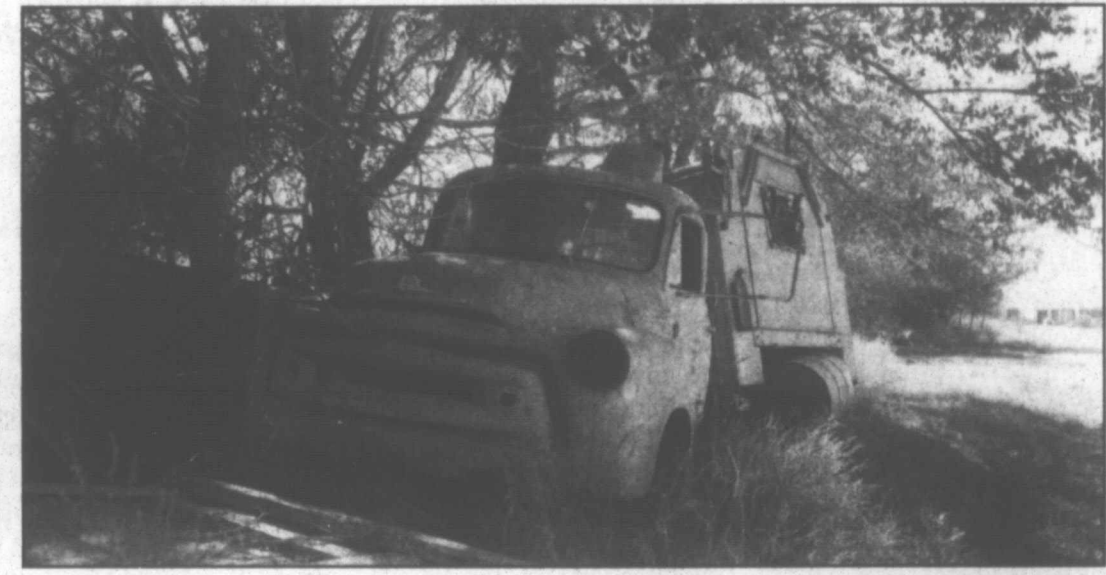

County Plans Cleanup Dec.17 and 18

"We want a better community," said Gray County Commissioner for Precinct 2 Gary Willoughby, standing alongside an abandoned International Harvester truck sans wheels on Rider Street.

Following up on an order passed in June by the Gray County Commission authorizing the abatement of public nuisances in the unincorporated areas of the county, Willoughby has launched a clean up campaign in his precinct. "I had 22 locations throughout Precinct 2," Willoughby said, "that were in dire need of clean up."

The locations include the Cole Addition; Horse Alley, and Gray County Roads 2 1/2, 5 1/2 and County Road 6, which is Price Road. "There are two or three other little roads," he said. "These range from junk yards to dead animals to years of accumulation of 'What do I do with this stuff.'"

Willoughby said he wants to help people get the country road right-of-ways in front of their properties cleaned up. "It's not the county's responsibility to tell somebody to come clean up their mess," Willoughby said. "I think they should have enough decency to respect their own property."

Annie Guthrie appears on History Channel

Pampa will have once again found claim in the United States and world wide through Woodie Guthrie.

On Sunday, Annie, Arlo's daughter and Woodie's granddaughter will speak on the program "Crash: The Next Great Depression?" on The History Channel, 9 p.m. local time. Annie was interviewed about her opinions concerning The Great Depression, and she told museum director Josh Paulson that she talked a lot about Pampa in her television interview.

The program will focus on the parallels between the Great Depression in 1929, and what many think has become a second crash financial crash in 2008.

Paulson also mentioned just left the museum after doing an article on Pampa and Woodie Guthrie, that will be four pages long, and reach a readership of 3 million people. There are 500,000 people subscribed to "Telarama," the French publication (telarama.fr).

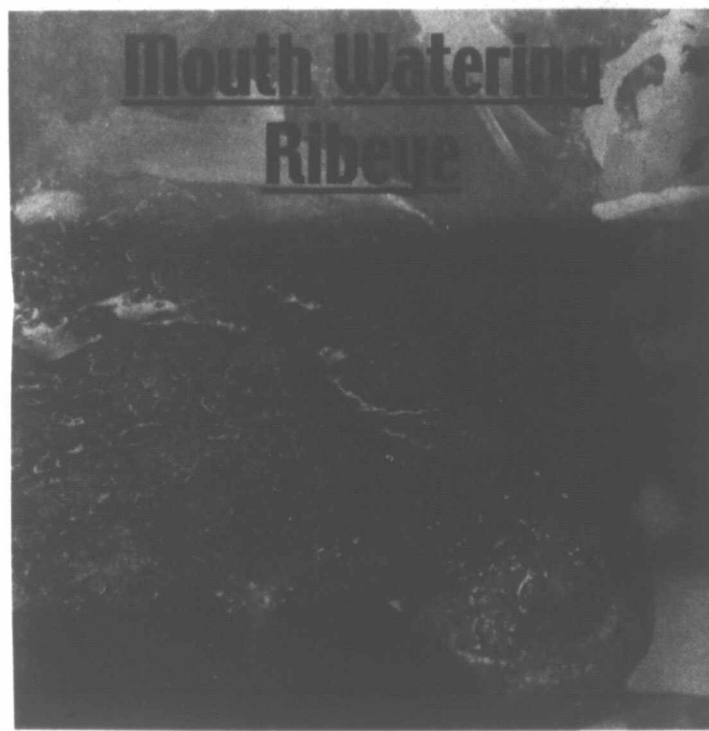

But sometimes people need a little nudge, he said. Willoughby said it took about six months to get the abatement passed in the Commissioners Court.

"We worked on this March, April, May and into June before we got it passed," he said.

The problem now, he said, is that some people don't take it seriously. "This went into effect in June," Willoughby said. "I mailed out 12 certified letters."

Four of those were in the Cole Addition. Two of those locations in the Cole Addition have been cleaned up completely, he said. "That still leaves me two," Willoughby said.

Gray County Road 2 1/2 has been cleaned up. Willoughby noted that over the past couple of years the City of Pampa made a push to haul off junked cars. "I applaud those guys," Willoughby said of the city commission.

The problem, however, was that a lot of the junked cars were piled in fields outside the city limits. "It helped the city," Willoughby said. "It looked good, and a lot of those places cleaned up really quickly." He said he worry was what was done with all the oil and gas and antifreeze out of those cars

when they were eventually crushed.

"All this got started down at the TCEQ (Texas Commission on Environmental Quality)," Willoughby said. They indicated that if the county didn't deal with such problems, the state would. Willoughby said he has two days scheduled for a clean up in Horse Alley, Dec. 17 and 18. "I have talked with Pampa City Manager Trevlyn Pitner," Willoughby said, "and he will graciously work with me on this and donate the use of their rollout boxes."

