## County to join in providing election administrator

Gray County commissioners voted to participate in providing a joint election administrator for all entities within the county at their special meeting at 11 a.m. Friday in the second-floor courtroom of the courthouse, 205 N. Russell.

Precinct 2 Commissioner Gary Willoughby, Precinct 4 Commissioner James Hefley and County Judge Richard Peet voted unanimously in favor of the proposed administrator. Precinct 1 Commissioner Joe Wheeley and

Precinct 3 Commissioner Gerald Wright were absent from the meeting.

Friday's meeting was the second in which representatives of each of the cities and school districts in the county were invited to participate.

A revised budget proposal was presented by the county at Friday's meeting. The new proposal shifts more of the cost of having a joint administrator onto the county, and decreases the share to be paid by each of the school districts and cities.

The annual cost of the position

will be \$51,770.46, of which salary and personnel services make up \$41,022 and the remainder is for office supplies, postage, phone and Internet service, mileage and attendance at conferences and training.

Eighty percent, the county's share, will be \$41,416.37. The city of Pampa and Pampa Independent School District will each pay \$4,529.92, or 8.75 percent. The cities of McLean and Lefors and the school districts of McLean, Lefors and Grandview-Hopkins will each pay \$207.08, or 0.40 percent.

The same percentages for each

entity will also apply to equipment maintenance and upkeep. Gray County will pay \$28,176; Pampa ISD and the city of Pampa will each pay \$3,081.75; and the cities of Lefors and McLean and the school districts of Lefors, McLean and Grandview-Hopkins will each pay \$140.88.

Total costs to be paid by each entity for a year are: Gray County, \$69,592.37; city of Pampa and Pampa ISD, \$7,611.67 each; cities of McLean and Lefors and school dis-

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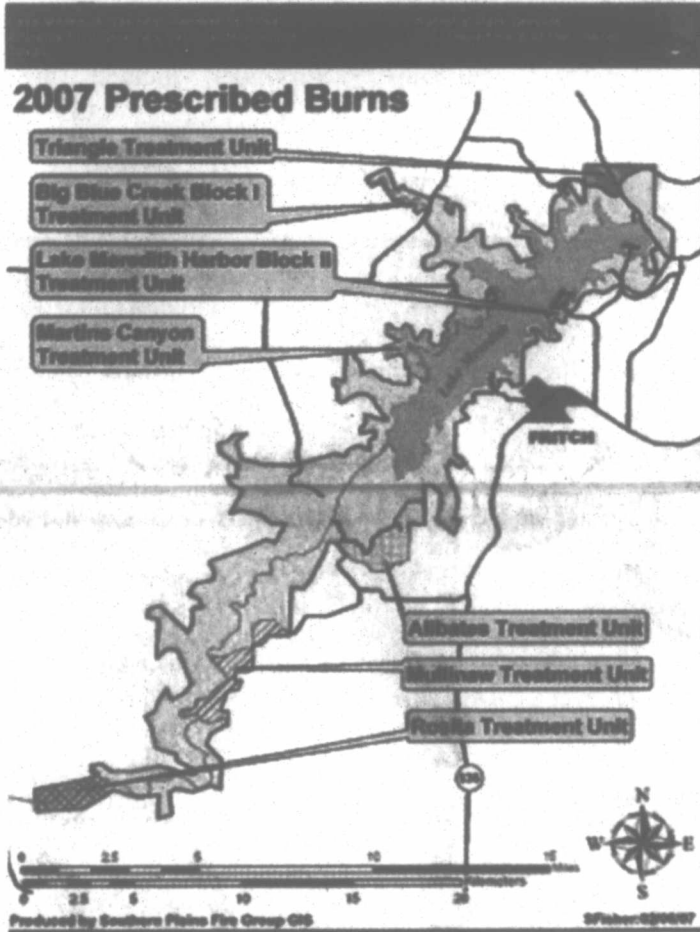
## Prescribed burns set at Meredith

Superintendent Cindy Ott-Jones has announced that Lake Meredith National Recreation Area will conduct four prescribed burns at Mullinaw, Big Blue Creek, Martins Canyon, and Rosita in the coming months. Park staff expect to begin burning this week and should complete the burns by the first of September, depending upon weather conditions.

The Rosita unit is divided into two blocks. The first block will begin on the south side of the river at the Rosita Campground access road and follow the park's boundary to Bull Taco Hill. The second

## Differences in bees explained by agent

With recent happenings with bees in Pampa and along with many calls pertaining to bees, I just wanted to take some time to make sure people know the facts when it comes to European Honey Bees (EHB) and Africanized Honey Bees (AHB), the similarities and differences.

In 1956, AHB were brought to Brazil to improve honey production ability of the EHB. In 1957, containment measures were accidentally removed and several swarms escaped to the Brazilian countryside. AHB

mated with local EHB and passed on their aggressive traits. AHB moved north at a rate of 200-300 miles per year and entered Texas in 1990. In 2001, Lubbock county was placed under AHB quarantine and a swarm with AHB traits was collected west of Silverton.

AHB and EHB are similar in size and appearance, where AHB colonies (hives) tend to be small while those of EHB are generally large. AHB store only small amounts of honey while EHB store considerably larger amounts of honey.

## Crystal Palace enjoyed prosperity in Pampa

Eighty years ago, a little confectionery shop opened up at 121 N. Cuyler and would stay at that location for almost 30 years, according to the book Gray County Heritage.

Pampa residents could enjoy sandwiches, drinks, ice cream and homemade candies at the Crystal Palace Confectionery.

James Matinas, a native of Greece, moved to Pampa in 1927 after selling a similar shop in Kansas. With the help of Lula Wilkins, they leased a store and began making wonderful food and candies for Pampans.

According to an article written by Eloise Lane in 1990 for The Pampa News, as the business progressed, Matinas was able to buy Wilkins' share. In 1930, he returned to Greece to marry his sweetheart, Freda (changed from Paraskive) and she and her sister moved to Pampa.

The front section of the shop contained glass cases filled with candy, which

was made in big copper kettles in the back of the building and turned out on marble slabs. The center of the store had small round ice cream tables with wire-backed chairs.

A menu, on display at the White Deer Land Museum, lists phosphate drinks and orange juleps for 5 cents, limeade for 10 cents, egg malted milk for 25 cents, ice cream sodas for 15 cents, plain sundaes, such as black and white, were 20 cents, fancy sundaes, such as a merry widow were 25 cents, and golden brown sandwiches containing pimiento cheese or goose liver could be purchased for 15 cents.

The candy types and prices were not listed on the menu, but could be bought out of the glass cases. The Crystal Palace was well known for its famous Christmas ribbon candy.

There was a beauty shop upstairs where women could get their hair done.

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BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) — International Educational Services' strip mall storefront opens up into a complex of cheery offices

and classrooms decorated with American flags. Open a classroom door, and dozens of smiling children look up from their workbooks for a

heavily accented group "good morning."

