Traffic light near Travis coming down

The traffic light at the intersection of 23rd Avenue and Wells Street, on the south side of Travis Elementary School, is on borrowed time.

It is scheduled to be removed soon and will not be replaced, according to Pampa Police Chief Trevlyn Pitner.

"Last year, we decided to remove that light and to make 23rd Avenue no parking in that area," Pitner said. Parallel parking spaces were marked along the street immediately east of the traffic light, beside the school.

The traffic light is confusing because it is at a three-way intersection, with

Primrose Lane connecting to 23rd Avenue less than half a block west of the light, Pitner said. Eastbound drivers on 23rd Avenue are often uncertain whether they are to stop at the intersection with Primrose or with Wells when the traffic light is red.

"It causes confusion and congestion," Pitner said.

Another problem with the light is that it is on a street which runs east and west. Depending on the position of the sun on a sunny day, drivers may find it difficult to see the old-style traffic light.

"We have monitored many, many people who have run that red light, mainly eastbound in the morning

County to consider 5-cent tax for CCPC

A five-cent maintenance tax to be used toward maintaining Clarendon College Pampa Center is on Friday's agenda for Gray County commissioners.

The meeting will begin at 9 a.m. in the second-floor courtroom of the county courthouse, 205 N. Russell.

The Pampa Center Foundation, which was formed in 1995 for the purpose of supporting the junior college's Pampa campus, has asked that the item be placed on the agenda. The possibility of levying the tax for the Pampa campus' maintenance is covered by Chapter 8 of the Texas Education Code.

Property tax rates are also on Friday's agenda. Commissioners will consider receiving petitions calling for an election to determine whether ad valorem tax rates on homestead property of persons 65 years of age or older, or disabled, may be frozen or capped in Gray County. If passed, the proposal would not affect property appraisal values, including increases in value.

The rate for renting a room at Gray County Annex, 12125 E. Frederic, will be reviewed. The room is available for rental by the public, and commissioners will consider adjusting the rate in

It's simple. Drink. Drive. Go to jail.

Texans planning to celebrate the last three-day weekend of the summer should know that the Texas Highway Patrol will be out in force looking for people who are driving while intoxicated. During the Labor Day weekend Friday through Sunday all available state troopers will be out on Texas roadways in support of the "Drink. Drive. Go to Jail." program.

"We are serious about enforcing this law," said Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr., director of the Texas Dept. of Public Safety. "Too many innocent people are killed every year in this state when drivers choose to consume alcohol and then operate a motor vehicle. We intend to do our part to find those intoxicated drivers and get them off the road."

It is illegal in Texas to operate a motor vehicle with a breath alcohol content of 0.08 or above. During the Labor Day weekend in 2006, DPS troopers arrested 887 people across the state for driving while intoxicated.

The Texas Department of Transportation reports that Texas continues to lead the nation in alcohol-related traffic fatalities. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports that impaired driving is a contributing factor in almost half of all Texas fatal traffic crashes.

The punishment for a DWI conviction:

First offense: Fine not to exceed \$2,000 and/or a jail term of 72 hours to 180 days; participation in an alcohol education and treatment program even if probation is granted; license suspension from three months to 1 year.

Second Offense: Fine up to \$4,000 and/or jail term of 30 days to one year; mandatory 72 hours in jail even if probation is granted; license suspension from six months to two years.

Third Offense: Fine not to exceed \$10,000; prison term of two years to 10 years; mandatory jail term of 10 days even if probation is granted; license suspension from six months to two years.

Intoxication manslaughter: Fine up to \$10,000, prison term of two to 20 years, license suspension from six months to two years.

DPS also is a participant in Operation CARE-Combined Accident Reduction Effort—a nationwide effort by police agencies to reduce fatalities on major interstate highways during holiday weekends.

In addition to intoxicated drivers, troopers will be looking for speeders and those who are not wearing seatbelts as required by law.

Two of three jailbreakers back in custody

SHAWNEE, Okla. (AP) — Two inmates who escaped from the Pottawatomie County Jail were back in custody today, while a search continued for the third escaped inmate, authorities said.
 Brandon Charles Farnell, 24, of Konowa was arrested about 1:30 a.m. today at a home near Shawnee, the Oklahoma Highway Patrol reported. Four other people at the home were being questioned and could be charged in connection with the inci-

dent, authorities said.
 Oklahoma Highway Patrol troopers and members of the Texas Department of Public Safety and the Texas Rangers arrested Joseph Ray Henson, 30, about 7 p.m. Wednesday night, OHP trooper Kera Philippi said.
 Henson was discovered at a motel in Wichita Falls, Texas, but Philippi said she wasn't authorized to say what led to the Shawnee resident's capture.
 A third inmate, Harley Davidson Scott, 26, of Norman, was still missing today.

