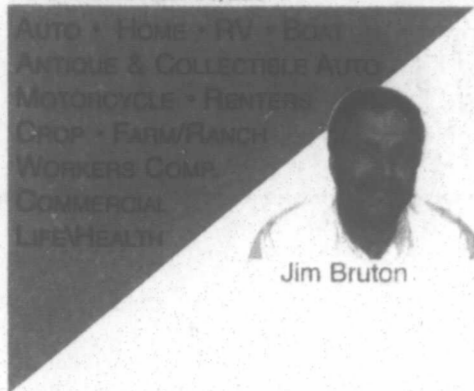

Tributes Continue Through Veterans Day

Blue/Gold Star Moms Honored

 POWs, MIAs, and Gold and Blue star mothers were honored yesterday in the opening ceremony to welcome the American Veterans Traveling Tribute (AVTT) wall to Pampa.

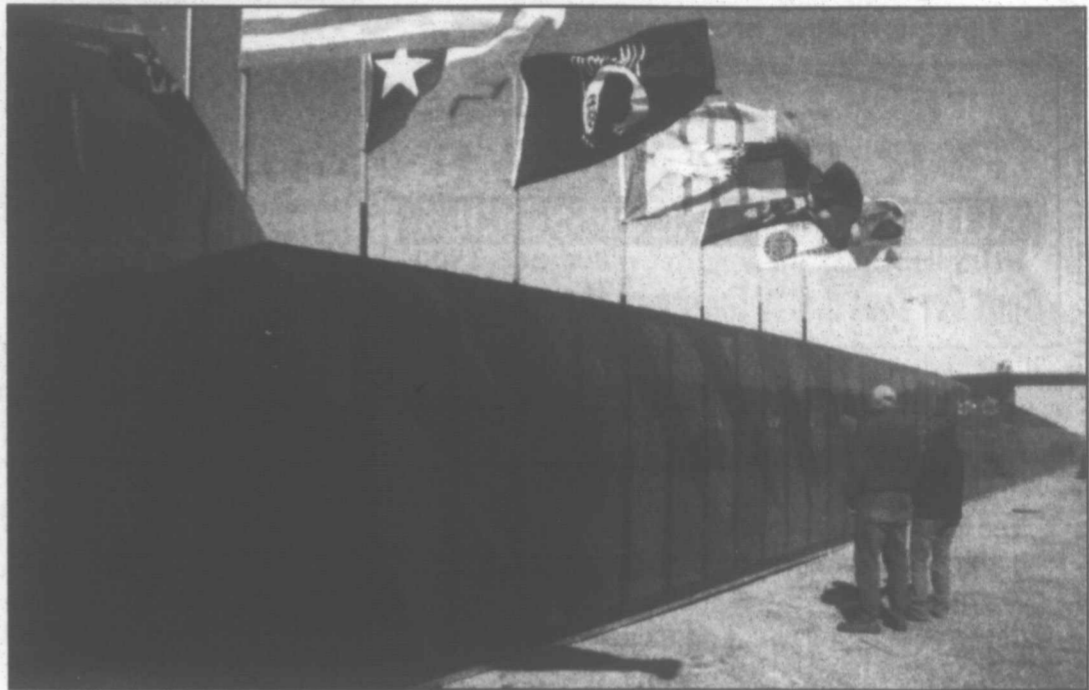
The ceremony, which was conducted under a tent outside next to the wall, included a proclamation to honor AVTT and fallen soldiers from all wars. Wreaths were laid by veterans and gold star mother Janet Buford, accompanied by veteran Danny Martin, for her son Travis Buford who died in the Iraq war. Another wreath for blue star mothers was laid at the wall by Julie Hester, who was accompanied by Rodnie

Winbourne. A POW/MIA wreath was laid by Danny Miller.

The ceremony continued with a speech by Mayor Lonny Robbins, which spoke of America's greatness that has been preserved and guaranteed through war veterans.

