Gray County grand jury hands up 25 indictments

A Gray County grand jury handed up 25 indictments Thursday in 31st District Court at Gray County Courthouse. Four indictments were for first-degree felonies, five for second-degree felonies, six for thirddegree felonies and 10 for state jail felonies.

Edward Lee Briley Jr., 29, was indicted for two counts of manufacture/delivery of four grams or more but less than 200 grams of a controlled substance, enhanced. Bond on each of the first-degree felonies was set at \$25,000.

On April 1, 2007, Briley allegedly possessed with intent to deliver four grams or more but less than 200 grams each of methamphetamine of the first-degree felonies was set at

and cocaine.

On June 2, 1998, he was convicted in 223rd District Court in Gray County of the felony offense of theft over \$20,000 and under \$100,000.

Briley was also indicted on two counts of possession of five pounds or less but more than four ounces of marijuana. Bond on the state jail felony which allegedly occurred on Jan. 19, 2007 was set at \$15,000. Bond on the state jail felony which allegedly occurred on April 1, 2007 was set at \$20,000.

Total bond for Briley on all four

indictments is \$85,000. Tracey Don Matthews, 40, was indicted for two counts of manufacture/delivery four or more grams but less than 200 grams of a controlled substance, enhanced. Bond on each

Bond on the three felonies for which Matthews has been indicted totals \$60,000.

Rogelio Aguilar-Olivo, 38, was indicted for two counts of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. Bond on each of the second-degree

felonies was set at \$15,000, for total bond of \$30,000.

On May 28, 2007, Aguilar-Olivo allegedly threatened two other persons with imminent bodily injury by pointing a firearm at those persons and threatening to shoot them.

Miguel Arturo Flores, 21, was indicted for burglary of a habitation. Bond on the second-degree felony was set at \$20,000.

On March 31, 2007, Flores allegedly entered a habitation without the consent of the owner and with intent to commit an assault against the owner.

Frederic Antonio Jackson, 31, was indicted for burglary of a habitation. Bond on the second-degree felony was set at \$15,000.

Sheriff's Association seeks partnerships

The mailings invite residents to become associate members of the association and thus assist law enforcement officers by building a partnership in the fight against crime, according to a news release from the association.

"The Associate Membership Drive helps provide the funding which is vital to our mission of making our communities safer places to live, work and play," Copeland said.

Dues paid by association members are used to provide officer training and education, technical resources, legislative support on criminal justice issues, crime pre-

vention and awareness programs, public safety promotion, help in the fight against drug abuse, additional training for sheriffs and their deputies, and scholarships for children of law enforcement officers and persons seeking a degree in the criminal justice field.

The association also provides scholarships to peace officers who are working toward degrees in law enforcement, the quarterly "The Texas magazine Lawman" and a quarterly newsletter for active members titled "SAT News".

"As the need for building stronger public-private law enforcement partnerships in this country continues to escalate, programs such as this continue to grow in importance," Copeland said of the association. "I encourage every citizen receiving a membership appeal to con-

Fred Thompson's gone. Duncan Hunter's gone. All these people are gone. Huckabee could become Huckabeen. So could Rudy. All of a sudden you've got this Republican primary coming down to McCain, Romney and Ron Paul. With all this uncertainty, just where can a conservative go?

All of a sudden, radio talk show hosts, who reflect the opinions of grass-roots conservative voters, are all over the lot hammering on Rudy, hammering on Romney, hammering on McCain and hammering on Paul. Listening to them you get an idea who they want or don't want. They don't like McCain. Most probably they support either Huckabee

why Ronald Reagan won. He won because he was able to excite a group of people in America that the liberal wing of the Republican party has never excited - the grassroots. Newt Gingrich is the last Republican to have done that - to reach out to the grassroots, to all those conservative Republicans and Reagan

Remember, it was Newt who engineered the miraculous Republican take-over of Congress in 1994 - something that was deemed impossible two years after Bill Clinton won the White House. I wouldn't be surprised if he was out there quietly working

So who can electrify the base and get them to come out from their bunkers and ignite a groundswell? On the record, the only person capable of doing that is Newt Gingrich. Covering all the issues that concern the

resounding "no" to all of the above.

grassroots: Romney represents the Reagan economic approach; McCain, the national security issues; Giuliani represents the hardline-on-crime position; and Huckabee covers the religious position. Everybody has a piece. Newt Gingrich covers all of those issues, and in the eyes of the grassroots, he covers them brilliantly.

