





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

Water districts meet to talk about achieving harmony

AMARILLO -- It's been slightly more than two years since the Texas Legislature mandated that groundwater management areas establish the desired future condition of the aquifers in their regions, but Groundwater Management Area 1 here has yet to reach a consensus of what they want that condition to be.

Still, C.E. Williams, general manager of the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District and chairman of Region Water Planning Group A, said this week he thinks the water districts in the groundwater management area are making progress.

PISD addresses dress code violators

Pampa Independent School Board members met Thursday evening and approved numerous financial reports, discussed construction, talked to students who have dress code violations and talked to the owner of land that will be donated to the district at their regular meeting.

Board members approved the spring sports bids, the quarterly financial report, the annual investment report and the budget amendment after hearing reports. One item that was discussed and tabled until a later date is the purchase of more buses for the district.

A report was given for the number of dress code violations at the campuses from Aug. 15 through Oct. 11. Austin and Lamar Elementaries did not have

any violations to report. Travis had two violations for hair and Wilson had one violation for hair. Pampa Learning Center, which follows the dress code as the other schools, had two violations and one of those was for inappropriate writing on shirts.

The junior high school had 40 violations with two of those being for writing on shirts. The school with the highest number of violations was the high school, which reported 82 with seven of those for writing on shirts. Board members met in executive session with a few students who have had three or more violations and their parents. No action was taken outside of executive session.

The board approved a bid from West Texas Landscape for \$11,250 to relocate 17

Chisum to help open Caprock Canyons visitor center

QUITAQUE — The public is invited to join State Rep. Warren Chisum, R-Pampa, Texas Parks and Wildlife commissioner Mark E. Bivins of Amarillo and other representatives of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department on Saturday for a day-long celebration of the opening of the new 4,440 square-foot Visitor Center at Caprock Canyons State Park.

The Frontier Regiment of the 4th Cavalry will salute the opening during a 2 p.m. ribbon-cutting of the \$1 million Visitor Center to be attended by Chisum, Bivins and other TPWD officials. The celebration also marks the 25th anniversary of the Panhandle park's opening.

Festivities kick off at 9 a.m. with a Dutch oven cooking demonstration, followed by a tour of the bison working pens, "Ramblings of a Bison Hunter," musical entertainment and a noon lunch that includes buffalo burgers and beverages. Throughout the day there also will be children's activities, living history demonstrations and hourly driving tours of the

park. The cooking and living history demonstrations will repeat during the afternoon. A slide show, "25 years at Caprock Canyons" at 6:30 p.m. in the park pavilion will conclude the Saturday celebration.

The \$1 million Visitor Center is part of a major park project that also includes a new group meeting pavilion, adjacent bison viewing platform overlooking the Texas State Bison Herd pasture, wayside signage, a parking lot and 24-hour restrooms. The Visitor Center houses a State Park Store, 24-hour restrooms, storage space, lobby/registration area and park administrative offices. Exhibits to be installed next spring inside and outside the center will interpret outstanding natural and cultural features.

In addition, the project includes a park map with wayfinding information, interpretive panels on bison conservation at the overlook and panels offering in-depth interpretation of park geology, selected park

Tulsa man defends sale of dog collars

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) amount for damages. — A Tulsa businessman who uses the words "BARK-STRONG' and

"PURRSTRONG" on pet collars claims a federal lawsuit filed by the Lance Armstrong Foundation to stop the sale of the collars is frivolous.

Chris Ohman, founder of Animal Charity Collar Group Inc., filed a counterclaim this week to the Armstrong Foundation's lawsuit that was filed in federal district court in Austin, Texas.

The Armstrong foundation claims the collars infringe on its trademarks for "LIVESTRONG" and is seeking an unspecified

"We have no intention of the Lance harming Armstrong Foundation in any way, monetarily or in public opinion," Ohman said. "However, we don't have a choice at this point but to defend ourselves and our position."

In his counterclaim, Ohman seeks a stay on the Armstrong lawsuit pending a ruling on patent protection for the "BARKSTRONG" "PURRSTRONG" trademarks and asks the judge to declare he is not infringing on the Armstrong trademarks. Ohman also is seeking an unspecified damage award from the founda-

6 dead after violent storms hit

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Powerful in the parking lot," Pastor Lonnie D. thunderstorms and high winds that moved through much of the country sent a mobile home in Missouri flying, destroyed homes in Michigan and collapsed a trailer in Kentucky. Six people were killed.

