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Capital improvement funds for recreation outlined

By DAVID BOWSER Staff Writer

Of the \$294,000 in capital improvement funds requested by Pampa's Recreation Department for next year, about two-thirds of that is for a splash pad or spray ground.

Recreation Department, outlined the department's capital requests for fiscal year 2007-2008 as the Pampa City Commission began working on the city's budget for next year during a work session Tuesday afternoon.

"We have a \$14,000 request for the fabric shade structures," Stokes

started this year at Recreation Park."

Stokes said. "The \$14,000 will complete the amount of shelters that we need,"

The Recreation Department is also requesting \$50,000 for a water slide with spray features to add water park-like features to the city's swimming pool. The slide would be a 10to 14-foot plume slide, a fully enclosed tube with a couple of turns before going into the water.

Stokes also projected spending \$180,000 in the 2008-2009 fiscal

Dennis Stowers joins EDC board

Dennis Stowers is a new member of the Pampa Economic Development Corp.

The Pampa Commission approved his appointment Tuesday afternoon after a closed session.

No action was taken on a financial package by the seven years where we've Pampa Development Corp. previously approved for MXT, LLC, which was also a point of discussion during the executive session.

The commission also approved a change in the city's budget for this fiscal year with regard to Hidden Hills Golf Course. Earlier this year, the commission decided to eliminate the use of a mobile home at the golf course that had been used for employee housing because of increasing maintenance costs. Instead, they agreed to increase an employee annual

salary by \$8,000 in lieu of provided housing.

The commission also heard from Pampa Public Works Director Richard Morris during a public hearing on the city's annual Water Quality Report. The report is required by state law.

"It's been about six or Economic had to do this," Morris said.

He said it costs the city about \$4,800 a year to produce the report. It's mailed to utility users and is available at City Hall and on the city's Web site.

"It does contain some information if you're interested in your water," Morris said, "and if what we're doing is very useful to you."

Commissioner Robert Dixon commented that the city is not selling enough water. Water usage needs to increase, he said, but the

Weeds, mosquitoes Blooming beauty still being fought by city work crews

Mosquitoes and weeds continue to be the target of a spraying and mowing program by the city of Pampa, according to Public Service Superintendent Lincycomb.

perature let us, we'll be out there spraying," Lincycomb said. The temperature must be below 85 degrees and wind speed must be less than 10 mph in order to spray, she said.

Mosquito Mist 1 is being used to spray for mosquitoes, and a larvacide is being applied to standing water throughout the city along

Deer Glycophosphate, a chemical herbicide, is being applied to unwanted plants along city right of ways, such as cracked pavement.

"We're still mowing day-Kim light to dark," Lincycomb said. City crews continue "When the wind and tem- mowing city parks to keep grass and weed heights down and thus help control the mosquito population.

Residents should keep their lawns mowed and empty outside containers which have standing water, in order to help decrease the number of mosquitoes. The insects breed in high grass and stagnant water.





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The hearing officer, Lt. Col. Paul Ware, wrote in a report released by the defense Tuesday that those charges

were based on unreliable witness accounts, insupportable forensic evidence and questionable legal theories. He also wrote that the case could have dangerous consequences on the battlefield, where soldiers might hesitate during critical moments when facing an enemy.

"The government version is unsupported by independent evidence," wrote in the 18-page report. "To believe the government version of facts is to disregard

Prosecutors allege Sharratt and other members of his battalion carried out a revengemotivated assault on Iraqi civilians that left 24 dead after a roadside bomb killed a fellow Marine, Lance Cpl. Miguel Terrazas of El Paso.

Texas. Sharratt contends the Iraqi men he confronted were insurgents and at least one was holding an AK-47 rifle

when he fired at them. In addition to Sharratt, two other enlisted men are charged with murder and four officers are accused of failing to investigate the incident the largest single Iraqi civilian death case of the war. 

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concrete pad with about 20 play features with water spraying on them,' Stokes said. "There's a tipping bucket and water guns and things like that."

