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Warrant roundup currently underway

Persons who are the suspects named in outstanding warrants for Pampa Municipal Court and the office of Gray County Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace have until Feb. 18 to settle with the court before being actively pursued and arrested, said Kurt Curfman, municipal court judge and Precinct 2 JP.

"We have entered into the statewide roundup program," Curfman said of the municipal and JP courts. "There are over 200 courts statewide participating in the annual roundup, which started Feb. 1.'

The purpose of the roundup is to encourage wanted persons to voluntarily take care of their warrants before the deadline, Curfman said.

"If they pay by the 18th, they don't have to worry about being arrested," he said. "If fines are not paid by them, they will go to jail."

County residents offered drug card

opportunity beginning on or about April 1 a member of NACo. to sign up for a discount prescription drug card program offered by the county through the National Association of Counties.

The free discount cards offer average savings of 20 percent off the retail price of commonly prescribed drugs, according to an NACo news release. Savings of as much as 50 percent off retail price may be possible by using the discount cards, said Gray County Precinct 3 Commissioner Gerald Wright, who will be in charge of administering the program locally.

All county residents are eligible to sign up for the cards, regardless of age, income or existing health coverage. Residents who have prescription drug insurance coverage and/or Medicare may use the cards to save on drugs that are not covered by those plans.

There will be no cost to county taxpayers to make the discount cards available to

county residents, according to the NACo. news release. The only requirement for a Gray County residents will be given an county to be able to offer the cards is to be

The program is administered nationally by Caremark Rx, Inc.

"Using the NACo prescription discount card is easy," Wright said. "A cardholder will simply present it at a participating pharmacy. There is no enrollment form, no membership fee and no restrictions or limitations on frequency of use. Cardholders and their family members may use the card any time their prescriptions are not covered by insurance or Medicare."

All local pharmacies will have an opportunity to sign up to participate in the program, Wright said. Caremark will absorb any costs incurred by pharmacies which participate, he said. A national network of more than 57,000 participating retail pharmacies currently honor the cards.

Gray County commissioners voted at their Feb. 1 meeting to offer the discount



Obama agrees to debate Clinton in Texas before March 4 primary

HOUSTON (AP) Obama agreed Barack Thursday to debate Hillary Rodham Clinton in Texas before the state's March 4 primary that has taken on higher stakes with both presidential candidates still closely vying for the Democratic nomination.

No date or place for the Texas debate has been set. Obama's campaign made the announcement Thursday evening hours after Clinton supporters in Texas chided Obama for not agreeing to a Feb. 28 debate in Houston.

Obama campaign spokesman Josh Earnest said the timing had nothing to do with criticism from Clinton supporters, adding that Obama had said earlier that the candi-

dates would debate again. Earnest said the campaign would announce the date and location of a Texas debate "soon."

Cornyn endorsement could help McCain woo conservatives

WASHINGTON (AP) —

Republican Sen. John Cornyn of Texas endorsed fellow border senator and presidential candidate John McCain on Thursday.

Cornyn said he told his Arizona colleague by phone that he was backing him.

Cornyn, who is running for re-election, announced the endorsement after McCain's chief rival, Mitt Romney, suspended his campaign. Cornyn's backing could help McCain as he tries woo conservatives to back him. Cornyn is a conservative who is part of

the Senate leadership. Cornyn gave McCain his support despite a public shouting match with him last year that was widely reported.

The two argued in a closed door meeting while putting the final touches on a comprehensive immigration bill.

Cornyn was unhappy with details of the proposal. When McCain cursed at him for raising his concerns, Cornyn responded by complaining that McCain had been neglecting the negotiations to campaign for president. McCain responded with another expletive, according to media reports about the exchange.

Judge apologizes for man bothered by twin's tickets

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — A traffic judge apologized to a man who was hounded for 17 years by officials trying to get his similarly named twin brother to resolve \$1,800 in unpaid tickets and fines.

The problems all started for 40year-old Edward Stanley Harris between October 1990 and May 1991. During that period, his twin brother, Edwin Shelby Harris, received eight tickets for moving

Edwin Harris pleaded guilty in traffic court in September 1991 and was ordered to pay \$1,501. But Edwin Harris never paid. He hit hard times, drifted south and lost touch with his brother.

