Charter Members Note American Legion's 50th Anniversary

Years ago tomorrow the American Legion was born. Not m America, of course, but overseas, at Paris, France.

It has been charged that whenever as many as two Americans find themselves in the same foreign country, one will pick up a gavel and the other will address him as

"Mister Chairman." However, there were 1,000 of these GIs of 1919. They were probably homesick, it is true, but their motivation went deeper than that. After one had fought and seen one's comrades die for a cause they believed in, it was natural that survivors should desire to commemorate the joint experience.

So these American soldiers, thinking over the past and looking forward to homecoming, pledged themselves to support throughout their lifetimes the government for which each had offered his future. Thus began the organization of veterans known as American Legion.

The date was March 15, 1919. The final shiploads of returning veterans arrived back home at last, family reunions spread like measles, the men settled into civilian existence. But the purpose that had gripped them in Paris never wavered. They set about repeating the experience in their home towns and cities, drawing other returnees to them

like metal to a magnet. Pampa veterans were organiCrossman Post No. 334, named for two deceased comrades, George Kerley and Abner Crossman. Both men died from

The Post's charter was presented at a Charter Night ceremony Dec. 28, 1921.

Charter members were: Walter Purviance, Frank John Thomas, Edwin S. Vicars, Edgar Lee Reasor, Lewis O. Cox, Claud E. Cary, Raymond E. Wall, Grover C. Morris, Joseph Frank Denton, Robert T. Mitchell. Artie O. Sailor, James A. Pearson, Jeff David Lard, Roy H. Pipkin, James Woodworth. Dr. Purviance was commander. He had been in general practice here several years

before the war in which he served in army hospitals. He was stationed at Fort Sam Houston, Waco, Tex., and Fort Riley hospitals before being ordered overseas. He was serving in an Army hospital in France when the Armistice was

According to his wife Dr. Purviance in general practice was a "bedside doctor" of the old school. He built the Purviance Clinic here and had a wide clientele. But he was always the family-doctor type, driving off into the country or oilfields where a baby was expected, and remaining there all night if need be, until the birth was accomplished.

Dr. Purviance continued to practice as before when he returned from overseas, retiring only two years before his death in 1958. A community-wide "Dr. Purviance Day" had been observed to honor his 50th year of practice.

Edgar S. Vicars, 608 Buckler, was stationed at several camps in the United States, but never got overseas. He was under sailing orders, however, when the war ended.

Jeff David Lard, a corporal in Co. A. 111th Engineers, landed at Brest, France, early in the war after training at Camp Bowie. He served over-

seas one year. A carpenter, he resides at Kingsmill Cabot Camp.

Roy H. Pipkin, 1032 Charles, still resides here. He retired a few years ago but, according to Mrs. Pipkin, "was so miserable" that his doctor permitted him to go back to work. He now operates a filling station at 300 S. Starkweather.

The late Judge Claud E. Cary was perhaps one of the few soldiers who served in the Balloon Corps. He was assigned to Camp John Wise. San Antonio, on first enlistment and later trained at Central Infantry Officers Training School, also at

The Carys were a large family, the eldest four sons all enlisting for World War I.

Walter Scott Cary was on the first ship carrying American troops overseas to land off the shores of France. Brothers in the service included Joseph Lester Cary, of the Ambulance Corps; and Royal E. Cary.

The Carys came to America in the early years of this century. They were from Bristol, England. "The English Carys all spell the name without the 'e'." According to Tracy Cary, son of the late county judge, "The Irish spell it 'Carey'."

Kerley-Crossman Post, beginning with 15 members, now has 250 on the rolls. Included are most of the surviving veterans of the first World War. together with a task force of







The treaty, first major arms control agreement since the 1963 pact banning nuclear tests in the atmosphere, would bar the Soviet Union, the United States and Britain from sharing their nuclear weapons and secrets with other countries. The 85 non-nuclear signatories would relinquish their right to produce or acquire the bomb in the future.





It is evangelistic calling that is urged in the Bible. Our association with a church is far more than "name on the roll." The Bible states that the church is Christ's body (Ro. 12.5; 1 Cor. 2:27; Eph. 5:23). Therefore, your relationship with the Church is, in fact, your relationship in the body of

In the early Church new members didn't sit at home waiting for someone to visit. They themselves had to go "into all the world." This responsibility of these early Christians is ours also. Senate Considers **New Expiration** For Inspections


AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)-Texans have just over a month to get this year's safety inspection sticker on their cars. Next year-who knows?

A senate committee Wednesday approved a bill which would, if passed, allow for yearround expiration dates for inspection stickers. The stickers would expire one year from the date of the previous inspection.

"This would schedule inspections-spread them out and get away from the long lines," a spokesman for the Department of Public Safety told the committee.

Sen. Jack Hightower of Vernon said he would propose an amendment during the full senate debate on the bill which would require the DPS to send out notices to vehicle owners when their safety inspection sticker was about to expire.

The bill would also increase the cost of the sticker to \$2 and add antipollution devices to the list of items to be checked for an inspection sticker.
