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Election official: Voter turnout 'heavy'

By MARILYN POWERS Staff Writer

Voting began at 7 a.m. today in seven locations across Gray County for the primary election, and the polls will close at 7 p.m.

The number of votes cast by 9:30 a.m. in four of the seven precincts totaled 72 Democratic ballots and 122 Republican ballots, according to Election Administrator Linda Lewis.

"Turnout has been really heavy," she said.

After the polls close, votes will be tallied electronically by a secure computer in Gray County Courthouse. The computer used to count the votes is used only for that purpose and has never been connected to an online service, Lewis said.

A printer connected to the computer prints out results as they are amassed.

Votes are tallied from computer cards in electronic calculation machines which monitor each polling place.

New technologies being developed to help protect natural resources

New tools created by scientists with the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) in collaboration with the Natural **Resources** Conservation Service (NRCS) will help keep the environment healthy by streamlining the process of developing computer models and decisionsupport tools used by agricultural producers and others in natural resource analysis and conservation planning.

ARS is the chief scientific research agency of the Department of U.S. Agriculture (USDA). NRCS - also part of USDA - leads national conservation of soil, water, air and other natural resources on private land.

One of the new technologies is the Object-Modeling System (OMS), which serves as a framework for streamlining the development, integration, use and maintenance of disparate computer simulation modules and tools built around hydrological, erosion, climate, cropgrowth and other agricultural research data.

OMS was developed by scientists with ARS' Systems Agricultural Research Unit in Fort Collins, Colo., in collaboration with the NRCS



Information Technology Center and the U.S. Geological Survey.

The second new tool is an updated and field-tested version of the Wind-**Erosion Prediction System** (WEPS). This computer program will equip NRCS field personnel with a cutting-edge tool for calculating topsoil losses caused by wind erosion, especially in drought-prone regions of the country such as the Great Plains, where some 5 million acres are at risk.

WEPS will also allow users to model how such losses could be avoided or reduced by implementing a erosion-control given measure, such as planting cover crops, using conservation tillage or establishing wind buffers.

WEPS is the result of 16 years of collaboration between ARS and NRCS software engineers and scientists. The updated version includes changes incorporated after three years of field testing,

NRCS feedback, and finetuning to make WEPS even more user-friendly.

Since its inception in the 1930s, NRCS' conservation delivery system continues a unique partnership, delivering conservation that respects local needs, while accommodating state and national interests. For more information about NRCS, visit their Web site at www.nrcs.usda.gov/.

Open warfare has engulfed the Gaza Strip in the last week. After Palestinian militants fired rockets into southern Israel, the Jewish state launched a major offensive in the Gaza territory that is controlled by the militant Hamas movement and used as a base for the rocket launches. The offensive prompted the moderate Palestinian leadership in control of the West Bank territory to walk out of peace talks.

But, said Bush, "Ten months is

a long time. It's plenty of time to get a deal done." He noted that Rice was pushing the Israeli and Palestinian leadership to resume talks.

"I am optimistic that they can conclude tough negotiations," he said. "I'm still as optimistic as I was after Annapolis," the site of a U.S.-backed international Mideast peace conference in Maryland late last year.

Bush, noting his typical opposition to timetables, said he remains firm on getting a peace deal done: "There happens to be a timetable, as far as I'm concerned, and that is I am leaving office." The president's term ends on January 20, 2009.

Palestinian President Mahmoud Abbas has suspended peace talks in protest of an Israeli military offensive that killed more than 100 Palestinians in Gaza.

His public comments were a disappointment for the United States, which had hoped for a firmer commitment to renew negotiations launched by the Bush administration at a the Annapolis conference. Rice looked on, lips pursed, as Abbas called Israel's action unjustified "under any pretext."

Rice is also planning to meet with Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Olmert.

"She's making our views known that we expect these leaders to step up and make hard decisions," Bush said.


The United States blames Hamas for inciting violence. Hamas took over the Gaza Strip last July and is deemed by the U.S. to be a terrorist organization.

