Nixon Asked To Withdraw Hurd's New Nomination

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations subcommittee on Western Hemisphere affairs, asked President Nixon today to withdraw the nomination of Texas oil man John Hurd as Ambassador to Venezuela.

Hurd was Texas campaign manager for Nixon in 1968 and is president of the Independent Petroleum Association of America. A native of Laredo, Tex., he owns interest in independent oil operations.

Church said Hurd "has been actively engaged in the movement for tighter oil import quotas."

"To send an oil protectionist to Caracas is like sending a Zionist to Cairo," Church said. Church said oil import policy "far overshadows any other issue in U. S.-Venezuelan relations."

"Pan American oil man who has lobbied for stricter import quotas, sent to Caracas as the new American ambassador would inevitably inflame Venezuelans across the political spectrum," Church said. "It would be like sending fire to fuel."

Church said Hurd might make a commendable ambassador to a country where oil does not figure so largely, "but I cannot give my advice and consent to sending him to Venezuela."

Top News In Brief

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House passed a bill Monday setting aside the "Pompeii of America" in Colorado as the Florissant Fossil Beds National Monument.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon is expected to announce a pullout of 50,000 more American troops from Vietnam in late August and may schedule another withdrawal of 50,000 fighting men in October, it was learned today.

SPACE CENTER, Houston (UPI) — Astronaut Neil Armstrong celebrated his 39th birthday in quarantine today while scientists studying lunar rocks pondered the age and origin of the moon.

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) — Mariner 7's closeup pictures of Mars early today exhibited "fantastic detail" a bewildering variety of surface features on the already mysterious planet, including a bright spiral marking dubbed "The Great Shoelace."

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Nixon's important message on welfare reform Friday is expected to propose a federal floor of \$50 a month payments to all adult welfare clientele—the aged, blind and disabled.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — With a six-month extension of the income tax surcharge on its way to the White House for approval, House liberals have opened up a campaign to head off a second six-month extension.

MOSCOW (UPI) — Moscow Radio said today President Nixon's "lunar diplomacy" was an attempt to cover up all America's recent "contradictions and failures." In an English-language broadcast beamed to North America, Moscow Radio said it was no accident Nixon's world tour coincided with the successful Apollo 11 moon landing.

Voting Light At Five County Polling Places

A "light turnout" described the action mid-morning as Gray Countians went to the county's five polling stations to indicate their wishes on the nine proposed constitutional changes.

At the courthouse, where precincts 2 and 7 through 14 were voting, Election Judge J. B. Austin said the turnout was "surprisingly good."

"We've had about 75 an hour since we opened at 8 a.m. today," he said.

The polls will remain open until 7 p.m. tonight. At Laketon Farm Supply, Precinct 6 Election Judge Ralph McLaughlin said, "It has been pretty light so far. Our first voter came in about 9:30 a.m. and since that time, they've been 'trickling' in."

McLaughlin said he expected the vote to pick up around noon and again this afternoon. "It's usually slow in the morning."

In Alareed, Election Judge Marvin Hall said "The vote is very light. We've had four in

so far this morning." He indicated he, also, expected the voting to pick up this afternoon.

At Grandview, 10 votes had been cast by mid-morning according to Mrs. Keith Davis, election judge. She said she thought most of the people will be coming in about 4 p.m.

Only 21 voters had shown up at McLean's City Hall by 11 a.m. today, according to Homer Abbott, election judge.

"It's been very light so far," he said.

Today's balloting is on nine constitutional amendments proposals, eight of which involved spending more money.

Two critical proposals are on the massive Texas Water Plan and a higher ceiling on welfare payments.

New Taxes Possibly Delayed Until 1970

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — Texas legislators today awaited voters' answers to two questions that could drastically alter the legislature's spending and taxing outlook.

If voters approve a constitutional amendment authorizing annual legislative sessions, Gov. Preston Smith says he will let the legislature consider annual budgeting again. That could delay new taxes until 1970.

