Comptroller tours Panhandle

Combs tells Pampans Texas is in pretty good shape

Susan Combs is not running for governor.

In Pampa to talk about the Texas economy, Combs said Monday that while Governor Rick Perry and U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchinson have indicated they will run for governor in 2010, she intends to pop some popcorn, take a sit and watch the debate unfold.

"I'm running for reelection," she said. Combs, formerly the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture and a twoterm state representative, is the Texas Comptroller of Accounts.

As such, she will tell the state legislature what they have to spend when they begin their biennial session in January at the

Capitol in Austin. She indicated that while there are still some unknowns, the legislature should have the money to conduct the state's business.

Combs said Texas has about \$2 billion in the general revenue fund, but the costs from Hurricane Ike may end up costing that much.

"We don't now what Ike is going to cost the state," she said. "I'm predicting that it may be about \$2 billion."

There is another fund, she said, dedicated to property tax relief that has about \$3 billion, but there is another \$6.8 billion in the state's rainy day fund. The rainy day revenue comes from oil

severance taxes.

can be used if two-thirds of the legislature decides to use that money," Combs said.

Funds from the new business tax, she said, have been disappointing.


Originally, it was expected to bring in about \$5.9 billion a year. "It has not done so this first year," Combs said "It's going to net out about \$4.5 billion."







expenses, like Ike, are one-time expenses. They are not recurring expenses, so she's predicting that the legislature will tap into the rainy day fund.

Combs said that the Texas economy is better than any other state in the Union.

She said that back in the early 1980s, the oil boom went bust.

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We lost about 250,000 jobs out of the oil patch,' Combs said.

After that the state moved to diversify its economy.

That decision, she said, is now paying dividends.

"The State of Texas has the most diverse economy of the top five states," Combs said. "That's been a tremendous help."

She said that in the 1990s, legislators like Warren Chisum, Pampa's state representative, took a look at the litigation climate in the state and proceeded with tort reform.

"That has moved ahead very successfully," she said.

She said the state also looked at the regulatory climate in the state and took a rational approach that gave people notice in advance to make changes in the environmental processes

"We must have clean air, clean soil and clean water," she said.

Most recently, Combs said the state avoided mortgage sub-prime problems that has consumed other parts of the county.

"Because we didn't," she said, "you could actually buy a house and not have to have a strange sub-prime shoehorn to get you into it.

Combs said the Texas economy is the envy of high. That is up two percent from a year ago. Housing starts are down, although she said she was talking to a builder in Amarillo

6.7 percent, a 15-year

Monday who said lots of housing were being built there.

"Oil is down to about \$46 a barrel," Combs said.

In 1999, she said, it was \$19 a barrel. "The tipping point is

about \$50 a barrel," she said.

Below \$50, consumers are happy, but producers can't make a living.

Above \$50, she said it helps the state because of the additional jobs the sector creates.

She said that sales taxes serve as a weather vane for how the economy in the state is doing.

"In Texas," Combs said, "we've had some amazing years."

She said that two years ago, the state experienced a year-to-year growth of 12 percent. Last year, it was a growth of 11 percent.

"Now," Combs said, 'we're down to about six percent."

The point, she said, is the state's sales tax numbers are not negative.

"We're still up from the previous year," Combs said. "We're not as high up."

Some states are down 20 or 30 or 40 percent, she said.

'We're still slightly up," Combs said.

Sales taxes account for about 60 to 65 percent of the state's tax revenue.

Combs said the data her office has been getting indicates that consumers are buying less expensive items and are shopping at large discount stores instead of mall specialty inter mix gay and rain

"That's not so good,"" she admitted.

DENISON, Texas (AP) - Storms damaged or destroyed more than 20 homes and knocked out power to at least 4,000 customers, but most electricity was restored by Tuesday.

One person, in the Collinsville area, suffered minor injuries in the violent weather late Monday, authorities said.

Denison Police Lt. Billy Shaw told The Associated Press that "it did appear to be a tornado, by looking at the damage.

National Weather Service representatives planned to review the damage to confirm whether there was a tornado.

Shaw estimated two or three homes were destroyed in the Denison area.

"Numerous roofs are gone," Shaw said.

The unmarked intersections of Pampa

The fist column I ever of my own near death wrote for the Pampa News was about things I had been learning since I moved here. One of those things was about the directional challenges I face, living in a city without mountains and only Hobart to lead my way. Now, having lived here a few months I realize the joke was on me. It seems that unless you were born here, no one can really know where they are going thanks to the unmarked intersections of Pampa.

