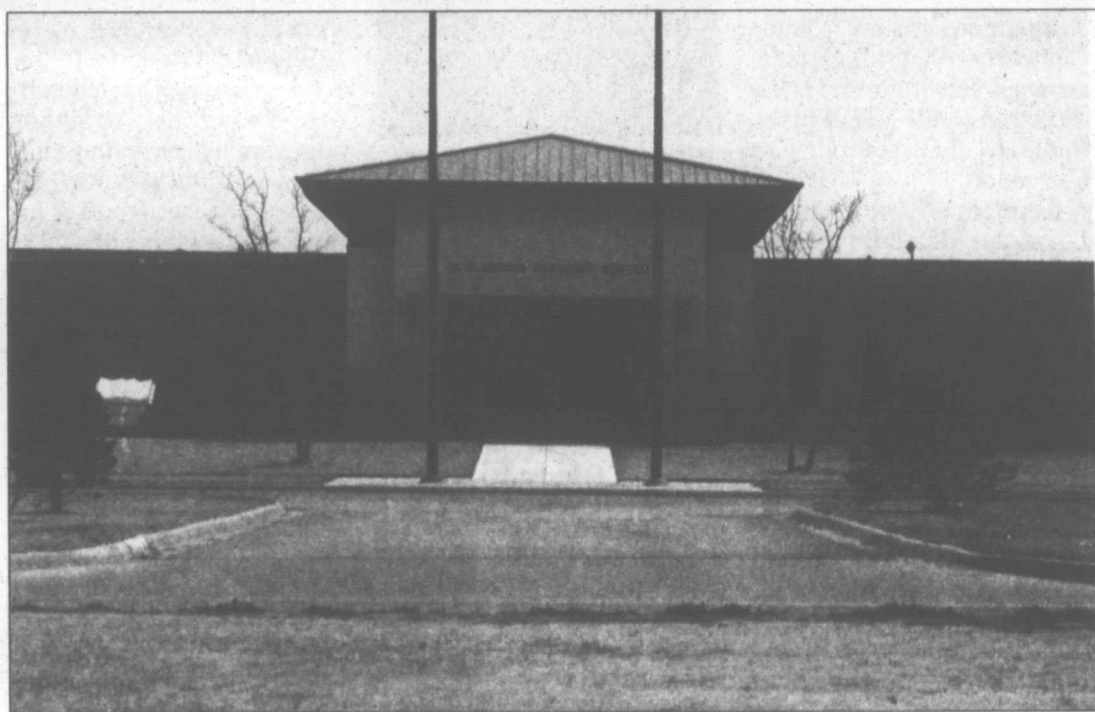

## May ballot contains 5 cent tax to benefit Pampa Center

All Gray County registered voters will be given an opportunity to vote in May concerning a proposed five-cent maintenance tax, with proceeds to go to Clarendon College-Pampa Center.

"All tax dollars collected from the tax must be used in Gray County," said Raymond Jaramillo, dean of the Pampa Center and dean of administrative services. Texas state law requires that such funds must be spent only in the county in which the campus is located.

State law also requires that the maintenance tax, if adopted, never exceed five cents per \$100 valuation of taxable property. Gray County commissioners would be responsible for the amount of tax charged each year, but commissioners would be limited to the five-

cent ceiling. The Pampa Center would determine how to use the funds, and would submit an annual budget to county commissioners for their approval concerning use of the tax revenue if the maintenance tax passes, Jaramillo said.

Property owners would pay \$4.17 per month, or \$50.04 per year, for example, for property valued at \$100,000 if the maintenance tax is approved and the rate set at five cents, according to information provided by Partners for Higher Education.

The Pampa Center is currently funded by tuition and fees collected from students of the center and funds from the parent campus. The projected annual maximum income from the proposed maintenance tax would be between \$700,000 and \$800,000 at current appraisal

values, said Lee Porter, chairman of the steering committee that is promoting the tax.

"This tax will be on a separate line on the property owners' tax statements each year," Porter said. "All exemptions will apply to this tax, too."

Maintenance tax revenues may result in tuition reduction, and can be used for maintenance costs and to facilitate special projects, Porter said.

"Tuition could be reduced by \$9 an hour if the tax is passed," he said.

The center has plans to expand its career and technical offerings, and maintenance tax funds could be used for these offerings.

"Right now, Clarendon College has approved special programs here for heating and air conditioning and diesel mechanics," Porter

## Railroad Commission runoff

# Early voting begins Monday

Early voting in a statewide runoff election between two Democratic candidates for state railroad commissioner begins Monday in the non-jury courtroom on the first floor of Gray County Courthouse, 205 N. Russell.

Mark Thompson and Dale Henry received the most votes in a three-way race in the March 4 primary. Thompson received 940,722 votes statewide, while Henry got 539,300. A third Democratic candidate, Art Hall, garnered 466,758 votes, according to the Texas Secretary of State's office.

Thompson also received the most Gray County votes in the primary, with 549 compared to Henry's 188. Hall got 156 local votes.

Early voting will be from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays through April 4. The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. April 8 at the county's seven precinct voting locations for the runoff election.

Persons who voted as Democrats in the March 4 primary and those who did not vote in the March primary may vote in the April 8 runoff election if they wish. Those who cast Republican ballots in March cannot vote in the runoff election, according to state election rules.

Those wishing to vote in the runoff election must be registered voters and must bring their voter registration cards, valid Texas driver's license or valid Texas photo ID card with them in order to cast their ballot.

## McLean man charged with sexual assault

A McLean man remained in Gray County Jail as of press time Friday in lieu of \$25,000 bond in connection with a sexual assault which was reported Thursday.

Merle Edwin Bowyer, 38, was booked into jail at 3:17 p.m. Thursday on a charge of aggravated sexual assault. Precinct 2 Justice of the Peace Kurt Curfman arraigned Bowyer and set bond.

The arrest by Gray County sheriff's deputies came after

a 26-year-old woman reported to Deputy Lynn Hudson that she had been assaulted in the early morning hours Tuesday at a residence in McLean, according to GCSO Chief Deputy Kelly Rushing.

She had gone to Bowyer's house, she reported, and Bowyer allegedly subsequently threatened her with a knife and sexually assaulted her, Rushing said.

After the assault, the victim left the residence, according to sheriff's office reports. No injuries were reported in connection with the incident.

## City's financial reporting exemplary, says auditor

The city's finances haven't always been great, but their reporting has.

For the past 20 years, through the economy's boom and bust cycle, the city's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report has achieved a level of excellence recognized by the Government Financial Officers Association.

Gary Brown with Brown, Graham and Company, a firm of licensed Certified Public Accountants who audited the city's books again this year, said that tradition should remain intact.

"Every year for about the last 20 years," Brown said, "the city has filed this with

the Government Finance Officers Association for the certificate of excellence in financial reporting. We believe that this report should also qualify for that."

The report also meets the Governmental Accounting Standards Board require-

ments. The report has some additional data than the normal government report might have in it, Brown said.

In Brown's independent auditor's report, he said gave this year's report an unqualified or clean opinion.

"It's the opinion you'd most desire to have on your financials," Brown said.

The annual report, he said, is about the city's financial performance, but more importantly, it's about the responsibility of those who are charged with maintaining

that financial performance. "The ultimate responsibility rests with the management and the commission of the city for the financial statements," Brown said. "Our responsibility is just to



said. "Cosmetology is also in the works; it has been submitted and is waiting approval."

"We want to build a facility for these new classes," Jaramillo said. "The tax revenue can be used to build a facility. The first thing we want to do with the money is to build a career and technical center."

"We think there is a growing demand for kids getting

out of high school needing vocational training and community college classes," Porter said. "This tax would help provide education not only for these classes but for the building trades, such as electricians and plumbing."

"We want to expand our course offerings," Jaramillo said. "Right now, we offer any first- and second-year core classes toward a four-year degree. If we get a career and technological center going, we may work

out a deal with Texas Tech or West Texas A&M to come in and teach upper-level courses."