Henson was serving time on child abuse charges when jail officials noticed he and Farnell were missing about 9:45 a.m. Tuesday, Philippi said.

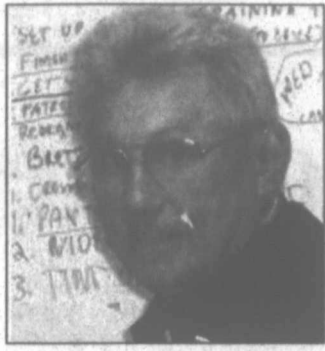
The other day I came to work and found a report on my desk about a resident being asked for his Medicare and Social Security number.

Economy surges 4% despite housing woes

WASHINGTON (AP) — The economy grew at its strongest pace in more than a year during the spring as solid improvements in international trade and business investment helped offset weakness in housing.

The gross domestic product, the broadest measure of economic health, expanded at an annual rate of 4 percent in the April-June quarter, significantly higher than the 3.4 percent rate the government had initially estimated a month ago, the Commerce Department reported Thursday.

But the growth spurt could be short-lived. There are concerns that the recent turmoil in financial markets, a result of a spreading credit crisis, could seriously dampen economic activity in the second half of this year.

GDP growth may have slowed to just above 2 percent in the current quarter and many analysts believe

growth will slow even further in the final three months of this year as the full impact of the recent market turmoil is felt.

The worry is that the roller coaster ride in stocks and spreading credit problems will shake consumer and business confidence and cause cutbacks in spending and hiring plans.

However, analysts believe the Federal Reserve will act to avert a full-blown recession. If financial turmoil persists, they think the Fed will wield its major policy tool, cutting its target for the federal funds rate, the interest that banks charge each other. That rate has been at 5.25 percent for more than a year, but investors are starting to hope that the Fed will begin reducing it in quarter-point moves starting at their next meeting on Sept. 18.

The Fed on Aug. 17 cut a less economically significant rate, its discount rate, and

has injected billions of dollars into the banking system in an effort to keep credit markets operating in the face of the turmoil. Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke may offer hints about the Fed's next policy moves when he delivers remarks at a Fed conference on Friday.

In other economic news, the Labor Department reported that the number of newly laid off workers filing for unemployment benefits rose to 334,000 last week, an increase of 9,000 from the

previous week. That gain caught analysts by surprise. They had been expecting a decline of around 2,000.

Sprawling spider web engulfs North Texas park trail

WILLS POINT, Texas (AP) — Entomologists are debating the origin and rarity of a sprawling spider web that blankets several trees, shrubs and the ground along a 200-yard stretch of trail in a North Texas park.

Officials at Lake Tawakoni State Park say the

massive mosquito trap is a big attraction for some visitors, while others won't go anywhere near it.

"At first, it was so white it looked like fairyland," said Donna Garde, superintendent of the park about 45 miles east of Dallas. "Now it's filled with so many mos-

quitoes that it's turned a little brown. There are times you can literally hear the screech of millions of mosquitoes caught in those webs."

Spider experts say the web may have been constructed by social cobweb spiders, which work together, or could be the result of a mass dispersal in which the arachnids spin webs to spread out from one another.

"I've been hearing from entomologists from Ohio, Kansas, British Columbia — all over the place," said Mike Quinn, an invertebrate biologist with the Texas Parks and Wildlife

Department who first posted photos online.

Herbert A. "Joe" Pase, a Texas Forest Service entomologist, said the massive web is very unusual.

"From what I'm hearing it could be a once-in-a-lifetime event," he said.

But John Jackman, a professor and extension entomologist for Texas A&M University, said he hears reports of similar webs every couple of years.

and westbound in the afternoon," Pitner said. Monday morning, we watched eight people run that red light.

"It is a dangerous location for that type of light. To have a proper traffic light on a four-lane street, you really need proper lights overhead with the proper technology," he said. The technology would include sensors to control when the light is red or green, and new-style lights that are brighter and more vivid.

The cost of such technology would require at least \$60,000 for the traffic light, Pitner said.

