


Bi-District Champs



On this drive McCook hit Pinkerton again for a 32-yard gain. On 3rd and 13 from 38 yards out, Pinkerton caught another pass from McCook and stormed into the end zone. The Covote's stats were impressive with 344 total yards. The Coyotes had 20 rushes for 188 yards and completed 7 of 13 attempts for 156 yards. The Coyote defense gave up only 64 total yards. The Wildcats had 17 rushes for 43 yards, and they completed 3 of 7 passes for 21 yards. The Coyotes threw tow interceptions, and the Cats lost two fumbles.

Vitamins offer prescription for healthy skin

Egg on your face to prevent wrinkles? Eating liver to fight skin cancer? The antioxidant vitamins, A, C and E that many people take every day might just be the answer to prevent and diminish wrinkles, heal wounds, fight acne and prevent skin cancer according to new scientific research.

When taken as a vitamin supplement, researchers believe that vitamin E strengthens the immune system to improve the overall disease fighting capabilities of your body.

"While a little of these vitamins is a

good thing, it's important to remember that a lot of anything can be bad for you," cautioned Dr. Keller. "Vitamins C, and E offer many benefits when taken at recommended doses as topical treatments or supplements. There's no evidence that large quantities of any of the vitamins will increase results."

The prescription for healthy skin?

Limit sun exposure. Always wear sunscreen. And make sure you're getting the recommended daily allowance of vitamins A, C, and E. And consult your dermatologist for additional advice on how to prevent and diminish wrinkles, heal wounds, fight acne, and prevent skin cancer.

All in all/we can look forward to /a very nice