The children are illegal immigrants, and all but one are from Central America. In the afternoon, they will go to foster homes, where they will live until they can be united with a "sponsor" — a parent, relative or family friend within the United States.

It's a better scenario than they would have faced in the past, when children caught crossing the border were locked up like adults. But critics say the majority will eventually fade into the nation's illegal immigrant subculture, having gamed the nation's alphabet soup of homeland security and social service agencies.

A 2004 analysis by the Department of Homeland Security's Office of the Inspector General found that 68 percent of the juveniles never appeared in court. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) spokesman Carl Rusnok said it was up to the sponsor to bring children to their proceedings.

"This is fraud-prone and this is an inducement to illegal immigration," said Don Barnett, a fellow at the Washington, D.C.-based Center for Immigration Studies who has analyzed the system. "There's no

question that smugglers are totally aware of this program and know how to use it."

Barnett's found that in some cases children are being turned over to non-relatives, because their blood relatives are illegal immigrants who fear being deported if they present themselves.

He said smugglers are telling parents to separate from the children once they cross the Rio Grande, because even if caught by the Border Patrol the children are all but guaranteed to be in a safe, comfortable home within a day or so and placed with a relative or friend within a few weeks or months.

The parents can meanwhile seek "voluntary departure," which means they can leave without a deportation order on their record (such an order would prohibit them from entering the United States within the next 10 years and subject them to jail time if they are caught.) They can then try to qualify for a visa or attempt to sneak in again.

If they were caught together, the family would be detained together under one of ICE's new family facilities, such as the T. Don Hutto facility in Taylor that has been criticized for prison-like conditions.

tricts of McLean, Lefors and Grandview-Hopkins, \$347.96 each.

The original proposed division of the \$51,770.46 for salary and office expenses was divided up into 50 percent for Gray County, 20 percent each for the City of Pampa and Pampa ISD, and 2.5 percent for each of the other entities.

"We've tried to be as fair as possible, as far as percentages go," Peet said.

Additional county contributions to the cost of having the position will include office space, equipment storage and administration.

Each entity will still have to pay \$1,500 to program the electronic voting machines each time they hold an election. The programming is done by an outside company and is not under the control of the county.

Any entity which chooses not to participate in providing a joint administrator will still be able to use the services of the administrator and to use the county's electronic voting machines for elections. However, the non-participating entities must contract for such services and pay for them, Peet said.

An alternative to paying \$1,500 for each election for programming costs is to buy the equipment to do the programming, but such equipment costs \$50,000, said

County Clerk Susan Winborne.

"I think this is very fair," Pampa City Manager John Horst said of the proposed budget. "I think this is a very good plan. This is better than what we anticipated."

"I really appreciate the work the county has done. I think our board can discuss this and come to a conclusion," said Lee Porter of Pampa ISD Board of Education.

"We'll be all right with this, from our standpoint," said a representative of Lefors ISD.

"The next step is for each entity to go back to their boards and decide whether to join up," Peet said.

The cities of McLean and Pampa have already voted to

participate in providing the joint election administrator. The county asked that the remaining entities come to a decision and notify the county by Aug. 15, the county's next regularly scheduled commissioners' meeting.

The joint administrator's office will be overseen by an election committee composed of Peet, Winborne, County Tax Assessor/Collector Gaye Whitehead, and one representative from each of the other participating entities.

The chairpersons of the county's Democratic and Republican committees will also be on the committee if they choose to participate in sharing a joint election administrator, Peet said. The party committees are not

included in the budget.

Alternatives to creating the administrator's position would be for the entities to lease electronic voting machines from companies which provide such services, or buying their own machines. Peet said the county could give each entity a voting machine, but the county has only one machine to count the votes and one for the judges to use to monitor the elections, and each

entity would have to have at least two voting machines and one each of the remaining machines.

Part of the cost of providing the machines to each entity is earmarked for eventual replacement of voting machines as it becomes necessary to do so, Winborne said. The cost is included in the joint administrator budget and would be included in contracts with non-participating entities.

defense is very intense while generally moderate with EHB. EHB colony (hive) defense can be intense when the colony is disturbed by trying to defend the colony in order to protect the honey and their colony.

Single foraging bees literally have to be forced to sting. AHB and EHB will sting once and die. The difference is that more AHB will sting more rapidly than

EHB. If stung by bees, run away from colony and seek shelter in a building or car. If stung, remove stingers by scraping them out and if you have multiple stings or an allergic reaction occurs seek medical attention.

In order to distinguish between AHB and EHB, tests must be run in order to tell whether or not the bees are AHB. Two tests can be administered, one is a DNA test and the other is a wing vein measurement. Both tests are accurate and can tell the difference in the two types of bees.

I have been in contact with the laboratory that will

test the bees and they are shut down until July 30, therefore the results will be in after Aug. 1. If you do see a hive in or around your home, barns, pens or other areas, please contact Brandon McGinty at the Gray County Extension office for information on persons to remove the hive or destroy the hive.

We do not recommend you attempt this yourself due to the possibility they could be aggressive. If it is an emergency, please call 911 and inform the 911 dispatcher that it is a stinging incident.

# Dogs chase down suspects

GAINESVILLE, Ga. (AP) — It's a bad idea to burglarize a place marked "K-9 training facility."

Police dog handlers arriving Wednesday at the abandoned nursing home where they hold training sessions discovered two men and a woman dismantling the building's copper pipes and wiring, Hall County Sheriff's Sgt. Kiley Sargent said.

When the officers arrived, the three dropped their tools and ran. That was their second mistake.

"For anyone to try to run from a whole unit of canines, it's just a no-win situation," Sargent said.

Pamela Puckett, 37, quickly surrendered. Marc Black, 18, was tracked to a trash bin behind a nearby convenience store. Paul Perry, 39, was treated for a superficial dog bite just below the buttocks after his arrest, authorities said.

unit is on the north side of the river along the park's boundary to Tin Cup Canyon. Prescribed burning of this unit is expected to begin Wednesday.

The Big Blue Creek unit starts west of the Big Blue Creek Bridge on highway 1913 and follows upstream on the south side of the creek, and should be completed by today.

The Martins Canyon unit lies between the recreation area boundary, Evans Canyon, and the Blue West boat ramp. Burning in this area should be completed by Sept. 1. The Mullinaw unit begins at McBride access road and continues into Coetas Creek; completion is expected by Aug. 15.

The purpose of the prescribed fires is to reduce the

buildup of grassy fuels that typically feed a wildfire and to return the mesquite grasslands to their natural cycle of growth. The reintroduction of fire into the ecosystem will help traditional plant distribution; reduce the danger associated with wildfires, including protecting threatened communities and ranchlands; and increase public and firefighter safety in the event of wildfires.

