## Vietnam diorama added to museum

A new room at Pampa's Freedom Museum features a soldier wearing a camouflaged uniform and beret setting a claymore mine. The nametag on the uniform is Stephens.

Larry Stephens farms south of Pampa, but he still remembers the long range reconnaissance patrols, or LRRPs, he used to make in Vietnam.

The diorama in the new addition to the Freedom Museum features a man in uniform and black beret in the setting that Stephens remembers.

"He's on our board here," Andy Epps, curator of Freedom Museum USA, said of Stephens. "He wanted to donate some stuff to get a Vietnam diorama."

Stephens admitted that the camouflaged uniform is new, but the nametag sewn to it is his. He said he used to wear

a tiger-striped uniform that he bought in Vietnam, but it must have shrunk over the years because it no longer fits him or the mannequin. The black beret is like the one he wore.

"We added on this whole area," Epps said. "This has really been nice to have a new space."

Freedom Museum USA is housed in what was once a municipal water department building.

The new addition includes the life-sized diorama of a mannequin setting a claymore mine in a jungle setting portraying Vietnam, but it also includes a new mural depicting the Korean War.

"That's the way it's supposed to look," said veteran Don Emmons of the soldiers and armored vehicles in a snow-packed landscape. "Cold."

In Korea, Emmons manned a half-track armed with quad-50s or four .50-caliber machine guns like the one in the painting.

Both the Korean and the Vietnam settings were the work of Pampa muralist Doug Pollard. Pollard has done extensive artwork at the VFW post on Cuyler.

But the new addition also includes weapons and equipment ranging from the frontier wars of the 1870s to Iraq.

There are World War I uniforms and a Desert Storm uniform with gas mask. There is also a Navy Chief Petty Officer's uniform that belonged to Epps' grandfather. He was on Guam during World War II.

"We're just bringing in what we can right now," Epps said. "Little by little." He said they've started using the room for things they had, but didn't have room to display them.

Around the walls of the new room are display cases holding various weapons including Japanese rifles and pistols from World War II. One of the pistols

## Crisis Center seeking volunteers

Volunteer training for persons wishing to become volunteers for Tralee Crisis Center will begin at 5:30 p.m. April 24 at Clarendon College Pampa Center, 1601 W. Kentucky.

Anyone wishing to attend the training must go to the crisis center's office at 310 S. Cuyler and pick up an application to fill out, said Cynthia Salazar, volunteer coordinator for the center. Applicants must be at least 18 years of age and provide references.

The April 24 training session will be the first of eight, with sessions meeting each Thursday for about three hours each meeting at the Pampa Center.

Volunteers are needed to help answer the 24-hour hotline, offer to accompany sexual assault victims to physical exams and elsewhere, help educate the public on domestic violence and sexual assault, assist with transportation for shelter clients, work at the crisis center's resale shop and provide clerical support in the office.

Tralee Crisis Center operates an office, resale shop, 24-hour hotline and safe house in Pampa for victims of violent crime, including domestic violence and sexual assault. The shelter can accommodate up to 30 victims, usually women with their children. Volunteers accompany victims to court, help with protective orders and crime victim compensation applications, provide peer counseling and work with other agencies to provide services to victims.

## PEDC considers establishing community fund

The Pampa Economic Development Corporation is considering the establishment of a community fund with matching money from the Amarillo Area Foundation.

Charlotte Rhodes of the Amarillo Area Foundation spoke to the economic development board of directors at their monthly meeting Thursday, explaining that the foundation would match \$50,000 in a community fund, if Pampa decided to

start one.

The foundation would manage the fund. There would be no charges to do so, although she said the foundation board is considering instituting management fees. She estimated that such a fee would run about a half percent of the community fund.

"The Amarillo Area Foundation is a community foundation that is one of over 700 community foundations in the United States," Rhodes said.

Out of the more than 700 foundations, she said the

Amarillo Area Foundations consistently ranks among the top 15 in terms of assets.

Although those assets vary with the market, they are in the range of \$182 million.

"We just celebrated our 50th year," she said.

Rhodes said they now give away about \$7 million a year in grants.

The Amarillo Area Foundation can only serve the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle under their charter.

"Sometimes," she said, "because it says Amarillo

Area, people think we're an Amarillo foundation. We're not. We really are an area foundation."

They have a 25 member

board. Two of the people are from Pampa. They are Rick Leverich of Bourland and

Leverich and Jack Curtis of Curtis Drilling Company.

Rhodes said that the foundation is going to communities in the panhandle and telling them that if they would raised \$50,000 and start their own community fund, the Amarillo Area Foundation will match that \$50,000.

"They would have \$100,000 to start with," Rhodes said.

Pampa has until the end of 2008 to establish a community fund and raise \$50,000.

"The unique thing about this program," Rhodes said, "is that we really don't put a lot of guidelines or stipulations on it."

The only real requirement, she said, is a community advisory committee to make the funding decisions.

"Community foundations operate basically under a gifting method called a donor advised fund," Rhodes

said, "which means that the donor makes a charitable donation to the foundation, establishes a fund, and then the donor advises on how he or she wants that money disbursed."

She said, however, that the Amarillo Area Foundation has the final authority to decide on the disbursement. That generally has to do with meeting the established rules, such as giving to a charitable cause or a 501.c3 organization.

"We feel like you're the ones that know how to make the decisions on what's best for your community," Rhodes said.

She said the one thing they can't do is give money directly to individuals.

"But we can give money to cities," Rhodes said. "We can give money to hospital districts. We can give money to schools. We can give money to 501.c3 organizations."

How the money is given is

up to each community, she said.

Rhodes said the advisory committee needs to have at least five members. She said that some of the community fund advisory committees in other panhandle communities have as many as 11 members. That decision is up to the community.

She said that the money in the community fund is invested through the Amarillo Area Foundation. Communities have a choice between a market fund, which has in the past returned about 10 percent per year, or certificates of deposits, which have returned a little over three percent. Most of the communities have chosen to split their funds and put some money in each.