Cost aside, the traffic light at the school is "not feasible and too confusing," he said.

"We relied on the light to help slow people down," Pitner said. "To help offset not having it, we put up new school zone signs with flashing amber lights that

are solar-powered." No plans are being made to remove the traffic light in the 1900 block of Duncan Avenue at Austin Elementary School.

"It is at a squared-off three-way intersection and is not a hazard since Duncan runs north and south," Pitner said.

Austin and Wilson Elementary Schools may get new school zone lights, however.

"We may improve the school zone lights at Austin in the next year or so and have the newer-style lights," Pitner said. "Wilson will be next after Austin."

Currently, a single flashing amber light is located at either end of the school zone in front of Austin Elementary. The amber lights are suspended over Duncan Avenue.

No improvements are currently planned for traffic and school zone lights at Lamar Elementary School.

"It doesn't have the problems the other schools have in regard to traffic," Pitner said.

He cautions drivers that

police officers are strictly enforcing traffic laws at each of Pampa's school zones, including rules concerning making turns and parking. Eastbound drivers on 23rd Avenue are prohibited from turning left into a parking area at Pampa Junior High School, and there are "No Left Turn" signs erected along the street at that location.

"We have zero tolerance on speed," Pitner said. Parking issues include parking where it is prohibited, double parking and parking with the vehicle pointed in the direction opposite to that of the traffic flow in the adjacent lane.

"It's the drivers' responsibility to help the traffic flow," Pitner said. "Pampa's in a period of growth. Years ago, when the schools were built, things were different than they are now."

"We ask that the drivers help us, and help protect the kids. Please be aware that children could be present. Watch for them whenever you are within a few blocks of the schools."

Atheists target state pledge of allegiance

I would like to applaud the Texas attorney general and a federal court for not caving in to pressure applied by atheists who recently attempted to have "one state under God" exorcised from the state pledge.

The attempt to acid-wash

The suit was filed in U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Texas.

"With today's ruling," the AG's press release quotes Abbott as saying, "a federal judge denied the plaintiffs'

attempt to prevent Texas schoolchildren from pledging their allegiance to 'one state under God' — just as they pledge to 'one nation under God.' The United States Supreme Court has repeatedly held patriotic acknowledgments of the Almighty such as these are completely consis-

tent with the U.S. Constitution. Texans can rest assured that we will continue vigorously defending their children's ability to recite the state Pledge of Allegiance each morning."

"The state contends," the press release continues past the quote, "the Texas Pledge

is an acknowledgment of patriotism and citizenship. It is a practice that mirrors the Declaration of Independence's self-evident truths that citizens are 'endowed by their creator with certain inalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.' The Attorney General's brief argues that, instead of conflicting with the First Amendment, the Pledge reflects the constitutionally protected freedom

of religion." Well, amen.

The Texas pledge is recited by schoolchildren on a voluntary basis. Note to atheists: Why not simply tell your children not to participate in the pledge if you find the very mention of God so objectionable? Why try to force YOUR God-less bias on an entire state of parents and their schoolchildren?

Today's Highlight in History:
Ten years ago, on Aug. 30, 1997, came reports of the car crash in Paris that claimed the lives of Princess Diana, Dodi Fayed and their driver, Henri Paul. (Because of the time difference, it was Aug. 31 when the crash actually occurred.)

On this date:
In 1797, the creator of "Frankenstein," Mary Wollstonecraft Shelley, was born in London.

In 1861, Union Gen. John C. Fremont instituted martial law in Missouri and declared slaves there to be free. (However, Fremont's order was countermanded days later by President Lincoln.)

In 1862, Union forces were defeated by the Confederates at the Second Battle of Bull Run in Manassas, Va.

In 1905, Ty Cobb made his major-league debut as a player for the

Detroit Tigers, hitting a double in his first at-bat in a game against the New York Highlanders. (The Tigers won, 5-3.)

In 1945, Gen. Douglas MacArthur arrived in Japan to set up Allied occupation headquarters.

In 1963, the "Hot Line" communications link between Washington and Moscow went into operation.

In 1967, the Senate confirmed the appointment of Thurgood Marshall as the first black justice on the U.S. Supreme Court.

In 1983, Guion S. Bluford Jr. became the first black American astronaut to travel in space, blasting off aboard the Challenger.

In 1987, a redesigned space shuttle booster, created in the wake of the Challenger disaster, roared into life in its first full-scale test-firing near Brigham City, Utah.