He said the \$200,000 would cover the cost of the spray ground, but he said he would like to have it next to the pool with a fence around both of them.

"We could kind of kill two birds with one stone," Stokes said. "It would allow us to increase the capacity of the number of people we could let into the pool."

Stokes said that a lot of the smaller children would go play on the spray ground.

"We could use pool lifeguards to watch both things," he said.

Horst said that the city was exploring the possibility of getting grants to

help fund the spray ground.

City Commissioner Bill Allison asked if the Pampa Economic Development Corp. had been approached. Part of their mandate includes parks and recreation.

"I think it's an incredible idea," said Mayor Lonny Robbins.

But the mayor said he wanted to see the options before committing himself to many of the budget requests.

Stokes also asked for \$30,000 for an equipment storage barn.

'That's a continuation," Stokes said. "We had \$10,000 budgeted this year for that project."

He said the \$30,000 would be enough to complete the project.

In the out years, Stokes projected the need for a \$20,000 lighting system at Recreation Park for volleyball and multipurpose courts for the 2009-2010 budget. For 2010-2011 budget, he projected spending \$30,000 for mowers. For the 2011-2012 budget, he listed the

need for \$30,000 for a tractor.

For M.K. Brown Auditorium, Stokes asked for \$20,000 for equipment and fixtures.

"There's some tables and doors that we still need to replace," he said.

That was the only request for the upcoming year.

In the future, Stokes said the auditorium needs about \$35,000 for a partition. He put that in his budget request for 2008-2009, which won't be acted

upon until next summer. He is also requesting \$95,000 for 2008-2009 for a fire alarm system.

For 2009-2010, he is requesting \$110,000 to make the auditorium compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Stokes said he is also projecting \$80,000 in 2008-2009 and \$85,000 in 2010-2011 to replace aging marquee



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Budget deficit dips to \$205 billion

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's budget deficit will drop to \$205 billion in the fiscal year that ends in September, less than half of what it was at its peak in 2004, according to new White House estimates.

It's also a gain over the \$244 billion predicted by President Bush in February, but not as great an improvement as anticipated by other forecasters.

Bush planned to discuss the figures in an afternoon appearance as the White House's Office of Management and Budget as part of its midyear update of the budget picture.

The deficit last year was \$248 billion and has closed in recent years due to impressive revenue growth from the healthy economy. Bush and Democrats in Congress have both promised to erase the deficit by 2012, though they have greatly divergent views on how to achieve the goal, with Bush and Republicans insisting on extension of his 2001 and 2003 tax cuts when they expire at the end of 2010.

The latest figure is in generally in line with expectations, as the early quarters of the 2007 fiscal year that began in October had shown continued revenue improvements. But the pace of such revenue growth has slowed more recently, according to the Congressional Budget Office.

CBO, which makes budget predictions for Congress, has estimated the deficit for the ongoing budget year will range from \$150-

The deficit peaked at \$413 billion in 2004, though economists say the best way to measure the deficit is in relation to the size of the economy. By that standard, the current deficit, at 1.5 percent of gross domestic product, is the lowest since 2002.

Despite the improvements, the deficit picture remains worse than when Bush took office six years ago. Then, both White House and congressional forecasters projected cumulative surpluses of \$5.6 trillion over the subsequent decade.

A revenue bubble burst, a recession and the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attacks adversely affected the books. Several rounds of tax cuts, including Bush's signature \$1.35 trillion 2001 tax cut, also contributed to the return to deficits in 2002 after four years of budget surpluses.

"Nothing in the administration's deficit announcement changes the failed fiscal record of President Bush," said Senate Budget Committee Chairman Kent Conrad, D-N.D. "He has increased spending by nearly 50 percent since taking office, while at the same time repeatedly cutting taxes primarily on the wealthiest.'



"Janise balanced law school, a family and a healthy marriage. And she did it well," classmate Nikeisha Ford said of the mother of two.

The twin-engine Cessna crashed into a suburban subdivision Orlando Tuesday morning, spilling aviation fuel that ignited and gutted the two homes it struck.