The city has five of the large dumpsters on wheels. "They are also willing to wave the landfill fee," Willoughby said. Instead, the city gets all the junk steel appliances that can be sold for their metal content. The city's participation, Willoughby said, will save the county about \$2,500.

He said he would like to give everybody he's notified until Dec. 15 to clean up their property themselves.

The rollout boxes will go out the morning of Dec. 17. "I'll be on site," Willoughby said. "My team will be on site as well as several volunteers. We've got a group of guys out there that have front end loaders, and they are willing to help."

What hasn't been cleaned up from the right-of-way, Willoughby said will be pushed to the center of the county roads. The roads will be closed and the trash burned.

"Once that's clean," he said, "then everyone is on an honor system." But he warned that if there is junk on the county right-of-way, in front of somebody's property, they are the ones that will get served citations by the Sheriff's office.

Willoughby said the clean up is a one time thing. After that, the landowners will be held responsible. "We've got 40 to 50 years worth of rubble out there," Willoughby said.

Xcel Energy seeks proposals for more power for Texas and New Mexico

AMARILLO — Xcel Energy's Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) is seeking more than 1,000 additional megawatts of power for its Texas-New Mexico electrical system to meet growing demands for electricity across the region.

In the last three months, the company has issued three separate requests for proposals (RFPs), seeking up to 800 megawatts of dispatchable power, which could come from various fuel types, including natural gas, and up to 250 megawatts of additional wind power.

Dispatchable refers to power that can be called upon when needed, as opposed to wind power, which is generated only

when the wind is blowing. The dispatchable power sources could include simple-cycle or combined-cycle natural gas generation, power purchased from other utilities or customer on-site co-generation.

All new power would be contracted through purchased-power agreements of varying terms to meet growing demand on the regional power system.

Proposals for up to 200 megawatts of additional dispatchable power are needed for delivery beginning in 2010 and 2011. Proposals for this solicitation were received in early October. In addition, proposals for an additional 600 megawatts of dispatchable power are being sought for delivery

beginning in 2012 and 2013. Responses to this RFP are due in December.

The company is requesting that the wind resources be available between 2010 and 2012 at the latest, and be located in the Texas portion of the SPS service area.

Any new purchased-power agreements would be subject to all necessary regulatory approvals, including regulatory approval in the states SPS serves.

"Texas and New Mexico are two states where the economy is growing, and we will need this additional power to meet anticipated higher electrical demand," said David Eves, president and CEO of Southwestern Public Service Company, an Xcel Energy company.

"The new power sources we seek will not only help us meet growing demand in a cost-effective manner, they also will help us meet our goals of reducing greenhouse gas emissions over time," Eves added.

Texas tales: Small cemetery home to several Rangers

Except for the occasional thunder-like sound of a jet taking off or landing at Austin's Bergstrom International Airport, the small cemetery could be out in the middle of nowhere. But while the family-owned burial ground appears isolated — the only way in is a narrow, one-lane road bordered with barbed wire fences — the Hornsby Bend Cemetery is entrapped by the modern urban sprawl of Travis County. It's still out in the country in comparison with other parts of metropolitan Austin, but less and less so every year.

The oldest cemetery in the county, laid out so long ago its size is recorded in land records by the antiquated Mexican measurement of varas (200 by 300), the graveyard is the final resting place for many members of one Texas' pioneer families, the Hornsbys. Among the graves

are those of 15 former Texas Rangers. The cemetery also has monuments honoring four other rangers who while not buried there are part of the Hornsby clan.

In a way, all the graves trace to Reuben Hornsby Sr. and his wife Sarah Morrison Hornsby, who on Oct. 16, 1832, received the first Mexican land grant approved for Travis County. (Texas did not have counties back then, but eventually the area became part of Bastrop County, and later Travis.)

Originally from Mississippi, the couple came to Texas in 1830. They lived briefly at Matagorda and then in Bastrop, with Hornsby helping empresario Stephen F. Austin survey the land in the upper portion of his colony. That's when Hornsby first saw a piece of land along the Colorado River he reckoned would suit him "just fine."

In July 1832, the Hornsby family settled in a bend of the river nine miles downstream from future Austin. Three months later they received a grant of a league and a labor of land, totaling 4,604.1 acres. While the area became known as Hornsby's Bend, the well-fortified Hornsby cabin was called Hornsby Station.

The elder Hornsby not only served as a ranger and later as a volunteer soldier in the Texas Revolution, he planted the first corn ever sown in Travis County, sat on the county's first jury, helped lay out the county's earliest roads, assisted in the surveying of Austin when it became capital of the Texas republic in 1839 and fathered the first Anglo child born in the county.

In ceremonies on October 25, the Former Texas Ranger Association placed sturdy metal Ranger markers (crosses bearing a symbolic Ranger

badge) on the 19 graves or monuments.

"When you put on the Ranger badge, you remember those who came before you," FTRA President Joe Davis said at the dedication. "And when somebody dies, after the last song is sung and prayer is said, the only thing left you can do for them is keep their memory alive."

With its 15 rangers, the Hornsby Bend Cemetery has the third most Ranger burials of any cemetery in Texas. The largest number of Ranger graves is in the Center Point Cemetery in Kerr County. Thirty-two men who served as rangers lie in that cemetery.

Coming in second is the Texas State Cemetery in Austin, which has 19 ranger graves.

So far, the FTRA has placed Ranger crosses on more than 400 graves. Most of the markers are on graves in Texas, but some have been put up in other states.

How many men have been in the Rangers? No one has ever done a precise count, but in 1982, genealogist Frances Ingmire compiled the names of more than 10,000 men who served from the 1820s to 1900. Another 1,500 to 2,000 men (and now women) have worn Ranger badges in the 20th and 21st centuries, including 134 current rangers.

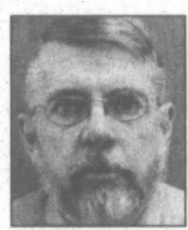
The Hornsby family-maintained Web site, <http://www.hornsbybend.com>, features an excerpt from a 1921 Dallas Morning News article about the Hornsby

Bend written by Edward Dealey, son of the newspaper's founder:

"There is a peculiar fitness that here in a lonely spot among the mesquite trees, within calling distance of the spot where once stood the first house in Travis county, are buried together all the dead members of the Hornsby family. In their lives, amid these very scenes, they did much to make Texas history and pave the way for those who followed in the more secure paths of civilization. ... It is meant that they should lie here in perpetuity, the little forest of their headstone serving as a lasting memorial, not only to their own bones, but to the vivid scenes and stirring times in which they took so large a part."

Hard to come up with a better joint epitaph for a cemetery than that.

