# Two transported to hospital after early-morning vehicle accident

A two-vehicle accident which was reported just before 6 a.m. today resulted in two persons being transported to Pampa Regional Medical Center, with one of the two later flown by air ambulance to an Amarillo hospital.

The collision occurred two miles west of Pampa on Highway 60 and involved an eastbound passenger car and a westbound pickup, according to Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper Chad Brooks.

The driver of the eastbound car apparently fell asleep at the wheel and hit the outside curb of the eastbound lanes, Brooks said. The driver then overcorrected and skidded into the westbound lanes


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

now grown to include six King-Airs, or fixed-wing planes, and 11 A-Star helicopters. Centrally located out of Wichita, Kan., EagleMed uses a sophisticated flight communications center that looks like something out of a movie. On a 42 inch overhead interactive real-time display, the communications center can see all aircraft bases, aircraft in flight as well as ground speed and live weather radar.

Pampa Regional Medical Center has phones both in the emergency room and in the intensive care unit that go directly to EagleMed

"We can give you, within a minute, our ETA (estimated time of arrival) and our crews are always in contact with a physician," Houlton said. "If someone calls our com (communication) center, and we're not available, we will call our competitors to get you an aircraft. We don't care about politics, we want to take care of patients."

According to Houlton, 95 percent of EagleMed helicopters and planes are flown

by well-trained, ex-military pilots. EagleMed not only transports patients from hospital-to-hospital but also flies to accident scenes if tion of the call. The crews necessary.

Houlton is adamant about being contacted even if a patient is not cleared for transfer at the time of the

"Sometimes it can take up to 45 minutes to get a patient admitted," Houlton said. "You can call us and tell us to go ahead and come that way, and that gets us in the air and on the way while you're waiting on clearance. We'd rather be on the ground waiting than have you waiting on us."

air ambulance veteran Lori Brown-Salyer said. "We'll help stabilize a patient. We pitch in on both ends."

The helicopter is equipped much like an ICU unit. It specializes in transporting patients requiring advanced life cardiac support, advanced pediatric life support, advanced trauma care and advanced burn life support. EagleMed is dis-

patched normally within minutes of a transport request and is continually monitored through the duraare not simply paramedics, but also RNs with a minimum of three years experi-

ence in ER trauma. "We're trained to do everything and a lot of our job is being able to fly," Brown-Salyer said. "You can't be claustrophobic either."

"I wasn't as comfortable with flying as Lori was," training officer Nicole Law said with a laugh. "At first it was the most miserable two months of my life."

EagleMed has a policy it 'We'll pitch in and help at calls "three to go, one to say the hospital, too," Chief no" when it comes to flying. Flight Nurse and eight-year If one person doesn't feel comfortable flying on a particular day, then they don't, no questions asked.

"Normally though, you've got people who are really ready and motivated to get to the patients," Brown-Salyer said.

EagleMed rotates crews nurse/paramedics. Personnel work 24 hours on and 48 hours off. The average time it takes to launch upon being dispatched is 10 minutes. In good conditions, it takes only 37 minutes for a helicopter to reach Pampa from Guymon and only 24 minutes to reach Amarillo from Pampa.

It makes all the difference.'





# Detainees rejoice at recent Supreme Court ruling

A Lunchtime Liberty Update from the Center for Individual Freedom (CFIF) was delivered to my e-mail inbox this past Friday. Embedded within the update was a link to an article concerning a recent Supreme Court decision to allow prisoners at Guantanamo Bay, read "enemy combatants," to proceed with lawsuits against the federal government.

According to the article, titled "The Deepening Detainee Disaster," certain justices are now seeking, based on the recent high court decision, to expedite the detainee court cases

Today's Highlight in History: On Aug. 7, 1942, U.S. and allied forces landed at Guadalcanal, marking the start of the first major allied offensive in the Pacific during World War II.

On this date:

In 1782, George Washington created the Order of the Purple Heart, a decoration to recognize merit in enlisted men and non-commissioned officers.

In 1789, the U.S. War Department was established by Congress.

— Arnold Toynbee English historian (1889-1975)

In 1882, the famous feud between the Hatfields of West Virginia and the McCoys of Kentucky erupted into full-scale violence as one member of the Hatfield clan was mortally wounded by three McCoy brothers, who ended up being slain in

In 1927, the Peace Bridge between the United States and Canada was dedicated during ceremonies attended

by Prince Edward of Wales, Canadian Prime Minister William Lyon Mackenzie King and U.S. Vice President Charles Dawes.

In 1947, the balsa wood raft Kon-Tiki, which had carried a six-man crew 4,300 miles across the Pacific Ocean, crashed into a reef in a Polynesian archipelago; all six crew members reached land safely.

In 1959, the United States launched Explorer 6, which sent back a picture of the Earth.

In 1964, Congress passed the Gulf of Tonkin resolution, giving President Lyndon B. Johnson broad powers in dealing with reported North Vietnamese attacks on U.S. forces.