In Washington state, where one of the deaths occurred, a floating bridge buffeted by powerful wind was closed, and tens of thousands of homes and businesses lost electricity.

The Midwest storms, unusually strong for October, left downed trees, power outages and debris in their paths as they struck Thursday and early Friday. Conditions were expected to transition into cooler temperatures and clear skies today.

The storms spawned a tornado in Pensacola, Fla., that sent mall shoppers and children at a day care center running for cover. Downtown Chicago was pelted with hail during rush hour and tornadoes touched down in Kentucky and Michigan, officials

Children at the Greater Little Rock Baptist Church's daycare center were moved to safety just before the twister hit Thursday morning, said Escambia County sheriff's spokesman Glenn Austin. The pastor and an employee at the center said they had little time to react.

"The phone call I received simply said, 'Pastor, it looks like the roof of the church is

Wesley III told NBC's "Today" today. "As soon as I made it to the church, the first words out of my mouth were, 'My Lord."' Eddie English Jr., a department store

stock manager, said he heard the wind outside the store suddenly speed up and get louder. Then mall security guards entered the store and ordered 200 to 300 employees and shoppers into the basement.

In rural northeastern Missouri, the state Highway Patrol said Kent Ensor, 44, and Kristy Secrease, 25, had sought refuge in Secrease's mobile home in Monroe County as a tornado approached. Their bodies were found about 400 feet from where the home

The mobile home's frame was found three-quarters of a mile away, with debris as far as two miles away. The National Weather Service said the storm traveled a mile and had winds as high as 135 mph.

Ensor and Secrease had been dating for about a year, friends and family said.

"Everybody knows everybody here," said Jim Lovelady, who moved to the Paris area in 1994. "This hurts."

Four people were hurt when a mobile home in Sebree, Ky., collapsed because of strong winds, but their injuries appeared to be minor, Webster County Sheriff Frankie Springfield told The Gleaner of Henderson.

Duncan, who represents Pampa, sat in on the Groundwater Management Area 1 meeting this week. Duncan said he thinks the process is working, and he's encouraged by it.

In 2005, the Texas Legislature enacted a law that required all the water conservation districts within a groundwater management area to get together and jointly decide what the desired future condition of the aquifers they shared would be.

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For Groundwater Management Area 1, which covers roughly Amarillo north, the participating groundwater districts are the Hemphill County Water Underground Conservation District, the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District, North Plains Groundwater Conservation District and parts of the High Plains Underground Conservation District.

Each water district has its own view of what needs to be done.

The Hemphill County Underground Water Conservation District has the most conservative water production rules. They have set a goal of having 70 percent of their groundwater still in storage in the aquifer at the end of 30 years and have set a depletion allowance of less than one per cent per year.

Panhandle The Groundwater Conservation District has a goal of maintaining 50 percent of their groundwater in storage at the end of 50 years, the socalled 50-50 rule. They have a depletion allowance of 1.25 percent a year.

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, based in Lubbock, makes up only a small portion of GMA1. They have parts of Randall County, including the southern part of Amarillo, which lies in Randall and Potter counties; a small part of Potter County west of Amarillo, and a corner of Armstrong

Jim Conkwright, High Plains Underground Water Conservation District manager, said that while he has no objections to it, some counties in his district would have difficulty meeting the 50-50 rule.

The High **Plains** Underground Water Conservation District, however, is petitioning for a boundary change and could withdraw from GMA1. A majority of their district is in GMA2.

North **Plains** Groundwater Conservation District has the most liberal pumping rules of the water conservation districts in GMA1. While they have not set any overall conservation goals, they allow pumping of up to two acre-feet of water annually per acre of water rights, twice what Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District allows. They have also recently ruled that producers can pump up to six acrefeet of water over a threeyear period. Essentially, an irrigated farmer can pump

up to six acre-feet in one year, but he would have to refrain from pumping for the next two.

North The **Plains** Groundwater Conservation District, which covers the western and northern tier of counties in the Panhandle, has areas that are heavily irrigated cropland.

Much of the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District and almost all of the Hemphill County Underground Water District is rangeland with little irrigation.