Idle American: A life full of measure

Let's "fess" up! Who among us has not attended memorial services that stretched toward eternity? Given advance warning of lengthy services, we might opt to be absent.

Or to concoct an exit strategy triggered by a coughing spell.

A tribute recently held in Fort Worth was to memorial services what Lawrence of Arabia was to movies — long, but worth every second.

The tribute was to Kyle Ogle of Texas, a real-life hero to the thousand-plus mourners who crowded into McKinney Memorial Bible Church to honor the life of this 38-year-old hero.

A bold Christian who battled cancer for a dozen years, Kyle met the disease head-on with dogged determination, deep faith and a trademark smile.

Honoring Kyle's detailed directives for the service, eulogist Tommy Saxon set the tone: "Keep it light. Keep it fun. Keep it real."

Saxon and fellow eulogist Jeff Turner were "thick and thin" buddies who forged friendships from life's deepest waters. Their bonds began in childhood days of neighborhood scrapes, bicycles and BB guns.

Reflections ran the gamut, with laughter and tears in equal measure.

"Kyle died young but lived old," observed minister friend Dr. Tommy Nelson. Powerful words, videos and music stirred mourners. More than two hours passed, but no one noticed.

"More," collective souls seemed to plead, "more." Wanting to glean more lessons from this magnificent life, fully half of the crowd lingered in the foyer for the better part of another hour. "Kyle stories" abounded.

And there are many. Though cancer was a backdrop for a dozen of his 14 years of marriage to the former Darla Ward, Kyle and his bride refused to let his disease dominate their lives — until recent days.

They "lived large," building their dream home overlooking a lake on acreage near Weatherford. They worked hard, her at home with son Turner, 9, and daughter Katherine, 7, while Kyle earned No. 1 sales status for a worldwide medical equipment firm. The family was the picture of perseverance.

He rarely flinched in his slugfest with synovial cell sarcoma. Known far and wide for his self-effacing humor, he "laughed off" much of the grimness that typically is "part and parcel" of cancer. Intimate friends gathered for his 2002 "Farewell to Arm" party that preceded the surgery that took his shoulder and right arm.

It was one of many surgeries. Immediately "left-handed," he soon was driving again. To the sporting world so important in his life, he introduced a new bow-hunting technique. Pulling back arrows with his teeth, he claimed deer, wild hogs, bear, elk and turkeys.

Kyle was always "at the ready" to share his testimony. And he was featured on TV hunting shows. He reached the hearts of tens of thousands with the message of Christ just as certainly as his arrows felled prey on Texas ranches, the mountains of Colorado and the wilds of Canada.

His witness never wavered. He "leaned into life's struggles," friend Jeff said, "never asking 'why me?'" Instead, he asked "why not me?"

Kyle was loving, giving, selling and joking, even during those final 10 days at Baylor Hospital in Dallas. He closed deals on medical equipment from his hospital bed, all the while greeting loved ones and friends who visited.

During some lucid moments on Sunday, three days before his death, he led son Turner to Christ. Fighting kidney poison that was having its way, he struggled to utter a prayer for his son. Darla finished it.

Though not a mystic, Kyle hearkened back to a vision that seemed so real to him eight months earlier when he had neurotoxicity from chemo poisoning. He told Darla about a black coat, a train, a bright figure and a voice requesting his coat. He told her how the bright figure took his coat (covered with his sin, Kyle insisted), and how he heard the words "it's not your time yet" as the train pulled away.

A dozen hours before his death, Kyle said, "The train's coming, and I'm getting on it."

One early morning at 1 a.m., he was restrained when he tried to get out of bed.

Who knows? Maybe he heard a train whistle. And maybe he was determined to get on board. Perhaps a bright figure handed him a coat as white as snow, in case of a chill in the morning air.

His one-way ticket punched, Kyle leaves a legacy of a man who squeezed life to extract the very last drop.

His stories will be re-told across the years. Hearers will smile, weep and marvel.

Sounds of the service will echo for a long time. Still resonating are Dr. Nelson's reminder: "We can dry our tears on the memory of this man's life."

And Saxon's summation: "Kyle could do everything well except quit."

(I was in Kyle's presence just twice. I took him parasailing at Lake Brownwood just prior to his initial diagnosis. Soon after the radical surgery that took his arm, I enjoyed a two-hour lunch with him. He spoke of God's powerful words: "I am.")

CANYON — Brody Russell, a freshman chemistry major from Pampa, will be among 12 West Texas A&M University students who will travel to Africa over spring break.

The 13 students are the winners of an essay contest about this year's Readership WT book selection "What is the What." The win will take the students to Lundazi, Zambia, in March 2009 on a series of service projects with the Rising Fountains Foundation.

"I'm flabbergasted," Patrick Miller, a freshman pre-law major from Amarillo, said. "I can't believe it — this is beyond my wildest dreams. It will be a trip of a lifetime, and I'm honored to be selected."

The trip to Africa marks the second international sojourn for winners of a Readership WT essay contest. Last year's winners traveled to Poland to follow in the footsteps of Elie Wiesel, the internationally known Holocaust

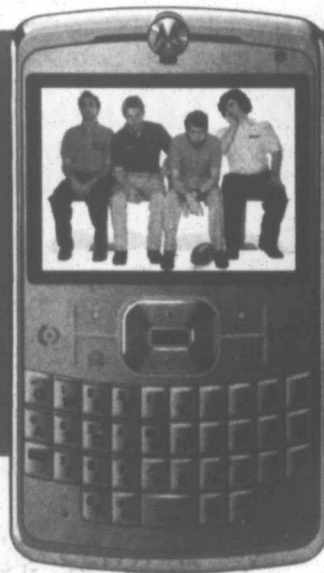
annual Convocation in September, and took part in a ticketed reception that served as a fund-raiser for the Africa trip.

The 13 students were each given a copy of the book, "On the Move," by Bono and a leather bracelet. The bracelets were made in Africa, and Lowery-Hart encouraged each student to wear it every day "as a remembrance of what you are being prepared for."

Through the Rising Fountains Foundation, the students will work with AIDS awareness issues and participate in after-school programs. They also will deal with the area's water safety issues and help build water wells and latrines.

Lowery-Hart, a few members of the WTAMU faculty and student peer leaders will travel to Africa with the 13 essay winners. This year's contest received a total of 164 essays.