The center's program for dual credit, in which high school students can earn college as well as high school credit for some classes, could be expanded with additional revenues provided by the maintenance tax. Continuing education courses, in which no college credit is earned, could also be expanded with the help of

additional funding, Jaramillo said.

"We are partnering with high schools to give vocational college credit for students enrolled in high school vocational programs," Jaramillo said. "Then, after high school, they can take classes here and get an associate of applied science degree."

Online classes and telecourses, currently already offered by the Pampa Center, could be increased with

maintenance tax revenue.

The center's nursing education program, which trains students to be licensed vocational nurses, is another area with potential for expansion. The center graduated 20 LVNs in December, Porter said, and all found employment. With additional funds, the program could be expanded to train registered nurses, he said.

"We have to have educated kids coming out of high school and the community

college level to attract business to the area," Porter said. "They want an educated workforce."

"There's no reason why we here in Pampa cannot be as big as, or bigger than, Frank Phillips College in Borger," Jaramillo said.

Election day is May 10, with early voting April 28 through May 6. Early voting will be at Gray County Courthouse; on election day, voters will go to their regular precinct polling places.

express an opinion based on the audit."

The report includes the Pampa Economic Development Corporation as a component unit of the city.

"The reason why these occur on the city's financial statement is because the city has some oversight responsibility and some power over the PEDC," Brown said. "Because of that, accounting standards say you have to put that on the financial statement as well."

The cities assets exceed its liabilities by more than \$21 million. Of that amount, about \$4.6 million may be used to meet the government's ongoing obligations to citizens and creditors, according to city officials.

At the end of the 2006-2007 fiscal year, the city's reported combined ending fund balances of \$4.5 million. About 60 percent of that, \$2.7 million, was available for spending at the city's discretion.

At the end of the year, according to the report, unreserved fund balance for the general fund was \$2.1 million, or 20 percent of total general fund expenditures.

The report also includes what is essentially an income statement for the city.

"It's a little different than what a business would show," Brown said. "The reason for that is that the city

is in the business of providing services to its citizens."

The report covers the costs of providing general government, public safety and other municipal services.

"After that," Brown said, "we look at anything that helps offset those services, such as water and sewer revenues or landfill collections."

They also include operating or capital grants.

"Those also help to offset those types of expenses," Brown said.

He said that those revenues are never enough. That's why the city has property and sales tax revenues.

Pampa showed a little over a million dollars in what could be construed to be net income for the city for the year, Brown said.

"It's been a real good year for the city," Brown said. "I think a good chunk of that was just higher sales tax this year."

Sales tax revenues were almost \$400,000 higher this year than what had been budgeted.

"The Enterprise Funds, the business-type activities, had about a \$218,000 profit," Brown said. "The PEDC had a substantial overall net increase of a little over \$1.2 million for the year. A good chunk of that was that the sales tax revenues finally started flowing in for the

PEDC, and they didn't have a whole lot of expenditures."

The Fund Financials that follow the Enterprise Funds in the report, Brown said, don't include long-term assets or long-term liabilities of the city.

"This is what we call the modified accrual approach," Brown said. "It's more of a current financial resource. This is more what the city has to work with on a liquid type basis."

It's broken down between the General Fund and the other major funds.

"The General Fund is usually the most important to look at," Brown said.

Assets here are almost \$3.7 million.

"There aren't a whole lot of liabilities in the General Fund," he said. "Overall, the net fund balance is about \$2.9 million at the end of the year for the General Fund."

Typically, Brown said when he looks at a city's financial records, he looks to see how much of the general fund is available. It usually comes out with about three to four months worth of funds.

"Anywhere from three to six months is pretty normal," Brown said.

He said Pampa is in that range.

"It's kind of on the low range," he said, "but it's a pretty good fund balance to have."

Brown said that a comparison between what was budgeted for the 2006-2007 fiscal year and what was actually spent tended to be good.

While the city expected and budgets for revenues of about \$9.1 million, it actually received \$10.6 million.

The budgeted for expenditures of \$9.9 million, but it spent \$10.3. Yet because of the increased revenues, it still had an excess of revenues over expenditures of more than \$1.1 million.

"As an auditor, I look to see if there are any negative variances on the expenditures, especially if there was a negative variances overall," Brown said.

Pampa had a couple of funds with some negative

variances, but there was no negative variance overall.

The report, Brown said, probably provides more information about the city and its accounting practices than most people would ever

want to know.

Brown commended Robin Bailey, the city's financial director, and her staff and City Manager John Horst, the former financial director.




## Docudrama really helps bring history to life

Wait till you see the tar-and-feathering scene in HBO's "John Adams" if you haven't all ready.

Wait till you see an ugly mob of Bostonians grab a British taxman, strip him naked, pour a caldron of hot pine tar over his head, plaster him with chicken feathers and carry him around on a rail like a prized trophy.

You won't likely forget it, no matter how injured you are to Hollywood's fake violence and graphic gore.

The brutal tar-and-feathering is the most memorable scene of many in the first episode of HBO's seven-part miniseries on the life of John Adams.

Though terrifying, the scene of vigilante injustice is

typical of how well the makers of "John Adams" have succeeded in their goal of capturing the reality of Revolutionary Colonial America and beaming it into our modern living rooms.

Co-produced by Tom Hanks, "John Adams" is based on historian David McCullough's 2001 best-selling biography of the same name and stars Paul Giamatti as John and Laura Linney as Abigail Adams.

HBO spent \$100 million and nine hours to slowly show and tell us how lawyer John Adams evolved into a driving intellectual and political force in America's founding and framing and then went on to become its first vice president and sec-

ond president.

Hollywood is infamous for having done terrible injustices to historical truth. But based on a what I've seen so far, "John Adams" is better than almost anything we're ever going to get from Tinsel Town.

At least if you're interested in quality, intelligence, historical accuracy and serious political ideas.

Historian McCullough wasn't blowing PR smoke when he recently told the Trib how pleased he was with the quality and historical integrity of HBO's pro-

duction, most of which was shot on location in and around Colonial Williamsburg in Virginia.

The rough reality of 18th-century America that McCullough hoped to capture on film is presented with

religious consistency — from the cold, spare interiors of Colonial homes to the graphic horrors of a smallpox epidemic.

As for absolute historical and political truth, who really knows? It's a docudrama.

In episode one, we see lawyer Adams risk his livelihood and stand up for the

rule of law to defend the British officers who killed five at the Boston Massacre.

We also see him speak eloquently at the Continental Congress of the natural rights of all men — not just princes and kings — and lead the call for quick and complete independence from Britain.

But is Giamatti's John really as vain, arrogant and unlikable as the real "Colossus of Independence" was?

Will we see an accurate portrayal of President Adams' now-politically incorrect dislike of democracy, his signing of the Alien and Sedition acts or his attacks on press freedom?

Has Linney's Abigail had her considerable political

influence over her husband exaggerated for dramatic or contemporary political reasons?

Who really knows? It's a docudrama.

"John Adams" is not perfect. But Hanks, HBO and McCullough deserve great credit for taking the highest, classiest road to telling history.

The trio already is busy turning McCullough's "1776" best-seller into a miniseries. If they tell us the story of that miraculous year — and do for statuesque George Washington what they have done for tubby John Adams — the American living room will be a much better, smarter place.

