





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Five named to Panhandle Veterans Hall of Honor

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William R. "Bill"

Culbertson William R. "Bill" Culbertson was a member of the second class, Class 43C, to go through the Pampa Army Airfield training center. He then became an instructor in the instrument squadron at the center.

1945, In January Culbertson received orders to report to Nadzab, New Guinea to teach instrument flying to pilots stationed there. From New Guinea, he was sent to the 13th AF 42nd Bomb Squadron in Palawan Philippine Islands.

This group took part in the longest twin-engine bombing mission ever by flying to Borneo to bomb the Japanese oil refinery at Balikpapan as part of the Australian invasion of the Netherlands East Indies. Because the Borneo mission involved a flight of more than 1,700 miles over open sea, it was necessary to place additional fuel tanks in the radio compartment.

Without the loss of a single crew member or airplane, making minimumaltitude attacks, the group dropped over 46,000 pounds of napalm and demolition bombs, 91 percent of which fell within the target area, and expended 415,000 rounds of ammunition.

The crews destroyed gun positions, warehouses, roadblocks, fuel and ammunition dumps, a radar station, numerous vehicles and 73 military buildings as well as huge stores of gasoline and oil. The bombing group was so effective that the enemy was totally unable to contest any of the landings and the Australian 7th Division came ashore on an undefended beach, according to information provided on Culbertson for the Hall of Honor banquet.

Culbertson was next assigned to drop pamphlets to the Japanese on Borneo and Luzon, and in December of 1945 he was sent back to the United States, where he signed up for an additional 18 months of military serv-

He served at Greensboro, N.C.; Boling Air Force Base in Colorado Springs, Colo.; Grand Island, Neb.; and then on to Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Ohio, where he received a regular Army commission. He flew 172 trips in the Berlin Airlift from Rheine-Main.

Culbertson's awards and citations include the World War II Victory Medal, Good Conduct Medal, American

Theater Medal, Southwest Pacific Medal with four battle stars, Berlin Airlift, Expert Marksman and the Air Medal.

He retired as a lieutenant colonel in 1965 and continues to volunteer at Wright-Patterson in the pharmacy department.

Clarence M. "Bud" Evans Clarence M. "Bud" Evans was born in 1906 in Oklahoma. His family moved from Oklahoma to New Mexico and then to White Deer in 1928, where the family opened a grocery store and a hotel on Main

Street. His wife, Golda, later

operated the hotel and

Buck's Cafe during the years

Evans was in the military. Evans registered for the draft on Oct. 16, 1940 and was drafted on Oct. 26, 1942. He completed basic training and artillery basic training in February of 1943 and was assigned to the 7th Infantry Division, Ford Ord,

California. At Ford Ord, the 7th trained for desert warfare and deployment to North Africa and was subsequently known as the Infantry Line Division.

On May 11, 1943, Evans landed with the invasion force on the Aleutian Islands and participated in a battle which lasted 18 days. He was also part of the U.S. invasion force on other landings, including that on Kiska on Aug. 15, 1943.

In September 1943, the 7th went to Oahu, Hawaii, where Evans, a private, was assigned to the 184th Infantry Regiment, 1st Battalion. Training to invade the Marshall Islands was

Evans' division arrived off Kwajalein Island on Jan. 30, 1944 and began an attack at 4:30 a.m. Jan. 31. The island was secured on Feb. 4.

During this period, PFC Evans was serving as a truck driver, re-supplying ammo, fuel and supplies.

The division returned to Hawaii in February of 1944 and began training for the invasion of Paluas or Yap. They sailed from Hawaii in September, and on Sept. 15, they were notified that their target would be either Iwo Jima or Leyte.

The division arrived on Leyte on Oct. 20, 1944, and Evans was wounded in the Leyte operation when he was struck in the chest by a wooden projectile fired by the Japanese.

Evans refused the Purple Heart, saying he was not wounded badly enough, even though he was hospitalized for two weeks, according to information provided for the Hall of Honor banquet.

The last invasion Evans participated in was at Okinawa, which was completed on June 30, 1945. He was honorably discharged from the Army on Sept. 24, 1945 and returned to White

Warren E. "Gene" Jeffers Warren E. "Gene" Jeffers was born in 1923 in Fort Worth. His childhood was spent in Texas and Oklahoma. He was living in Pampa when he enlisted in the Coast Guard in Amarillo on Dec. 15, 1942, five days before his 19th birthday.

Jeffers attended basic training at Manhattan Beach Training Station in New York. He was later transferred to Galveston, where he spent a few months doing horse patrol on the beaches and attending horsemanship and firefighting schools.