In 1991, Azerbaijan declared its independence, joining the stampede of republics seeking to secede from the Soviet Union.

Ten years ago: Philip Noel Johnson, an armored car driver who had stolen \$18.8 million, was arrested at the Texas border. (Johnson was later sentenced to 25 years in prison.)

Five years ago: With just hours to spare, baseball averted a strike; it was the first time since 1970 that players and owners had agreed to a new collective bargaining agreement without a work stoppage. Movie director J. Lee Thompson ("The Guns of Navarone") died in Sooke, British Columbia, at age 88.

One year ago: Hurricane John lashed tourist resorts with heavy winds and rain as the dangerous Category 4 storm marched up Mexico's Pacific coast. Actor Glenn Ford died in Beverly Hills, Calif., at age 90.

Naguib Mahfouz, the first Arab writer to win the Nobel Prize in literature, died in Cairo, Egypt, at age 94.

Today's Birthdays: Country singer Kitty Wells is 88. Opera singer Regina Resnik is 85. Actor Bill Daily is 80. Actress Elizabeth Ashley is 68. Actor Ben Jones is 66. Cartoonist R. Crumb is 64. Skier Jean-Claude Killy is 64. Actress Peggy Lipton is 60. Comedian Lewis Black is 59.



Instant messaging hot way to communicate

I remember when the Internet existed only for e-mail. Communication was limited to sending text messages from computer-to-computer. While faster than the U.S. Postal Service, it was hardly "real-time communication." For some time now, sophisticated software has taken real-time communication to the next level: Instant Messengers.

An instant messenger is a program that runs on your system all of the time. When you are online, it notifies you when your friends go online. Of course, your friends, also using the instant messenger, are notified that you are online. But that's not all. The programs allow you and your friends to communicate directly, either through text, voice or video.

Basically, six major instant messengers exist today: America Online Instant Messenger (AIM), Microsoft Instant Messenger, ICQ, Jabber, Yahoo, and Trillian Basic. All of them are free, but

offer different features. **A I M** (<http://www.aim.com>)

By far, the most popular instant messenger is AIM. However, before you immediately go out there and download it, understand why they wear that title. By default, all AOL users have built-in instant messaging (whether they use it or not).

Therefore, AOL can claim the largest user base. Most people end up getting AIM, though, because of one little important fact: Most instant messengers do NOT interoperate with instant messengers made by other companies. In other words, if your friend is on ICQ and you are on AIM, you cannot chat. A few exceptions exist, but I'll get to that later.

Windows Live Messenger (<http://messenger.msn.com>)

With the advent of Windows XP and Vista,

Microsoft is working overtime to become the dominant instant messenger. If you have a copy of Windows on your system, you will immediately notice that MSN IM is automatically loaded. However, using it requires that you have a Microsoft Passport. Basically, this Passport is a secure way of verifying your identity to your friends and online retailers. Some are concerned about the

"privacy" issue on this one, though. Exactly WHAT is Microsoft doing with all of that personal information?

ICQ (<http://icq.com>)

One of the best known instant messengers is ICQ (<http://www.icq.com>). The name is actually a play on words. "ICQ" sounds like "I Seek You." ICQ was originally developed by an Israeli company named Mirabilis, which was then bought by AOL. So, yes, that means

AOL owns AIM and ICQ, keep expecting them to merge the two, but it hasn't happened yet.

Jabber (<http://www.jabber.com>)

More and more companies are setting up their own internal instant messaging solutions. Only Jabber has taken advantage of this trend by offering a turnkey server. The machine with a 25-user license runs around \$1,800. The Jabber client (program employees use) is nothing to write home about, though.

Y a h o o (<http://messenger.yahoo.com>)

When Yahoo entered this market years ago, they made quite a splash by being one of the first companies to offer free video conferencing. Today, they are pushing their free PC-to-PC calls. I've tried it and am quite impressed. Their program also has a very neat feature that lets you drag and drop photos onto your buddy icons to quickly get them delivered. One of their

El Paso Times on passport delays:

If you're trying to get a passport, you've noticed that the passport mess is getting even messier, though a month or so ago that wouldn't have seemed possible.

A rule that took effect in January of this year mandates that U.S. citizens traveling by air to Canada, Mexico and the Caribbean must have passports. Currently, that same restriction is scheduled to go into effect next year for all land and sea crossings.