As of January, Rhodes said they had some 23 community funds, although some communities had multiple funds for different purposes.

She said the funds can be

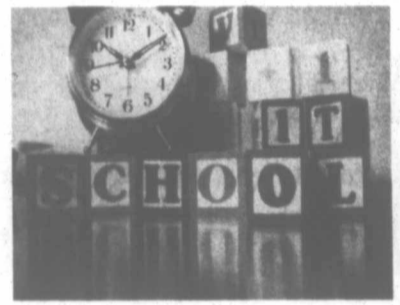

was picked up after the Atomic bomb was dropped on Nagasaki.

In one case is an M1 carbine that was rescued from the sea by a Pampa soldier at the end of World War II. He cleaned it up and presented it to the museum.

In another case is a .45 to .70 carbine that was issued to the cavalry in the 1870s. It's from Epps' personal collection. This one has the crest of the Seventh Cavalry on the stock and rawhide on the fore grip and stock.

"I got this from an old man who carried it for 75 years," Epps said. "He got it from an Indian who carried it."

He said he's been unable to document its connection to Custer's Seventh Cavalry, but it's certainly from that era and area.

Epps said he doesn't know if the Indian took the carbine from the Seventh Cavalry or if he was a scout for them.

Whoever had wrapped the weapon in rawhide had taken the rear site off, wrapped the rawhide around the barrel and fore stock and put the site back on, but he'd put the site on backwards.

"He had it on backwards to start with," Epps said. "He couldn't hit anything."

Epps left it on backwards. Although the center of the room is empty now, Epps

said he hopes to park a Jeep there.

"One of our board members has a World War II Jeep," Epps said.

Walter Miller, assistant curator, said that when they built the new addition, he made sure the double doors to the east side of the building were large enough that the Jeep could be driven in and out.

Epps said the board member, Lynn Hulsey of Panhandle, likes to drive the Jeep in area parades.

"I'll keep it dust free," Miller said of the Jeep.

## Making progress along Texas border ...

Having voted for the \$110 million in border security funding that Gov. Rick Perry requested in the last legislative session, I recently visited the border region to see the threat firsthand and assess the progress of our efforts. I can report that our approach is having an extremely positive impact.

The state is confronting the challenges at the border with a primary emphasis on prevention. And, while barriers can be effective in certain heavily-trafficked areas, closely coordinated local, state and federal law enforcement resources give us our best chance to hit our target — reduced crime and a secure border.

A one-size-fits-all solu-

tion for this complicated terrain of waterways, deserts, urban centers and agricultural operations is not possible. But, we can move away from an operational structure that records ever higher numbers of apprehensions, drug seizures and convictions to an outcome-based model that focuses on crime prevention and safety.

At Gov. Perry's request, state funds appropriated by the legislature are being used to provide much needed equipment and resources to support the brave men and women of the Border Patrol in achieving its vital mission. This funding and clear direction from the governor's office have allowed us to attain an unprecedented

level of coordination and cooperation among local, state and federal agencies in the border region.

Around the clock, local sheriffs' deputies, police officers, Border Patrol agents, Department of Public Safety troopers, Customs and Border Protection inspectors, Texas Military Forces personnel, Texas Parks and Wildlife Game Wardens and others under the coordination of the Texas Rangers are working together to secure the Texas/Mexico border. This teamwork is maximiz-

ing our resources, increasing our impact on organized smuggling activity and protecting our citizens.

I have crossed rugged terrain on horseback with the Border Patrol, accompanied game wardens on boat patrols of border lakes and the Rio Grande River and flown at night in helicopters equipped with newly-acquired night vision capabilities. I have listened to weary law enforcement officers as they share stories of heavily-armed paramilitary forces and transnational gang members employed by

drug cartels who threaten Texas landowners.

However, our efforts are succeeding, and we have the results to back it up. In border counties that have long been the personal playground for smuggling organizations, serious crime has dropped by an average of 65 percent and illegal alien apprehensions have fallen as those who would cross illegally are staying home. It is clear the word is out: Texas is serious about border security.

I am encouraged by conversations I had with experienced sheriffs like Sigi Gonzalez and D'Wayne Jernigan who told me that they have seen substantial progress in their border

counties since operations began. Their newfound belief that a secure border is attainable through teamwork is yet more proof of our progress.

Our situation is improving because Texans decided to do something about border security instead of just talking about it. Border security is, first and foremost, a federal issue. Yet, Texas is making a difference because we are willing to dedicate our resources to a problem that affects the entire state and our nation. I am convinced that the Texas approach should be emulated in other states as soon as possible.

Our purpose is not to shut down the border, but to shut

## Today in History

Today is Sunday, April 13, the 104th day of 2008. There are 262 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On April 13, 1958, American pianist Van Cliburn, 23, won the first International Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow. On this date:

In 1598, King Henry IV of France endorsed the Edict of Nantes, which granted rights to the Protestant Huguenots. (The edict was abrogated in 1685 by King Louis the XIV, who declared France entirely Catholic again.)

In 1742, Handel's "Messiah" was first performed publicly, in Dublin, Ireland.

In 1743, Thomas Jefferson, the third president of the United States, was born in Shadwell, Va.

In 1870, the Metropolitan Museum of Art was incorporated in New York. (The original museum opened in 1872.)

In 1943, President Roosevelt dedicated the Jefferson Memorial.

In 1964, Sidney Poitier became the first black performer in a leading role to win an Academy Award, for "Lilies of the Field."

In 1965, 16-year-old Lawrence Wallace Bradford Jr. was appointed

by New York Republican Jacob Javits to be the first black page of the U.S. Senate.

In 1970, Apollo 13, four-fifths of the way to the moon, was crippled when a tank containing liquid oxygen burst. (The astronauts managed to return safely.)

