

Pornographic Papers Flourish Despite Police Stand

NEW YORK (UPI)—"Get your pleasure now before it's busted," shouts the newsstand dealer one block from the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel as he openly peddles the latest example of a fast-growing, nationwide journalistic phenomenon, pornographic weeklies.

But most quickly renewed publication or have been replaced by other porno sheets, as they are called in the subterranean publishing trade. As many as 150 of these sheets have been in publication at one time or another.

The district attorneys of the five counties which make up New York City and the city's corporation counsel are working jointly to deodorize the newsstands, most of which belong to private operators. State civil obscenity laws limits court action to individual issues of periodicals as a safeguard against prior censorship, so progress is naturally slow.

Hogan has obtained a criminal complaint under the state penal code against the editor of another porno sheet, Screw, and six other defendants for whom a hearing has been set June 17. Bronx Dist. Atty. Burton B. Roberts has confiscated more than 1,000 copies of Kiss and Screw and 160 of Pleasure in the past two weeks and has served warning summonses on 17 dealers. His vow to make The Bronx off-limits to pornographers has the ring of old-time crusading.

Psychologists are not entirely sure of the effect of pornography on young people, but Dr. Eugene E. Levitt of the Indiana University Medical School warns that porno publications' gross exaggeration of standards of sexual behavior leave young men with a feeling of sexual inadequacy. This could later prevent success in marriage, he says.

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI)—A key to whether there is some form of life on Mars may be provided by ultraviolet inspection of gases in the atmosphere by two Mariner spacecraft, now more than three quarters of the way on a voyage to the Red Planet.

Ultraviolet and infrared spectrometers can measure the amount and distribution of atmospheric compounds containing carbon, oxygen, nitrogen and hydrogen. Barth is a physicist from the University of Colorado heading the UVS experiment, one of several Mariner scientific probes designed for the National Space and Aeronautics Administration by Caltech's Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