Danny Krienke, Perryton farmer and president of the North Plains Groundwater Conservation District, said that cutting the amount of water that farmers in his district are allowed to pump could cause economic disaster, although he has indicated a willingness to compromise.

The discussion as to what the desired future condition of the aquifer should be will continue when Groundwater Management Area board of directors meets again Nov. 14.

Duncan said the water laws, particularly groundwater laws, were designed by the Legislature to push decision-making process down to the local level through the groundwamanagement area

"I'd rather see GMAs do it rather than have the Texas Commission Environmental Quality come in and force a decision on them," Duncan said.

Groundwater Management Area boards have until September 2010 to reach a consensus.

Texas unemployment rate up

DALLAS (AP) — The statewide unemployment rate rose to 4.3 percent in September as the number of new jobs failed to keep up with an increase in people looking for work, according to figures from the Texas Workforce Commission today.

The jobless rate had been 4.2 percent in August, when the commission reported a sharp decrease in job seekers. Only people actively looking for work are considered in the figures.

Seasonally adjusted nonfarm employment rose by 23,100 jobs from August, or less than 1 percent, according to commission figures. But the seasonally adjusted number of unemployed people jumped 4.1 percent, to about 500,000.

The statewide figures were adjusted for seasonal trends in hiring and firing, which most economists believe gives a better picture of the job market.

Commission Chairwoman Diane Rath said the statewide rate, below the national figure of 4.7 percent, showed the strength of the Texas economy.

All of the campus principals were in attendance to



The best things in life are free ... and unexpected

Sometimes, the things that bring us the most joy and happiness in life come from the most unexpected places. In my case, it came from a pregnant stray cat living under a new home that my husband and I had just purchased in Dallas in 2000.

When my husband got out of the Navy, we decided to move closer to home and moved just east of Dallas to a small town named Royse City. We wanted to be out in the country so we bought a double-wide trailer that was on five acres of land. It was just us and our 10-year-old golden retriever, Bumper.

So, decided to start buying

formula and feeding them from a syringe twice a day. I did this for about six weeks and really concentrated on the runt of the litter because he was so tiny and hardly had any hair. When I would hold him in my hand and feed him, he would just wrap his little feet around my hand and gulp the food down.

When it came time to find homes for the brood of eight, we decided to keep two of the kittens and the mama cat. My husband

attached to. My girlfriend took two of the kittens and we managed to find the other four homes

countering the opium trade: What is it with the U.S. government's obsession with herbicides as a remedy for insoluble problems abroad?

Spraying Agent Orange as a defoliant in Vietnam didn't win the war and has been associated with massive health problems. Spraying coca bushes in Colombia didn't halt the cocaine trade. Now the Bush administration is pressuring the weak Afghan government to allow aerial spraying of poppy fields to break the opium trade, which is financing the growing Taliban insurgency.

That's a thoroughly bad idea. It won't work in Afghanistan any more than it did elsewhere. And if it takes place, it may even accelerate the alienation of Afghan farmers from their government, shifting their loyalties ever further toward the Taliban.

The facts are stark. Afghanistan has become a narco-state, supplying 93 percent of the world's opium, a trade that makes up close to 50 percent of the country's economy. The Taliban, which cracked down on the cultivation of opium poppies as anti-Islamic when it was in power, now profits from it by raking in a fat cut to provide security for shipments across Afghan borders.

But aerial spraying would also destroy the food and feed crops routinely grown alongside poppy fields, as well as potentially cause long-term health problems from human exposure. If the goal is to fend off the Taliban insurgency, the solution is to persuade NATO to treble or quadruple its 30,000 troops. If the goal is to halt opium production, farmers would have to be bought off with very expensive subsidies to grow tomatoes. Neither is an easily accomplished solution. But the aerial spraying of herbicides is no solution at all.

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Autistic hiker, 18, found alive in West Virginia woods

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. (AP) — An autistic teen found underneath an umbrella of dense brush after four days in the wilderness was doing well at a hospital today, asking for food and smiling at relatives who came to visit him, his family said.

Jacob Allen, 18, was discovered Thursday sleeping under a thicket of laurel in the Dolly Sods Wilderness Area, part of the Monongahela National Forest. He had survived four cold days and four nearly freezing nights.