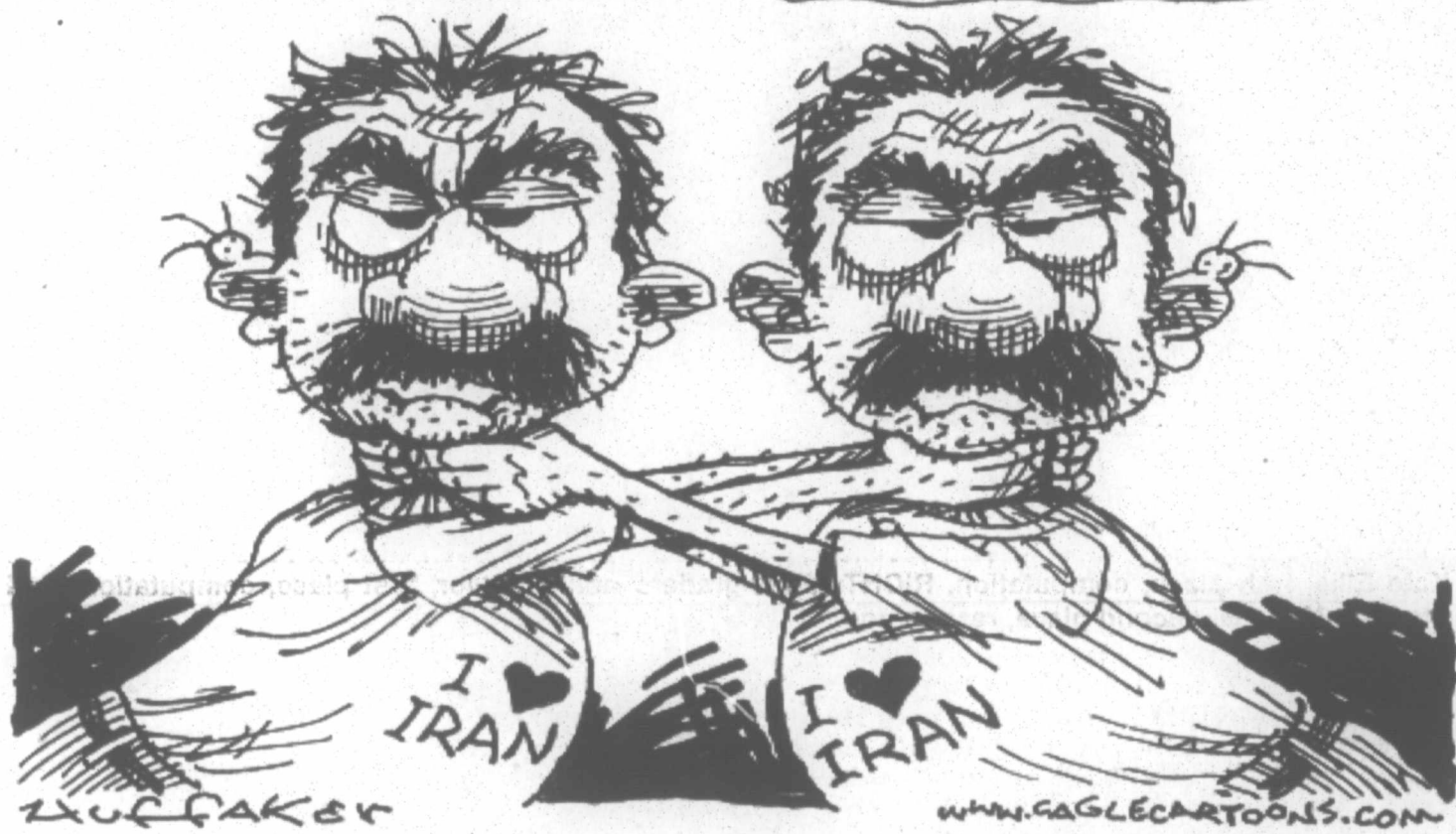

## Texas Thoughts

The Dallas Morning News on China and Tibet:

The rise of China on the world stage is one of the monumental stories of our time. Yet despite its modernization, China is still ruled by an authoritarian communist regime, one that does not hesitate to use deadly violence to enforce its rule.

That's what's happening in Tibet today, as Chinese soldiers have reportedly killed scores of Tibetans protesting Beijing's ruthless suppression of their culture, religion and autonomy. Tibet has been harshly ruled by China

since it smashed the 1959 independence rebellion and sent the Dalai Lama, Tibet's spiritual leader, into exile.

The Dalai Lama has agreed to yield to Chinese administrative control of Tibet, in exchange for religious and cultural independence but Beijing refuses to deal. Younger generations of Tibetans are growing restless with the nonviolent Dalai Lama's accommodationist strategy and have led the recent violent demonstrations precipitating the Chinese crackdown.

This is dangerous brinkmanship. Beijing cannot afford to let Tibet go. To do so would threaten the breakup of China, whose historic curse has been instability. The recent recognition by many in the world community of Kosovo's independence frightened

China and other nations with restless minorities seeking nationhood.

But Beijing is also playing a risky game with Tibetans. The Beijing Summer Olympics will be China's coming-out party, celebrating its status as a major world power. If this week's threats by France and others to boycott opening ceremonies in solidarity with bleeding Tibet amount to anything, China will lose an enormous amount of face.

Despite its substantial material progress, the Tibet crackdown shows that the real face of China continues to be the same authoritarian scowl that massacred pro-democracy protesters at Tiananmen Square in 1989. That's a

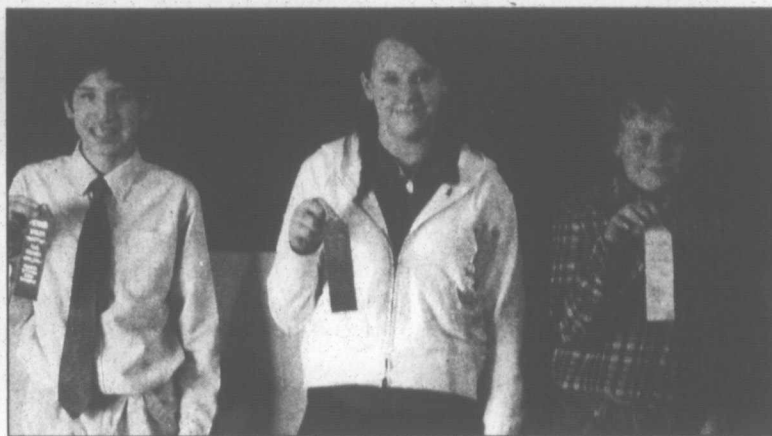

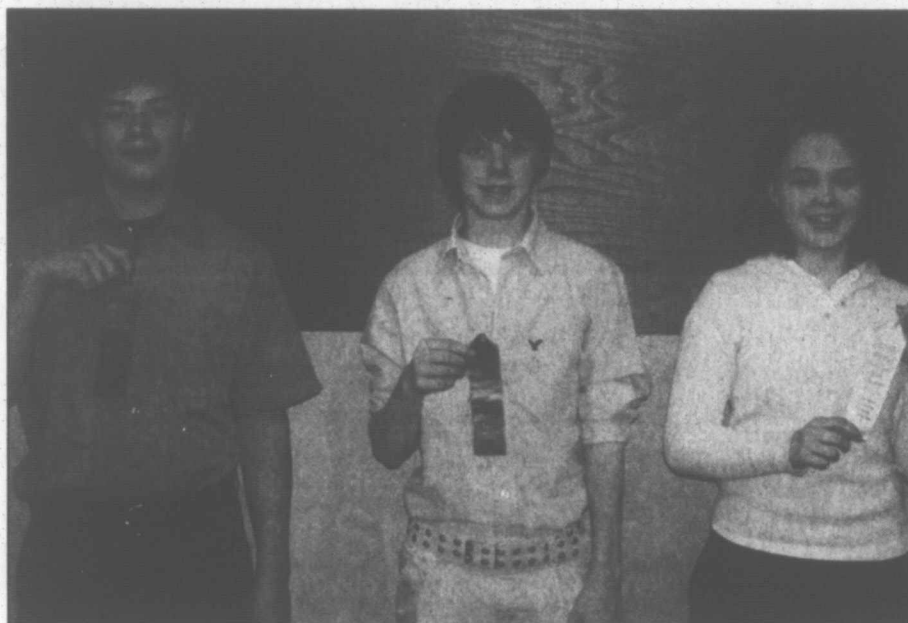

# WT to stage annual music showcase

## Pampa graduate to perform with student group during program

CANYON — It will be a performance-filled program when the Department of Music at West Texas A&M University presents its 28th Annual Showcase of Music at 8 p.m. Friday, April 4 at the Amarillo Civic Center Auditorium.

