his only full season as coach.

## Olympic vote proves to be a boost for Russia, Putin

SOCHI, Russia (AP) — A single road snakes past shabby houses and dismal small farms, marking the way from Sochi's seashore into the mountains. Soon, this same route will be transformed, with a gleaming high-tech train line and smooth, swift new roads to carry travelers to the 2014 Winter Olympics.

Seven years is a short timetable for such an ambitious project, but the International Olympic Committee believes Russia can do it, as well as build the gleaming ice arenas, giant sporting venues and everything else needed for the

Vladimir Putin, too, is confident. After all, the Russian president's determined pitch for Sochi included a pledge: "No traffic jams, I promise."

For many Russians, the IOC vote awarding Sochi the games was proof of the country's resurgence. It also was a major victory for Putin, who threw his full weight behind the campaign, at a time of growing criticism of his government's democracy and human-rights record.

Putin, who frequently skis in Sochi, said being awarded the Olympics was a recognition of Russia's sports tradition and its growing economic and cultural clout in the world.

"This is support from one of the most authoritative and independent international organizations - the International Olympic Committee," he said in televised comments upon returning from Guatemala City, where the decision was announced.

Footage broadcast over and over showed exuberant Russian officials and athletes dancing and singing and celebrating in Guatemala and Sochi. Moscow hosted the 1980 Olympics, but Russia has never held the Winter Games.

But everyone is convinced that the Sochi games will be an unquestionable boon.

The project still must address protests by environmental watchdogs and local residents who say it will destroy the region's fragile ecosystem. And building the Olympic facilities essentially from scratch under the tight deadline won't be easy.



FBI spokeswoman Nancy O'Dowd said Mohammed Asha and another suspect had contacted the Philadelphia-Educational based Commission for Foreign Medical Graduates, as first reported in The Philadelphia Inquirer. She said Asha, a Jordanian of Palestinian heritage, contacted the agency within the last year, but apparently did not take the test for

foreign medical school

graduates. "He was applying, (but) we don't believe he took the test," she said. O'Dowd could not immediately con-

firm the name of the second suspect. The FBI this week visited the ECFMG's office in West Philadelphia,

O'Dowd said. "From what I know, we are getting to the bottom of this cell that has been

responsible for what is happening," Prime Minister Gordon Brown said in an interview with British Broadcasting Corp. television.

Asha was arrested on the M6 highway Saturday night along with his wife. In Jordan, security officials said Asha had no criminal record, and friends and family said they found it hard to believe either

eight suspects - six Middle Easterners and two Indian nationals -Britain's intelligence agencies are focusing on their international links, one British intelligence official and another government official said speaking on condition of anonymity because they

are not authorized to

speak to the press. "We've known for quite some time of al-Qaida's growth in Iraq," the government official told The Associated Press. "Iraq is an obvious place to look for connections, but it's not the only country link we're investigating.

MI5, Britain's domestic intelligence agency, said on its Web site that some Britons had joined the Iraqi insurgency.

"In the longer term, it is possible that they may later return to the UK and consider mounting attacks here," the Web site said. "British and foreign nationals linked to or sympathetic with al-Qaida are known to be present within the UK. They are supporting the activities of terrorist groups in a range of ways."

Metropolitan police, who are leading the investigation into the failed bombing attacks in London and Glasgow, Scotland, refused on Friday to confirm or deny the role the MI5 and MI6 are playing in the probe.



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
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
