**POLLY'S POINTERS**  
Practical Suggestions  
For Filing Clippings

DEAR POLLY—I would like Germaine to know I have made a filing cabinet for clippings and articles. My wife frequently uses it in her classroom and students in the area find it a fine source of information. The cabinet is four feet wide, seven feet high and all the shelves slide out except the middle one in each of the three vertical rows. These are fastened in securely to prevent the sides from bulging. Germaine will find that lumber companies are often glad to get rid of small pieces of 3/4-inch plywood or wallboard. A plywood door keeps the dust out and adds a better appearance. This type of cabinet keeps papers flat, neat and a pleasure to keep and file.

**DEAR POLLY—**My father was a schoolteacher. He made shelves of pigeon-hole-sized shelves in his study in which he would file his enormous collection of clippings for ready reference. He made the shelves out of orange crates. My way is different and I think more practical because I can work out a filing system much better. I use three-ring notebooks with clear plastic envelopes and black album inserts. It is easy to find clippings in these binders by subject matter, pull them out when I desire and they do not occupy too much space.

**DEAR POLLY AND GERMAINE—**I am a librarian and we traditionally file clippings by subject in file folders stored alphabetically by subject in file cabinets. Another way is to use divided boxes with the divider tabs labeled as to subject. The most difficult part is assigning subjects so that you will know where to look. Experiment with your own ideas or check the subject headings in your library or the indexes of applicable

**Safeguard Health By 'Cold' Manners**

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## Law Tends to Take Stern View Of Foreign Matters in Most Food

If Mrs. Murphy bit on a rock in a bowl of chowder and broke a tooth, she would have good cause for complaint. Ordinarily she could collect damages from the restaurant (if she ate the soup there) or from the processor (if she brought the canned). The law takes a stern view of foreign matter in food. But not every unwelcome ingredient is "foreign."

Suppose, for instance that you encounter a hard, unpopped kernel in a box of pop corn. No doubt, biting it would be an unpleasant experience. Still, the kernel would not be foreign to the pop corn. A reasonably careful pop corn eater would expect an occasional kernel, and would be able to cope with it.

In other words, the law seeks to decide how "natural" the object is in the food where it is found. Consider this case:

A woman injured her throat when she swallowed a small bone in some canned chicken fricassee. But when she sued the processor for damages, the court ruled that such a bone—at least, if not splintered—was not foreign matter.

"Bones," observed the judge, "are normally left in chicken cut-up for fricassee." But the ruling went the other way when a man eating a chicken sandwich in a restaurant downed a sharp fragment of bone. Holding the restaurant liable, the court said a diner would naturally expect to find sliced chicken and

## Aids For Your Job Can Be Deductible

Editor's note: It is time to think about the income tax again. This is Chapter Thirteen of a series reviewing the regulations, with emphasis on taking advantage of all exclusions and deductions legally due you.

Unreimbursed entertainment expense and the cost of gifts presented to customers in the ordinary and necessary course of your business.

Renal safety deposit box if used to store securities or otherwise used in the production of income.

Casualty losses, educational expenses and child care expenses, all explained below.

Alimony payments made to a divorced wife under the terms of a divorce decree or legal separation agreement.

CASUALTY LOSSES

Uninsured losses are insured to the extent they exceed \$100 to the extent they exceed \$100. The first \$100 of the loss is on you; the remainder (less insurance reimbursement) is deductible.

To be deductible the loss must be of a sudden, unexpected or unusual nature. This includes an auto accident, fire, explosion, flood, earthquake, sonic boom, storm or vandalism. It does not include erosion, termite or blight damage.

To determine loss, contrast the value immediately before and immediately after the casualty.

CHILD CARE

This deduction may be claimed by an unmarried, married, widowed, divorced or deserted woman if she pays someone to look after her children in order that she may work or seek gainful employment.

The child must be under 13 to qualify, unless the child is physically or mentally incapable of self-support. Where one child is involved the limitation on the deduction is the actual cost of the care or \$600, whichever is lesser. If two or more children are being cared for under the age of 13 the limitation is hiked to \$900.

A man may claim the deduction if he is a widower, is legally divorced or separated from his wife, or if his wife is physically incapacitated or institutionalized for at least 90 consecutive days or a shorter period if the stay in an institution is terminated by death.

EDUCATIONAL

Educational expenses incurred to maintain or improve the skills on your job or to meet your employer's specific job regulations or by law or regulations to keep your status are deductible. So, too, is the cost of education designed to enable you to get an advancement in your present job or to obtain a new position within your own profession, trade or business.