If the voters defeat a constitutional amendment raising the state welfare ceiling, it will reduce the tax need by \$30 million, Smith, Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and Speaker Gus F. Mutscher all hope the amendment will pass, however, because they say its defeat could bring on a "welfare crisis."

The \$30 million already has been appropriated, contingent on passage of the amendment.

Defeat of the welfare amendment would reduce the tax need to \$27.5 million under Smith's budget, \$286 million under the house version, and \$327 million in the Senate budget.

The legislature appeared to be operating on the assumption that the annual sessions amendment would fail.

Barnes and Mutscher Monday appointed a conference committee to write a final version of a two-year budget and told the conferees to wait until a tax bill has been passed so they can tailor the spending bill to fit the amount of revenue that will be available.

The House Tax Committee was scheduled to recommend late today a \$306 million tax bill made up entirely of sales and cigarette taxes.

The bill would raise the state sales tax from 3 to 3½ per cent, extend the sales tax to beauty, barber, repair, laundry and cleaning services, and increase the cigarette tax from 11 to 15 cents per package.

Mutscher said the House will debate the bill Thursday and sent it to the Senate by the end of the week. The actual tax bill is expected to also be written by a conference committee, however.

Barnes warned the budget conferees Monday to be prepared to work under last-minute deadline pressure. He said he does not expect a tax bill to be passed until the last week of the special 30-day session, and possibly not until the final hours.

"It may be that the appropriations conference report will have to be worked out in the last few days or hours," Barnes said.

Barnes and Mutscher both urged the conferees to get to work immediately on preliminary bills.

MIAMI (UPI) — The Great One is in love.

"It's true, he's very much in love," a spokesman for comedian Jackie Gleason said Monday.

Television and filmdom's fat man—who's been reducing lately—wants to marry Beverly McKittrick, an executive secretary from Miami, as soon as he can get a divorce from his estranged first wife, Genevieve. The Gleasons have been separated since 1954.

Gleason met Miss McKittrick about three months ago, shortly after he broke up with his longtime companion, Honey Merrill.

Gleason's divorce suit, filed in October when New York State made separation grounds for divorce, is being contested by Mrs. Gleason. The suit is now pending in a New York appeals court.

Investigation Continues In Coed Murders

YPSILANTI, Mich. (UPI) — Police today investigated "striking similarities" between the murders of seven young women in Michigan and five in California who may have died on a cross-country killing spree by two men.

Police here and in California said there were "striking similarities" — including earnings missing from many of the victims — that suggested the same person or persons could have been responsible for the Ann Arbor-Ypsilanti murders over the past two years, and the California deaths.

While John Norman Collins remained in his Washtenaw County maximum security jail cell, the FBI and police searched for 6-foot-1-inch, 235-pound Andrew Manuel, 25, alias Richard Diaz, whose last known address was the rooming house Collins lived at in this university community.

Collins and Manuel were believed to have gone to California together in June and July. Police said the pair used Collins' car to tow a trailer rented by Manuel, but they returned without the trailer.

When I watch all the cavortin' at the dances in the television westerns, I am irritated about the kind of image the young folks get of their pioneer forebears. Amused too, especially remembering a remark of Mrs. George Kibler's when she was reminiscing with me and with her daughter, Janie Belle Meadows.

Mrs. Kibler said she attended a dance where a certain young man started to "swing" her - meaning pivot her as the caller called "everybody swing" - by the waist. She informed him that boys swung her by the arm!

Much later than the time Mrs. Kibler recalled, I was a little girl at all-night dances being courteously invited by my uncles to dance a set with them. And I saw grandfathers dancing with their granddaughters, spreading an open snowy handkerchief between their palms and the backs of the little girls. If anyone had grabbed hold of a young woman and jumped and bounced and kicked the way the TV dancers do, they would have been very quietly escorted off the floor! It was my grandmother's boast that she could dance the thirty-two step schottische with a cup of water on her head. And she and a neighbor, Ruth "Widow" Robinson, spent many an evening dancing to the tune of our victrola when they were in their sixties. Come to think of it, looking ahead, that isn't nearly as old as it seemed then!