Many streets and intersections go unmarked in two ways. Some streets that I have come across have no street sign to kindly remind a driver of their location. Other streets go unmarked in a much worse way, by having no traffic signs to inform a driver to stop or yield. Pampa has some of the most naked street intersections I have ever seen.

Thanks to these intersections, I, along with I'm sure many other Pampans, have stories about near accidents or complete driving confusion. When I was a junior in high school I wrote a research paper about near death experiences (NDE). I recorded a story my dad told me about how he almost drowned and had a NDE. I shared the recording with the class, but now, thanks to these shifty intersections, I can report that I have had two

experiences and no longer need to rely on my dad's encounter. Maybe the intersecare unmarked tions

found, street names matter. Working for a newspaper requires a lot of driving to a lot of unknown places, unknown to me at least. Even more, when driving on these mischievous streets, it is good to know which car will be required to yield or stop at an intersection. I think that most people who have been here long enough have probably become aware of what intersections have stop signs and street names and do not. But, for newcomers like me, we assume we have the right away, a costly assumption that lead to my NDE. I was driving casually down some street that is nameless, or at least marked like it is name-

less, when a Texas-size

truck came furrowing

down the street my way. I didn't quiver to the enormity of the truck, but instead I kept on my slightly over the limit speed down the street. As I sung loudly in my economical Toyota Camry, I realized he wasn't slowing down either. I gave a healthy honk, but he



apparently was singing loudly in his truck too because he still didn't waiver. A part of me was exhilarated at the game of unplanned chicken, but then I started thinking about the way the truck would leave unwanted grill marks on my silver painting so I swerved. He swerved too, and then honked, and followed quickly with a hand gesture.

After I calmed down and realized that the hand gesture probably wasn't something personal, I started thinking about the incident and wondering who was at blame. Fearing it was me being distracted in my singing state, I re-traced the intersection. Sure enough, we were both at blame, or the intersection is at blame. It was unmarked. No stop

sign, no yield sign, no "prepare for unplanned chicken" sign. How does an intersection simply go unmarked?

A long standing weird goal of mine (there are many) is to name a street. Not that I don't enjoy my job, but I would likely leave it in a hurry if I could be appointed chairmen of the "street naming" committee (if there is such a thing). I like street names and neighborhoods themed after trees, or writers, or even M.K. Brown. Even more, I want to live on a street that has an easy to spell name, not like Acacia or Becknell that you have to spell out every time you tell someone where you live. The dream has evolved since being in Pampa though. Now, I simply want to see every street named and marked properly.

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It probably sounds like a pathetic dream but the problem is not only annoying and strange, but also dangerous. Who's to blame when an accident happens and no stop signs are around to be responsible? I'm a mediocre driver to say the best. While I have a few speeding tickets under my belt, I've been able to go accident free up to this point. However, these unmarked intersections have been enough to make me worry that I probably won't be able to pull off this good fortune much longer.

Family says Blackwater defendant wanted to become police officer

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) -Donald Ball, a 26-year-old decorated former Marine, was the only Blackwater Worldwide defendant allowed to keep a gun after his arrest on Monday. Ball packs a .40caliber Glock as a justice-court bailiff.

"I'm not interested in unduly burdening Mr. Ball," said federal Magistrate Paul Warner.

Warner said he was making an exception for Ball, one of five men charged with manslaughter in the 2007 shooting on a busy Baghdad street that left 17 Iraqis dead. Assistant Attorney General Patrick Rowan said evidence in the case, however, could only prove the guards fatally shot 14, atthough he left open the possibility of future charges.

The five defendants were released without bond, and were set to plead not guilty Jan. 6 in Washington.

Ball, of West Valley City, Utah, declined comment on the advice of his lawyers, but his family members had plenty to say.

"Those things they're saying about manslaughter should not be used in the same sentence as Don. It just shouldn't. It's wrong," said his mother, Karen Ball, of West Jordan, Utah.

"It hurts these boys to think that the government has turned on them," she told reporters.

Donald Ball was a veteran of three Iraq tours before he joined Blackwater.

Ball's mother said her son was "the guy protecting us" and a man who wouldn't want to hurt anyone.