From Galveston, Jeffers traveled to Los Angeles, Calif., where he boarded the Coast Guard ship USS Carson City Patrol Frigate 50 on July 19, 1944. He was assigned the duties of first loader on one of the eightman crews to operate the three-inch "50" guns mounted on the ship.

Jeffers' ship sailed for Espiritu Santo and two days later sailed to Milne Bay, New Guinea, where on Aug. 13 the USS Carson City reported for patrol escort

duty in the New Guinea area with the Seventh Fleet.

The ship took part in the landing on Morotai on Sept. 16, which was an essential preliminary to Philippine operations. The ship also took part in guarding men, ships and supplies being assembled in the plans for the Leyte landings. One of the ship's responsibilities was to run ahead of the fleet and search out and destroy enemy submarines.

The group sailed for Leyte Gulf on Oct. 16, leading the first wave of reinforcements for the Northern attack. On Oct. 22, under enemy fire, they accompanied men and boats into the landing area and the next day returned with the empty ships back to Humbolt Sansapor, Morotai and Mios Woendi.

In January 1945, Jeffers' ship sailed to the Alaskan Sea Frontier at Dutch Harbor, where they assisted in air force operations.

Jeffers' service awards include the American Campaign ribbon, Asiatic Pacific Area Campaign with one Bronze Star, Philippine Liberation Campaign with one Bronze Star, World War II Victory Medal and Philippine Campaign Medal. He was honorably discharged on March 30, 1946.

Billy Jeff Neal

Billy Jeff Neal was born on Wolf Creek, north of Pampa, in 1924. His family moved to Borger and then later returned to Pampa.

On March 22, 1943, shortly after Neal's 18th birthday, he was drafted and sent to Camp Butner in North Carolina to begin training with Battery A of the 270th Field Artillery Battalion.

After extensive training, Battery A was transported to Europe and became part of General George Patton's Third Army. They landed at Normandy 15 days after D-Day and immediately began shelling the German-held French town of Cherbourg.

Neal's initial training was as a light truck driver; how-

ever, once in Europe, in addition to driving the recon jeep, he was responsible for the laying and maintenance of the commo wire that connected the forward observer to the artillery units. Probably the single most important duty Neal had was to protect the forward observer, as this officer could make or break a battle in progress.

Neal was part of the historic "dash" of Patton's 3rd Somewhere in Northern France, Neal's unit came under heavy German air attack, and Neal manned a .50 caliber machine gun mounted on a 6x6 heavy truck. A nearby explosion blew him out of the truck and threw him into the air.

The blast severely damaged his right nasal area, which would bother him the rest of his life, as well as giving him a puncture wound to the right leg.

Neal was discharged from the Army on Dec. 17, 1945.

Danford Dale Robbins Danford Dale Robbins was born in Wichita, Kan. in 1923. He was drafted into the Marines in 1943 while a senior at Felt High School in

Upon induction, Robbins first went to San Francisco, Calif. and then on to Honolulu, Hawaii aboard a troop ship that was a con-

verted ocean liner. During the 23 months he served during World War II, Robbins was on four different battleships: his home ship, the Idaho; then the New Mexico, Mississippi and Pennsylvania. Their job was to bombard various Pacific islands before and after Allied troops landed, the retire from the island after it was secured. Robbins saw landings on seven dif-

ferent islands. Most of Robbins' time was spent as an orderly and carrier of classified documents which were sent in by radio and decoded. He served under Rear Admiral L.D. McCormick, commander of Battleship Division Three.

During his time in the Pacific, Robbins experienced two hits by kamikaze suicide planes. One hit the bridge about 30 feet above Robbins' head, and the other was at the water line at Okinawa.

Robbins was in San Pedro Bay, Leyte, when the Japanese surrendered on Aug. 15, 1945. As of that day, his division's ships had poured over 50 million pounds of major shells on Japanese-held areas, and the division's anti-aircraft had brought down close to 100 Japanese planes.

Robbins was discharged in Chicago, Ill. He then joined the Coast Guard during the Korean War. He was in the Navy Reserve during the Vietnam War and retired as Senior Chief Petty Officer after 28 years of military service.

He moved to Pampa in 1955 and currently resides in the Veterans Nursing Home in Amarillo.

Traditionally, to be eligible for induction into the Hall of Honor, the nominee must meet one of four criteria: Born in the 26-county Texas Panhandle, raised in 26-county the Panhandle, went into the service while living in the 26-county area or served at Pampa Army Air Field during World War II.

The Board of Directors of the Hall of Honor have eligibility to extended include individuals stationed in the 26 counties during their service, any individual who moved to the Panhandle after being discharged and made significant contributions in or to the military services, individuals who served in the Merchant Marine or Coast Guard, or civilians such as those who fought beside the Marines at Wake Island in World War II.

