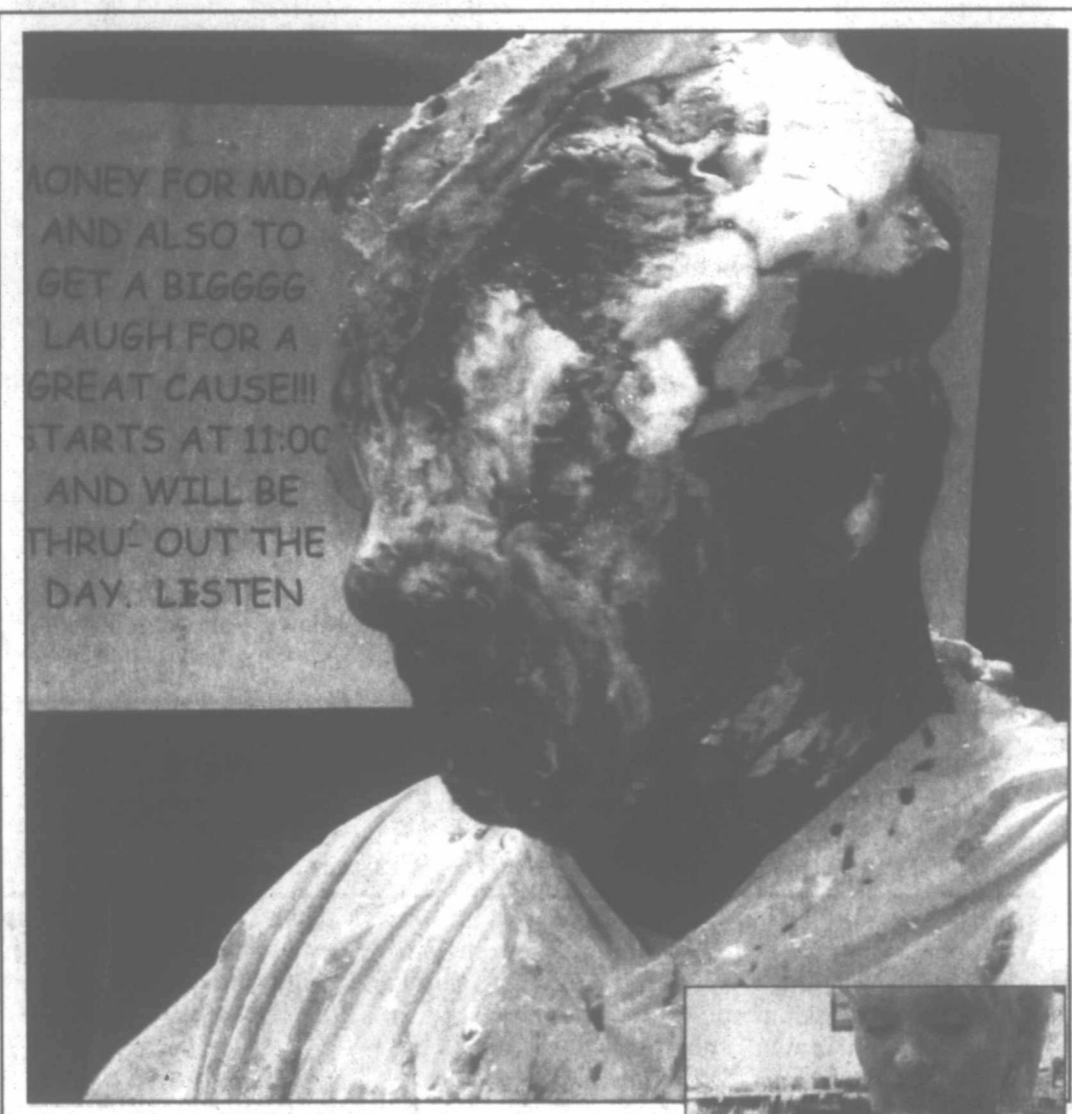

'Curbside voting' offered for elderly, disabled residents

Voters who are 65 or older and/or handicapped may get curbside service when they go to vote, according to Elections Administrator Linda Lewis.
 "We can take an e-slate out to them," Lewis said of eligible voters who drive or are driven to the polling place but would find it difficult to walk in to the polling place.
 The voter must have a passenger with them who can go inside and request the service, Lewis said.
 The curbside voting service is available on election days as well as early voting days, but the voter will likely have to wait longer for their chance to cast their curbside ballot on an election day, she said.
 The cutoff date to send out paper ballots requested by voters was Friday, Lewis said.
 Approximately 467 ballots had been cast in early voting