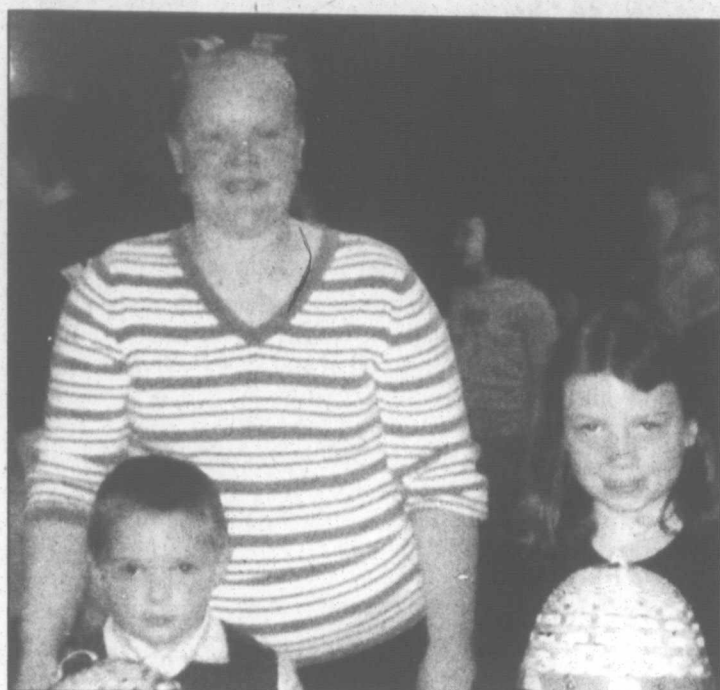

## Progress slow in fight against fever ticks

AUSTIN — A few miles north of the Rio Grande, where spring temperatures climb past 100 degrees, helicopters work in concert with cowboys to gather cattle, thorny bushes nick kneecaps, and dust and manure swirl up noses and down collars, and cowboys inspecting, dipping or treating cattle are gritty and soaked with sweat before noon.

For a small contingency of government "hands" and livestock producers on the border, the very presence or absence of ticks on cow bellies or deer flanks indicate defeat or victory in the fight against the fever tick, a foreign-origin pest that threatens the health of U.S. cattle.

This is the scene that Bruce Knight, USDA's undersecretary of agriculture for marketing and regulatory programs, traveled to South Texas to see in mid-March to gain a first-hand perspective of the fever tick situation.

He visited a fever tick-infested premises, observed gathering and treatment of cattle, and discussed fever tick issues with ranchers, USDA and TAHC staff. Knight noted the time, work and expense endured by cattlemen to round up cattle and present them for treatment. He also experienced the difficulty in gathering cattle in

the brush country of South Texas, where a helicopter is as necessary as cowboys on horseback.

"We are fighting a border war against the fever tick," said Dr. Bob Hillman, Texas' state veterinarian and head of the Texas Animal Health Commission, the state's livestock and poultry health regulatory agency. "I believe Knight's visit to the fever tick quarantine area will result in a commitment and dedication of resources necessary to successfully operate the fever tick program."

In 1943, the U.S. pushed the fever tick across the border and has maintained a permanent quarantine zone along the Rio Grande from Del Rio to Brownsville since that time as a deterrent to reinfestation with the fever tick. However, the tick was never eradicated from Mexico, which serves as a continuous source for reintroduction into US cattle herds.

"Last summer the pest gained a foothold beyond the 852-square mile permanent, USDA-patrolled fever tick quarantine zone," said Dr. Hillman. "As of mid-March 2008, we are making progress in fighting the outbreak, having defined the outer limits of the tick's spread. Now the TAHC, USDA and livestock produc-

ers are working from the 'outside in' to eradicate the tick, a process that may take another 16 to 18 months, if no additional infestations are discovered."

"Due to fever tick infestations, more than 1,000-square miles of ranchland have been temporarily quarantined since last summer. The quarantines are in Starr, and Zapata counties, and in a

contiguous area of Maverick, Dimmit and Webb counties," Dr. Hillman said. "From these areas, no domestic or exotic livestock capable of hosting the fever tick can be moved without an inspection, treatment and a permit. These temporary quarantines more than doubled the geographic scope —

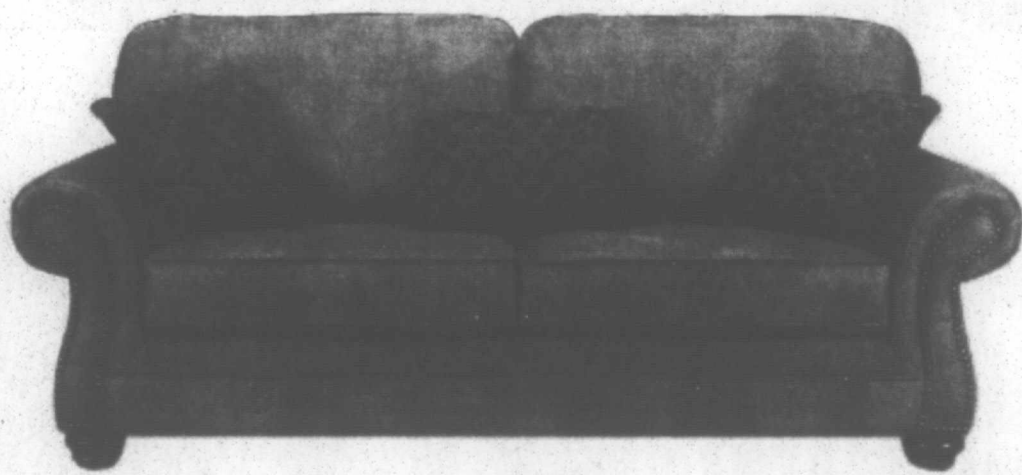

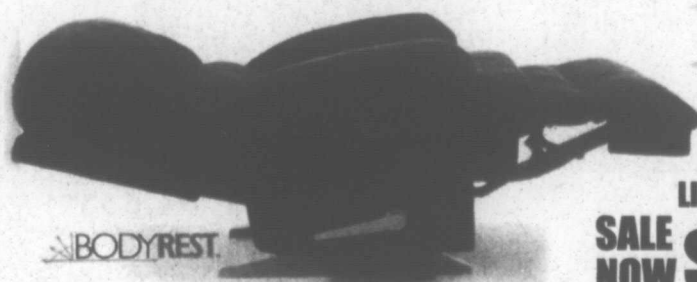

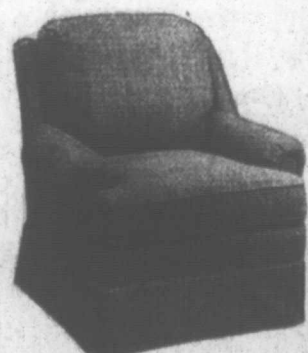

to an area larger than Rhode Island and Washington, D.C. — for which fever tick monitoring, inspection and treatment must be provided."

"The battle costs money, but fighting the battle against fever ticks has been like putting a band aid on a lacerated artery," said Dr. Hillman. Beginning in August 2007, the TAHC worked with the U.S. Department of Agriculture to develop a funding request, which if fulfilled, would be sufficient to provide the personnel, equipment and supplies required to contain, and then eradicate the fever tick outbreak from the temporarily quarantined areas.

USDA recently announced that \$5.2 million, would be made available to control the outbreaks of fever ticks occurring outside the permanent quarantine zone between Texas and Mexico.

"We are very appreciative that these funds are being provided to aid in the fight against the fever tick," said Dr. Hillman. "They will certainly help in this battle against a relentless foe. However, this level of funding is significantly less than the \$13 million requested and will be enough to address

only the program's most dire needs."