In 1974, French stuntman Philippe Petit repeatedly walked a tightrope strung between the twin towers of New York's World Trade Center.

In 1987, the presidents of five Central American nations, meeting in Guatemala City, signed an 11-point agreement designed to bring peace to their region.

In 1993, the public got its first glimpse inside Buckingham Palace as people were given the opportunity to tour the London home of Queen Elizabeth II. (Proceeds were earmarked to help repair fire damage at Windsor Castle.)

Ten years ago: Terrorist bombs at U.S. embassies in Kenya and Tanzania killed 224 people, including 12 Americans. The Federal Aviation Administration, in a follow-up to the probe of the 1996 explosion that destroyed TWA Flight 800, ordered the inspection of Boeing 747 fuel

Five years ago: A bombing outside the Jordanian Embassy in Baghdad killed 19 people. An Indonesian court sentenced Amrozi bin Nurhasyim to death in the 2002 Bali bombings that killed 202 people.

San Antonio Express-News on looting Medicare:

Medicare officials need to get serious about putting an end to rampant fraud without any further delay.

A recent report from the Senate Homeland Security investigations subcommittee found that medical supply vendors collected \$93 million in phony Medicare claims from 2000 through 2007, using identification codes from dead doctors, the Associated Press reported.

This repugnant outrage is amplified by the fact that Medicare is at risk of going insolvent unless lawmakers revamp the funding mechanism.

The struggle to provide adequate health care for the elderly is severely damaged by such heinous fraud.

The AP reported that Medicare officials moved to a new ID system in May, but the Senate report called for numerous other safeguards.

For example, the wire service noted, lawmakers suggested that the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services update physician data to discover doctor deaths every 90 days instead of the 15-month period in the current proce-

Congressional oversight will be crucial. Medicare officials promised to make changes in 2001 after \$91 million in bogus claims were discovered.

Here we are seven years later, and the fraud continues.

Medicare is vital to the nation's senior citizens, and the program must be run efficiently to preserve benefits in tight budget times.

Procedures must make it more difficult for thieves to raid the program at the expense of taxpayers and patients in need of care.

# Retailers report mixed results for month of July

NEW YORK (AP) — The remained in a malaise. outlook for the back-toschool shopping season looked grim Thursday, as retailers' July sales reports showed an increasing shift toward buying necessities like food and household supplies at discounters and away from discretionary splurges on clothing.

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With the benefits of the government stimulus checks fading, the big worry is how much shoppers - squeezed by high gas and food prices — will retrench in the critical months ahead.

As the nation's retailers reported monthly sales, Wal-Mart Stores Inc. and Costco Wholesale Corp. posted solid gains.

But July results for Wal-Mart, the world's largest retailer, fell slightly short of Wall Street forecasts. The company noted that shoppers are increasingly running out of money and projected that sales would slow in August as the benefits from the stimulus checks dry up. Many mall-based apparel stores including Limited Brands Inc., Abercrombie & Fitch Co. and Gap Inc. sales, or sales at stores

"Consumers are in a fair amount of pain," said Ken Perkins, president of research company RetailMetrics LLC. He worries that without the government stimulus money, shoppers won't have any incentive to splurge on back-toschool merchandise.

from newly opened stores. Consumers are finding that their paychecks are not keeping up with rising food and gas prices. They're also dealing with tighter credit, a housing slump that doesn't look like it will be ending anytime soon and a weaker job market. Such fears have dragged down consumers' outlook for the economy to the lowest level in decades, according to the Conference Board.


A report on unemployment Thursday underscored the woes in the job market. The Labor Department reported that the number of newly laid-off people signing up for jobless benefits last week climbed to its highest point in more than six years as companies cut back. New applications for unemployment insurance rose by a seasonally adjusted 7,000 to 455,000 for the week ending Aug. 2, putting claims at their highest level since late March 2002.





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

Internet. Unfortunately, most wireless access points and NICs are set up by default to operate this way. Hackers are counting on this fact.

A closed network will deter most hackers as it will only allow access from certain machines. Specifically, the wireless access points are tied to certain NIC addresses. What's that, you ask? Well, believe it or not, every NIC (wireless and wired) has a unique address. No two NICs on the planet have the same address. This address is hardwired into every NIC, and broadcast every time you access something on the network. (By the way, this is one of the secret methods law enforcement officials use to find hackers on the Internet). Anyway, wireless access points can be set to only talk to machines broadcasting certain NIC addresses.

If the hackers discover a WPA or WEP protected network, they typically move on to the next target. WPA is short for WiFi Protected Access and is the most popular form of wireless transmission security available. WEP is short for WiFi Encrypted Protocol and is a much stronger form of protection. All information

the receiving NIC is scrambled (or encrypted), so that only those two devices can communicate. Coupled with a closed network architecture, your wireless network is practically impenetrable.