His mother, Karen Allen, spent the night in the hospital, keeping watch over her son. 'He was alert, asking for food and wanted to get out of

bed and walk around," she told NBC's "Today" today. It was the wilderness — a cascade of mountain laurel and rhododendron flowing over loose rock and steep cliffs that posed the greatest danger to Allen while he was.

lost. But in the end, it was the one thing that kept him

Though Allen was less than a mile from the spot where searchers had found his hat Monday, the brush kept his location hidden until Thursday afternoon. State Police 1st Sgt. Jim Wise said he believes it also may have kept the teen from wandering toward 20- to 30-foot cliffs.

"It made sort of like an umbrella, but underneath it was bare and open," Wise said. "It made some type of shelter." Allen opened his eyes, then rolled over to meet his res-

cuers when Jeremy Reneau called his name. "He was very quiet," said Reneau, 25, the first to spot Allen. "But you could tell by his body language he was

hungry. After a quick meal of candy bars and peanut butter sandwiches, Allen tried to walk with rescuers but tired

quickly. Reneau, Wise and others carried him on a litter to a trailhead where 50 people, including his parents, await-

"There were tears. There was clapping. I was crying. Other people were crying," said Tiffany Curran, a volunteer firefighter.

Allen was in good condition at Davis Memorial Hospital in Elkins, where officials said he remained under observation. His parents, 14-year-old brother, Micah, and 22-year-old sister, Brittany, were with him.

"We are just relieved and just so happy, happier than in the past couple days, that's for sure," Micah Allen said Friday morning.

He said that even though his brother is nonverbal, "he's obviously 10 times happier. You can tell he's happy to be with us, he's smiling when we walk into the room.'

Micah Allen said he expected his brother to be released from the hospital Friday.

Jacob Allen wandered away from his parents Sunday afternoon on the Boar's Nest Trail in Randolph County. Hundreds of volunteers and trained professionals had been combing the woods, calling for him to come to them for candy bars, ice cream and other food. After each shout, they listened closely for rustling brush.

cocaine in it. The deputy testified that Lane claimed ownership of the syringe, and both men were arrested.

Douglas' attorney, Juan Huerta, said McKarrell failed to do his job by not testing the two men for sobriety.

Wagoner was the opening act for the White Stripes at a sold-out show at Madison Square Garden in Manhattan this summer.



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

Please advise me because I have no idea how to handle this, and most parenting resources don't address this situation. - LOVING DAUGHTER **AND MOTHER**


DEAR LOVING DAUGHTER: I have a hunch that the reason your daughters "continue to ask" how Nana died is they either already know the answer and want confirmation, or people have clammed up about it in their presence to the point they know something is wrong. You should sit them down and ask them why they have been asking that question. Then tell them the truth -- that Nana was sick and in pain and ended her life earlier than anyone wanted her to. You did not mention whether your mother killed herself because she was in physical or psychological pain. If it was the latter, it's important that your daughters understand in the coming years that depression can run in families, that there is help for it, and that they can come to you if they need to talk about anything that is troubling them.


Last week on Harvester Field, Pampa held back Caprock to win their first district game of the season



No. 2 South Florida unbeaten no more

PISCATAWAY, N.J. (AP) - South Florida flopped and No. 2 is up for grabs again.

Done in by Rutgers special teams tricks, the Bulls became the third secondranked team to lose in the last three weeks, falling 30-27 to the Scarlet Knights on Thursday night.

USF (6-1, 1-1 Big East) had its eight-game winning streak come to an end, no doubt to the delight of Boston College, LSU, Oklahoma and the rest of the teams hoping to grab the second spot in the BCS standings USF held this week.

After reaching the rankings for first time in the 11year history of South Florida football earlier this season, the Bulls shot up the charts behind a quick and hard-hitting defense and quarterback Matt Grothe's dynamic playmaking.

Against Rutgers, the Bulls' defense got thumped. Ray Rice ran for 181 yards on 39 carries and the Scarlet Knights scored more points than any opponent had this

season against USF. Grothe was good, passing for 247 yards and a touchdown and running for another score, but he also took a pounding. Rutgers sacked him seven times and preserved a three-point lead with two late defensive stands.

"I thought the defense played hard all night," Rutgers coach Greg Schiano said. "We made some mistakes, against a good football team like South Florida, they're going to find those mistakes immediately. But the kids played incredibly hard."

