

Local car dealers speak out on bailout by David Bowser staff reporter

The leaders of Pampa's two major automobile dealerships appear to disagree on more than who makes better cars. The debate revolves around what the government should do to keep those manufacturers turning out those cars.

Friday, the Senate turned down a \$14 billion in bridge loans to the Big Three automobile manufacturers.

The Senate ended debate on the measure with U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, R-Texas, voting against the loans, U.S. Sen, John Cornyn, R-Texas, did not vote.

Pampa's Congressman Mac Thornberry voted against the measure that the House passed Wednesday, saying that there were better alternatives including a prepackaged bankruptcy provision.

Saturday morning, the White House indicated that it was taking another look at the situation.

"It looks like it's going to happen, unfortunately," Harry Fisher, general manager of Fenton Motor Companyin Pampa, said of what he termed a bail out. "We were kind of hoping that they would not."

Speaking at a meeting with Texas Comptroller of Public Accounts Susan Combs last Tuesday, Fisher said he thought the manufacturers needed to restructure and bring prices down to where vehicles are affordable. He said he fears that all

a loan will do is prolong the agony of an injured automobile sector.

Fisher said that he and quite a few friends of his have written letters to Congress urging that any action be tied to selling the vehicles. If it's not, he said, they shouldn't proceed.

"Right now, the manufacturers are holding us dealers over a barrel saying they're not going to give us rebates or send us cars if we don't order cars," Fisher said.

Richard Stowers, presi-

dent of Culberson-Stowers auto dealership, said he has not contacted Thornberry or Sens. Hutchison and Cornyn concerning the issue.

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"I'm really inclined to do so now," Stowers said, "just because I'm tired of the situation."

He said the message he wants to get across to Congress is to do what is best for the country.

"Let's forget about what in my best interest and in your best interest,"

Several scams have been circulating through Pampa recently, which have the potential for criminal charges to be brought upon anyone who is subject.

Pampa officer Stormy McCullar issued warnings to Pampa citizens to check materials that come in the mail carefully, especially checks.

lent check scams includes a letter and a check. The letter attached with the checks can say different things, McCullar said, but usually it indicates that the recipient has won the sum of money on the check, but will need to pay back some of it.

McCullar explained that any person should be able to tell that a check is valid or not by looking at it's account number, the bank on the check, and the authorized signature

Rising behind a cloud cover Friday night, the moon was only a dull glow, but as the clouds dissipated, moonlight filled the night sky as the moon reached its closest point to the Earth this year. The moon averages about 238,855 miles from Earth, Friday night it was just 221,560 miles away. This made the moon 14 percent bigger in the night sky and about 30 percent brighter than some other full moons during the year, according to NASA.

They'll consider an eight-inch well for Robert Clark about six miles north of Miami.

The Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District board will meet at 9 a.m., Wednesday, in the district offices at 201 W. Third Street in White Deer.

The season will end with a tournament in the first week of March.





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

Stowers said. "What's in our best interest."

He said that the situation appears to have been a political split rather than one based on logic and economics.

Fisher said car sales are down in Pampa about 10 percent this last quarter. Car sales were up about four percent prior to that, he said.

He said a lot of that has to do with the credit market.

"All of our lenders have tightened up," Fisher said.

Tarrant County (Fort Worth) vehicle sales, Combs said, are down 42 percent. Harris County (Houston) vehicle sales, she said, are also way down.

Stowers said that his clients are not large credit risks. He said that in September, some 60 percent of his dealership sales were cash. They did not require financing.

"That 60 percent was a good volume of business," Stowers said. "It was a lot of people. We're still fortunate to be where we're at."

Still, he said that in talking with other dealers around the panhandle, the area is feeling the impact. "This has all been a perfect storm," Stowers said. He said it's not a case

of pointing fingers and finding blame. It's a case of a confluence of circumstances. Stowers said the problem needs to be identified and fixed so the country can move on, but he worries that this may be too big to fix.

"It is strictly a bridge loan," Stowers said. "Everything would be repaid."

Culberson-Stowers auto dealership has been in business since 1927. From 1927 to 1930, the dealership was on Kingsmill. They moved in 1930 to Ballard. In 1965, they moved to their present location on Hobart.

If things go well, they're planning a new building to house the dealership at their present location, but among the problems they face is whether General Motors will still be operating.

While he's been urged to take sides on both sides of the financial issues surrounding the three major automobile manufacturers, Stowers said he is philosophically opposed to a bail out, but that may be beside the point.

A long time civic supporter, Stowers said he's always looked at such situations as not is what in his best interest, but as what is in the best interest of society as a whole.