"As we view the wall this week, let us remember all of the brave men and women who willingly paid the supreme sacrifice to guarantee life, liberty, and the freedom to pursue happiness for all Americans."

Robins continued the ceremony by reading a letter written by a Tabitha Nilsen 15 year old, 11th grade stu-

Parade for Vets Saturday

Some 30 entries have sign up to participate in the parade tomorrow morning to commemorate the visit of the Traveling Vietnam Wall. However, parade organizers said anyone may show up tomorrow morning and be a part of the event. The parade's theme is "Patriots Going to the Wall."

All local World War II veterans will be honored by serving as Parade Marshals.

Floyd Sackett, one of the parade's organizers, said they had already heard from some veterans, but there is still plenty of time for any WWII vet to participate by contacting him at 440-1438 or VFW Post 1657 Commander Danny Martin at 662-4367.

The parade will form at 9 a.m. and begin promptly at 10 a.m. at the intersection of

Cuyler and Craven Streets. It will proceed north on Cuyler to Francis Avenue, west on Francis Avenue to Somerville Street, and then to the Traveling Vietnam Wall which will be erected on the M.K. Brown Civic Auditorium parking lot.

Parade entries will be divided into 10 categories: Bands, classic/antique cars, churches, commercial, four wheelers/bicycles, individuals, military, motorcycles, schools and service organizations. Winner and runners-up trophies will be awarded in each category.

The parade will be led by a color guard from VFW Post 1657, followed by the World War II veterans and then the Pride of Pampa High School Band.

School Board Discusses New Junior High, Names Mascot

The city's new junior high school scheduled to be built on the northwest side of town will be known officially as Pampa Junior High and its mascot will be the Reapers.

The Pampa Independent School District board of trustees decided on the name and mascot at their special meeting Thursday night.

School board member Derrell DeLoach questioned whether the board should solicit public input, but Charles Smith, board president, said the board had been through that before and had been unable to get any public consensus.

Smith noted that initially

the school was known as Pampa Junior High School, then when it moved into the old high school downtown it was renamed Robert E. Lee Junior High School, but was later renamed a more politically correct Pampa Junior High School.

As the educational system changed it was called Pampa Middle School, but then renamed Pampa Junior High School.

He also noted that over the years, the mascot had been the Reapers, the Shockers, the Patriots and the Green Team.

"I have no idea what they want to be called," Smith said.

Board member Lee Porter said that originally the junior high mascot had been the Gorillas.

The board heard reports on the progress of construction on the new junior high and the renovations to the high school.

Carol Fields, the district's business manager, said they had verbal commitments on all utility easements at the junior high and the contracts were being drawn up.

The board decided to leave the electronic marquee at the present junior high for now, noting that the new junior high would be some 700

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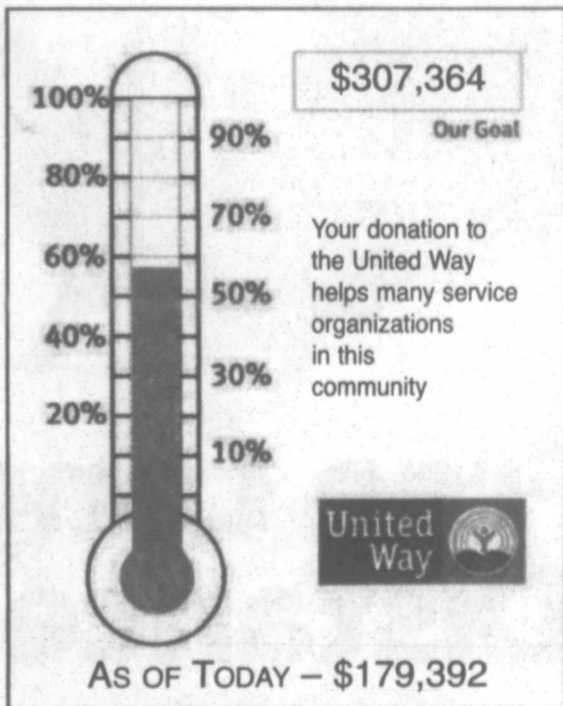