Bush lauded Abdullah, saying "The United States has no stronger friend in the Middle East than Jordan." In turn, Abdullah hailed Bush's commitment to the peace process.

"The words and discussions that we've had this morning will have, I think, a very great response back in our part of the world," Abdullah said.

Bush also addressed the political uncertainty in Lebanon, where his administration blames Syria for violent interference.

"I am extremely disappointed that the Syrian leader continues to make it harder for the Saniora government to succeed," Bush said. "And I really don't appreciate the fact that they've made it hard for this government to elect a president."



800,000 Rwandans, mostly Tutsis, were killed. There were an estimated 100,000 to 500,000 Ugandans murdered under the brutal rule of Idi Amin. Liberia, Ivory Coast and the Congo have been racked by war, and slavery exists to this day in Mauritania and Sudan. Added to this carnage is

gross corruption, AIDS, famine and repression.

African leaders, and many people on the left, blame Africa's problems on the evils of colonialism. They sometimes blame the violence on the



have been independent for four decades. If colonial borders were a major problem, how come they haven't changed them? And, by the way, colonialism cannot explain Third World poverty. Some of today's richest countries are former colonies, such as United States, Canada, Australia,

New Zealand and Hong Kong. Some of today's poorest countries were never colonies, such as Ethiopia, Liberia, Tibet, Nepal and Bhutan. The colonialism argument is simply a cover up for African dictators.

The worst thing the West can do to Africa is to give more foreign aid. For the most part, foreign aid is government to government. As such, it provides the financial resources that enable Africa's grossly corrupt and incompetent regimes to buy military equipment, pay off cronies and continue to oppress their people. It also provides resources for the leaders to live lavishly and set up "retirement" accounts in foreign banks. Africa is the world's most

San Antonio Express-News on Sen. Larry Craig's punishment:

The Senate Select Committee on Ethics sprang into action this month. It issued a bipartisan letter of admonition to Sen. Larry Craig, R-Idaho.

Sure, it's been six months since the media broke the news that Craig had been arrested for lewd conduct in a men's restroom at the Minneapolis-St. Paul International Airport, almost seven months since he pleaded guilty to a lesser charge of disorderly conduct. But passing ethical judgment on your colleagues is tough business on Capitol Hill.

The committee made four determinations:

The obvious, of course Craig engaged in and pleaded guilty to misconduct.

He handed the arresting officer his Senate business card and told him, "What do you think about that?" which could reasonably be construed as seeking favorable treatment.

He attempted to evade the legal consequences of his actions by trying to withdraw his guilty plea.

And he used \$213,000 in campaign funds to pay legal expenses related to his appeal. The ethics committee must approve such payments in advance. Craig never sought such approval. And the expenses incurred must be related to duties official ones, that is, which seem highly unlikely in an airport rest-

room.

And Craig's punishment? The six senators who serve on the committee, including John Cornyn of Texas, determined that the letter itself was sufficient punishment. That's what counts as ethics enforcement in Washington.

If the Senate ethics machinery turns agonizingly slowly and doesn't seem to produce much, however, it is at least better than the House ethics contraption, which hardly functions at all.

All this provides more evidence that members of Congress are simply incapable of policing their own ethics. No matter how tough the rules are, congressional ethics will continue to be an oxymoron until an independent office exists to investigate ethics complaints and punish offenders. "I'm worried about it. I know it's a death sentence," Krueger said.

An estimated 600,000 people in Oregon are uninsured, according to the Oregon Department of Human Services.

Those selected in the lottery will be eligible for a standard benefit program, which was once a heralded highlight of the Oregon Health Plan.

At its peak in 1995, the program covered 132,000 Oregonians. State budget cuts forced the program to close to newcomers by 2004, but it now has several thousand openings.

The program covers their most basic health services, medications and limited den-

tal, hospital and vision services at little or no cost.

The health insurance lottery winners will be chosen in a series of drawings that could take a few months.

"This is such a wonderful opportunity," said Ellen Pinney, director of the Oregon Health Action Campaign. "We've heard absolutely no complaints, just a lot of hope that they are the ones who will be selected."



