Deadly Babies



When West Texas experiences a very dry year, cotton is not the only thing that is affected. It causes thirsty snakes to begin to mover early, as drought has dried up their usual watering places.

In many cases, mother rattlers are forced to abandon hatches of baby snakes as they have to venture further and further from their dens.

This year, when the snakes began looking for water, people were still spending much of their time outdoors. But people don't have to be around a water source to run into the snakes. They are venturing into populated area in their quest for water.

Colorado City experienced a rash of sightings of baby rattlers last month. Most of those that ventured town and other into populated areas were six to eight inch babies. Cement and asphalt hold the sun's longer heat than the ground, and snakes like to seek heat in the late afternoon or evening.

One might think baby snakes are harmless. One would be wrong. The babies are actually more dangerous than their parents, because their venom is more concentrated. Plus, they have not yet grown the rattles that adult snakes use to warn humans of their presence.

At least one person in Mitchell County has suffered from a run-in wit the baby snakes. A twoyear-old boy reached out to that crawled from one Mesquite under a bush near his home in Westbrook. The toddler was bitten twice on the right hand. His five-yearold brother knew what the rattlesnake was, and he kicked it away. He narrowly missed also being bitten when the baby rattler struck at him, but hit the strap of his sandal. After three surgeries, the toddler is expected to recover.

At least 50 snakes were killed in and around Colorado City by mid-September, a number far above the annual average. Danger will remain until time for the snakes to go into their winter dens.

All though this article was printed in the Colorado City Cap Rock's Wolf Division Lone newsletter, it also holds true for us here in Gail and Borden County.



Coyotes Win District Opener

Borden The County Coyotes won their district opener last Friday, night at Westbrook by defeating the Wildcats 61 to 14. The win puts the Coyotes at 6-0 on the season and 1-0 in district.

The Coyotes began the game in high fashion as they took an early lead 12 to 0 at the end of the first period. The Coyotes then scored 27 points in the second period, and allowed all 14 of the Westbrook's points in this period. The Coyotes ended the game by the 45 point rule with 4:16 left in the third period with 22 consecutive points.

Fernando Baeza scored the first of his 5 touchdowns on the first play from scrimmage for the Coyotes. Baeza took a pitch from Colt McCook, as he got outside the Cat's containment, and went 67 yards to the end zone. The PAT failed, and the score was 6-0.

With :40 seconds left in the first period, Ed Rodriquez carried the ball over from 11 yards out. The pass attempt for the PAT failed, and the score was 12-0.

With 7:24 left in the second period Baeza carried the ball 47 yards for the Coyote TD. The PAT failed once again, and the score was 18-0.

The Cats got on the score board as they completed a 35 yard pass for the touchdown. Their PAT kick was good, and the score was now 18-8 with 7:06 left in the first half.

With 5:57 left in the action. second period, Ryan Grant dove over the end zone from 9 yards out. McCook kicked the PAT good, and the score was 26-8.

In the last minute of the first half, three touchdowns were scored. The first was scored by the Covotes. With :59 seconds left, Fernando Baeza scored from 21 yards out. The pass for the zone point PAT was incomplete and the score was 32 to 8.





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

Snack Time Can Be Fun Time