You'd think that the State Department, which issues passports,

would have been prepared for a deluge of applications. Unfortunately, that wasn't the case.

People who were looking at a "normal" wait of about six weeks saw that jump to 12 weeks or more. Just imagine what that did to the vacation or business-travel plans of people who thought they'd have their passports in time — and didn't.

But just when it seems things can't get much worse, they do.

At one time people who needed passports quickly and would pony up an extra \$60 could receive those passports in about a week. Now that "expedited" service is expected to take about three weeks (or more) as regular service is taking 10-12 weeks.

U.S. Rep. Steven LaTourette, an

Ohio Republican, said, "What color is the sky in their world? I can't believe they're proposing a rule where they want to charge you the same amount and in return you're virtually guaranteed to get worse service."

The State Department was caught totally unprepared for the surge in passport applications that almost anyone could have forecast. Now the department is approaching another critical time when the rules will be changed once again, and another surge in applications can be expected.

The department should be preparing right now for another spike in passport applications. Taxpayers have a right to expect better organization, preparedness and efficiency than they've received so far.

Oswalt strikes out 9, Cooper gets 1st win, 7-0 over Cardinals

HOUSTON (AP) — Thanks to Roy Oswalt, Cecil Cooper's second game as the Houston Astros' manager went much better than his first.

Oswalt allowed four hits and struck out nine in seven dominant innings as the Astros beat the St. Louis Cardinals 7-0 on Wednesday night, Cooper's first win since replacing Phil Garner on Monday.

Lance Berkman and Luke Scott hit solo homers, Berkman added an RBI double off St. Louis starter Kip Wells and Houston won for just the third time in nine games.

The Cardinals, who

remained two games back in the NL Central, lost for the third time in nine games after getting back to .500 for the first time since April 16 on Tuesday. Manager Tony La Russa was ejected in the ninth by plate umpire Tim Tschida in the ninth for arguing balls and strikes.

Oswalt (14-6), who turned 30 on Wednesday, also had an RBI single and won for the sixth time in seven starts. He came into the game with a 1.18 ERA in his last six outings and showed no ill effects from a strained oblique muscle that forced him to miss a start last Thursday.

He struck out four of the

last six hitters he faced and allowed only one baserunner to reach second.

Wells (6-15) lost his second straight decision and gave up two homers for the second time in three starts. He allowed five runs and nine hits with two strikeouts in six innings.

Garner was fired on Monday and Cooper promised to make lineup changes after losing 7-0 in his managerial debut. He moved Hunter Pence to the top spot in the batting order on Wednesday and dropped usual leadoff man Craig Biggio to No. 2.

Bad knee gives Nadal fits at U.S. Open; Federer-Isner coming in 3rd round

NEW YORK (AP) — Playing on a taped-up knee so painful he almost pulled out of the U.S. Open, Rafael Nadal was hardly at his imposing best Wednesday.

It was a struggle to sprint, and he scuffled against a foe who never has won a Grand Slam match, let alone a title. On a day when his rival, No. 1 Roger Federer, won easily, three-time French Open winner Nadal hardly looked ready to flourish at Flushing Meadows, where his career mark is worse than at any other major.

To improve on that, Nadal will need to recover quickly and perform better than he did before eventually earning a 7-5, 3-6, 6-4, 6-1 first-round victory over Australian wild-card entry Alun Jones, whose claim to fame is a bit part in the film "Wimbledon."

"I didn't run too much, no? I can't move too much,"

the No. 2-seeded Nadal said. "Difficult to play like this, especially here."

Federer had no difficulty at all Wednesday night, when he was dressed for a formal affair as he bids to become the first man since the 1920s to claim four consecutive U.S. championships. He strode out for his 6-1, 6-4, 6-4 victory over Paul Capdeville in black, head-to-toe: bandanna, wrist band, shirt, shorts, socks and shoes. The shorts even had satin stripes down the sides.

"A little bit of the tuxedo look," Federer said. "It's something special."

The only real fight Capdeville put up was directed at the chair umpire, who wouldn't let him challenge a call at the end of the second set because the replay request came too late.

Now Federer faces a much taller task: His third-round opponent is John

Isner, the 6-foot-9 American who only a few months ago was playing college tennis for Georgia. With fans barking for their favorite Bulldog, Isner followed up his first-round upset of No. 26 Jarkko Nieminen by beating Rik de Voest of South Africa 6-3, 6-3, 7-6 (4).

