Below Freezing Weather Causes Several Deaths

By United Press International — Zero weather greeted the New Year as far south as Oklahoma today as a large, cold air mass caused several deaths around the nation.

Below freezing readings dipped as far as Texas, New York and the Northwest had snow on the ground across the Eastern seaboard.

Below zero readings were in parts of the nation as far as the Great Plains states. By early morning in the Dakotas were in the 20-below zero range.

In Sibley, Iowa, the frozen body of a 25-year-old farmer was found Tuesday by his son. Authorities said he had died of "simple exhaustion" after his pickup truck became stalled in a snowdrift.

The announcement promoted a snowdrift in the region. (See WEATHER, Page 3)

Population Growth Shows Small Gain

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Census Bureau has estimated that there were only 2,006,000 more Americans on hand to welcome 1969 than 1968—the smallest gain since 1945.

The overall increase in U.S. population, the bureau said, was a 1 per cent gain over last New Year's Day and was the slowest growth rate since the 1940 record low of .92 per cent.

It estimated that there are 202,254,000 Americans today. The bureau said the population increase over 1967 was the result of approximately 3,487,000 births, 1,929,000 deaths and 448,000 immigration arrivals.

The bureau also said that the average statistical American in 1969 will continue to grow younger, move to the West and the South, set up a household earlier and have smaller families.

In 1968 the average American was 27.7 years old—almost two years younger than he was in 1960.

Women continue to outlive men, the bureau said. The average age of women is 29 years while the average man is but 26.4 years of age.

There were nearly 50 million family units in the United States in 1968 and the Census Bureau said the number of people in those units declined from 3.3 in 1964 to 3.2 last year.

The decline in family size was attributed to the falling birth rate. The bureau said that the United States had a birth rate of 17.9 babies per 1,000 persons in 1967 and it estimated that the figures for 1968 and 1969 will be even lower.

Americans continued to be on the move during 1968. The bureau reported, with the West and South drawing the most people. It said that although the West continued to have the fastest growth rate, the South got the most new people.

Western states drew 5.2 million people in 1968 for a growth rate of 19.4 per cent. He called his parents at 4 o'clock apparently remained in. (See GROWTH, Page 2)

Soviets Try Out Supersonic Plane

MOSCOW (UPI)—The Soviet Union zoomed into the new year with the world's first test flight of a supersonic passenger jetliner.

By getting the TU144 airborne on the last day of 1968, designer Alexei Tupolev jested. "We have outstripped our British and French colleagues working on Concorde by at least a year."

Concorde is the joint Anglo-French supersonic airliner expected to be test flown within a few months.

The Soviet designers were considered to be at least six years ahead of the Americans. Boeing recently scrapped designs for a swing-wing B707 and started redesigning on the basis of a fixed wing.

Tupolev, son of famed, 80-year-old designer Andrei Tupolev, said the TU144 took off "smoothly and quickly gained height" from an airport near Moscow on Tuesday. Its takeoff run was 25 seconds.

Tension In Mideast Mounting From Raid, Bombing Attempts

By United Press International — Israeli security forces kept a New Year's day vigil in Jerusalem today after bombs were discovered in a school bus and a milk bottle near the city.

An Army special disposal unit dismantled a bomb containing six pounds of explosive found Tuesday under a seat of a bus carrying 75 Jewish school children to Jerusalem.

Earlier in the day an Israeli grocer discovered a pencil shaped time-bomb in a milk bottle in front of his shop on the main Jaffa road leading to the city.

The bomb discoveries came at the end of a day of mounting tension in the Middle East following the Israeli commando raid on Beirut International Airport Saturday night.

The U.N. Security Council Tuesday unanimously condemned Israel for the revenge attack at Beirut airport and said Lebanon was entitled to "appropriate redress" for the 13 civil aircraft destroyed in the attack.

Arab governments accused Israel of carrying out new raids and provocations. Jordan charged that Israeli jets Tuesday strafed a Jordanian military vehicle on the Jordanian side of the truce line, killing three Jordanian soldiers and wounding two others.

Lebanon protested that Israeli jet fighters flew over southern Lebanon Tuesday, accused Israel of massing ground troops along the Israeli-Lebanese frontier and called for an international embargo on the sale of arms to Israel, including U.S. arms. (See TENSION, Page 3)

Israelis Reject Condemnation — UNITED NATIONS (UPI)—Israel today stood condemned by the U.N. Security Council for the commando raid against Beirut Airport. But Israel rejected the condemnation.

The 15-nation council unanimously adopted Tuesday a resolution that also contained a solemn warning to Israel that if such acts were to be repeated, the council would have to consider further steps.

It also said Lebanon is entitled to "appropriate redress" for the raid's \$50-to-\$100 million destruction of 13 Lebanese airliners. Israel announced the resolution ignored basic UN principles. Thus, it said, it was "inapplicable."

The council in daily debate over the Saturday raid since Sunday ignored a request from Israel that it also discuss the machinegun attack last week upon an Israeli airliner in Athens. The attack by two Lebanon-based Arab terrorists led to the Israeli raid on the airport.

The Council sided with Lebanon. But so vitriolic did anti-Israeli speeches become that the United States, leader of the original drive to condemn Israel for the raid, spoke up for Israel.

Prisoner of Viet Cong Rescued After Fourth Escape Attempt

Doctors Pronounce Them in Good Shape

SAIGON (UPI)—Viet Cong agents brought three American prisoners into a battlefield clearing today, wished them a "happy life" and released them to five U.S. doctors promised.