A week after No. 2 California lost to Oregon State and two weeks after Southern then-No. California was upset by Stanford, the Bulls became the 11th top-10 team to fall to an unranked opponent this season. There are five undefeated teams left in major college football.

In this topsy-turvy season, the Bulls' national title hopes can't quite be put to rest. But they took a major hit.

"We talk about ddversity all the time and this is another part of (dealing with)

adversity," Bulls linebacker Brouce Mompremier said. "It will show what type of team we have. It will show the true friends we have. We're not worried about the ranking and all that."

Third-string quarterback Andrew DePaola threw a 15yard touchdown pass off a fake field goal to give the Scarlet Knights (5-2, 2-1 Big East) the lead in the third quarter and Rutgers also used a fake punt to set up an early field goal.

Mike Teel threw also two touchdown passes to Tiquan Underwood for Rutgers.

rankings "Personally, don't mean that much when you're on the field," Bulls receiver Marcus Edwards said. "All that stuff goes out the window. It comes down to who scores the most points and they scored more than we did tonight."

Rutgers, which started the season ranked 16th but fell out after two straight losses last month, might not be unranked much longer.

Jeremy Ito lined a 51-yard field with 11:59 left in the fourth quarter to give Rutgers a 30-20 lead.

Grothe's gang wasn't done. He led the Bulls on a 70-yard touchdown drive that Mike Ford capped with a 1-yard run with 9:16 left to make it 30-27.

When USF linebacker Ben Moffitt recovered Rice's fumble near midfield with 4:11 left, the Bulls were in business at the Rutgers 40. But Brandon Renkart sacked Grothe on the first play, and the Bulls were forced to

"We had the ball at the 50, down by three and their defense came up to play," USF coach Jim Leavitt said. "Give them credit. Give them a lot of credit. They did it twice."

Rutgers was unable to kill the clock and the Bulls got one more shot to keep their perfect season alive, starting at the Rutgers 49.

Boston Bound: Beckett keeps Red Sox alive in ALCS

CLEVELAND (AP) - Josh Beckett never flinched.

When the towel-waving crazies filled his ears with noise, he ignored them.

When Kenny Lofton challenged him, he walked away.

And when his singing ex-girlfriend belted out a couple tunes once with him standing only 100 feet away - Beckett kept humming along.

The star of stars this October, Beckett blocked out everything and delivered yet another brilliant pitching performance to lift the Boston Red Sox to a 7-1 win over the Cleveland Indians in Game 5 of the AL championship series Thursday night.

A 20-game winner and Cy Young favorite, Beckett made sure the Red Sox, no strangers to comebacks, would live to fight another

"The motto in the clubhouse right now is it's better to die on your feet than live on your knees," Beckett said, using a famous quote from President Franklin D. Roosevelt to underscore his team's win-or-else plight.

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Beckett, standing tall as ever on the mound, dominated Cleveland for the second time and enigmatic slugger Manny Ramirez drove in the go-ahead run with a 390-foot single as the Red Sox stayed alive.

So it's back to Fenway Park, where two more wins can return the Red Sox to the World Series.

"We weren't trying to win three games in one night," said Kevin Youkilis, whose homer in the first inning off C.C. Sabathia set the tone. "We were just going out there to do whatever we had to do to win."

The best thing Boston did was hand the ball to Beckett, who improved to 3-0 this postseason and added another gem to a sparkling resume that already stands among the best in baseball's hallowed month.

"He's the best," David Ortiz said. "We were confident with him going out there. He was unbelievable. It was one of the best pitching performances I've seen.'

Faced with an earlier exit than they planned, the Red Sox came up

Clearly, Ramirez & Co. cared.

"We made it happen," Ramirez

The Red Sox have done it before.

In 2004, Boston rallied from an 0-3 deficit to win the 2004 ALCS against the New York Yankees and went on to sweep the St. Louis Cardinals in four straight for its first World Series title since 1918.

The Red Sox forced Game 6 on Saturday night, and will turn to Curt Schilling, 9-3 in 17 career postseason starts, against Fausto Carmona.

Boston still trails 3-2, but if not for the calm, cool and cocky Beckett, their would be no more baseball until spring.

"Josh is unbelievable," Youkilis

The 27-year-old Beckett, who beat Cleveland in the opener, once again came through with the stakes at their highest.