The victims included two aboard the plane: 54-yearold Dr. Bruce Kennedy, a Daytona Beach plastic surgeon and husband of International Speedway Corp. President Lesa France Kennedy, and NASCAR Aviation pilot Michael Klemm, 56.

Also killed was a 4-yearold girl, Gabriela Dechat, who lived in a home beside Joseph-Woodard. Her parents, Milagros Dechat, 33, and Peter Dechat, 36, were



Fort Worth Star-Telegram on Senateissued subpoenas regarding the U.S.'s warrantless eavesdropping program: Like a scene from the old western

High Noon, members of the U.S. Senate are calling out the White House, which is expected to strap on its legal sidearm for what could be a very public showdown over Senate-issued sub-

After the White House and the Department of Justice ignored nine requests to turn over internal documents about the administration's warrantless eavesdropping program on

American citizens, the Senate Judiciary Committee issued subpoenas last week to the offices of the president and vice president and the Justice Department.

"All requests have been rebuffed," said committee Chairman Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., who had the support of the leading Republicans on the committee to issue the subpoenas.

The secret program to monitor emails, telephone calls and other communications was issued after the 9-11attacks, supposedly with the intent to trace contact with terrorism suspects and those with ties to them.

The administration has insisted that it was simply protecting the country. Many others, however, see the program as a wanton attack on the civil liberties of U.S. citizens.

Regardless of the intent or merits of the administration's actions, Congress and the American people have a right to know the reasoning that went into the debate over the issue and what compelled officials to proceed with a wiretapping program not approved by a

That issue is especially pertinent now that we know former Attorney General John Ashcroft was opposed to at least part of the operation, and that then-White House counsel Alberto Gonzales pressured him - while Ashcroft was in the hospital recovering from surgery - to change his mind.

Gonzales himself is under congressional scrutiny over the firing of sever-

White House press room gets revamped

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush inaugurated the refurbished White House briefing room on Wednesday, showing off a sparkling upgrade to both the guts and face of the famous space.

"Welcome back to the West Wing," he said to the presidential press corps, assembled in the room for the first time since the massive renovation began 11 months ago. "We missed you — sort of."

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Bush seemed most impressed by the new superpowered cooling system, remarking on an improvement that means "a fellow like me would feel comfortable coming in here and answering a few questions without losing 20 pounds." Indeed, the antiquated old air

conditioner had not nearly enough capacity — and condensation tended to leak from the ceiling vents when it was particularly overworked.

The president and his wife, Laura — who took a personal, active interest in the project — cut a ribbon stretched across the briefing room stage. The ceremony was timed for airing on network morning shows, but media attendance in the room was severely limited to make space for White House staff and construction workers.

"I think it's going to benefit future presidents and future White House press corps," Bush said.

Steve Scully of C-Span, president of the White House Correspondents

Association, offered something he said the press hardly ever hands a president: a "thank you." And he noted that the move-back finally puts to rest fears that the renovation was a ruse to permanently evict the media from

the White House. During the yearlong project, the presidential press corps occupied temporary quarters across the street, the first time in 105 years it had been based outside the White House grounds.

Later, White House press secretary Tony Snow holds his first daily briefing in the

But though the room is now officially re-opened and journalists reoccupied their work quarters behind it 13 days ago, the end of construction is still possibly weeks away.

Less than 24 hours before Bush wielded his scissors, the room was still a work-inprogress.

Construction debris littered the floors. Drop cloths covered seats while painters lacquered door frames. Fixed cutaway camera positions had to be relocated. Workers scurried about hanging shelves and drilling holes. A lack of audio was just being fixed.

Amid the last-minute chaos, the look of the place generally was praised. The media's work quarters, though yet to be completed, are sleek and uniform - nofrills, industrial-style desks and booths of tan, silver and





DEAR BABY GIRL: Please accept my deepest sympathy for your loss. It is clear that you are still grieving. When someone close commits suicide, it is normal for the

survivors to feel guilt. But please, stop dwelling so much on your perceived short comings. Mothers do not commit suicide because their daughters forget to call or visit. And they do not commit suicide because their daughters don't buy them Mother's Day gifts. I'm sure your mother knew you loved her and was proud of you. Time for Montgomerie to look behind, not ahead

This is no time for Colin Montgomerie to get excited about Carnoustie.