But such educational costs incurred to meet minimum requirements or initially to qualify you for a position or profession are not deductible.

Remember, as well, that fees paid any employment agency to help you obtain a new or better job are also deductible here.

## HOW'S BUSINESS?

### Despite the Competition, Steel Is a Mighty Force

Although competing metals and other substitutes have made serious and steady inroads into traditional markets for steel, this industry is still a mighty force in the nation's economy. Steel remains important as a basic ingredient for a wide range of industrial, consumer, capital equipment, and military products. In addition, it is a major item in building and construction. The industry is also important as a pace-setter in the field of labor relations, furnishing the pater for wage increases and better benefits.

1968 was a good year for steel. Indeed, production was better than expected, particularly in the second half of the year. Throughout 1968, steel consumption was at a brisk pace, supported by the upturn

of general business. Moreover, during the first half, demand for steel was augmented by strike-hedge inventory buying. When the labor crisis was averted, production was cut back so that excess inventories could be digested. However, the high level of consumption hastened the inventory adjustment process with the result that in the last three months of the year steel output turned upward again.

For full-year 1968, steel consumption (including imports) reached 108 million tons, while output totaled 129.9 million. These figures compared with consumption of 93.7 million tons and output of 126.4 million during 1967. If it were not for the record imports of steel

products, 1968 would undoubtedly have racked up an even more impressive production achievement; but foreign competition has become an increasingly painful problem for domestic steel companies.

During 1969 steel consumption should compare favorably with that of 1968. In the absence of inventory accumulation, output should decline approximately 2 percent below the 1968 total. This would still, however, be well above average on a historical comparison. Hence, economic activity should derive at least a bolstering influence from operations in steel during the current year.

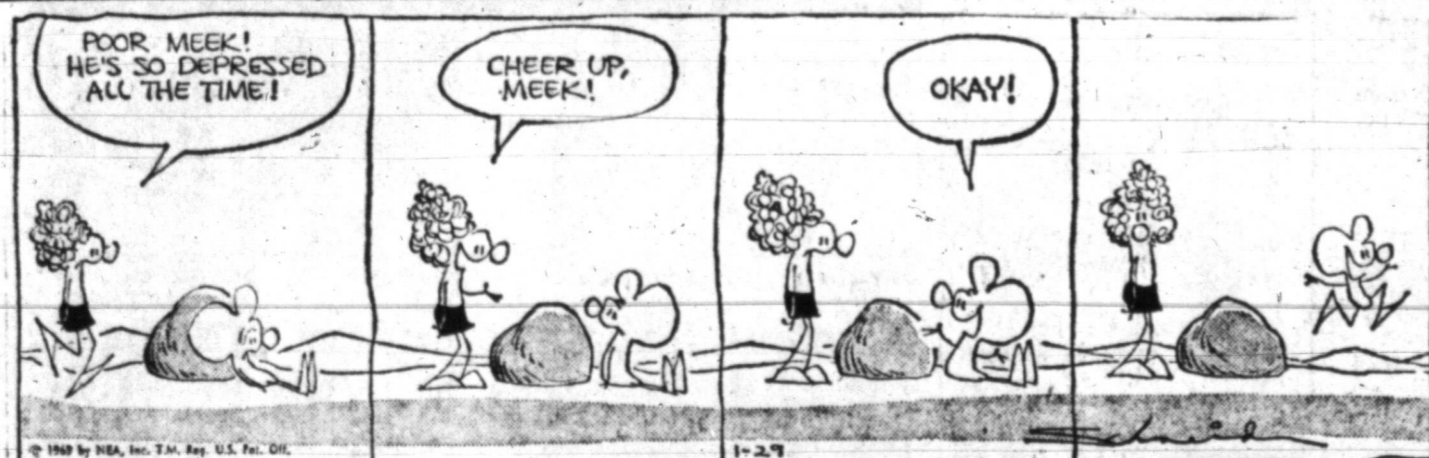

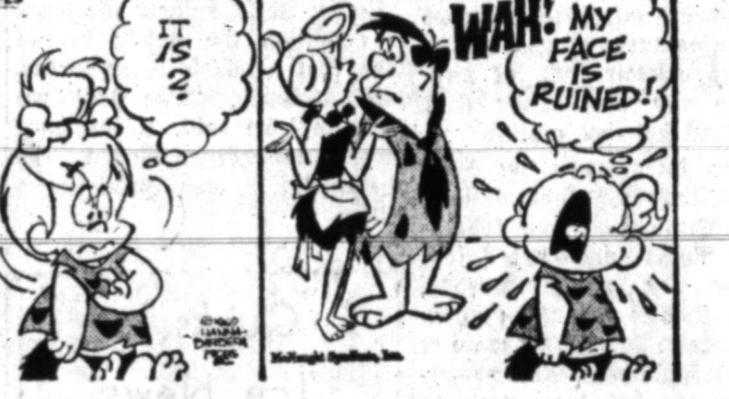

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# Harvesters Take MHS Five, 70-55

Monterey was just full of charity Tuesday night and Pampa took full advantage of it to stay unbeaten with Tascosa and Berger in second half of District 4-4A basketball race.