In 1986, Pope John Paul II visited the Great Synagogue of Rome in the first recorded papal visit of its kind to a Jewish house of worship.

In 1992, the Great Chicago Flood took place as the city's century-old tunnel system and adjacent basements filled with water from the Chicago River.

Ten years ago: NationsBank and BankAmerica announced a merger which created Bank of America, while Banc One and First Chicago NBD said they would unite. A 500-pound steel joint fell from the upper level of New York's Yankee Stadium, crashing onto seats below. (No fans were inside the park at the time.)

Five years ago: U.S.-led forces announced the capture of Wabtan Ibrahim Hasan, a half brother of and adviser to Saddam Hussein. After three weeks of captivity, seven U.S. POW's, including Army Specialist Shoshana Johnson, were released by Iraqi troops near Tikrit, Iraq.

## Texas Thoughts

The Dallas Morning News on the border fence:

Proponents of a border fence between Mexico and the United States want it taller, thicker, longer. They want it impregnable, and they want it now because, for them, this is the solution to our illegal immigration problem. Others, including landowners, border-area politicians and environmental groups, say the fence will be ineffectual, will disrupt wildlife habitats and could damage U.S.-Mexico relations.

But the time for debate about the

fence is over. It's the law, and Homeland Security Secretary Michael Chertoff says he has no option but to comply. He tells us that when confronted with the conflicting priorities of protecting habitats or stopping criminals and illegal immigrants from entering, the latter trumps the former.

On Tuesday he invoked waivers allowing him to bypass federal environmental reviews to expedite work on 370 miles of fence, plus 22 miles of flood-control levees topped with fencing in Hidalgo County. The waivers are an uncomfortable choice for what amounts to a quick-fix answer.

Mr. Chertoff concedes that the fence will be more of a hindrance to illegal immigrants than an impenetrable monolith. Parts are designed to prevent

trucks and cars from crossing the border but won't halt individuals. He explains that the fence must be built with gaps large enough to permit wildlife migration.

Anyone looking at a map of the fence, especially in Texas, can see that most of the border will remain open. And the land chosen for the federal right-of-way is provoking additional skepticism. The fence will divide the University of Texas campus in Brownsville, for example, but it bypasses border property owned by individuals with close White House ties. Dozens of court challenges are pending.

Altogether, it's a mess that has been

got rental cars, opting to avoid the shorter southern route because of foot-deep snow. (The ferry would have been nice, but it is still hibernating.)

No, we had to drive north, then across the peninsula before heading south again.

We missed the semi-final game, taking turns listening to radio reports over cell phones. Our team won, and it was only a 530-mile jaunt up, around and down the "lake" to Holland. Shucks, we made it in a dozen hours, checking into our hotel at

midnight. The championship game was 17 hours away, and maybe we'd already joined the record books. I mean the short-listed one naming people who've driven about half of the almost 1,100 highway miles around "Ocean Michigan" on the same day. ....

Oh, you want to know about the trip home? It was uneventful. The plane left on time, and we luxuriated in the wide leather coach seats. Reflecting on our team's championship, we administered self-pinchers for reminders that ours is the nation's only team at any collegiate level, men or women, undefeated for the

season. And that our Meia Daniels and Chris Kielsmeier were voted "player and coach of the year," respectively.

On that "cloud with a 'nine' on it," we hardly needed a plane.

My mind wandered back a half-century to another air-plane story. ....

The year was 1960. It was a gentler time when airplanes were as likely to wait on passengers as vice versa. The late J.H. "Cap" Shelton was nearing the end of his 49-year career as HPU track coach. His teams won numerous championships and were best known for distance races. The two-mile

relay team was invited to run in the Coliseum Relays at Los Angeles where 30,000 fans would attend. It was "heady stuff" when he and the four guys readied to board Trans-Texas Airlines' DC-3 at Brownwood Airport. Bands played, speakers spoke and cameras flashed, delaying take-off by a good half-hour.

A ruffled passenger, perhaps weary of a half-dozen stops en route to Dallas Love Field, asked the young men about their sport. "I hope you can run faster than you can get on an airplane," he gruffed. ....

dropped in Mr. Chertoff's lap, and it still doesn't deal with the hard part: Congress must enact a comprehensive immigration reform package that tackles the real issues behind our immigration problem.

As Daniel Griswold of the Cato Institute told us this week, illegal immigrants are crossing the border because U.S. business has an ongoing demand for cheap labor. Building a border fence won't ease that demand. But a guest-worker program that allows immigrants to enter legally would do a far better job than a fence in reducing illegal crossings.

It would ensure that employers have access to the labor they need. And tougher workplace enforcement, coupled with measures giving existing illegal immigrants a pathway to regularization, would provide stronger incentives for all to comply with the law.

Just like the fence, comprehensive reform won't make everyone happy. But the right choices are rarely the easiest ones to make.

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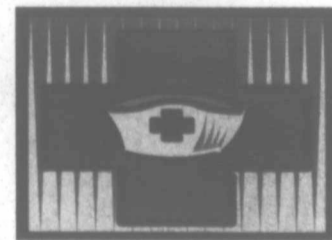
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## RRC stats, allowables set for April

AUSTIN — The Texas average rig count as of March 14 was 870, representing about 51 percent of all active land rigs in the United States. In the last 12 months, total Texas reported production was 337 million barrels of oil and 6.5 trillion cubic feet of natural gas.