Fire crews began preparing burn units Oct. 1, 2006, and have spent several months removing brush and other fuels from the perimeter of the burn units. The burns will be a cooperative effort sponsored by the National Park Service, with assistance from local ranchers and local and Federal agency fire departments. Extensive fire management plans have been created that will guide the strategic placement of fire crews and engines based on weather

and expected fire behavior. Lake Meredith began its prescribed fire program in 1999 and has successfully burned approximately 36,000 acres to date.

During these controlled burns some of the areas will be closed to the public. People traveling in the area should use caution by reducing vehicle speed and turning on their headlights when smoke is present. The burns are designed so that the majority of smoke will move toward the waters of Lake Meredith, which means boating activities near the burn units may be affected briefly. The staff of Lake Meredith National Recreation Area apologize for any temporary inconveniences that may occur during the burns, but feel that the benefits derived from the treatments will improve safety and recreational opportunities for the public.

Music could be played on the nickelodeon for 10 cents.

Many high school students ate lunch at the Crystal Palace, since the high school was located on West Francis at the time. Students could save their

money until they had a quarter apiece and buy a sandwich and a Coke.

In Lane's article, she wrote how downtown business owners would often go to the late show at the LaNora Theater (where Heard & Jones Drug currently stands) and then walk across main street for refreshments at the Crystal Palace.

In 1945, Nicholas Matinas, a nephew who was

living in California after being discharged from the military, heard that is uncle wanted to sell the confectionery. He and his wife packed up and drove to Pampa, only to find that the Crystal Palace had been sold several days previously to Spence and Marguerite Hearn.

The Hearn's leased the business to Josephine Austin in 1951, who kept it open until 1956.

## AP covers several interesting stories this past week

There were several national stories on the Associated Press wires last week that got my attention.

One was from Ypsilanti, Mich., home of Eastern Michigan University, a public school with 23,500 students.

A coed at the university was apparently raped and murdered in her dorm room in December.

At the time, university officials told her family and the media that she died of asphyxiation and there was no evidence of foul play.

In February another EMU student was arrested and charged with murder, and that is when the dead girl's family and students learned

that she had been raped and killed.

I wonder why police, a medical examiner or a funeral home employee did not say something at the time.

The board of regents of the university last week fired President John Fallon, Vice President of Student Affairs Jim Vick and Public Safety Director Cindy Hall for covering up the incident.

A letter of discipline was also put into the file of Kenneth McKanders, an attorney for the university.

The AP said that an independent law firm investigation and U.S. Department of Education report both found that the university violated the federal Clery Act, which

requires colleges and universities to disclose campus security information. Many in the administration were accused of covering up the truth and endangering students to protect the school's image.

I thought it outrageous that an institution of higher learning would stoop so low as to try to cover up a crime.

Criminals and the Mafia try to cover up crimes. Educators should be above that.

The other story involved

the Catholic Archdiocese of Los Angeles and a settlement of \$660 million to alleged victims clergy sex abuse.

I went to Catholic schools for 12 years. The eight years in elementary and junior high school nuns were in charge. There were a few lay teachers, mainly basketball coaches and music instructors.

The nuns were basically harmless unless they wielded a wooden ruler on the knuckles of misbehaving students.

The four years in the mili-

tary academy high school priests ruled. There were lay coaches and military instructors, too.

Not once in those 12 years did I experience any abuse, except for the aforementioned nun with the wooden ruler.

Nor did I hear of anyone else being abused.

Perhaps I lived in a different time when clergy abuse was a rare exception.

Reporters are not supposed to be personally involved in stories they cover. They need to be objective and fair.

But that is not always possible.

Last week's excitement on

the bee swarm story got reporter Kerri Smith personally involved in that story.

She was going to take photos of Ron Ebel dismantling a bee hive.

As luck would have it, she got stung by some angry bees, 14 times on her face and arms.

If you know Kerri and her infectious personality you will understand why she had to show off her battle scars at the news office before seeking medical attention.

So naturally, when reporter Marilyn Powers learned of a bee suit available locally, we got it for her.

We told her to keep it in the trunk of her car in case she has to cover more bees.

In 1942, the Nazis began transporting Jews from the Warsaw Ghetto to the Treblinka concentration camp.

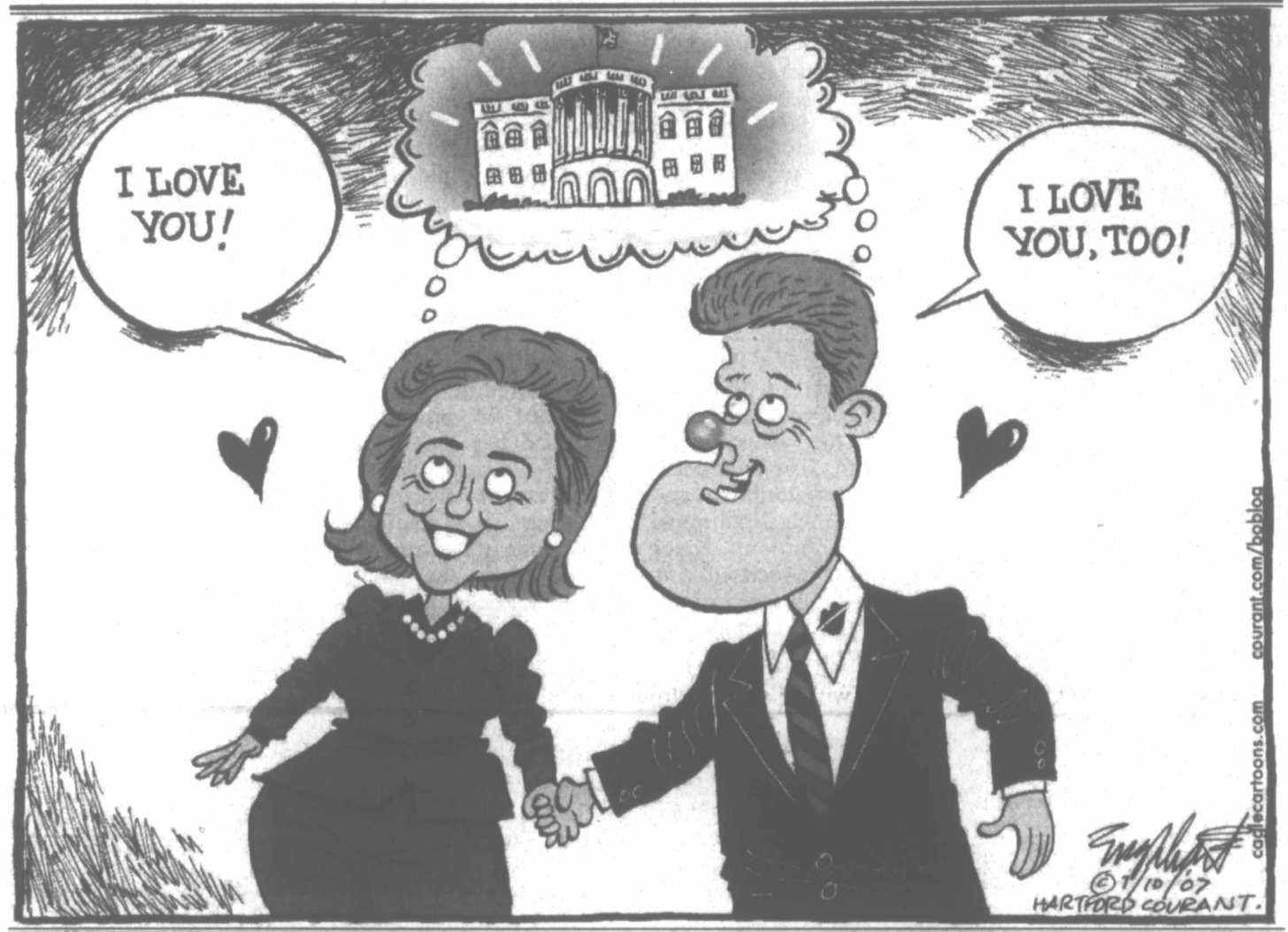
In 1943, American forces led by Gen. George S. Patton captured Palermo, Sicily.

