Leverich and Jack Curtis of Curtis Drilling Company Rhodes said that the foundation is going to communities in the panhandle and telling them that if they would raised $\$ 50,000$ and start their own community
fund, the Amarillo Area fund, the Amarillo Area $\$ 50,000$. "They would have $\$ 100,000$ to start with," Rhodes said.
Pampa has until the end of 2008 to establish a community fund and raise $\$ 50,000$. "The unique thing about
this program," Rhodes said, "is that we really don't put a - lot of guidelines or stipulations on it:"
The only real requirement, she said, is a community advisory committee to make the funding decisions. "Community foundations operate basically under a
gifting method called a gifting method called a
donor adyised fund," Rhodes
said, "which means that the donor makes a charitable donation to the foundation, establishes a fund, and then
the donor advises on how he or she wants that money disbursed."
She said, however, that the Amarillo Are. Foundation has the final authority to decide on the disbursement. That generally has to do with
meeting the established meeting the established
rules, such as giving to a charitable cause or a $501 . \mathrm{c} 3$ organization.
"We feel like you're the ones that know how to make the decisions on what's best for your community,"
Rhodes said Rhodes said.
She said the one thing they
can't do is give money can't do is give money
directly to individuals. "But we can give money to cities," Rhodes said. "We can give money to hospital districts. We can give money to schools. We can give money to $501 . \mathrm{c} 3$ organiza-

That decision is up to the community. She said that the money in the community fund in Amarillo Area Foundation Communities have a choice between a market fund, which has in the past returned about 10 percent per year, or certificates of deposits, which have returned a little over three percent. Most of the commu-
nities have chosen to split their funds and put some money in each.
As of January, Rhodes said they had some 23 community funds, although some communities had multiple She said the funds parpos.

OVERTON - Texas AgriLife Research scientists hope to develop a means to select on less feed than cattle of the same bred-type and history.
At stake, literally, are steaks, as well as and hamburger and ribs. Eating less and gaining more means more efficient beef cattle operations, which could eventually mean a better product on grocery store shelves, said
David Forbes, AgriLife Research animal nutritionist.
Forbes, who is based at Uvalde, is the lead researcher in a project that involves AgriLife Research scientists from across the state and different disciplines. These scientists include age management (Overton); Dr. Gordo Carstens, AgriLife Research animal nutri tionist (College Station); Dr. Ron Randel AgriLife Research animal physiologist (Overton); and Dr. Tom Welsh, AgriLife
Research, reproductive physiologist (College Research reproductive physiologist (College
Station).
At the heart of the subject is a beef-anima At the heart of the subject is a beef-animal measurement technique called "residual fee intake," or "RFI" in research shorthand. RFI has been used to fine-tune poultry operations for years, Forbes said. Mor technique can be applied to beef cattle. More importantly, they have found there are differences between animals of the same breed, even the same herd, when it comes to how efficiently they convert feed into gaining

RFI is not to be confused with feed conversion, a measurement used by animal scientists and agricultural producers for decades to improve net efficiency in poultry and
swine operations, Forbes said. swine operations, Forbes said. culation that measures how much feed an animal consumes to gain a pound, Forbes said. It's simple mathematics: weight of the feed consumed daily divided by the weight gained daily.

The math behind RFI, however, is more
complicated. RFI compares the difference complicated. RFI compares the difference predicted feed intake. Predicted feed intake is the amount of feed the animal is expected to consume based on its weight, growth rate and
the performance of its contemporaries For the performance of its contemporaries. For
example, steers that weigh more and gain example, steers that weigh more and gain
faster would be expected to consume more than steers that weigh less and gain more slowly.
"Residual feed intake is better than feed conversion as it (residual feed intake) is inde-
pendent of growth and body weight," Forbes pendent of growth and body weight," Forbes
said. "Residual feed intake measures the variation in feed intake that remains after the requirements for maintenance and growth are accounted for, and is calculated as the difference between an animal's actual feed intake and the feed an animal is expected to con-
sume based on its body weight and average

Chemistry in Muppoum at WTAMU CANYON - For some, the chemical sciences can be downright scary.
That's why Dr. Mark Olsen, assistant profes-
sor of chemistry at West Texas A\&M University, sor of chemistry at West Texas A\&M University,
and Buster Ratiff and Buster Rattiff, operations coordinator for
Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum, teamed up to develop an interactive way of introducing chemistry to pre-college students - and any others interested in the subject - outside of the classroom.
Their efforts have been rewarded by a presti-
gious grant of $\$ 33,000$ from the Camille and Henry Dreyfus Foundation, Inc.
Olsen and Ratliff will utilize the finding this summer to implement "Novel Chemistry Displays and Assessment for the Panhandle-
Plains Historical Museum Plains Historical Museum," which will utilize computer graphics to explain how chemistry is
vital to the basis for various displays already in place at the museum.
"Some students, when they get to college, have an active dislike of chemistry, but it's because they know so little about it". Olsen said.
"We want to be proactive in influencing their "We want to be proactive in influencing their
knowledge of chemistry before they arrive at knowiedge of chemistry before they arrive at
our door, and we want to do it in an informal way, outside of the classroom, so they can experience chemistry in an enjoyable setting at their own pace."
Kiosks with specially developed software will be placed at three museum displays to
explain how chemistry plays a role in: petroleexplain how chemistry plays a role in: petrole-
um production, herbs and medicines of Native Americans, and in the dying of clothes by early Panhandle pioneers.
Additionally, tour groups will be armed with Quizdom clickers, radio-frequency operated devices, through which students can demon-
strate their levels of interest and understanding in chemistry-related aspects of the museum displays.
"Museums always label their displays, but
this will give our exhibits much more depth," this will give our exhibits much more depth," Ratliff said. "It will add to the overall experience, and because of the way Dr. Olsen is
designing the software, visitors will be able to go into the chemistry aspect of it in a casual way or as in-depth as they like. The kiosks will have touch-screen interaction, and people will have the opportunity to learn about chemistry without knowing it's a lesson. I think it's a great, non-traditional approach to learning and teaching