During an on-court interview, Isner was asked to look ahead to the matchup with Federer.

"Is he good?" Isner said with a knowing laugh.

Like Federer, other past U.S. Open champions in action won in straight sets: Venus and Serena Williams, Justine Henin and Marat Safin. Nadal would love to join that club, and he and Federer have been building quite a rivalry, combining to corral the last 10 Grand Slam titles and meeting in four of the past six major finals.

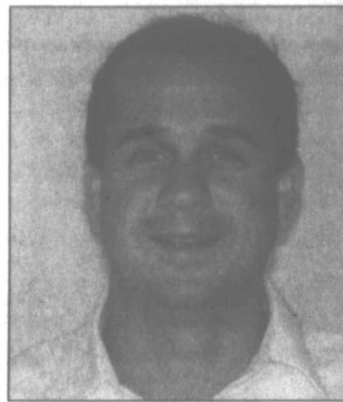

Arkansas State has a few with Texas connections

LITTLE ROCK (AP) — Montis Harrison could be a marked man this weekend when the Arkansas State defensive back takes the field at No. 4 Texas.

It seems Harrison grew up in Houston — and was a Texas A&M fan.

"I was against Texas my whole life," Harrison said Wednesday.

Harrison will be against the Longhorns again Saturday night when the Indians face them in the season opener in Austin, Texas. He's one of a handful of Arkansas State players from the Lone Star State who are looking forward to the trip.

"I haven't been home in a long time," Harrison said. "I'm just ready to get back in the Texas atmosphere."

The Indians aren't going just to enjoy the scenery. The program has made strides in recent years under coach Steve Roberts. Arkansas State played in the New Orleans Bowl in 2005 and has gone 6-6 each of the last two seasons — solid marks for a Sun Belt Conference team that is no stranger to playing big-name nonconference opponents on the road.

Roberts' first game at Arkansas State was a 63-7 loss at Virginia Tech in

2002. Recently, the Indians have been more competitive against teams from top conferences. Arkansas State lost at Ole Miss 28-21 in 2004, and fell at Oklahoma State 20-10 the following season.

Unlike those two teams, this weekend's opponent is a legitimate national championship contender, but the Indians are looking forward to testing themselves. Defensive lineman Prince Hickman is from Dallas, and he says his team intends to do more than just show up.

"It's going to be a business trip too," he said. Like Harrison, Hickman

wasn't a big Longhorns fan growing up — but he wasn't necessarily rooting for their rivals either.

"I really wasn't into football growing up," Hickman said. "I played it, I just really wasn't into it college-wise."

This week Hickman will face a couple players he knew growing up — offensive lineman Cedric Dockery and wide receiver Philip Payne.

"It's going to be fun going to Austin," Hickman said. "It's going to be fun being around some of the people that I grew up with on the Texas team."

Richard Jewell, former security guard wrongly linked to 1996 Olympic bombing, found dead

ATLANTA (AP) — Security guard Richard Jewell was initially hailed as a hero for spotting a suspicious backpack and moving people out of harm's way just before a bomb exploded, killing one and injuring 111 others. But within days, he was named as a suspect in the blast.

Though eventually cleared in the 1996 Centennial Olympic Park bombing, Jewell, who was found dead Wednesday at 44, never recovered from the shame of being wrongly linked to the bombing in the news media. Finally, a year ago, he was again hailed as a hero.

Gov. Sonny Perdue commended Jewell at a bombing anniversary event. "This is what I think is the right thing to do," Perdue declared as he handed a certificate to Jewell.

"I never expected this day to ever happen. I'm just glad

that it did," Jewell said.

It was one of his last good days. Jewell, who had diabetes and kidney problems and was recently on dialysis, was found dead in his west Georgia home. An autopsy was scheduled for Thursday, though officials said foul play was not suspected.

After the Olympics, Jewell worked in various law enforcement jobs, including as a police officer in Pendergrass, Ga., where his partner was fatally shot during the pursuit of a suspect.

As recently as last year, Jewell was working as a sheriff's deputy in west Georgia. He also gave speeches to college journalism classes about his experience.

For two days after the July 27, 1996, bombing, Jewell was hailed as a hero for shepherding people away from the suspicious backpack.

Ex-Duke lacrosse prosecutor faces contempt charge over handling of case, pleads not guilty

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) — Disgraced former prosecutor Mike Nifong pleaded not guilty Thursday to criminal contempt charges stemming from his failure to turn over complete DNA testing results during the now-discredited Duke lacrosse rape case.