for the May 10 elections as of mid-morning Friday. Of those, 50 were cast in McLean and the remaining 417 in Pampa.
 Early voting continues through May 6 for election of city and school board officials in the county. Also on the ballot are special elections concerning a maintenance tax to benefit Clarendon College Pampa Center and a property tax rate freeze for some Pampa residents.
 Polls will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays through the remainder of early voting.
 All Gray County voters have the opportunity to vote on whether to approve a maintenance tax for CCPC. State law requires that the tax would never exceed five cents per \$100 valuation of all taxable property in Gray County, and all tax revenue would go to the Pampa Center.

Wildfires burn 600 acres along Hwy 2300

One Gray County sheriff's deputy was treated for smoke inhalation as emergency services units from nine agencies responded to wildfires which were reported at 6:32 p.m. Thursday.
 The three fires burned an estimated 600 acres along Highway 2300 between County Roads L and N, with most of the fires occurring east of Highway 2300, said GCSO Lt. Joe B. Hoard.
 "The three fires were all of undermined origin," Hoard said.
 Deputy Joe Montgomery was treated for smoke inhalation at Pampa Regional Medical Center in connection with the fires.

"He was released in good condition and will return to duty today," Hoard said.
 No other injuries were reported in connection with the fires, and no structures were damaged or burned.
 Emergency personnel remained on the scene until about 9:30 p.m. Thursday, Hoard said.
 Responding to the emergency call concerning the fires was GCSO, Hoover Volunteer Fire Department, volunteer fire departments from Groom, White Deer, Skellytown, Lefors and Celanese, the Gray County Precinct 2 motor grader, and the Gray County Precinct 3 motor grader and tanker truck.

Board denies teacher's contract renewal request

Volleyball Coach Tandi Hudson's appeal to renew her contract was denied during a Thursday night meeting of the Pampa Independent School District Board of Education.
 Although it is not the board's usual practice to discuss personnel matters in open session, Coach Hudson and her representation, Lindsay Gustafson of Texas Classroom Teachers' Association, requested it.
 The appeal hearing began with Gustafson's opening argument and a request for a five minute rebuttal following Superintendent Barry Haenisch's presentation.




"She feels as though she has been and is an asset to Pampa ISD. She has tremendous student and teacher support," Gustafson said. "She would provide the consistency necessary to create a winning team."
 Hudson also addressed the board, adding that she thought she'd set good groundwork for a strong program. When Hudson was finished speaking, the board told Haenisch that he would have fifteen minutes to make his own argument.
 "Our volleyball program existed in the most turmoil of any program I've encountered in all my years in administration," Haenisch said.
 He told the board that

Hudson had pitted the volleyball girls against each other by revealing player evaluations to some of the team and not others, that she overspent the district budget amount for her program and that her excuses for her actions led to a breakdown of trust between the administration and the board.

Maintenance tax funds could be used for tuition reduction, maintenance costs, special projects, building construction and expansion of course offerings.

Residents of the City of Pampa may vote on a proposed limitation on the amount of ad valorem taxes imposed on the residence homestead of a person who is disabled or is 65 years of age or older and receives a residential homestead exemption.

The proposition on the

ballots states that if the limitation is approved, it would be established "even if the tax freeze raises the tax rate for other tax payers or reduces services in the City of Pampa."

No election is being held for Pampa Independent School District's board of trustees, although three seats are up for election. Each incumbent filed for re-election and was unopposed, and in such instances, the school district declines to hold an election.

Incumbents who will each serve another three-year

term on the PISD school board are Derrell DeLoach, Place 1; Lance DeFever, Place 2; and Dana Terry, Place 3.

Candidates in the running for seats on the McLean Independent School District's board of trustees are Joe Riley, Toni Bohlar and Linda Harvey. Voters are instructed on the ballot to vote for none, one or two of the candidates.

Lefors Independent School District's election for school board trustees drew five candidates. They are Bruce Withers, Sandra

Pairsh, Pam Franks, Anna Johnson and Michael Ray. Voters are instructed on the ballot to vote for none, one or two of the candidates.

