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
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
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Hearings slated on tuition increase

CANYON — Officials at West Texas A&M University have scheduled five public hearings to address a proposed increase in designated tuition for the 2009-2010 academic year.

Each of the five public hearings will take place at the Jack B. Kelley Student Center on cam-

The first hearing is at 11:30 a.m. Thursday, Dec. 11. Two other hearings will be Tuesday, Jan 20 at 11:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. The final two hearings are scheduled for Tuesday, Feb. 3 at 11:30 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Designated tuition is a general use fee authorized by the Texas Education Code that universities use as part of a student's total tuition costs.

WTAMU's designated tuition is \$86 per semester credit hour, which ranks below both the average and median of the designated tuition rates of the 35 public universities in Texas.

Xcel withdraws fuel surcharge plans

AMARILLO - Xcel Energy has withdrawn a planned fuel-cost surcharge that would have raised average residential bills in Texas by 6.2 percent beginning in January.

Lower natural gas prices and the addition of the new, efficient Hobbs Generating Station to the power generation mix are projected to largely offset the company's past fuel cost under-collections, said David Eves, president and CEO of Southwestern Public Service Company, an Xcel Energy company.

Overall bills in Texas were reduced by more than 8 percent at the beginning of November when the company lowered its fuel cost factor the rate at which the company charges customers

Plea agreements

The 223rd Judicial District Court approved many plea agreements for second and third degree felony offenses yesterday, with the honorable Judge Lee Waters Presiding.

In the case of Texas vs. Dirk Gellert, Gellert pleaded guilty to failure to attend drug program, failure to perform community service, delinquent payments, failure to attend theft classes, and failure to report to probation supervision officer.

Gellert reached a plea agreement with the district attorney to serve five

years probation, and confinement for 16 months in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, institutional division. Gellert also was ordered to pay restitution.

Charles Fredrick Sidelnik pleaded guilty to the third degree felony of possession of a controlled substance greater than 5 pounds but less than 50 pounds. Sidelnik was sentenced to five years probation and ordered to pay a fine of \$5,000. Sidelnik lives in the state of New York and the court approved the transfer of probation supervision to

Justin Allen Thomas pleaded guilty to two second degree felonies. In one charge for fraud using counterfeit \$20 bills on Jan. 24, 2008. Thomas reached a plea agreement with the DA to serve seven years probation, and pay \$2,000 in fines. On a second charge, Thomas agreed to 10 years of probation and payment of another \$2,000 fine, and 240 hours of community serv-

Larry Dean Fernandez pleaded guilty to money laundering that had allegedly occurred on

was placed on probation, but failed to complete substance abuse evaluation, and failed to report to the probation supervising officer within 48 hours of an arrest. In September of 2008, Fernandez was also charged with battery and domestic violence. He pleaded true to possession/consumption of marijuana, being delinquent in paying court cost, and failure to perform community service. A plea agreement was reached with the DA for five years of probation, and payment of \$1,500 in fines.

pleaded guilty to a third degree felony charge of possession of marijuana greater than four ounces but less than 5 pounds and to possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine) greater than one gram, but less than four grams. To the first charge, Spencer agreed to pay \$2,000 in fines (\$1,000 at the time of agreement and the other \$1,000 over probation time), serve three years of probation, and 120 hours of community service. To the second charge, Spencer pleaded

At the time, however, the company was still millions of dollars behind on collecting past fuel costs because of natural gas price spikes in 2007 and mid 2008. Since the November fuel factor was set, prices have fallen even further and the new Hobbs plant began delivering even more savings. The net result is expected to eliminate the need for the previously scheduled surcharge.

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Customers will continue paying a fuel surcharge that was placed on bills in April 2008, but that surcharge will expire at the end of March, further reducing the amount customers will pay for fuel in the foreseeable future.

An average residential customer in Texas using 1,000 kilowatt-hours (kWh) per month is now paying 9.4 cents per kWh, or \$94.42 month. In October that same customer was paying 10.9 cents per kWh, or \$109.60 per month.

overall bills, we can't overlook the impact of Hobbs the new Generating Station, which is 40 percent more efficient than our existing fleet of gas-fired plants," Eves said. "This plant not only reduces natural gas use on our system, but it also reduces greenhouse gas emissions and groundwa-

ter use." Eves pointed out that changes in fuel costs are separate from a proposal to increase Texas base rates, which recover (non-fuel) operational and maintenance expenses and increased investment in infrastructure. One such investment is the Hobbs plant, which increases base rate-recoverable costs, but decreases fuel consumption.

Texas communities served by Xcel Energy, along with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, are in the process of examining the base rate proposal. A decision on base rate changes could come by the end of the year or in early 2009.

Eves said fuel charges are pass-through costs that pay for the coal and natural gas used to produce electric energy at Energy-owned power plants in the area, along with wind power and energy purchased from outside providers.