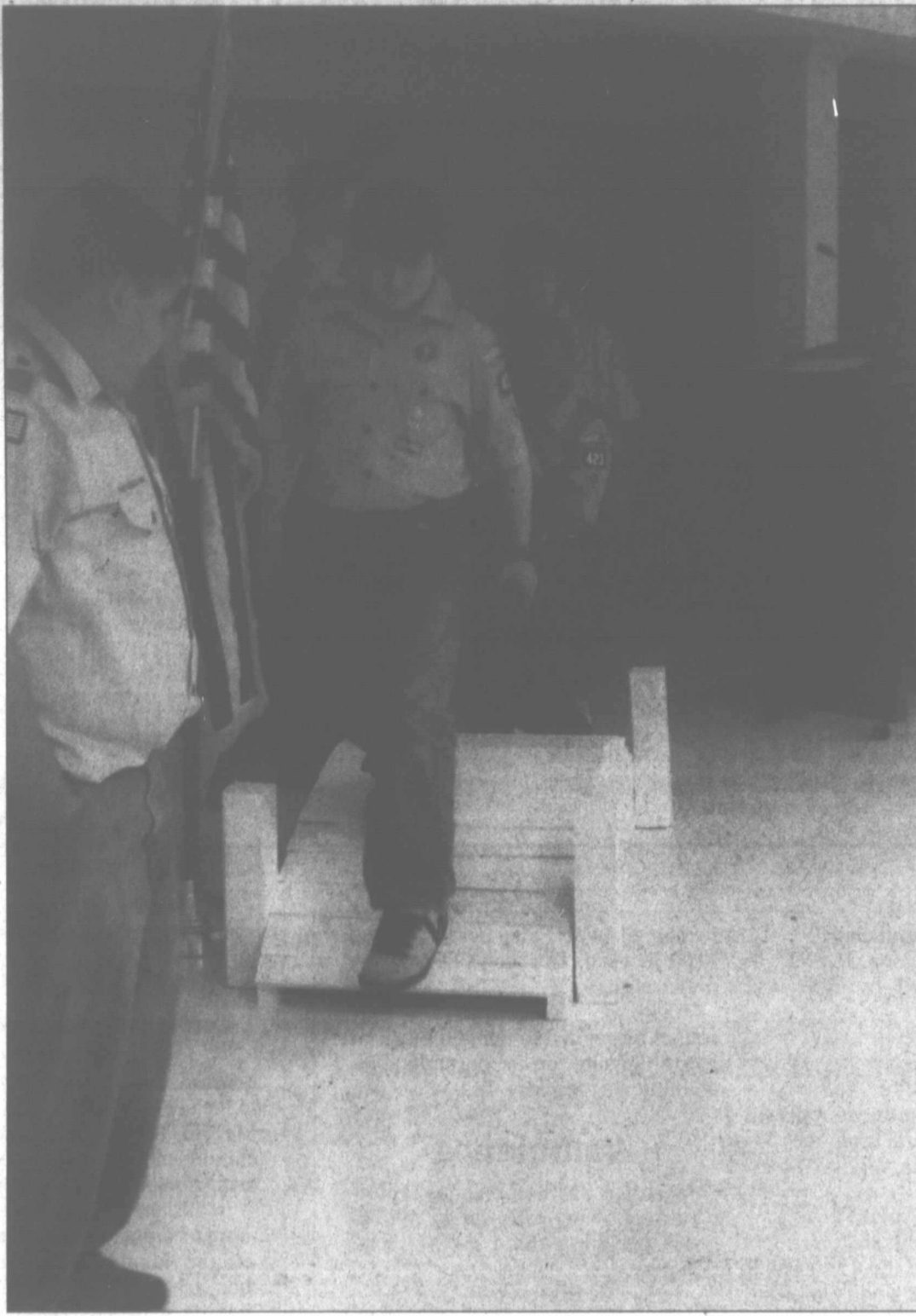
Texas natural gas production represents approximately 29 percent of total U.S. natural gas demand.

The Texas Railroad Commission's estimated final production for January 2008 is 29,127,893 barrels of crude oil and 509,964,266 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas well gas.

The commission derives final production numbers by multiplying the preliminary January 2008 production totals of 27,580,620 barrels of crude oil and 435,680,706 Mcf of gas well gas by a production adjustment factor of 1.0561 for crude oil and 1.1705 for gas well gas. (These production totals do not include casing-head gas or condensate.)

## Commission releases monthly oil, gas activity

AUSTIN — The Texas Railroad Commission issued a total of 1,926 original drilling permits in February 2008 compared to 1,400 in February 2007. The February total included 1,694 permits to drill new oil and gas wells, 47 to re-enter existing well bores, and 185 for re-completions.

Permits issued in February 2008 included 316 oil, 501 gas, 1,046 oil and gas, 50 injection, two service and 11 other permits. Texas preliminary January 2008 crude oil production averaged 889,697 barrels daily, up from the 876,817 barrels daily average of January 2007.

The preliminary Texas crude oil production figure for January 2008 is 27,580,620 barrels, an increase from 27,181,330 barrels reported during January 2007.

In February 2008, opera-

tors reported 400 oil, 785 gas, 46 injection and one other completion compared to 429 oil, 681 gas, 31 injection and seven other completions during February 2007.

Total well completions for 2008 year to date are 2,720 up from 2,599 recorded during the same period in 2007.

Operators reported 438 holes plugged and six dry holes in February 2008 compared to 530 holes plugged and three dry holes in February 2007.

Texas oil and gas wells produced 495,149,111 Mcf (thousand cubic feet) of gas based upon preliminary production figures for January 2008, up from the January 2007 preliminary gas production total of 469,810,569 Mcf.

Texas production in January 2008 came from 135,171 oil and 78,601 gas wells.

## Roberts, Hemphill foundation benefits from hefty donations

Longtime Roberts County resident and philanthropist T. Boone Pickens and commodities trader Salem Abraham of Canadian are donating \$2 million each to form the Pickens-Abraham Foundation for the benefit of the youth of Roberts and Hemphill counties in the Texas Panhandle.

"I know what it's like to grow up in a small town and the challenges families encounter," says Pickens, who was born in Holdenville, a small town in eastern Oklahoma, and later grew up in the Texas Panhandle. "It is my belief that this Foundation will provide help for youth who live in Roberts and Hemphill counties and are determined to reach for the stars."

The foundation will focus on youth in the two counties, funding educational programs and health initiatives beginning in January 2009. It will award grants each January from the funds earnings in the previous year.

