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Gray County voters support tax issues

A maintenance tax to benefit Clarendon College Pampa Center won approval from Gray County voters by a narrow margin Saturday, while a proposition to place a tax freeze on City of Pampa property tax rates for persons

age 65 and over and the handicapped won by a much larger majority.

The proposed maintenance tax, which by state law cannot exceed five cents per \$100 valuation of taxable property, passed by a count of 861 for and 812 against. Tax revenues collected cannot be used outside Gray

County and may be used to help fund tuition reduction, maintenance costs, special projects, building construction and expansion of course offerings.

All Gray County taxpayers will be subject to the new tax. The limitation on the amount of ad valorem taxes imposed on a person who is

disabled or 65 years of age or older applies to that person's residence which has a home-
stead exemption.

The proposition to limit such taxes for Pampa city residents passed with 1,099 votes, or 88 percent of all Pampa voters in the election. Those voting against the proposition numbered 144.

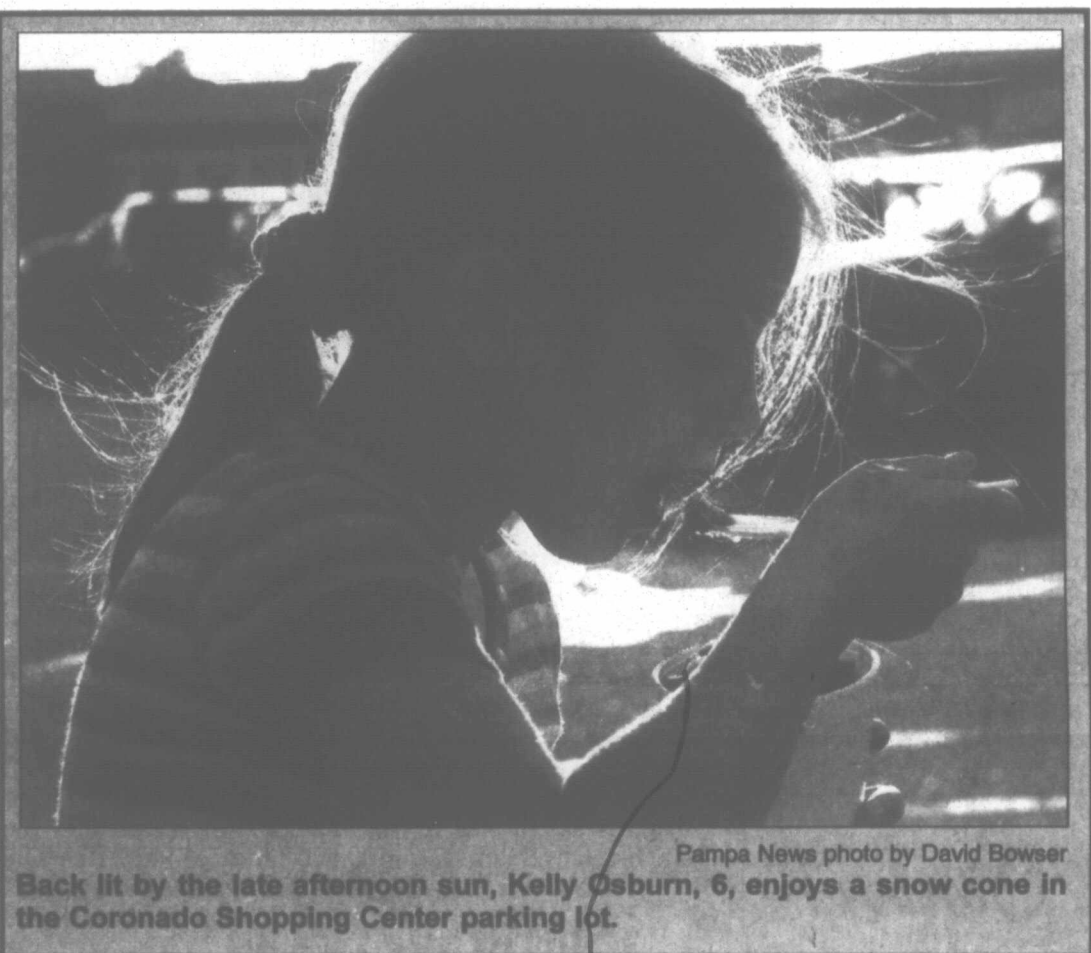
Pampa City Commissioner Bill Allison will retain his Ward 2 seat on the commis-

sion. He received 732 votes, while his opponent, Shawn Clifton, garnered 471 votes.