In the fall of 1992, the

Pennsylvania Transportation gave Edward Harris a painful reminder of his twin: The agency, confusing him with his brother, told him his license would be suspended for nonpayment of tickets.

Eventually, PennDOT got things cleared up and withdrew the suspension threat. But Edward Harris' fight against bureaucracy was only just beginning.

Every year or so, between November 1992 and June 2007, PennDOT would rediscover Edwin Harris' unpaid tickets and threaten to suspend his twin's license. Each time, Edward Harris would return to traffic court, and the suspension threat would get lifted.

The cycle dragged on until everything he had to go through."

Department of November, when Judge Willie Adams refused to look at the paperwork that showed Edward Harris was innocent, then told him to start paying the tickets or go to jail. That led him to take his story to the Philadelphia Daily News.

After a column Monday, a different traffic judge, Bernice DeAngelis, caught wind of the story. She apologized and said the court would give Edward Harris a refund.

"I'd like the chance to look him in the eye and apologize, from the bottom of my heart," DeAngelis told the newspaper for a story Thursday. "I see what we do in this court as a sacred trust. That might sound corny, but I truly believe it. I'm sorry for

There are currently over 1,300 outstanding warrants issued out of the Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace office. Another 2,400-plus are outstanding out of Pampa Municipal Court. Offenses listed in the warrants are Class C misdemeanors. Curfman

Each court could collect over

\$800,000 if all outstanding warrants were taken care of, he said. The total equals an average of \$333 per warrant for municipal court and an average \$615 per warrant for Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace court.

"This is the second annual statewide warrant roundup, but this is the first year we've participated," Curfman said. "I'm hoping by next year we can list offenders and their information online, like some other communities have done."

Precinct 1 and 3 Justice of the Peace Joe Martinez, whose office's

volume of work differs from that of Curfman, is not participating in the roundup. Precinct 4 Justice of the Peace Mary Ann Carpenter could not be reached for comment.

'We've had several who have already come in and said they'd heard about the roundup and wanted to take care of their citations before being detained," Curfman said.

"On the 18th, we will actively start looking for people and arresting them on the spot," he said. "We'll be making calls, knocking on doors and leav-



It is truly taxing without Rudy in the race

Rudy's gone, and now I'm really ily switch to Rudy's simplified tax plan. depressed.

It's winter, you see, a rough time for the self-employed. It's rough because our 1099s - official records of how much our clients paid us the prior year – arrive in the mail.

My 1099s always add up to more than I thought they would - my taxes will be higher than I expected, and that depresses me.

And because I'll have to organize hundreds of receipts that I keep in a giant box a task that will take countless hours – I get even more depressed.

But Rudy was going to save me from some of those woes. Like all the Republican candidates, Rudy was going to extend Bush's tax cuts. He was going to lower the capital-gains tax from 15 to 10 percent and the corporate-tax from 35 to 25 percent.

His ideas would have unleashed investment and economic growth, as lower taxes always do.

But the best part of the Rudy plan had a direct impact on ME: It would have given me the option to keep filing returns under our current nightmarish tax code or voluntar- dividends and capital gains for folks with

Rudy's voluntary plan had three tax brackets of 10, 15 and 30 percent. It provided basic deductions (health insurance, mortgage interest, charitable contributions, state and local income taxes and a \$3,500 personal exemption). It was so simple, it required only one piece of paper. An English major could complete it.

But Rudy is gone and his simplified tax plan is gone with him.

It's true all the Republican candidates discussed tax-reform ideas. According to the Tax Foundation, Ron Paul

wants to abolish the IRS and slash spending. Mike Huckabee wants to abolish the IRS, too, and replace the income tax with a national sales tax – an idea sensible enough that it will never happen as long as we have a Congress.

Romney proposed cutting the corporate tax rate and eliminating all taxes on interest,

incomes below \$200,000. He said he'd simplify the tax code, but didn't explain how. Ditto for McCain. He says he'll keep

Bush's tax cuts in place and simplify tax filing, too, but hasn't said how.