"Boone and I have often discussed the idea of financially supporting local projects," Abraham said. His roots run deep in the 2,000-population town of Canadian in Hemphill County.

"I assured him, that with his money we could make a difference in the lives of the wonderful people who live in Hemphill and Roberts counties. Unfortunately, instead of giving me a blank check, he negotiated a dollar for dollar match from Ruth Ann and me as part of the deal. You can always count on Boone to be a good haggler, whether it is for business or charity."

Pickens founded Mesa

Petroleum, an independent oil company. "Oil & Gas Investor" included Pickens with such luminaries as Henry Ford and John D. Rockefeller on its "100 Most

Influential People of the Petroleum Century."

In 1996, Pickens formed an energy-focused invest-

storage reported by the commission for February 2008 is 238,242,049 Mcf compared to 263,160,164 Mcf in February 2007. The March 2008 gas storage estimate is 218,692,850 Mcf.

The commission's Oil and Gas

Division set initial April 2008 natural gas production allowables for prorated fields in the state to meet market demand of 17,070,833 Mcf (thousand cubic feet).

In setting the initial April 2008 allowables, the Commission used historical production figures from previous months, producers' demand forecasts for the coming month, and adjusted the figures based on well capability. These initial allowables will be adjusted after actual production for April 2008 is reported.

ment firm, BP Capital, a hedge funds primarily focused on oil and gas commodities and energy-dependent equities. In the process, he has continued to advocate conservationism and the development of alternative energy options such as compressed natural gas as a transportation fuel and wind power, long before they became mainstream issues.

The first parcel of land that was to become Mesa Vista Ranch, which Pickens calls home, was purchased in Roberts County in 1971. He now owns 68,000 acres, where he has concentrated on habitat restoration and enhancement for recreational uses. Promoting the recreational uses, along with efforts to market stranded and surplus water and

potential for wind farms have led to a tremendous increase in local land values.

Five generations of Abrahams claim Canadian as their home. Salem Abraham is owner and president of a hedge fund housed in the same family financial offices above a local steakhouse where his grandfather amassed a large land-speculation business.

He graduated from the local high school, as have most of his employees. Abraham, who lives in Canadian with his wife, Ruth Ann, and their eight children, is president of the board of trustees for the Canadian Independent School District.

The Notre Dame graduate's Abraham Trading Co. trades global commodity futures using a strategy that relies in large part on the behavioral sciences and the mentality of crowds. Abraham also has been involved in land, water and energy deals throughout the Panhandle.

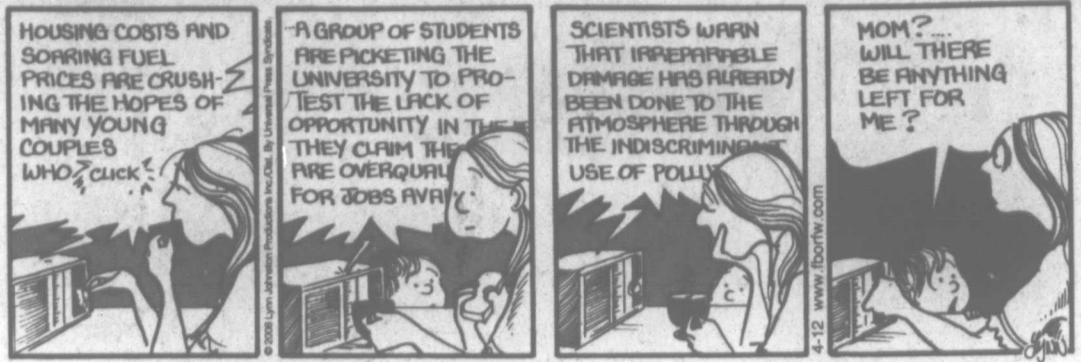

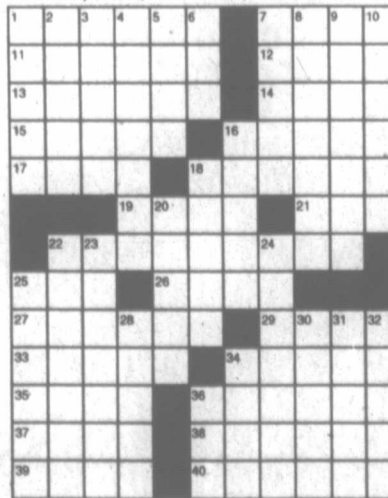

## Research could reap 'residual' benefits for beef eaters, producers

OVERTON — Texas AgriLife Research scientists hope to develop a means to select cattle that gain the same weight — or more — on less feed than cattle of the same bred-type and history.

At stake, literally, are steaks, as well as and hamburger and ribs. Eating less and gaining more means more efficient beef cattle operations, which could eventually mean a better product on grocery store shelves, said Dr. David Forbes, AgriLife Research animal nutritionist.

Forbes, who is based at Uvalde, is the lead researcher in a project that involves AgriLife Research scientists from across the state and different disciplines. These scientists include Dr. Monte Rouquette, AgriLife Research forage management (Overton); Dr. Gordon Carstens, AgriLife Research animal nutritionist (College Station); Dr. Ron Randel, AgriLife Research animal physiologist (Overton); and Dr. Tom Welsh, AgriLife Research reproductive physiologist (College Station).

At the heart of the subject is a beef-animal measurement technique called "residual feed intake," or "RFI" in research shorthand.

RFI has been used to fine-tune poultry operations for years, Forbes said. More recently, researchers have found that the technique can be applied to beef cattle. More importantly, they have found there are differences between animals of the same breed, even the same herd, when it comes to how efficiently they convert feed into gaining weight.

What makes the study different is it is designed to develop a means of measuring RFI of cattle on pastures, Forbes said.

"We will test cattle on pasture so that we can use this technique to clarify and validate the residual feed intake data we're obtaining from feedlots," Forbes said.