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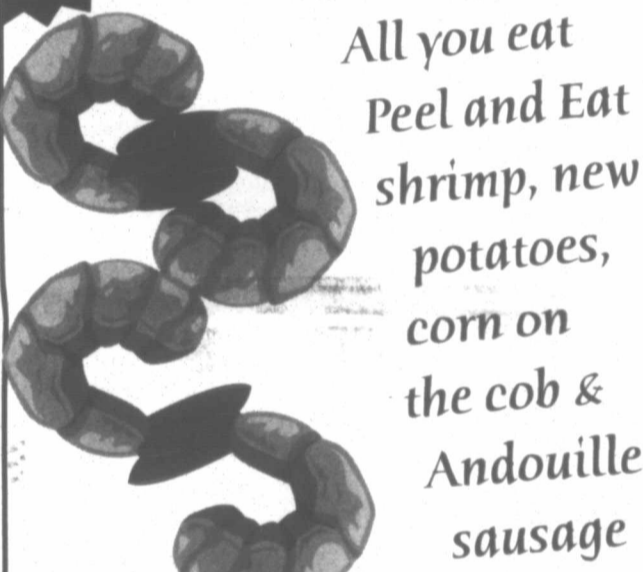



feet off Texas Highway 70.

The school board reviewed plans for an outdoor play area on the north side of the new junior high but delayed finalizing the plan.

For security reasons, the new school will have solid wooden classroom doors with no windows.

The board approved erecting a five strand barbed wire fence on both sides of the main access road from Texas Highway 70 to the new school. Porter said the 40 acre site of the school was already fenced but the area along the access road was not, and there were cattle grazing in the area.

With the approval of rep-

resentatives of the Pampa High School Class of 1956, who provided the Harvester statue in front of the high school, the statue will be moved into the school's rotunda surrounded by an eight-foot tall glass wall. Engraved bricks around the statue will be moved to around the new flag pole as the main entrance shifts from the south side of the building to the north side.

PISD Superintendent Barry Haensch said engineers had notified that the concrete fence on the south side of the high school was in bad shape. Rather than tear it down, Haensch said the district was contacting the Texas Historical Commission to see if it can be salvaged.

In other business, Haensch said the district was working with the city on traffic congestion problems.

Last week, parents picking up their children at Travis Elementary School found themselves being ticketed for double parking.

Haensch said parents were following procedures that apparently had been followed for 50 years, but for 50 years apparently had been illegal. He said that with the help of the city, the parking and traffic flow problems were being corrected.

In the future, the Travis Elementary pickup and drop off lanes will be similar to the ones at Austin Elementary. Haensch said the lanes will be painted and striped. He said they are trying to add two new crosswalks at Travis, too.

Haensch said the city told him there had been complaints about traffic problems at Wilson Elementary, and the district is working to relieve con-

gestion there, too.

The board also heard a report on a program that pairs Pampa elementary schools with comparable Amarillo elementary schools.

Haensch said principals and teachers from Pampa schools are working with the Amarillo schools in an effort to find new ways to improve student scores.

Austin is working with Paramount Terrace and Puckett elementary schools in Amarillo. Lamar is working with Landergin and Sunrise. Travis is working with South Georgia and Ridgecrest. Wilson is working with Pleasant Valley and Bivins.

"There are similarities," Haensch said. "We generally match up well."

He said there's always something to learn.

"The staff feels it's beneficial," Haensch said.

Today's Highlight in History:

On Nov. 7, 1917, Russia's Bolshevik Revolution took place as forces led by Vladimir Ilyich Lenin overthrew the provisional government of Alexander Kerensky.