There are three candidates in the City of Pampa's general election for two city commissioners. Ward 4 Commissioner Neil Fulton is running unopposed for re-election. In Ward 2, incumbent Bill Allison faces Shawn Clifton.

Registered voters in the City of Lefors may vote on a mayor, city council members and cemetery committee members. The choices for

mayor are Mike Young or a write-in candidate.

On the ballot for Lefors City Council are Dana Davis, Johnny Harper, Karen Noble, Ray Carter, C.E. (Bud) Hess, Ronny Ferguson and David Boyd. Voters are instructed on the ballot to vote for none, one or two of the candidates.

Candidates for Lefors cemetery committee member are Linda Stanton, Wayne O'Brien and Clayton Lock. Voters are instructed on the ballot to vote for none, one, two or three of the candidates.

Running for two-year terms on the City of McLean's city council are Patti Brass, Donnie Basham, Robert McDonald, Lynn Reeves, Roby Lynn, Debbie McDonald and Mindy Reeves. Voters are instructed on the ballot to vote for none, one, two or three candidates.

coach.

"Based on the years I've spent in coaching and administration, I recommend that you deny the request to renew her contract," the superintendent said. "To do so is in the district's best interest."

Gustafson's rebuttal began with reminding the board that the meeting was the first instance in which Hudson had heard the reasons why her contract was not being renewed and that Haenisch had not provided any specific examples for his argument. Hudson then explained that there were only two sets of parents who were dissatisfied with how she had handled things and that all she'd needed to better understand her responsibilities in budget matters was to be guided in what she called "the ropes."

When the appeal was over, it was requested by Gustafson and Hudson that the board's deliberation be continued in open session.

After a moment of silence, board member Derrell DeLoach motioned to grant Hudson relief and to put her on another year of the same probationary contract which she'd worked under this year. There was no second and the motion died.

Following another moment of silence, board member Mark McVay motioned to deny Hudson relief and the motion was seconded by fellow member Joe Martinez. The motion carried with a vote of 5-1.

"I'm disappointed but I'll still be here in Pampa, and I'll be here for the kids as much as possible," Hudson said when asked how she felt about the board's decision.

Gustafson added, "It's disappointing for them to make a decision based on judgment rather than factual information."

The board also accepted bids for roofing and HVAC replacement for Travis Elementary School, deciding to proceed with the project as scheduled and heard information about a new

phone and intercom system for Pampa High School. The proposed system would combine the phones and intercom system, putting a speaker phone in every room including the vocational and athletic buildings. The system will be reviewed at the next board meeting.