### Providing a forum for excellence important in our prisons ...

According to an article in the Los Angeles Times that was reprinted in the May/June issue of the Inside Journal (the hometown newspaper of America's prisoners), the California state inspector general announced that the state's one billion dollar investment in drug treatment for prisoners has been a complete waste of money and had done nothing to lessen the number of inmates entering state prisons.

For those who argue that simply creating more beds is

not the answer to the burgeoning prison population, this is probably not what you want to hear. But here's something you might. On June 23, the Rufe Jordan Unit's Islamic community conducted a program, "Developing Your Full Potential." The regional Islamic chaplain was on hand for the event and gave a speech. The program's highlight, however, was two presentations conducted by inmates. The two orators

## A mansion by every measure that counts

Boy, houses are getting huge these days. I offer a solution.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the average new home grew to 2,434-square feet in 2005 from 1,660-square feet in 1973. Houses of 3,000-square feet and well beyond — "McMansions" — represent a quarter of all new home construction.

That got me to thinking about the house I grew up in.

As it went, in 1964, we'd been living in an 850-square foot ranch, one built with GI Bill money after World War II. I was 2 then, the youngest of three, and my mother was pregnant with my sister Lisa. We were in dire need of a bigger house.

One day as my father (the Big Guy) drove home from work, he noticed a house was being built in a new

housing plan. He stopped the car and paid a visit to the builder.

The house hadn't been sold yet, he learned. The builder was eager to sell, and the Big Guy, relying on the same "I'm-broke-as-hell-buddy" techniques he used to buy cars, negotiated several extras as part of the deal.

There must have been a rule in the early 1960s that every house built in the suburbs should have a brick facade on the bottom and white aluminum siding on the top, and our box-shaped house was no exception. It had four bedrooms, one full bathroom and one half-bathroom.

It was all of 1,500-square feet.

My parents began improving the place right away. The Big Guy planted grass, trees and shrubs, while my mother painted and wallpapered.

They built a family room in the basement. They added a concrete porch with roof out back, a porch that never wanted for a cool breeze.

By 1974, we had six children and the house was bursting at the seams. The Big Guy sold some stock he inherited and added on a fifth bedroom and full bath on the first floor — creating a 1,700-square-foot house.

We did a lot of living there. For 34 years, the front

door was never locked, and friends and relatives came and went at all hours. We had a million birthday parties and family gatherings there. Every emotion under the sun — love, anger, joy, sadness — took place there.

I remember how the Big Guy loved to nap on his favorite recliner on the back porch. And how Jingles, our dog, rushed out from under the shrubs to greet me. And how sometimes after dinner Sunday nights, my five sisters and I sat around the kitchen table laughing and sharing stories.

The modest size of the house forced us to live together — there was simply no way to avoid each other. We had to learn how to share — certainly how to negotiate — and how to get along, all

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

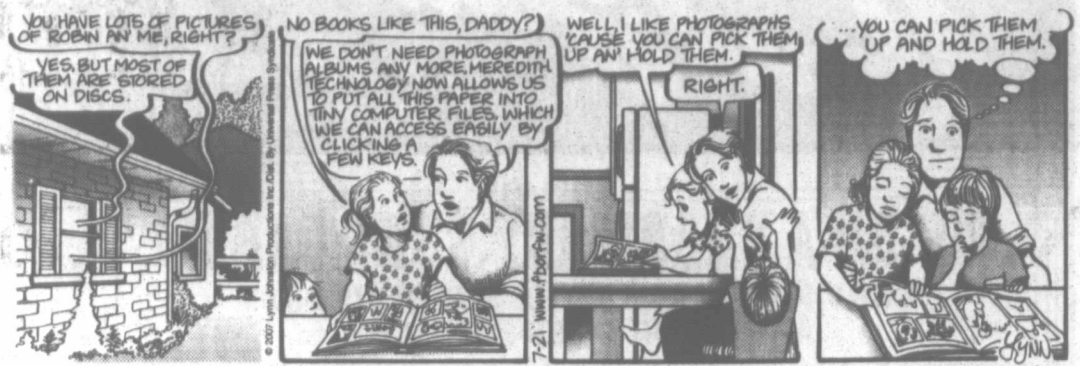
**DEAR ANNOYED:** Many restaurant managers feel that the more often they can "turn" a table, the better their bottom line