On this date:

In 1874, the Republican Party was symbolized as an elephant in a cartoon drawn by Thomas Nast in Harper's Weekly.

In 1893, the state of Colorado granted women there the right to vote.

In 1916, Republican Jeannette Rankin of Montana became the first woman elected to Congress.

In 1918, during World War I, an erroneous report that an armistice had been signed set off celebrations across the country.

In 1940, in Washington state, the Tacoma Narrows Bridge, nicknamed "Galloping Gertie," collapsed during a windstorm.

In 1944, President Roosevelt won an unprecedented fourth term in office, defeating Thomas E. Dewey.

In 1962, Richard M. Nixon, having lost California's gubernatorial race, held what he called his "last press conference," telling reporters, "You won't have Nixon to kick around anymore."

In 1967, President Johnson signed a bill establishing the Corporation for Public Broadcasting.

In 1972, President Nixon was re-elected in a landslide over Democrat George McGovern.

In 1973, Congress overrode President Nixon's veto of the War Powers Act, which limits a chief executive's power to wage war without congressional approval.

Ten years ago: John Glenn returned to Earth aboard the space shuttle Discovery, visibly weak but elated after a nine-day mission. A scant four years after leading Republicans to glory, House Speaker Newt Gingrich announced he would resign not just his speakership but also his seat in the House.

Five years ago: Six U.S. soldiers were killed in the crash of their Black Hawk helicopter in Tikrit, Iraq. The defending champion U.S. baseball team failed to qualify for the 2004 Athens Olympics, losing to Mexico 2-1 in the quarterfinals of a qualifying tournament in Panama City, Panama.

One year ago: An 18-year-old gunman opened fire at his high school in Tuusula, Finland, killing seven other students and the principal before taking his own life. A cargo ship struck the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge, causing the San Francisco Bay's worst oil spill in nearly two decades.