Dione Nicole Wood pleaded guilty to possession of controlled substance, (methamphetamine) greater than one gram but less than four grams, and possession of marijuana greater than four ounces and less than five pounds. On the first charge, Wood agreed to serve five years probation and pay \$2,000 in fines, and on the second charge, Wood agreed to serve three years probation and pay \$2,000 in fines. Woods is a resident of California, and transfer or probation supervision to the state of California was approved.

Miguel A. Villegas, Villegas pleaded guilty to a second degree felony for threatening an alleged victim and shooting their direction with a firearm, and use of a deadly weapon in March of 2008. Villegas reached a plea agreement with the DA and agreed to serve four years of probation, pay \$3,000 in fines, and to have no contact with the victim or the families. The state agreed not to pursue a case with an alleged second victim for

the guilty plea. Mary Tiffany Martin pleaded guilty to possession of marijuana more than 5 pounds but less than 20 pounds in February of 2008. Martin reached an agreement with the DA to serve six years of probation, and pay \$4,000 in fines, \$2,000 at the time of agreement, and \$2,000 over probation time. Martin also agreed to pay \$140 in restitution fees, and serve 240 hours of community service.

John David Richards pleaded guilty to possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine) less than one gram on March 14, 2007, and driving while intoxicated in October of 2002.

Richards reached a plea agreement with the DA for four years of probation, payment of \$4,000 in fines, \$140 in restitution fees, and to serve 240 hours of community serv-

Robert Allen Robinson pleaded guilty to criminal mischief, where property was damaged and tires punctured causing more than \$1,500 but less than \$20,00 in damage. Robinson reached a plea agreement with the DA to serve three years of probation, pay \$1,000 in fines, \$4,998.74 in restitution, and serve 120 hours of community serv-

Simeon Xavier Dunn pleaded guilty to possession of cocaine greater than one gram, but less than four grams. Dunn agreed to serve four years probation, pay \$3,000 in fines, pay \$140 in restitution, and serve 160 hours of community service.

Stephen Jerald Pierce pleaded guilty to secure execution of document by deception greater than \$1,500 less than \$20,000. Pierce had previously pleaded guilty to this charge and at the time reached a plea agreement with the DA to serve three years of deferred probation. That probation was violated, and he was reached a new agreement to serve five years probation, pay about \$1,500 in fines, and serve 120 hours of community service.

For years, families have bought in bulk to save money, and it makes sense for state government to have the same option.

Second Initiative: Texas Transparency Check-Up

With the rollout of a new Web site, Texas opportunity to see how well their local governments stack up in offering online access to financial information.

When you know what you are spending, you know how to spend better. Our office is committed to seeing that philosophy spread to every level of government. In the age of the Internet, there is seldom a reason to not publish public information online.

Third Initiative: Single Set of Books

To shine more light on state agency bookkeeping, beyond our Where the Money Goes online expenditure database, we are pursuing an initiative to introduce more uniformity in Texas government accounting.

Today, we have many sets of books of sometimes conflicting accounting data across Texas state agencies, a recipe for duplication that can make accurate bookkeeping an enormous challenge. With the Single Set of Books Initiative, our office will work with agencies to present a report to the Legislature on ways that state accounting systems and processes can be made more accurate and useful in decision making.

Transparency wise spending are important during the best of times, and absolutely essential during an uncertain economy when there are no dollars to waste. We need to be sure we show the same common sense, resourcefulness and thrift when spending money as the hardworking citizens of the Lone Star State.

Mumbai terrorist attacks: India's trauma will be measured not just by the scale of the attacks on Mumbai, but by their duration. For nearly three days, security forces battled terrorists for control of sites in the heart of the financial capital of the world's largest democracy. Compared to the instant horror of a suicide bombing, a paramilitary death squad murders in slow motion. The time it took to defeat the gunmen brought a new

dimension to the fight against terrorism. On this occasion, it truly looked like war.

To Indian authorities, it also looks like invasion. New Delhi was quick to blame "elements linked to Pakistan." ...

India's terrible misfortune is to have been singled out as a collaborator in the imagined Western con-

spiracy against Muslims. ... The enormous challenge for India's government is to pursue justice for the victims of jihadi violence and simultaneously to embrace the cause of justice for those Muslims in whose name the jihadis claim to act. In other words, New Delhi must find a way to make the defeat of terrorism a common cause among its citizens regardless of faith. ...

India was targeted not just because it is a country with an unhappy Muslim minority, but because it is a democracy undergoing rapid and potentially destabilising economic change, and with a history of inter-faith violence. But India is also a regional beacon of cultural openness and political freedom. The terrorists clearly think the bastion is brittle and can be blown apart. They must be proved wrong.

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





Yankees general manager Brian Cashman left the winter meetings Tuesday and traveled to the San Francisco area to meet with the pitcher and his wife.



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


