



Gray County commissioners approved the county's budget and property tax rate for fiscal year 2009 at their 9 a.m. meeting Monday in the secondfloor courtroom of Gray County Courthouse, 205 N. Russell.

The tax rate of .44673 cents per \$100 valuation for fiscal 2009 was approved and ratified. The 2008 tax rate is .47326 cents per \$100.

"This tax rate will raise more taxes for maintenance and operations than last year's tax rate," said County Judge Richard Peet. "The tax rate will lower taxes for maintenance and operations on a \$100,000 home by approximately \$26.53."

The total 2009 budget approved by commissioners for Gray County is \$11,849,299, which includes special funds, health insurance funds, tax revenues and other sources of income. The 2008 budget is \$11,004,455.

A public hearing concerning creation of a reinvestment zone which had been requested by the firm of Babcock and Brown was postponed until commis-Oct. 1 Representatives of the company, which owns the former Celanese chemical plant west of Pampa off Highway 60, were unable to attend Monday's meeting and asked for the postponement. The public hearing was to have been followed by commissioners' discussion and possible vote on creation of the reinvestment zone.


Commissioners approved a 3 percent cost of living pay increase for county employees and elected officials. They also entered into the minutes of Monday's meeting the salaries of the auditor, assistant auditor and court reporters' salaries for fiscal 2009. District judges set the salaries of those officers. The auditor and assistant auditor will receive raises of 3 1/2 percent, and the court reporters will receive raises of 2 1/2 percent.

Influenza vaccines for county employees and the public will be offered from 7:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Oct. 1 at the courthouse. The shots are free of charge to persons covered by the county health insurance program and will be \$25 for all others.

Precinct 3 Commissioner Gerald Wright was appointed to the White Deer Land Museum's Board of Directors. He replaces Precinct 1 Commissioner Joe Wheeley, whose term on the board is expiring.

Precinct 4 Commissioner James Hefley received approval to replace an employee for his precinct. Road crossing requests for a water line at Eighth Street in Lefors and utilities concerning a new home on Walnut Creek Road were approved.

CASA: Chuck wagon supper kicks off Texas Roundup

A chuck wagon supper, complete with riders on horseback to greet guests, bandanas for dinner napkins and a chuck wagon from which the meal was served was the kickoff Saturday for CASA of the High Plains' participation in the Texas Roundup.

The roundup is a volunteer recruitment effort by CASA chapters across the state. CASA, or Court Appointed Special Advocates, is an organization which trains and supervises volunteers who act as advocates for children who have been removed from their homes due to abuse and/or neglect. The Pampa chapter is CASA of the High Plains, housed in The Brown Alliance at 315 N. Ballard.

"The purpose of the Texas Roundup is to try to double the number of CASA volunteers in the state in one year," said Janet Watts, executive director of the local CASA office. "Statewide, right now, CASA is providing volunteers for less than half of the children in foster care. Every child we are assigned gets served, but not every child gets a volunteer. They might get a staff member."

Saturday's chuck wagon meal was served at 6 p.m. at the Woody Guthrie Inn, 400 S. Cuyler. Staff members, volunteers and prospective volunteers were served fajitas with all the trimmings as staff members explained the purpose of the roundup and CASA's purpose. One former foster child told of

how much her CASA caseworker had meant in her

"Locally, our goal is to recruit 29 new volunteers between now and Aug. 31, 2009," Watts said. "Right now we have 29 volunteers who are actively working cases. A lot of them are working two

Volunteers speak for the children in court and other situations, and they work with the children and others involved in the children's cases while the children are waiting for a permanent decision concerning their futures.

A CASA volunteer reviews all material in child protective service case files on the child, monitors the family's compliance with a CPS service plan, visits with anyone who can give them information about the child, visits with the child if the child is old enough to respond, and prepares reports for each court hearing involving the child.

The CASA volunteer is also required to see the child monthly if the child lives within a 150-mile radius. The volunteer's court reports include recommendations on what they feel is in the best interest of the child.

Individuals and groups who wish to help CASA but do not wish to become volunteers may donate funds to help CASA volunteers with the cost of

The human mind is a tricky thing.

Our memories are one such example. I have often found that if I need to remember something, such as a short list of two or three things I need to pick up at the grocery store, it does not matter what clever little memory trick I try in order to retain the list in my brain. If I don't have the items written down and make sure to remember to have the piece of paper with me, I will forget at least one item.

On the other hand, things I don't especially want to remember refuse to fade quietly away but instead remain in the forefront of my mind, at least for awhile. This category includes annoying song lyrics and hurtful words.

Sometimes a mistake seems to have more sticking power in the mind than an accurate memory. I recently discovered the joys of aromatherapy, specifically, scented candles. I was shopping in a store one day with a relative, who shall remain nameless in order to not incriminate them, and we were checking out the scented candle selections.

I found one scent that reminded me of the beach when my husband and I went to Cancun, Mexico, and decided to buy it. The name of

One of the hardest things for me to remember is a person's name. Faces, voices and other ways of identifying the person are no problem, but ask me to remember their name, and unless I have known it for at least a decade, forget it. After all, I already did.