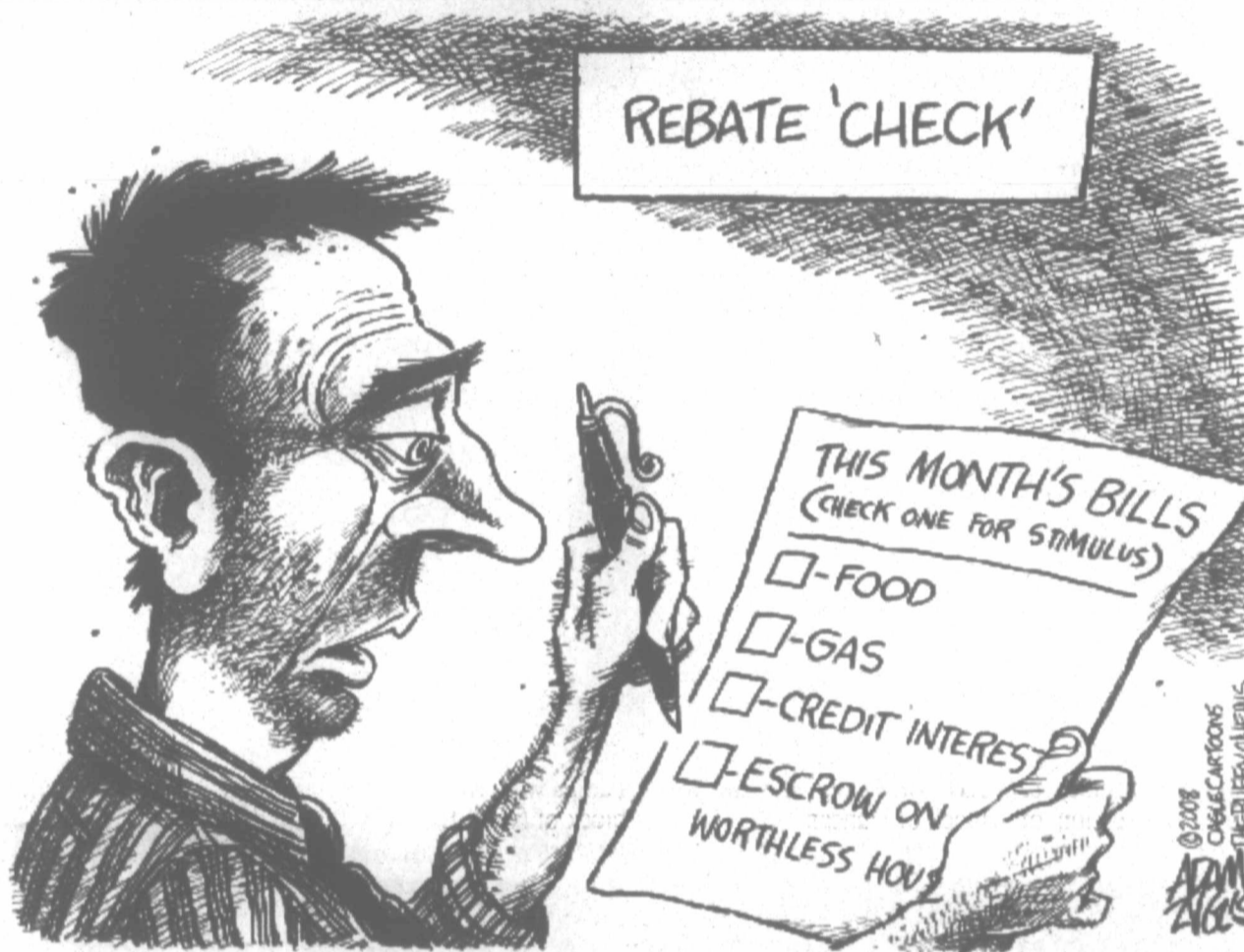

Today in History

(AP) — Today is Sunday, May 4, the 125th day of 2008. There are 241 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On May 4, 1945, during World War II, German forces in the Netherlands, Denmark and northwest Germany agreed to surrender.

On this date:
In 1626, Dutch explorer Peter Minuit landed on present-day Manhattan Island.

In 1886, at Haymarket Square in Chicago, a labor demonstration for an eight-hour work day turned into a riot

when a bomb exploded. In 1904, the United States took over construction of the Panama Canal.

In 1916, responding to a demand from President Wilson, Germany agreed to limit its submarine warfare, thereby averting a diplomatic break with Washington. (However, Germany resumed unrestricted submarine warfare the following year.)

In 1932, mobster Al Capone, convicted of income-tax evasion, entered the federal penitentiary in Atlanta. (Capone was later transferred to Alcatraz Island in San Francisco Bay.)

In 1946, a two-day riot at Alcatraz prison in San Francisco Bay ended, the violence having claimed five lives.

In 1961, a group of "Freedom Riders" left Washington, D.C., for New Orleans to challenge racial segregation on interstate buses and in bus terminals.

In 1970, Ohio National Guardsmen opened fire on anti-war protesters at Kent State University, killing four students and wounding nine others.

In 1979, Conservative Party leader Margaret Thatcher became Britain's first female prime minister as the Tories

oust the incumbent Labour government in parliamentary elections.

In 2001, Bonny Lee Bakley, wife of actor Robert Blake, was shot to death as she sat in a car in Los Angeles. (Blake, accused of the killing, was acquitted in a criminal trial but was found liable by a civil jury and ordered to pay damages.)

Ten years ago: Unabomber Theodore Kaczynski was given four life sentences plus 30 years by a federal judge in Sacramento, Calif., under a plea agreement that spared him the death penalty.

Commission posts monthly stats

AUSTIN — The Texas Railroad Commission issued a total of 1,926 original drilling permits in February 2008 compared to 1,400 in February 2007.

The February total included 1,694 permits to drill new oil and gas wells, 47 to re-enter existing well bores, and 185 for re-completions. Permits issued in February 2008 included 316 oil, 501 gas, 1,046 oil and gas, 50 injection, two service and 11 other permits.