The Hall of Honor is housed at Freedom Museum USA, 600 N. Hobart.

There are other areas north of Pampa that the city is considering for annexation, he said.

"Development is something that we talk about every day in our office and there's more and more calls coming in and planning that has to be done and trying to prepare for what we think is about to happen here," Hooper said.

Hole in the ground finally fulfilled a purpose

One of Texas' most impressive engineering feats is nothing but a hole in the ground today, an idea that tanked big time.

In 1928, however, anything seemed possible. The newly discovered Hendricks field in Winkler County spouted 500 barrels a day and places like Pyote, Monahans and Wink became what one newspaper called "mushroom towns." The only thing rising faster than the available supply of crude was the price it fetched.

Unfortunately, the Roxana Petroleum Co. (later absorbed by Shell Oil) did not have a pipeline to get all that oil to a refinery. And -hauling the crude to the nearest rail connection by truck over mostly unpaved roads would take a fleet of vehicles.

To solve the problem, the company decided to build a Texas-size reservoir to hold the black gold.

After selecting a site in adjacent Ward County southeast of Monahans and not far from the Texas and Pacific main line, Roxana brought in an army of workmen to dig a giant hole. More men than the nearby town could accommodate, the work force lived in tents near the job site.

Using mule-drawn equipment, the workers completed an excavation that from an airplane must have looked like a wide meteor crater. Next workers laid wire mesh over the packed earth. Then, working 24-hours-a-day, tons of concrete.

When the concrete cured, the tank measured 522.6 feet from north to south and 426.6 feet east to west. With 45-degree walls, the tank dropped 35 feet deep.

By late April 1928, workers hammered away at a wooden cover for the colossal

tank, placing creosote-soaked support timbers at 14-foot intervals across the sprawling reservoir floor. Those timbers supported a domed redwood roof covered with tarpaper.

Though the Monahans facility soon became known

contractors started pouring as the million barrel reservoir, engineers had actually designed it to hold a staggering 5 million barrels of oil. Pressurized crude entered into the bottom of the tank, the intake located near a huge drain that would be used to

the weight of crude. One gallon of the thick stuff weighs nearly eight pounds. A barrel of oil contains 50 gallons and weighs some 400 pounds. When Roxana injected a million barrels of

bearing down on the concrete amounted to 400 million pounds of pressure.

Consisting of seamed sections of concrete, under that much pressure, the tank leaked. Beyond that, despite the roof, evaporation also claimed oil.

Even so, the loss happened slowly enough to make the tank workable for a time. The oil it did manage to hold got shipped by rail to Oklahoma to be refined. But when production near Wink began to decline, the flow from the field could be more easily moved by traditional methods.

Not long after the economy soured following the stock market crash in October 1929, Roxana

oil into the tank, the weight stopped using its belowground Coliseum without seats. In the early 1930s, the company removed and sold the wood. According to Ben White, retired Monahans High School swim coach and local history buff, quite a few board feet of the lumber ended up in residences and buildings in Monahans.

The huge concrete hole in the ground, wider than five football fields, lay abandoned and mostly forgotten until 1954, when Monahans officials tried to get the tank and land around it for a city park.

Shell nixed a lease agreement, but said it would sell the property. The city opted not to buy it, but a former

Solzhenitsyn: A giant among men is lost

Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn is dead, and the world is a far poorer place. He was a giant of the 20th century. He stood up unarmed but fearless and defied the mighty Soviet Union until it had no choice but to spit him out into exile.

Amidst all of the welldeserved eulogies he has received, the greatest compliments were paid to him by the communists. They hate him still and vomited vitriol when they heard the news of his death. The communists, at least, recognize the man who did more than any other one man to kill their empire and expose their philosophy for the poison that it is.

After Solzhenitsyn's exposure of the gulags, not even the most cynical American Marxist could get away with the same old lies that there were benevolent things in the communist system and that

Josef Stalin Charley was any-Reese thing but a paranoid Columnist killer with more blood

his hands than Adolf Hitler.

