

American innovation being usurped by greed

There's an old joke that goes, "The whole world is crazy except for you and me, and I'm starting to worry about you." A variation would end with "sometimes I worry about

There are lots of things which make me feel that sometimes I'm living in that world, and that the joke is no joke after all.

For example, in a previous column I talked about how the meaning of words and phrases has changed. Rubber-soled sandals with a V-shaped strap over the top of the foot that dips between the first two toes used to be called thongs; now they're flip flops. Meanwhile, thongs are now an item of underclothing.

This style of underclothing places fabric right in the place where we always made sure our underwear didn't go because it was so uncomfortable. If it was uncomfortable for other styles of underwear to be in that place, why are thongs bought and worn by

anyone? If someone says thongs are comfortable, it always makes me wonder what else is in their closet.

Hints that the Panhandle may face limited supplies of drinkable water and may have to begin water rationing have started to circulate. The water level of Lake Meredith, which supplies our drinking water

along with the Ogallala Aquifer underground water formation, has been dropping for a long while now, and there's no indication that the trend will change.

So why are we entertaining the notion of selling our water downstate in order to make one or a few people wealthy? Why did we allow this to be possible? Apparently, we are so greedy for money that some of us willingly sold our water rights to a company which plans to ship the water to another part of the

what amount of allowances.

I can understand the concept of mineral rights, that a landowner can also own the

minerals (including gas and oil) that occur underneath their land. But water should be a different matter. Water is essential to life and should not be an item of ownership in the way that minerals are owned.

Another essential to life is oxygen, found in air and wind. Now at least one company is hinting at paying us for our "wind" rights, as long as we also sell them our water rights. The idea is that if and when the company erects wind generators, we will get paid a share of the value of the energy produced by the wind generators.

It is inconceivable to me that a country which has been responsible for so many inventions and new technology can't come

up with new ways of providing energy to make motor vehicles run. Well, new ways have been proposed, and there are some hybrid vehicles on the market, but such vehicles are still relatively few and far between, even though this is not the first energy "crisis" we have faced.

I heard somewhere that on at least one occasion, an inventor came up with a workable, low-cost motor that runs on a cheap. easily renewable energy source, but the idea never saw the light of day because the oil industry got wind of the inventor's creation after a patent request was submitted, and the inventor accepted the megabucks that an oil company offered him for his brainchild. The oil company then made sure that the contraption never saw the light of day.

There is a song in the musical "Cabaret" which declares that "money makes the world go around." Sometimes, it seems, money can also make it come to a screeching halt.

Environmentalists' hold sway in Congress

Let's face it. The average individual American has little or no clout with Congress and can be safely ignored. But it's a different story with groups such as Environmental Defense Fund, Sierra Club and The Nature Conservancy. When they speak, Congress listens. the Unlike average American, they are well organized, loaded with cash and well positioned to be a disobedient congressman's worse nightmare. Their political and economic success has been a near disaster for our nation.

For several decades, environmentalists have managed to get Congress to keep most of our oil resources off-limits to exploration and drilling. They've managed to have the Congress enact onerous regulations that have made refinery construction impossible. Similarly, they've used the courts and Congress to completely stymie the construction of nuclear power plants. As a result, energy prices are at historical highs and threaten our economy and national security.

What's the political response to our energy problems? It's more congressional and White House kowtowing to environmentalists, farmers and multi-billion dollar corporations such as Archer Daniels Midland. Their "solution," rather than to solve our oil supply problem by permitting drilling for the billions upon billions of barrels of oil beneath the surface of our country, is to enact Energy the Independence and Security Act of 2007 that mandates that oil companies increase the amount of ethanol mixed with gasoline.

Anyone with an ounce of brains would have realized

that diverting crops from food to fuel use would raise the prices of corn-fed livestock, such as pork, beef, chicken and dairy products, and products made from corn, such as cereals. Ethanol production has led to increases in other grain prices, such as soybean and wheat. Since the U.S. is the world's largest grain producer and exporter, higher grain prices have had a huge impact on food prices world-

Congress and the environmentalists aren't through with us. If you're bothered by skyrocketing food and energy prices, wait until Congress re-introduces its environmentalist-inspired Climate Security Act, socalled "Cap and Trade." Cap and Trade is deceptively peddled as a free-market solution to the yet-to-be-settled issue of manmade climate change. Under its provisions, companies would be able to 'emit greenhouse gases only if they had a government allowance. The Congressional Budget Office estimates that a 15 percent cut in emissions would raise the annual average household's energy costs by \$1,300. Since energy is an input to everything we use, we can expect everything to become more costly, resulting in a reduction in economic growth.