But at least Romney and McCain gave lip service to simplification. Hillary and Obama don't even do that. They'd likely make

El Paso Times on the colleges' demand for smarter freshmen:

Write it down on paper. It's only logica that if colleges are telling high-school graduates they're under-educated, then somebody has to determine what, then, is an educated

graduate. Something is being done about that. To be college-ready, a high-school graduate should know this, this and that. So will say a printed 104-page packet approved by the Texas Higher

Education Coordinating Board. It's new college readiness standards so everyone from teachers to students to parents know what high-school graduates need to know.

Actually, it's a little scary. The "this, this and that" includes a student's need to understand such subjects as quadratic equations, the laws of thermodynam-

ics and the ability to identify words based on the Greek or Latin roots. There is some social studies in there,

That's what colleges want incoming students to know - more about English, math, science and social studies.

About half of incoming freshmen are now being funneled off to remedial classrooms, each spending a semester or more just catching up on what they didn't learn in high school.

The booklet is the combined effort of high-school teachers, university professors and experts in education. It comes after the Texas Legislature ordered new standards in education in 2006 when it continued to be apparent that Texas ranks low in data showing who's educated and who is not.

The Associated Press in Austin quotes Evelyn Hiatt, senior director of college-readiness initiatives for the coordinating board: "We wanted to spell out clearly what colleges expect," she said.

The new standards seem ...

Well, as Mercedes Guzman of the El Paso School District said, "They're up there."

Mercedes helped lead one of the teams that developed the science standards. "I think a lot of teachers are going to be surprised by this," she told the AP.

The next step is for the state Board of Education and the Texas Education Agency to mandate changes in the state's curriculum so as to meet the pepped-up standards. It's noted that these are not standards for a student being graduated from high school, but standards students should meet if they are college bound.

The coordinating board said it hopes the standards are in place by 2012.

Buffs collect 90-82 victory over Abilene Christian

ABILENE, Texas - The West Texas A&M men's hoops team picked up a 90-82 victory over Abilene Christian on Thursday, improving to 15-6 on the season and 5-1 in Lone Star Conference South play. Senior Robert Lee led the way with a team-high 25 points and a team-high six steals, while senior Andre Hill set a new career record with 21 points while also pulling down eight rebounds.

The Buffs opened up the scoring with flair as Lee grabbed a steal, thundered down court and dunked the ball to spark an early 14-5 run. WT never looked back from its opening points as the Buffs did not relinquish the lead for the rest of the game, holding the Wildcats to shooting just 39.4% from the floor as opposed to their season average of 51.7%.

The Buffs rebuilt their lead by way of a 12-2 run sparked by a Hill jumper followed by two made free throws by Keon Grant. The run put the nail in the coffin as it was too much for the Wildcats to overcome eight points.

Senior Chris Hinz also was solid for WT, finishing with 11 points and seven rebounds, while fellow classmate Tyler Cooper pulled down a team-high 10 rebounds while adding four points.

West Texas A&M continues on its road trip by traveling to San Angelo on Saturday for an 8 p.m. match-up against Angelo State.

ACU upsets No. 12 Lady **Buffs in overtime, 71-66**

ABILENE, Texas - The No. 12 West Texas A&M Lady Buffs dropped a hard fought overtime loss to Abilene Christian, 71-66, on Thursday night at Moody Coliseum, ending WT's 32-game win streak in conference play. Juniors Emily Brister, Courtney Lee and Jamie Dreiling all finished with double-digit point tallies as Brister finished with 20 and Lee and Dreiling scored 10 apiece.

The Lady Buffs fall to 16-4 on the season and 6-1 in Lone Star Conference South action, but remain on top of the standings; meanwhile, the Wildcats improve to 11-9 overall with a 5-2 conference mark, tying with Angelo State and Tarleton State for second place.

WT missed its first four baskets while Abilene Christian started the first half with three made buckets to go ahead, 6-0, before junior Jamie Dreiling put the Lady Buffs on the board with a jumper just outside the paint. Sophomore Holly Isaacs converted an old-fashioned three-point play at 13:09 to give WT its first lead of the game; Isaacs' points followed another lay-up by Dreiling to spark a 13-0 run by the Lady Buffs.