Ward 4 Pampa City Commissioner Neil Fulton was unopposed in his bid for re-election. He earned 830 votes.

Mike Young received 83 votes to win the Lefors mayoral race. A write-in candidate, Mike Steele, collected

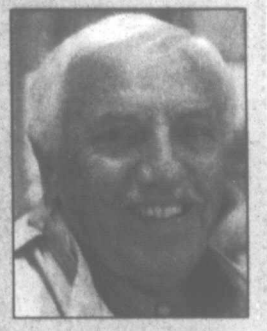
Back lit by the late afternoon sun, Kelly Osburn, 6, enjoys a snow cone in the Coronado Shopping Center parking lot.

Teams sought for first 'Cookin' on the Bricks'

Pampa Chamber of Commerce will hold its first annual Cookin on the Bricks BBQ Cookoff in conjunction with the annual Burnin' the Bricks on Saturday, June 14. The cookoff will be held from 8am to 8pm with the competition judging times at 6pm-7pm.

"We mainly just wanted to compliment the Burning of

the Bricks and then we just thought we needed something else for the Chamber to offer something more to the people," Executive Director Keith Pitner said. "We wanted to do something different than we've done. We're not trying to make money this year. We want to experiment and see if we can make this an annual large affair."

Competition cooking category classes consist of briskets, chicken, pork ribs

and pork (Boston butt, picnic, whole shoulder). Entry fees are \$50 for individuals and non-profit organizations and \$100 for businesses and professionals. If a team is interested in entering more than one cooking category, there will be an additional charge of \$5 per class.

"We have 10 participants already. It looks like it's going to turn out really well," Pitner said.

The cookoff will be held in the Bank of America lot on the south side of the courthouse. A 15'X20' cooking space is included in the entry fee with an additional \$25 per

space for contestants who need more room. The Chamber asks that contestants do not charge for their food but they may ask for donations.

"People who are cooking can give samples out to peo-

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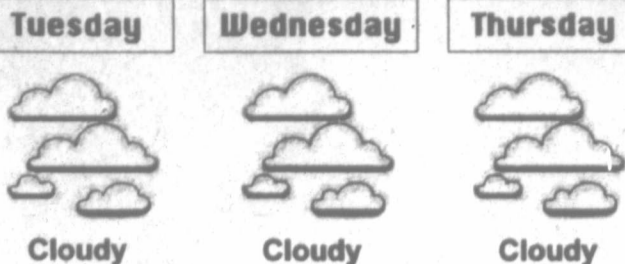

Houston lawyer gives university \$15 million

AUSTIN (AP) — Houston attorney Joe Jamail, whose name already appears on several University of Texas buildings, is donating another \$15 million to the school.

"I like it, and I think I'm helping," the 82-year-old Jamail told the Houston Chronicle of his philanthropy involving his alma mater. "There are no vaults where I'm headed, up or down."

The donation was to be formally announced Monday.

The campus is already home to the Lee and Joe Jamail Texas Swimming Center, Joe Jamail Field and the football stadium, the Joseph D. Jamail Pavilion and the Joseph D. Jamail Center for Legal Research.

UT President Bill Powers Jr. said \$10 million of the latest donation will go to the law school, with the rest split between undergraduate programs and the nursing school.

The law school and nursing school will use the money to recruit and retain faculty. The nursing school also will create a fellowship for students seeking doctoral degrees. About \$2.5 million will endow and support a freshman advising center, Powers said.

Jamail is best known for his 1985 \$11 billion victory for Pennzoil over Texaco, but his interests have always varied. He supported the first of Willie Nelson's annual picnics in 1973 with a \$5,000 loan.

UT declined to say how much money Jamail has given to the school over the years, citing his request that they not. Jamail himself pegged the total at "millions and millions."

"I'm just doing what any decent guy with enough money to do it should do," he said. "Whether it's \$50 or \$50 million, it doesn't matter."

Wind energy to grow dramatically

WASHINGTON (AP) — An Energy Department report concludes that wind turbines can produce a fifth of the nation's annual electricity needs within about two decades. That is about the same share of electricity produced today

by nuclear power.