Just as his Contract with America dealt with many of the issues that concerned the grassroots and won Congress for the GOP, his agenda goes right to the heart of our current problems. He's offering concrete solutions to all the concrete problems and that's what the grassroots crave. As a result, if the nomination gets thrown open in a brokered convention, the person who comes out of the struggle the winner will most likely be Newt Gingrich. 

Merely having a gun does are by yourself, whether on not mean you will survive an urban street or in a forest, the encounter. The gun is an

inanimate object, a tool. It can't think, it can't move, it can't aim itself, and it can't fire itself. You have to supply



nature. If you are in an isolated area, any stranger should be considered an enemy until proven differently. That doesn't mean you attack the stranger; it just means you watch him carefully and don't let him get too close to three functions: recreational you or behind you.

For a gun/tool to be of any

use, it has to be loaded and readily available at the time and place you need it. You can't very well say: "Uh, hold up there a moment, will you? I know I put that pistol somewhere." A friend of mine who had lived in New York City all his life moved to Florida and went a little nuts when he discovered that any legal adult can buy a gun. He bought an arsenal. I reminded him one day that all his guns and ammunition stored at home wouldn't help him if someone jumped him in the parking lot.

I've never been a gun collector. To me, gurs are just tools, and they have only shooting, hunting and selfdefense. In a self-defense situation, you are going to need only one gun, and if you haven't protected yourself with your first two or three bullets, chances are you won't have need for the rest of them. I am not an advocate of the spray-and-pray school of shooting. The only bullets that count in a gunfight are those that hit the bad guy.

The best self-defense tactic is to avoid putting yourself in a position where you will need to shoot. The majority of violent crimes are committed in certain neighborhoods. You know where they are. Stay out of them. Don't mope about looking vulnerable. Secure your home and secure your car. You don't have to be

grim to be alert.

Two more points: Before you buy a gun for selfdefense, make sure you are psychologically prepared to take a human life. That's not a minor thing. Death is irrevocable. There are always consequences. If you aren't prepared to deal with them, then you're better off buying pepper spray and a pair of running shoes.

Secondly, learn to use your gun. That means lots of practice. If an attack comes, it will come unexpectedly and suddenly, and you won't have time to fumble around wondering where the safety catch is. Always shoot to kill.

about national security, but what the FBI really needs is a good office man-If that sounds facetious, consider a

recent development that is as disturbing as it is embarrassing: A telephone company recently cut off an international wiretap after the agency failed to pay its bill on time, according to a government audit released this month.

The audit, conducted by the Justice Department, criticized the FBI for the poor handling of funds used for undercover investigations, Reuters reported.

And while the incompetence led to the disruption of a wiretap case, it has repercussions beyond a single incident, making the agency vulnerable to theft and mishandled invoices, according to the audit.

Politicians engage in lofty debates about whether the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act, which governs electronic spying in intelligence cases, makes it too cumbersome for agents pursuing leads on terrorism.

That debate, however crucial to the war on terrorism, is reduced to absurd

irrelevance when the FBI cannot do what hard-working Americans are expected to do every month pay their bills on time.

"Late payments have resulted in telecommunications carriers actually disconnecting phone lines established to deliver surveillance results to the FBI, resulting in lost evidence, including an instance where delivery of intercept information required by a ... FISA order was halted due to untimely payment," Reuters quoted the audit as say-