"We were sick of a lot of things," the prisoners told a U.S. Army doctor at the scene, and they said they didn't want to fight. They held apples which they said they hadn't stolen, and appeared weak and pale.

In light blue Communist prisoner uniforms, they swayed in yellow shower sandals, the three were taken immediately to a U.S. Army hospital where doctors pronounced them in good condition.

There they joined Maj. James Rowe, 30, of McAllen, Tex., who had been held by Viet Cong officers for a year. The first, after five years' captivity. He on Christmas Day, on the same day, was listed in good condition.

The release followed the beginning of a 40-minute broadcast at 9 a.m. Saigon time (7 p.m. EST) and then passed to an hour. The Viet Cong to drink beer, the Americans iced tea. Then, with a sweep of his arm, the Communist leader produced the three prisoners.

Czech President Warns Citizens Of Uneasy 1969

PRAGUE (UPI)—President Ludvik Svoboda today warned citizens of Soviet-occupied Czechoslovakia that 1969 "will not be easy, not without difficulties."

In a sober, almost homespun speech, Svoboda insisted that the nation's leadership could proceed only on "the approved course" developed in compromise with the Soviets.

The president said the ruling Communist party still is working out an active program based on the ill-fated April "action program" that brought in the night of the Red Army. He said the "approved course" was a way out for us from the present difficult situations.

Svoboda indirectly condemned pro-reform student demonstrations and worker strike threats when he said, "we may have different views as to what was good and what was bad, but what we all need most are not words but deeds. Today, fewer slogans, declarations and phrases are necessary, fewer loyalties to our aim, but more honest work."

He repeated the Czechoslovak policy that "we see the future of our country in socialism" and "we wish to develop mutually advantageous relations and friendship" with the Soviet Union and the other Communist-ruled nations.

"In these international conditions we shall even in the future practically apply the principle that our people are masters in their own country," he added in an allusion to the occupiers.

The president said 1968 "was not an easy year for anyone among us. It was not easy for me, either. All experiences and impressions still are fresh in our minds. Last year was also a year of great social criticism in our country, sometimes too passionate, sometimes excessive, but essentially positive criticism."

"We went through hard, very hard trials (in 1968) but we passed them bravely and honorably," Svoboda said. "We failed to avoid mistakes and inconsistencies. There was plenty of recklessness and we took little account of world developments and international context of our internal affairs."

Pampa still was quiet today. City, county and state offices were closed. Only merchandising stores open were those selling food. The various city banks were also closed.

Today was expected to be mostly quiet with most families eating traditional New Year's dinners with black-eyed peas and watching football bowl games.

The post office was closed except for box patrons. There was no residential mail delivery. Only special delivery mail was handled.

Public and parochial schools will resume classes tomorrow morning after the holiday period. College students' home for Christmas will begin their trek back to school during the weekend.

Pampans Enter Into New Year

Pampans moved into 1969 today after saying farewell to 1968 and welcoming the New Year last midnight.

The local New Year's Eve celebration was confined mostly to private parties and club dances.

There were watch parties in some churches. Scattered night spots had revelers until the 1 a.m. closing hour.

Police reported no out-of-hand disturbances. There were no major accidents in the city or county.

The ringing of bells, the cracking of gunfire and blasting of auto horns were heard as the clock pealed off the midnight hour. Radio and television stations broadcast "Auld Lang Syne" and a New Year was born.

There was no report up until noon today of arrival of the first Pampa baby of 1969. However, there were two possibilities of early arrivals.

Kremlin Chances:
Diplomatic circles in London say the new year may see some changes in the Kremlin. No changes is expected in the ruling troika of party chief Leonid Brezhnev, Premier Alexei Kosygin and President Nikolai Podgorny. But some of the other members of the Kremlin may be dropped or demoted, possibly including chief theoretician Mikhail Suslov who advised against an invasion of Czechoslovakia last August.

De Gaulle Shifts:
French government members say President Charles de Gaulle may send a high powered delegation to Washington for the Jan. 20 inauguration of President-elect Richard M. Nixon to press De Gaulle's little-publicized campaign to improve relations with the United States. Allied military quarters in Paris say meanwhile De Gaulle is coming under growing pressure from French military planners to drop his aloof attitude toward

close technical cooperation with NATO.
U.S.-Saigon Rift:
North Vietnamese and Viet Cong delegations to Paris appear confident that the rift between Washington and Saigon will be closed by the end of the year. Under the city's contract agreements, 7 fire calls were answered in Roberts County and one in Carson County during the year.

Peace Hopes:
United Nations peace envoy Gunnar Jarring may get more Soviet support in his quest for a Moscow say the Kremlin is aware that Jarring's time may be running out. But the Russians oppose an outbreak of large-scale hostilities that might involve the big powers.

Economic Struggle:
Indonesian President Suharto will announce details of the Indonesian five-year economic development plan on New Year's eve. Cabinet ministers in Jakarta have made known the state budget will be 80 per cent higher than last year, with 35 per cent to go to development projects and 65 per cent to routine government expenditures.

Argentine Arms:
Government officials in Buenos Aires hint that Argentina will continue to orient its arms purchases towards Europe rather than the United States. The government found out in 1966 that European nations are willing for Argentina to manufacture parts for arms it bought and nationalists prefer Argentine industry profit from this rather than for the country to buy the arms outright.

