The parade is one of the largest in the Texas Panhandle. Entries are now being taken for anyone interested in participating. Entries will be accepted up until parade time, but to



Scrimshire wood creations on display at museum


Harold Scrimshire prefers to make his carvings from mesquite.

Harold Scrimshire likes wood with wormholes.

He is an artist, not with paints or watercolors, but with wood, incorporating flaws such as wormholes into the final product. His creations are currently on exhibit in the Holland Wing at the White Deer Land Museum and will be on display through the summer.

Scrimshire began woodworking around 1970 when he bought a used lathe from a friend. He worked with it off and on for several years but has devoted more time to his craft since retiring from Celanese some 20 years


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



Texas OKs new wind power project

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas is moving forward on the nation's largest wind-power project, a plan to build billions of dollars worth of new transmission lines to bring wind energy from gusty West Texas to urban

Texas is already the national leader in wind power, and supporters say Thursday's preliminary approval by the Public Utility Commission, will make the Lone Star State a leader in being able to move all that ener-

gy to the urban areas that need it.

Environmentalist and consumer groups called the move a critical expansion of the "renewable energy superhighway," predicting it will spur wind energy projects, create jobs, reduce energy costs and reduce pollu-

Texas electric customers will bear the cost of the \$4.9 billion plan over the next several years, paying about \$4 more per month on their electric bills.

Continued from Page 1 ago. At the present time, he has more than 100 pieces on hand, many of which still have wormholes visible. One bowl has a large knothole which he inlaid with a piece of flint. None of his objects are for sale, although he sometimes gives one away.

Almost all of the pieces are made from mesquite, gathered from a friend's ranch on the Llano River. The rancher gives Scrimshire access to all the mesquite he can use

"The mesquite is bigger down there," Scrimshire said. "They have trees, not bushes."

Scrimshire is self-taught, with no formal training, and has learned by trial and error. First, he has to find a suitable piece of wood with a circumference large enough to make a bowl or other object.

"It has to be several inches bigger than the finished product," Scrimshire said.

He cuts the log into large blocks to turn on the lathe and fashions a smooth cylinder first.

"Then I have to wait for a vision as to what that cylinder will become," Scrimshire said. "That might take several days."

Once he has the idea in his mind, he turns the finished creation. He uses no stain, varnish or lacquer to coat his pieces, but instead uses Old-fashioned Johnson's Paste Floor Wax to give his art a beautiful shine and patina. This process allows the true colors of the wood to show through."

All but one of the objects in the exhibit are made from a single, solid piece of wood. Another material he has used is wood from old Bois D'arc fence posts, from which he fashioned containers for candles or flowers.

He also does some carving or "chiseling" as he calls it, out of Austin stone. However, his first love is the mesquite, which has to be totally dry and cured. He usually picks his logs from trees which have been dead for a long time. Scrimshire's wife of 54 years, Yvonne, helps him find the logs to use in his creations. Then she "helps him enjoy the finished products."

Harold grew up in Roberts County and attended school in Miami. He went through training during World War II, but the conflict ended before he saw combat. He finished his military service as a guard at the Fort Leavenworth military prison. He then worked for Celanese for 33 years, along with farming and

Yvonne was born in Oklahoma but was living in Pampa when the Scrimshires met and married. They have one son, Rick, who lives in Houston, and one granddaughter, Anna. They enjoy spending time at their house on Lake LBJ near Kingsland where Harold does his searching on the nearby ranch for the right pieces of wood to use in his craft.

The Scrimshire Wood Creations Exhibit is at the White Deer Land Museum, 116 South Cuyler, and is open to the public. Summer hours are Tuesday through Sunday from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.



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

El Paso Times on Medicare cards and the important information they hold:

By now, almost everyone must realize that their Social Security numbers have to be protected to help prevent ID theft. Yet, incredibly, Medicare includes the full Social Security numbers of nearly 44 million beneficiaries. Also, Social Security numbers appear on 8 million identity cards issued by the Pentagon to active-duty personnel, Reserves and their dependents, and mil-

Yet, according to an Associated Press story, the Federal Trade Commission, in a pamphlet mailed recently to every mailing address in the country, warned, "Protect your Social Security number. Don't carry your Social Security card in

your wallet or write your Social Security number on a check."