RFI is not to be confused with feed conversion, a measurement used by animal scientists and agricultural producers for decades to improve net efficiency in poultry and swine operations, Forbes said.

Feed conversion is a relatively simple calculation that measures how much feed an animal consumes to gain a pound, Forbes said. It's simple mathematics: weight of the feed consumed daily divided by the weight gained daily.

The math behind RFI, however, is more complicated. RFI compares the difference between an animal's actual feed intake and its predicted feed intake. Predicted feed intake is the amount of feed the animal is expected to consume based on its weight, growth rate and the performance of its contemporaries. For example, steers that weigh more and gain faster would be expected to consume more than steers that weigh less and gain more slowly.

"Residual feed intake is better than feed conversion as it (residual feed intake) is independent of growth and body weight," Forbes said. "Residual feed intake measures the variation in feed intake that remains after the requirements for maintenance and growth are accounted for, and is calculated as the difference between an animal's actual feed intake and the feed an animal is expected to consume based on its body weight and average

daily gain."

For either measurement, keeping track of an animal's feed intake in a confined feeding operation is relatively simple. Computerized equipment tracks an animal's intake by various measures, usually involving feeding stations that are keyed to an electronic device either hung around the neck or clipped to the ear.

All such measures done to date have been done in some kind of confined feeding operation or another, Forbes said.

But unlike chickens and swine, beef cattle spend more time in pastures than in confinement. As valuable as a research tool as RFI is for feedlots and researchers, questions remained: Can RFI of cattle on pasture be

measured? And if it can be measured, how would pasture RFI match up with RFI data collected in feedlots?

Forbes and his research partners are trying to find answers to both questions. "(With this method), when they're on pasture, can we measure forage intake," Rouquette said. "And the question we'll be asking is does that RFI pasture rating hold true to what we measure in the feedlots?"

If the data compare, then the easier-to-acquire feedlot data can be used to select animals that perform better in the pasture, Rouquette said.

The project is an example of research only



## Dreyfus Supports Integration of Chemistry in Museum at WTAMU

CANYON — For some, the chemical sciences can be downright scary.

That's why Dr. Mark Olsen, assistant professor of chemistry at West Texas A&M University, and Buster Ratliff, operations coordinator for Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, teamed up to develop an interactive way of introducing chemistry to pre-college students — and any others interested in the subject — outside of the classroom.

Their efforts have been rewarded by a prestigious grant of \$33,000 from the Camille and Henry Dreyfus Foundation, Inc.

Olsen and Ratliff will utilize the funding this summer to implement "Novel Chemistry Displays and Assessment for the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum," which will utilize computer graphics to explain how chemistry is vital to the basis for various displays already in place at the museum.

"Some students, when they get to college, have an active dislike of chemistry, but it's because they know so little about it," Olsen said. "We want to be proactive in influencing their knowledge of chemistry before they arrive at our door, and we want to do it in an informal way, outside of the classroom, so they can experience chemistry in an enjoyable setting at their own pace."

Kiosks with specially developed software will be placed at three museum displays to explain how chemistry plays a role in: petroleum production, herbs and medicines of Native Americans, and in the dying of clothes by early Panhandle pioneers.

Additionally, tour groups will be armed with Quizdom clickers, radio-frequency operated devices, through which students can demonstrate their levels of interest and understanding in chemistry-related aspects of the museum displays.

"Museums always label their displays, but this will give our exhibits much more depth," Ratliff said. "It will add to the overall experience, and because of the way Dr. Olsen is designing the software, visitors will be able to go into the chemistry aspect of it in a casual way or as in-depth as they like. The kiosks will have touch-screen interaction, and people will have the opportunity to learn about chemistry without knowing it's a lesson. I think it's a great, non-traditional approach to learning and teaching."

CANYON — An event-filled agenda is on tap for Communication Week at West Texas A&M University.

an agency such as AgriLife Research is equipped to do, Forbes said.

"A private individual, if he knew half his animals were more efficient, he'd get rid of the others pretty quickly," Forbes said. "But as scientists, we're interested in the less efficient animals too, because we want to understand the biology."

Through understanding the biological processes behind residual feed intake, it may one day be possible to identify less efficient animals via a simple test, Forbes said.

"But that's a long way off," he said. "Right now, we are just trying to solve basic measurement problems."

The researchers are near to having solved the first problem, that of developing the methodology of measuring residual feed intake of animals on pastures.

Twice a day, the animals

are fed a corn gluten supplement containing alkane, a waxy substance similar to paraffin. Forages also contain alkanes. Using an instrument called a gas chromatograph, fecal samples from the test animals can be analyzed for amounts of the different alkanes.

"Using the ratio of those two different alkanes, we can determine how much (grass) the animals have eaten," Forbes said.

Forbes is confident that

the methodology he and his research team have chosen will work, he said. There are details yet to be resolved, however, before the actual test can proceed.

"What we don't know yet is how many fecal samples we need to get to adequately describe intake over these long periods. We'll dose these animals for periods up to 70 days, which is an incredible undertaking in itself," Forbes said.

## Beastie Boy Adam Yauch makes basketball documentary

NEW YORK (AP) — Some of college basketball's brightest stars, including Kansas State's Michael Beasley and UCLA's Kevin Love, are featured in Beastie Boy Adam Yauch's new documentary, "Gunnin' for That No. 1 Spot."

And while it's less than two years since he followed the then-high school players for a week, he still can't get over how much they've changed.

"They already look different, and I think it will be really interesting to look at this doc five or 10 years from now and see these guys when they were high school students. There's a good chance that several of them may be superstars in the NBA," Yauch told The Associated Press in an interview this week. "They were like babies in this picture."

Yauch took his camera to Harlem's famed Rucker Park, made famous by streetballers, in September 2006 to document some of the nation's top high school talent, who were playing in an event there.