NY State Police intensify search for would-be dancer from Texas

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y. (AP) -State police searched woods, trash bins and a septic system Monday near the home of a convicted sex offender who left a nightclub last week with a woman who hasn't been seen since.

State police Capt. Wayne Olson said several women have come forward with information about the man, 23-year-old Michael Mele, who has a record of sex crimes committed in the northern suburbs of New York City. Olson declined to elaborate on what the women told investigators.

Police had publicly requested that women who knew Mele come forward, given his history of sex offenses.

The missing woman, 25-year-old Laura Garza, was a newly transplanted New Yorker who had left a Texas border town with dreams of becoming a dancer.

She met Mele last week at the Marquee nightclub in Manhattan. They left together early Wednesday and were last seen a couple of hours later in his Infiniti sport utility vehicle, 70 miles north of Manhattan and not far from his Wallkill apartment.

On Monday, state police were still searching Mele's SUV, his apartment and the surrounding area, but there was no sign of Garza, Olson said.

AUSTIN (AP) - Authorities searched Monday night for the person who opened fire at a new restaurant in Travis County, killing an employee and then fled in a car.

The Steiner Ranch Steakhouse was closed at the time of the Monday afternoon shooting in the Steiner Ranch subdivision.

DEAR ABBY: I hope "Mother With a Secret" (Sept. 3) will speak to her children about the halfbrother they don't know about.

I was given up for adoption at birth and was raised by a wonderful mom and dad. After my oldest son was born, I wanted more information about my birth parents' history. My parents understood and helped me obtain the information. It has now been 26 years since I reunited with my birth mother and six half-siblings.

Although my birth mother had not told anyone about me before I contacted her, by the time I met her in person, she had told all her children about me. The sky didn't fall, and the earth didn't crumble. Instead, we became friends, sisters and brothers -- all of whom I love dearly.

As it turned out, I inherited a disease that both my biological parents

have. I found out only because I asked to be tested after they told me. Because I was diagnosed early, I will be fine. Some secrets should not be LUCKY kept. DAUGHTER

DEAR LUCKY: I agree. I have always advocated for an adopted child's right to know if he or she has a genetic predisposition to any illnesses.

While you were "lucky," readers' opinions on the subject were mixed. Read on:

DEAR ABBY: Except for some medical need to know, have you considered that the adopted child may not have been told about the adoption, or that he might not WANT to be found? As an adoptee, I have been approached by strangers claiming kinship. I know enough about my irresponsible birth parents to not want to know any of

their kin, no matter how "respectable" they may seem. Not all of us want to be found. -- 'OLD CURMUDGEON' IN OREGON

DEAR ABBY: While I was moving my ill mother from her home to live with me in another state, she told me that Dad was not my birth father. I was stunned. I asked a lot of questions, and thought I had learned everything I needed to know.



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

Naked Lady Justice statue unveiled in San Antonio

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — Justice may be blind, but in San Antonio it's naked, too.

A restored 4-foot-tall blindfolded Lady Justice statue in a fountain was on display Monday in front of the Bexar (BAYR) County Courthouse.

Ceremonies were held Sunday night to unveil the renovated statue, with a sword in one hand and scales in the other, atop a globe as part of the J.L. Mott Fountain.

The return of the statue and fountain/is part of a \$2.6 million courthouse complex restoration project involving the Hidalgo Foundation.

Bexar County bought the statue and fountain from J.L. Mott of New York in 1896, but offered the display to San Antonio in 1927 to make room for a courthouse expansion.

Vandals in 1997 damaged the original Lady Justice statue and the fountain. Restoration was led by sculptor Gilbert Barrera, who says that in Greek mythology, "bareness and naturalness were a sign of purity, goodness and justice."

Beagle fills unlikely role of mom to kitten

SIERRA VISTA, Ariz. (AP) ,Äî In Ralph and Marie Brymer's household, an unlikely relationship has developed between a 10-month-old beagle and an 8-week-old kitten.

Within days of bringing home the kitten, Satchel, about two weeks ago from the Huachuca City Animal Control Shelter, Ralph caught the beagle, Bandit, nursing Satchel.

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"It's really mellowed her out."

The Sierra Vista Animal Care and Control Center is opening its doors Wednesday and featuring pets up for adoption. Adoptions are the highlight of this night, though the center's officers and volunteers will offer light refreshments set out and holiday favors.

The shelter will also hold a raffle for three gift baskets ,Äî two for furry friends and one for people.