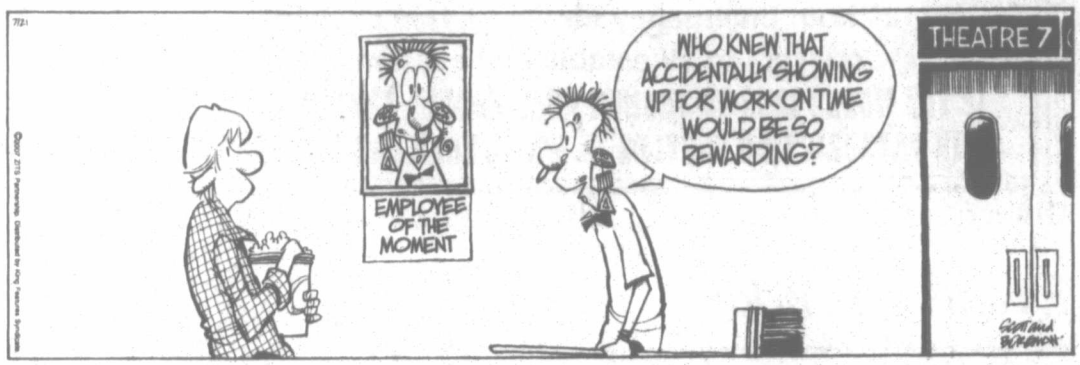

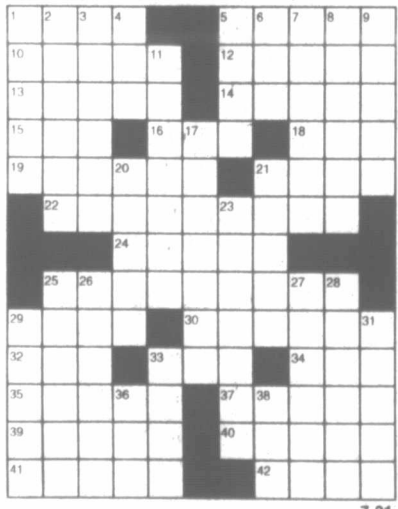

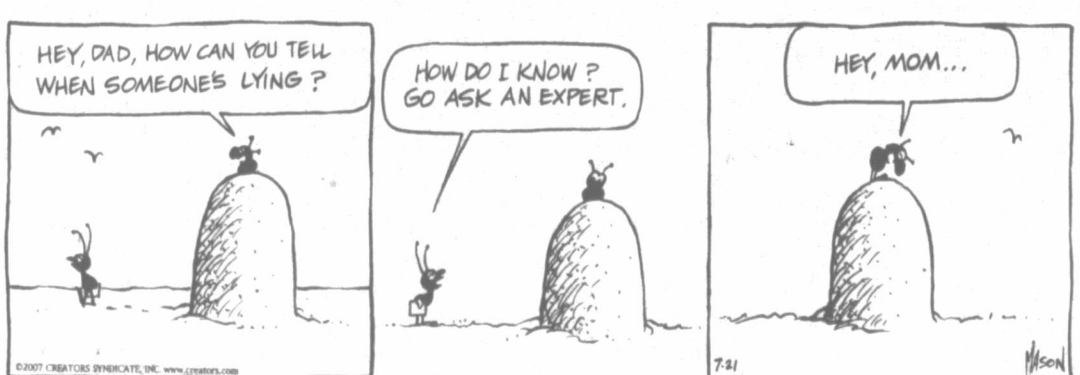

## FBI investigating whether NBA ref bet on games

David Stern led the NBA through drug problems and work stoppages. Now his league faces the stigma of a point-shaving scandal involving a referee.

The NBA acknowledged Friday that the FBI is investigating Tim Donaghy for betting on games, including ones in which he officiated.

According to a law enforcement official, authorities are examining whether the referee made calls to affect the point spread in games on which he or associates had wagered over the past two seasons.

The referee had a gambling problem and was approached by low-level mob associates through an

acquaintance, said the official, who spoke to the AP on condition of anonymity.

Donaghy is perhaps best-known previously as one of the referees in the 2004 game at Detroit that ended with Indiana Pacers players fighting with Pistons fans, among the biggest black marks in league history.

This could top it.

"We would like to assure our fans that no amount of effort, time or personnel is being spared to assist in this investigation, to bring to justice an individual who has betrayed the most sacred trust in professional sports, and to take the necessary steps to protect against this ever happening again," Stern said in a statement.

Donaghy officiated 68

games in the 2005-06 season and 63 games in 2006-07, according to the Elias Sports Bureau. He also worked 20 playoff games, including five last season — Pistons-Magic on April 23; Warriors-Mavericks on April 27; Suns-Lakers on April 29; Nets-Raptors on May 4; and Spurs-Suns on May 12.

The National Basketball Referees Association did not return calls for a statement, and Donaghy reportedly has resigned from the league.

A woman came to the door of the Bradenton, Fla. home where Donaghy lives and shouted through the door: "We have no comment."

Defense attorney John Lauro confirmed Donaghy is under investigation but

refused to comment on the allegations or the case.

Stern's statement said the FBI is investigating allegations a "single" referee bet on basketball. But the law enforcement official, who requested anonymity because he was not authorized to discuss the ongoing case, said other arrests are expected.

Those studying Donaghy's games might have noticed some trends.

When the home team was favored by 0-4 1/2 points, it went 5-12 in games officiated by Donaghy this season, according to Covers.com, a Web site that tracks referee trends. Home underdogs were 1-7 when the spread was 5-9.5 points.

## Two bad shots, and one happy ending

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland (AP) — A shank for Sergio Garcia. A duck-hook for Tiger Woods.

Both shots were shocking to see on the opening hole at Carnoustie. The bigger surprise Friday at the British Open was which player recovered — not the guy with 12 majors, but the one seeking his first.

"It was a solid shank," Garcia said, able to laugh after an even-par 71 put him 6 under for the tournament and gave him a two-shot lead going into the weekend.

His 9-iron skidded into a nasty lie in the rough right of the green, and what followed was a chip that would have made short-game genius Seve Ballesteros proud. It skirted the edge of a bunker and rolled to tap-in range for an unlikely par that brightened Garcia's mood.

Woods, on the other hand, hit his iron off the tee so poorly that it found the Barry Burn. That's not unusual at Carnoustie, except the winding stream

shouldn't come into play until the final hole, not the first one.

It was that far left.

He dropped the club right after impact and watched the ball sail over the gallery, hop along the turf and disappear into the burn and out-of-bounds, putting two strokes on his card before he put a ball in play.

"It was such a poor shot because the commitment wasn't there," said Woods, who made double bogey on his way to a 3-over 74 that left him seven shots behind in his quest to become the first player in 51 years to win the claret jug three straight times.

"Still not out of it," Woods said, even though 18 players separated him from the top of the leaderboard.

Garcia took another step toward validating his promise, grinding his way through chilly breezes with birdies on both par 5s and only a couple of mistakes that put him two shots clear of K.J. Choi.

## Francis back in Houston, but no longer as 'Franchise'

HOUSTON (AP) — Steve Francis is no longer Houston's "Franchise."

But the man who was once the anchor of the Rockets' rebuilding effort was elated Friday to be back at the place he calls home.

Francis, who earned the nickname "Franchise" during his first stint in Houston from 1999-2004, signed a two-year deal to return to a team that now boasts the superstar duo of Tracy McGrady and Yao Ming.

He won't be the star of these Rockets, might not even start and his nickname could be retired, but the 30-year-old Francis said that's OK with him.

"I have no problem with somebody calling me that," he said of the moniker. "But if the Rockets win and I'm out there, I'll be more happy if that happens."

Francis was a three-time All-Star with the Rockets before he was traded to Orlando in 2004 in a multi-player deal that brought McGrady to Houston.

He went to the New York Knicks in another trade in early 2006 and was dealt to Portland on draft-night this year. The Trail Blazers bought out his contract for a reported \$30 million last week, making him an unrestricted free agent.

Francis was pursued by Miami, Dallas and the Los Angeles Clippers, and agent Jeff Fried said he was

offered more money to play elsewhere.