Yauch said he was struck by how the players — who also included Jerryd Bayless of Arizona, Donte Green of Syracuse and Kyle Singler of Duke — could act like kids one minute, yet live in such an adult world.

"They have this infrastructure around them, and they are being groomed for stardom," he said.

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

# Major League Baseball players, owners reach drug agreement

NEW YORK (AP) — Baseball players and owners agreed Friday to more frequent drug testing and increased — but not total — authority for the program's outside administrator.

All players implicated in December's Mitchell Report on performance-enhancing drugs were given amnesty as part of the agreement, which toughens baseball's drug rules for the third time since the program began in 2002.

Thus, the deal eliminated 15-day suspensions assessed against Jose Guillen and Jay Gibbons.

The independent administrator, a position created in November 2005, will be given an initial three-year term and can be removed only if an arbitrator finds a cause. Until now, he could be fired at any time by

either side. But baseball did not heed advice from the World Anti-Doping Agency and turn drug testing over to an outside agency.

In addition, the decision over whether a player can be subjected to reasonable-cause testing will remain with management and the union, with any disagreement decided by the sport's regular arbitrator. Also, a joint management-union body called the Treatment Board will supervise the part of the program relating to drugs of abuse, such as cocaine.

Reps. Henry Waxman and Tom Davis, leaders of the House Committee on Oversight and Government Reform that has held hearings on drug use, said in a joint statement they were "pleased that Major League

Baseball has taken steps to strengthen its drug-testing policy."

Yet the changes were not enough for Dr. Gary Wadler, chairman of committee that determines the World Anti-Doping Agency's banned-substances list.

"It's another incremental step. It's better than it was but not where it needs to be," said Wadler, who faulted baseball for not adding blood testing for human growth hormone and for not turning testing over to the U.S. Anti-Doping Agency.

"This still falls significantly short of the mark, no matter what internal bureaucracy they've patched together," Wadler said.

As part of the agreement, players will join Major League Baseball's efforts to educate youth about performance-enhancing drugs,

and their union will contribute \$200,000 to an anti-doping organization.

In exchange for those two provisions, baseball commissioner Bud Selig agreed not to discipline players implicated by Mitchell during his 1 1/2-year investigation.

"We are gratified that commissioner Selig chose to accept Sen. Mitchell's recommendation that no further punishment of players is warranted," union head Donald Fehr said. "In many instances the naming of players was punishment enough; in others it may have been unfair."

Guillen and Gibbons were suspended in December following media reports linking them to performance-enhancing drugs. Those penalties were put on hold just before opening day as negotiators neared an agreement.

"It is time for the game to move forward," Selig said. "There is little to be gained at this point in debating dated miscon-

duct and enduring numerous disciplinary proceedings."

The sides agreed that in future investigations, allegations against players won't be made public unless discipline is imposed, and that a player will be given the allegations and evidence against him before any investigatory interview.

While the sides agreed that records of negative tests be kept for two years, they did not agree to keep the actual urine samples.

Players and owners reached their first joint drug agreement in August 2002, then under pressure amended it in January 2005 and instituted a 10-day penalty for first offenses. After Congress pushed for more changes, they amended it a second time in November 2005, changing the first offense to a 50-game suspension, banning amphetamines and creating the independent program administrator, who shared power with a management-union Health Policy Advisory Committee.

In his recommendations, Mitchell said the program should be administered "by a truly independent authority" in the form of an expert who couldn't be removed except for good cause, an independent nonprofit corporation or another structure created by the sides.

As a result, the HPAC is being disbanded, and its duties largely turned over to the administrator, Dr. Bryan Smith.

In the deal, the sides agreed:

—annual tests will rise by 600 to 3,600, an average of three per player.

—as many as 375 off-season tests can be conducted over the next three years, up from the current limit of 60 per off-season.

—testing will include the top 200 prospects for each year's annual draft.

—the IPA will issue an annual report detailing what substances resulted in positive tests, the number of tests given and therapeutic use exemptions by category of ailment.

—additional substances were added to the banned list, among them: insulin-like growth factor, gonadotropins, aromatase inhibitors, selective estrogen receptor modulators, and clomid and other antiestrogens.

—an automatic stay for an initial suspension will be expanded to players disciplined for conduct unrelated to a positive test.

The sides also disclosed a previously unannounced agreement struck during the 2006 labor talks in which they specified the commissioner has authority to discipline players under a just cause standard for violations of the drug agreement that don't carry a specified penalty.

"Going into this negotiation, the commissioner was 100 percent correct that we had the best program in professional sports," said Rob Manfred, baseball's executive vice president for labor relations. "These changes just solidify that kind of premier leadership position in my view."

The new joint drug agreement, which must be ratified by both sides, runs until Dec. 11, 2011, when baseball's labor contract expires. The sides will meet annually with the IPA, the collection company and the laboratory to consider changes.

"Given the series of modifications which have previously been made, as well as the flexibility provided for in the current JDA, we do not expect to be renegotiating the JDA again prior to the next scheduled round of collective bargaining," Fehr said.

Selig's next step will be to determine whether management employees should be disciplined for conduct mentioned in the Mitchell Report. He already has met with officials of the San Francisco Giants, who were mentioned prominently. Manfred said no decisions on management discipline have been made.

Selig said any fines imposed on management will be donated to the Partnership of a Drug Free America and the Taylor Hooton Foundation.