However, on the back of the

Medicare card is this advice: "Carry your card with you when you are away from home."

But then, Medicare's chief operating officer, Charlene Frizzera, said, "Our advice is, don't carry it with you unless you know you're going to need it."

While this might sound like bad comedy, it's actually a frightening picture of major intra-agency communications problems in the federal government. Perhaps "shambles" would be a better description. .

Worse, the Medicare agency has no plans to fix the problem.

The Pentagon is working on removing those sensitive numbers from military-issued ID cards. That's a step in the right direction, even though the initiative probably won't be complete until

But Medicare's Frizzera said it would be too expensive to change the in-place

However, this is an instance where expense could be relative. Although Medicare officials insist that compromised Social Security numbers on their cards haven't led to ID theft, that, of course, could change.

Even though the plan might have to be phased in, as with the Pentagon program, it could well be worth the expense.

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
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Dear Abby...



Technology advances A futuristic linkage of animals and electronics

The same Global Positioning System (GPS) technology used to track vehicles is now being used to track cows.

But Agricultural Research Service (ARS) animal scientist Dean M. Anderson has taken tracking several steps further with a Walkman-like headset that enables him to "whisper" wireless commands to cows to control their movements across a landscape - and even remotely gather them into a corral.

He and his colleagues realize this is a highly futuristic technology, but they can envision a time when these technologies will be affordable and useful for a range of applications, from intensive animal operations to monitoring and controlling the movements of some wildlife species and even household pets.

Anderson, at the ARS Jornada Experimental Range in Las Cruces, N.M., is working with Daniela Rus and a team of engineers at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Cambridge to equip an Ear-A-Round (EAR) device with state-of-art electronics. Their latest prototype is a doughnut-shaped stereo headset worn over each ear. Anderson's headset design and his knowledge of range animal ecology

have been combined with the MIT scientists' electronics skills in robotics and mobile computing.

Prior to working with MIT, Anderson patented technology for virtual fencing termed Directional Virtual Fencing (DVF) that centered around giving cows "left" and "right" sensory signals to cause them to move away from an irritating suite of cues.

The researchers at MIT's Computer Science and Artificial Intelligence Laboratory have developed and prototyped a miniaturized electronics package for DVF devices that is solar- powered and is packaged as a headset device. The circuit board contains a processor, data storage, WiFi for remote communication, audio and electrical stimulation electronics, a GPS receiver, and sensors such as magnetometers and accelerometers that record the body orientation and configuration of the animal.

The commands vary from familiar 'gathering songs" sung by cowboys during manual round-ups, to irritating sounds such as sirens and even mild electric stimulation if necessary to get cows to move or avoid penetrating forbidden boundaries.

ARS is a scientific research agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Single-family construction takes hit

Construction of single-family homes fell in June to the slowest pace in 17 years although a change in New York laws helped give a big boost to apartment building.

The Commerce Department reported Thursday that construction of singlefamily homes dropped by 5.3 percent in June to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 647,000 units, the weakest performance since January 1991, another period when the housing industry was going through a severe downturn.

However, construction of multifamimonth, thanks to a change in New York City building codes that spurred a wave of apartment construction in that area. Taken together, single and apartment construction rose by 9.1 percent to an annual rate of 1.066 million units.

But the total increase was viewed as an aberration that did not give a true picture of the continued weak state for the housing industry because it was skewed by the huge jump in apartment building in New York.

Private economists are predicting

Analysts said they expect that builders will continue to slash construction as they struggle with an extremely difficult environment.

ly units surged by 42.5 percent last that housing will continue to be under strains for the rest of the year. The troubles in housing, combined with related turmoil in the financial sector attributed to billions of dollars of losses on mortgage loans, are dragging down the total economy, raising risks of a recession.

