## **City to hold special** meeting for rezoning

#### By DAVID BOWSER Staff Writer

The Pampa City Commission is planning a special meeting at 5 p.m. Monday in the commission chambers to decide a rezoning request after a public hearing during their regular meeting last Tuesday afternoon. Only four people testified during the public hearing last Tuesday. Richard Morris, director public works for the city; Doug Hixson, pastor of the Cornerstone Baptist Church; Charles Lowry, pastor of the CrossPointe Church, and Ian Mackay, owner of the property.

Ian and Martha Mackay are requesting that 5.08 acres of God's Plateau Subdivision on the southeast corner of 23rd Ave. and Price Road be rezoned to commercial for storage units. It is now zoned for single-family homes. Morris told the commission that God's Plateau Subdivision was platted in the 1970s or 1980s and that the Cornerstone Baptist Church is the only building at the intersection now.

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"Trying to develop that area is going to be expensive," Morris said.

Running utilities to the area will cost a lot of money, he said.

Cornerstone Baptist Church paid to have a water main run to their property, but since part of the

Amarillo's north side this week. Pampa Fire Chief Kim Powell hoped that the city commission will approve her request for a new fire truck to battle grass fires when they meet in special session Monday.

She told the city commission earlier this week that department's trucks were heavily used during the spring wild fires of 2006 that burned off a million acres across the panhandle and threatened the north side of Pampa.

"Recently," Powell said, "we've been encountering an increase in our brush fires, what we call wild land interface fires, just this last month."

She said that from Jan. 1 through mid-February last year, the fire department records showed only one or two grass fires. This year for the same period, they've had

trucks used for fighting grass fires. "We still have some more to take care of," Powell said.

She wasn't able to take the older truck off-line to repair it because of the runs they were making. She said the transfer case is leaking extensively in the 1984 model Ford truck

"We're just keeping it filled," she said.

Most fire fighting equipment is custom made, she said, but after discussions during budgeting sessions last year, Powell said she began looking for equipment that might be available with little or no modification.

"We tried to find something that we could do turnkey," she said, "where we could actually just drive it off the lot."

property is outside the city limits, the church elected to install a septic system rather than have a city sewer line run to the building.

Morris said the city's policy in the past has been to encourage development.

"We are always interested in new development, " Morris said.

Doug Hixson, pastor of the Cornerstone Baptist Church, spoke against the change in zoning. He said he had no problem with the storage units, but he feared what else might go in along Price Road if the zoning were changed to commercial.

"I'd like to speak against the change of zoning for the property God's Acres, five acres across the street from us," Hixson told the city commissioners.

Hixson said his church owns 20 acres on the northeast corner of the 23rd and Price Road intersection.

"Our church purchased that land several years back with the understanding that it was in a residential area," Hixson said, "and we would have the ability to grow a church in a residential location."

He said the church has already built on their lot. That building is valued, he said, at more than \$1 million.

"We also have plans to build a second adjoining building there," Hixson said.

It will be valued at between \$1.5 and \$2 million, he said.

Hixson said his church feels like the zoning change would negatively affect the area. The Baptist minister acknowledged that his church is the only one there at the moment.

"We've invested to bring the utilities out there," Hixson said.

He said his church is not against expansion in Pampa.

"We're very much for it," Hixson said. He said the storage unit

project should find another place in town.

"We do not have a personal

Hixson says he is not concerned about what might be built along Price Road today, but he is concerned about how it may be developed over the next 20 years.

"We do have concerns," Hixson said. "Not necessarily what's going to be built today on that five acres, but what's going to happen in 20 years. We have absolutely no desire to move. We've planted ourselves in a place where we have room to expand and be there for a long time. What's going to happen in 20 years or 30 years? If this is zoned commercially, will the whole street become commercial? Will we be in the middle of a bunch of welding shops?"

Charles Lowry, pastor of the CrossPointe Church, asked several questions of the commission, but he did not oppose to the storage project.

Lowry said his church has 3.5 acres just east of the proposed storage units.

He said that at the first meeting of the Planning and Zoning Commission, he visited with the Mackays. Lowry said he had some of the same concerns that Hixson had expressed, but the Mackays had alleviated the concerns he had. He said that the construction of the storage units would help his church with the utility lines being run.

"I think it would be a spur for future growth out there," Lowry said.

Ian Mackay, who also owns storage units in Borger, said he had spoken with Lowry and with Wells Street Church of Christ that owns neighboring property and had overcome their objections. Mackay told the commission that he felt he had overcome their fears; however, he said that Cornerstone Baptist Church had refused to talk with him.

Mackay indicated that the project he is planning will be larger than Borger and should generate more tax revenue for the city.

"We bought the property not thinking that anyone would object to this location," Mackay said.