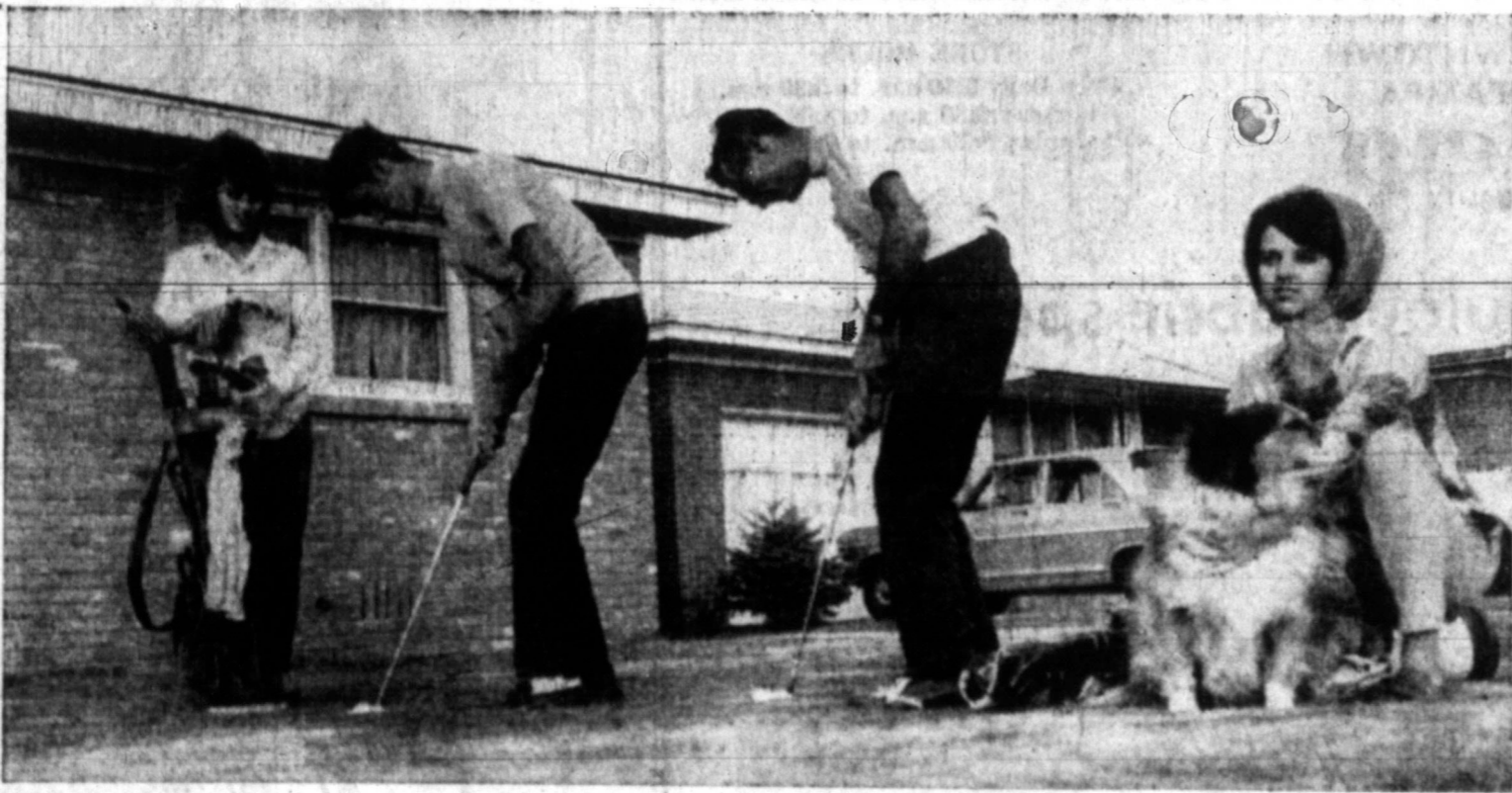

And, on the subject of performances, "Promises, Promises" offered one to rank with those previously cited—that of Jerry Orbach, who can be impressive whether he does or does not have songs.

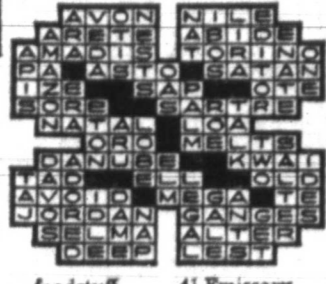

Kenworth Corp. Is Home For Mafia Leaders

NEWARK, N.J. (UPI)—The white stucco building occupied by Kenworth Corp. looks like any other business headquarters but the private conversations inside its wood paneled offices concern murder, corruption and rackets.

"The Boot hit him with a hammer. The guy goes down and he comes up. So, I got crow bar... eight shots in the head. What do you think he finally did to me, he spit at me."

Anthony "Tony" Bioardo, son of the New Jersey Mafia chieftain known as "The Boot," was describing the murder of a "little Jew" to Samuel R. Decavalcante, head of Kenworth, a plumbing and heating firm, and Angelo "Ray" Decario, another Mafia boss.

They also talked of paying off policemen and criticized two other Mafia men for operating too openly and "going right into precinct houses."

"And how long do you think it will take the federal men to find out," Decavalcante complained. Unknown to the mustachioed 52-year-old boss, the federal men already knew. They were listening.

They had planted listening devices from 1961 to 1965 in the Kenworth office; in a mountain-side night club known as "The Barn" and operated by Decavalcante; at the offices of Best Sales in Newark, owned by Jerry Catena the top man in the New Jersey rackets; and at the Penn-Jersey Vending Machine Co. owned by Philadelphia chieftain Angelo Bruno.

U.S. Atty. David M. Satz, a handsome Harvard graduate who was named by President Kennedy to handle New Jersey and is now leaving office, rocked the Mafia kingdom. New Jersey business, labor and political leaders last week by releasing 13 volumes of conversations obtained by eavesdropping FBI agents.

The dialogue in the "Decavalcante Papers" ranges from the ordinary such as when he tells his wife on the phone that "pea soup will be all right" for dinner to chilling conversations about past murders, the best method for disposing of bodies, police payoffs, read-to-order labor problems.

Soldier Killed While On Leave

SAN ANTONIO (UPI)—A soldier who had served a year in Vietnam had been on leave for three weeks before reporting to his next station was killed Thursday at the end of a hunting trip.
 Spec. 4 Richard Gonzalez of San Antonio was dead on arrival at Bexar County Hospital about 4:30 p.m. He was accidentally hit with a shotgun blast as he and three other young men, one a brother, were returning to their car after a rabbit hunt.