Chamber Warns Businessmen Of Trick Salesmen

The Pampa Chamber of Commerce today warned businessmen of the so-called "sob-story salesmen who try to win their orders for overpriced office supplies."

E. O. Wedgeworth, chamber manager, said business executives throughout the country have been victimized by name-dropping con-man who relate carefully rehearsed sob stories in an attempt to sell carbon paper and other office supplies.

According to the National Better Business Bureau, with which the local Chamber is affiliated through memberships, these itinerant salesmen often affect heavy foreign accents and usually drop the name of a highly placed executive in a corporation to support their sales pitch.

In their sympathy appeals they may claim they are trying to raise money to bring oppressed refugees to this country, or to return to a sick relative behind the Iron Curtain, or to help a friend liquidate the business of a deceased relative.

One salesman claimed that he was on his way to Vietnam to serve as an interpreter and had to liquidate his stock in a hurry. One young con man said he was "working his way through college" — the college being in Budapest.

NBBB said the salesmen claim their carbon paper is of top quality and may actually show samples of good quality paper. However, when orders arrive, the paper, unlike the samples, is invariably of inferior quality.

In some cases, where only small orders were given, large quantities of supplies were shipped, accompanied by appropriate bills and followed by high-pressure dunning.

NBBB said some salesmen recently were peddling ball point pens by the gross for 25 cents each, claiming a list price of 49 cents, and carbon paper at \$3 a box, supposedly worth \$4.75.

The National Bureau said businessmen victimized by the office supplies racket were otherwise prudent executives who allowed their misguided sympathy to override their sound judgment.

These executives, said NBBB, would be the first to advise others to let experienced purchasing agents buy office supplies from firms of reliability.

Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Television's New Year binge now brings us the King Orange jamboree parade from Miami, the Cotton Bowl festival parade from Dallas and the Tournament of Roses parade from Pasadena. Impressive? Well, it all depends on how you look at things.

My own feeling is that CBS-TV's Red Skelton, alone on stage, doing his classic pantomime of an old man watching a parade—and the flag going by—captures the spectacle and spirit of such events more than all the New Year's telecasts put together.

Skelton, through his artistry and genuinely heartfelt attachment to his subject, is able to enlarge the unseen parade beyond himself. When, however, it comes to the real thing on networks each New Year, the spectacles become almost puny as they are reduced to home screen size, and the presentations are so commercially oriented—so full of banal showbiz chatter—that the magic of innocence is destroyed.

Pleasant Development

Of course it is undoubtedly a pleasant development for persons remote from the scenes of the major parades to be able to watch them on television. But one can also, alas, almost feel the old-fashioned sense of person-slipping away as video once again mesmerizes does into becoming passive spectators.

At the risk of being corny, I feel sorry for the spectator whose knowledge of parades nowadays is strictly through video, and who has forgotten—or never felt—the exuberance of walking alongside a rousing parade, in small town or bit city.

hardy souls who turn out personally to see at least part of the parades in Pasadena, Dallas and Miami, and can taste and feel the events of the day instead of getting them completely second-hand through an electronic filter. For those of us sitting at home, there is no real sense of place in the New Year's Day Parades. Dallas might be Detroit or Chicago. Miami might be San Francisco or Salt Lake City. Just floats and bands and streets, and more of the same.

Wonderful Word

Wonderful words, however, can save almost any situation, and television's networks could do themselves—and us—a big favor by enlisting, as their parade narrators, persons whose sense of innocence is not so obviously gone. Anyone, for instance, who ever read Meyer Berger's rousing, yet lovely, New York newspaper stories about parades knows the value of a good heart as the guide such experiences.

Technically, television is incomparable. In the ratings, the parades do spectacularly well—so much so that we are now in the relatively absurd position of getting the Tournament of Roses parade on not one, but two of the three major networks, NBC-TV and CBS-TV. Yet, so far as I know, there are probably more idiotic complaints when the political conventions appear on two networks simultaneously.

So the parades have it made by all of television's commercial standards. Impressive? As I say. It all depends on how you look at things. And how much value you give to innocence, which after all, is the genuine soul of a parade.

Buckeyes, O.J. Ready For Rose

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI)—Undefeated Ohio State and once-tied University of Southern California were the opponents today in the 55th annual Rose Bowl football game.

It was a "dream bowl" game from the standpoint of 100,000 fans who battled for tickets and millions more who will be watching on television. Clear warm weather was in prospect for the 2 p.m. PST kickoff.

As befits the No. 1 team in the nation, Ohio State was a slight favorite by three points to climax a "dream" season with a Rose Bowl victory.

The Trojans had the game's superstar in O.J. Simpson, winner of the Heisman trophy and nearly every award a player can receive, but Notre Dame proved Simpson could be stopped by holding him to 55 yards. The Buckeyes think they can do as well.

Sophomore Dominated

The sophomore-dominated Ohio State team was the surprise of 1968 as it went through nine games without a defeat to capture the big ten championship, winding up the regular season with a stunning 50-14 victory over Michigan.

Southern California appeared headed for a possible national championship until the Trojans stumbled over the Irish. Playing a rugged schedule, the Trojans defeated three intersectional and six conference foes and then were held to the 21-21 tie by Notre Dame.