I've tried the tricks touted by some for remembering names, and they don't work for me. Some so-called experts recommend finding something about the person to associate with their name so that it will be a trigger to jog one's memory as to that person's moniker in the future.

The problem with that technique is that people's appearances undergo changes, even from day to day. They may get a haircut,

change the color of their hair, grow longer hair or even lose their hair. They may

gain or lose

weight, start or stop wearing glasses, get a different vehicle or move to a different address. And hopefully they will wear dif-

ferent clothes each day. Finding something to associate with a person's name is tough for me. For example, by using this technique, I would look for something to remind me that the person's last name is "Barker." I'm just as likely to come up with "Whinery" or "Snapp.

And with my luck, anyone named "Barker" is likely to be the quietest person in the room, anyway.

There are all sorts of things that can have adverse affects on our memories. One very controllable factor is the use, and abuse, of alcohol and drugs. Researchers who conducted one study in London reported that alcohol can increase memory problems and mistakes by as much as 30 percent. The same percentage of increase in memory errors was found among persons who used illegal drugs such as ecstasy.

Other things which are not as easy to avoid are the effects of stress, illness, prescription medications and the aging process. Poor nutrition can interfere with our memory, as can simply having too much to try to remember due to a jampacked lifestyle.

It may be difficult or even impossible and undesirable to avoid all the possible causes of memory glitches. After all, getting older beats the alternative. But the memory-jogging tricks which work for one person may not be as successful for the next person.

My advice is to not be embarrassed to write lists and keep reminders posted where they will be seen.

After all, isn't that what refrigerator doors are for?

Shivering in their boots, the GMU administration reported a diversity improvement since the ABA's site visit in 2000. Their entering class of 2003 was 17 per-

cent minori-Walter ty and their Williams 2004 class was 19 per-Columnist cent minority and they had appoint-

ed a diversity czar. Despite these efforts, the ABA was not satisfied. They complained that of the 99 minority students admitted in 2003, only 23 were black, and of the 111 minorities admitted in 2004, still only 23 were black, even though, in 2004, 63 black students had been offered admission.

Virginia has two other major public law schools, College of William & Mary and the University of Virginia. They did not win the ire of the ABA because unlike GMU, they practiced a racially dis-

criminatory admissions policy. The Center for Equal Opportunity monitors racially discriminatory college policy.

Their publication, "Racial and Ethnic Preferences at the Three Virginia Public Law Schools (http://www.ceousa.org/content/view/467/119/), reported that at the University of Virginia, a student with a LSAT score of 160 and an

undergraduate GPA of 3.25 had a 96 percent chance of admission if he or she was black,

but only a 3 percent chance of admission if white. At William & Mary, a black with a LSAT score of 155 and an undergraduate GPA of 3.0 had a 92 percent chance of being admitted while a white with the same credentials had a 3 percent chance of admission.

At GMU, not having racist policies, the chances for admission were roughly the same. Blacks with a LSAT of 155 and an undergraduate GPA of 3.0 had a 53 percent chance of admission while similar whites had a 50 percent chance.

The bullying practices of the ABA are truly a wicked, disgusting perversion. George Mason University Law School, which does not practice racially discriminatory admissions policy, is brought on the carpet by the ABA whilst University of Virginia and William & Mary, which have racially discriminatory admissions policies, have little problem. The sad fact of the matter is the ABA holds enormous life and death power over law schools and they must cave in to ABA demands or else.

Several years ago, I taught 'Economic Foundations of Legal Studies" at George Mason University Law School. I have attended many of their lecture series and social functions. As such I can attest to the high quality and moral stature of their faculty and administration. It pains me to see my very distinguished colleagues being forced to cave in to the racist demands of the American Bar Association.

Why have visual reminders on the road to remind everyone of the worst day instead of the best days of the individual's life? -- SEEN AND HEARD TOO **MUCH**

DEAR SEEN AND HEARD: Readers were divided on this issue. Some find the memorials to be comforting. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: I live in Japan, and often when people die, a small statue or flowers will be placed in their memory. It serves a twofold purpose. First, to remind others how lucky they are to have loved ones, and second, it serves as a warning to others to beware of hazards. -- AMERICAN IN **JAPAN**

DEAR ABBY: Please allow me to comment to "M.H. in L.A." There may not be a cemetery in which to pay your respects because some victims are cremated. Placement of the roadside memorial often reflects where the loved one spent his or her final moments. It is calming to go to the place where our loved one transitioned. I hope "M.H." will never have to encounter this sad experience. -- JUST A MOM

DEAR ABBY: I agree with "M.H." I think roadside memorials are overdone and unnecessary. If you wish to honor someone's memory, look into the adopt-a-highway program and put the person's name up for motorists to see. -- KANSAS CITY READER

They are often on a dangerous part of the roadway that precipitated the fatality, and people stopping to place flowers and other tributes can lead to further fatalities. 