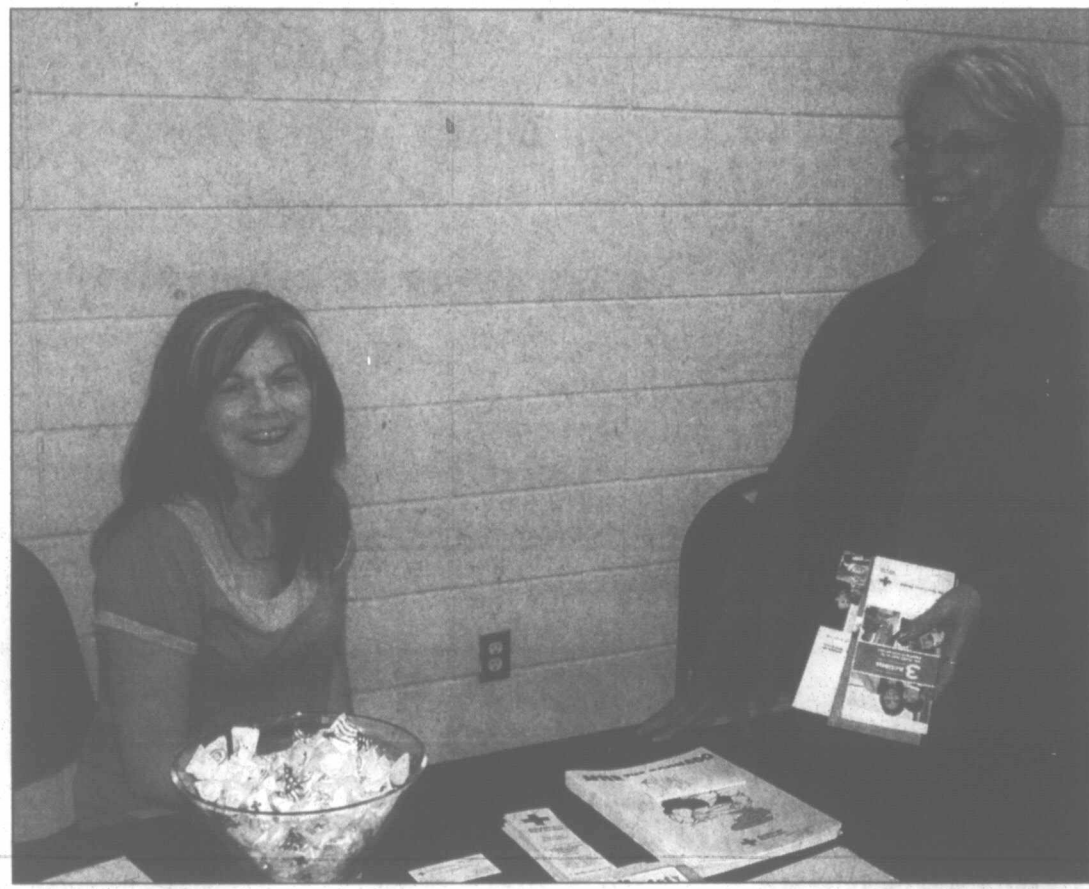

## Annual report recaps beef programs

AUSTIN — The Texas Beef Council (TBC) recently published the 2007 Annual Report highlighting key state and national programs of research, communication and promotion that Texas producers helped fund with checkoff dollars.

"Each year the annual report allows Texas producers to learn more about how their checkoff dollars were invested in various beef demand-building projects and programs throughout the previous year," said Sugie Sartwelle, chair of the TBC board of directors.

The Beef Checkoff Program was established as a part of the 1985 Farm Bill and assesses \$1-per-head on the sale of live domestic and imported cattle, in addition to a comparable assessment on imported beef and beef products. By law, 50 cents of each dollar collected goes to national beef checkoff programs and the other half is administered by the state beef council. TBC collected approximately \$11.15 million dollars in 2007 and sent over \$5.57 million for national programs through the Cattlemen's Beef Board.

The TBC board of directors, consisting entirely of Texas beef producers, sent an additional \$2.31 million to further support national checkoff programs. In total, the TBC board used about \$4.46 million dollars to fund in-state programs.

The report includes a chart indicating the percentage breakdown of investments in each program area and the additional national investments. Programs were direct-

ed to target audiences including consumers, retailers, restaurant operators, health professionals, educators and media.

The report's reverse side summarizes similar information on national programs approved by the Cattlemen's Beef Board and contracted through organizations such as the National Cattlemen's Beef Association's Federation of State Beef Councils and U.S. Meat Export Federation.

"We have over 149,000 beef producers here in Texas and I strongly encourage every one of them to learn

and read about the checkoff-funded programs taking place on their behalf," said Sartwelle. "It is important for producers to recognize that through these programs, TBC is working towards the industry's aggressive long range plan goal of increasing beef demand 10 percent by 2010."

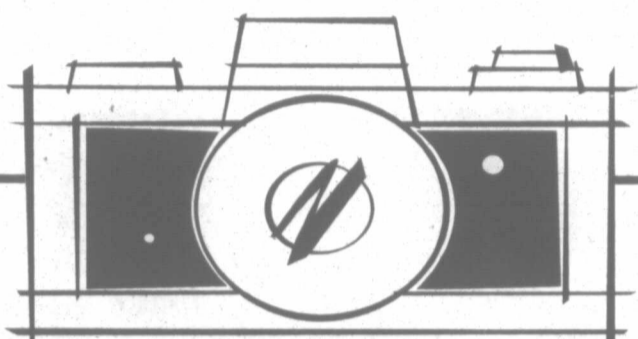

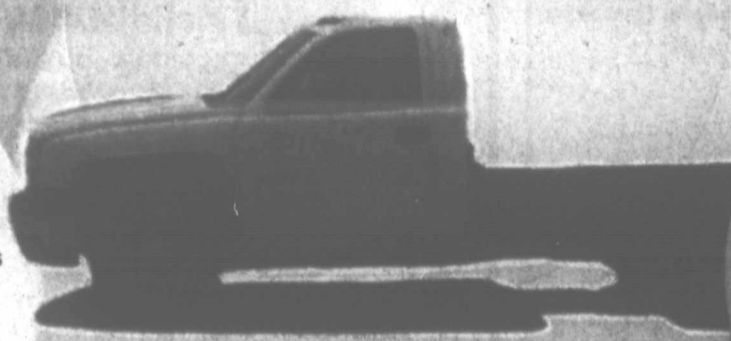