The Wildcats battled back, though, going on a 12-4 run of their own, but WT took over the scoring and Brister sank a buzzer-beater jumper after ducking under ACU's defense to send the teams to the locker rooms with 30-26 lead in favor of the Lady Buffs.

ACU committed 16 turnovers in the half and finished the game with a total of 27, but WT only scored 25 points off of the giveaways. Abilene Christian also out-rebounded West Texas A&M by a 42-28 margin.

The second half was almost a different game as the teams set out with a breakneck pace; ACU took its first lead of the game since the 14:00 mark in the first stanza on a lay-up by Audrey Maxwell, but the Lady Buffs benefited from a three-pointer from Dixie Bell which tied the game at 39 apiece with 14:25 on the clock.

With a three-pointer from junior Chelsea Blackshear at 8:39 that gave WT a one-point

lead, the Lady Buffs went on a 12-2 run, capped by a jumper by freshman Joni Unruh. Unruh, a native of Amarillo, Texas, made a huge defensive stop for the Lady Buffs as she took a change with 1:06 to play, nullifying Kristee Davidson's made jumper and causing Davidson to foul out. But ACU again worked its way back from the deficit to go ahead, 61-60, as Maxwell sank two free throws with just 16 ticks on the clock.

Blackshear took the ball up the court and drove to the basket, drawing a foul and two free throws with 4.08 seconds left. She missed the first attempt but refocused to sink the second try, sending the game into overtime despite WT shooting just 36.7% from the floor in the second half.

Senior Jenessa McKray muscled around ACU's Maxwell and sank a lay-up that put WT ahead, 63-61, just over 30 seconds into the overtime period. Wildcat Jody Meyer was fouled on ACU's next possession and she made both free throws to tie the game. The Lady Buffs got the ball back but quickly committed a turnover; McKray came up with a bit steal on the Wildcats' drive and dished the ball to Brister for an easy lay-up, but for the second time in OT the Wildcats tied the game, this time at 65 points apiece with 2:16 to play.

Maxwell made a lay-up over the WT defense with just 44 seconds left to push ACU ahead, 67-66, then Kat Kundmueller was fouled and sank the ensuing two free throws to give the Wildcats a three-point lead with 22.21 seconds on the clock. West Texas A&M tried to tie the game with a three point basket, but Isaacs misfired and although Blackshear grabbed an offensive rebound, her shot aired out of bounds. MLB steroids dealer to plead for probation after naming

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - A former clubhouse attendant who implicated dozens of major leaguers in the use of performance-enhancing drugs plans to ask a federal judge for leniency Friday after pleading guilty to distributing steroids and laundering money.

Kirk Radomski agreed to cooperate with government investigators and baseball officials after a federal raid on his house. The former New York Mets employee led investigators to Brian McNamee, the former Yankees strength coach who claimed he injected Roger Clemens with steroids and human growth hormone at least 16 times from 1998 to 2001, an allegation the pitch-

er vehemently denies. After his cooperation, Radomski hopes a judge will sentence him Friday to probation rather than prison. In April, he admitted selling speed, steroids and HGH to dozens of players from 1995 until Dec. 14, 2005, when agents raided his Long Island home.

Radomski was required to cooperate with baseball investigator George Mitchell as part of his plea bargain and spoke with the Boston Red Sox director four times, with federal prosecutors attending meetings. If prosecutors feel that Radomski's cooperation is significant, they could ask the judge to mete out a lenient sentence.

"If the government does file that motion, it will show that he substantially assisted the investigation," said Buchanan, Thomas Washington lawyer who assisted on baseball's 1989 Pete Rose investigation. "He also appears to have cooperated extensively with the

Mitchell report.' Given his lack of prior offenses and his extensive cooperation, Radomski faces no more than six months in prison. His lawyer John Reilly, in court papers filed Wednesday, asked U.S. District Judge Susan Illston to sentence Radomski to probation.

