POLLY'S POINTERS

Methods To Clean Cane Bottom Chairs

DEAR POLLY — Sometime ago a reader asked how to clean old-fashioned rush and cane chair seats. We have several such chairs and have found the following to be most satisfactory. Wipe seats with a cloth wrung from a solution as follows: Place a quart of boiling water in the top of a double boiler, add three tablespoons of boiled linseed oil and one tablespoon of turpentine. Put boiling water in the bottom of the boiler to keep the solution hot but do not place this mixture directly over a flame.

For dry ones let them completely dry and they will be very hot and retain the heat for some time. I place a large plastic bag inside a heavy paper bag, drop the hot towels into the plastic bag, close the top and quickly carry them to my patient. I spread the hot towels on his back, put a small rubber sheet over them to hold the heat in. This saves wringing out and burning my hands. Pulling the covers up over his back also helps keep the heat in longer.

Now I often put hot towels and other clothing (just out of the dryer) on my knees, shoulders and neck while I fold the wash as I am usually in pain due to arthritis. As one piece cools I replace it with another and continue with the folding.

Polly's Problem
DEAR POLLY — I have a very large completed piece of needlepoint-petit point that was worked many years ago. Even though it has never been used, the background has faded. Can this piece be dyed or what do the readers think I might do to brighten this?

DEAR POLLY — My husband is bedfast with a back ailment and his doctor prescribed hot packs to help relieve the pain. I not only sloshed hot water carrying the pan and wringing out the towels but I burned my hands and still the packs were not too hot by the time I applied them to his back.

Now I use my clothes dryer, set on HOT, for such things. The towels can be partially dried if you want a wet pack.

Tough Cookware
A hint for "kitchen maids." Now nonstick finishes are being applied to the outside of kitchen cookware. This inside-outside application, called hardbase, is tough, comes in colors and may be applied to a variety of materials, such as glass, ceramics, aluminum and cast iron. It boasts heat resistance to 800 degrees, making it safe in hot soap or detergent suds.

Self-Cleaning Blender
The container of a blender can be self-cleaning by using this method: Add a dash of soap to a half full container of warm water and turn on the machine for a few seconds. Rinse and dry.

Fashion Winner Is A Hand-Knitted All-Season Three Piece Costume

What is a fashion winner? It's something you knit—with a little extra know-how.

The all-season style I'm featuring today is one of those three pieces that you can wear together or separately to expand your wardrobe.

Each piece is knitted in three complementary colors or in three shades of a single color. Worn together, they form an

interesting pattern of repeat colors. For a change of pace wear the skirt with a solid color shell and do just the reverse with the shell of your new costume. The scarf has an added attraction, too. Wear it as a headband when it's not a flattering-neckline tie.

The three-piece dress is simple to knit in a choice of yarns. Directions are available for sizes 8-14. Remember, these are the new sizes adopted by the knitting industry, corresponding to ready-to-wear sizes. This means, for example, that a size 16 in the former sizing category probably would wear a 14 now.

Knit Knacks
DEAR JUDY LOVE: I've been knitting for nearly a year now, and from time to time I still have trouble knitting to the proper gauge. I always make a swatch first, but I find that I'm not always consistent throughout a garment.

DEAR MRS. G: Your predicament is not unusual, and

there are many assorted reasons for it. For instance, worry or nervousness will cause a person to knit tightly, while an especially relaxed mood has a relaxed effect on your stitching. Also, I've found that many knitters will produce quite a difference in tension between knit and purl stitches. If you find this is the cause, the answer is practice. It really does make perfect!

Several church executives and agencies have urged their denominations to encourage passage of the proposed amendment to the Texas constitution which would authorize the Texas legislature to spend an additional \$20 million for welfare.

Space Age Could Present Some Shattering Theological Questions

United Press International In Houston, Tex., three American astronauts are sitting out a three-week quarantine as a safeguard against the possibility they may have picked up strange microbes on the moon. While most scientists consider it highly unlikely that living organisms exist in the airless environment of the moon, it is widely believed, within and without the scientific community, that space-voyaging man sooner or later will encounter evidence of extra-terrestrial life.