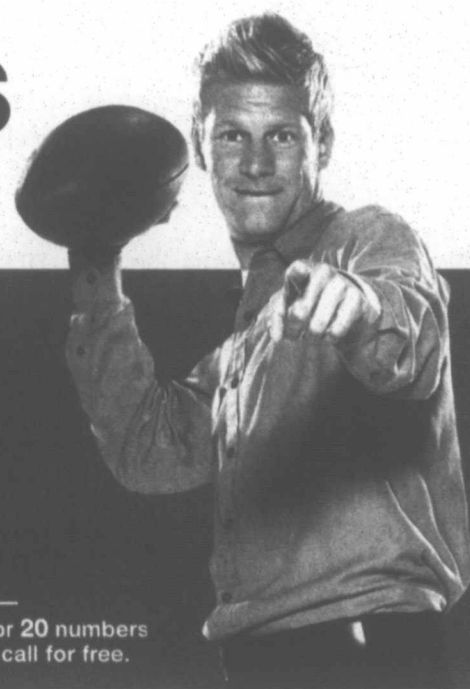

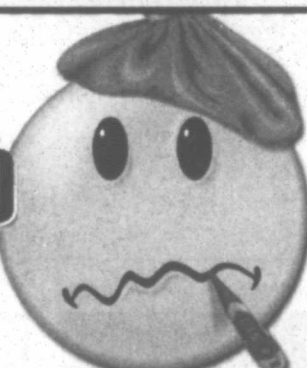

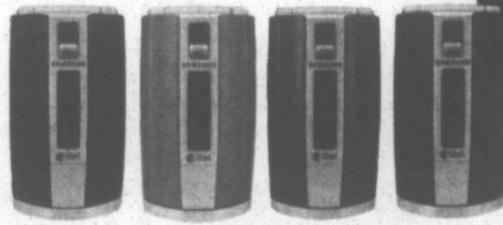

Perry announces appointments to advisory panel

AUSTIN — Texas Gov. Rick Perry has appointed three members to the newly created Texas Advisory Panel on Federal Environmental Regulations.

The panel's initial work will be to assess the potential impacts to Texas of the Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) proposed framework for regulating greenhouse gas emissions through the Clean Air Act and to report to the governor on the findings.

Bryan W. Shaw of Bryan is a commissioner of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality and an associate professor in the Biological and Agricultural Engineering Department of Texas A&M University (TAMU).

He was formerly associate director of the Center for Agricultural Air Quality Engineering and Science, and formerly served as Acting Lead Scientist for Air Quality and Special Assistant to the Chief of the U.S. Department of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Service.

In December 2007 he was appointed by

Governor Perry to the Texas Environmental Flows Advisory Group. He is also a member of several committees for the EPA Science Advisory Board, including the Environmental Engineering Committee, Committee on Integrated Nitrogen, and an ad hoc panel for review of EPA's Risk and Technology Review Assessment Plan.

He is also a member of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Air Quality Task Force. Shaw received a bachelor's and master's degree in agricultural engineering from TAMU and a doctorate degree in agricultural engineering from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. He will serve as chairman of the Task Force.

Barry T. Smitherman of Austin is chairman of the Texas Public Utility Commission (PUC), and has served on the PUC since 2004. He has held leadership positions in public finance with J.P. Morgan, Bank One, and Credit Suisse. He is also a former Harris County prosecutor and a former adjunct professor of public administration at the University of St. Thomas. Smitherman is an

ex officio board member of the Electric Reliability Council of Texas, and a member of the State Bar of Texas and the Governor's Competitiveness Council.

He is also a member of the Regional State Committee for the Southwest Power Pool, Texas Regional Entity, National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners' Committee on Energy Resources and the Environment, and serves as one of 30 inaugural members of the U.S. Department of Energy's Electricity Advisory Committee. Smitherman received a bachelor's degree from Texas A&M University, a law degree from the University of Texas, and a master's degree in public administration from Harvard University. He will serve as a vice-chairman of the task force.

Michael Williams of Austin is chairman of the Railroad Commission of Texas, which regulates pipelines and energy resources, and has served on the Commission since 1999. He led the Texas FutureGen effort, chairs the Governor's Clean Coal

Technology Council and initiated the Texas Breathe Easy Propane School Bus Tour, all of which focus on using Texas resources with clean technologies for improved air quality.

He also serves on the National Coal Council, an advisory board to the U.S. Secretary of Energy. He represents the Governor and the Railroad Commission on both the Southern States Energy Board and the Interstate Mining Compact Commission. Additionally, he chairs the Governor's Competitiveness Council. Williams received a bachelor's degree, master's degree and law degree from the University of Southern California. He will serve as a vice-chairman of the task force.

Serving as staff to the Task Force will be David Schanbacher of the TCEQ; Leslie Savage of the RRC; Richard Greffe of the PUC; Dub Taylor of the State Energy Conservation Office with the Comptroller of Public Accounts, and Cary Dupuy of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Brucellosis tests still mandated by state

AUSTIN — Selling or buying cattle? A cattle brucellosis, or "Bang's" test is still required for changing ownership of adult cattle in Texas, says Dr. Bob Hillman, Texas' state veterinarian. For many years, Texas ranchers and livestock health officials worked to eradicate cattle brucellosis, a bacterial disease that can cause cows to abort, deliver weak calves, or produce less milk.

"We have enjoyed 'Class-Free' status for cattle brucellosis since February 2008, but testing is still required at livestock markets, special sales and private treaty sales, for at least two years," said Dr. Hillman. "This testing requirement is part of the national brucellosis program standard, and it assures that a state is clearly free of the disease and that we can quickly identify and deal with reintroduced or yet undetected infection."

Slaughter testing surveillance will continue across the country for an indefinite period, to ensure that the disease is completely eradicated from cattle herds in Texas and other states.

Dr. Hillman noted that cattle which are sexually intact and 18 months of age or older must be tested prior to sale. The test requires a small blood sample from the

animal, collected by an accredited veterinarian, or TAHC or USDA personnel. A chute-side test is conducted at livestock markets on sale days, with laboratory confirmation by the State-Federal laboratory.

For private treaty or special sales, an accredited, private veterinary practitioner can draw the blood sample and submit the blood sample to the State-Federal laboratory, where the test will be run.

Cattle owners should allow at least four days for private testing, to allow for shipping the blood sample to the laboratory, testing of the samples and receiving the test results that will be recorded on the document

that will accompany the animal to the sale.

"Texas was the last state to achieve cattle brucellosis free status, but there is no guarantee we can maintain this status, if we aren't vigilant," said Dr. Hillman.

He stressed that the continued testing will identify potential cases of cattle brucellosis that weren't detected during the eradication effort. Brucellosis status can be lost, if two infected herds are detected within a two-year period.