Wind energy today accounts for only about 1 percent of the nation's electricity. The government report to be released Monday said by 2030 wind energy could account for 300,000 megawatts of

power, or about 20 percent of the total electricity generated.

The report envisions more than 75,000 new wind turbines, many of them larger than what is in use today, and expansion of transmission systems to

move power from high-wind areas to other parts of the country.

Texas is the nation's leader in wind-generated power.

President calls wedding 'spectacular'

WACO, Texas (AP) — President Bush and first lady Laura Bush didn't share their daughter's wedding with the nation, but the president eagerly shared their joy on Sunday about Jenna Bush's marriage to Henry Hager.

"We're mighty blessed," Bush said at an airport in Waco where he boarded Air Force One to return to Washington.

Bush called the wedding "spectacular," saying that his daughter and new son-in-law exchanged vows just as the sun set at the

Texas ranch.

"This Mother's Day weekend was awfully special for Laura and me," said the president, his wife standing at his side.

Bush referred to the new bride as "our little girl Jenna" and declared his new son-in-law to be "a really good guy."

A White House official confirmed by e-mail at 9:28 p.m. EDT Saturday that the two had been officially hitched.

The party ensued. The more than 200 family and friends were entertained

by the Tyrone Smith Revue, a 10-piece party band from Nashville, Tenn. The musicians gave the newlyweds what Smith described as a "get down" party.

The closely guarded affair at the 1,600-acre ranch was very different from other first family weddings like Luci Baines Johnson's in 1966, which was watched by millions. Jenna and Hager wanted privacy so they didn't invite reporters or allow television cameras to film the nuptials, which are

now part of presidential history.

But it wasn't a complete media blackout. In recent days, the president, first lady and White House spokesmen dribbled out details about the bride's dress, the ring, the wedding attire and pre-wedding events — all part of a communications strategy to disclose bits of information, but keep the wedding from becoming a media circus.

San Antonio voters approve visitor tax

(AP) — Voters in San Antonio on Saturday approved four proposals to use visitor taxes to fund \$415 million in civic improvement projects for the area.

Bexar County voters decided to extend a 1.75 percent tax on hotel rooms and a 5 percent tax on short-term car rentals to fund four separate propositions: improvements to the San Antonio River, new youth and amateur athletic facilities, renovations of arts centers and upgrades to rodeo grounds and arenas, including the AT&T Center.

The proposals for river improvements and work on new youth facilities were each approved with more than 70 percent of the vote, according to final unofficial returns. About 65 percent of voters approved renovation of arts centers. The closest proposal was a 57-43 percent vote in favor of rodeo grounds and arena upgrades.

The Bexar County venue tax was originally approved in 1999 to help pay for the AT&T Center, where the defending NBA champion San Antonio Spurs play.

In the race for mayor of the Dallas suburb of Farmers Branch, the councilman who pushed for one of the country's most sweeping anti-illegal immigration measures handily defeated a busi-

nessman who opposed the costs of trying to enforce the ordinance. Tim O'Hare had about 64 percent of the vote to Gene Bledsoe's 36 percent with all precincts reporting, according to unofficial election results.

"You're going to see a mayor and council committed to making positive changes for our city," said O'Hare.

O'Hare steered the City Council into a November 2006 ordinance barring apartment rentals to illegal immigrants. The rule was revised months later to include exemptions for minors, seniors and some families with mixed immigration status. Bledsoe was treasurer of a group that opposed the ordinance.

Residents endorsed the rental ban 2-to-1 in May 2007 during the nation's first public vote on a local government measure meant to combat illegal immigration. A federal judge later blocked Farmers Branch from enforcing its ordinance. The case remains in court.

Challenger Ron Branson defeated Carrollton Mayor Becky Miller, whose colorful background had come into question in recent days, 55-45 percent, according to unofficial election results.

Officials say Miller's talks include an engagement to Eagles drummer Don Henley and stints as a backup singer for Linda Ronstadt and Jackson

Browne. Miller has also spoken of a brother who died in Vietnam.

Family members, school officials and spokesmen for the famous musicians contacted by The Dallas Morning News said none of the stories are true.

Miller said she never made some of the claims and attributed other discrepancies to dirty politics by Branson.

Branson trailed in the count of the early votes, but picked up steam among those who voted Saturday — just a few days after the news story appeared.