It has 50 percent of the world's gold, most of the world's diamonds and chromium, 90 percent of the cobalt, 40 percent of the world's potential hydroelectric power, 65 percent of the manganese, and millions of acres of untilled farmland, as well as other natural resources. Before independence, every African country was self-sufficient in food

production; today, many depend on imports and others stand at the brink of famine. The only people who can solve the problems of Africa are Africans themselves. It is only they who can change their leaders, end corruption and bring about transparency in government and end the African wars. Only they can stop the continent's massive brain drain. This was brought home to me, a number of years ago, at a dinner I was invited to in honor of a new Nigerian ambassador to the United States. During his speech, he admonished the Nigerian professionals in attendance to come home to help the country develop. The Nigerians seated at my table, and nearby tables, fell




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Dear Abby...

Readers, because none of us know when an emergency such as incapacitation (or death) should strike, this "insurance policy" could be invaluable to those left to handle our affairs. To secure log-in/password information, print out the document you have created and put it in a safe-deposit box or under lock and key in a file cabinet. If you keep the document in your computer, be sure to secure it with a strong password or use commercially available privacy software.

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

WASHINGTON (AP) Congressional Democrats are taking a closer look at the U.S. missile defense program, partly in an effort to pare down its high price tag.

effectiveness of the antimissile program and investigating whether its testing regimen is realistic enough to demonstrate its capabilities against real attacks. Critics have long contended that the program's tests are too predictable.

The scrutiny comes as the United States is at a sensitive moment in negotiations with Poland and the Czech Republic to build part of its shield on their territory. Lawmakers are questioning the security value of those plans against stark opposition from Russia.

Rep. John Tierney said he intends, during hearings beginning Wednesday, to raise the question of whether Congress should continue present funding levels for what congressional auditors call the most expensive U.S. would be.

Some have pointed to the recent use of modified missile defense interceptors to destroy a damaged U.S. satellite as a sign of the program's progress, although U.S. officials denied the interception was a test and critics say the satellite was a far easier target than a warhead

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Authorities find bodies of six people in Memphis home

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) children's conditions. — Police who forced their way into a small brick house discovered the bodies of four adults and two children, as well as three children found clinging to life.

Police said they were investigating the case as a multiple homicide but otherwise released little information early Tuesday, including whether they believed the killer was at large.

Children ages 7 and 4 and a 10-month-old baby were taken to Le Bonheur Children's Medical Center, Memphis Fire Department spokeswoman Melanie Young told The Associated Press. She did not know the ages or sexes of the other victims, but police told The Commercial Appeal newspaper all the children were under the age of 12.

"We just don't know the motive or cause of death, but we do have four adults and two children (dead)," Memphis police Lt. Jerry Guin told the newspaper.

Young said the victims had been shot. At least one of the children had been stabbed, police said.

The Commercial Appeal reported on Monday night that one of the children had been upgraded to stable condition and another upgraded to critical while the third remained in extremely critical condition.

Hospital spokeswoman Jennilyn Utkov told The Associated Press the family has requested that no information be released on the

Authorities were called to

the house by a relative who knocked on the door around 6 p.m. Monday but did not get an answer.

Detectives and crime scene specialists were still at the scene late Monday night and authorities cordoned off a block in either direction.

Dark, narrow streets in the low-income working class neighborhood, still wet from heavy rains, showed little signs of life late Monday except for the flashing lights of police cars.

Wayne Bolden, who lives across the street from the scene of the shooting, told The Associated Press that the adult male occupant of the house periodically fired shots in his yard.

"He'd shoot on the 4th of July and New Year's Eve," Bolden said. "He'd have company over and I'd hear the shots."

He said the family there kept to themselves, but he would see four or five children from the house riding bicycles occasionally.

"It's a pretty quiet neighborhood; nothing of this magnitude has ever happened here," Bolden said.

Rob Robinson, who owns the brick, single-family home where the shootings occurred, told The Commercial Appeal the house was rented, and that a man, his girlfriend, a baby, and at least one other child lived there.