"We were thrilled," Rockets general manager Daryl Morey said. "I think it speaks a lot to Steve's character that he's chosen winning over everything else. We really feel like he's a strong piece to get us, deeper and farther into the playoffs."

The Rockets were ousted from the playoffs in the first round by the Utah Jazz last season, but things were worse for Francis. He played just 44 games for the Knicks while dealing with injuries, averaging a career-low 11.3 points. He has averaged 18.4 points and 6.1 assists in his eight-year career.

Back in Houston on Friday, Francis made jokes, laughed easily and his grin was brighter than the yellow button-down shirt he wore under his cream-colored suit. He sat down for a news conference, glanced at the Rockets logo behind him and did a double take, as if he couldn't quite believe he was back.

Francis will reclaim the No. 3 jersey he wore the first 6 1/2 years of his career. He took No. 1 in New York because Stephon Marbury had No. 3.

The importance of the number wasn't lost on Rockets officials, who planned his introduction to begin at promptly 3:33 p.m.

## Spurs have high hopes for Splitter's future

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The San Antonio Spurs introduced the latest addition to their cadre of international players on Friday, Brazilian forward Tiago Splitter, whom they took in the first round of the draft.

The 6-foot-11 Splitter, 22, has a year left to play with Tau Ceramica in Spain, but hopes to join the NBA champions for the 2008-09 season.

"Very seldom does an organization have an opportunity to add a player of the

quality of person, the quality of character and the quality of basketball talent through the draft after a championship season that we were able to do this year," Spurs general manager R.C. Buford said. "Although the time isn't right for Tiago to join our team, we're really looking forward to that day coming soon."

Splitter has played for Tau Ceramica the last four seasons after signing with them in 2000. Splitter played 20 games in the 2006-07

Euroleague and averaged 10.7 points and 6.0 rebounds per game. The Spurs took him with the 28th overall selection.

"I'm really glad to be here. And I think it's a great opportunity for me to be part of this team, this club, this city," Splitter said. "I always thought that San Antonio had a different game than the NBA. ... They don't have just one guy who is going to score 40 points every night, but they have a team." Buford said "we have

every indication that we'll be able to bring him into our program" after next season.

The Spurs already boast several international players, highlighted by Manu Ginobili and Fabricio Oberto, both of Argentina, and finals MVP Tony Parker, who was born in Belgium and raised in France. Also playing for San Antonio last season for their fourth championship in nine seasons were Francisco Elson of the Netherlands and Beno Udrih of Slovenia.

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## DARS seeking more clients for special rehabilitation program

AUSTIN — An increase in funding from the state legislature means more clients will be served and the time clients spend on the waiting list will be greatly shortened through the Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services. This announcement came recently from the department in regards to its Comprehensive Rehabilitation Service program which assists Texans with brain and spinal cord injuries.

The CRS program provides the following services:

- Inpatient Comprehensive Medical Rehabilitation. A team of qualified professionals provides a variety of intensive therapies, medical care and other services to help individuals live as independently as possible. Services are provided on an inpatient basis at an accredited rehabilitation hospital.

- Outpatient Services. Rehabilitation Services for occupational therapy, physical therapy, speech therapy and cognitive therapy may be continued on an outpatient basis.

- Post-Acute Traumatic Brain Injury Services. These services help an individual deal with injury-related cognitive difficulties such as memory loss and/or inappropriate behaviors.

Eligible applicants of the CRS program must have a traumatic brain injury and/or spinal cord injury that results in a substantial impediment to functioning independently. There must also be a reasonable expectation that the individual's ability to function within the family and/or community will improve with the provision of services. Applicants

must also be:

- at least 16 years of age when services are completed;

- a U.S. citizen or immigrant alien of the United States and a resident of Texas for at least six months or have a family member living in Texas for at least six months who is or will become, the applicant's primary caregiver;

- sufficiently medically stable to participate actively in a program of services; and
- be willing to participate in treatment.

Program funding has been increased by approximately \$3 million per year, making the overall funding a total of \$16 million for fiscal year 2008. In 2007, CRS has already served 562 clients and expects to serve more before the end of the fiscal year on Aug. 31.

DARS encourages Texans with brain or spinal cord injuries and their families to apply for the CRS program. This new funding will mean consumers applying for services will experience greatly decreased wait times.

- "Know Your Plants and How to Manipulate Them," J.F. Cadenhead, Extension range specialist.

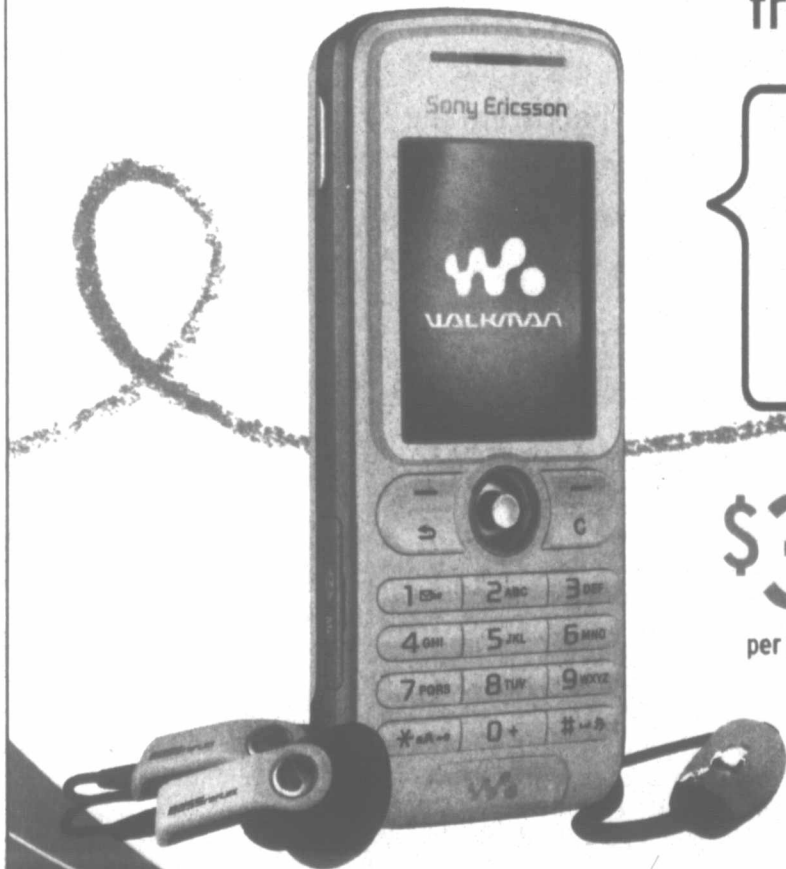
- "Why I Like Weeds," Keith Boone, ranch manager.