"I think people looked at the issues," Branson said, "but when the news story hit, it did change a lot of people's minds."

Registered sex offender James Brian Sliter lost by a large margin to two others in the race for mayor of the small town of Wilmer.

Sliter, who was arrested in 2004 when he was caught in a police sting trying to arrange sex with a 15-year-old girl, on the Internet, withdrew from the mayoral race on March 28. However, his name remained on the ballot.

Texas Tales: The case of the missing six-shooter

Whatever became of Ben Thompson's six-shooter?

Thompson, a British-born former Texas Ranger and soldier of fortune with a penchant for booze and gambling, made quite a reputation as city marshal of Austin in the early 1880s. His life ended violently in San Antonio on the night of March 11, 1884, when someone gunned him down along with former outlaw-turned-lawman King Fisher of Uvalde.

The already-legendary shootist crumpled to the floor with his six-gun smoking, but the weapon he clutched in his hand when he died cannot be accounted for today.

Though neither Thompson nor Fisher could claim to be a church deacon, they had not been looking for trouble that evening. They were just out on the town in the Alamo City, taking in a variety show after dinner and numerous drinks.

But Thompson had a well-known temper, particularly when in his cups. A verbal sparring match led to Thompson slapping Joe Foster, the former business partner of the late Jack Harris, founder of the establishment where they stood, Jack Harris' Vaudeville Theatre and Saloon. Moments later, lead started flying.

No matter the exact circumstances of what happened that evening, it didn't take Sherlock Holmes to deduce that it had something to do with the fact that Thompson had killed Harris back on July 11, 1882. Charged with the murder, he had been acquitted.

The coroner's verdict concluded

Thompson and Fisher died "from the effects of pistol shot wounds from pistols held and fired from the hands of J.C. Foster [who later died of the wound he received in the fight] and Jacobo S. Coy ... and that the said killing was justifiable and done in self defense in the immediate danger of life."

Former newspaperman and San Antonio historian Sam Wolford told Thompson's story in a speech to a group of military historians at Fort Sam Houston on Nov. 18, 1953. The Witte Museum, where Wolford served as honorary curator of history, later published his remarks in a 17-page pamphlet with a small press run.

"There are countless gun collectors in the United States, and you know how much they would pay to own the six-shooter they took off Ben Thompson's body that night," he told his audience.

Black powder smoke still hanging in the air, just about every law enforcement officer in San Antonio rushed to the scene of the shooting that night. The ranking officers included San Antonio Marshal Phil Shardein and Bexar County Sheriff's Capt. T.P. McCall. (McCall later got elected Bexar County sheriff, serving from Jan. 1, 1889, to Dec. 31, 1892.) Also on hand was deputy William Krempkau, a former trail driver.

One of the participants, special police officer Coy, later said in a sworn affidavit that he turned Thompson's pistol over to Shardein

that night.

"I examined it without revolving the cylinder and discovered that five shots had been fired," Shardein said in his statement. "The cylinder has been moved since it was in my possession. When I had it the loaded cartridge was next to the barrel, and cocking it would have thrown the cartridge under the hammer ..."

In other words, for safety reasons, the marshal either moved the cylinder or took out the shell. (Removing the shell would have been the best bet.) At some point, Shardein turned Thompson's pistol over to future sheriff

McCall.

Historians are not even 100 percent sure what caliber revolver Thompson had been packing that night. Unfortunately, no one in authority seems to have recorded the weapon's serial number, long since standard police procedure in a criminal investigation. One writer, not offering a source, said the pistol in question was a pearl-handled, nickel-plated .45.

While that may have been the case, two years earlier when Thompson killed Harris the record shows he used a pistol chambered for .44-40 rounds, a popular Old West cartridge that could be used in a handgun or Winchester rifle.

"He bought 10-cents worth, that is five cartridges," San Antonio gun store owner Charles F.A. Hummel testified after the

Harris killing. "They were central [center] fire .44 caliber."

Former deputy Krempkau could have answered the question as to caliber and style of the piece Thompson packed on his last night of life.

Only a young man at the time of the Thompson-Fisher killing, Krempkau later ran San Antonio's Barrel House Saloon. "Uncle Billy," as he came to be called, lived well into the 20th century. By the 1940s, he could claim to be the last principal in the case still kicking.

"Billy, whatever happened to Ben Thompson's gun," Wolford asked one day, hoping to land it for display in the Witte.