Texas preliminary January 2008 crude oil production averaged 889,697 barrels daily, up from the 876,817 barrels daily average of January 2007.

The preliminary Texas crude oil production figure for January 2008 is 27,580,620 barrels, an increase from 27,181,330 barrels reported during January 2007.

Red Wings finish sweep with 8-2 win

DENVER (AP)— Even at full strength, the Colorado Avalanche would've had a difficult time keeping up with the Johan Franzen-fueled Detroit Red Wings.

But without five of their key players, the Avalanche had no shot.

Detroit routed Colorado 8-2 Thursday night behind Franzen's second hat trick of the series, sending the Red Wings on to the Western Conference finals.

"It's not often you see a player score like this," said Henrik Zetterberg, who added two goals and two assists. "It's great to see him score."

Move over Gordie Howe, you've now got company in the record books. Franzen's six game-winning goals in March bested the franchise record of five established by Howe in 1952.

Then, in Thursday night's sweep of the Avalanche, Franzen topped another of the Hall of Famer's marks as Franzen scored his ninth goal of the series. Howe had eight goals in a series in 1949.

Franzen turned comedian when asked about the accomplishment.

"I didn't know," he said. "I didn't follow the game back then."

In the only other playoff game Thursday, the New York Rangers beat Pittsburgh 3-0.

The Red Wings realize they beat up on a bruised and battered Colorado team, but they'll take it anyway as they wait to face the winner of the San Jose-Dallas series, which the Stars lead 3-1.

"I won't apologize for beating them like this,"

Zetterberg said. "I know they'll come back at us next year."

The Avalanche were minus five key players: center Peter Forsberg (groin, ankle), leading scorer Paul Stastny (knee) and forwards Ryan Smyth (foot), Wojtek Wolski (ribs) and Marek Svatos (knee).

"I've seen injuries in the playoffs, but I've never seen that many injuries," Red Wings coach Mike Babcock said. "I mean, come on. That's not fair."

Colorado wouldn't use injuries as an excuse during the series. Afterward, the team acknowledged the rash of ailments didn't help.

"We ran into some really strange happenings, health wise," Colorado coach Joel Quenneville said. "But they played well and they'll be dangerous."

Especially with teams having to account for Franzen, who scored as many goals (9) as the Avalanche had all series.

"He's been great. He's a big, big man with lots of skill," Babcock said. "We're lucky to have him."

But the "Mule" isn't the only offensive force the Red Wings have at their disposal. Zetterberg and Pavel Datsyuk — dubbed the "Euro Twins" by teammates — have formed quite the tandem. Datsyuk had three assists in the game.

"Pavel and Hank, in my opinion, are superstars in the league at the perfect age," Babcock said. "They've got more coming."

The Avalanche are hoping Forsberg and Sakic have more coming as well.

Sakic, who missed 38 games at age 38 with a hernia this season, wants to wait until the summer to decide if he'll return for a 20th NHL season.

Forsberg could never get completely healthy since rejoining the Avalanche at the trade deadline. He said after the game that an MRI on Wednesday revealed tears in both groins. He ended up playing nine games in the regular season, and another seven in the playoffs.

The 34-year-old Swede hasn't ruled out a return to Colorado if his health allows it. Otherwise, he could call it a career.

"If it doesn't get solved, that would be it, but we'll see what happens," Forsberg said.

Franzen, a fellow Swede, also had a hat trick in Game 2. He's just the sixth player in NHL history to turn in a pair of hat tricks in one series, and the first since Jari Kurri in 1985.

Sargeant becomes first female umpire in ULB

EDINBURG, Texas — United League Baseball (ULB) announced today its historic umpiring crew for the upcoming 2008 season, which features the only female umpire currently working in professional baseball and first female umpire in ULB history, Kate Sargeant.

Sargeant is part of a six-person crew that includes former Major League player Jim Tatum, Dewey Larson, Stacey Dunbar, Vince Price and ULB Director of Umpires Woodie Belle.

"She handles herself professionally on and off the field and she has a great determination and work ethic, which is what impressed me the most," said Belle, who is entering his 23rd year as a professional umpire. "This is the league where dreams come true, and she can be successful just as well as anyone else can because of her determination."