There's a hateful side to Cap and Trade that's revealed by asking the question: How will it be decided who received how much allowance to emit green-

house gases? Congress Much worse than that is could sell the allowances the massive control government would have over our and/or give them away to favorite constituents. You economy and our lives. Congress might decide that can bet the rent money that since tobacco use is a new army of lobbyists, unhealthy, it might not issue with special pleadings, will descend on Washington to allowances to tobacco comlobby Congress. And you panies. While can be sure that campaign Americans might applaud contributions and favoritism that, how many would like will play an important role in Congress to refuse to issue the decision of who received allowances to companies that produce foods that some

people deem unhealthy such beque in our backyard. as French fries, sodas, canned soups and potato chips?

Congress might deny, or threaten to deny, allowances to companies that in their opinion didn't hire enough women and minorities. The possibilities for control over our lives would be endless and could include nuisancetype edicts such a requiring us to buy a permit to bar-

The thirst to wield massive control over our economy helps explain the near religious belief in manmade global warming and the attacks on scientists and others who offer contradictory evidence.

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

Barack Obama's meeting with troops in There's been so much attention paid to the political jousting between Sen.

John McCain and Sen. Barack Obama over the latter's trip to the Middle East and Europe that some good news is close to being forgotten already: The Iraqi government is talking about American troops leaving by the end of

Unfortunately, it is not clear that troops pulled out of Iraq would come home right away regardless of which candidate wins the presidency.

For now, there's no official deadline for U.S. withdrawal from Iraq. And yes, for a lot of Americans even 2010 would be too long to wait.

Still, the fact that the Iraqi government wants a timetable or to use President Bush's preferred euphemism, a "time horizon" for the departure of American troops suggests that there might really be light at the end of the Iraqi tunnel.

U.S. military commanders have expressed caution about any abrupt withdrawal from Iraq, which no one including Obama has called for. Troops would come out gradually.

If the Iraqi government and its security forces prove too weak to contain the violence that continues, if Sunnis and Shiites and Kurds start going at each other again, full-scale civil war could erupt even as U.S. troops pulled out. At that point, though, the threat to U.S. interests would have to be crystal clear before the American public would support a return of its troops.

Whether it's weak or strong, if the Iraqi government tells the United States to leave, it must. The U.S. government has no right to stay the course if the government it helped create says go

But U.S. troops leaving Iraq might be going to Afghanistan, not home.

Adm. Michael Mullen, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said this week in an interview with Newshour on PBS that the situation in Afghanistan is "precarious and urgent." About 10,000 more U.S. troops are needed there, but none can be sent "in any significant manner" unless troops are withdrawn from Iraq, he said.

In the past few months, more U.S. troops have been killed in Afghanistan than in Iraq.

There's already some debate beginning among experts about whether sending more troops into Afghanistan could prove inappropriate for the situation there.

What's not much debated is that Islamic extremism, including al Qaeda, has managed to flourish in parts of Afghanistan, a poor country with a weak but generally friendly government. There's a good chance that Osama bin Laden, the inspiration and enabler for the Sept. 11, 2001, al Qaeda terror attacks in the United States, is hiding somewhere in Afghanistan or just across the border in Pakistan.

The U.S. situations in Iraq and Afghanistan have been overshadowed this past week by Obama's successful foreign tour, which reached a climax Thursday in Berlin, where he attracted an audience of 200,000 people.

But Americans, not just Europeans, should note that whatever their differences on Iraq, McCain and Obama both have expressed commitment to U.S. military involvement in Afghanistan. URL: http://www.statesman.com

DEAR READERS: When I printed the letter about cheating in school from "Valedictorian Contender" on May 27, my staff and I were deluged with mail. If you're interested in what folks had to say, here is a sample:

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DEAR ABBY: My husband and I recently retired from teaching at a highly rated, competitive Midwestern public school. Cheating was rampant, from copying homework to text-messaging during tests in the classroom. When confronted, the cheaters were surprised and usually asserted that "everyone else does it." And they were right. Cheating occurs in the classroom, in sports, in extra-curricular activities and in the hallways, and has become more acceptable among students than ever before. Teachers are practically powerless to control it; administrators seem to have no idea how to handle it. Parents don't want to get involved for fear of angering their children, and a strong leader may be "asked" to back down from pursuing it. My husband and I tried many times to make students understand that what they were doing or thinking was wrong and needed to be corrected, only to be met with an incredulous stare, a sneer perhaps, and then, "Can I go now?" We began asking ourselves that same question and realized last year that WE "could go now" -- and we did. More of our time was spent trying to teach moral values and ethics and less was spent on the required curriculum. You were right when you said people's codes of ethics have taken a nosedive in the last decade. It's rampant in every aspect of life as you mentioned. But when it's rampant in our schools, it eliminates any chance of fixing it for coming generations. -- RETIRED IN THE MIDWEST

DEAR ABBY: In recent years it seems cheating is encouraged by parents. I have seen it when teaching Sunday school to seventh-graders. The father of one of the Scouts in our local Scout troop even called cheating "just a form of competitive advantage." For a long time I have carried a quote in my wallet that is my favorite saying: "Our lives begin to end the day we become silent about things that matter." The person who said it was the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. -- TONY S., NEW MIL-FORD, CONN.