The Harvesters made 34 of 37 free throw shots to sink Monterey for the second time this season, 70-55 in a game that really wasn't this close.

Jim Gallman was the only Harvester regular to fail to connect from the charity stripe and that was only because he didn't shoot from there. Gallman did, however hit two of four from the field.

Billy Thomas led the point parade with 25 points, 11 of 11 from the charity stripe; Jim Hollis had 20, 10 from the free throw line and Johnny Epperson added 12 more points, 10 from the free throw line. Edward Moultrie had another good shooting night, scoring nine points, but was the only Harvester to miss a free throw, connecting on three of six.

While the Harvesters were busy making hay of Monterey Tascosa went to 3-0 in second half play by routing Lubbock, 66-44 and Berger stayed in the running with a 72-60 victory over Amarillo. Palo Duro edged Plainview, 58-55 and Coronado downed Caprock, 61-30.

Tascosa, Pampa and Berger are all 3-0 in second half play and Amarillo is 2-1. The Rebels still haven't lost a district game this season, having won all 12 they've played.

Pampa did more than just make free throws against Monterey. The Harvesters defense again showed improvement as Pampa raced to a 14-3 first quarter lead.

Almost two minutes had elapsed before Pampa got a field goal but with 6:25 to play in the opening period Epperson's two free throws put Pampa on top 2-0 then Thomas hit his first goal of the night 23 seconds later to make it 4-0 and Monterey never seriously threatened.

The Plainsmen got as close as four points three times in the second period when they put on a rally but after closing the gap to 24-20 with 1:03 left in the half Hollis and Moultrie hit two free throws each and Thomas hit a basket just before the half ended to make it 30-20.

The Plainsmen never got closer than eight points after

## Kennedy Due Senators Job

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Bob Short, the new owner of the Washington Senators, didn't say yes and didn't say no Tuesday but he did say it's "not impossible" that Bob Kennedy could be the club's new manager with George Selkirk and Jim Lemon being offered other jobs in the organization.

"It's not impossible but at this point it's merely speculation," Short said when asked for comment on a published report that he plans to relieve Selkirk, the general manager, and Lemon, the field manager, of their duties.

Kennedy, who was fired as manager of Oakland in a surprise move by owner Charley Finley at the end of last season after he had piloted the A's to a sixth place finish, is supposed to be in line to replace