He said he never thought that anyone would want to build houses across Price Road from a cemetery. He also said that he had also looked at the intersection of Sumner and Somerville but was unhappy

about the way the negotiations had gone there.

"It is a great piece of property," Mackay said of the 23rd and Price Road location, "and that's the reason we bought it."

He said that the cost of bringing sewer and water lines to the project hasn't phased the project.

'So far the estimate for the sewer alone is \$80,000," Mackay said.

The water line is estimated to be about \$30,000.

Mackay said he thinks it would be advantageous for the two churches planning to build there to split the costs with his project. He said that as soon as he bought the two five acre lots (only one is being proposed for rezoning), he mowed them and cleaned them up.

"The second piece of property that we purchased," Mackay said, "the only reason we bought it was because of the amount of money it's going to cost to take the sewer and the water into this location."

He said that once the utilities were run to that location, it should push the price of that property up. Mackay said that the storage business is a very quiet, low traffic business. He said that eventually he would like to build a boat and RV storage unit at the initial location. If he cannot get the rezoning passed, Mackay said he would have to sell the property, and he cannot say who would buy it and what they would plan for it.

The city commission is expected to meet in special session Monday with the Planning and Zoning Commission to render a decision.

"Customarily," Robbins said, "we do not go against our Zoning Planning and Commission."

Lance DeFever, chairman of the Planning and Zoning Commission, forwarded a letter to the commission in January noting that two people spoke against the change in zoning and only one spoke in support of it.

"The board felt compelled," DeFever wrote, "to vote in favor of the majority and not ask the city commission to



She said that the Miami fire department got a good deal on a brush truck when someone had defaulted on a grant.

"They paid about \$65,000 for theirs," Powell said.

She checked on used equipment, but she said such trucks are used hard and under tough circumstances. The ones she found, she said were pretty well beat up.

Eventually, she said she talked with Gulf Coast Apparatus Services in Spring, Texas. They offered her a 2008 Ford F550 truck ment that she'd found. When Powell and the commission had first talked about such a fire truck last year, the estimated cost was



In 1942, the British colony Singapore surrendered to the Japanese during World War II.

In 1961, 73 people, including an 18-member U.S. figure skating team en route to Czechoslovakia, were killed in the crash of a Sabena Airlines Boeing 707 in Belgium.

In 1965, Canada's new maple-leaf flag was unfurled in ceremonies in Ottawa.

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## The debt bomb is ticking for America

One of the older books on my shelves is "A Short History of the United States" by John Spencer Bassett, a professor at Smith College, and revised by his son, Richard Bassett. It was published in 1938.

It is interesting to note what the book had to say about the causes of the Great Depression, which began with the stock-market collapse in 1929:

"The accumulation of debt throughout the country, in farm districts and city districts, in private enterprise and in local governments had grown larger than the national income could endure. Farmers had mortgaged their farms, wage earners had bought on the installment plan, small and large investors had borrowed to speculate, companies had borrowed to expand, railroads had a long heritage of debt, municipal governments had borrowed heavily for roads and public buildings; the national government finally in spite of reductions was still carrying a large debt from the war. The boom psychology - and credits to foreign buyers - had sustained this edifice for a few years but when it crumbled at one

Some years ago, I went into my newspaper's morgue and dug out the microfilm of the papers published in October 1929 and read them page by page. There was not a hint of the coming crash, but there were several statements identical to those we often hear today - to wit, "The econo-





#### Marriage topic of Catholic survey

WASHINGTON (AP) - Most Roman Catholics say church teachings shape their views of marriage, yet they also get some tenets wrong and are largely accepting of divorce, a new survey found.

Seventy percent of married U.S. Catholics were either wed in a Catholic church or have had their marriages blessed by the church, according the survey by the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate at Georgetown University.

A majority of Catholics - 55 percent - said their opinions about marriage have been at least "somewhat" informed by church teaching.


Most accurately described church teachings about the sacrament of marriage, including that the church does not consider a civil marriage after divorce to be sacramentally valid. However, 76 percent of adult Catholics also said divorce is acceptable in some cases.

Misconceptions also were discovered. The survey found six in 10 Catholics have heard that a non-Catholic spouse must promise to have the couple's children raised Catholic, which has not been the case since a change in canon law in 1983.

On the whole, Catholics were comparable to the U.S. population in marriage demographics, including marriage age and frequency of divorce, the study found.

The survey of 1,008 self-identified Catholic adults, conducted in June 2007, was commissioned by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Marriage and Family Life.