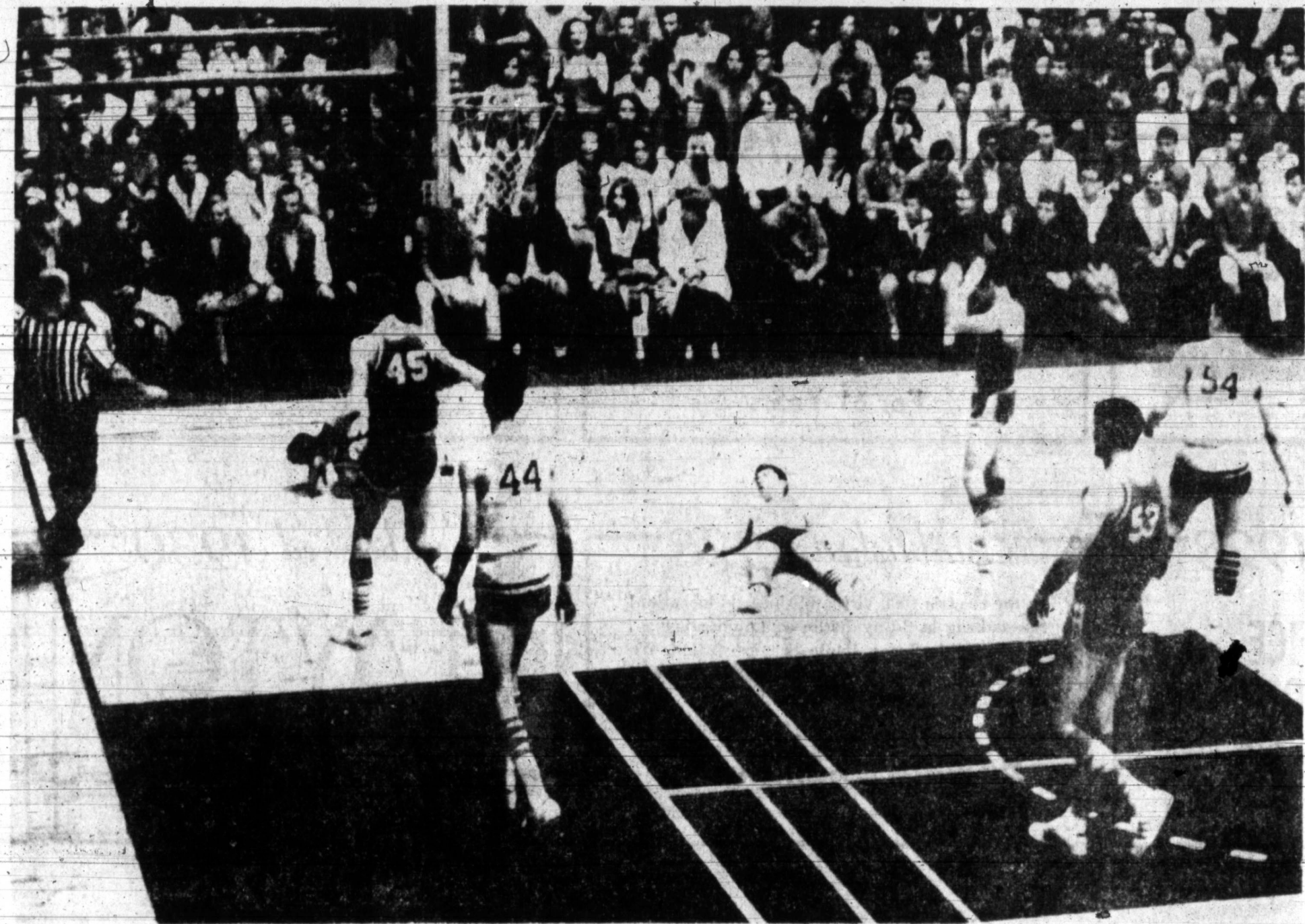
Basically, the teams employ similar types of offenses. Both feature powerful running backs and rollout quarterbacks. The big question was whether the Buckeyes can stop Simpson who gained 709 yards this season.

To do the job, Ohio State has the two best tackles in the big ten if not the nation in David Foley and Rufus Mayes. And Ohio State's defense has allowed their foes only 976 yards for the season. The Trojans gave up 1,576 yards rushing.

Top ball carrier for the Buckeyes is fullback Jim Otis who has gained 884 yards and coach Woody Hayes proclaimed proudly that the junior never quits driving.

The quarterback contest between Ohio State's Rex Kern and the Trojans' Steve Sogge also was expected to be a battle for individual honors. Kern, despite shoulder and back injuries, had an outstanding season. He gained 499 yards on the ground and passed for 371 yards and five touchdowns.

Sogge took to the air for 1,265 yards and eight touchdowns but made only 262 yards rushing.

This Kid's A Champ By Any Name

CHICAGO (NEA) — Nothing should be done to embarrass him, so let us call him Johnny. He calls himself Kid Chocolate.

In the early 1930s a flashy Cuban nicknamed Kid Chocolate held the featherweight and the junior lightweight championships. At the end of his ring career he returned to Havana. He has not been heard from since Castro grabbed power.

Some think he is dead.

Nat Fleischer, the 82-year-old boxing expert, said he last saw Kid Chocolate at a fight in Havana in 1959, shortly before Batista's regime collapsed.

"He was sickly," said Fleischer, "bent over and he walked with a cane. It's like he disappeared when Castro came. If the Kid was in America, we surely would know about it. He was extremely popular. It would be big news."

