## OPEC ministers looking for handle of oil spigot

GENEVA (AP) - OPEC oil ministers, meeting
behind a cloak of secrecy, today resumed their search for at least a tentative agreement on production controls that could push petroleum prices back up.
The cartel leaders made no public comments as
they arrived for a 12 th straight day of talks at a they arrived for a 12 th straight day of talks at a
Geneva hotel. Geneva hotel.
The outcome of what has become one of the
longest meetings in the 26 -year history of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries remained in doubt, even after Thursday s intense
deliberations.

formula, based on a statistical profile of each member country, that would be usedto calculate
oil production quotas for the 13 members. The aim is to restrict the cartel's production in

SOUTH PADRE ISLAND, Texas (AP) - Since
arriving on the Texas coast in January Mark Hamarriving on the Texas coast in January Mark Ham-

But he's not sure how he'll handle the toxic red tide that kept hotel visitors away from the beach eyes, lungs and nasal passages.

The red tide washed into Sov ${ }^{\text {th }}$ Padre late
Wednesday and by Thursday afternoon dead catfish littered the beaches of the coastal resort. The red tide began near Galveston in late August and slowly has moved south. Thousands of fish
have been killed by the heavy concentration of marine micro-organisms.
Officials in Corpus Christi, 120 miles to the north,
have have been forced to close beaches to swimmers.

oyster harvests for 300 miles of coast from San

## A system after apartheid

There are two principal questions concerning
South Africa, one easy and one hard. The easy one is whether the white supremacist system of apartheid ought to be preserved, to which the
only answer is no. The hard one is what ought to replace it. As the South African government's power erodes, finding an answer to the latter
becomes increasingly The American debate over The American debate over imposing trade
sanctions against Pretoria has been almost entirely preoccupied by the easy issue. Propo-
nents, pointing to a long and daming list of enits, pointing to a long and damning list of
crimes by the white racist government, think the U.S. is morally obliged todo what it can to
cripple the regime. They show an insouciant cripple the regime. They show an insoucian
lack of interest in what happens afterward. lack of interest in what happens afterward.
This is roughly the same approach the U.S took toward Rhodesia when its white minority
government was embriled in a civil war with government was embroiled in a civil war with

be enough to meet the needs." The earthquake that struck EI Salvador last Friday demolished buildings in the capital city of San Salvador, claiming nearly 1,000 lives and leaving
tens of thousands homeless, the latest figures indieens of thousands homeless, the latest figures indi-
cate. Jose Mario Celaya Cruz, 30, said he arrived in
this South Texas community on the day the earthquake struck in San Salvador and he has not been able to get any word about his family. He said, however, that many of his countrymen
will journey to the United States. "There are a lot of Salvadorans who have family and friends here and that's why I think they will be coming soon," he said.
Celaya Cruz and hundreds of other Central Americans are restricted to a nine-county area in South Texas that church officials have called a
giant detention center. The fravel restriction has
caused overcrowding at the church facility. caused overcrowding at the church facility.
The Central Ammericans have been documented
by U.S. Immigration and Naturiization officials,
but they are not able to leave the area without
posting a $\$ 1,000$ cash bond that most do not have, poshey ant,000 ash bo mor They are not allowed to work while they are out on their own recognizance. Church officials, attorneys for Central Amer-
icans and immigration officials will meet icans and immigration officials will meet on Fri-
day to try to work out a solytion to the bond probday to try to work out a solytion to the bond prob-
lem, said Silvestre Reyes, chief of the Border Patol sector in McAllen.
The McAllen sector annually records the highest number of arrests of Central Americans trying to enter the United States.
Most of those arrested Most of those arrested during the last fiscal year
that ended Sept. 30 , were from El Salvador. Reye said. ended Sept. 30, were from E1 Salvador, Reyes He said the earthquake in El Salvador would trigger an eventual influx of illegal aliens, much
like the earthquake in Mexico City last year caused thousands of Mexicans to go north.