If found in contempt,

Nifong could face up to 30 days in jail.

As Durham County district attorney, Nifong led the investigation into a woman's allegations that she was raped at a 2006 lacrosse team party where she was hired as a stripper. He won indictments against three lacrosse players, but

eventually recused himself from the case, and state prosecutors dropped all remaining charges, saying the players were innocent victims of a "tragic rush to accuse."

Defense attorneys for the three falsely accused young men asked a judge to punish Nifong for initially telling

the court he had turned over all DNA test results when he knew, and failed to disclose, that genetic material from multiple men was found on the accuser — but none from any lacrosse player.

Nifong's attorney, Jim Glover, said Nifong never intentionally tried to mislead the court.

Rangers overcome 4 errors to beat White Sox 5-4 in 11 innings

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Sammy Sosa is still having a big impact for the Texas Rangers, even though he's not in the lineup very much anymore.

Chicago White Sox manager Ozzie Guillen just keeps getting more frustrated.

Sosa had a game-tying pinch-hit RBI double in the seventh inning and won the game with a sacrifice fly in the 11th, as Texas beat the White Sox 5-4 on Wednesday night.

"I know the situation right now is not the way that I want it," said Sosa, who has started only 10 of the last 28 games. "What I have to do is just be patient. Any opportunity I get, I'm going to do the best I can."

While the Rangers won their fourth straight game, the White Sox managed only five hits — none in the last five innings against five Texas relievers — and lost for the 15th time in 18 games.

"It's embarrassing day in and day out to do the same stuff," Guillen said. "People are blaming our pitching staff, but the offense comes along and puts more dirt on the grave. Everyone in that room should look in the mirror and be embarrassed."

Less than two years after winning the World Series, the White Sox (57-76) are in last place in the AL Central. "We've got a \$100 million payroll and they don't show it on the field," Guillen said. "If this keeps up, bring on the Double-A kids. They're killing me. They're killing my family, my coaching staff and the White Sox fans. I hope they care the way we care. I'm tired of seeing this (expletive) every day."

With the Rangers on their way to a seventh losing record in eight seasons, they are evaluating younger players. That means fewer playing chances for Sosa, the 38-year-old slugger who earlier this season joined

the 600-homer club. Sosa hit a fly ball to center in the 11th and Jerry Owens made a diving catch, but the fielder had no chance to get up and throw Ian Kinsler out at the plate.

Kinsler reached with one out on a fly ball that dropped several feet in front a sliding Owens, who played while Jermaine Dye got a night off. Michael Young followed with a double into the left-field corner off Boone Logan (2-1), who then intentionally walked Marlon Byrd to load the bases for Sosa.

"Any guy in his situation wouldn't be happy with what transpired, but he didn't hang his head and he told us he'd help us any way he can," manager Ron Washington said. "When he does make contact he can do damage. He can find a way to get RBIs."

Sosa still leads Texas with 76 RBIs. Jim Thome went 3-for-5 with a pair of run-scoring singles for the White Sox, who have lost 15 of 18 games.

Thome had reached base in 16 consecutive plate appearances against Texas before taking a called third strike leading off the eighth and grounding into a double play in the 10th. Thome is 8-for-11 with 11 walks in the five-game season series.

Wes Littleton (2-1), the sixth Rangers pitcher, threw a perfect 11th for the win.

Sosa's double in the seventh tied the game at 4 when Byrd scored. Byrd drew a one-out walk and extended the Rangers' team record to 20 consecutive stolen bases — since Byrd was caught July 5.

The White Sox didn't score after having two on with no outs in the ninth. Andy Gonzalez walked and Darin Erstad, in an 0-for-14 slump, reached on a sacrifice bunt when Frank Francisco bobbled the ball. After another sac bunt, Francisco struck out the last two batters.

GOP lawmakers calling for Craig's resignation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Idaho Sen. Larry Craig is finding himself increasingly isolated from his political allies as more Republicans call for him to resign over his arrest in an airport men's room.

A spokesman for Craig denied widespread speculation in Washington that the three-term senator — up for reelection next year — was preparing to quit. Sidney Smith said Wednesday he had heard no such discussion.

Republican Senate leaders pushed Craig from senior committee positions. A White House spokesman expressed disappointment in the 62-

year-old lawmaker, who pleaded guilty earlier this month to a charge stemming from an undercover police operation last June in a Minneapolis airport restroom.