"If we are to be ultimately successful in eliminating fever ticks from the temporarily quarantined areas, and push the fever ticks past the permanent quarantine zone and back into Mexico, we must have sustained funding over many years. The amount provided will be utilized efficiently, but it will not be sufficient to complete the job," said Dr. Hillman.

Besides the sheer size of the area under quarantine, nearly 100 premises (up from 40 premises in 2007) in the permanent and temporarily quarantined areas are known to have fever ticks.

On these pastures, livestock must be examined and treated every 14 to 28 days, depending on the acaricide products used. As an alternative, the animals can be "tick-free" for two consecutive treatments, then transferred under permit from the property, leaving the pasture vacant for at least nine months, with the idea that the ticks will starve. Because the fever tick has shown an ability to adapt to wildlife hosts, pasture vacation may no longer be an effective option for "clearing" a pasture of fever ticks.

Since Oct. 1, 2007, (the start of federal fiscal year 2008), more than 52 fever tick infested premises have been detected in the permanent and temporary quarantine areas. During the 2007 hunting season, about 2,300 white tail deer and other wildlife hosts harvested in the quarantined areas were examined for fever ticks by the USDA and TAHC.

Inspections disclosed that, of the 52 newly detected fever tick-infested premises, 23 premises had fever tick-infested wildlife. Fever ticks were detected on white-tail deer, fallow deer, axis deer, and red deer. The pests also were found on aoudad sheep, a species previously not thought to be a fever tick host.

"This is disturbing, but not surprising," said Dr. Hillman. "Wildlife host populations are high in these areas. Scientists believe that the fever tick prefers cattle as a host, but when tick populations are unchecked, or cattle hosts are not available, the pest will infest wildlife hosts."

Fever tick-infested wildlife complicates eradication. Treatment for free-ranging wildlife is limited to feeding ivermectin-treated corn or drawing animals to "four-poster" stations where they rub against pyrethrin-treated posts, which transfers the chemical to the head, neck and ears of animals and kills the ticks. However, some products require a 60-day withdrawal period, so they can't be used just prior to or during the hunting season.


One of the most time-consuming and frustrating tasks in the fever tick fight has been tracing the more than 800-head of cattle moved from the area since August 2006. TAHC staff spent several months looking for the animals, due to a scarcity of records and animal identification.

Most of the shipments had moved within Texas, but some animals had been transported as far away as Kansas, Colorado, Oklahoma and Wyoming. All the animals have been inspected, and none were infested with the fever ticks.

It is time to remember why this tiny, prolific pest is so deadly to cattle, he noted. Fever ticks by themselves are a problem. Fever ticks that carry the blood parasite, "babesia," are deadly and can infect cattle with "cattle tick fever," causing them to suffer bloody urine, diarrhea, fever and extreme anemia before death.

"We either address the fever tick in south Texas, or we could be addressing fever ticks in Oklahoma, Missouri, Virginia, California, or a host of other states where the tick would flourish," said Dr. Hillman. "Fever ticks are not just a 'Texas' problem. Through extraordinary effort by cattlemen, and state and federal animal health officials — beginning in 1906 and culminating in 1943—these pests and babesiosis, the disease they carried, were eradicated from the United States. These fever ticks are now classified as foreign pests, and they are a U.S. problem."

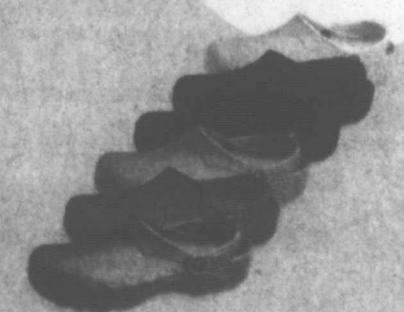

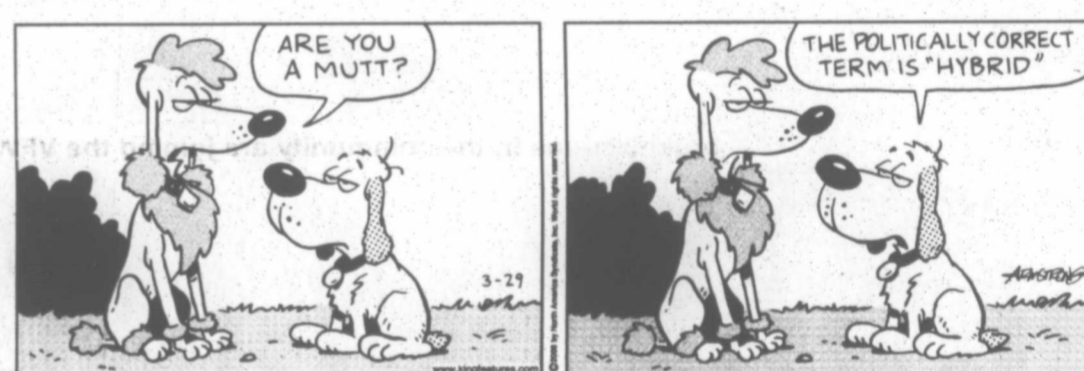

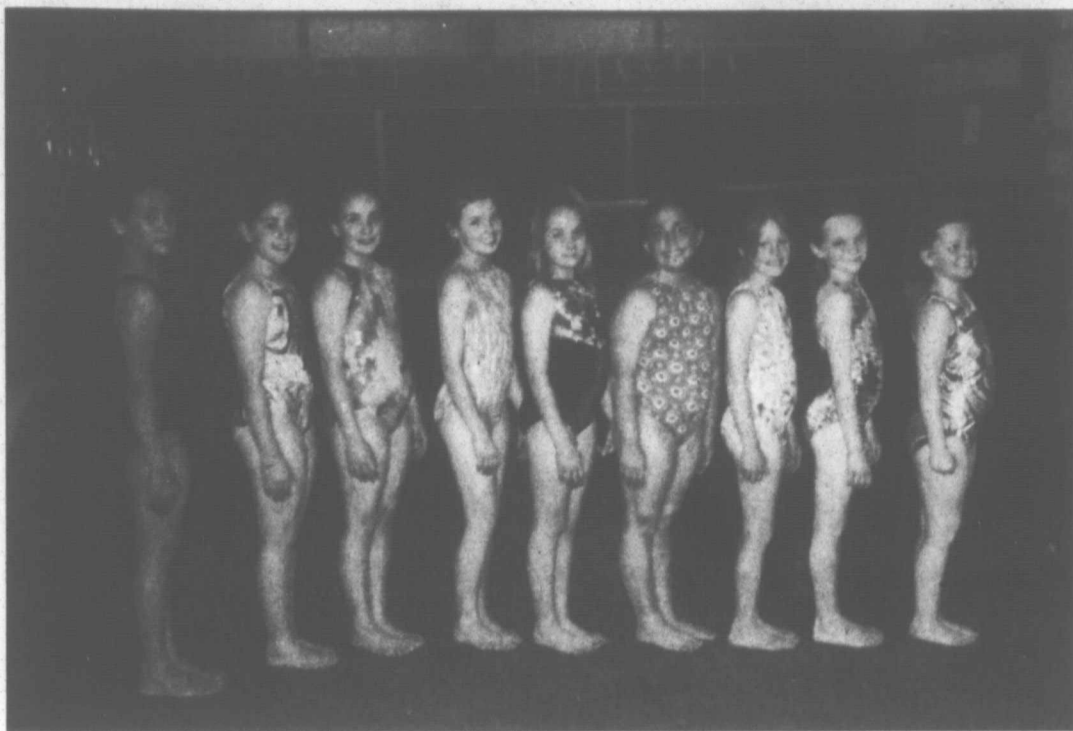

## Roush tells his side of Toyota feud; Gordon calls it "hilarious"

MARTINSVILLE, Va. (AP) — Jack Roush's feud with Toyota is escalating over a car part he claims was stolen from one of his teams. The multica owner calls it a case of "intellectual espionage," but many others think it's much ado about nothing.

"What's he doing with stuff just laying around the garage area?" four-time Sprint Cup Series champion Jeff Gordon joked Friday. "If that was a proprietary piece, I'd think that you'd have some tighter grips on it. I think the whole thing is hilarious."