It is essential that we continue to follow the national standards for the brucellosis program. Montana recently lost its brucellosis-free status,

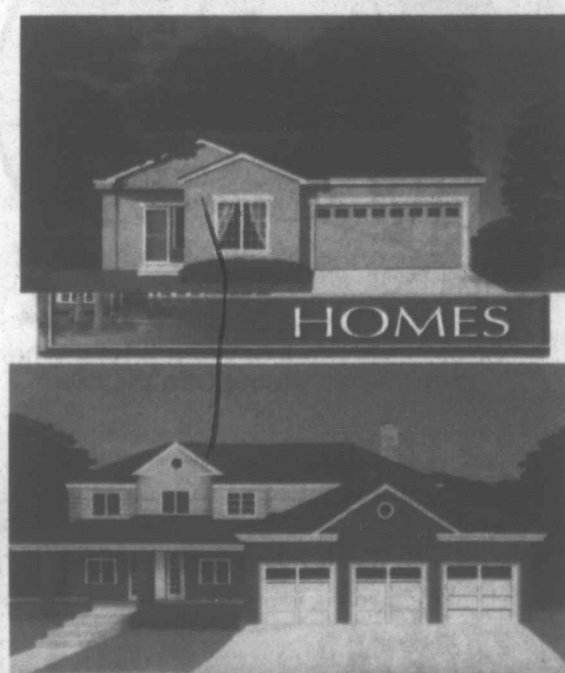

DEAR DESPONDENT: James may not have been telling you the complete truth. He continues the charade because it keeps you frozen in a holding pattern. Do not be surprised to learn that he is not separated from his wife, which could be the reason he hasn't visited. The first thing you should do

is consult your doctor and discuss the depression you have experienced since your daughter's birth. It could be caused less by the guilty conscience than a postpartum hormone imbalance. If it's the latter, it's treatable. Once that's done, consult a lawyer to ensure that Lyric will be provided for financially. Truthful people do what they say. Because James doesn't, stop listening to what he says and focus on what he does -- which is almost nothing. Mahler masterworks focus of next symphony concert

AMARILLO — Music's life-affirming power takes center stage in the Amarillo Symphony's Nov. 21-22 concerts.

The Symphony will perform two powerful works by Gustav Mahler, the Austrian composer whose compositions influenced much of 20th-century music.

"These concerts promise an emotional experience for our audiences, with music that will take listeners from the depths of grief to the stirrings of joy," said Kimbo Ishii-Eto, Music Director & Conductor.

Concerts begin at 8 p.m. in the Globe-News Center for the Performing Arts. Tickets normally run from \$18 to \$56 (\$16 for students and seniors), but by taking advantage of the Fly Standby with the Symphony

The concerts will open with Mahler's "Kindertotenlieder," a song cycle featuring mezzo-soprano Susan Platts in a return performance. Platts, a world-traveling singer and protégé of Jessye Norman, first sang with the Symphony in April 2007 during the performance of Mozart's Requiem.

"Kindertotenlieder," or

"Songs on the Death of Children," is based on the poetry of Friedrich Rückert, who wrote 425 poems in an outpouring of grief over the loss of two of his children just 16 days apart. Mahler chose five of the poems to set to music between 1901 and 1904.

Though they deal with the darkest of subjects, the songs end with a mood of transcendence: "In this weather, in this gale, they rest, they rest, as if in their mother's house: not terrified by any storm, but sheltered by the Hand of God, they rest, they rest, as in their mother's house."

"In Mahler's 'Kindertotenlieder,' we are taken on an emotional journey, only to be reminded that these children are as safe and

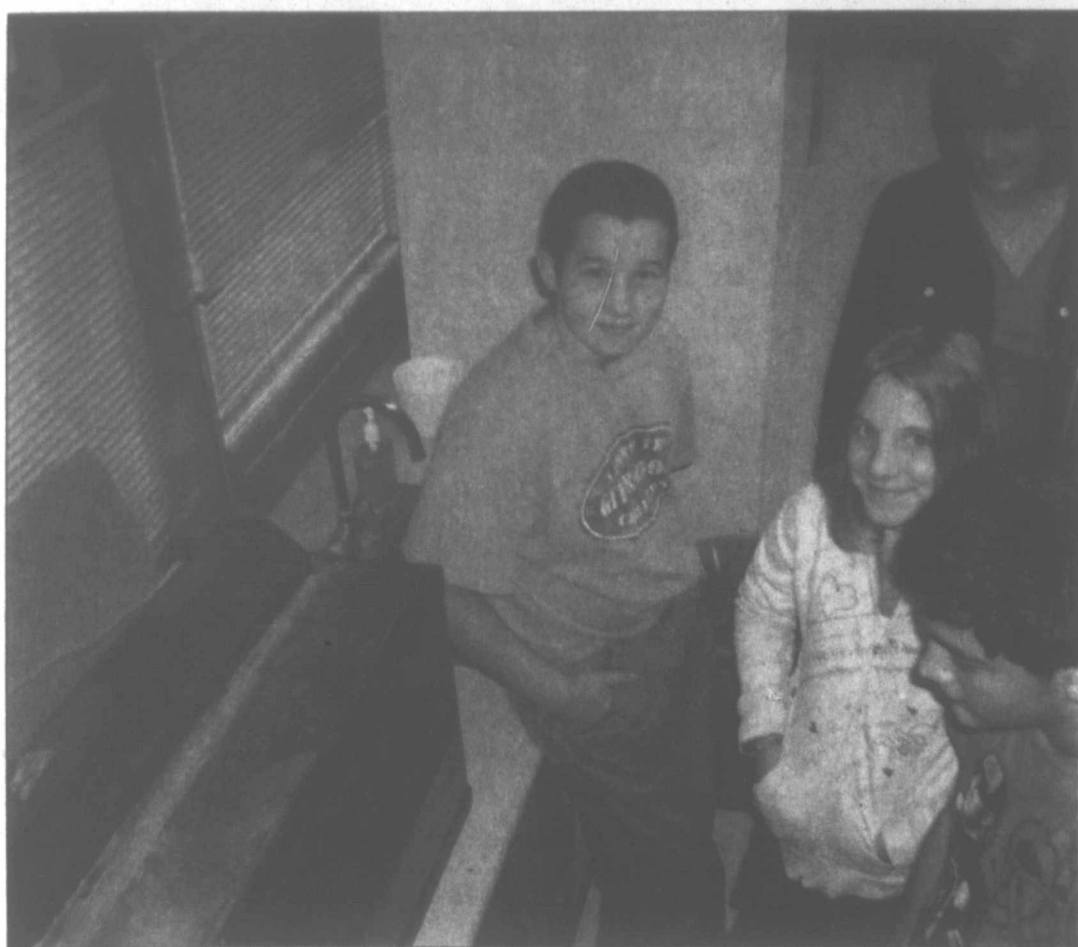

due to exposure to infected wildlife in the Greater Yellowstone Area, and widespread testing must be conducted to regain the ranking.

"Eradicating a disease is a livestock health victory, and that makes vigilance even more important now," said Dr. Hillman. "Don't risk buying infection. Ensure that the breeding cattle you buy have been tested."