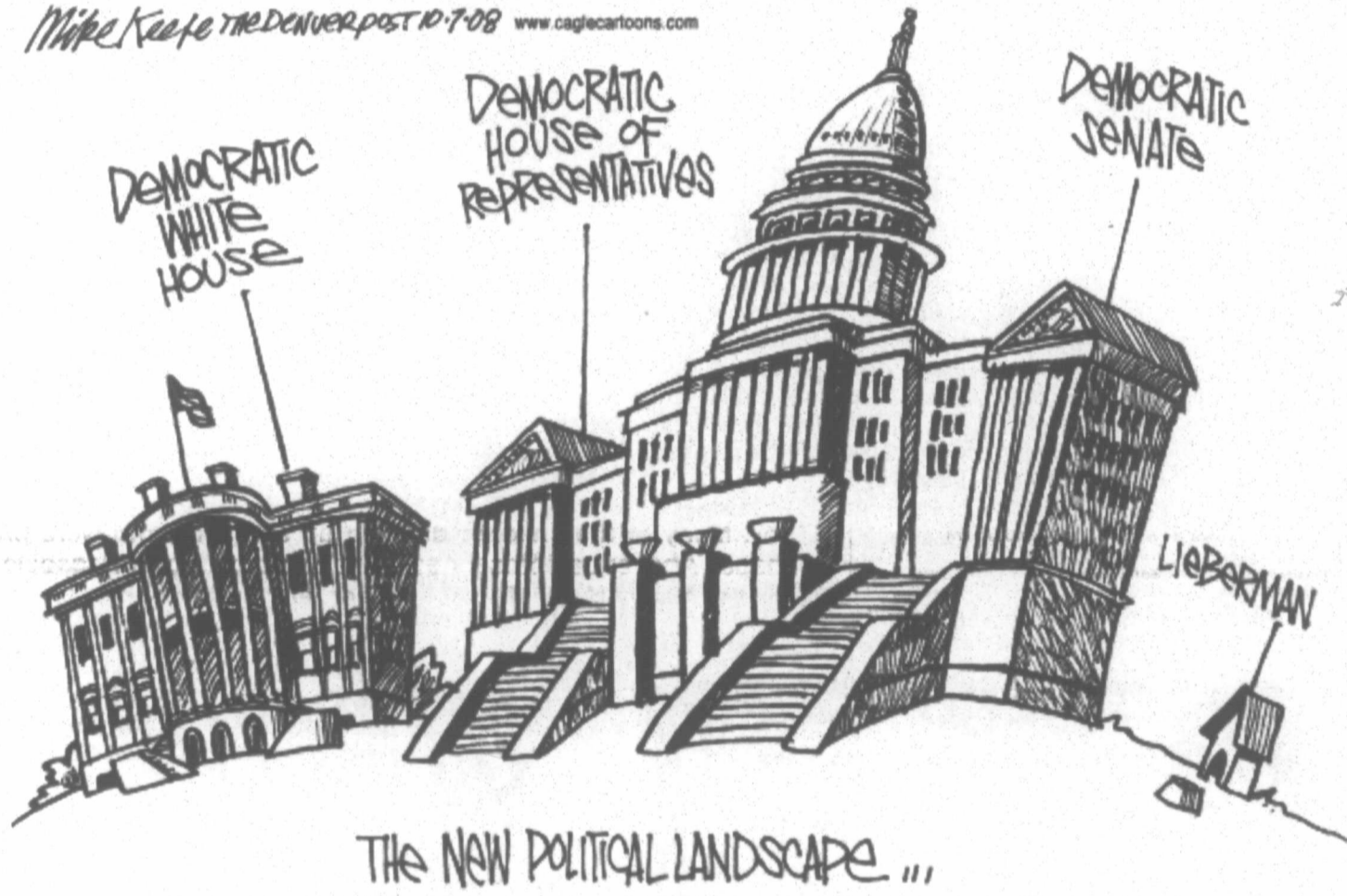

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Signs that your kid is a hacker ...

Recently, a Congressman's kid was arrested for breaking into Sarah Palin's Yahoo e-mail account. Many news organizations labeled him a "hacker."

Most of you have heard the term, "hacker." But, what is it? Or, more importantly, "who" is it? Hollywood leads you to believe this person is a misguided teenage punk rocker with too much time on their hands involved in illegal deeds using their computer.

First, let's get things straight. The words "hacker" and "criminal" are not synonymous. I have quite a few friends who are hackers. I even fancy myself a bit of a hacker, but not on caliber with some of the net-gods that exist. A hacker is simply someone that enjoys "learning how things work."

One online source defines a hacker as:

"[Originally, someone who makes furniture with an axe]

"1. A person who enjoys exploring the details of programmable systems and how to stretch their capabilities, as opposed to most users, who prefer to learn only the minimum necessary.

"2. One who programs enthusiastically (even obsessively) or who enjoys programming rather than just theorizing about programming.

"3. A person capable of appreciating hack value.

"4. A person who is good at programming quickly.

"5. An expert at a particular program, or one who frequently does work using it or on it; as

in 'a Unix hacker'. (Definitions 1 through 5 are correlated, and people who fit them congregate.)

"6. An expert or enthusiast of any kind. One might be an astronomy hacker, for example.

"7. One who enjoys the intellectual challenge of creatively overcoming or circumventing limitations."

Notice, that no where in that definition, did you see anything illegal. To use a Star Wars analogy, though, it is possible for a hacker to turn "to the dark side." We call criminal hackers, "Crackers." A person that breaks into computers or networks with the purpose of changing, deleting or stealing information is a cracker.

As an example, here's a scenario involving both types of people: One day, Joe Hacker is wandering around the Internet, looking at various sites, when he finds an "address" he hasn't seen before. Upon entering this mysterious address, he finds himself at the heart of NORAD's missile defense system. A large button labeled, "Launch" sits squarely on his screen.