Those who know Johnny believe he is the original Kid Chocolate. That includes his employer, Johnny is a handyman in a night spot on Chicago's North Side. His boss recalls the time a few years back when a guy tried to break into the club.

"The Kid flattened him with one punch," the boss said. "Yep, he's still got the goods. And what a fine, warm, gentle guy he is. Does a great job

with this cat." He stuck his thumb in his chest. "So I popped him through the alley. That's how a rattlesnake do. He rattles. Woof, he hits you."

"When I was champ that was my motto: Lay 'im out, forget 'im. First preservation is the first law of nature."

Blaring music and smoky voices and crash of cash registers of the night, before hung heavy in the quiet of the club. Johnny wiped a long-stemmed glass and placed it upside down on the bar. It reflected dully in the mirror. He was asked about his days as champion.

"I forgets about it now," he said. "Do not like to talk about it. You start seeing it in your mind, and that is all you can think of. Drive you crazy, like it done Johnny Bratton."

"I was a big man then, but I didn't get the swell head. Use to like to do the cabaretting and good timing, though. My home was New Orleans, and them days I was always 'round Bourbon St. You hear about that place? I was friends with ol'

Chick Webb and Fatha Hines and Louis Armstrong and Count Basie. Member them?"

"I made some money the hard way, didn't graft, it like some of the others. Now I only associate with the poor class, 'cause I'm from the poor class. But some who makes it big forgets the little man. Some peoples don't look back. That's what is wrong with the world. When I sees the 'scrum', I toss 'em a few bucks and say, 'Enjoy it, boys.' Then I leave."

"They'll respect you and maybe later they will listen to you when you tell 'em about the good life."

"I got a little green saved up. Know what I'd like to do with it? Open a boys' camp. Yessir. Lecture the young-uns on clean living. Wouldn't that be somethin'?"

Later, Johnny admitted he was not the real Kid Chocolate, though he said he once was a boxer and used that name. Kid Chocolate was his idol. "People call me champ," he said, "and I only goes by what they call me."

Johnny was not a champion. Perhaps he should have been.

Hill coached the Wildcats from 1921-1952.

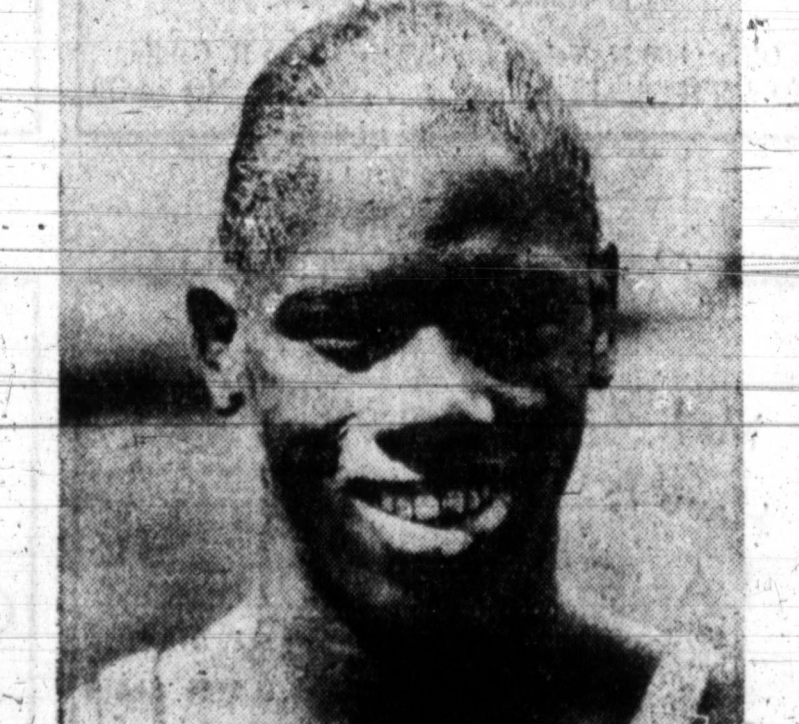

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SMU Edges Injured Sooners, 28-27

 HOUSTON (UPI) — Four young Southern Methodist line men should make the same New Year's resolution today—to protect Chuck Hixson at all cost in 1969.

Hixson, the SMU sophomore quarterback, has one of the most valuable right arms this side of Joe Namath and Bob Gibson. He threw for 3,103 yards during the regular season and 281 New Year's Eve to lead his Mustangs to a 28-27 victory over favored Oklahoma.

Four of the five interior offensive linemen charged with protecting Hixson return in 1969. They are center Stan Poulos, guards Kemp McMillan and Que Brittain and tackle Bill

Jackson. These four and senior tackle Terry May held off Oklahoma rushers 16 of the 17 times Hixson passed in the fourth quarter and allowed him to complete 40 of the 16 for two touchdowns and set up a third. Hixson passed 11 yards to all-America flanker Jerry Levias and 19 yards to end Ken Fleming for touchdowns and to fullback Pinky Clements for an all-important two-point conversion after the Levias touchdown.

He also set up SMU's other fourth quarter touchdown as the Mustangs came from a 14-6 deficit with 22 points in the quarter to win — the seventh time in eight victories this year they have come from behind.

Mike Richardson scored SMU's other touchdowns, one on an 18-yard run, the other on a one yard dive. Hixson set up the second score with a 21-yard pass to Levias to the eight and a pass interference penalty against Levias that put the ball on the one.

