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Firecrackers in the Classroom

I met a man the other day who had a firecracker fingers and I dropped it and it school and it reminded me of something my father did when he was a teenager. He exploded a firecracker in class one day and nobody told on him. My dad was well liked and respected by his fellow students and graduated as class valedictorian. If the teacher ever knew who popped that cracker, they never did anything about it.

The man I met was Vastine Jawn Jannsen of La Grange, where he was born and raised. People call him Big John.

When Big John was a junior in high school, he was made captain of the basketball team. It was a high honor because the school system in La Grange had just consolidated several rural schools and brought those students in, so it was a real challenge to make the squad.

The team won most of its games because of the number of players. The roster listed seventeen members and the coach played five at a time. When one group of five got tired, the coach sent in another five.

"It kind of made my head big to be captain," says Big John.

One day after the Christmas holidays Big John was sitting in study hall when a classmate pulled out firecracker. He told Big John "I bet you a dollar you won't light it.

Big John took the challenge. He planned to light it, throw it on the floor real fast and step on it before it exploded. That way, he would still win the bet. It didn't work out that way.



Keeping Kids Safe: Children Cars and Heat April is National Child Abuse **Prevention Month**

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The West Texas heat is definitely upon us! Each year, we hear news reports of children dying from heat strokes after being left in hot cars. SAFE KIDS reports that 30 children died in 1999 after being trapped in parked cars in the searing heat. In Texas, this is a problem throughout the year, but especially in the spring and summer. Texas has a law that prohibits children being left unattended in cars.

Temperatures in cars soar quickly. When the outside temperature is 93 degrees Fahrenheit, even with a window cracked, the temperature inside a car can reach 125 degrees in just 20 minutes. It can reach 140 degrees in 40 minutes. In these extreme conditions, children can die or suffer a permanent disability in a matter of minutes.

The National SAFE KIDS Campaign, warns parents to be especially careful about their children's safety on says when temperatures are 80 degrees or higher. They offer the following safety precautions:

- Keep cars locked at all times, even in the garage or driveway.
- Teach children not to play in or around cars.
- Never leave your child in an unattended car, even with the windows down.
- Always make sure that all child passengers have left the car.
- If your child gets locked inside a car, get him/her out and call the EMS immediately (806-759-5111).
- Make sure you check the temperature of the car-seat surface and safety belt buckles

before restraining you children in the car.

- Use a light covering to shade the seat of your parked car. Consider using windshield shades in front and back windows.
- Be wary of childresistant locks. Teach older children how to disable the driver's door locks if they become trapped in a car.

Car trunks can be especially hazardous! Children can get in, but can't always get out.

- Keep the trunk of your car locked at all times, especially when parked in the driveway or near the home.
- Keep the rear fold-down seats closed to help prevent kids from getting into the trunk from inside the car.
- ٠ Put car keys out of children's reach and sight.
- If not already equipped, contact your automobile dealership about getting your vehicle retrofitted with release trunk a mechanism.

Financial need will not necessarily be a criterion for consideration; however, financial need may be considered by the selection committee.




Financial need will not necessarily be a criterion for consideration; however, financial need may be considered by the Selection Committee.

This Arbor Day, Plant a Dogwood Tree for your Dog

Doghouses – while essential for keeping Fido dry during summer thunderstorms (and winder snowstorms) – don't give much relief from the heat. In fact, a doghouse can actually act like an oven, trapping hot air inside. Last summer, PETA conducted an informal test of

temperatures inside doghouses on hot days. On a day when the temperature in the sun reached 89 degrees, the temperature inside the doghouse was 88 degrees – just one degree cooler. Meanwhile, the temperature in the shade was 80 degrees – a difference of nearly 10 degrees. On a 98-degree day, the temperature inside the doghouse was actually higher - 100 degrees – while the temperature in the shade was 90 degrees.

Trees not only provide shade, they actually cool the air, through the release of moisture from their leaves. Studies have shown that neighborhoods with lots of trees can have temperatures

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as much as 12 degrees lower than treeless areas.

Here are some of the other benefits of planting trees, courtesy of the National Arbor Day Foundation:

- A tree windbreak can lower home heating bills up to 30%.
- Shade trees planted east and west of your home can cut cooling costs 15 to 35%.

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- Trees remove air pollution by lowering air temperature, through respiration, and by retaining particulates.
- Trees can increase the property value of your home 15% or more.
- Trees support many generations of birds and other wildlife.

So do your dog – and yourself- a favor this Arbor Day by planting trees.


the Air Force Academy's claim s as for the National Championbund ship. Air Force captured its t to third consecutive national the boxing team championship.