But Roush isn't laughing, saying a Toyota team that he declined to name stole a swaybar created specifically for Roush Fenway Racing from one of RFR's teams at last fall's race at Dover, Del. He said the team sandblasted the custom paint off of it and tried to have the vendor that created it for RFR duplicate the ends that make it fit.

Roush said after his team found out about it, it learned from a former employee of the Toyota team since hired by Roush that he'd seen the part in the Toyota team's shop.

"I found out about it and I wanted to go supersonic," Roush said, calling the team's "theft" of the swaybar "intellectual espionage." He said it initially left him wanting to get a search warrant to go claim the part and a restraining order to prevent the team from using any information gleaned from having it in competition.

Instead, he brought the matter to NASCAR, and that hasn't been satisfying, either. "It's not the first time that

somebody's gone home with a mistaken part," John Darby, NASCAR's Sprint Cup director, said during practice at Martinsville Speedway.

"It's not a PIN number to somebody's bank account. It's a swaybar, a very simple, very non-smart kind of a part, and I don't know why it's amplified to where it has."

The problem, according to Roush, is that the team acquired the part last fall and didn't admit to having it or agree to return it until confronted by RFR in January.

The return took place during a "landestine meeting" at 6 a.m., Roush said, but in the interim, he fears the team may have learned things it can apply to its car.

"We've been harmed by this theft," he said.

Former Roush employee Lee White, now a senior vice president and general manager for Toyota Racing Development, has been sparing with Roush in the media since Roush raised the issue of the theft a few weeks ago. White said Friday it's not an issue for the manufacturer, but rather one between Roush's team and the unidentified Toyota team.

The feud dusted up when Roush went public with his theft claims while responding to White's claim that RFR's No. 99 team with Carl Edwards as the driver intentionally took the cover off its oil tank at Las Vegas and gained an aerodynamic advantage.

Edwards was docked 100 driver points plus 10 bonus points. His crew chief, Bob Osborne, was fined \$100,000 and suspended, and

Roush was docked 100 owner points.

Roush, who denied that the team did anything to make the oil tank lid come off, said he's never stolen anything from another team in 22 years of racing, and that he's disappointed that NASCAR hasn't chosen to take any action in the swaybar matter.

"It's basically lawyer time and as far as what NASCAR might do, they could obviously do a lot," he said, including mediating a meeting between the teams, securing an apology and ensuring they won't use information gained "by their ill-gotten means."

He also wasn't pleased to read that Robin Pemberton, vice president of competition, said things like the swaybar incident are common and the teams should work it out.

"It's real easy for NASCAR to bring the rule book out and deal with what happens if a part is the wrong dimension or if it doesn't fit a template," he said. "... But they don't have a rule as it relates to theft, and maybe they should have. I'm not sure."

Darby said with all the traveling teams do, and all the equipment they bring everywhere they go, and the ease with which things get mixed up, it's no big deal.

"Our garage is open. Somebody can walk up to anybody's pit stall and look and see and photograph and measure and smell and touch any part they want to in the garage and we've always been that way," he said. "These are just stock cars and stock car parts."

## Barnes thrilled to have Augustin leading Longhorns past Stanford

HOUSTON (AP) — D.J. Augustin was hanging back, playing defense, trying to protect a slim lead. Then he saw a bad pass going the other way, toward midcourt.

Augustin beat two Stanford players going for the ball, then turned it into an uncontested layup. The play was so perfect in its execution and timing that Texas coach Rick Barnes jumped up, yelled "Yeah, baby!" and gave a fist pump.

The breakaway basket was an early spark in a 20-3 run that sent the Longhorns past Stanford 82-62 Friday night and into the NCAA's South Regional final. Second-seeded Texas will

have quite a challenge with top-seeded Memphis, but Barnes likes his chances with Augustin running the show.

"He's as good as any basketball player out there," Barnes said.

The Longhorns (31-6) set a school record for victories and got to the regional final for the second time in three years, and third time in six. Augustin deserves plenty of credit for this team's success — but, against Stanford (28-8), he got help from an unlikely source, sophomore Dexter Pittman.

A sophomore who arrived in Austin weighing 366 pounds, he's down to 299 but still only a bit player. Barnes figured the jumbo reserve would make life

rough on Stanford's big guys, the 7-foot Lopez twins, and his hunch was right on.

Leaning, pounding and pestering, Pittman changed the game in only 10 minutes. His second-half effort on Brook Lopez turned him from someone who scored 24 of the Cardinal's first 48 points into a guy who didn't make a basket the final 13:55.

"I felt he was getting frustrated because I heard him talking," said Pittman, who had four points and six rebounds in 10 minutes. "My goal was to make sure I keep my body at him on all times — whenever the ball goes up, whenever the ball is in the guard's hands, make

## Scott Sutton says he's staying at Oral Roberts

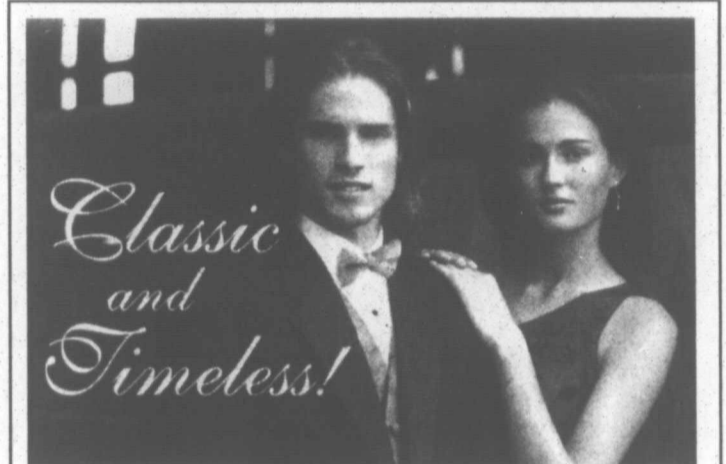
TULSA, Okla. (AP) — Oral Roberts basketball coach Scott Sutton says he's staying at the private Tulsa school.

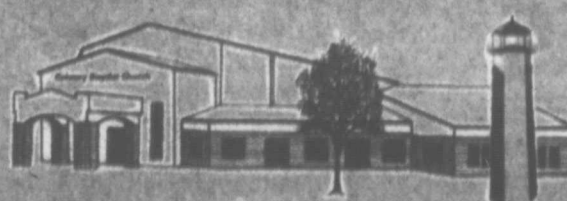

sure my body is on him. Even on offense, I could clear the lane out and move him where he couldn't block shots."

As time ran out, Brook pounded the court in anger as he walked to the postgame handshake. In the interview room, he turned his head away when asked questions about Pittman.

"I think I just stopped playing aggressive since he was guarding me, throwing up low-percentage shots," said Lopez, who finished with 26 points and 10 rebounds. "He just bodied up against me and tried to push me off the lane."

Said Barnes of Pittman: "I thought he was huge."

Just to clear, he meant that as a compliment.

Damion James scored 18 points and A.J. Abrams scored 12. Augustin added seven assists and five rebounds and Justin Mason had seven points, eight rebounds and six assists, providing plenty of thrills for the tens of thousands of Texas (31-6) fans at Reliant Stadium.

"We had a feeling we'd have

a good load of our fans down here," Abrams said. "They did a good job of getting this place loud and really supporting us. It really helped us out when they started coming back and they got into it."

Stanford had little offense outside of Brook Lopez. The second-most points came from reserve Landry Fields—just 11. No one else had more than six.

The starting backcourt went 2-for-16, scoring six points; a pair of 3s by Mitch Johnson, one going into halftime and another coming out. The game was 17:29 old before the Cardinal finally hit anything longer than an 8-footer.

"For whatever reason, we didn't hit shots we normally make," coach Trent Johnson said.

The Cardinal already were on their deepest run since 2001.