DEAR ABBY: After teaching in public and private schools for 44 years, I believe that most students are honest the majority of the time. However, I would advise "Valedictorian" to pay attention. Make mental notes of the names of her classmates who cheat every chance they get. Do not forget who they are. She will be meeting them all the rest of her life. If they go into business, shop elsewhere. If they become bankers, put your money elsewhere. If they go into the service industries, get your car or your teeth repaired somewhere else. Above all, do not let your siblings marry one of them -- marriage is the biggest "test" of all. -- E.B., LINDEN,





"There are several areas where we are going to need plenty of help," Martin said. 'We would like church groups and school groups to do partriotic programs during the day. This is a tribute, and we need to stay focused on that."

The wall will be in Pampa

from Nov. 5 through Nov. 12 or 13. It will be free to the public. Plans are to erect the memorial in the M.K. Brown Auditorium parking lot.

"We need people to help us clean up," he said. "And we really need a parade chairman. We want to have a parade on Saturday (Nov. 8), and we need someone to take that on.

The commander added that he already has more volunteers than the 25 people who attended the first meeting.

"One lady is going to take care of getting people to man the computers from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.," he said. "The computers are there to help locate a soldier's name on the wall. Give them a name, and they

can help you find it, and it will also give you a biography of that person."

Martin said special days are planned for Gold Star mothers and Blue Star mothers, as well as a special day set aside to honor prisoners of war and those missing in

"Part of our agreement is

to provide an escort for the memorial as it arrives in town Wednesday," the com-mander said. "It is usually a motorcycle escort, so we will be asking all the motorcycle groups in our area to help us bring it to town. I don't think that is going to be a problem."

The next organizational meeting will be held at 6 p.m. Monday (Aug. 11) at the Pampa VFW Post.

"If anyone is interested in helping, they should come to that meeting," Martin said. "Each of our committees will take several people. It is going to be a big thing for Pampa."

... opportunities.

"I'll talk to any club because the more I get the word out the more the chances are of someone knowing a kid who would benefit from this," Pingel said. "I go to doctors and nurses to get names, just whatever I can do."

Pingel then meets with the children's families and presents them with literature and a video he had made with his daughter as the star, talking about how much fun she's had at the camp. Pingel said he had started making the videos to keep memories for Lauren but soon realized it was a good way to get the message of the camp across to others.

While the camp costs roughly \$1,500 per child, Pingel and Pampa Lion's Club sponsor them at no cost to the family. This year, they donated a \$3,500 video camera. Pingel said next year, they will film a camper's

experience for a full week to help promote TLC.

"People see Lions Club all over town at our dodge ball tournaments, basketball tournaments, golf tournaments, broom sales ... and all of that money we send to the camp. We even provide transportation," Pingel said.

The camp, held in Kerrville near San Antonio, is conducted for a period of six weeks for handicapped children (including everything from asthma, to blind and deaf children, to amputees and burn victims) and two weeks for children with Type 1 diabetes. The children must have an IQ of 70 or above and be between the ages of 7 and 16 to qualify for the camp.

Each day, 130 counselors from all over the world take up to 1,000 pictures which are then posted on a special Web site each evening for parents to check on how their children are doing.

This year, along with Lauren, Pampa Lions Club

sent Kolton Dyson and Brody Gilbert, all of Pampa, to the camp.

"I have dinner with them right after Friday's awards ceremony, and they are already wanting to make sure they can go back next year which is good because they haven't seen their parents in a week. It's a confidence builder," Pingel said. "I talked to Kolton's mom, and that's all he talks about, too. They see the same kids every year, and they build relationships, and the older they get, around 10 or 12, they can stay in touch."

Activities for the campers include fishing, horseback riding, putt-putt golf, arts and crafts, dances, swimming, a ropes course, nature studies, a music program, and archery to name just a few. The camp sits on 512 acres of rolling countryside and is one of the largest handicap camps in the United States.

There is a full-time nursing staff on site and a physician on call at all times. The physician who oversees the two-week diabetes camp has been bringing his entire staff for 27 years.

"Everything is focused to take care of special needs kids. At the diabetic camp, they teach and encourage them to take care of themselves," Pingel said. "But the positive attitude is one of the biggest things."

Pingel's goal is to send 10 children from Pampa next year.

"They can come to the camp and not worry about getting made fun of. Some kids are in wheelchairs, but half of them are not and that's the cool thing about it, you know? Who cares?" Pingel said. "So what if someone's in a wheelchair. They're people, too."