Dr. Hillman also reminds cattle owners, especially those in the eastern portions of the state, that heifers should be vaccinated against cattle brucellosis, particularly if they will be used as breeding animals. Accredited veterinarians can administer the RB-51 vaccine to heifers between the ages of four and 12 months to provide lifelong protecting against the disease.

loved in the hands of God as they are in those of their mother," said Laura Street, interim executive director. "The audience will hear an exceptional masterwork."

"He wanted to express everything in his music, all of our complicated human emotions, and that intensity is comforting," Ishii-Eto said.

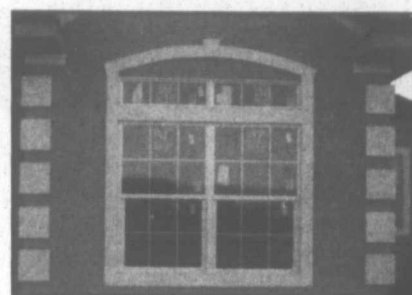

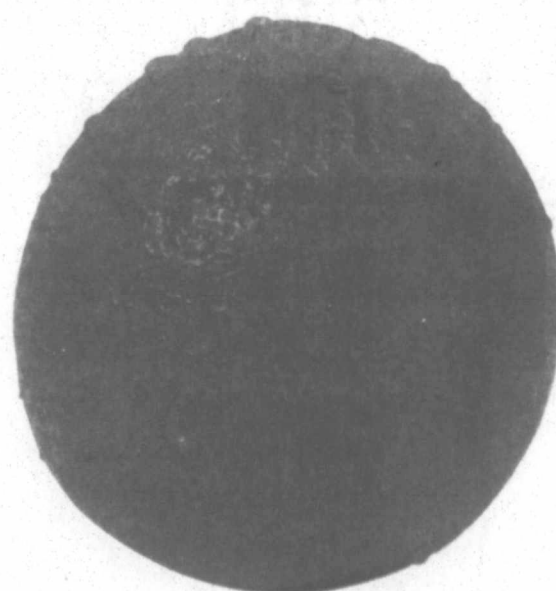
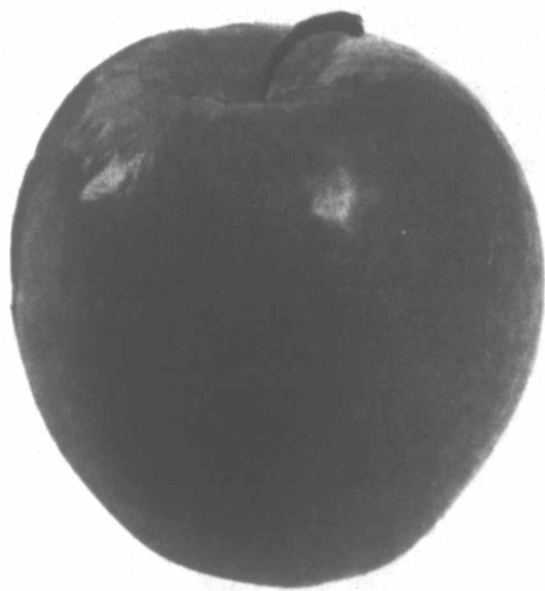

Harvesters defeated in season finale 58-34

The Pampa Harvesters traveled to Dick Bivins stadium to take on the Palo Duro (PD) Dons in the last regular season game Friday afternoon.

After several possessions were traded between the two teams resulting in punts, the score remained tied 0-0 at the end of the first quarter. The defense for both teams did not allow many yards in the opening frame.

The second quarter was however, a different story. Palo Duro drove five plays and 52 yards for a touchdown to begin the quarter 7-0. John Luke Covalt returned the kickoff to the Don 24 yard line. Pampascored on a four yard touchdown pass from Alex Clendening to Trent Carter to make the score 7-6. Palo Duro went 52 yards on three running

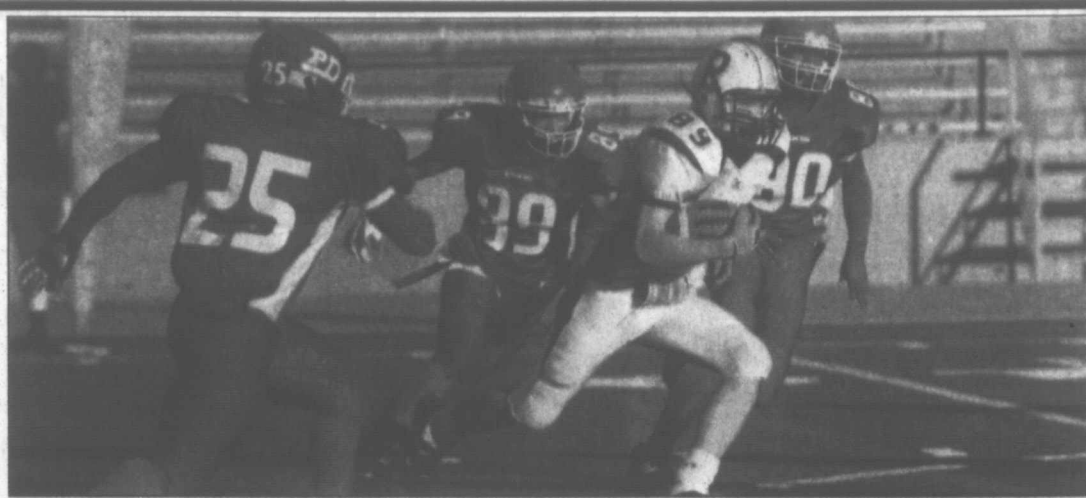
plays and stretched the lead to 14-6 with 7:02 to go in the second quarter. Palo Duro went 44 yards and score again to lead 21-6 with 2:46 to go in the half. Pampa's Covalt returned another kickoff to the Don 32 yard line. Clendening swung a pass to Madison Wilson for a touchdown and the score stood at 21-12 with 1:45 left in the half. Palo Duro took over at their own 43 yard line and went 47 yards and to make a field goal and with nine seconds in the half. The score at half time was 24-12, Pampa. The game remained active.

Clendening found a wide open Heath Skinner for a 60 yard touchdown pass and Jeremy Maxwell added the extra point to shrink PD's lead to 24-19. Pampa took the second half kickoff and drove 63 yards in 10 plays for a touchdown. Clendening found Maxwell for

a touchdown and Maxwell connected with Ryan Funderburg for the two point conversion and the Harvesters took the lead 27-24. Palo Duro took only five plays and went 65 yards and answered Pampa's touchdown with one of their own. The extra point would be good and the score stood at PD 31-27 with 6:10 remaining in the third quarter.

