We're Back! Coyotes Return to State Championship

The Borden County Coyotes continued their domination as they rolled through the Balmorhea Bears to win the Semi-final Championship and a ticket to the "Big Dance." The Coyotes out-scored their opponent last Friday night in Kermit by a score of 70 to 24. The Coyotes increased their record to 13-1 and received a chance to prove to the world that somebody can play with the highly favored Trinidad Trojans in the state game.

The Coyotes received the ball first and wasted no time putting 8 points on the board as they went 50 yards to cap off a 7 play drive. From the one yard line Fernando Baeza plunged across the line for the score. Colt McCook kicked the PAT good. With 6:38 left in the quarter the Coyotes took the lead and never relinquished it.

After making one first down the Coyote defense held the Bears and forced them to turn the ball over on downs. The Coyotes took over on their own 23 yard line. This time it took 7 plays to go the 57 yards for the next score. From the two yard line McCook faked the dive and pulled the ball for the play action pass hit Ryan

Grant in the end zone. McCook kicked the PAT good to make the score 16-0 with 2:06 left in the first period.

The Bears took over on their own 20 yard line

after Javier Galvan kicked the ball through the end zone for the touch back. On the first play of this Bear possession Baeza caused a Bear to fumble the ball; and McCook

FFA Public Relations Places 2nd at State

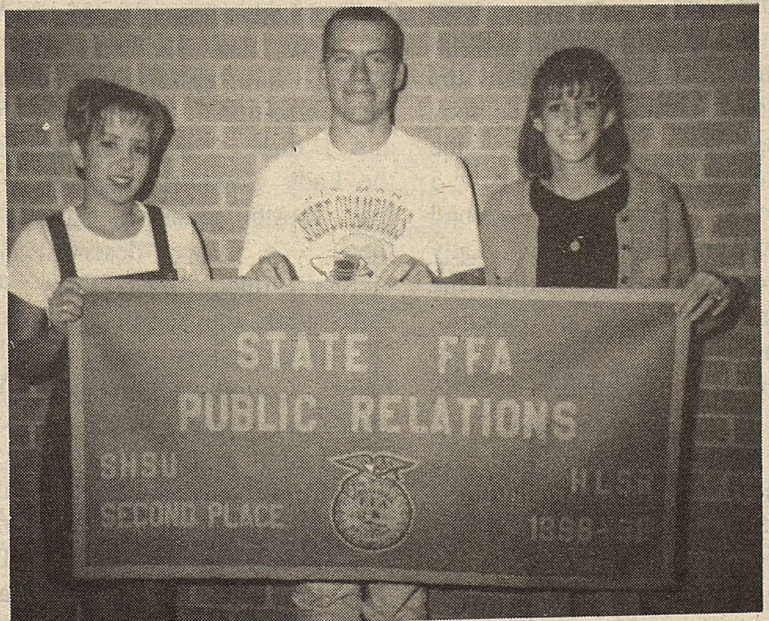
The Gail FFA Public Relations represented Area II in style as they placed second in the State competition this past weekend.

Lady Coyotes return home with Championship Trophy from Coahoma Touranment

The Lady Coyotes traveled to Coahoma over the week-end to participate in their first tournament of the season. In the first game of the tournament the Lady Coyotes faced an opponent they had seen previously, the Lady Buffs of Stanton. The first quarter of the ball-game saw the Lady Coyotes taking a slim margin in the scoring. The Lady Coyotes defense held the Lady Buffs to 3 field goals while they scored 3 field goals, 1 three and missed 2 free throws. The score after the first quarter was 9-6. The Lady Coyotes were not willing to let the difference of the score of 3 points be a factor of the game. They knew they could improve on their offensive production and could become more aggressive on defense.