C. S. M. Lewis, thought it probable that the universe contains living beings who are both morally and intellectually superior to man. He suggested that the vast distances between solar systems are God's way of quarantining the violent and self-centered human creatures of earth, to prevent them from spreading their spiritual sickness to happier worlds.

Dr. Bill Holchak, director of the social concerns committee of the Wesleyan Community Center in San Antonio, contends that families with dependent children who have been receiving welfare assistance are "suffering terrible hardship" because of the two recent cutbacks in monthly payments.

Dr. Kenneth L. Teegarden, whose office is in Fort Worth, sent a letter to the leaders of 475 congregations urging them to vote for Amendment 5 and to encourage other church members to do the same.

Lutheran Unity Gets Major Boost

DENVER, Colo. — The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod gave major impetus to the cause of Lutheran unity when its 48th general convention in July here approved a declaration of altar and pulpit fellowship with The American Lutheran Church.

By a margin of 522 to 438 on a written ballot, delegates adopted a resolution which stated that "with joy and praise the Synod herewith formally declare itself to be in altar and pulpit fellowship with The American Lutheran Church."

When the result was announced at the opening business session this morning, spontaneous applause broke out and brisk hand clapping mingled with cheers throughout the convention auditorium. Then, more soberly, delegates and visitors sang "Our God Our Help in Ages Past."

James Dunn, secretary of the Christian Life Commission, Texas Baptists' agency which speaks to social concerns, issued the following statement, authorized by unanimous vote of the commission at its quarterly meeting.

The classes are programmed to include children from 2 years old through the sixth grade. The theme for Vacation Church

School this year will be "The Church in Today's World". Sunday Evening the 1st Rho Youth Group will meet at 6 p.m. under the leadership of Mrs. Nadine King.

The functional committees of the First Christian Church will meet at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday, Aug. 6. The official board, Mr. Bill Atkinson, chairman, will meet this same night at 8:30 p.m. Immediately following the functional meeting.

Church Invests In Black-Owned Bank

HOUSTON — The Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Texas this week invested \$15,000 in the black-owned Riverside National Bank here.

Dr. Kenneth L. Teegarden, executive minister, and Edwin F. Johnson, business administrator, acted for the state church body in investing the special reserve funds in certificates of deposit.

Commenting on the significance of the investment, Dr. Carroll said: "Riverside National Bank has been engaged for several months now in small business loans in high-risk circumstances. These kind of investments will make possible the expansion of such practices."

One of the specific recommendations contained in a lengthy "Message" the Disciples' General Board issued in May was that "units of the Christian Church" put "fifteen percent of their investment funds in those institutions that engage in regular-cost loans to the poor, the powerless and the racially alienated, with special consideration for minority-controlled banks, savings and loans and businesses."

Rockwell Executive Says Moon Trip Broke Bonds

GLORIETA, N.M. — "The resurrection joined the earth to the stars because it gave man a reason not to cower in a cave, but to develop potentials, to move, to grow, to plan larger vistas," Edward B. Lindaman told Southern Baptist young women July 22.

Lindaman, assistant to the vice president for management planning, North American Rockwell Compay, Space Division, compared the recent moon voyage to the trip of Columbus, breaking down the last remaining barrier between the old world and the new world.

Following a description of space-age inventions to come, Lindaman suggested that man in space may someday ask himself, "Is what I see below merely an uncontrollable biological process? Is what I see merely a chance combination of protons in a cosmic test tube? Or do I see a community of beings trying to become more human by sharing, trying to follow in the footsteps of One, the Creator of the earth?"

Reading from Romans 8:18-23 (TEV), Lindaman emphasized God's plan to reveal his creations to man. "I consider that what we suffer at this present time can't be compared at all with the glory that is going to be revealed to us. All of creation waits with eager longing for God to reveal his sons... we also groan within ourselves as we wait for God to make us his sons and set our whole being free."

Council Of Churches Divided In Response To Manifesto

The top echelon leadership of the National Council of Churches is sharply divided over a response to the Black Manifesto. The manifesto was issued April 27 by the National Black Economic Development Conference (NBEDC), a new organization headed by black militant James Forman. It demanded \$500 million in "reparations" from U.S. churches.

Some Negro church leaders are urging the council to give its blessing to the NEEDC. They also want the council to raise \$500,000 from its member denominations to finance a headquarters and staff for the NBEDC.