He already has suffered enough.

The sometimes burly, often surly Scot should be positively chuffed with the British Open only a week away. Having gone 18 months without a trophy that belonged only to him, Montgomerie ended one of the longest dry spells of his career when his 6-iron somehow stayed out of the water on the 18th hole and he won the European Open by one shot.

It was his 31st victory on more than Nick Faldo, trailing only Seve Ballesteros and Bernhard Langer. It came three weeks after he shot 82 in the U.S. Open to miss the cut, and two weeks after he turned 44.

"It is just great at 44 to come back and win again, as sometimes that is the end of one's career," another playoff, only for ahead of the leaders.

feel this is a new beginning for me, and I can look forward now."

Forward, in this case, starts with the Scottish Open this week at Loch Lomond. The grand prize is a silver claret jug at Carnoustie, Montgomerie believes he still has time to end his 0for-62 drought in the majors.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)

Ichiro Suzuki sped around the bases as the ball bounced away from Ken Griffey Jr. for the first inside-the-park home run in All-Star game history. On a night of tricky hops, Suzuki and the American League rebounded to win — as

usual. Instead of a Barry Bonds splash shot, the defining hit at Tuesday's All-Star game was Suzuki's drive off the right-field wall at quirky

AT&T Park.

His two-run homer in the fifth inning put the AL ahead, then Carl Crawford and Victor Martinez added conventional shots and the Americans held on for a 5-4 victory over the Nationals.

"I thought it was going to go over the fence," Suzuki said through a translator. "When it didn't, I was really bummed."

In a decade of dominance, the AL has won 10 straight games played to a decision,

with the notorious 2002 tie at Milwaukee interrupting the run. The only longer streak was when the NL took 11 in a row from 1972-82.

"We're tired of losing always," the Chicago Cubs' Derrek Lee said. "We just want to win one and put all of this to rest."

EU maps out strategy to deal with economic, social impact of sports

(AP) — The European Union said sports federations should not be exempt from EU anti-monopoly and labor laws, as it unveiled a strategy Wednesday for dealing with the growing impact of sports in Europe, economically and socially.

Proposals from the EU's executive branch covered doping and racism in stadiums, but attention was focused on how the European Commission will balance European laws with demands by sports federations to set their own rules. EU Sports Commissioner

Longtime AP sports writer Ralph Bernstein dies at 85

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Ralph Bernstein, who peppered coaches and players alike with tough questions for nearly a half-century while covering the Philadelphia sports scene for The Associated Press, has died. He was 85.

Bernstein died Saturday of cancer, his daughter-in-law, Maureen Bernstein, said

"I'll bet you there wasn't a single person involved in sports in Pennsylvania and beyond who didn't know of Ralph Bernstein," said AP sports editor Terry Taylor, who worked with Bernstein in the Philadelphia bureau from 1977-81.

"He was ferocious and he made the AP's presence known at football fields, ballparks, basketball courts and hockey rinks in Philadelphia. And if the Nittany Lions were playing at home, Ralph was there.'

The Penn State Nittany Lions play in State College, 200 miles from Philadelphia.

Bernstein, who lived in Pembroke Pines, Fla., since retiring in February 1994 after more than 48 years at the AP, would have turned 86 on Thursday.

"No sports writer in the history of Philly had a more widespread influence or presence," longtime Philadelphia Daily News sports columnist Bill Conlin told his newspaper. "He covered every Phillies spring-training and home game, every Eagles preseason and home game, every Sixers and Flyers home game, every Big 5 doubleheader, all the press conferences for hirings and firings, and everything in between."