As the second quarter began, they took a great deal of pride in stopping the scoring of the Lady Buffs by causing several turnovers from their mistakes. The Lady Buffs struggled to score from the field scoring 1 three; they added 2 for 2 from the free throw line for their 5 points in the second quarter. While the Lady Coyotes were causing the Lady Buffs fits on defense, the Lady Coyotes got charged offensively scoring 2 threes, 2 field goals and 4 of 6 from the line. As the Lady Coyotes continued adding to their lead in the second quarter they made few mistakes and lead at half time 23 to 11. The Lady Buffs had committed 6 fouls to the Lady Coyotes 7 in the first half.

In the third period the Lady Buffs had the first opportunity to score as they had the ball on the possession arrow. With the Lady Coyotes continuing to put on the defensive

pressure, the Lady Buffs failed to score. The Lady Coyotes took over the ball and scored a 3 point basket. After a few turnovers by the Buffs, the Lady Coyotes added 3 field goals and 2 for 2 from the line. The Lady Buffs were successful on 2 field goals and 2 for 2 from the line to add 6 points to their half time score. After the third period was over the score stood 34 to 17.

With a very comfortable third quarter lead the Lady Coyotes settled into playing a very offensively productive fourth and final quarter. The Lady Coyotes defense kept the Lady Buffs at bay giving up 2 field goals and 1 three. A few fouls by the Lady Coyotes gave the Lady Buffs an opportunity to go to the free throw line to make 4 of 5. Later in the fourth quarter the Lady Buffs gave the Lady Coyotes the same opportunity sending the Lady Coyotes to the free throw line where they made 4 for 8. The Lady Coyotes didn't just take that opportunity, but also got hot from the field scoring 4 field goals and 1 three. The 15 points the Lady Coyotes scored in the fourth quarter gave them a well-deserved victory over the Lady Buffs with the score 49 to 28. That victory sent the Lady Coyotes into the semi-final game with a record of 4 and 2.

The victory over the Lady Buffs sent the Lady Coyotes to take on the Lady Cubs from Brown-

field on Saturday morning. The Lady Coyotes took charge and stopped the Lady Cubs from the get go. The Lady Cubs struggled with the tenacious Lady Coyotes defense and scored 2 field goals. The only time the Lady Coyotes gave anything to the Lady Cubs was at the free throw line where they shot and made 2 for 6. With the 2 field goals and 2 free throws, the Lady Cubs came away with 6 points in the first quarter. The turnovers from the Lady Cubs provided the Lady Coyotes a lot of offensive power. While the Lady Coyotes started out slow at the beginning of the game, those turnovers started adding up to 14 points in the first quarter.

With 5 field goals and a dismal 5 for 10 from the free throw line, the Lady Coyotes had scored the 14 points to give them an 8 point head start. Not only was the Lady Coyotes' lead a substantial factor in the first quarter, but also the Lady Cubs were getting into early foul trouble.

The second quarter started with the Lady Cubs taking the ball out of bounds but soon turning the ball over. The Lady Coyotes took off on another scoring spree making 6 field goals for 12 of their 18 points. While the Lady Cubs were continuing to turn the ball over for some easy baskets they also were getting into more foul trouble. The Lady Coyotes took advantage of the Cub's foul problems and made 6 of 9 free throws. The Lady Coyotes wanted to find out if they Lady Cubs could make a few free throws of their own, so they sent the Lady Cubs to the free throw line as well, where they made 7 of 10 from the line. Even though the Lady Coyotes opened up a

small opening for the Lady Cubs at the line they shut them down from the field allowing only 1 basket to be made, which was a 3 pointer. This gave the Lady Cubs 10 points in the second quarter. With all the fouls committed in the first two quarters, 12 for the Lady Coyotes and 16 for the Lady Cubs the advantage began going in favor of the Lady Coyotes. The half time score of the game was Lady Coyotes 32 Lady Cubs 16. As the Lady Coyotes went to the locker room they were very pleased and excited about the first two quarters.