"Oh, after Captain McCall gave me the gun, it lay around the house for a few years and I finally sold it to a Mexican for \$10," the former deputy said.

For the next decade, Wolford pestered Krempkau trying to get him to remember the name of the man. To Wolford's lasting dismay, Krempkau never managed to retrieve the name from his memory. The former deputy died on Oct. 11, 1953, and lies buried in San Antonio's old City Cemetery.

Kurt House, curator of San Antonio's famed Buckhorn Saloon museum has done considerable research on Thompson. But other than having a faint recollection that the late Tom Keilman may have auctioned a pistol supposedly once owned by Thompson, he does not know if that was Thompson's death gun or where it is today.

Politicians good at avoiding the cause

As for health care, Japan, Great Britain, Canada, France and Germany, to name just five, have health-care systems that provide better care to more people at lower cost than our system does. Again, our politicians tend to ignore the causes. You can't lower health-care costs with 1,200 percent profit margins in pharmaceuticals; you can't do it with millionaire physicians and with superexpensive hospitals stuffed with overpriced medical devices.

If you're going to provide affordable health care, you're going to have to lower the incomes of the people in the health-care industry. It is stupid to suppose that you can call together the people who are benefiting from the present high-profit system and expect them to devise a low-cost system. I know of no instance where anybody ever voluntarily decided to lower his income, and that will certainly be true of the overpaid lobbyists and their rich clients.

The same principle applies to the rising costs of college tuition. Besides a

stable dollar, which the government is failing to provide, education requires only a classroom, a teacher and some books. But if you wish to build multimillion-dollar campuses and overpay your professors, then how are you going to lower the cost of an education?

A tradition has grown up in our country that causes many people to look at every single aspect of human life as a moneymaking opportunity. Senators and represen-

tatives have voted themselves into the top 5 percent of the income bracket, and they work only part time. Presidents live like emperors, surrounded by servants and bodyguards. The idea that public buildings should be simple, utilitarian and inexpensive is gone. You can no longer bury Aunt Suzy in the backyard because the cemetery industry has lobbied the law-peddlers to force you to use its land. Practically every law on the

books is designed to help somebody make money.

All of the money, time and blood we spend in the Middle East is wasted because we refuse to address the root cause of the conflict, which is the displacement of Palestinians by the Zionists in Palestine. Unfortunately for them, not many Palestinians contribute to political campaigns.

It's virtually openly acknowledged that if you want access to your elected

representative, you have to pay for it, just as you have to pay for access to the people's court system.

Perhaps we should all attend a summer chautauqua and discuss the possibility of substituting a revolution for the next election. Change in political micro-increments doesn't seem to be solving many problems.