Whether they can get back next year might depend on whether Lopez and his 7-foot twin brother, Robin, stick around for their junior years. Regardless, Johnson told his team how proud he was that they gave UCLA a run for the regular-season Pac-10 title and in the conference tournament, then made a nice run in the NCAAs.

# Stephen Curry carries Davidson over Wisconsin into regional final

DETROIT (AP) — After all those Davidson students came all that way, the least Stephen Curry and Co. could do was give them a good game.

Did they ever. And now the Wildcats' band of merry travelers gets to see another before climbing back on the buses.

Curry went over the 30-point mark for a third straight game, and 10th-seeded Davidson extended its wonderful ride for at least another game with a 73-56 romp over Wisconsin on Friday night. The Wildcats will play top-seeded Kansas for a trip to the Final Four.

"I couldn't be more pleased," Davidson coach Bob McKillop said. "So many guys contributed in so many ways to make this a very special victory for Davidson College."

In pushing the nation's longest winning streak to 25 games, Davidson also represented for the little guys. Of the three double-digit seeds that reached the regional semifinals, the Wildcats are the only one left.

And they are by far the lowest seed standing, with

the four No. 1s, one 2 and two 3s advancing.

"We've said it all season long, that if we stick together as a team, it's a recipe for success," Max Paulhus Gosselin said. "We aren't intimidated by anyone. Why should we be?"

Why should they be, indeed. They have Curry, while everybody else is still trying to figure out a way to stop him.

Curry, the son of former NBA sharpshooter Dell Curry, outscored the Badgers all by himself in the second half, 22-20. He finished with 33 points on 11-for-22 shooting, including six 3-pointers.

Add in his 30-point effort against Maryland in last year's NCAA tournament, and Curry joins Clyde Lovellette of Kansas, Jerry Chambers of Utah and Glenn Robinson

of Purdue as the only players to score 30 or more in their first four NCAA tournament games.

"In the NBA, I never experienced this as a player. I don't think even in all my playoff games in my career that I've felt like this," said Dell Curry, who was getting congratulatory high-fives at the end of the game. "To see your son succeed and have fun on a national stage is great."

Even LeBron James was impressed. The Cleveland Cavaliers star had praised Curry earlier this week and, on the eve of a game against the Detroit Pistons, found a seat a few rows behind the Davidson bench.

"It just shows what we're doing here at Davidson," Curry said. "We got guys that are in the spotlight and they're com-

ing to our game and watching us play. It's pretty cool to give him something to be happy about and cheer about and just entertain him."

The nation got an idea of what Curry can do last weekend, when he scored 40 against Gonzaga and added 30 against Georgetown.

But big, brawny Wisconsin (31-5) was supposed to be different. Badgers defensive specialist Michael Flowers has made many a perimeter player ineffective, and Wisconsin was holding opponents to 53.9 points, best in the nation. Their 3-point defense was even stingier; in the second round last weekend, Kansas State didn't manage a single bucket from long range.

Instead of being intimidated by the big stage—not to mention the monstrous Ford Field venue—Curry and Davidson played with such ease and attitude they may as well have been in their cozy little gym back home. The Wildcats shot 49 percent from the floor, and were 12-for-24 from 3-point range. Jason Richards had 11 points and 13 assists, and Andrew Lovedale added 12 points.

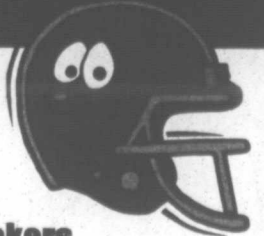

# A-Rod plays for hometown crowd in Miami

Hometown hero Alex Rodriguez played in Miami for the first time since high school, while the scenic waterfront site of exhibition games for more than eight decades hosted its final game in St. Petersburg, Fla.

Adam Dunn homered and the Cincinnati Reds beat the Tampa Bay Rays 6-3 on Friday in the final game at Al Lang Field.

"I'm kind of a nostalgic freak," said Rays manager Joe Maddon, who took in his first game at Al Lang after hitchhiking to St. Petersburg from Tampa, where his college team was playing in the early 1970s.

"Believe me, you can't find a better setting for a spring training game to be played. For those who never had the chance to encounter it, it's two bad because this truly is the essence of spring training."

A different type of nostalgia reigned across the state.

For the first time since A-Rod was a senior at Westminster Christian High in 1993, he finally got to play in his hometown.

With 150 of his friends and family in the crowd—a "world record" player ticket buy, he said—Rodriguez and his New York Yankees visited the Florida Marlins on Friday in their next-to-last exhibition game of the spring. Dozens of fans swarmed the Yankees' dugout in A-Rod's No. 13 jerseys, most imploring him in Spanish to sign something for them.

"Coming up here and being a part of South Florida high school sports, poten-

tially going to play football and baseball at the University of Miami, it's nice to come full circle," said Rodriguez, the reigning AL MVP after hitting .314 with 54 home runs and 156 RBIs last season. "I never really thought I would get this opportunity, being in the American League."

With interleague play, chances like these are hardly uncommon.

But Rodriguez has always missed out on Miami trips—until now.

"This is Alex's home," said Yankees manager Joe Girardi, who, like Rodriguez, lives in South Florida during the winter. "I went and saw a Heat game this year, I was driving back, and there was a big billboard that said, 'Congratulations Alex on the MVP.' This town has really embraced Alex and Alex has really embraced this town."

Rodriguez, who got a huge roar when the starting lineups were announced, homered, doubled and drove in two runs for the Yankees, who got two hits apiece from Derek Jeter, Johnny Damon and Jason Giambi in a 5-3 loss to the Marlins.

His 407-foot home run in the fifth inning off Florida starter Andrew Miller earned him a standing ovation in a stadium almost entirely filled with Yankees fans.

As for baseball in St. Petersburg, the next time a major league game is played at the spot where the field currently stands, it may well be the Rays' new regular-season home.

Rays owner Stuart Sternberg revealed plans last fall to replace Tropicana Field with a \$450 million open-air ballpark here that partly would be paid for by the sale and development of the domed stadium that opened in 1990—eight years before the Rays played their first game.

Under current plans, the team would pay about a third of the cost of building the 34,000-seat stadium that would open on the Al Lang site in 2012.

In other news, Arizona Diamondbacks left-hander Doug Davis was diagnosed with thyroid cancer.

"We don't know much, other than he does have thyroid cancer," team president Derrick Hall said in a telephone interview. "It's saddening. It was a complete surprise to the entire organization, and to him."

Despite the news, Davis started for Arizona. He struggled, allowing back-to-back home runs in the second inning to Brad Hawpe, Yorvit Torrealba and Jayson Nix.

# Spurs hit 50-win mark, pick up sixth straight victory

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The San Antonio Spurs played well against the Minnesota Timberwolves for three quarters.

Manu Ginobili is just glad that one of those was the fourth. The Spurs' super-sub scored 16 of his 26 points in the final period to lead his team to a 99-84 victory Friday night and their sixth straight win.

After the Spurs squandered almost all of a 20-point lead during the third quarter, Ginobili took over in the fourth. He scored 11 points in a span of 1:51—including three 3-pointers—to put them up 88-72 with just over 6 minutes to play.

"I started being more aggressive," said Ginobili, who was 5-of-5 from the field in the fourth. "So it's like a snowball. You feel more and more confident and every shot I took, it went in."

After that, the momentum never shifted back Minnesota's way.

The Spurs, who were in fifth place in the West, moved into second place and sit just percentage points behind New Orleans. San Antonio was the first team in the conference to hit the 50-win mark.

The Spurs on Sunday host the Houston Rockets, who have won 29 of their last 33

games and had an identical record to the Spurs before San Antonio's Friday win.

Tony Parker added 18 points for the Spurs and Tim Duncan had 12 points and 14 rebounds.

Ryan Gomes led the Timberwolves with 17 points and 10 boards and Al Jefferson added 14. Reserve Rashad McCants scored 13.

