NEW YORK (UPI)-Reynolds & Co. disagrees with recent observations by market analysts that the market is experiencing massive liquidation by informed investors, resulting from a steady deterioration of leadership over the past five years and failure of steady infusions of capital to move up stock prices. On the contrary, the

firm says, the blue chips appear to be coming back and assuming market leadership and the massive flow of public funds into the market has been primarily into established mutual funds, and thus well spread out over the market.

Hertz, Warner & Co., surveying the market during the past month, notes that some interesting patterns developed, "Activity centered on the extremes of either very conservative or very speculative areas," it says. "It would appear that investors and traders are taking a defensiveaggressive posture respectively. The simultaneous pursuit of relative safely and speculative gains is a type of hedged position that sometimes occurs when the economic and market outlook is uncertain."

Standard & Poor's believes that the past month gives an accurate preview of the market's major trend direction. "In its creeping advance of the past month," the firm observes, "the market has regained more than one-third of the ground lost in the November-January de-



The Bears, now in second place in the SWC, received their first conference loss at the hands of Texas Tech in a game played in Waco.