The Lady Coyotes took the first possession after half time and started out scoring 2 of their 11 field goals. Most of the field goals were easy baskets as the Lady Cubs not only struggled against a swarming defense from the Lady Coyotes, they gave away some easy lay-ups off of their press. With several steals and some great defensive rebounding the Lady Coyotes finished the third quarter with a total of 22 points. Championship Game

The Lady Coyotes accomplished what they set out to do by making the finals of the Coahoma Tournament and played the host team the Lady Bulldogs in the championship game Saturday evening. This game was the second game of the day for the Lady Coyotes after defeating the Lady Cubs earlier that morning. The Lady Coyotes opened up with a lot of tired determination and hustle in the first quarter of the game. They picked up right where they had left off at the last game with some great defense and some strong scoring from the floor. They held the Lady Bulldogs to only 2 field goals in that first quarter by using their full-court press and causing the

recovered it at the Bear 28 yard line. The Coyotes failed to convert a first down on this possession as they turned the ball over on downs to the Bears.

In just two plays the Bears went 63 yards for their first score of the game. Their PAT was missed, and with :23 seconds left in the first period the score was 16-6.

Kevin Pinkerton carried the ball to the 25 yard line on the kick return. This drive took just 4 plays to produce points for the Coyotes. Baeza had two nice carries for 34 and 22 yards, the latter of which was good for the touchdown. McCook kicked the PAT good again to make the score read 24-6 with 8:34 left in the second period.

Ramon Griffin made a great shoe string tackle on the kick-off team to stop a big play from developing for the Bears. They took over on their own 25 yard line. After making one first down the Coyotes forced the Bears to give the ball back on downs. The Coyotes took possession on their own 22 yard line. In 6 plays this time the Coyotes found pay-dirt again. This time Baeza was on the receiving end of a McCook pass that went 36 yards for the TD. The PAT was kicked good by McCook. With 3:29 left in the first half the Coyote lead was increased, 32-6.

After only one first down the Bears were forced to give the ball up on downs. On first and fifteen from the Coyote 26 yard line, McCook hit Colt Miller on a 54-yard bomb for the touchdown. McCook kicked the PAT good to make the score 40-6 with just 1:25 left in the first half.

The Bears found the end zone for another 6 points with just :50 seconds left in the first half. This drive needed only two plays to produce points as they scored from 55 yards out. Their PAT

attempt for one point failed as Grant intercepted the pass in the end zone.

The Coyotes desperately tried to put more points on the board before the half was over. On fourth down from our own 28 yard line a long bomb was attempted to Miller again but this time it was a little long. The ball went over on downs and gave the Bears just enough time for one play to try to get more points on the board. A good rush by Grant forced the quarterback to throw the ball to a back who then ran well to the 8 yard line before he was tackled by Miller.

The Bears received the ball first in the second half and returned the kick-off to their own 36 yard line. The Bear runner looked as though he might break loose when Robert Stamper came across the field to make the tackle. The Bears wasted no time finding the end zone. In just three plays they put 6 more points up as they ran the ball over from 30 yards out. Their PAT was missed, and the score with 8:58 left in the third period was 40-18.

The Coyotes answered the Bears with 8 points of their own in just two plays on their next possession. McCook hit Grant on a pass that went 50 yards for the touchdown. With just 7:51 left McCook kicked the PAT good to increase the Coyotes lead, to 48-18.

The Bears again answered the Coyotes with a score on their next possession that took only 2 plays. Their PAT was blocked by Miller, and with 7:17 left in the third the score was 48-24.

It was all Coyote from there as the Coyotes scored the next three times in a row. This time the Coyotes had a one play drive as Baeza ran a sweep that went 61 yards for the touchdown. The PAT was kicked good by McCook to make the score 56-24 with 6:54 left in the third period.

The Bears were moving the ball again and had made one first down on

this drive. Joseph Hardman wrapped up a Bear runner and forced the ball loose. There was a massive pile as players from both teams were scrambling for the ball and when Ryan Grant recovered the fumble and handed it over to the official. It looked like a magic trick. It was the Coyotes' ball at the 26 yard line.

On the very next play from 54 yards out McCook hit Stamper for a touchdown. Nick Flanigan attempted the next PAT kick, and it just missed. With 5:54 left in the third period the score was 62-24.