Ginobili has made a habit this season of playing well against Minnesota, which lost the season series to the Spurs 0-4. In the other three games against the Timberwolves, Ginobili scored 31, 22, and most recently 44 points—two shy of his season high.

"He's explosive. He can score in multiple ways," said Minnesota coach Randy Wittman. "It's not like he's just a shooter. He gets to the line, he gets in the lane, he can make 3s. So he's probably as good as there is. For a guy off the bench who played 25 minutes and scored 26 points, that's a pretty good sixth man."

Michael Finley, who is averaging better than 18 points in his last three games, joined the Spurs' Big Three in double-digits Friday, scoring 16. Marko Jaric and Randy Foye each had 11 for Minnesota.

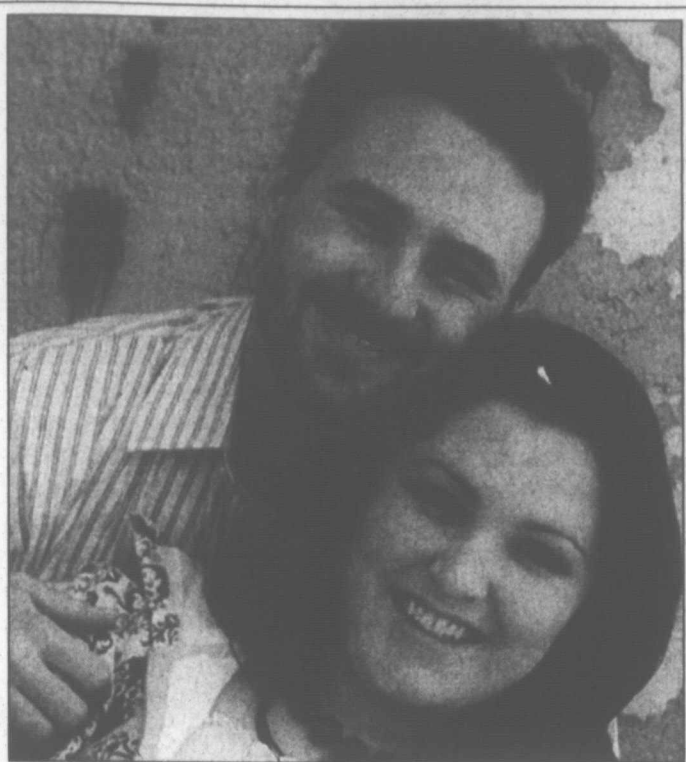

# Tax Freedom Day® to arrive in April

WASHINGTON — Tax Freedom Day® will fall on April 23 this year, according to the Tax Foundation's annual calculation using the latest government data on income and taxes. That's three days earlier than in 2007. Stimulus rebates and a projection of slow growth in 2008 are the principal reasons for the earlier celebration.

The study Tax Foundation Special Report No. 160, "America Celebrates Tax Freedom Day®," by Tax Foundation senior economist Gerald Prante and Tax Foundation president Scott Hodge, announces the nation's Tax Freedom Day®. The new study compares tax payments to other major consumer expenditures, traces the course of America's tax burden since 1900, examines the composition of today's tax burden by type of tax and calculates a Tax Freedom Day® for each state.

**Taxes vs. Other Expenses**  
 "Government continues to dominate the American taxpayer's budget," said Tax Foundation President Hodge. "Americans will still spend more on taxes in 2008 than they will spend on food, clothing and housing combined."

In 2008, Americans will work 74 days, a news release from the foundation reports, to afford their federal taxes and 39 more days to pay state and local taxes. Meanwhile, buying food requires 35 days of work, clothing 13 days, and housing 60 days. Other major categories are health and medical care (50 days), transportation (29 days), and recreation (21 days).

**Bush Era Has Seen Tax Freedom Day® Fluctuate Substantially**

"Tax freedom has been a see-saw affair in recent years," said Tax Foundation senior economist Prante. "In 2000, Tax Freedom Day® was celebrated May 3, the latest date ever. Then a string of tax cuts between 2001 and 2003 pushed Tax Freedom Day® up by more than two weeks, so that it fell on April 16 in 2003 and April 17 in 2004. For the next three years, incomes and tax collections soared, pushing Tax Freedom Day® back to April 26 in 2007. Now the stimulus rebates and a projected slowing of income growth have made Tax Freedom Day® come three days earlier, on April 23."

**Which Taxes Are Biggest?**

Five major categories of tax dominate the tax burden. Individual income taxes, both federal and state, require 42 days' work. Payroll taxes take another 28 days' work. Sales and excise taxes, mostly state and local, take 16 days to pay off. Corporate income taxes take 13 days, and property taxes take 12.

**Tax Freedom Day® by State**

Alaskans kick off the celebration of Tax Freedom Day® on March 29, more than a week before any other state's taxpayers. Mississippi (April 7), Montana and West Virginia (April 8), and Alabama (April 9) round out the first five. The next five are Kentucky (April 10), Tennessee and Oklahoma (April 11), and New Mexico and South Dakota (April 12).

Tax Freedom Day® is early in low-income states because the federal income tax hits most of their federal income taxes at the lower rates, 10 percent and 15 percent. Alaska stands out as an exception — income and federal tax payments are above average there, but state-local taxes are extraordinarily low.

Three states will have to wait until May to celebrate their state-specific Tax Freedom Days — Connecticut, New Jersey and New York. Although they have high state-local taxes too, the main culprit is the progressive federal income tax. States with large metropolitan areas offer higher-paying jobs, and as a result, many of the citizens earn enough to pay income tax at the highest rates — currently 25 percent, 28 percent

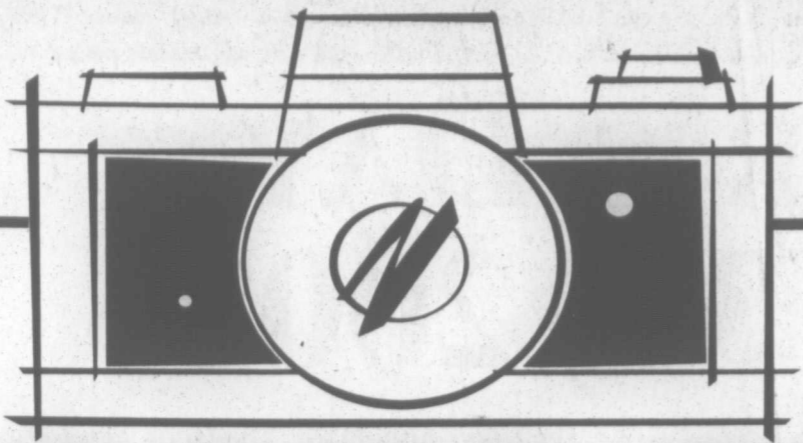

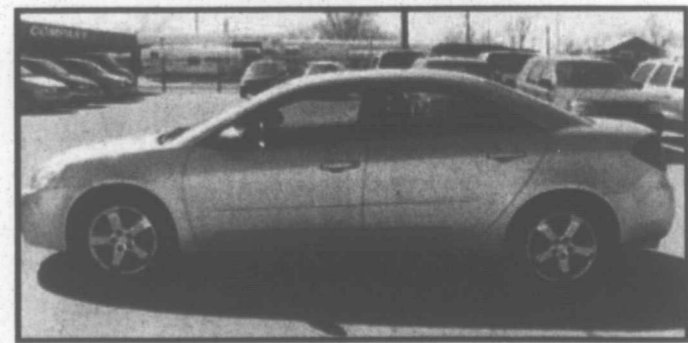

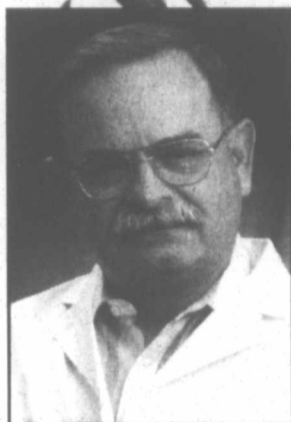
# DOCTOR'S DAY MARCH 30, 2008