Pampa's next possession resulted in a quick interception and the Dons took advantage of a short field and scored another touchdown to increase the lead to 38-27 at the end of the third quarter. The next three possessions by the Harvesters garnered no points but PD's three possessions resulted in touchdowns to put the game out of reach 52-27. Palo Duro scored yet again to make the score 58-27. Pampa showed a little life and took its next drive 71 yards on seven plays. Clendening found Maxwell for a short touchdown pass and Maxwell added the extra point to leave the score 58-34.

The game ended Pampa's season with the score 58-34.

Longhorns need to win and watch for title

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — A week ago, Texas coach Mack Brown said style points don't count.

They do now. After losing at No. 2 Texas Tech and falling from No. 1 to No. 5, Brown's Longhorns now are left watching how the round-robin in the Big 12 South plays out and whether they will still have a shot at the Big 12 and national titles.

They also have to take care of their own business the final three games, starting Saturday with Baylor (3-6, 1-4).

Style points count because the Longhorns (8-1, 4-1) not only need to win, they need to do it in convincing fashion so the pollsters in the complicated Bowl Championship Series system like what they see. Texas is still the highest-ranked team with one loss in the BCS standings.

"There are a lot of games still left to be played, and a lot of things are going to pan out," Texas quarterback Colt McCoy said. "If we put ourselves in the position we need to be, and we win the rest of our games, we'll be fine."

Will they? If the Big 12 South comes down to a three-way tie, BCS standings are part of the tie-breaking formula. Any little edge will count and the next three weeks promise to be a circus of calculating wins, rankings, strength of schedules, etc.

Anybody watching Texas' schedule over the last month certainly looked at Baylor as the breather after four straight games against ranked opponents. Then the Bears nearly upset No. 13 Missouri last weekend, losing 31-28 on a field goal late in the fourth quarter.

"Anybody who saw that game," Texas center Chris Hall said, "knows the 'gimme' part of this week went right out the window."

Baylor hasn't beaten Texas since 1997 and really hasn't even been competitive. But even though they are one loss away from their 13th consecutive losing season, the Bears seem to have found new energy behind first-year coach Art Briles and freshman quarterback Robert Griffin.

"If you don't believe in yourself, no one else will. And right now, we are fighting for ourselves and trying to make other people believe in us as a football team," Briles said.

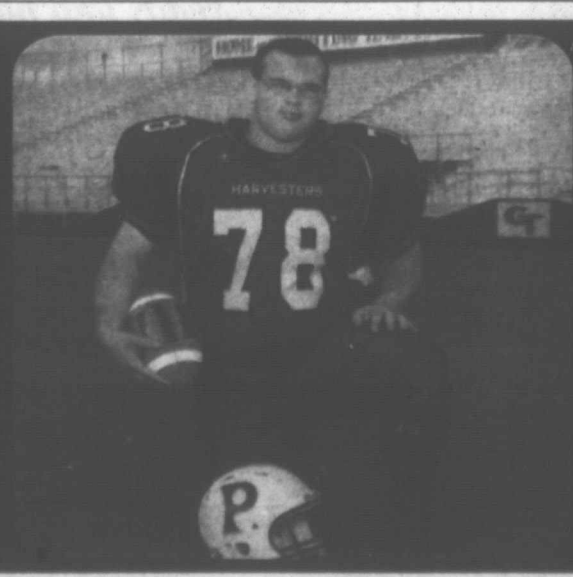

Oklahoma State, Texas Tech is latest Big 12 clash

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) — Get ready for another "biggest game in the history of this year."

That's what dry-witted Texas Tech coach Mike Leach called the Big 12's next Saturday night prime-time showdown, this one against eighth-ranked Oklahoma State a week after the Red Raiders rose to No. 2 by beating Texas for the program's first win against a top-ranked team.

Frankly, Cowboys coach Mike Gundy is worn out, and his team even got a relative break with last week's 59-17 home romp against Iowa State.

"This is getting kind of monotonous with the big games in this league," said Gundy, whose team helped kick off the Big 12 craziness a month ago with an upset of No. 3 Missouri the same day fifth-ranked Texas bounced No. 1 Oklahoma. "There's just not a lot of time to back off."

Under different circumstances, the chatter would be all about the first Texas Tech-Oklahoma State game since Gundy's "I'm a man" rant that became a YouTube sensation after last year's 49-45 Cowboys win.

Instead, everyone's talking about what a man Michael Crabtree is. The receiver's sensational 28-yard touchdown with 1 second left to beat the Longhorns gave Texas Tech a direct path to a shot at the national championship, although a trip to No. 6 Oklahoma is two weeks away.

It's an interesting juxtaposition because Crabtree had the biggest drop of his

career in last year's loss to the Cowboys, an easy potential winning catch inexplicably slipping through his hands in the end zone on fourth down in the final seconds.

"We said if we're ever in that situation again, we don't want to be the ones that lose," said quarterback Graham Harrell, recounting a conversation he and Crabtree had about the drop. "We want to make the play. It was a big learning experience with us, and I think it really helped us get where we are."

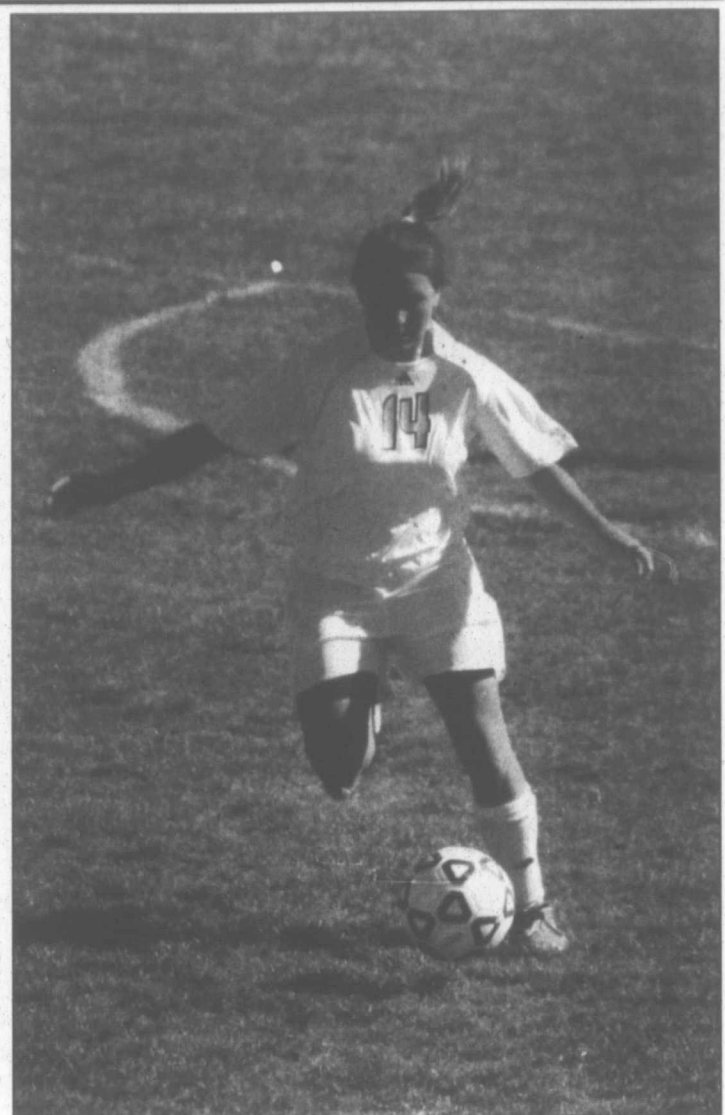
One other significant thing came out of last year's game. The Red Raiders changed defensive coordinators after they lost while gaining 718 yards, including 646 passing by Harrell, the fourth-highest total in a college game at the time.