Colleagues recalled Bernstein's hardnosed questions sending the normally cool Dallas Cowboys coach Tom Landry stalking angrily from a stage, and prompting Philadelphia Phillies manager Danny Ozark to kick a trash can in the team clubhouse and threaten to punch him.

"Nobody — and I mean nobody — could grill someone in an interview the way he could," said Frank Bilovsky, retired sportswriter for the former Philadelphia Bulletin and longtime friend of Bernstein.

But after fielding a series of tame questions at news conference shortly after Bernstein's retirement, Philadelphia Eagles coach Rich Kotite groaned, "I miss Ralph."

"He refused to take 'no comment' for an answer," Conlin said. "But his questions were straight-ahead. He never set anybody up for a cheap shot. And when his story appeared, the quotes were accurate and in

Bernstein, a Philadelphia native, started as a stringer for the old Philadelphia Record while attending Temple University. After serving in the Army in World War II, he returned home and worked for United Press before joining the AP.

Pakistani troops comb mosque for holdouts, cleric slain in offensive

Pakistani troops cornered holdout Islamic mosque July 3. militants and combed the warren-like Red Mosque complex for booby traps today mosque as a base to send out radicalized after assaulting the compound and killing students to enforce their version of its pro-Taliban cleric, the

army spokesman said. Army spokesman Maj. Gen. Waheed Arshad said only a "very few" militants were still resisting and that combat operations would soon end. But he said clearing the compound of mines, booby traps and other weaponry could take some time.

"The whole area has to be sanitized," he told a news conference.

Arshad said three of the die-hard remaining defenders were killed overnight and troops were meeting resistance in just "one or two places" of the sprawling compound in the heart of the Pakistani

capital. More than 50 militants and 10 soldiers have been killed since the assault began early Tuesday, including the mosque's pro-Taliban cleric Abdul Rashid Ghazi, the army said.

Commandos went in after unsuccessful attempts to get the mosque's militants to surrender to a weeklong siege mounted by the government following deadly street

ing abducting alleged prostitutes and trying to 're-educate" them at the compound.

More than 80 people have been killed overall since the violence began.

By this afternoon, nearly 35 hours after the assault began, the intermittent explosions and gunfire earlier heard from the complex, which includes the mosque and a women's religious school, had ceased.

An army officer, who spoke on condition of anonymity because he was not authorized to speak to the media, said earlier that troops were moving from

room to room in basements of the compound, blowing up foxholes where militants had been entrenched. He said the three militants reported killed Tuesday night were trapped in foxholes by commandos.

Relatives of young women, men and children who had been inside waited behind army barricades around the mosque or inquired at morgues.

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




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China to focus crackdown on small-scale food producers

BEIJING (AP) — China's food and drug agency announced stricter rules today for approving new drugs, a day after its former head was executed for accepting bribes to approve untested medicine. The government also ordered small, loosely regulated food producers to clean up their act.

China is struggling to salvage its reputation as a safe exporter. Importers of Chinese goods, especially the United States, have grown extremely wary as the list of products tainted with deadly toxins and dangerously high levels of chemicals grows each day.

Starting in September, all food exported from China will have an inspection and quarantine symbol to guarantee safety, the government said.

China also told small-scale producers to renovate their operations to meet hygiene standards or be shut down. The measures are part of China's efforts to clarify regulations, tighten enforcement and clean up corruption factors underpinning its poor food safety

Inspection agencies at all levels need to

recognize that "the process will take a long time and the work is complicated and difficult," the General Administration of Quality Supervision, Inspection and Quarantine said on its Web site.

The food and drug watchdog said the 2008 Olympics would give China a chance to prove to the world that it was capable of setting a new standard for food safety and raise awareness domestically about the issue.

China's small-scale food producers have been accused of unsanitary production conditions, using tainted or substandard ingredients and failing to register with authorities. While their products generally are sold only in local areas, their continued existence helps explain why China is facing a food cri-

Many will not survive the new regulations and their numbers are expected to be halved by 2009, with all properly certified by 2012, the administration said.

The regulations also target the use of recycled ingredients, unapproved additives, and banned substances.