Oklahoma's Mickey Ripley

matched Hixson in scoring passes, but could not match the two point conversion. After Ripley threw 30 yards to split end Johnny Barr with 1:16 left in the game to make it 28-27, he tried to roll out and throw for the winning two points, but defensive end Mike Mitchell threw him out of bounds.

Oklahoma had another chance to score with 19 seconds remaining, but Bruce Derr missed a 34-yard field goal. It was wide to the left, with Derr kicking from a bad angle. He also missed two field goals in the first half.

Ripley's other touchdown pass was 22 yards to end Bob Denton on a believe it or not play. The ball deflected off one defender's hands through the arms of three others to the diving Denton in the end zone. Steve Owens, Oklahoma's

workhorse tailback, tossed a third touchdown pass for the Sooners, a 21-yarder to Barr in the third quarter. It was his third pass of Owens' college career and all three have gone for touchdowns.

Owens was the game's leading rusher with 122 yards in 36 carries. Richardson had 85 in 18 tries and Oklahoma quarterback Bob Warmack had 68 in nine attempts before suffering a knee injury in the second quarter.

Loss Of Warmack Hurt Oklahoma

'Bowl' Day Promises Plenty Of Action, Upsets

 Ohio State and Southern California, the nation's No. 1 and No. 2 teams during the 1968 college football season, were paired in the Rose Bowl today in a classic matchup highlighting the day's bowl activities.

A crowd of 100,000 at Pasadena, Calif. paid to see whether Ohio State, a three-point favorite, could hold Heisman trophy winner O.J. Simpson in check and hand the Trojans their first loss. Ohio State was unbeaten and untied during the season, while Southern California was unbeaten but tied by Notre Dame.

The kickoff was scheduled for 3:45 p.m. CST, three hours after the start of the Cotton Bowl game in Dallas, Tex., and the Sugar Bowl game in Miami, Fla. It added up to about nine hours of uninterrupted football for millions of TV fans.

The Cotton Bowl game together Texas and Tennessee, which finished the regular season with identical 8-

1-1 records. Texas was rated a 6½-favorite in a game expected to be played in frigid cold. It marked the first time since the Alabama game in 1967 that Tennessee went into a game as the underdog.

Fourth-ranked Georgia (8-0-2) and ninth-ranked Arkansas (9-1) were matched in the Sugar Bowl, where fair weather and temperatures in the low 40s were predicted. Georgia was a 7½-favorite—although both teams were led by sophomore quarterbacks—the Bulldogs by Mike Gavan and the Razorbacks by Bill Montgomery.

Undefeated Lions Penn State places its 10-0 record on the line tonight against a Kansas team which averaged 38 points a game while compiling a 9-1 record. The Nittany Lions, ranked third in the nation compared to a No. 6 ranking for Kansas, are 1½-point choices. Penn State's biggest problem is likely to be stopping Bobby Douglass, a left-handed quarterback who passed

for 3,832 yards this season. All four games offered the promise of exciting action by exceptionally good teams but the Ohio State-Southern California matchup was the most intriguing.

The key man in the game, of course, was Simpson, who gained a record 1,709 yards rushing over the season. An indestructible runner with exceptional balance and an explosive "second go" after he is hit, Simpson won all-America and player-of-the-year honors in addition to the Heisman Trophy.

Rex Kern, the quarterback, and Jim Otis, the fullback, were the key men in Ohio State's attack. Ohio State has long been noted for its "meat-grinder" offense but coach Woody Hayes departed from his usual custom in 1968 so that the Buckeyes boasted a well-balanced air and ground attack.

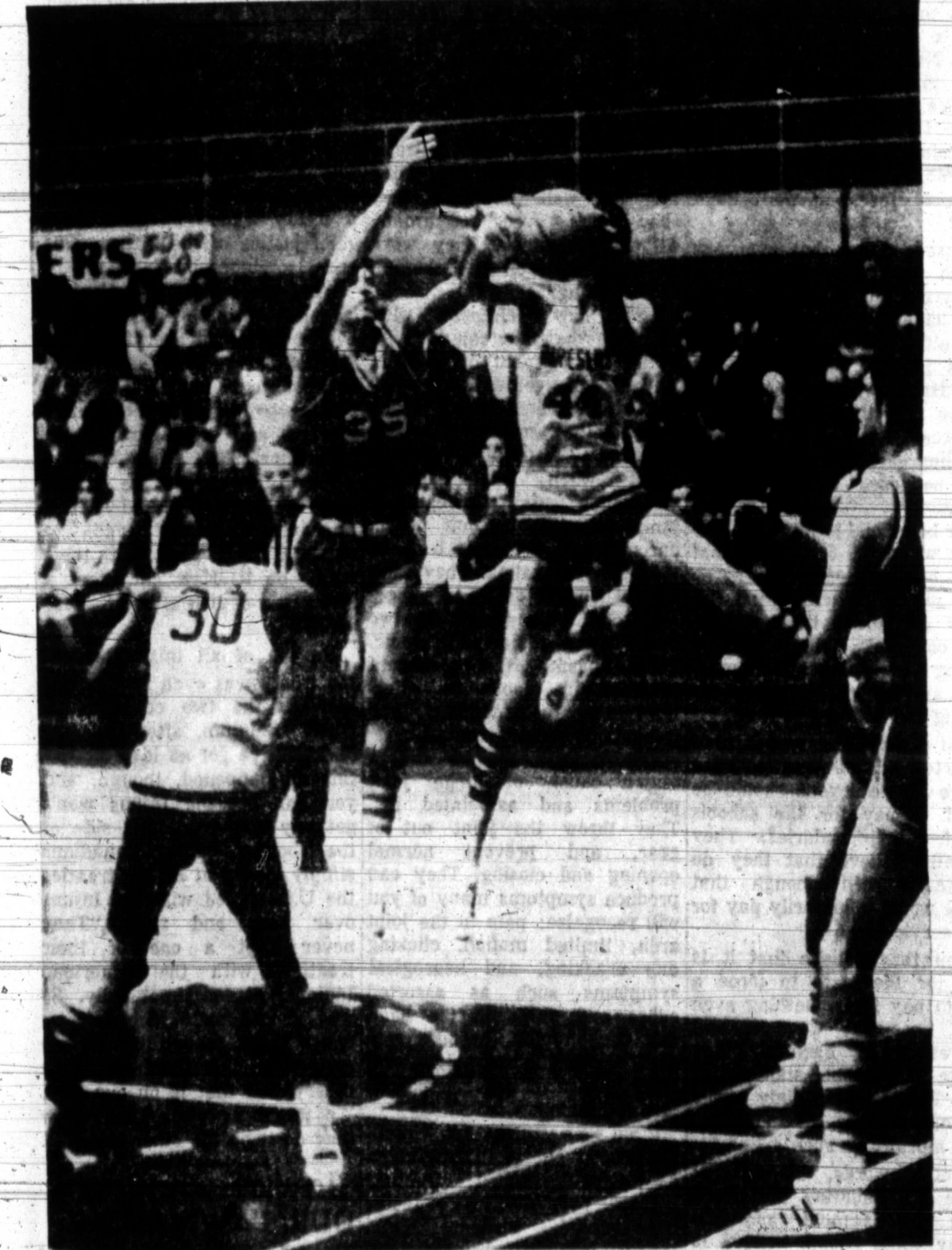

Congressional Inquiry Likely Into U.S.-German Developed Tank

WASHINGTON — The Army's MBT-70 (Main Battle Tank) may be the next major weapons system to become embroiled in intense and critical congressional inquiry.

Such a spotlighting by Congress could have touchy international overtones. The MBT, envisioned as the principal battle tank for the 1970s, is being jointly developed by the United States and West Germany.

The United States is said to want 1,000 to 1,500 of the new tanks to replace its M-60 tank. The Germans are believed planning for about 500 MBT-70s to supplant their Leopard tank.

Before Congress adjourned, a quiet inquiry into MBT costs and schedules was ordered by Rep. George H. Mahon, D-Tex., who heads the House Appropriations Committee and its defense subcommittee. Very little has been said in public about the matter so far.

Question Box

Driving Up The Cost

Federal government spending has increased \$10 billion a year since 1965. The White House blamed "the war." The Congress protested, "We've reduced expenditures to the bare bone." Let's see: Your federal government spent \$11.2 million to subsidize art; to poets to write poems, novelists to write novels to painters and sculptors to paint and sculpt, to undergraduate architects to study abroad.

Your federal government last year spent 400,000 of your dollars to purchase 1,000 TV sets "to send abroad."

208,741 of your dollars went to the Zuni Indians to teach them how to improve their jewelry business, though the Zunis have been doing a \$2 million-a-year jewelry business for many years.

Your tax dollars are financing a sobering-up station for alcoholics in Poland, a survey of husband-wife relationships in Israel and an archaeological program for Yugoslavia.

You are financing a neolithic excavation in Poland, a study of old metal-working crafts in Pakistan and a study of the behavior of elephants in Ceylon.

The National Institute of Health spent \$28,755 to study "changing patterns of Moslem family life."

members of congressional appropriations committees can give each only the most cursory examination.

I lacked the time necessary to sift those volumes; I am indebted to Jameson Campaigne, editor of the Indianapolis Star, and his research staff for culling this sampling of figures:

This is a perplexing problem for any President, any Congress. The bureaucracy has become so gargantuan that sifting, sorting and separating essential from nonessential expenditures is almost impossible.

President Johnson, forced by Congress to reduce government spending in exchange for a tax increase, ordered "percentage cuts off the top" in each department. Thus it was left to the head of each department to cull and cut. Immediately, of course there was vociferous and valid objection from some congressmen:

"You can't reduce the number of air-traffic controllers when we have more air traffic to control!"

"There were similar objections from enough departments so that Congress ended up reinstating most of the cuts the White House had ordered."

Thus we end up with bigger than ever budgets for such nondefense departments as Agriculture, Commerce, Health, Education and Welfare, Housing and Urban Development, Interior, State, Transportation, Treasury, General Services Administration, Civil Service, Office of Economic Opportunity and the U.S. Information Agency.

The situation is not hopeless. The new Nixon team even has some examples worth emulating. The heads of the FBI and the Passport Office have effected economies despite expanded activities. One of those administrators is a woman; the other is a very uncommon man.

The Mohawks up in Massena, N.Y. are blistered at the Canadian Gov't. They sat down on the international bridge, and held it for two hours. The police finally arrested 48 Injuns and set bail for each at \$200 berries.

It don't make any difference that the Mohawk reservation sets half on Canada and half on the U.S. or that they have a treaty signed by John Jay, chief justice of the U.S. in 1794 and also signed by Canada.

What matters is, that Canada is gettin hard up and wants to collect duties on everything the Injuns carry back and forth between their homes. Not only that, these Mohawks often intermarry and have families on both sides of the bridge.

When they cross the bridge they are stopped, asked if they are immigrants, and made to obtain a slip of paper with their status on it. Now ain't that a fine kettle of fish after all these years?

On top of all this nonsense, the treaty was even re-affirmed between the two countries in Ghent, Belgium, after the War of 1812. I've got an idea of why this all happened, though, and you can bet the Injuns won't get any help from this side of the border. The Canadians simply looked at all the treaties the U.S. signed with the Injuns over here and said, "They never kept a one of their treaties, with the American Indians, at least not fully. So why should we? Mebbe if we cause them enough trouble we can take this land of their reservation that is on our side. We might as well. That's how they do it on the other side."

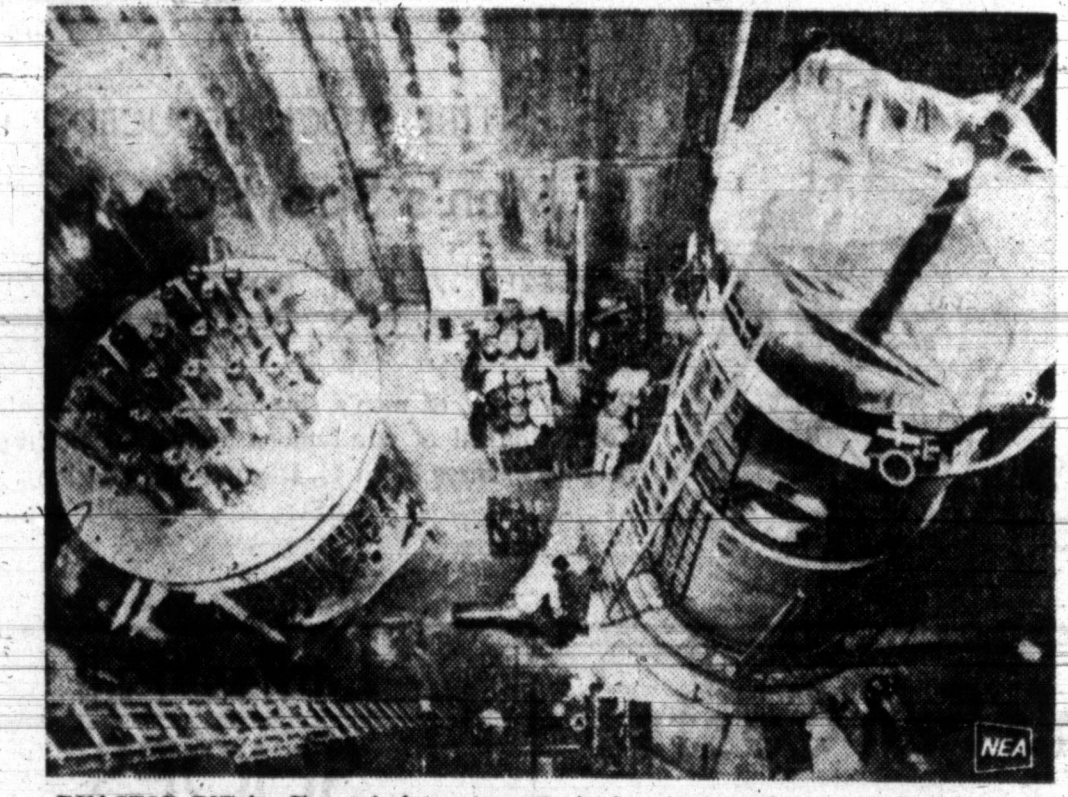

Electronics and mechanics had become such integral parts of daily life by 1922 that they had an impact on the arts. 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The Family Lawyer

Do-It-Yourself Lawyers
It was a story to warm the heart of the common man. An indignant motorist, handling his own case, fought a traffic ticket all the way to the state supreme court and won an acquittal.

In acting as his own lawyer he was within his rights. There is no legal requirement that you must have an attorney to represent you in the courtroom. As long as you are of age and mentally competent, you have the right to plead your own cause.

But the difficulties to be faced are formidable indeed. As the United States Supreme Court observed about a layman in court:

"He needs the aid of counsel lest he be the victim of over-zealous prosecutors of the law's complexity, or of his own ignorance or bewilderment."

Nor is the court required to guide the do-it-yourself lawyer through his difficulties. By and large, he is bound by the same basic rules as regular lawyers are.

"Otherwise," said one judge, "ignorance is rewarded."

To test the success of do-it-yourself lawyers, a study was made of thousands of personal injury claims in New York City. It showed that those who hired a lawyer collected almost 50 percent more money after paying the lawyer—than those who did not.

Why should anyone want to try his own case? Reasons sometimes given are "I couldn't afford a legal fee" or "I didn't know any lawyers."

But those reasons apply far less today than ever before. There has been a vast expansion—still going on—in the availability of legal services. For those who cannot pay, free legal help is now offered at more than 800 Legal Aid or neighborhood OEO offices and defender organizations—an increase of 200 in the last year.

For those who can pay but don't know a lawyer, there are Lawyer Referral Service offices in more than 252 cities and towns. These agencies (or the local bar association) will arrange a try-out interview with a qualified attorney for a modest fee.

Anyone interested in protecting his rights ought to explore these possibilities before striking out on his own. As a federal judge warned: "A party who tries his own case is like a man cutting his own hair—in a poor position to appraise what he is doing."