"Mr. Radomski has very seriously tried to redeem himself and his redemption started on day one when he met with the federal authorities, admitted his guilt and agreed to cooperate," the filing stated. "Mr. Radomski's cooperation with the government may in some way assist in changing the face of major league baseball as it exists today.'

According to the filing, Radomski took out a mortgage on his Long Island home to open the Pro Touch Detail Center in St. James, N.Y. His lawyer argued that Radomski needs to stay out of prison to operate the business and support his wife and 8-year-old daughter, Paige.

"She is my family's heart and soul, and I am extremely concerned about how this may affect her," Radomski's sister-in-law Nicole Gaskill wrote the judge in January, pleading for probation. "Ultimately, I am afraid of what removing him from her life would do to her."

Missouri gunman left suicide note

A gunman carrying a grudge against City Hall left a suicide note on his bed warning "The truth will come out in the end," before he went on a deadly shooting spree at a council meeting, his brother told The Associated Press Friday.

Arthur Thornton, 42, said in an interview at the family's home that he knew his brother was responsible for the killings when he read the one-line note.

"It looks like my brother is going crazy, but he's just trying to get people's atten-Thornton said, explaining he believed the note reflected his brother's growing frustration with local leaders. Police have the note, he said.

After storming the meeting and killing five people Thursday night, Charles Lee "Cookie" Thornton was fatally shot by law enforcers. Friends and relatives said he had a long-standing feud with the city, and he had lost a federal free-speech lawsuit against the St. Louis suburb just 10 days earlier. At earlier meetings, he said he had received 150 tickets against his business.

"He felt that as a black contractor he was being singled out," said Hodges, who is black. "I guess he thought mentally he had no more recourse. That's not an excuse."

The weekly Webster-Kirkwood Times quoted Swoboda as saying in June 2006 that Thornton's contentious remarks over the years created "one of the most embarrassing situations that I have experienced in my many years of public service."

At least three dead in refinery blast

working gingerly through a still-burning sugar refinery found three bodies Friday and were trying to reach the remains of three others killed in an explosion overnight, Georgia's top fire official said.

Crews found the three bodies in tunnels beneath the building, which was reduced to a mass of rubble, twisted beams and mangled metal, Georgia Insurance and Safety Fire Commissioner John Oxendine said.

Local authorities said they had not heard of any recov-

We have not had any confirmed deaths yet. I know of the refinery on the Savannah River. that for a fact. They are still going through the rubble as we speak," Savanah-Chatham County Police Sgt. Mike Wilson said.

Police Chief Michael Berkow told families of missing workers that rescue efforts at the massive Imperial Sugar Company refinery had shifted to recovery operations hours after the explosion erupted late Thursday. Dozens of the nearly 100 people were working inside at the time of the blast were hurt, many critically burned.

Fire officials said they had begun clearing debris so they could move farther into the plant, and predicted the injured.

PORT WENTWORTH, Ga. (AP) - Firefighters blaze could be extinguished by Friday afternoon. Fire Chief Greg Long said he wasn't giving up hope some of the missing might still be found alive in rooms blocked by debris.

"I have friends that work at this plant," Long said. "I don't want to see a casualty list."

Officials had not determined what caused the explosion Thursday night but said they suspect sugar dust, which can be volatile.

"There was fire all over the building," said Nakishya Hill, a machine operator who escaped from the third floor

"All I know is, I heard a loud boom and everything came down," said Hill, who was uninjured except for blisters on her elbow. "All I could do when I got down was take off running.'

The blast was felt by residents throughout the Savannah suburb.

Police Lt. Alan Baker and his wife, Joyce, told CNN they were among the first on the scene. Alan Baker said he went with a maintenance worker to turn off a gas main while his wife, a Red Cross first aid instructor, treated the

Astronauts carefully check shuttle for post-launch damage

Atlantis conducted a painstaking laser inspection of the ship's wings Friday, looking for any signs of damage from its trip into

space. Launched Thursday after two months of technical delays, the shuttle was chasing the international space station in orbit with a special delivery: Europe's \$2 billion Columbus lab. The shuttle was scheduled to reach it Saturday.
