Saudis have invested nearly $\$ 100$ bil-
lion to increase production capacity. Soon, they'll be able to pump 1.5 milion additional barrels per day. But with China and India demanding more oil, here's no guarantee the United States will be the beneficiary.
The kingdom's sympathies could well be guided by the tenor in Washington. Its rulers hear the antiaudi rhetoric in Congress when they hases multioilion-dollar arms pur-

stream did not meet all Texas Surface Water Quality Standards enforced by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality Gregory said.
Ony 20 water samples were taken from 1996 to 2001, and bacterial levels failed to meet water quality standards. If the mpairment persisted, To prevent this, several groups began working together, and Dr. John Sij, Texas AgriLife Research agronomist at Vernon, took on the project to gather data that would determine bacteria levels and their cause.
The work, funded by the Texas State Soil and Water
Conservation Board through the Envir Conservation Board through the Environmental Protection Extension Service, Texas Water Resources Institute, Natural Resources Conservation Service, the Red River Authority, Soil and Water Conservation Districts, and Texas Parks and Wildlife.
The main objective of this project was to obtain a sufficient amount of data from multiple locations in order to make a scithe water, Gregory said. Fifteen sample sites were established along the creek and bi-weekly sampling was conducted from 2004 to 2007, which established a data set that now will be sent to the state enviranmental commission for review, he sent to
said.

But the work doesn't end there. The next step is to establish a Watershed Protection Plan and do some bacteria-source tracking, Gregory said. It is anticipated this portion of the project should be completed by Aug. 31, 2009.
Phyllis Dyer, research technician for AgriLife Research at Vernon, conducted the water sampling over the past three
years. She will now collaborate with Dr Geerge years. She will now collaborate with Dr. George Di Giovanni,
AgriLife Research microbiologist in El Paso, who will use DNA analyses to match E. coli colonies found in the water to a library of DNA 'fingerprints' gathered from human and animal species found in the watershed.

AMARILLO - When rain settles the atmosphere and brings air pollutants to the ground, it can have a lasting dreds of miles away, according to a Texas AgriLife Research agricultural engineer.

"We have intensive agriculture of all

Auvermann explained ecosystems receive some atmospheric inputs, such as nitrogen, phosphorus and sulfur. The plant and animal life dominant to that region thrives because it has adapted to a particular-rate of When the nutrient load changes, it can change the competitive ability of a species and allow different ones to thrive where they once were not competitive, he said. The effects extend
from major animal life such as deer down to the smallest bacteria.

asked to speak to the Texans. "Like a soldier ... [he] obeyed," the Statesman reported. The article continued: "His remarks were on the style of 'a little more grape,' [as in 'have another drink, boys'] and were enthusiastically received by his hearers. His towering form, noble demeanor, suavity
and age, are such as to command the respect of any one.".
Barely a year later, only 59 , Bragg dropped dead while walking with a friend down the street in Galveston.