He allowed only a run and three hits in the first, and then just two more hits before leaving after eight marvelous innings. He struck out 11, walked one and was around the plate with almost every one of his

"He's got something others don't have," third baseman Mike Lowell said. "There is a different feel for us when he takes the mound. Time and time again he comes through."

Unless they can find a way to win again at Fenway, the Indians will think about what might have been, and their fans will add Beckett to a long list of players who have denied Cleveland a possible championship.

"We just couldn't get that big hit off him," Indians first baseman Ryan Garko said. "A lot of credit goes to Josh for making good pitches when he needed to.'

In 2003, Beckett pitched a twohitter for Florida in Game 5 of the NLCS as the Marlins rallied from a 3-1 deficit to eliminate the Chicago Cubs. Then, pitching on just three days' rest in Game 6 of the World Series at Yankee Stadium, he allowed five hits in a 2-0 win and was named MVP.

If the Red Sox can win two more, he might have another trophy for his mantle.

"We know what we have to do now," said Beckett, 3-0 with a 1.17 ERA this October. "This is not

where we want to be, but obviously, we're inching closer to where we want to be."

Cleveland, which hasn't won the Series since 1948, had won three straight to seemingly take control. But the Indians, trying to clinch a pennant at home for the first time, could do little against Beckett, who rarely shook off a sign from catcher Jason Varitek and kept hitters guessing with a rocket fastball and knee-buckling curve.

With so much on the line, both teams were on edge, and tempers flared briefly in the fifth when Beckett and Lofton screamed at each other.

Cleveland's outfielder had flipped his bat to the ground after what he thought was ball four, and when Beckett retired him on a fly, the pair exchanged words and both benches and bullpens emptied.

The two got into a similar argument two years ago, when Lofton was with Philadelphia and Beckett with Florida.

"It goes back a way," Beckett said. "Those things have a way of working themselves out."

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

Canadian schoolteacher suspected of sexually abusing boys was arrested in rural Thailand and charged today after an international manhunt that relied on digitally unscrambled photos and tips from the public.

Police found 32-year-old Christopher Paul Neil after tracing the phone call of a Thai acquaintance who then led them to the house the two rented together, officials said at a news con-

ference in Bangkok where Neil also was present.

"I think he knew we were coming," said police Col. Paisal Luesomboon, who was in the five-man team that made the arrest the northeastern province of Nakhon Ratchasima. "He knew that there was an arrest warrant issued and that his face was posted everywhere.

He said Neil acknowledged his name and nationality, but would not

say whether he was the man pictured in more than 200 photographs having sex with boys as young as 6 in Cambodia, Vietnam and Thailand.

Driven to Bangkok, about 130 miles away, Neil was in handcuffs and had a blue shirt draped over his head as officers led him into national police headquarters. He made no comments to a waiting horde of reporters.

He stayed silent when presented to journalists at the news conference. The shirt was removed from his head, but his eyes were hidden behind a pair of sunglasses.

Several Thai boys had come forward to say that they had been abused by Neil, and police — who had been tracing Neil's network of friends — had expressed con-

Police said that on Thursday night, they traced a phone call made by a 25year-old Thai man with whom Neil was previously known to be in touch, said Col. Paisal, superintendent of the Tourist Police Division.

They found the Thai man, whom they described as a transvestite, in the northeastern province of Chaiyaphum. He told

Report: Student nutrition showing improvement

WASHINGTON (AP) -It's harder to find a french fry in a school cafeteria these days, and junk food is less common at school fundraisers, a federal study out Friday has found.

But when it comes to encouraging healthy habits, the nation's schools still aren't earning straight As.

About 19 percent of schools served french fries to students in 2006, down from 40 percent six years earlier, according to the study by the Centers for Disease Control Prevention.

The percentage of schools that sold cookies or other high-fat baked goods at tricts require physical educa-

fund-raisers dropped from 67 percent to 54 percent during the six-year period.

And in nearly half of schools, students can select bottled water instead of sugary drinks from school vending machines or snack bars, up from nearly a third of schools in 2000.

Public health officials are cautiously optimistic about the changes.

"We're not satisfied. We still have a long, long way to go, but it is encouraging," said Howell Wechsler, director of the CDC's Division of Adolescent and School Health.
