

Ad campaign to change, says Beef **Council Chair**

PERRYTON -- Sam Elliott is out. Matthew McConaughey is in.

Richard Wortham, executive vice president of the Texas Beef Council, told cattlemen here Monday night that the 'Beef - It's What's for Dinner' has been one of the most successful advertising campaigns in the past 14 years, but this year there will be changes to the campaign.

"Eighty-six percent of consumers in the United States know that tagline," Wortham said.

Stray dogs need to be reported, says AC officer

By JULIE ANN THOMPSON The Pampa News

.If a dog, any dog, is running loose it needs to be reported. That's the stance Animal Control Supervisor Sandy Burns takes when discussing what could be constituted as a dangerous animal.

"What sets off a dog?" Burns said. "It could be a bicycle, a water sprinkler, a walker ... you never know."

According to Burns, what constitutes a dangerous animal is one that attacks a person, not necessarily one that attacks another animal. When a dangerous animal is reported, Burns, with the help of the police department, begins a thorough investigation.

"We do background checks for any past history with the animal. We conduct interviews with neighbors and I'll talk to the mail carrier," Burns said, "Just because one person says an animal is dangerous doesn't mean it is."

If an animal is declared dangerous, the owner is given certain requirements in order to keep the ani-