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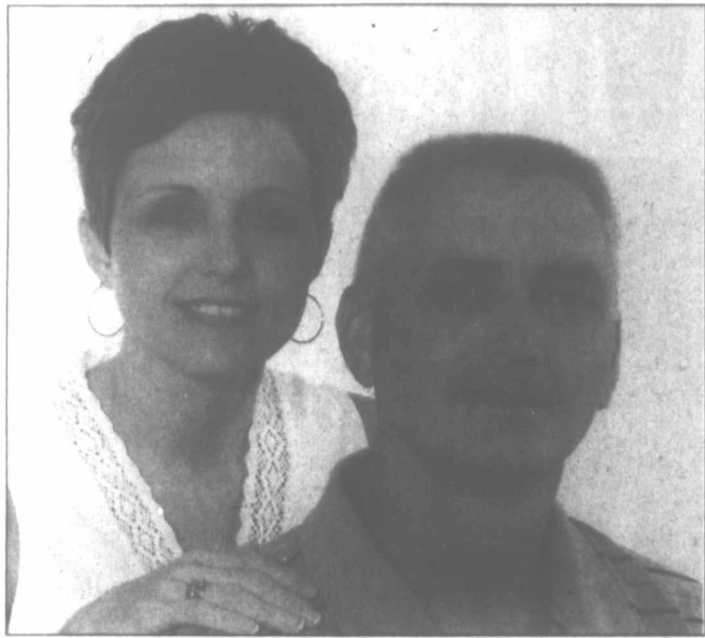

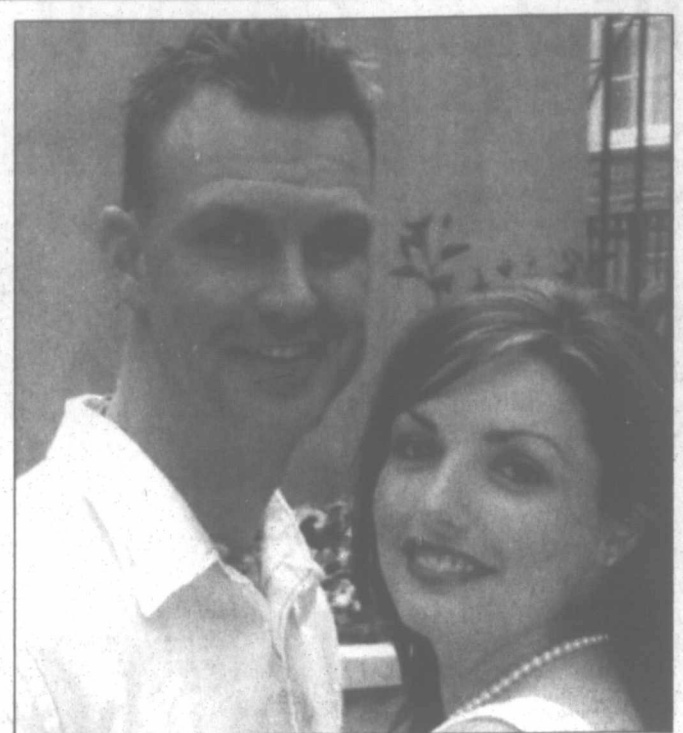

# DPS troopers seize drugs on I-40, arrest 5

AMARILLO — Area troopers made several huge seizures Thursday along Interstate 40 when three separate traffic stops yielded large amounts of both cocaine and marijuana along with the arrests of five subjects.

The first seizure occurred at 10 a.m., 7 miles west of Amarillo when a 1999 Toyota pickup was stopped for a traffic violation traveling eastbound on I-40. After consent of search the vehicle was given, troopers later found 5000 grams of cocaine worth an estimated \$280,000 hidden between the skid plate and gas tank of the vehicle.

Arrested and booked into the Potter County Detention Center were Rudy Ademar Alonzo-Soles, 30, of Easton, Md., and Orlando Miguel Rablero, 24, of Mesa, Ariz. It is believed the load originated in Arizona and was headed for Maryland.

The next seizure occurred at 1:25 p.m. three miles west of Groom when a 2004 Ford Explorer was stopped for a traffic violation traveling eastbound. After consent to search was given, troopers

found 10,000 grams of cocaine worth an estimated \$560,000 hidden in a hydraulically actuated compartment in the rear of the vehicle.

Arrested and booked into the Carson County Jail in Panhandle was Michael Joseph Daniels, 46, of Cranston, R.I. This load was believed to have originated in Tucson, Ariz., and was headed for Rhode Island.

The final seizure occurred at 6:22 p.m. when a 2002 Ford truck was stopped near Conway on I-40 traveling eastbound. After consent to search the vehicle was given, troopers located 13 bundles of marijuana weighing 301 pounds in a false compartment built under the flat bed of the truck. The marijuana is worth an estimated \$126,721.

Arrested and booked into the Carson County Jail in Panhandle were Jose Oscar Arceo, 36, of Birmingham, Ala., and Salvador Larranaga, 19, of San Diego, Calif. The drugs originated in Arizona and were headed for Birmingham.

## Buying cold medicine? Meth cops may get an e-mail

LONDON, Ky. (AP) — Detective Brian Lewis returns to his desk after lunch, scanning e-mails he missed.

One catches his eye: It says a suspected member of a methamphetamine ring bought a box of Sudafed at 1:34 p.m. at a CVS pharmacy.

Minutes later, Lewis is in his truck, circling the parking lot, searching for the woman.

Lewis did not find her that day, but the scenario illustrates the way law enforcement is increasingly relying on computerized tracking systems in their fight against meth, an illegal drug that is often brewed in makeshift labs and has become a particular scourge in Appalachia and the Midwest.

Tracking systems are gradually being installed in pharmacies nationwide in response to a federal law that, since March 2006, has regulated purchases of pseudoephedrine, a key ingredient in the manufacture of meth. Pseudoephedrine is found in many

over-the-counter cold and allergy medicines, such as Sudafed.

Under federal law, customers must show photo ID to buy pseudoephedrine, and the legal limit for purchases is 9 grams per month — roughly the equivalent of two 15-dose boxes of 24-hour Claritin D, or three 10-dose boxes of Aleve Cold & Sinus, or six 24-dose boxes of Sudafed.

Tracking systems like the one in use in Kentucky, MethCheck, automatically collect the buyer's name, address and age with a swipe of a driver's license or state-issued ID card.

Then the system notifies detectives via e-mail when a customer has exceeded the purchase limit. It also allows law enforcement to quickly spot suspicious patterns — for example, someone who might be trying to skirt the purchase limits by going from pharmacy to pharmacy and buying a few packages at a time.

An updated version of MethCheck eventually will enable law enforcement to track purchases by neighborhood or street. That

could help detectives spot instances in which a meth chemist enlists others in the neighborhood to buy pseudoephedrine for him, Lewis said.

In addition, the system can flag purchases by people already under suspicion among law enforcement authorities.