DEAR ABBY: You were right to tell "Just Saying No" (Jan. 16) that his pot-smoking classmates could be headed for addiction or other problems. I worry that marijuana poses more risks to teens than they -- or their parents -- recognize. More kids need professional help kicking marijuana than for all other drugs combined. It is not a "harmless" drug. School failure, which you mentioned, could be only the first of many problems daily pot smokers may experience. Researchers have a long way to go in understanding the complexity of brain function, but we know that illicit drug use changes the developing brain. Many young people smoke pot before their brain development is settled, and their chronic use of the drug can affect certain centers in the brain that control emotion and reason. Research shows that regular use of marijuana may also lead to mental health problems. Youth who use marijuana weekly have double the risk of depression later in life, and are three times more likely than non-users to have suicidal thoughts. --MARC GALANTER, M.D., DIREC-TOR, DIVISION OF ALCOHOLISM AND DRUG ABUSE, NEW YORK UNI-**VERSITY MEDICAL CENTER**

DEAR LINDSAY: Because, as part of their business, magicians often spend a lot of time on the road, expect a vanishing act. (Now you see him -- now you don't.)



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## Pampa local plans to continue NFL career with another team


The Miami Dolphins released linebacker Zach Thomas, a Pampa local, Thursday morning in an effort to help their major rebuilding project.

Thomas is a seven-time Pro Bowl linebacker and one of the most popular and productive players to wear a Dolphins uniform.

"Zach Thomas has been a great player on this team for many years," Dolphin's general manager Jeff Ireland said. "And because of the type of player and the kind of person that Zach is, this was not an easy decision."

34-year-old Thomas said he plans on continuing his linebacker career with another team.

"I am healthy and look forward to playing in 2008, but will always consider myself a Miami Dolphin," Thomas said in a statement. Due to concussions and migrains, Thomas missed most of last season and, against his wishes, was placed on injured reserve in



Originally, the Dolphins claimed that Thomas was uninjured in that crash. With numerous migrains following his wreck, Thomas never made it back to the field in 2007.

Releasing Thomas is the second major salary slash this week by Miami. The Dolphis went 1-15

last season, which caused

new football operations head Bill Parcells to start rebuilding.

This season, Thomas was to make about \$5.6 million in base salary. In the 1996 draft, Thomas

was the 154th player chosen. Many didn't give the Pampa native much of a chance of making the Dolphin's roster.

Thomas proved them wrong, becoming one of the best linebackers in Dolphins history.

And into Dolphins history Thomas goes, leading the Dolphins in tackles ten times. He also became the franchise's all-time leader in tackling, and also played the most games (168 games) of any Miami defensive player. In his first 11 seasons as a Dolphin, he missed only 13 games, and in 2006, he

recorded a career-best 165 tackles.

"I have a tremendous appreciation and admiration not only for the Dolphins organization, but for the fans as well, for all the support they have given me, Thomas said in a statement.

## Former Aggies standout Acie Law to be honored Saturday

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) — Acie Law IV was perhaps the most visible player in Texas A&M's improbable rise from Big 12 laughingstock to national contender.

So it's fitting that Law will become the first Texas A&M athlete to have his jersey permanently displayed in an Aggies sporting venue on Saturday.

In what's being billed as "Acie Law Day," the current Atlanta Hawk will be honored with a ceremony at halftime of A&M's game against Oklahoma State in which his No. 1 jersey will be raised to the rafters of Reed Arena. The number is not being retired, but Law's jersey will remain on display at the arena "forever," according to coach Mark Turgeon.

Though he never coached Law, it was first-year coach Turgeon who came up with the idea and pushed for the honor.

"You can argue that no four-year player has ever had a bigger impact on the basketball program and the university," Turgeon said. "Acie helped the program become respected in the state of Texas and on national level."

#### College Station, Law helped the Aggies go from an 0-16 Big 12 record to their first NCAA Sweet Sixteen appearance since 1980. And their 27 wins last season were the most in A&M history, capping a school-

record three straight 20-win seasons for a program that had wallowed in mediocrity or worse for much of the last two decades.

Law won the Bob Cousy Award, given to the nation's top point guard, and became the school's first consensus All-American last season.

In his four years in and they're moving forward to do this, it means a great deal to me," said Law, who plans to spend the weekend in College Station. "It's something I'm looking forward to.'

> Law became the highest draft pick in A&M history when the Hawks chose him with the 11th pick in last year's draft. He has struggled with an ankle injury this season, but scored a season-high 13 points in Atlanta's last game before the All-Star break, a 100-98 loss to Charlotte.

The Aggies are ranked 16th in the latest poll, their school-record 35th straight week to appear in the national rankings. Before this recent streak, Texas A&M had been ranked for just 27 weeks in its history.

Turgeon said the decision to push for this was easy because he witnessed Law's importance to the program while coaching at Wichita State. Law was moved by the gesture.

"I didn't play for him and hardly know him, but he said I deserve that honor and pushed for it," Law said.