Others in the GOP were more harsh. "Senator Craig pled guilty to a crime involving conduct unbecoming a senator," said Sen. Norm Coleman, R-Minn. "He should resign."

Craig "represents the Republican Party," said Rep. Pete Hoekstra of Michigan, who called the behavior unacceptable and was the first in a steadily lengthening list of GOP members of Congress calling on Craig to quit.

Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., also urged Craig to step down, as did a handful of Republican House members, including Jeff Miller and Ginny Brown-Waite of Florida, Mark Souder of Indiana, Bobby Jindal of Louisiana and Ron Lewis of Kentucky.

One GOP senator who did not call for Craig to resign — Missouri's Kit Bond — said he was praying for Craig and his family but still called Craig's conduct intolerable.

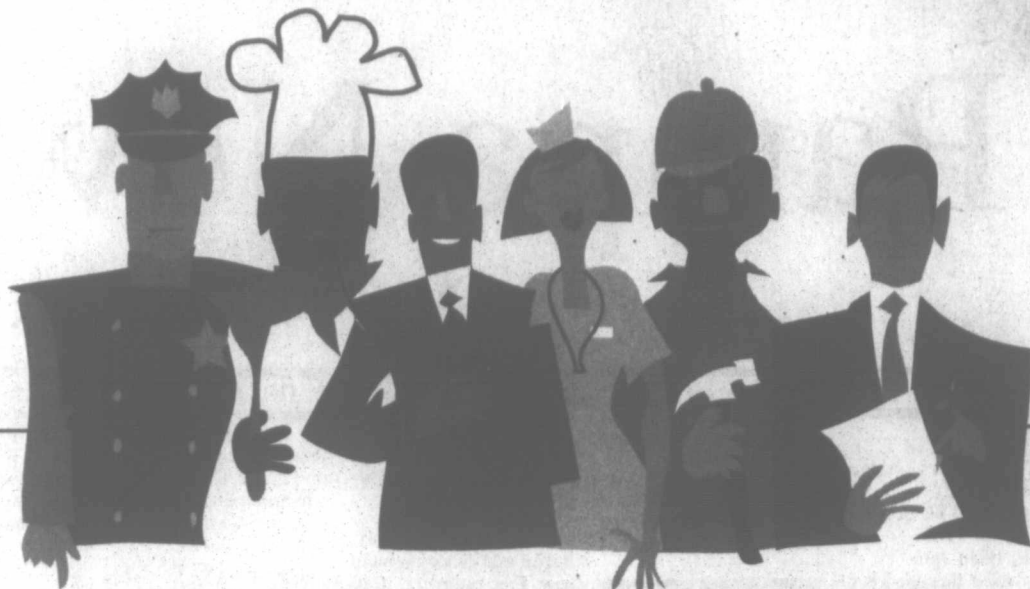
"It is unacceptable for a member of Congress to be soliciting sex in public restrooms," Bond said.

Craig's spokesman Smith said the GOP lawmakers "have a right to express themselves," but added, "We're not going to get into an argument on that right now."

Craig is cooperating with Senate leaders by stepping aside as the senior Republican on the Veteran Affairs committee and from his position on two subcommittees, Smith said.

Craig said Tuesday he had committed no wrongdoing and shouldn't have pleaded guilty. He said he had only recently retained a lawyer to advise him in the case, which threatens to write an ignominious end to a lifetime in public office.

GOP Senate leaders said they did not act lightly in asking Craig to give up his leadership posts temporarily. But they said their decision was "in the best interest of the Senate until this situation is resolved by the ethics committee."

cheesiest features is IM environments. Basically, it's stationary for your instant messages. It puts graphics and animations behind your conversations.

Trillian Basic (<http://www.trillian.cc>)

Of all the Instant Messengers I have come in contact with, the one I use the most (and exclusively) is Trillian Basic. Unlike other programs, it is completely interoperable with all of the other Instant Messengers. And, Trillian's interface is much easier to use (and look at).

As an aside, remember that in order to use the voice or video communication features of these programs, both computers must have a Webcam, sound card, microphone and speakers. Fast Internet access is also advised, but not critical. Today's compression techniques allow even slow Internet connections to have good audio/video quality.

Regardless of which instant messenger you choose, you'll open a brand new world of communication options. If you use them enough, the savings, in long distance charges alone, will pay for your Internet Access.