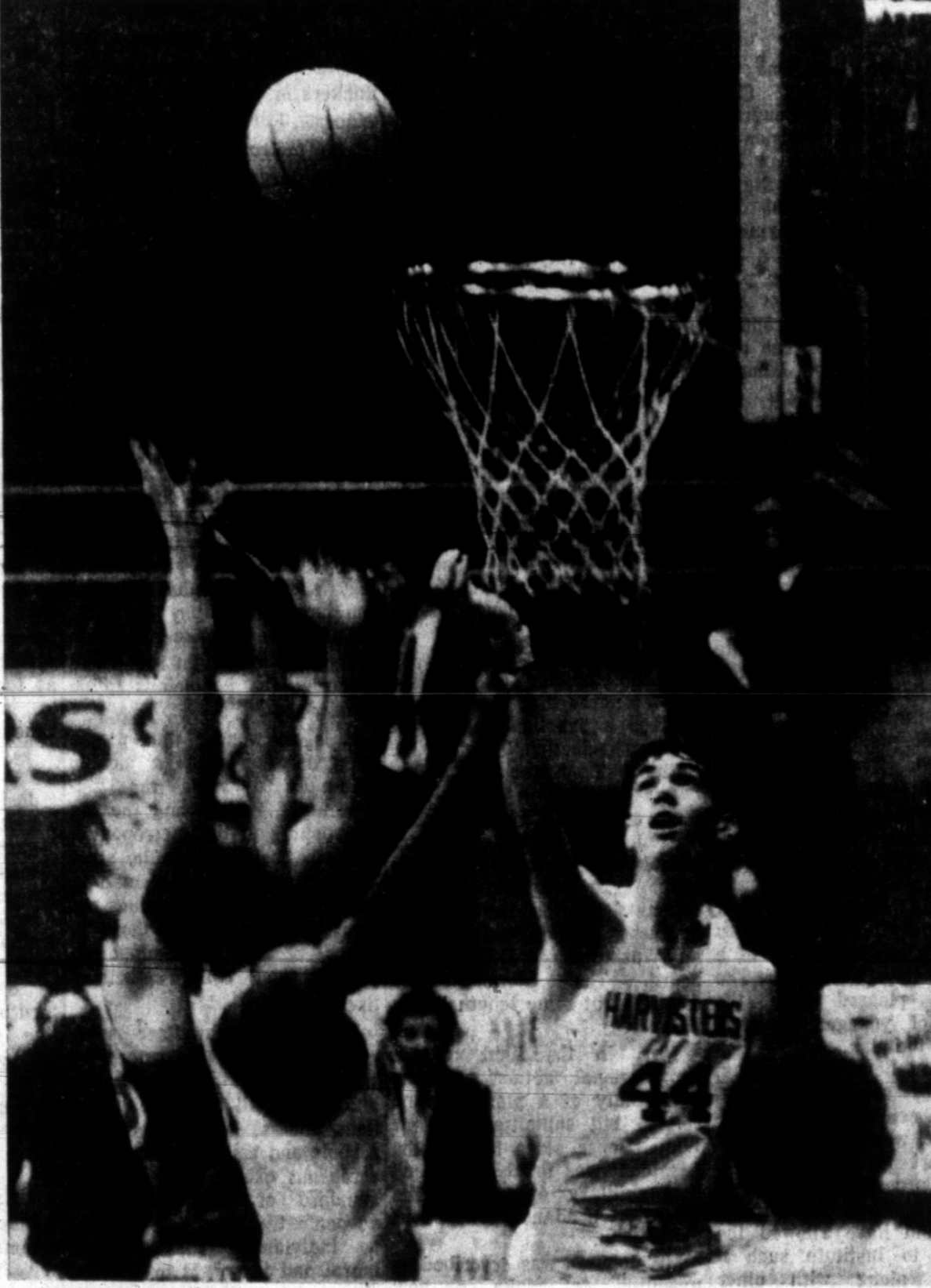
Lemon. Kennedy was hired by the St. Louis Cardinals as a scout after he was fired by the A's.

Contacted at his home in Mesa, Ariz., Kennedy said he knew nothing about any report that he would become the new manager. He said he just received an invitation from the Cardinals to join them this spring in their training camp at St. Petersburg, Fla.

Short officially took over as new owner of the Senators Tuesday afternoon and said that Wednesday would actually be his first day in the "office." He paid \$9.5 million for the Senators and is the sole owner of the club.

Short, however, said if a vacancy in Washington's managership should arise, Kennedy would be one of the logical candidates to take the post.

The Senators finished 10th last season in Lemon's first year as manager after replacing Gil Hodges, who left Washington to take the managerial post with the New York Mets.

West Texas State's Mercury Morris was picked by the Miami Dolphins in the third round.

The Philadelphia Eagles, who were expected to take Ted Kwalick of Penn State, picked third and quickly grabbed Keyes while he was still available.

The draft resumes today with the final 10 rounds expected to be completed.

Among other surprises in the first round were the selections of two Ivy League, Columbia quarterback Marty Domres by San Diego and Yale halfback Calvin Hill by Dallas. Domres had been listed as a good prospect but no one expected Hill to go on the first round.

Greg Cook of the University of Cincinnati was selected by the Cincinnati Bengals, who picked fifth, as the first quarterback to be grabbed. Pittsburgh picked fourth and took Joe Greene, a defensive tackle from North Texas St.

Green Bay took one of the most surprising first round choices, Villanova's defensive tackle Richie Moore. But the Packers have a habit of making good selections so the jury will remain out until Moore has a chance to prove himself.

The other first round picks were Ron Sellers of Florida by Boston, Kwalick by San Francisco, Bill Stanfill of Georgia by Miami, Fred Dyer of San Diego St. by the New York Giants, Rufus Mayes of Ohio State by Chicago, Ron Pritchard of Arizona St. by Houston, Gene Washington of Stanford by San Francisco.

Also John Shimmers of Xavier (Ohio), by New Orleans, Bob Babich of Miami of Ohio by San Diego, Rober Wehrli of Missouri by St. Louis; Ron Johnson of Michigan by Cleveland, Art Thoms of Syracuse by Los Angeles.