The Harvey families are having a re-union. Joyce came from El Paso with her children, Bill and family from New Jersey, and all are together here with Pat, Joe and Louie - all but Anna who lives a long way off, South Africa.

Did I ever tell you about the letter I had from Ernest Archambeau of Amarillo regarding the late Mr. A. H. Doucette who started surveying the White Deer lands in 1906? Mr. Doucette found old roads on the White Deer Land Company's White Deer pasture which followed the Fort Smith Santa Fe trail and it was his opinion

that Capt. Marcy and Lt. Simpson camped on Section 240, Block 2, & GNRR Co. lands. That would make it not too far from Price Headquarters where Buddy and Ida Ruth live, maybe about where the old log barn once stood.

Going back in history is always interesting and it is a shame that more folks do not tell their own family of local history and show them the historical places.

My husband, talking to his friend and neighbor, Dock Stockton, told of the old water wells in our north pasture and of the dugout where the family once lived. He was horrified that I had lived in this neighborhood all my life and on this place for 35 years and did not know that there were two hand dug wells before the windmill was "augered" out by him and Elbert "Red" Moore, or that I didn't know the location of the half-dugout where the family lived.

Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—News papermen, as often as not, are superior to the celebrities they write about. In fact, more often than not.

Yet the fact is that, too often, the work of really fine newspapermen is glossed over when they pass on. Notoriety much too frequently substitutes for quality in the obituary columns.

There were tributes, fitting and proper, when Dean Gysel, the television and radio critic of the Chicago Daily News, died in an automobile accident recently in his mid-30s.

And today I would simply like to add a few of my own words about him, not only because he added stature to the business I am in, but also because he was my pal.

If you read Dean's stuff, you were fortunate. He could smell

a phony at 50 paces, and he could smoke him out with his typewriter. He had a police reporter's instinct for where the action was.

If you had known him, however, you would have been even more fortunate. Despite his youth and contemporary awareness, he was a throwback to the traditional newspaperman-image—the charming, casual wisecracker to conceal his inherent shyness. He seemed to toss off his daily pieces with ease.

In the few years he was on the TV and radio beat, his reputation and authority had grown swiftly.

In any business, there are really only a relative handful of truly first-class talents. And that is why, among Dean's fellow critics and throughout the network, there was an added sorrow in his death.

Despite his worldliness, however, Dean was a soft touch, a patsy.

Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI)—One major news item with important near-term market implications is the surtax, says Bache & Co. "If Congress allows the surtax withholding provision, to expire this week, it will have dealt the anti-inflation forces a severe body blow," it adds.

Fiscal restraint thus removed must be replaced by additional monetary restraint, which could seriously crimp the market, the firm observes.

The worst that could happen in the market at present would be a return to a slow downward drifting on low volume, notes E. F. Hutton & Co. A minor rally could start anytime, however, as the market is quite oversold and due for some kind of rebound, the firm says.

Since the government and the Federal Reserve Board are committed to "a fight to the finish" against inflation, Spear & Staff notes, either a prolonged continuation of the anti-inflation measures now in effect, or new and more drastic

moves to stem the upward spiral can be expected. Either one spells continued pressure on stock prices, "and there does not seem to be any good news in the offing to offset the pressure," it adds. By this time the market probably has discounted a slowdown in economic growth, but not a sizeable recession, the firm adds.

Business psychology will become even more conservative in the year ahead than is justified by the economic trend, Business and Investment Service observes, and the market can be expected to overdiscount lower earnings and the high cost of money, as well as government efforts to contain inflation. However, the current low in common stock prices is not a harbinger of a major bear market, the firm says.
