



San Antonio Express-News on new 911 screening policy:

Paramedics respond to thousands of emergency calls annually that don't require their life-saving skills. Those unnecessary dispatches, the Express-News reported, cost the City of San Antonio \$1.4 million each year. And they allocate overburdened paramedics to minor incidents at the expense of victims of real emergencies.

The solution seems so simple, you might wonder why it hasn't been tried before.

Fire Chief Charles Hood has instituted a new program under which ambulances will only be dispatched for emergency calls when they are actually needed, such as situations involving more than minor injuries or where a patient requires transportation to a hospital.

If you have a minor injury, you're not out of luck. Firefighters, who are trained to offer basic medical care, will still respond to all scenes. And Hood announced an effort to put more paramedics on fire trucks.

"If you truly need an ambulance," he told the newspaper, "you're going to get an ambulance. But we're just keeping those units available for more serious incidents."

They key to making the new system work is the public. In order to screen 911 calls for real emergencies, dispatchers need more data.

Too often when reporting an accident or incident, a 911 caller hangs up

without providing important information. If the prioritization of emergency services is going to succeed, callers will need to stay on the line long enough for dispatchers to make a meaningful evaluation.

When in doubt, the fire chief said, dispatchers will send an ambulance. "We're always going to err on the side of the patient."

that is being conducted. Extension cords can easily over heat. If possible, don't use them at all and keep the original cord in its own socket.

Smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detecors both need to be checked throughout the year, but especially during winter. Make sure the detectors have fresh batteries. Gas increases occur in the winter as most people begin to use gas heaters. Check all vents because blocked vents can lead to a build up of carbon monoxide, which can lead to poison effecting the brain or death.

When driving in winter conditions, make sure the car has antifreeze that is up to date and make sure all battery terminals are functional. Clean off windshields for a clean view while driving, and scrape windows throughoughly. When going on a trip, Courtney said make sure the car has a winter emergency kit that includes a candle, blankets.





Oprah hoax fools Victoria school

VICTORIA, Texas (AP) — School officials and a student who successfully battled a lifethreatening illness spent six months thinking Oprah Winfrey was coming to Victoria to tell the eighth-grade girl's story.

It turns out they were victims of an apparent hoax.

The buzz started in April when Victoria school district officials received a packet that appeared to come from "The "Oprah Winfrey Show." In it, they were invited to be part of a project that focused on schools and students, said district spokeswoman Diane Boyett.

Follow-up e-mails led school officials to believe they were negotiating for the use of the school and the need for publicity releases for children

involved in the filming, Boyett said. But one of the key purported correspondents by email or mail was a former Winfrey executive producer who hadn't produced a show in five years, Winfrey spokeswoman Angela DePaul said in Thursday's editions of the Victoria Advocate.

No one from the school district actually spoke with Harpo staff members, Boyett said.

DePaul said Winfrey wasn't coming to Victoria to film a show.

"Nor had she planned to," DePaul said.

The apparent hoax fell apart when claims of connections to Children's Miracle Network, which grants wishes for sick children, turned out to

Genesis House is a residential program serving Pampa and area youth since 1971. Genesis House first opened its door to girls in June 1971 and added a home for boys in 1975. Genesis House offers out-patient substance abuse treatment for local and area youth who are struggling with drug and alcohol issues. The outpatient program consists of an eight-week, 16-session Park program. course that meets twice weekly.

Genesis House has gone through a transition over the past year, moving away from a residential substance abuse facility to more of a group home environment, story describes the journey

The first time Miss T was confronted about some of her negative behavior she escalated to the point of yelling, swearing and threatening to run away. Afterwards, she was found curled up, hiding in her closet.

Genesis House staff began to impress upon Miss T the importance of good social and coping skills which at first she did not like. She became stubborn and refused to complete an assignment on the topic.

She was confronted several times over her negative behaviors, with her handling each one a little more appropriately, as she progressed in the program. She slowly improved her basic social and coping skills. She began to share her feelings in groups and in individual sessions with her counselor.

She was enrolled in Pampa High School. The Genesis House staff placed particular emphasis on the importance of education. When any of her grades fell below a 'C,' she was assigned an additional hour of study time until her grades improved.

She had started writing poetry prior to coming to Genesis House to express her feelings. Most of the poetry was morbid and depressing, but she showed talent and enjoyed writing. Eventually, she used her poetry to build on her self-

esteem instead of using it primarily as emotional relief.

Miss T was awarded an Academic Achievement Award in English from PHS. She also chose to remain at Genesis House after her 18th birthday to complete the school year. She considered staying an additional year to complete her senior year of school, but she felt the need to return to her elderly great-grandmother's home to help take care of her. Her great-grandmother's health had deteriorated while Miss T was at Genesis House.

Due to her history of abusing drugs, Miss T was placed in the Genesis House Outpatient Program for Substance Abuse. She completed the program successfully. Before leaving Genesis House, Miss began to talk about completing her education and living a drug-free lifestyle due to her improved decision-making and basic