Separately, the Labor Department reported that the number of newly laid-off people signing up for jobless benefits rose by 18,000 last week to 366,000, the highest level since late June. The increase was below the number that economists

had been expecting.

The report on housing construction showed that applications for building permits, considered a good sign of future activity, rose by 11.6 percent to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1.091 million units. However, this increase was also skewed by a big rise in the volatile apartment sector. Permits for multifamily construction soared by 39.4 percent while permits for singlefamily homes fell by 3.5 percent. Analysts said they expect that

builders will continue to slash construction as they struggle with an extremely difficult environment. The National Association of Home Builders said Wednesday that its survey of builder sentiment fell to a record low of 16 in July, down from 18 in June,

That decline reflected all the problems facing the housing industry at the moment from a weak economy that is pushing down employment and consumer sentiment to surging mortgage foreclosures which are dumping more homes on an already glutted market.

More people sign up to receive jobless benefits

WASHINGTON (AP) — The number of newly laidoff people signing up for jobless benefits rose last week as companies keep work forces lean given the economy's slowdown.

The Labor Department reported Thursday that new applications filed for unemployment insurance increased by a seasonally adjusted 18,000 to 366,000 for the week ending July 12. That left new claims at their

highest level since late June, when they spiked to 404,000.

The number of new layoff filings was lower than the 380,000 that economists were forecasting. Yet, the filings are higher than a year ago, when they stood at 309,000, underscoring weakness in employment condi-

Meanwhile, the four-week moving average of claims, which smooths out week-toweek fluctuations, dipped

last week to 376,500. A year Health Inc.; and Pfizer. ago, this figure was 312,500.


The number of people continuing to draw unemployment benefits fell to 3.1 million for the week ending July 5, the most recent period for which that information is available. That compared with 2.6 million a year ago.

Several companies that announced job cuts in July include: Tribune Co.; American Airlines; IndyMac Bancorp Inc.; Cardinal

Cautious employers have cut jobs for six months straight bringing total job losses to 438,000 so far this year, the government reported earlier this month.

The jobless rate held steady in June at 5.5 percent after jumping in May by the most in two decades. The unemployment rate is expected to climb to 6 percent or higher by early next

Dems try to spur oil exploration

WASHINGTON (AP) - Seeking to blunt GOP efforts to permit oil exploration off the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, House Democrats are pushing legislation they say would spur drilling on already available lands in Alaska, the West and the western Gulf of Mexico.

Republicans scoffed that the so-called Drill Act imposing a tougher "use it or lose it" rule on leases already held by oil companies - would do

On the eve of the vote, the Interior Department issued a major new lease in Alaska's National Petroleum Reserve, known as NPR-A. "Drill now, drill everywhere," said Rep. Gresham Barrett, R-

Democrats scrambling to appear pro-drilling - hence the "Drill Act" title for Thursday's bill - even as leaders such as House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., are dead set against reversing the long-standing drilling bans along the Atlantic and Pacific coasts.

Democrats say the industry should first go after oil and natural gas in areas where they hold leases. They also say Republicans are simply seeking political advantage with a pro-drilling plan that won't deliver new U.S. oil for another decade or so, and that the GOP's fixation on drilling is a smoke screen for the administration's inability to prevent the sharp spike in gasoline prices.

U.S. judge to consider blocking first Guantanamo trial

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge is considering whether to block the first Guantanamo Bay war crimes trial from beginning next week. If he does, it could throw another kink into the Bush administration's legal strategy in the war on terror-

Salim Hamdan, a former driver for Osama bin Laden, is scheduled to go on trial Monday as the first defendant in a special military commission system set up to prosecute detainees at the Navy base in Cuba. Other detainees, including alleged Sept. 11 mastermind Khalid Sheikh Mohammed, are awaiting trials of their own.

But a Supreme Court ruling last month jeopardized those plans. The court ruled that detainees must be allowed to challenge their detention in civilian courts, a right that the Bush administration said for years did not

Hamdan quickly asked a federal judge to delay his military commission trial, saying he must be allowed to challenge the legality of the system before he can be prosecuted. Otherwise, he

says, he could be convicted in a process that is later revealed to be unconstitu-

LOS ANGELES (AP) "Mad Men," AMC's sleek drama set in the advertising world circa 1960, and FX's legal thriller "Damages" made Emmy nominations history Thursday as the first basic cable programs to gain best-series nods.