The Bears took over on their own 36 yard line as Preston Sharp was there first to wrap up the runner. Good Coyote defense held the Bears without a first down this time, and the ball went over to the Coyotes.

The Coyotes were barking at the door again as they had moved the ball to the Bear 23 yard line. An attempt to hit a Coyote in the end zone failed as a Bear intercepted the ball. From the 20 yard line the Bears took over. On fourth down from the 26 yard line it looked as though a Bear had found his receiver for a 68 yard touchdown, but the Bear quarterback had crossed the line of scrimmage before he released the ball. The penalty was five yards and a loss of down, which gave possession of the ball to the Coyotes at the 22 yard line.

On fourth and 10 from the 17 yard line, McCook kept the ball and ran it to the 3 yard line. From there Pinkerton took the ball over for the score. The game ended on the 45 point rule as the PAT was kicked through by McCook for his eighth in a row. The score was 70-24 with :28 seconds left in the third period.

The Coyotes had 15 first downs and 537 total yards of offense. The Bears had 8 first downs and 389 yards of offense. The Coyote offense was pretty balanced with 268 yards rushing in 27

plays, and 269 passing yards. The Bears had 306 yards rushing in 29 plays. They were 3 of 7 passing for 83 yards. The Coyotes threw one interception; the Bears threw none. The Bears lost 2 fumbles, and the Coyotes lost none. There was not a punt in the game by either team. The Coyotes had two penalties for 7 yards, and the Bears had 5 penalties for 40 yards.

Colt McCook had all the passing yardage this week, completing 12 of 18 passes for 269 yards, one interception, and 4 touchdowns. McCook also ran the ball 5 times for 66 yards. On defense he recovered a fumble and had 6 solo tackles.

Fernando Baeza carried the ball 16 times for 192 yards and 3 touchdowns. He caught 5 passes for 78 yards and a touchdown. Baeza also led the defense with 11 tackles and caused a fumble.

Ryan Grant caught 2 passes for 52 yards and a touchdown. He had 6 tackles on defense, a fumble recovery, and a quarterback hurry.

Colt Miller caught 4 passes for 85 yards and a touchdown. Miller also had 9 tackles on defense, and he broke a pass play up by slapping the ball away.

Robert Stamper caught a McCook pass for 54 yards and a touchdown. He had one tackle on the special teams.

Kevin Pinkerton got the last carry of the game for 3 yards and a touchdown. Kevin played end and center on offense. On defense he had 5 tackles and caused a fumble. Kevin also did a great job as the deep snapper on the extra-point team.

Ed Rodriguez had only 3 carries before leaving the game with a head injury. He will be all right but spent most of Friday night counting the stars.

Ramon Griffin snatched the ball some on offense and played some defensive end. He had two tackles from that position.

Preston Sharp played on the extra-point team and the kick-off team. He had two tackles on the evening.

Joseph Hardman played a lot of defense after Rodriguez was out. Hardman did a great job there, recording 3 tackles and a caused fumble. His ankle is getting stronger every week, and even though he still is not 100%, he still has much to offer this team.

John Harding and Justin Lawrence are also on the extra-point team.

These guys just play better every week. I don't know if we are better than we were this time last year, but we are for sure playing as well. I can't believe it is the 15th week of football and I am still writing these articles. For the second year in a row the Coyotes have played football for as long as you possibly can. The only thing that can top that now is to have two state championships. The Trinidad Trojans are a very good football team with more speed than anyone in the state. They have jelled into a very good football team behind the talent of tailback, Damian Jackson. He is very speedy and hard to catch. If he gets into the open it will be six points. The Coyotes will have to do their best to keep him and the Trojans contained. This will definitely be our greatest challenge of the year. You are supposed to have a greater challenge each week you play. If the Coyotes play this game like they have in the other play-off games, I know we will have a chance to win. Everyone come to the "Big Dance" at Glen Rose and root the Coyotes to another state championship.