If society prospers, Stowers thinks he, too, will prosper.

Stowers said that for weeks he's heard a Republican Senator from Alabama that GM and Chrysler need to stand on their own. But he points out that the State of Alabama provided money to build Hyundai and Mercedes factories to employ people in that state, and other states have spent public funds for incentives on attracting and keeping foreign automobile manufacturers and employing a local workforce.

Credit markets, he said, may have initiated a lot of the problems.

As recently as last summer, 57 percent of GM vehicles were financed by GMAC.

"Last month," he said, "it was six percent."

Stowers said GMAC has not been a part of his dealership's finance sources for the better part of 10 years.

"GMAC's capital inability has no effect on us," Stowers said.

Right now, Fisher said,

"I sold an 2008 Dodge truck this morning for \$14,200. Six months ago, it would have brought \$18,000," Fisher said, "and I made money doing it." He said he's getting

the authorized signature on the check. All of these can be checked by calling the bank listed on the check. If any of them are not valid, the check is usually a scam.

"If you aren't expecting a check in the mail, don't cash it," McCullar said.

Some scams are also circulating in the form of money orders from Wal-Mart or other large companies. If the money order is not expected, call the source and confirm that it is valid, McCullar said.


Criminal charges can be brought upon anyone who falls for the scams because the person will be responsible for coming up with any money they have cashed and spent. McCullar said that people sometimes have to take out loans to make up for the spent money.



The New York Times, on the mortgage crisis and minorities:

The mortgage crisis that has placed millions of Americans at risk of losing their homes has been especially devastating for black and Hispanic borrowers and their families. It seems clear at this point that minorities were more likely than whites to be steered into risky, high-priced loans even when researchers controlled for such crucial factors as income, loan size and location.

The Congress that takes office in January can start to deal with this problem by strengthening fairlending laws, especially the Community Reinvestment Act, which encourages fair, sound lending practices while requiring banks to lend, invest and open branches in low- and moderate-income areas.

... A classic discrimination study by the (National Community Reinvestment Coalition) found that black and Hispanic people who posed as borrowers received significantly worse treatment and were offered costlier, less-attractive loans more often than whites even though minority testers had been given more attractive financial profiles, including better credit standings and employment tenures. ...

... While lenders are required to report to the federal government such things as race, gender, census tract, amount of loan and income, they omit credit score data. By guarding the single most important statistic used in making loans, the lenders have given themselves a

ready shield against charges of discrimination. ...

Los Angeles Times, on Presidentelect Barack Obama and Guantanamo Bay:

Call it the otherother mess Barack Obama will inherit from George W. Bush.

It is the military tribunal system that the administration set up at Guantanamo Bay to try accused al-Qaida members and other suspected Islamic terrorists ,Aî and, particularly, the five men in U.S. hands who, by their own admissions, organized and coordinated the Sept. 11 attacks. ...

Why did administration officials create such an unwieldy, unconstitutional structure? 40s hearthrob Van Johnson dies at 92

NEW YORK (AP) - Van Johnson, whose boy-next-door wholesomeness made him a popular Hollywood star in the '40s and '50s with such films as "30 Seconds over Tokyo," "A Guy Named Joe" and "The Caine Mutiny," died Friday of natural causes. He was 92.

Johnson died at Tappan Zee Manor, an assisted living center in Nyack, N.Y., said Wendy Bleisweiss, a close friend

He was born Charles Van

Dell Johnson on Aug. 25, 1916, in Newport, R.I., where his father was a real estate salesman. From his earliest years he was fascinated by the touring companies that played in Newport theaters, and after high school he announced his intention to try his luck in New York. He arrived in 1934 with \$5 and his belongings packed in a straw suitcase

With his tall, athletic build, handsome. freckled face and sunny personality, the redhaired Johnson starred opposite Esther Williams, June Allyson, Elizabeth Taylor and others during his two decades under contract to MGM.

He proved to be a versatile actor, equally at home with comedies ("The Bride Goes Wild," "Too Young to Kiss"), war movies ("Go for Broke," "Command Decision"), musicals ("Thrill of a Romance," "Brigadoon") and dramas ("State of the Union," "Madame Curie").

During the height of his popularity, Johnson was cast most often as the all-American boy. He played a real-life flier who lost a leg in a crash after the bombing of Japan in "30 Seconds Over Tokyo." He was a writer in love with a wealthy American girl (Taylor) in "The Last Time I Saw Paris." He appeared as a post-Civil War farmer in "The Romance of Rosy Ridge.

More recently, he had a small role in 1985 as a movie actor in Woody Allen's "The Purple Rose of Cairo."