Originally from Poulosbo, Washington, Sargeant has worked all over the country polishing her craft. A 2007 graduate of the Harry Wendelstedt School for Umpires, she received her first big break as a full-time umpire in 2005 with the Mountain Collegiate Baseball League based in Colorado. In 2006, Sargeant was an umpire in the Southern Collegiate Baseball League, a wooden bat summer league, and last season

the 26-year-old worked in the New York State League, a developmental league for players who have completed their college eligibility.

"There are a lot of people who have given me opportunities and it's because of them that I have another great opportunity here in the United League," said Sargeant. "I know a couple of managers in the league already and I've been really impressed by the league personnel I've met recently so I'm very excited to go to work every night with some tremendous people."

Sargeant will begin the season with Larson as her umpiring partner, which will be a reunion for the two since Larson was her supervisor in the Mountain League. Price and Dunbar will start the year as a team and Belle and Tatum will be the other two-man crew.

Tatum was drafted by the San Diego Padres in the 3rd Round of the 1985 amateur draft and played parts of five seasons in the big leagues as a member of the Brewers, Rockies, Red Sox, Padres, and Mets. The 40-year-old is a 2008 graduate of the Jim Evans Academy of Professional Umpiring, which is where Larson and Belle graduated from as well. Dunbar, the youngest member of the crew at 22 years old, is currently enrolled in the academy and has a wealth of Division I and Division II college experience.

Vet camp ready for sixth year

SAN ANGELO — The West Texas Youth Veterinary Science Workshop, open to all Texas youth, will be held June 29 - July 3 at the Tom Green County 4-H Center in San Angelo.

The event is sponsored by the Texas AgriLife Extension Service offices in Sutton, Schleicher and Tom Green counties.

Pascual Hernandez, AgriLife Extension agent for Sutton County and the workshop's coordinator, said the event, now in its sixth year, is meant to expose high school students to careers in veterinary science. University and research faculty members, AgriLife Extension and Texas Animal Health Commission personnel, as well as veterinarians, will serve as instructors.

Course topics will include zoology, the Beef Quality Assurance Program, toxicology, parasitology, anaesthesiology, anatomy, nutrition, first aid, beef feedlot health management, large and small animal practice, necropsy and horse medicine. The workshop will include classroom study, lab work and field excursions.

Enrollment is limited to 30 students, Hernandez said, but participants from across Texas are welcome to attend. They must be of high school age, have an interest in veterinary science and be willing to work in teams.

Adult project guides are also needed, but must pass a background check before participating, Hernandez said.

Applications must be submitted to the Extension office in Sutton County by June 6. Participants will be informed of their acceptance by June 13.

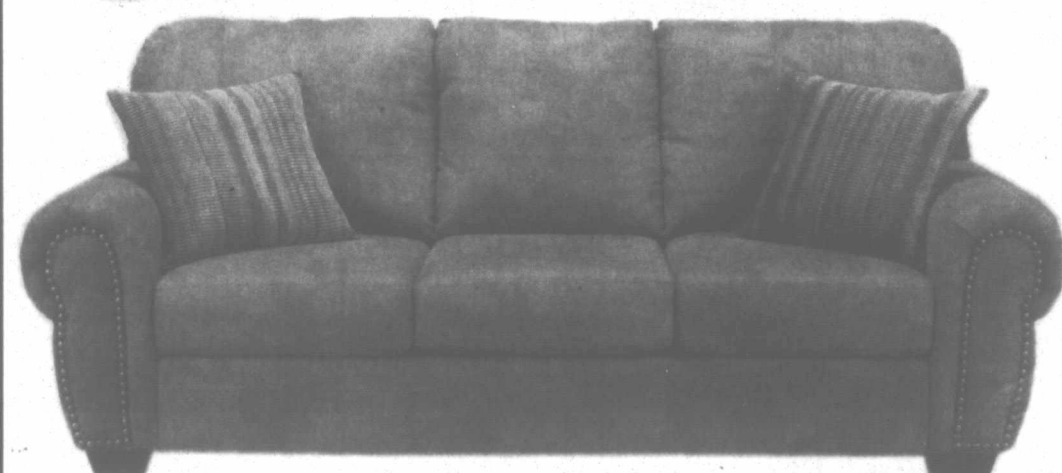