A "hacker" would contact NORAD and tell them about the "hole" in their security so it could be fixed. A "cracker" would push the button (or, more likely, sell the information to the highest bidder).

Using these definitions, we can actually label some of our greatest inventors hackers. If Thomas Edison were alive today, he would probably wear the label proudly. Throw in Benjamin Franklin, Albert Einstein, etc. Heck, if you have a kid that takes apart the vacuum cleaner to see how it works, well, you have a hacker.

Crackers are the more mysterious of the two, though. They tend to congregate in loose organizations, similar to street gangs. However, unlike street gangs, a single gang may include members from nations all around the world. With names like "Legion of Doom" and "The Destroyers," these criminals often bill themselves as cyber-mercenaries, selling their services to corporations or foreign countries. Much like mobsters, once hired, they will steal from a competing corporation or "assassinate" their data.

Many of the most lethal computer viruses are written by crackers. Originally, these deadly viruses were intended for a specific target (like a military base or corporation). However, as with most viruses, they escape into the wild, spreading throughout the large population of personal computers in homes and businesses.

The majority of crackers use "non-techy" methods of breaking into systems. "Dumpster diving" is a popular pastime among crackers. You would be surprised how many passwords, credit card numbers and confidential reports are simply thrown away. So, how can you tell if your kid is experimenting with "cracking?" Are they constantly using their computer to the exclusion of other important activities? When you enter the room, do they suddenly "switch the screen off" or cover it so you can't see what they're doing? Do they frequent chat rooms at odd hours of the night? In their writing, do they use any of the following slang:

kEwL - similar to "cool," capitalization included

lamer - someone that is not a cracker, but thinks they are

doodz - dudes - fellow crackers

warez - short for "software," specifically, pirated software?

Don't get me wrong. Answering "yes," to any or all of those questions does not automatically mean your kid is a cracker, but those are some of the "signs." Many families have solved the problem by putting the family PC in a public area, like the living room or dining room, with the screen in full sight of anyone entering. If your kid is behind a locked bedroom door using his computer, you are just asking for trouble ...

Cutler rallies Broncos past Quinn, Browns

CLEVELAND (AP) — Jay Cutler turned Brady Quinn's big night into his own prime-time showcase.

Cutler passed for a career-high 447 yards, throwing three touchdown passes in the fourth quarter Thursday night — the last an 11-yarder to Brandon Marshall with 1:14 remaining — to rally the broken Denver Broncos to a 34-30 win over the Cleveland Browns that spoiled Quinn's highly hyped debut as an NFL starter.

The Broncos (5-4) entered the fourth quarter trailing 23-13, but Cutler, borrowing a page out of John Elway's comeback playbook, brought Denver back. He recorded his fifth career fourth-quarter comeback victory despite losing two more running backs to injuries and only having his fullback to carry the ball.

"It was a big, big win for us," Cutler said. "To be down 13 and have an empty backfield and to come back like this, it means a lot."

Cutler threw a 93-yard TD pass to rookie wide receiver Eddie Royal, a 28-yarder to tight end Daniel Graham and then finished off the Browns

like so many Denver teams have done in the past with his toss to Marshall in the corner of the end zone.

The Broncos have beaten Cleveland eight straight times and been the Browns' longtime nemesis, beating them three times in AFC title games.

Cutler finished 24-of-42 with three TDs and one interception. He piled up 204 yards passing in the fourth quarter.

Quinn threw two TD passes to Kellen Winslow and went 23-of-35 for 239 yards, but thought he could have done more.

"I told everyone, this one is flat on me," Quinn said. "I know I am good enough that I can make a play at the end and win. I felt comfortable out there, it's my home away from home."

After hauling in Cutler's final TD pass, Marshall, who spent the week exchanging barbs with Dolphins linebacker Joey Porter, was about to pull something out of his pants when teammate Brandon Stokley ran over and stopped him from getting a possible personal foul.

