Dear Sir;

As you know, on March 22, 1972, both houses of Congress, by large majorities, passed and submitted to the states for ratification a proposed Equal Rights Amendment (ERA). With in two hours Hawaii had ratified it followed in time by 35 more states. (38 State ratifications are necessary.) Texas ratified the Amendment within 2 months.

Since that time, and as truth about the Amendment circulates public opposition to it grows. Nebraska and Georgia have since rescinded the ratification. In Texas, House Bill 57 (to recend the 1972 ratification of the ERA) was referred to the Constitutional Revision Commi-

It must have been the proximity of Easter-whatever the reason, the U.S. Senate should be aplauded for the action taken last week. They suspended cattle imports for a period of ninety days. Can you imagine? It's been a long time since positive action has been taken to promote an industry within our own boundaries.

If you've done much driving lately-even to the Post Officeor if you own a herd, you are aware of the numbers of livestock on the ranges. There years when you would drive from my town to Ft, Worth and see hardly a creature stirring. Nowadays you notice what might be termed a roundup just ever few miles. There is a reason for this. The cowmen can't afford to put his cattle in a feed lot to fatten them-what with the inflated price of feed and the depressed price of cattle on the hoof. The feeder can't afford to buy even these cheap cattle, fill them with expensive feed, then sell them for cheap again, So the common is left with his visited Thursday at Snyder in herd, hoping the market will go, the Ram o home. up before he is forced to sell for whatever he can get.

All the while, the government has continued to allow beef imports. Supposedly flag waving, patriotic American companies who have all to gain from doing business at home, were importing-Swift, MaDonalds-and at least one fancy restaurant in Atlanta. If the truth were known the Jess Murphy home. no telling how many outlets were getting beef without a U.S.

glut? I must admit, that's one medical school at Galveston. question I can't answer-much less cope with. Imported beef surely couldn't be any cheaper than domestic. The prices in the market reflect that imported beef must surely be higherotherwise why the spread? And in fact, a Swift salesman admitted to me that their Australian beef was more costly than U.S.

Well, anyway, the Senate has taken a step which may restore the market place to the beef industry. At the same time, they have clamped all sorts of punitive taxes and restrictions upon the oil industry. Mobil Oil is to be commended for tossing out the gaunlet. They have served notice that should the U.S. government inact these

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punitive restrictions on domestic production, they will move their operations out of the U.S. Now how's that for economic chess playing? Mobil has done a tremendous job in advertising in magazines, newspapers and on TV for the last two years. They have told the oil story like it is. They, too, have been a flag waving, patriotic company. But when they can no longer afford to stay in business here, they wonder who is waving which flag?

When and if Mobil moves out, they will be able to ship their overseas products back to US at twice as much as the U.S. is allowing for domestic production. They won't have to contend with all the government taxes, freezes and general monkey business.

Should the cattle import freeze be only temporary, maybe the rancher should take a lesson from Mobil. Just load 'em up, ship 'em out and sell them to US as imported beef.

At age 63 Mrs. Johnson passed away in Methodist Hospital on March 19 after an extended illness. Burial was in Snyder on March 20.



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

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

Amendment I would allow the state to continue paying increased benefits which began February 1 for teachers already retired.

Amendment 2 would increase the rate of pay and allowances which members of the Texas Legislature have drawn since

Mr. Bob Dyess, president of BCTA, said at a meeting of the teachers Wednesday that unless voters approve Amendment 1 the retired teachers will immediately lose the higher benefits enacted by the Legislature this year at the urging of Governor Dolph Briscoe and the Texas State Teachers Association.

"Many of these people, who have given their lives to public education at low salaries, just cannot live on their regular benefits in today's inflation," Mr. Dyess declared. "It would be tragic for them to lose some benefits after receiving them for a while."

Legislators are much in the same boat, Mr. Dyess said. Their present pay and allowances have been in effect since 1960 and have no relation to

present conditions.

Amendment 2 would raise lawmakers' salaries from \$4,800 to \$7,200, per diem exfrom penses while in session from \$12 to \$30, and mileage to and

from Austin from 10 to 16 cents per mile, the amount now allowed state employes.



### Coach Of The Year

Snyder--Western Texas Coll-ge closed out a spectacular 1974-75 basketball season by taking first place in the National Junior College Basketball Tournament in Hutchinson, Kans., downing Southern Idaho by 65-57 in the final game.

Mike Mitchell, winding up his second year as coach of the WTC Westerners, was named Coach of the Year. Bob Miller, who had averaged 22 points per game for WTC during the season, was named Most Valuable Player and a member of the All-Tournament Team. Eugene Harris, who led all scorers in the final tournament game with 18 points, was also named to the All-Tournament team.

WTC, now four years old, entered the national tournament ranked sixth in the nation. The Westerners had earned the right to enter the national competition by taking the Region V Championship. Mitchell was also named Coach of the Year for Region V, while Miller and Harris were named to the All-Region team. Miller was selected the Region V All-American Nominee.

WTC's four victories in the National Tournament upped its season record to 36-1. WTC was the first Texas team to take the national title since San Jacinto won it in 1968, and it was the first trip to the national meet for WTC.

Mitchell will have four squadmen back next season, 6-0 Stanley Covington, 6-6 Tyrone Clopton, 6-8 James Smith and 6-2 Harrison Johnson. The top six players, all sophomores, have been recruited by senior colleges and Mitchell has also had offers to leave WTC. "Right now, I'm planning on being here next year," Mitchell said. He's already secured committments from four new players and predicts, "If they come and are as good as they're supposed to be, we'll be salty."

Mitchell has also been named to coach the West Team in the first National Junior College Athletic Association All-Star game scheduled April 4 at the Convention Center in San Antonio. The enthusiasm stemmed from the fact that body is now dominated by so-called Third World members.

Curiously, for one who claims to have gone straight, Arafat wore a gun throughout his appearance on stage. Most in the audience ignored this, commenting instead on his colorful burnoose.

Enthralled by his perform-ance, the United Nations granted the PLO the right to have a "permanent observer" stationat its East River enclave. This gentleman, Sadat Hassan, is urbane and courtly and is now traveling about the nation visiting with a variety of public figures. Politely, he states the case for the PLO in particuand for Arab historical claims to Palestine in general.

I'm not sure history supports the latter contention, but there is some truth in what someone has said about the difficulties in the Middle East: "There is so much right on both sides." Believing that, it would seem that men of good will could find a peaceful solution.

If so, there could be reason for optimism, but once the fox has gotten inside the chicken coop, does he ever lose his taste for blood until he's cleaned the place out? Tragically, we may have the answer to that al-ready. If so, there's little room for optimism at all.

Early in March, PLO guerri-llas attacked a Tel Aviv hotel in a savage raid that left 18 persons dead, including all but one of the attackers.

Now, one Zouheir Mohsen, head of the "military section" of the PLO, threatens to attack "Israeli targets" in the United States.

"We will strike at any Israeli strategic target where ever we can reach it, in Israel, or in Japan or in the United States," he said in an interview cently.

He also admitted that the hotel attack in Tel Aviv was aimed at sabotaging Secretary of State Henry Kissinger's delicate peacemaking negotiations between Arabs and Israelis. Mohsen described Kissinger as a "joker and a charlatan." So much for the PLO's peaceful intentions.

Clearly, the bandit group's actions belie its soothing words in international forums. Since this is so, any American leaders who are scheduled to hear
