## Alcohol Awareness Month Bring Startling Statistics of Teenage Drinking:

- $76 \%$ of young men are reported as being current drinkers.
- Girls who are sexually abused are twice as likely to develop drinking problems later.
The above statistics are cause enough for alarm but when you figure in that premature deaths resulting from alcohol and/or drugs total more than 132,000 per year with nearly $3 / 4$ 's of these deaths were from alcohol

## Firecrackers in the Classroom

I met a man the other day who had a firecracker experience while in high school and it reminded me of something my father did when he was a teenager. He exploded a firecracker in class one day and nobody told on him. My dad was well liked and respected by his fellow students and graduated as class valedictorian. If the teacher ever knew who popped that cracker, they never did anything about it.
The man I met was Vastine Jawn Jannsen of La Grange, where he was born and raised. People call him Big John.
When Big John was a junior in high school, he was made captain of the basketball team. It was a high honor because the school system in La Grange had just consolidated several rural schools and brought those students in, so it was a real challenge to make the squad.
The team won most of its games because of the number of players. The roster listed seventeen members and the coach played five at a time. When one group of five got tired, the coach sent in another five.
"It kind of made my head big to be captain," says Big John.
One day after the Christmas holidays Big John was sitting in study hall when a classmate pulled out a firecracker. He told Big John "I bet you a dollar you won't light it."
Big John took the challenge. He planned to light it, throw it on the floor real fast and step on it before it exploded. That way, he would still win the bet. It didn't work out that way.
"When I lit it, it burned my fingers and I dropped it and it went off. That building was glass and steel and made a perfect echo chamber. It was a loud boom that went back and forth about three times, ricocheting off the walls."
But luck was with him. People thought it was an explosion in the chemistry lab and Big John talked that up because he didn't want to get caught. "Those days they used a board. And they hit pretty hard. We had a superintendent that went crazy when he was giving somebody a paddling."
In a few days, interest in the incident faded. John was feeling confident that he had pulled a good one. Then the superintendent called John into his office. "He told me he was going to expel me from school during mid-term exams. That would bust me out of basketball automatically because I couldn't make the grades without taking the tests. I asked him if he had anything else. He told me he had the board. I told him to get out."
The superintendent gave Big John a severe beating. "I was bruised from may fanny to may ankles. If that happened today, they'd put him in jail."

John didn't tell his parents. "I didn't think they would

## Keeping Kids Safe: Children Cars and Heat <br> April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month

The West Texas heat is definitely upon us! Each year, we hear news reports of children dying from heat strokes after being left in hot cars. SAFE KIDS reports that 30 children died in 1999 after being trapped in parked cars in the searing heat. In Texas, this is a problem throughout the year, but especially in the spring and summer. Texas has a law that prohibits children being left unattended in cars.
Temperatures in cars soar quickly. When the outside temperature is 93 degrees Fahrenheit, even with a window cracked, the temperature inside a car can reach 125 degrees in just 20 minutes. It can reach 140 degrees in 40 minutes. In these extreme conditions, children can die or suffer a permanent disability in a matter of minutes.
The National SAFE KIDS Campaign, warns parents to be especially careful about their children's safety on says when temperatures are 80 degrees or higher. They offer the following safety precautions:

- Keep cars locked at all times, even in the garage or driveway. Teach children not to play in or around cars. Never leave your child in an unattended car, even with the windows down.
Always make sure that all child passengers have left the car.
If your child gets locked inside a car, get him/her out and call the EMS immediately (806-7595111).

Make sure you check the temperature of the car-seat surface and safety belt buckles
before restraining you children in the car

- Use a light covering to shade the seat of your parked car. Consider using windshield shades in front and back windows.
- Be wary of childresistant locks. Teach older children how to disable the driver's door locks if they become trapped in a car.
Car trunks can be especially hazardous! Children can get in, but can't always get out.
- Keep the trunk of your car locked at all times, especially when parked in the driveway or near the home.
- Keep the rear fold-down seats closed to help prevent kids from getting into the trunk from inside the car.
- Put car keys out of children's reach and sight.

automobile dealership about getting your vehicle retrofitted with a trunk release mechanism.

Potential recipients must be a member in good standing of the current Borden County High School graduating class or must be a previous graduate of Borden County High School.
Candidates must attend a state-accredited/Southern Association accredited college, university, or post-secondary institution to be eligible for consideration. The Selection Committee will have sole authority to determine the candidate's eligibility status related to the post-secondary institution to be attended.
Financial need will not necessarily be a criterion for consideration; however, financial need may be considered by the Selection Committee.
Members of the Porter family will have no input into the selection process. Complete selection authority has been delegated to the Selection Committee, and the Committee has the authority to waive all rules, regulations and formalities in order to select the candidates that the Committee feels is most appropriate. The selection process is a subjective task that will be left to the discretion of the J. Pat Porter Scholarship Selection Committee in order to select a person that the Committee feels is a dignification of the positive attributes that were exhibited by the late J. Pat Porter.

temperatures inside doghouses on hot days. On a day when the temperature in the sun reached 89 degrees, the temperature inside the doghouse was 88 degrees just one degree cooler. Meanwhile, the temperature in the shade was 80 degrees a difference of nearly 10