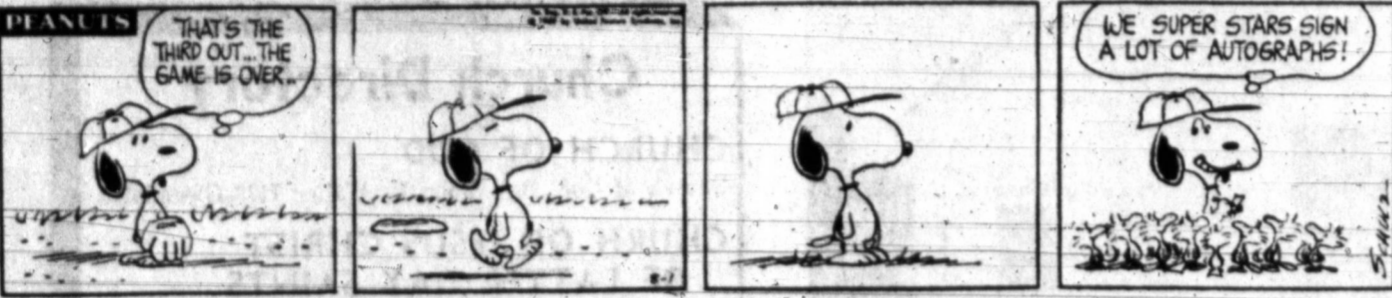

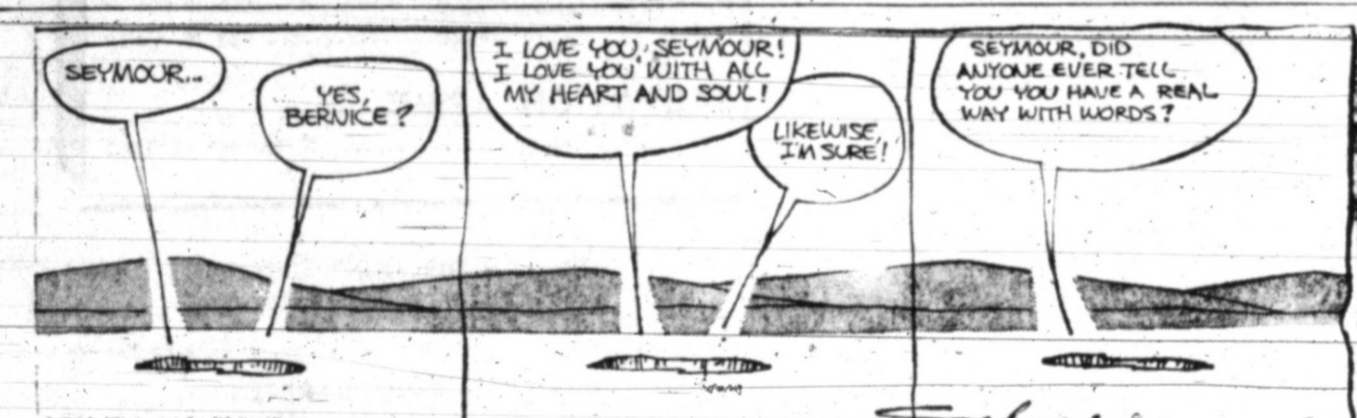

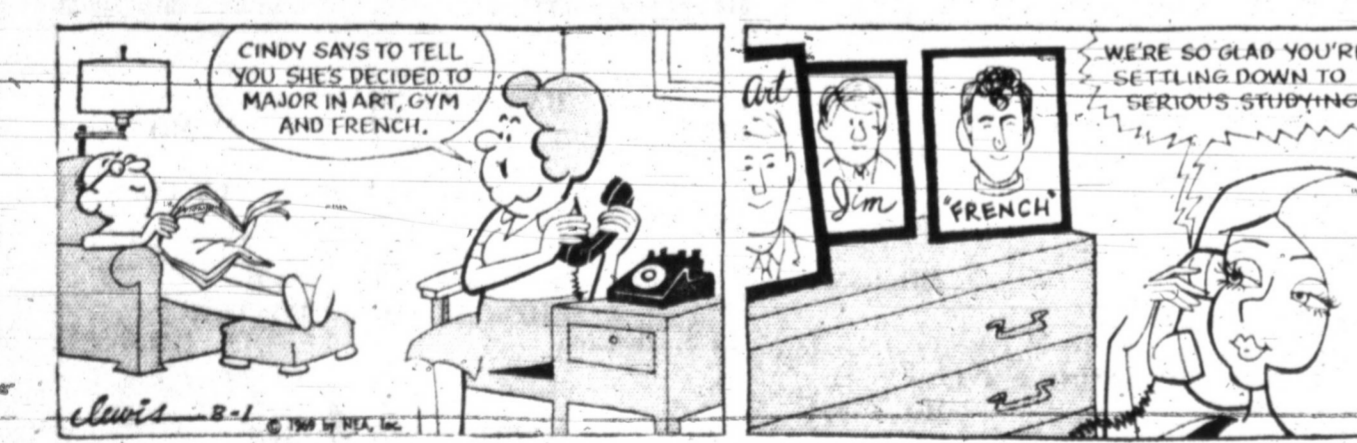

Graham said his offense had enough plays so that "we can do what the Jets let us do."

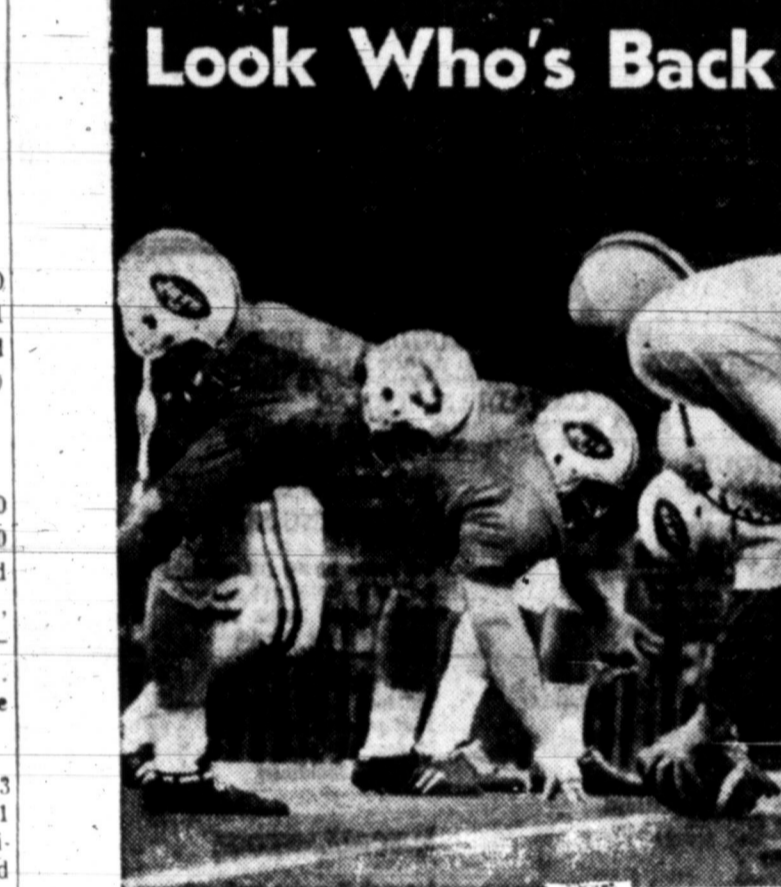

USGA Changes Rule On Putting Again

NEW YORK (UPI)—The U.S. Golf Association has second-guessed itself and decided that the old way of putting was best.

Beginning Jan. 1, 1970, the golfer farthest from the cup will putt first, the way he did before the USGA installed a rule, intended to speed up play, that one player hit his putt and continue until he got the ball in the cup.

USGA officials said the change didn't work out, and brought about so much confusion it offset any time-saving factor.

Also revoked was a rule that a ball can be picked up and cleaned only once after the golfer has reached the green.

The rules "have not been as fully effective as had been hoped in achieving the objects for which they were introduced—namely, speeding up play and reducing the occasions on which a ball on the putting green may be lifted," a USGA official said.

In certain conditions of weather—and course maintenance, the rule providing a ball could be cleaned only once "has been found to operate unfairly as between players, especially