Solzhenitsyn can be best appreciated in context. He was born in 1918. His father died before he was born, and his mother raised him in Rostov-on-Don, an industrial city in southwest Russia. He graduated with a degree in mathematics and went into the Army when the Germans invaded in 1941. He was a captain in the artillery. Stalin's secret police snatched him out of immediately clamped down. the front lines and arrested him for having written some

unflattering things about the dictator in a private letter to a friend. He was

tenced to eight years in the labor

sen-

camps. He developed cancer, and before his sentence was complete he was sentenced further to permanent exile. After Stalin's death, he was able to teach and continue his writing, which he had done secretly in the camps. A brave Russian publisher got his novella "Day in the Life of Ivan Denisovich" in print, but the communists

He was a leading dissident and resorted to private printings and to slipping his manuscripts out of the country. In 1973, "The Gulag Archipelago," his graphic description of the prisons and Soviet tyranny, was published. The following year, he was arrested for treason

and exiled. He lived in Cavendish, Vt., from 1975 to 1994, when he ended his exile. While in the U.S., he made several stinging criticisms of the West's weaknesses and what he saw as capitulation to tyranny. This did not endear him to the American Establishment, and, of course, American commu-

The Bush administration has consistently opposed providing funding for international birth control programs, but until now has not tried to limit the use of contraceptives inside the United

That could change in the president's final months in office. Health and Human Services officials are considering a draft regulation that would classify most birth control pills, the Plan B

emergency contraceptive and intrauterine devices as forms of abortion because they prevent the development of fertilized eggs into fetuses.

The rule, which does not require congressional approval, would allow health care workers who object to abortion on moral or religious grounds to refuse to counsel women on their birth control options or supply contraceptives. It would forbid more than half a million health agencies nationwide that receive federal funds from requiring employees to provide such services. Pharmacists could use the rule as a justification for refusing to fill birth control prescriptions, and insurance companies could cite it as a basis for declining to cover the costs.

An existing regulation allows health care providers with objections to abortion to abstain from providing it to patients. By extending the definition of abortion to cover contraceptives, federal officials are attempting to create by administrative fiat what would fail by a wide margin in Congress.

In fact, the draft rule could void laws in 27 states that require insurance companies to provide birth control coverage for women requesting it. The rule also could counter laws in 14 states requiring that rape victims receive counseling and access to emergency, day-after contraceptives. It would also

Solzhenitsyn's great mind and his complex thoughts can't be summarized easily, but he is certainly worth reading. His criticisms of our Western culture were valid. He never criticized the American people, but aimed at the elite who, at that time, were compromising with tyrants all

over the place and spouting a materialistic philosophy. One part of history Americans need to know is how much material aid was given to the Soviet Union by America. The largest truck factory in the world, located in Russia, was financed by Western banks. All kinds of aid, financial and political, helped to prop up Stalin's

key to understanding The Solzhenitsyn is that he was a devout Christian. That never got much play in the American press, but he never played the part of a professional

Christian. Nevertheless, his Christian beliefs were deep and are at the root of his thinking.

He was an admirer of Vladimir Putin, as I am, because he recognized that Putin was saving Russia from disintegration. Solzhenitsyn believed in a moral and spiritual regeneration. Read some of his books, and I think you will see that he well deserved the Nobel Prize that he received.

Wreckage spotted by a hiker Sunday in the Rocky Mountains was that of a plane carrying a Texas family, Summit wreckage in steep terrain on County sheriff's officials confirmed.

require federal agencies and states to provide funds for sham family planning clinics that provide women only abstinence counseling.

The enactment of such rules would have an immediate impact in Southeast Texas, where state health officials estimate more than half a million women are in need of affordable family planning services. Rochelle Tafolla, a spokeswoman for Planned Parenthood of Houston and Southeast Texas Inc., warns that enactment of the regulation would endanger women's health.

According to Tafolla, "In a time when more and more families are uninsured and feeling the financial strain of a bad economy, it's pretty incredible that the Bush administration is actually trying to put up road-

blocks for women trying to access basic health care." Planned Parenthood strongly opposes the proposed rule "and will be fighting to preserve women's access to health care information."

Planned Parenthood is not alone in its opposition. The American Medical Association, the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists and a bipartisan group of 112 members of Congress have weighed in against the draft regula-

Democratic presidential candidate Barack Obama has signed a letter of protest written by a group of U.S. senators. (Republican candidate John McCain has not taken a position.)

Health and Human Services officials issued a statement claiming the regulation would not alter existing rules and is simply designed to protect health care workers from discrimination based on their views of certain medical procedures. That ignores the fact that defining some

forms of contraception as abortion is a radical departure from the status

As with a spate of administrative regulations undermining environmental enforcement that the administration has pushed as its time in office grows short, this one is a payoff to social conservatives who oppose abortion and contraception. Since polls show that an overwhelming percentage of the American people support birth control, such backdoor tactics are the only way such restrictions could be considered, let alone enacted.

Justifying these draft rules as an anti-discrimination measure would be laughable, if it weren't so undemocratic and dangerous to American women. If HHS Secretary Michael Leavitt is irresponsible enough to approve the regulation, Congress and the next president should make sure it short-lived. URL:
