Congress Gives Nixon Authority

House and Senate conferees he has said should be used only have agreed to give President Nixon unlimited authority to impose gasoline rationing. without the consent of Congress. Hoping to have emergency

energy legislation on President Nixon's desk before they adjourn for the holiday, the conferees also agreed Tuesday to allow the President to order other energy conservation measures until June 30, subject only to veto by either house of Congress. After June 30, the president would have to seek specific legislation for any further energy conservation moves except gasoline rationing

The conferees, trying to iron out differences between House and Senate measures to deal with the energy crisis, worked on the measure until midnight and scheduled another meeting this morning to work out compromises on other portions of the bill

As a result of lower speed limits imposed because of the energy crisis the Teamsters union demanded Tuesday that its national contract with the trucking industry be reopened Truck drivers are paid by the mile, and Teamsters President Frank Fitzsimmons, invoking a wage reopener clause in the contract, said the union will seek to raise the per-mile pay of long-haul drivers. The lower speed limits were imposed to save fuel.

The conferees left unresolved several major areas of the bill. including provisions dealing with limits on "windfall" profits for the oil industry, the bulk of environmental sections and the highly emotional issue of an amendment banning the use of fuel for busing children to desegregated schools.

Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., author of the Senate version of the bill, said the antibusing provision would be retained in the measure "only over my dead body.

Farmers Fuel Supplies 'Tight

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The supply situation for farm gasoline and diesel fuel remains. "tight to very tight" the Agriculture Department says in a weekly report

In a summary for the week. ending Dec. 14, the department said the northeast is experiencing more of a shortage of gasoline than diesel. The reverse is true in the central states, it said, adding that the situation is critical for both products in the Mountain and Western states

The department said farmers having the most difficulty getting fuel are those who have not vet completed harvest, who are preparing land for spring crops. or who engage in year - round farming such as dairying.

Some farmers have expressed concern that there will not be enough fuel for spring work because distributors have notified them that their supplies will be reduced, the report said.

Scotland Yard Searches For Bombings Suspects

LONDON (UPI) - Scotland Yard today issued composite pictures of two suspected members of the Irish Republican Army (IRA) it believes responsible for at least one of a string of terror bombings in

Former Vice President Spiro T. Agnew, his voice barely audible, pleaded with a three-judge state court Tuesday "not to strip me of my means of livelihood" by forbidding him to practice law in Maryland Instead, Agnew, in a 12

minute presentation, suggested that he be suspended temporarily "I can resume a useful place

in the practice of law after my suspension." Agnew said in a low voice. "The practice of law means quite a lot to me. I want to return at some later date to bring credit to my practice and to the courts. Agnew, who was governor of that Agnew be forbidden to

Boyle Sentenced To Jail

eral Judge Charles Richev today ordered W. A. "Tony" Boyle jailed immediately for making illegal political contributions from United Mine Workers funds, but reduced the sentence of the former UMW president from five to three

Boyle, 72 is expected to be taken to a federal prison hospital at Springfield, Mo. He has been in a hospital since a suicide attempt Sept. 24.

Richey originally sentenced Boyle to the five-year term, and said he was reducing the period because of his health. The pale Boyle, defeated a year ago for re-election as UMW head, sat throughout the hearing in a wheelchair

Boyle uttered only a few words during the proceeding. telling Richev he had nothing to say on his own behalf

Richey denied a defense motion to suspend the prison sentence entirely, saying he hoped word would go out "that at least one judge does not view crimes of this type as anything less than serious.

Under terms of the sentence. Boyle will become eligible shortly for parole after paying \$130,000 in fines and repaying \$49.250 to the union.

Finney Trying To Push Oil Unitization Bill Again ply and try to find a scapegoat

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) - Rep. Dave Finney, D-Fort Worth. said Tuesday he is ready to reintroduce an oil field unitization bill during the present special session of the legislature.

All he needs, he said, is Gov Dolph Briscoe's permission. The governor has repeatedly "declined to allow unitization and other energy-related bills to be considered in the session he called to lower speed limits. Finney's bill, which passed

the House during the regular session but died in the Senate would allow operators and royalty owners of an oil field to unitize-pool their resources by injecting water or gas into the ground - in order to recover more oil. Seventy-five per cent of the owners and operators must agree to the plan before a field can be unitized, while present regulations require nearly unanimous consent.

The House Natural Resources Committee listened to 70 minutes of testimony on the bill Tuesday. Sherman Hunt, president of

the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association, said unitization would mean billions of additional barrels of oil recovered from existing Texas fields. We can work together and



A visitor to the officially theistic nation of the Son iet Union at Christmastime would see very little that differs from western nations' customs.

Colored lights, decorated trees, gift - laden shoppers and images of a bearded, befurred old gentleman delivering toys from a sleigh . . these and other traditional sights greet the eye.



The one significant difference is that the Russian Christmas has been shorn of any religious meaning, officially at least.

There are some isolated instances of Christian worship in Russia at this time. The Russian Orthodox Christmas is celebrated with an 8-hour Xmas Mass at midnight in a few churches. This mass takes place, not on December 25, but on January 7, in conformity with the old Julian calendar. To this day the Mass is splendid, involving all the rich orthodox pageantry of the 19th century, in the days of the Czars. It still brings thousands of faithful souls into cathedrals to partici-

The richest mass is sung in Moscow's Yelokhovsky (Epiphany) Cathedral. Six priests, resplendently garbed, sing the Slavonic ritual in rich baritone and bass voices with accompaniment from two choirs high in a loft

above the altar. Usually the plain, rough attire of many of the worshippers contrasts sharply with the splendor of the altar and the priests.

That this line of argument constitutes the soundest political game - strategy possible toward shoring up a beleaguered presidency is, as I say, borne out by recent history. With the exceptions of Harry Truman in his Korean venture and the riverboat gambler. Lyndon B. Johnson, who lingered at the table too long in Vietnam, the record indicates that American Presidents who play the foreign policy number for public opinion stakes are generally favored to beat the house (or, as the case may be, the Senate)

Thus. Rule One in the game of presidential public opinion roulette: However strictly accountable we hold our chief executives for domestic mistakes. Americans are tolerant of foreign policy goofs. The Bay of Pigs aftermath is only one example. Other cases bearing out the point involve foreign policy disasters occurring even at fever - pitch moments during national political campaigns.

the 1956 election, the Eisenhower administration was struck with a double dose of foreign policy trouble. War in the Middle East, involving three U.S. allies and the Freedom Fighter uprising in Hungary.

Milt Eisenhower Joins Chuck Percy's '76 Club

By ROBERT S. ALLEN WASHINGTON - It is now official! Illinois's liberal Republican Sen. Charles Percy is definitely a 1976 candidate for President.

He has been coy about that. professing to be still undecided. But Dr. Milton Eisenhower. brother of the late President. has removed any uncertainty about it in a way that can't be refuted.

With Percy's approval. Eisenhower has sent out a widely circulated letter soliciting funds for a campaign committee set up by Percy.

It's the so-called "Exploratory Committee" ostensibly to take political soundings for Percy. Actually. it's a campaign organization to handle his presidential electioneering without his appearing to be an active candidate.

To finance this wily operation. Eisenhower is spearheading a drive to raise what he describes as a "modest sum" - \$90,000

In specifying this amount. Eisenhower pointedly notes it's only a "starter.

How much more will be sought later is carefully not indicated. Certainly if Percy stays in the arena, a lot more will be required - especially against such well - heeled rivals as Gov. Nelson Rockefeller. Gov. Ronald Reagan and former Gov. John Connally.

Whether more campaign funds for Percy will be sought only time will tell.

Among politicos, the question is being asked. "Why the \$90,000?" They are mystified because Percy is amply able to finance his own presidential "exploring" — as Rockefeller. Reagan and Connally are doing.

Dear Dr. Thosteson: My father-in-law is 90, very active, walks two to three miles a day. weighs from 120 to 124, has a very good appetite, eats anything and everything. Never sick except for a little sinus trouble and a little arthritis.

The problem: he has a very offensive body odor, not the ordinary B.O. The odor gets into his clothes, bed clothes, is noticeable even in his room.

My wife and I insist that he take at least two or more baths each week even though he thinks one is enough. We also make him use a deodorant.

His room is aired each day to lessen the odor, but after he has been in the room a few minutes the odor returns.

I have heard that older people have an offensive odor; however. I have been around several who did not have it. Have you any suggestions to help me?

Some old folks develop unpleasant odors; some don't. So it isn't just a matter of age.

The "two or more" baths every week would lead me to suspect that the problem won't wash out with soap and water. But exactly what the trouble is - well, best I can do is to suggest some of the things which have been found to be culprits in such cases.





"I believe that the major problem which faces this country, in the 1970s and '80s, is how we stop the growth of government - how we prevent leviathan from growing so big that it destroys our freedom and our ability to run our own lives.

This initiative in California. is to my mind, the only measure taking place anywhere in this country that offers some real hope of stopping the growth of that gigantic government." The speaker was Dr. Milton

Friedman, professor of Economics at the University of Chicago. The occasion was the Public Broadcasting Service program ."The Advocates." first broadcast in our community on Nov. 1: 1973.

There is a fundamental defect in our present democratic structure.' Friedman explained. "That defect arises from the fact that the elegislature - the government - approves individual programs, and that nobody takes a look at the whole.... You don't decide how much to spend on A.B.C and D; then add it up and say, well, that's how much income I've got. You start with a certain amount of money available to spend and

then you will apportion it out. The debate soon changed from one on the merits of a constitutional limit to state spending, to a debate on this particular California proposal Would the proposed amendment do what its proponents claimed it would do?

This observer is not a regular watcher of The Advocates, but three recent episodes have been of interest to me. Advocates on each side try to win their cases by misleading innuendo. discrediting their opponent's witnesses, and by emotional appeal


to make any rational decision on the question. The program is a good sideshow, but little else. Far from being a simple-

question of should or should not state-spending be limited, the California proposal was complicated, and difficult to interpret. It was related to total personal income to the citizens of the state. Judgments as to what it would and would not do depended at least in part, on forecasts of the future economic gains of the people of California.

People naturally fear the unknown. The effects of the proposed amendment were unknown to most of the state's voters. It was little wonder that the minority who voted on Nov. 6 rejected the proposal.
