China's Mao Accused In Blistering Attack

MOSCOW (UPI) - Soviet leader Leonid I. Brezhnev told a world Communist summit conference Saturday that Red China was planning a nuclear war against Russia. He warned Peking that Russia has strong forces to defend itself and its people "will not be frightened."

In one of the most blistering attacks ever delivered against Peking Chairman Mac Tse-tung by a Communist, Brezhnev accused the Chinese of continuing border provocations and of making "unfounded territorial claims against the Soviet Union." He promptly rejected these claims.

Pope's Visit Honors 22 **Catholic Martyrs**

KAMPALA, Uganda (UPI)-The July visit of Pope Paul VI to honor 22 Catholic martyrs, tortured and burned for their faith nearly a century ago, may turn out to be another step towards Christian unity.

Anglicans and Catholics were burned together in the public pyres ordered by a halfdemented African king Letween 1885 and 1887.

In the canonization ceremonies for the 22 Catholics in 1964, the Pope said: "We do not wish to forget otherswho, belonging to the Anglican confession, met death for the name of Christ."

Anglicans and Catholics alike consider this mention deeply significant despite the official Vatican position the, it is unable to bestow any kind of status "on those who have not died doing battle within our own ranks."

Nevertheless, uncontested historical facts show that the brutal, petulant King Mwanga of Buganda did not differentiate between types of Christians in his persecution campaigns and it is agreed -though much less research has been done on them—that the Anglicans, like May Be Near Reality their Catholic contemporaries. their Catholic contemporaries. went to the stake proclaiming their belief they would meet in heaven.