Kentucky is the first state to use MethCheck; it has been testing it out in Laurel County since mid-2005. MethCheck will be used at some 7,000 pharmacies in 43 states by next year, said to Rick Jones, spokesman for Louisville-based Appriss Inc., which developed MethCheck.

Lewis, who heads the MethCheck initiative at Operation UNITE, a federally funded drug task force in Kentucky, said he has used the system to build cases against dozens of people.

Consumer privacy watchdogs are troubled by the technology, worrying that people with colds or allergies could come under suspicion for unwittingly exceeding the purchasing limits by stocking up for themselves or family mem-

bers. That has happened to at least eight people in Kentucky, according to Lewis.

"People's health information — it's intimate, it's personal, it's something people desperately want to keep private," said Beth Wilson, executive director of the American Civil Liberties Union in Kentucky. "For law enforcement to do an investigation, there must be a reasonable suspicion. I'm not sure just the amount of medication justifies that."

Authorities said evidence from MethCheck only leads to preliminary interviews with police and is not enough to warrant an arrest.

"It's just an investigative tool," said Van Ingram of the Kentucky Office of Drug Control Policy. "During the course of any investigation, you're sometimes going to interview people who aren't guilty of wrongdoing but who are part of the investigative process."

CVS, the nation's largest pharmacy chain, is participating in the voluntary Kentucky program and plans to install MethCheck in most of its 6,200 stores across the

country by the fall.

"We wanted to make sure we were in compliance (with federal law) and have a solution that would be the least time-consuming for our customers and easiest for employees," CVS spokesman Mike DeAngelis said.

Arkansas started testing out another program, called Leads on Labs, in North Little Rock pharmacies last year.

The nation's largest retailer, Wal-Mart, said it is working to develop its own tracking system.

In Kentucky, the goal is to have some sort of electronic tracking in all of the state's 1,290 pharmacies by the fall, at a cost estimated at up to \$500,000. Under state law, pharmacies must employ electronic tracking if the state foots the bill.

Drugstore customers "put up a little bit of a fuss," said Amanda Hall, a pharmacy technician at a Kroger supermarket in London. "It's usually the legitimate ones who think they're being picked out of a crowd, but they're not."

## Summer camp participants overcome obstacles

TEMPLE, Texas (AP) — When 15-year-old Ebony Crichlow first mounted Aero for a ride around the arena, it was an act of courage. During much of the 20-minute ride her eyes were wide as saucers, her posture was stiff and she refused to take her hands off the horse's reins even to wave at friends.

But by the time Ebony — a cancer patient at Scott and White Memorial Hospital — finished, it was obvious she had overcome her fear of riding a horse.

"I think I'm definitely going to try and persuade my mom to get a horse," she said confidently. "I'm pretty persistent."

Overcoming obstacles is nothing new for Ebony, a Copperas Cove resident on outpatient medication for leukemia. Nor is it new for most other participants of Dream Catcher summer camp — a week-long segment of the nonprofit Camp for All — held recently near Burton.

For children fighting cancer and blood disorders, overcoming obstacles is what they do every day of their lives.

The Dream Catcher camp, sponsored by Scott and White, is for cancer and blood disorder patients

6 to 15 years old and a few healthy siblings.

According to Jenny Damron, child life specialist at Scott and White, it is a chance for children with something in common to get away from the sterile world of a hospital and share common experiences.

"This camp provides all of the normal activities they would experience at a summer camp but at the same time accommodating all of their special needs," Damron said.

The camp and its activities, Damron said, give the participants the opportunity to bond and help one another overcome the challenges they face.

And as with most summer camps, parents are conspicuously absent.

"One of the goals of our camp is to provide these children with some independence," she said. "In the world of hospitals they become so dependent on their parents and the medical staff, and this gives them a chance to be a little bit more independent, a little bit more autonomous, so they can gain confidence and self-esteem."

That self-confidence, she said, can result in a more successful struggle against the illnesses that

threaten the campers' lives.

Much of the encouragement comes as campers interact with each other.

"We have kids in varying stages of treatment — kids currently receiving chemotherapy (who) will receive chemotherapy while they are out here," Damron said. "We also have kids here that have been off of their treatments for several years."

"We find the blend of those different populations makes for a really neat experience, because those kids that have been through it are able to help those kids that are going through it right now."

Prior to riding Aero, Ebony — who's in her second year at the camp — stood several minutes next to the horse before she finally found the courage to mount. Her cabin mates urged her on.

"It was really scary," she said. "You just have to learn to trust the horse. And I've been working on trust issues so it was good for me. I just have difficulty putting my trust into people or things," she said.

She's also learned that trust is an important part of her treatments.

"It did take some time in the beginning," she said about her relationships with her doctors and

social workers, some of whom are counselors at the camp. "Just like it took some time to get to know the social workers. I didn't have that bond with them so I didn't trust them. But now I don't want them to leave my side."

The mutual support among campers is apparent at all of the events — from the archery range where young campers cheered after Drew Schmidt, 8, hit a target, to the 30-foot "challenge tower," where a scared young camper made it to the top after calls of encouragement from others.

Avianne McClendon, 8, of Waco, didn't need any such help. She scaled the wall easily and took a fast ride to the ground on a "zip line."

"Sliding down was the best part," she said, removing her harness and helmet. Avianne is in her second year at the camp and is fighting a brain tumor.

Damron said Dream Catcher summer camp also gives the counselors a chance to bond in a special way with the campers.

"We see them at their most vulnerable in the hospital and clinics and here we are able to see them in a normal atmosphere when they are just being kids," she said. "It helps

us get a better understanding of them as just 'children,' and not 'children with an illness.'"

She said that is especially important for doctors to get to know their young patients more personally.

"The kids say 'my doctor is a human,'" Damron said.

Some of the counselors were once campers themselves. For them, coming back is a calling.

Bryan Pycr, 20, worked at the camp a few weeks last year and could not resist returning.

"Once I came out here it was absolutely amazing," he said between shifts at the archery range. "A lot of the kids inspired me — taught me about life and to take what you have. They've taught me loads more than I could ever teach them."

Each year at the end of camp, a closing ceremony is held. As part of the ceremony each cabin comes up with a wish.

Unlike other summer camps where children might wish for a trip to Disneyland or a pony, the wishes coming from Camp for All participants often reflect their shared, common experience.

"They wish that their friends are all healthy enough to come back next year," she said.

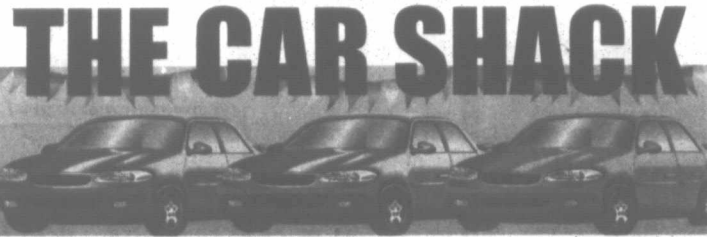