A year later, defensive coordinator Ruffin McNeill has Texas Tech ranked No. 1 in the Big 12 in total defense (349.5 yards per game).

"From the beginning he inspired the group," Leach said. "They have gotten better playing together and play together as a unit."

The challenge last week came from Texas quarterback Colt McCoy, a Heisman Trophy contender. This week, it's Oklahoma State's powerful running game. Cowboys running Kendall Hunter is the nation's fourth-best rusher (135.6 yards per game) on a team with the country's No. 5 rushing offense (273 yards a game).

Hunter has gained 161 yards or more in four games this season and will be a big part of Oklahoma State's

keep-away plan as the Cowboys try to win in Lubbock for the first time since 1944. If they pull it off, the Big 12 South could have four teams with one loss.

"Any time you can try to keep a good offense like Texas Tech off the field, you definitely want to do that," Cowboys quarterback Zac Robinson said. "We're going to try to just keep doing what we always do."

The Red Raiders have a history of getting burned by the Cowboys' running game.

In the past five games, Oklahoma State has notched six touchdown runs of 46 yards or more, including a 95-yarder.

Texas Tech can't forget about the Cowboys' passing game because there's a standout sophomore receiver at Oklahoma State, too. Dez Bryant has as many touchdowns as Crabtree (15) and is four spots higher nationally in yards per game. Bryant is second at 117.11 yards to 102.33 for Crabtree, who ranks sixth.

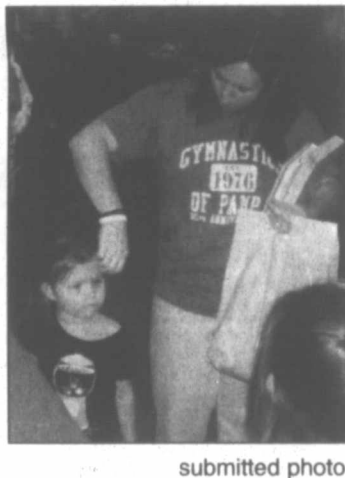

THC to offer oral history training

Water district accepting tree orders

Gray County Soil and Water Conservation District is currently accepting orders for wind-break and wildlife tree seedlings and shrubs now through March 4, 2009.

A wide variety of seedlings are available this year. Several species of potted conifers are available including Arborvitae, Austrian Pine, Pinyon Pine, Ponderosa Pine, Rocky Mountain Juniper, Scotch Pine and Spruce.

Bareroot hardwoods available include Aromatic Sumac, Bur Oak, Caragana, Catalpa, Chokeberry, Cotoneaster, Desert Willow, Golden Willow, Green Ash, Hackberry, Honeylocust, Hybrid Cottonwood, Lilac, Live Oak, Lombardy Poplar, Nanking Cherry, Native Plum, Pecan, Sand Cherry, Sawtooth Oak, Siberian Elm and Smooth Sumac.

In addition to the tree seedlings, the district will offer a variety of larger trees including hardwoods, fruit trees, evergreens and shrubs in 1-, 3-, 5-, 10- and 15-gallon sizes.

The seedlings will arrive at the district office at the end of March. Officials urge tree orders be submitted as soon as possible as many species sell-out rather quickly.

The expected delivery date for larger trees is the end of April 2009.

The conservation tree program is designed to offer tree seedlings at a nominal cost with an eye towards controlling erosion, enhancing wildlife and protecting cropland, feedlots and buildings.

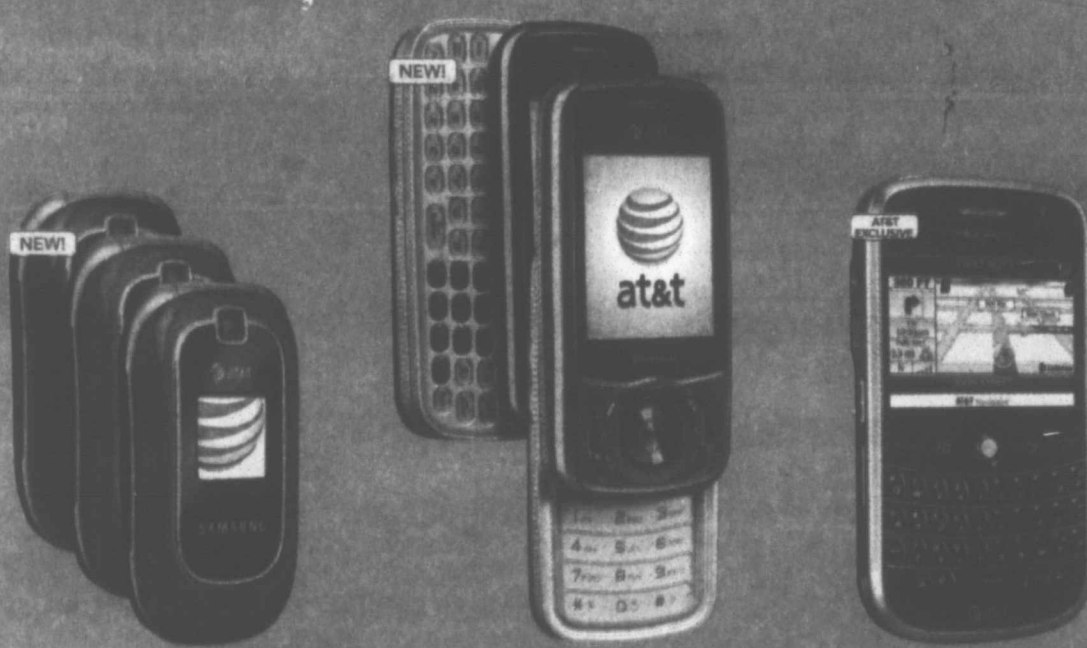