After the game, Marshall

said he had a black-and-white glove designed to honor President-elect Barack Obama and former Olympians Tommie Smith and John Carlos, who made controversial black power salutes at the 1968 Games in Mexico City.

Quinn had one last chance, getting the ball back with 1:10 remaining. The former Notre Dame star, who waited 25 games to take over Cleveland's offense, completed a 9-yard pass to Winslow on first down before two incompletions gave him no margin for error. On fourth down, Quinn whipped a high pass to Winslow that sailed through the hands of the Pro Bowl tight end.

"I just can't get that last play out of my head," Winslow said. "The great ones, the legends make those plays. That's where I want to be and I'm going to take it as a lesson."

Denver's bench burst into celebration while the Browns sustained another gut-wrenching loss after blowing a 14-point lead in the second half Sunday against Baltimore.

Dallas Fed CEO sees no economic growth in 2009

GRAPEVINE — The President and CEO of the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas thinks the financial crisis facing the nation, indeed the world, will be resolved, but it will take time.

"I believe we've put in place all the right sprockets to make the machine move," Richard W. Fisher said. "We may have some more that we have to do and hopefully the fiscal side will complement what we do and those gears will begin to mesh."

Speaking here Tuesday to the Texas Cattle Feeders Association annual convention, Fisher admitted that he sees no economic growth in 2009.

"None," Fisher said. "It's going to take a while. I wish I could give you a happier message than that."

He explained that the Federal Reserve Banks have certain tools that they can use and he said they have been busy putting them to use, but while the banks deal

with monetary policy, it is the federal government that deals with fiscal policy.

Fisher said that the Federal Reserve doesn't have the authority to tax and spend.

"We don't have the power to direct the budget," he says, "nor do we seek to."

The Executive Branch of the government works up the budget, he says, and Congress has the power of the purse strings.

"The Treasury is part of the Executive Branch," Fisher says. "We are not part of the Executive Branch."

The Federal Reserve System has seven governors that are confirmed by the United States Senate.

"Also, we have 12 bankers, of which I am one," Fisher says. "I am not appointed by the President of the United States and I am not confirmed by the United States Senate."

Fisher said he is elected by his board of directors.

"Each of us has nine members on our board that are elected by our shareholders," Fisher says.

The shareholders are the banks that own the capital stock of each of the Federal Reserve Banks.

"We have a true federal system," Fisher says, "devoted to conducting monetary policy with the

goal of non-inflationary sustainable economic growth."

He says the Federal Reserve Bank has an extraordinary collection of economists.

"As the Treasury has sought to get it right at the direction of the President of the United States," Fisher says, "the Fed has provided a substantial amount of intellectual input."

The Chairman of the Federal Reserve is on the committee that advises Treasury Secretary Henry Paulson with regard to the \$700 billion that Congress came up with to help solve the current financial crisis.

"That's really the limit of our job," Fisher says.

