

# **USDA** seeks public input


mile Fort Riley Prairie Run. Sublett, his wife Kassy and 18-month-old son Conner live in Junction City, Kan., and attend the

In 1968, American Independent Party presidential candidate George Wallace tapped retired Air. Force Gen. Curtis E.

LeMay to be his running mate.

In 1968, the Howard Sackler play "The Great White Hope," starring James Earl Jones and Jane Alexander, opened on Broadway.

In 1988, Lebanese kidnappers released Indian educator Mithileshwar Singh, who'd been held captive with three Americans for more than 20 months.

In 1995, the jury in the O.J. Simpson murder trial found the former football star not guilty of the 1994 slayings of his former wife Nicole Brown Simpson and Ronald Goldman. (However, Simpson was later found liable in a civil trial).

Ten years ago: Australian Prime Minister John Howard's conservative government narrowly won re-election. Pope John Paul II beatified Cardinal Alojzije Stepinac, the World War II archbishop of Zagreb, a controversial figure because many Serbs and Jews had accused him of sympathizing with

Five years ago: A tiger attacked magician Roy Horn of duo "Siegfried & Roy" during a performance in Las Vegas, leaving the superstar illusionist in critical condition on his 59th birthday. Illustrator and children's book author William Steig died in Boston at age 95.

One year ago: North Korea agreed to provide a complete list of its nuclear programs and disable its facilities at its main reactor complex by Dec. 31, 2007. (However, North Korea has since said it would move to restore its nuclear reactor, saying the United States had failed to follow through with promised incentives.) President Bush vetoed expansion of a children's health insurance program.



In seventh grade, boys cut hear the story of how he found out during his birthday party that his mom was sentenced to prison.

Or when one of your students walks up to you before class begins and tells you he's scared because his 19year-old cousin got shot in the head last night. And died

Seventh grade is no laughing matter when you find out that some of your students don't have a mom or dad in their lives anymore. Some have dyslexia. Some suffer from depression. Some can't sit still long enough to do an assignment. Some stare into space and act like they are physically here and mentally checked out. And they're only 12 years old!

What's a teacher to do? Seventh grade is not what expected, and exactly what I expected, all rolled up in one. But it's early in the year. And I still need a First Aid kit ... some days, like today, for my heart.

## Texas Thoughts.

A sample of editorial opinion around Texas:

■ Sept. 22 Austin American-Statesman on a wiser approach to energy efficiency:

A task force looking at ways to make Austin homes more energy efficient wisely backed away from requiring homeowners to make upgrades when a house is sold.

Instead, the task force is recommending that the City Council require only an energy audit that will cost no more than \$300 at the time a home is sold. That audit will let buyers know what improvements could save on energy bills, such as leaks in the duct system or faulty air conditioning units.

An early draft of the report by the 28-member task force made improvements mandatory. The buyer would have had to make the improvements, down to the level of changing to energy-efficient light bulbs, before the house could be resold.

Forcing sellers and buyers to make expensive changes did not sit well with many homeowners and those in the real estate business. They fought the

Though improving energy efficiency is a laudable goal, making the changes mandatory at sale would have hurt those prospective homeowners who could least afford it first-time buyers, low-income families and those on fixed

An energy audit will inform home buyers about efficiencies and upgrades that could save them money on energy bills. In most cases, those upgrades will save the homeowner money in the long run. The audits will be disclosed along with the other inspections required when houses are bought and sold.

The audits must be performed by companies authorized by Austin Energy, the city's electric utility. Those audits should tell buyers what improvements are suggested and what the payback period would be to recoup their investment through energy savings.

That is good information for any homeowner, especially someone getting into a home for the first time. The \$300-or-less cost of the audit will be well worth the expense.

mandatory aspect of the proposal and house gases believed to be a cause of global warming. He's pushed hard on everything from switching the city's fleet of vehicles to hybrids to the task force on energy-efficient homes, He's been a leader in that regard.

> But there is a problem when the city forces homeowners to make changes, all the way down to the light bulbs, when they sell their property. That didn't go down easily with most homeowners, who have enough burdens when selling a house.

Disclosing any energy inefficiencies and educating new buyers about ways to save money through upgrades is a better approach. Most homeowners will want to save on their electric and gas bills in any way they can.

The task force report still must work its way through the city's myriad boards and commissions before reaching the City Council. But council members would be wise to heed the recommendation to choose incentives and education over mandates to achieve efficiency. energy URL: http://www.statesman.com





Big fossil found in Ikeravaged home's front yard

CAPLEN, Texas (AP) -A homeowner whose beachfront property in Texas was destroyed during Hurricane Ike has found a football-size fossil tooth in the debris.

Dorothy Sisk asked her colleague, Lamar University paleontologist Jim Westgate, to accompany her to her Bolivar Peninsula home after Ike hit. Together they found something unusual in the remains of Sisk's front yard: a six-pound fossil tooth.

Westgate believes the fossil is from a Columbian mammoth common in North America until around 10,000

years ago. The tooth, which looks like a series of boot soles or slices of bread wedged together, is expected to be sent to the Texas Memorial Museum in

In their decision the night before, selectmen in the popular tourist town noted that they would have had no problem granting the license if the promotion ended for the \$10.95 sandwich.