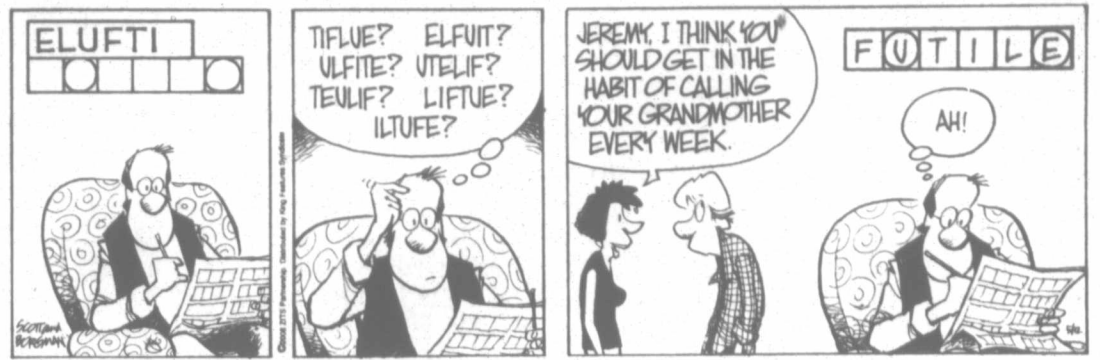

Offensive leaders for game

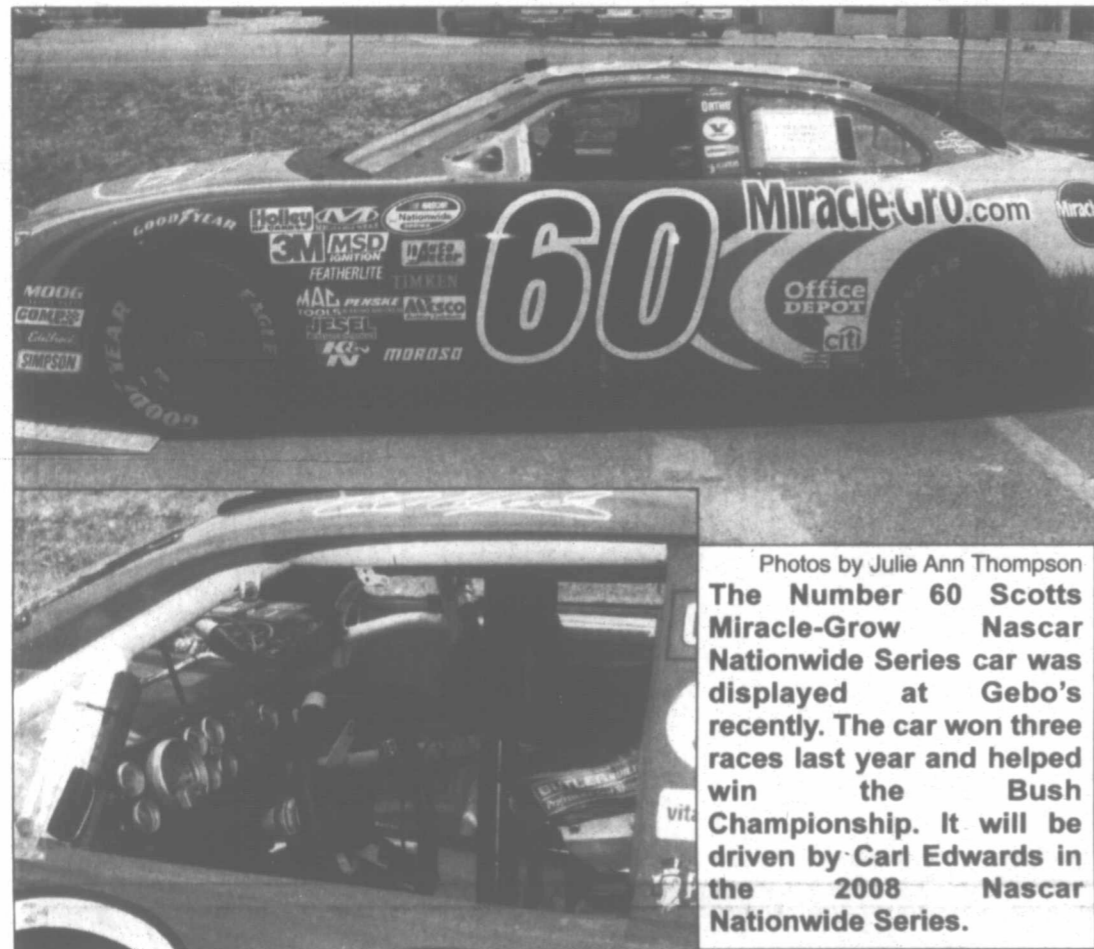

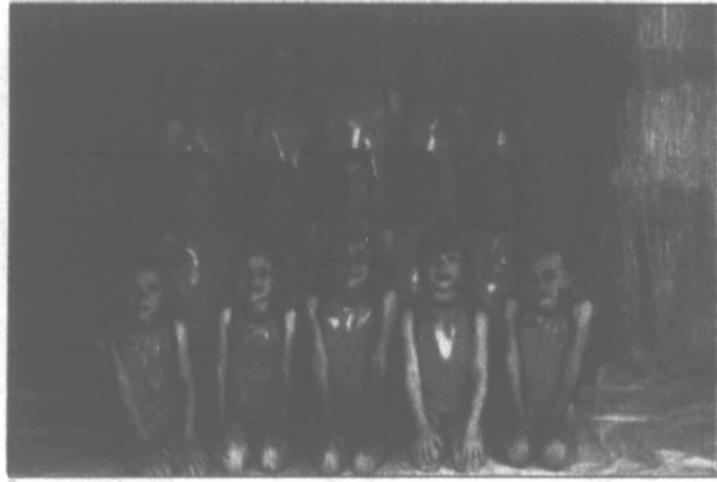