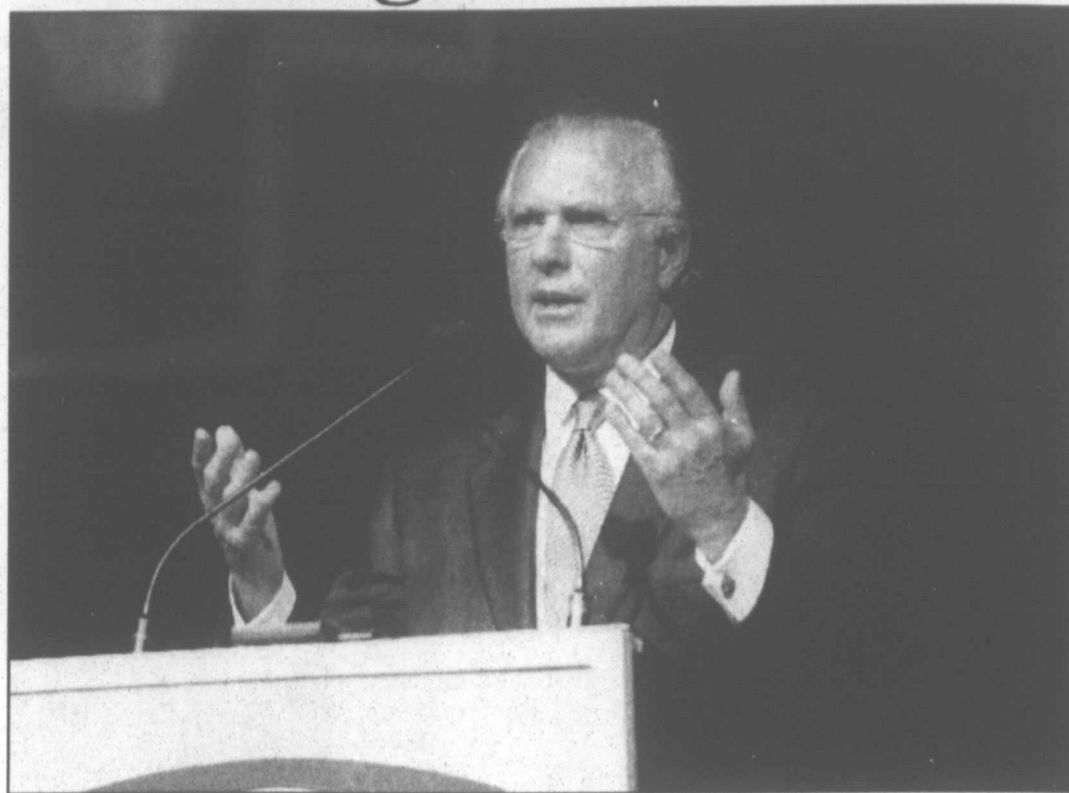
He said the Federal Reserve's tools are limited and much has been done in a short period of time under a great amount of pressure.

"We know that the job cannot be completed without the fiscal policy," Fisher says.

He says that comes back to the elected officials in the U.S. government.

"You have to look in the mirror and think about who you elect to represent you to hold the purse strings," Fisher says.

He says this does not involve the political parties. "In my view," Fisher

says, "what we have to do is think about what makes this the most attractive place to invest your money and to grow. That's what America's all about. We've done it better than anybody else since we were founded."

That's the side that the Treasury has to help direct, he says. They come up with

the programs and then negotiate with Congress.

"I spent four years of my life negotiating with the Chinese and the Vietnamese and the Chileans and the Mexicans and the Canadians," says Fisher, who served as a trade negotiator. "They're easy compared to negotiating with Congress. It's a lot tougher

to negotiate with Congress than it is with some of these very tough trading partners that we have."

Fisher says he negotiated beef agreements with Korea and says he has the scars to prove it.

"But I have bigger scars from negotiating with Congress," he says.

ConocoPhillips considers job cuts at Ponca City facility

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — ConocoPhillips is considering eliminating or moving 700 jobs at the com-

pany's Ponca City facility, company official have confirmed.

The jobs being reviewed

are within the company's pipeline and terminal headquarters division, payment systems enterprises divi-

sion, technology division, facility services division and global information services division. The review is expected to take until about the end of January.

"ConocoPhillips always has been proactive in looking for business efficiency opportunities," said Tracy Harlow, spokeswoman for the Houston-based company.

The ConocoPhillips evaluation does not include about 750 refinery or operational pipeline jobs in Ponca City. Harlow said the jobs review was announced to affected employees this week.

Bruce Bell, chairman emeritus of the Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association of Oklahoma, said he wasn't surprised.

"They have kind of been heading in that direction ever since they took over Phillips," Bell said.

Bell called the announced job review "par for the course," noting that big companies like to consolidate their people into one location.

"Houston has just become the center of the universe, Dallas is a distant second, and we are at the tail end," he said.