Thus, said Turner, dropping the deal was a no-brainer. "Au jus" wins out over "au naturel."

He had said last year that he had two or three takers a week, and no frontal nudity was exposed to customers. But police said they had gotten several complaints, and



DEAR BESIDE YOURSELF: I understand your frustration, but your ability to dictate who comes to the house and spends time with your wife -- and by extension, your children -- ended when you moved out. For your own sake, I strongly recommend you schedule a meeting with the legal counsel who is representing you in your divorce and set up a regular schedule of visitation with your children. But the sooner you understand that you can't stop Jill from entertaining whomever she pleases in her dwelling, the better off you will be. P.S. Your sister also has my sympathy, but what's going on now should be a clue that she'll be better off without him.



# Red Raiders poised to take a big step

Texas Tech has been here before, undefeated, ready to into the national title chase.

This time, the Red Raiders always seems to come with such a strong start.

Emboldened by its highest ranking in 32 years, No. 7 Texas Tech (4-0) heads to Manhattan on Saturday to face Kansas State (3-1), determined not to let another There was the upset victory opportunity wash away in disappointment.

"We haven't proved anything yet," Tech running back Baron Batch said. "Coach (Mike) Leach says the same thing: We win games, but there's always a big game we won't win. We can't look at the games we think might be big because if we don't win the week at hand, those other games won't be so big.'

The Red Raiders know a thing or two about losing big games.

MIAMI (AP) — Two-time Mich. They also were sched- "This case is pure harassment Indianapolis 500 winner and "Dancing With The Stars" champion Helio Castronoves was set to appear in court Friday to face allegations he used offshore accounts to hide millions of dollars in income from the Internal Revenue Service.

The 33-year-old driver was indicted Thursday on charges of conspiracy and six counts of tax evasion for purportedly failing to report to the IRS about \$5.5 million in income between 1999 and 2004, according to court documents. Each count carries a maximum five-year prison sentence.

One of his attorneys, David Garvin, said he was disappointed that the tax dispute could not be resolved without criminal charges.

"Helio has always done the appropriate thing and hired accountants and attorneys he relied upon," Garvin said. "We are of the strong belief that he did not do anything wrong. We're looking forward to going to court."

Castroneves, a native of Sao Paulo, Brazil, has won the Indianapolis 500 twice and finished second this year in the IndyCar Series points standings. He and partner Julianne Hough won the 2007 "Dancing With The Stars" TV reality show competition on ABC.







After 10 seasons as baseball's doormat, Tampa Bay took the division with the best home record in the majors. And there were no October jitters as the young Rays kept winning at Tropicana Field behind James Shields' effective start and Grant Balfour's bases-loaded escape.

The Rays ranked near the bottom of the attendance charts this year, yet were cheered on by a sellout crowd of 35,041. World War I, where in 1917, the Division Trains were formed to support the newly Infantry formed 1st Division. In 1921, the Division trains were consolidated into the Special 1st Infantry Division. After World War I, the Special Troops deployed to Fort Riley, Kansas.

Three of the DISCOM's former subordinate battalions, the 101st and 201st Forward Support Battalions (FSB), and the 701st Main Support Battalion (MSB), served in World War I, but with different divisions. These units deployed back to Germany to support the Big Red One during World War II, and participated in all eight campaigns credited to the 1st Infantry Division.

In 1955, the Division and its support organizations returned to Fort Riley, Kansas.

In 1965, the Big Red One deployed to the Republic of South Vietnam, marking the third time this century that the Division participated in armed conflict. DISCOM units supported the Division in all of the eleven campaigns it participated in Asia in Support of Operation while deployed to South Vietnam. After Vietnam, the DISCOM underwent many The Division changes. Management Material Center (DMMC) was established, and the Finance and Personnel Services Companies (PSC) were reorganized into battalion commands

In 1990, the DISCOM deployed again, this time to Southwest Asia in Support of Operation Desert Storm. In 1996, the DISCOM, deployed to Europe for a third time and consisted of the 101st FSB at Fort Riley, Kansas, the 201st FSB in Vilseck, Germany, the 701st in Kitzingen, Germany, Headquarters and Headquarters Company (HHC), also in Kitzingen.

In 2003, the DISCOM was deployed to Turkey in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom I. The DISCOM simultaneously supported peacekeeping operations in the Balkins and deployed a logistics task force to support Operation Iraqi Freedom I throughout Iraq.

In 2004, the DISCOM

Iraqi Freedom II. In addition to the organic DISCOM units, the 225th FSB from Hawaii and the 230th SB from North Carolina deployed to support logistical operations for Task Force Danger. Finally, in 2005, the DISCOM redeployed to Germany to reconstitute and prepare for future contingency operations. The DIS-COM was awarded the Meritorious Unit Commendation for its contributions during Operation

As of January 2006, the DISCOM consisted of the 201st FSB in Vilseck, Germany, the 701st MSB in Kitzingen, Germany, the 299th FSB in Schweinfurt Germany, the 601st Aviation Support Battalion (ASB) in Katterbach Germany, and the Headquarters and Headquarters Company (HHC), also in Kitzingen. 