The HBO historical drama "John Adams" was the overall frontrunner with 23 bids, including a lead-actor nomination for Paul Giamatti's turn as one of America's founding fathers.

"30 Rock," last year's best comedy Emmy winner, was the top nominee among sitcoms with 17 bids. "Mad Men" was the leading drama series contender with 16 nominations, including one for star Jon Hamm.

"The Wire," the just-ended, critically acclaimed HBO drama about police and drug dealers in Baltimore, lost its last shot at a best-drama nod after years of Emmy snubs. It received one nomination Thursday, for writing.

erode.

In the lead drama actor category, four of the five nominees were stars of cable shows, including Jon Hamm of "Mad Men." In the corresponding actress category, three of the slots went to cable series stars, including Glenn Close of "Damages."

Close said she heard about her nomination from her sister Nancy, who called her on her cell phone as she was being driven to a shooting location on Long Island in New York.

"I don't believe in comparison among artists, but, given the amazing number of talented people in this profession, to be included with a distinguished group of people is a huge honor." Close said.

"Damages" won critical acclaim last year — but not great ratings. She's hoping Emmy attention will boost its ... audience for season two.

"We need all the help we can get," she said.

HBO failed to field a bestdrama series contender for the first time in nearly a decade, after "The Sopranos" claimed the honor last year. But the premium cable channel had a leading 85 bids overall, followed by ABC with 76.

Network audience : favorites that failed to make a serious showing included ? "Grey's Anatomy" and 2 "Desperate Housewives," both left out of the best-series categories, although "Grey's" stars Sandra Oh and Chandra Wilson received nomina- 2 tions.

Bush hails Snow's 'record of accomplishment'

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush fondly remembered Tony Snow Thursday, telling mourners at Snow's funeral that the conservative commentator-turned-White House press secretary "amassed a rare record of accomplishment.'

He knew the job of a reporter was vigorous. He understood the profession and always treated it with respect," said Bush, who traveled to the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception to pay respects to his former lead spokesman, who died of colon cancer last Saturday.

His was a life that was "far too brief," the president said of

Bush was accompanied to the funeral on the campus of Catholic University by some familiar faces from earlier in his presidency, including former top adviser Karl Rove and onetime chief of staff Andrew Card. Row after row at the shrine was packed with family members and friends and associates, including White House correspondents.

An enlarged photo of Snow was displayed, showing him smiling at the press secretary's podium in the White House

"We will always remember his wry sense of humor and abundant goodness. We will also remember he was lots of fun," Bush said.

A somber Bush had a special message for Snow's three children. The president said he often called Snow on the weekend seeking his advice, and would find that he was helping his kids with homework or cheering them on the soccer field.

"He loved you a lot," Bush told the three children. "I hope you know we loved him a lot, too."

Snow was White House press secretary from May 2006 until last September. He was long a member of Washington's power circles, and a familiar face across the country, as a conservative commentator and an interviewer on TV and radio for Fox News.

In a homily, the Very Rev. David M. O'Connell, president of Catholic University, told the mourners: "The measure of this man's life can be found in his character, in his optimism, in his joy and humor, in his courage, in his passion for what was good and right, and in his love for God and family and neighbor and country. ...

WASHINGTON (AP) -The plaintiff in the Supreme Court case that overturned Washington's strict 32-yearold handgun ban was among the first to arrive as the city started registering firearms.

Dick Heller showed up early Thursday at the police department, but he's still upset with the city even after winning his case.

He says its strict new rules for handguns still violate the spirit of the court's ruling defending the constitutional right to bear arms.

They allow handguns to be kept in the home if they're used only for self12 rounds of ammunition. Gun owners can only register one weapon in the first 90 days. Police say the permitting process could take

weeks or months.
