Movie producer hopes to start filming in area during Oct.

Lamesa Press-Reporter A serendipitous friendship that has grown over the years has led to pre-production of a movie that will be shot primarily on the Youngblood Ranch east of Lamesa in October.

Daniel Millican, of Serendipitous Films, attended the Lamesa wedding of Kelli Merritt's daughter, Ky, with his family last year. While visiting here, Millican took a few looks around at the Caprock and got an idea for his fourth script.

"It's a 'Mad Max' kind of script. Society has broken down and a 'soccer mom' and her two children are escaping the urban life for the foothills of New Mexico," said Millican.

Millican thinks the Caprock area will be a good substitute for New Mexico in the film. Since the Youngbloods and the Millican's have been friends with for years, the Youngbloods even appearing as extras in one of Millican's films, he got permission to film on the Youngblood Ranch.

The movie will be an action film, Millican said, and the female lead has been cast but the male villian lead has yet to be filled.

"Joey Lauren Adams will be my (female) lead. She is wonderful to work with," Millican said. "She was in one of my movies, 'A Promise Kept'

"A Promise Kept" asks the question, "Do we take justice into our own hands, even for the most noble causes?" It deals with two cops facing the turmoil of chasing an unknown suspect who is killing child molesters. The movie was shown early in its release at the Lamesa Sky-Vue drive-in theater back in 2004. The Lifetime Movie Network on cable premiered the film on television in January of 2005.

Tucker Etheredge of Lamesa received billing as an assistant to the director.

"I had just graduated college and ran into Dan in

Dallas at an editing facility," said Etheredge. "We started talking and the next week we were filming a movie. Dan's a great guy, very intelligent and he's so generous with his knowledge."

Millican grew up in Austin and received his degree in Communications from the University of Texas in Arlington. He now makes his home in the Dallas/Fort Worth area with has wife, Jill son Joseph and daughter Erin.

After college, Millican went to work in broadcasting and video/film production. Later Millican worker has way up to general manager for the facility.

He has won over 30 international awards for his writing, directing, editing and producing of films, television, music, videos, commercials and corporate films.



Coyotes Upended Coyote Pups Win By Steers 28-6 Over The

The Borden County Coyote football team made a little history last Friday, I believe it is the first time that Borden County has ever played a football game in Robert Lee and against the Steers. You have to watch what you say about them also because there are a couple of staff members here in BC that is ex-steers. This is the third season for Robert Lee to be playing six man football and they are getting better at it each year, they defeated the Coyotes last Friday in Robert Lee by a score of 53 to 28.

The Coyotes fell behind early 16 to 0 when they got on the board with an 11 yard run from Michael Bullinger. Flynn Chapman kicked the PAT good and the score was 16 to 8.

In the second period the Steers scored twice to take a 32 to 8 halftime lead. The Coyotes scored 3 times in the second half to score 20 points in the half, but the Steers scored 21 points of their own.

The Coyotes second score of the game came as the Chapman brothers hooked up for their first scoring combo of their high school career. Senior Clint hit the freshman brother Flynn on a 20 yard scoring pass. Flynn kicked the PAT good for two points and the score was 32 to 16.

On the next BC score Quentin Shafer carried the ball to the one yard line on a 6 yard gain, and on the next play Clint Chapman completed a pass to Symeron Rinehart for the touch down. The PAT was no good and the score was 46 to 22 in the fourth.

on the clock Clint Chapman completed a pass to brother Flynn again for a touch down from 17 yards out. The kick was blocked and the final score was 53 to 28.

Michael Bullinger carried the ball 15 times for 121 vards and one touchdown. He caught 4 passes for 38 yards, and completed 6 out of 8 passes for 53 yards. He had 9 tackles on defense.

Clint Chapman completed 13 of 18 passes for 126 yards, 2 interceptions and 3 touchdowns. He caught 5 passes for 41 yards and had 4 tackles on defense.

Ouentin Shafer had 5 carries for 25 yards, and caught a pass for 3 yards. He had 6 tackles and 2 interceptions on defense.

Jake Cooley caught 3 passes for 40 yards. He had 7 tackles, recovered 2 fumbles and had one quarterback hurry.

Flynn Chapman caught 4 passes for 48 yards and two touchdowns, and he had 7 tackles on defense.

Dore Rodriguez caught a pass for 8 yards and he had a couple of tackles on defense.

Symeron Rinehart caught a pass for a touchdown from the one yard line and he had 5 tackles on defense.

Asa Rutherford had two tackles on defense.

Be Prepared for Disasters: Make a Plan

ness Month, it is important to become aware of ways that your family can prepare for certain disasters. Realizing that we are never fully prepared for anything out of the ordinary to happen, we can still make some preparations for general preparedness. Every household should create and practice a Family Disaster Plan and assemble and maintain a Disaster Supplies Kit (tips for assembling this kit will be in next week's paper). Each household should take specific precautions to the types of disasters that could affect the local community and plan for and practice what to do if these disasters occur. In our area, we often think of tornadoes, fire and flooding. However, we may not realize that even a short power outage or a severe ice

storm are also disasters. You will find some basic questions and information to help you "realize" the dangers of not being prepared.

First, find out what could happen to you and your family. How should you prepare for those disasters? What can you do to protect your home and avoid or reduce the impact of the disaster that might occur? Does your community have a public warning system? How will you learn of disasters when they occur? If you care for young people, elderly or people with disabilities, how can you help them in a disaster situation? What might be some special needs to What about consider? animal care after a disaster? Second, find out about the disaster plans at your

workplace, your children's school or day care, and other places where members of your family spend time. You should be prepared in case disaster strikes and learn steps you can take to prevent or avoid disasters.

Next, create a family disaster plan. Now that you know what disasters are possible in your area, have a household meeting to talk about how to prepare and how to respond to a disaster if one occurs. Plan to share responsibilities and to work together as a team. Consider the following for your family plan:

- \$ Know what to do in case household members are separated in a disaster.
- \$ Keep it simple, as disaster situations are stressful enough.
- \$ Pick two places to meet (right outside your home in case of a sudden emergency and outside your neighborhood in case you cannot return home or are asked to leave). \$ Pick two out of town
- contacts (a friend or relative as a primary contact and another friend or relative as an alternate contact). Make sure that both adults and know the children primary and alternate contacts' names, addresses and home and cell

phone numbers, or carry the information with them. Make sure you tell the contact where you are and how you can be reached if you ever have to contact them in case of an emergency.

- \$ Discuss what to do if a family member is injured or ill.
- \$ Discuss what to do in the rare circumstances that authorities advise you to shelter-in-place.
- \$ Discuss what to do if authorities advise you to evacuate.
- \$ Be familiar with evacuation routes. \$ Plan how to take care of your pets.
- \$ Make and complete a check list. (Post emergency numbers. Teach all responsible members or the household how and when to turn off the water, gas and electricity at main switches or valves)
- \$ Be sure to have working smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors in your home.
- \$ Know how to use the home fire extinguisher.


\$ Plan home escape routes (know where the safe places in your home are; keep a complete and current inventory of your home, garage and surrounding property and always keep the originals of important documents in a safe deposit box or fire/water proof safe).


s Practice and maintain your plan. Review it at least every six months and refresh your supply kit with fresh food, water and batteries. Conduct fire home and emergency drills at least twice a year.

Hopefully with some of these insightful questions and suggestions, you and your family can be prepared for a disaster should it ever occur. Remember, it never hurts to be prepared! 
